Callves are too valluable to lose The effect of a difficult calving on a cow is very expensive. Aften calving, clear the calif's mouth and nostril. Sever the cord two inches from the call's body and disinfect with tincture of iodine. Ensure that the calf gets biestings within 2-4 hours of birth. The calf should consume approximately 7 pints collos trum within the first 12 hours of life. The calf should suckle from all four teats. An alterna-

tive is to milk the cow and feed it directly to the calf, giving the calf at least three feelds in the first twelve hours. The colostrum should be fed to the call three times daily in the

INCREASES ON AND FROM 1 MARCH 1986

On and from 1 March, 1986, VAT rates will be increased as follows by virtue of a Financial Resolution passed by Dail Eireann on 29 January, 1986 (Budget Day):---

- All goods and services at present liable at 23 per cent. 1. The rate will be increased to 25 per cent;
- 2. Live cattle, sheep and pigs. The rate will be increased to 2.4 per cent; Farmers' flat-rate addition.

IMPORTS

The new rates will apply to imports on and from 1 March, 1986, also.

TRANSITION TO NEW RATES

VAT-registered traders are advised to proceed with their preparations on the basis of the instructions contained in Chapter 22 of the "Guide to the Value-Added Tax" (September, 1985, edition).

IMPORTANT

VAT-registered traders who have chosen to calculate their VAT hability from moneys received are reminded that they will be liable for VAT at the new rates on all moneys) received on or after 1 March, 1986, including moneys received in respect of goods and services supplied before that date.

OTHER VAT CHANGES

Services such as meals and catering, cinema and certain other entertainment services, certain repair and maintenance services, and certain personal services will become liable to VAT at 10 per cent on and from 1 July, 1986. These services will be liable at 25 per cent, from 1 March, 1986 to 30 June, 1986. Hot take-away foods will become Wable at 10 per cent on and from 1 July, 1986. An explanatory leaflet will be issued in due course.
