

Firstly the Department of Communica-tions refusing all their appli-cations for Road Passenger Licences; secondly there was a disturbing increase in Garda activity against them over the past two yars; thirdly was the constant media attention which was afforded CIE spokesmen trade union leaders and misin-formed public representatives accusing the private sector of "creaming off" the lucrative routes while the fourth problem arose from the recent CIE


