

# VAT DISCOURAGES REPATRIATION OF ART ITEMS

VAT regulations are discouraging the repatriation of Irish works of art, Mr. Richard Wood, Director of Fota House said last Tuesday night at the opening of the Wiggins Teape Exhibition of Illustration in the Craw-ford Gallery of Art, Cork.

"A one way valve is in opera-tion which facilitates the export tion which facilitates the export of our patrimony by putting no financial obstacles in the way of those who export heritage items, no matter how important," Mr. Wood said. "Yet those who wish to repatriate them have to pay what is laughingly described as the lower rate," which has recently gone from 23% to 25% and this has to be paid at the point of entry to this country." he added.

"Ireland," he said, "must be the only country in Europe which actively encourages the dispersal of its own heritage in this way."





The game, FOCAL FUN, has been invented and is being manufactured by the firm of CPR Teo. Baile na nGall Ring

Blasically it consists of 1000 cards in each game with an English word on one side and its Irish equivalent on the back, together with a playing board, a 6-coloured dice, 100 playing tokens or pegs, and a set of rules. Progress on the pllaying board comes as a result of giving the correct Irish word for the English one on the card drawn by a player.

There are three grades in the one box, which makes it suitable for three separate age groups or standards of Irish.
