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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### STILL WAITING

Despite an announcement last week that senior executives of the U.S. based Sterling Drug Company were due to visit Dungarvan "within days" and that an announcement confirming their intentions to go ahead with a major pharmaceutical plant on the outskirts of the town was expected, no visitors have, as yet, arrived. We are in fact still waiting, as we have been for the past four years, to learn what the eventual outcome will be.

It was in December 1981 that Mr. Eddie Collins, T.D., Minister of State officially announced that Sterling Drug were to construct a large plant in the Lisfennel area (close by to the Stafford Miller complex). At that time hopes were high that when erected and in full production the plant would employ a workforce of up to 300. It augured well for Dungarvan.

However as time passed following this official announcement, no fresh moves to get the project moving took place. It was accepted that the worldwide recession had affected the Sterling Drug plans for Dungarvan and that they had been temporarily "moth-balled." Doubts were then publicly expressed that the project had fallen through but it was pointed out by the County Manager and the members of his County Development Team that the Company still owned the site which had, in the first instance, been selected and purchased by them for the project.

Last week then the dormant project seemed to be ready for release from its moth-balls when a whisper came down through the grapevine that Company executives were expected to visit the town for on-the-spot consultations with the County Manager, members of the County Development Team and the Regional Officers of the IDA.

However up to the time of penning these lines on Tuesday afternoon of this week the expected executives had not arrived in the town and all that an inquiry as to the latest position could realise was that the matter was still, as it has for the most part been in the past, rather vague. So we are still waiting!

### DRIEST AND COLDEST

The month of February which ended last Friday was the driest in this country since records were first kept and the coldest since 1947.

Over the 28 days of February we had an incredible low rainfall with a recorded level of only 5.5 millimetres—which fell mostly as snow (snow constitutes rain in official 'met' figures).

With sub-zero temperatures being recorded practically throughout the entire period, not only did we have a dry and viciously cold month but February this year will also be recorded as being one of the windiest and duller ever. With monotonous regularity easterly winds with a Siberian edge blew with frequent force 7 or 8 gales up to 34 knots.

The first "real" rain after an unprecedented dry period extending over almost six weeks fell on Monday last and with the disappearance of the easterly gales the air temperatures

shot up an amazing 10 degrees in a matter of hours. It happened so quickly that you could almost feel the air around you heating up!

### NOT BEFORE TIME

Barristers could soon be under sentence of banishment from the Irish legal system, for the offences of being "outmoded" and "milking the system." A consultant is to prepare a detailed report on the whole operation of the law and the activities of solicitors and barristers for the Dail Committee on Crime, Lawlessness and Vandalism. It is expected that a comprehensive submission urging radical changes in the legal system will be put before the Dail for debate as soon as the Committee completes its investigations.

The Committee has already unanimously agreed that the system needs an overhaul and one member, Fine Gael Deputy Gay Mitchell, favours the abolition of the "two-tiered" legal system which forces solicitors to hire barristers at enormous cost to clients before cases go into the higher courts. He believes that solicitors are competent enough to deal with all cases right up to Supreme Court level.

Deputy Mitchell also favours the abolition of the wigs and gown routines stating that "it's time the Courts were dragged into the 20th century. The whole thing has become as outmoded as the wigs and gowns."

We have alluded to the need to modernise our courts and again add our voice to this latest call to dispense with the trappings of the imperial traditions which still surround our courts.

### TEACHERS ON STRIKE

Schools in many parts of the country were closed this week as teachers began a concerted three-week campaign in support of their demand for the full implementation of their 10 per cent arbitration award. Teachers have claimed that they had "been driven on to the streets by the Government" in this latest escalation of their campaign.

It is disconcerting to see that the teachers' unions have decided to escalate their confrontation strategy in this manner. They have made capital out of the overwhelming support which the rank and file members of the three unions concerned have given to the decision to initiate this latest strike campaign and claim an almost 100 per cent support for the move. Surely in the light of the present dire economic position of the country some acceptable compromise could have been worked out without having the children in our schools and their parents forced into the position of being levers in the dispute.

Teachers have claimed, inter alia, that they have the support of the bulk of parents in their stand "for their rights." But parental support for teachers must stop short at the endorsing of strike action and the disruption of the educational progress for all children and especially for those facing exams in the near future. They have also vehemently denied that it is money which has

**URBAN WATER CHARGES**

I would as an individual and as a Councillor, like to express my point of view. I read with great interest the letter from Cllr. Wright, and would have agreed with some of his comments. I also read the statement from the Chairman of the U.D.C.

Firstly I personally thought Cllr. Wright was a bit hard on Cllr. Goode and secondly I would like to make it quite clear that I never made any pre-election promises to anyone on anything, not even on the water charges. I said I would do my best for anyone at local level if I could.

I am opposed to water charges as I think water is a God-given right and I appreciate the fact that the U.D.C. in Dungarvan need money for roads, repair work, lighting and jobs, etc.

I would not be in agreement with Cllr. Richie Walsh that we were confused over the issue of National Taxation and Local Taxation. As far as I'm concerned the working class pay more tax than any other sector of our community and water charges are a burden on the less well off. I would like to let the people know that the Council in Dungarvan operate a waiver system whereby people on low incomes, the unemployed and people living on their own can apply for relief or exemption of water charges.

## DISQUALIFIED FOR THREE YEARS AT CAPPOQUIN COURT

A Co. Tipperary motorist, who failed to appear at Cappoquin Court, on a charge of driving with excess alcohol, was fined and banned from driving for three years by District Justice W. F. O'Connell.

John Slattery, Derryvoher, Ballylooby, Cahir, was convicted of the offence at Lismore Bridge on October 26 last. He was fined £100, endorsed, and disqualified from driving for three years.

Garda Denis O'Reilly and Pat Norris told the court that they were on duty on Lismore Bridge that night when the defendant's car passed at speed. They gave pursuit and stopped Slattery at Cappoquin where they arrested him on suspicion of drunk driving. He subsequently gave a urine sample which on analysis disclosed he had an alcohol concentration of 181 milligrams.

Supt. M. English disclosed that Slattery had a previous conviction for drunk driving.
