## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### TOP OF THE LIST

Minister for Communications Jim Mitchell last week publicly accused RTE—radio and television—of being ever and over-ready to stress the bad rather than the good news. While we see the Minister's point we must, at the same time, point out that for the most part, the news that is worthy of headlines is more often bad than good.

So for a change this week we are pleased to be able to put some good news at the head of our list. This concerns the decision of the American based Sterling Drug Corporation to reactivate their plans for the re-establishment of their Rumsom Chemicals plant in Dungarvan. First announced in December 1981 by Minister of State Eddie Collins the project has since been lying dormant. Despite the Job's Comforters who several times in the interim forecast the collapse of the project, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, who also heads the County Development Team, never lost his optimism for the project and maintained that in the long run the dream would become a reality.

The latest moves which saw a number of top executives visit Dungarvan last week-end where they held discussions with Mr. Hurley and senior officials of the IDA and met a number of leading local business executives indicate that as far as Sterling Drug and Dungarvan are concerned things are at last really on the move. The project now only awaits Government approval.

### SCHOOLS STRIKE RESUMES

As a new wave of teachers' strikes began on Tuesday morning, parents were becoming increasingly alarmed at the damage being done to their children's education by the dispute. They felt they have been betrayed by both the Department of Education and by the teachers where the whole sorry mess is concerned.

The general secretary of the INTO has defended the spread of the strikes saying that the education service was being disrupted by the government's action and not by the teachers. The current issue of "Fine Gael News," a 2-monthly Newsletter issued by the Fine Gael Press Office, Leinster House, Dublin, which may be accepted as genuinely reflecting the government's views on the matter completely rejects the teachers' claim.

In an article on "Teachers' Pay," it states as follows: "There is a fair deal of confusion on the issue of teachers' pay. The unions have misled their members into imagining that an arbitrator's award is somehow the unchallengeable 'word of God.' Secondly they have ignored the fact that the award is being offered, albeit without back money. In short, not only are they being offered

the same terms as others in the Public Service but they are also being offered their special pay award on the same basis as is being offered to other groups with such special awards.

"The arbitrator is not a referee in a football match. In a football match, both sides agree to be bound by his decision. In the arbitration system, neither side does. The teachers have never wanted binding arbitration.

"In 1979, ASTI, INTO and TUI demanded a review of their pay outside the normal conciliation and arbitration machinery. They threatened industrial action if the Government would not give in. So, in early 1980 a review body on teachers' pay and conditions was set up (its membership decided in consultation with the teachers' unions). It made recommendations in September 1980. The teachers rejected most of the recommendations and threatened industrial action again. Mr. Haughey's Government gave in to their demands with pay increases of 34.3%. The Review Body resigned in protest.

"It has always been part of the system that the Dail had the right to overturn or amend an arbitration recommendation. "A package has been offered to the unions (not formally because they broke off negotiations on 15 January): 17.9%, a 3% increase from 1 May next, followed by the first third of the special 10% award from 1 December next, followed by a 2% increase from 1 May, 1987 followed by the second installment of the 10% award from 1 December 1987 and finally, the final installment on 1 July, 1988. These increases would apply not only to the common basic scale but to the whole range of teachers' allowances as well."

And that's how the other side sees the matter. However as we have stated before, it is the children who will suffer in the long run and nothing can justify their use as pawns in the game.

### NEW BRIDGE DESIGN APPROVED

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, informed members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday that the approval of the Minister for the Environment for the design of the new bridge over the river Collihan on the new Dungarvan By-Pass Road had been received by him that morning.

He added that as a result, he hoped to be able to put the construction of the bridge to contract soon and to have builders on site by the beginning of September.

The Chairman of the Council, Cllr. John Carey and

## Co. Council's Call To Legalise Monofilament Nets

Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday by a majority vote passed a motion proposed by Cllr. Patsy Kennedy calling on the Minister for Fisheries to legalise the use of monofilament nets but with a curtailment as to the length of nets allowed.

Moving the existing proposal Cllr. Kennedy said the existing laws which banned the use of Monofilament nets was nonsensical. "The nets are legal to buy and legal to sell and the government collects VAT on sales," said Cllr. Kennedy, "but they are illegal to use. The fishermen must use these nets to survive but they have no option under the law as it stands."

Cllr. John Carey, Chairman, said that he would have to oppose the motion as if it were passed it would prove detrimental to river salmon fishermen and he had been asked by the fishermen at Passage East, to declare his stand on the issue and was now doing so.

Another motion proposed by Cllr. Jackie Fahey, T.D. which was passed unanimously asked the Minister for Fisheries to take urgent steps to revise the laws relating to salmon fishing and in the meantime to take steps to prevent commercial fishermen from going to jail for offences committed under the existing out-dated laws.

Deputy Fahey said that when laws became outdated as the existing fisheries laws now had they led to harassment and to people going to jail. While agreeing that there was a need for the conservation of salmon stocks he said that fishermen were also entitled to a fair crack of the whip if their co-operation in this regard was to be expected. "I appeal to the Minister to tackle this problem with all the urgency possible," he added.

Cllr. B. Swift said that from the discussion on this matter it was evident that there was a big difference of opinion between the estuarine and the off-

shore salmon fishermen and he believed that the only way to solve all the problems involved was to call on the Government to hold a sworn public inquiry to decide what the needs of the salmon industry were, and he proposed that they call for the holding of such an inquiry. This proposal was seconded by Cllr. Carey and was also passed unanimously.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that the opinions expressed showed the piecemeal manner in which these fishery problems were being dealt. He thought that the obvious need was for the Minister and his officials to meet the fishermen and to discuss the problems. "If this were done," said Cllr. Kyne, "it would take some of the hostility out of the situation and could start a discussion which would bring about the desired results for all concerned."

### PLANNING PROBLEM IN CAPPOQUIN

Cllr. James A. Walsh complained about the big number of refusals for planning permission applications in the Cappoquin area and said that because of existing regulations these were now being confined to a very small space in the locality. He said that practically all the prime sites had now gone and very few options were now open to people seeking to build houses in the area.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that in the light of the information which had been submitted by Cllr. Walsh, Mr. J. Shine the Chief Planning Engineer was again looking into the position and they would be in touch with Cllr. Walsh on the situation later.

### WHAT HAS MINISTER IN MIND

Cllr. O. Wilkinson proposed that the Council ask the Minister for Education if he would let the people of Cappoquin know what he has in mind for the town and district now.

## UNEXPECTED DEATH OF VERY REV. FR. JOHN F. MORRISSEY, P.P.

The news of the sudden death of Very Rev. Fr. John F. Morrissey, P.P., which took place at the Parochial House, Carrickbeg, Carrick-On-Suir, on Wednesday, March 5, came as a stunning blow not only to his family relatives and to his parishioners but also to his legion of friends throughout the entire diocese of Waterford. He was aged 64 years.

Fr. John was member of one of Dungarvan's best known and most highly respected families. Son of the late John J. and Mrs. Morrissey, 88, O'Connell Street, he was brother of Mr. Liam Morrissey and also of the late Patrick J. Morrissey, Solicitor, and former Coroner for West Waterford and of the late Mr. Vincent Morrissey.

Education at the local C.B.S. and at Mount Melleryar Seminary, Fr. John Francis completed his theological studies at St. John's College, Waterford and was ordained in the Cathedral, Waterford, on June 8, 1944 by Most Rev. Dr. Coghlan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore. He celebrated his first Mass at the Mercy Convent in Dungarvan.

Following his ordination, Fr. John's first assignment was to the English Mission and he served as curate in Middlesboro for two years. In 1946 he went to Australia and served in the Diocese of Adelaide for 5 years before he returned to the home diocese and was appointed curate at Glendine, Knockanore where he remained for a period of five years. In 1956 he was appointed curate and Chaplain and was based at Kilkham Barracks, Clonmel and served with the 35th Infantry Battalion in the Congo.

In 1964 Fr. John returned to pastoral duties when he was appointed curate at Aghish and from there he went to Kilsheelan before he was appointed

Parish Priest of the Parish of Kilsheelan, Clonmel and Kilsheelan, in February, 1985 he was transferred as Parish Priest to Carrickbeg.

As a person Fr. John F. Morrissey had few equals and as a young man he was an outstanding hurler being particularly proud of the fact that he wore the old blue jersey of his native Dungarvan with distinction in many great games. He was an expert river angler also and nothing gave him greater pleasure than to spend a few hours with rod and line whenever he could find the time.

As a priest he was kind, considerate and understanding and was ever available to help anyone who found the burdens of life too heavy to bear. He was beloved of the parishioners in all the parishes throughout the Diocese where he had served during the forty odd years in which he had laboured in Rev. Lord's Vineyard. His sudden death now while he still had so much to offer is mourned by all but by none more than his family relatives, his friends and his Bishop and the clergy of the diocese to all of whom deepest sympathy is now extended.

The remains were removed to St. Molleran's Parish Church, Carrickbeg on Thursday and honour guards lined the funeral route from the Parochial House to the Church. Concelebrated Mass was offered on arrival of the remains.

On Friday afternoon Most Rev. Dr. M. Russell, Bishop of the Diocese was chief celebrant of the Concelebrated Requiem Mass with co-celebrants Rev. Fr. J. Griffin, C.C. St. Mary's, Dungarvan and Very Rev. Fr. M. Russell, P.P. Modeligo and in all 91 priests from all over the diocese were present and formed an honour guard as the funeral left the Church for Dungarvan.

On arrival in Dungarvan the remains were received and blessed at St. Mary's Parish Church by Very Rev. Dean Cassidy, P.P. and another large choir of clergy. The remains were laid before the high altar and prayers were recited.

Cllr. Wilkinson referring to the Community school differences which had arisen between the towns of Lismore and Cappoquin, recalled that it was decided some time ago by a majority vote at a parents meeting in Cappoquin to seek their own secondary school facilities and a request had been made for a meeting with the Minister to discuss this proposal.

"So far," said Cllr. Wilkinson, "this has not been granted and as we are now running up to the end of another school year there is a great deal of uncertainty arising and as a parent concerned about the matter myself I know what damage this is creating especially among the children."

It was then unanimously agreed to contact the Minister for Education and to ask him to announce his decision in regard to the proposal for Cappoquin as quickly as possible.

## Multi-Million £ Industrial Project For Dungarvan Re-Activated

Good news for Dungarvan and district this week comes in a report that the U.S. Sterling Drug Company has decided to resurrect its interest in the establishment of a giant multi-million pound pharmaceutical plant in the town. First announced in December 1981 the project has remained in the wilderness for the past four years while many questions about the future of the industry, registered as Rumsom Chemicals were raised.

Last week three senior executives of Sterling Drug International visited Dungarvan including the Managing Director designate of the Dungarvan project, Mr. Michael Burke, where they met and had discussions with the County Manager, Mr. Hurley and senior executives of the IDA including Mr. Frank Burke, Manager South East Region.

The purpose of the visit was to discuss the planning implications involved in the construction of the massive plant which will occupy a floor area of 85,000 square feet and the procedures to be followed and also the appointment of the Consultants to supervise the construction work.

A reception was held at Whitechurch House Hotel on Thursday for the visiting executives which was also attended by a number of leading local

businessmen including Mr. Stephen O'Connor, Chief Executive Waterford Co-op Society and Mr. Michael Holland, General Manager, Dungarvan Crystal.

### MANY CONSTRUCTION JOBS

Work on the building of the plant is expected to commence this year and could take two years to complete. This will provide a big number of jobs for construction operatives over the entire period.

During the week, the "Leader" learned that the new Rumsom plant will be one of the biggest I.D.A. backed projects in Ireland this year and by far and away the biggest undertaking

in the south-east region. When completed and in operation it will be a pharmaceutical finishing plant, one of the main project lines to be handled being the well-known drug panadol. In this it will be an entirely different project to that which was first announced in 1981.

It is anticipated that the new industry plans a modest beginning and to gradually grow in time to full production capacity. An application for the necessary planning permission to commence building is expected to be lodged with Waterford County Council shortly and from the discussions which he has already had with the Company executives, the Co. Manager, Mr. Hurley has expressed himself as being totally satisfied that there will be no environmental problems either visual, effluent or air emission concerned.

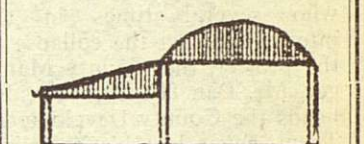

# Big Turnout Expected For St. Patrick's Day Parade

All is now in readiness for next Monday's St. Patrick's Day parade in Dungarvan, and after three months of major organisational effort, the local Pipe Band Committee are hoping for the biggest, and most colourful parade to date.

It was back in 1976 that the Pipe Band stepped into the breach and revived the St. Patrick's Day Parade which had lapsed several years previously. Ever since the Band has taken on the very onerous task of organising the parade, and the entire community owes those involved a very deep debt of gratitude.

No fewer than 130 circulars have gone out, to the various clubs, organisations, and industry, inviting participation in the parade. And even now if there are some who did not receive the circular but who are

interested in being a part of the great celebratory occasion they can be, and will be, accommodated by the organising committee.

**SPONSORSHIP**

This year the Pipe Band has received generous — but well overdue — sponsorship, and the main sponsors of the parade are Waterford Co-Op., Dungarvan Credit Union and Radley Engineering Ltd. In addition financial support has been received from two anonymous sources for which the committee is very appreciative.

As in former years the parade will begin from Crofty's Corner at Abbeyside at 3 o'clock and will be headed by the Dungarvan Pipe Band — fittingly. Two other bands, the Dungarvan Brass Band and the Castlelyons Pipe Band, will also be in the parade.

Having passed the reviewing stand the parade will proceed along O'Connell Street, Wolfe Tone Road, Mitchel Terrace, Mitchel Street, Mary Street, and back to Grattan Square, where the various prizes will be presented by representatives of the sponsors.

**TROPHIES**

This year there will be no fewer than seven category awards, the most prestigious being the Fr. Paddy O'Riordan Perpetual Trophy (a brand new one this year) which goes for the best overall float.

All the other awards will be adjudicated by Fr. Michael Brennock, Prior, St. Augustine's, Mrs. Joan Baily and Jimmy O'Donnell.

"Needless to remark we would like to have all the parade entries in by this week-end," said Pipe Band chairman Jim Veale. "We will however accept entries right up to the final minute," he added.

## ST. PATRICK'S HOLY MOUNTAIN

(The lonely summit of Croagh Patrick where our national apostle communed with God and prayed for the people whom he loved so dearly)

Croagh Patrick, originally known as Cruachan Agli or the Eagle's Mount, is situated on the shores of Clew Bay and rises to a height of 2,510 feet above sea-level. It was on this lonely summit that our national apostle communed with God for 40 days, praying for the welfare of the people that he dearly loved.

Nine years after Patrick's return to Ireland he visited the area, called Aghagower in the west of Ireland and it was then that he decided to make this mountain a place of prayer and fasting. The great Dr. Healy writes of the place thus: "The beautiful cone of this hill called Croagh Patrick rises just above the low hill surrounding Aghagower, that heaven-aspiring soul of Patrick must have longed with an ardent longing to reach the summit. The lone grandeur of its soaring peak has a strange fascination for the beholder.

The ancient chroniclers record that "Patrick went to Cruachan Agli to fast, forty days and nights. His stay on the mountain was a time of great penance — no food, no water — from Shrove Saturday till Easter Saturday. It was during his stay that an angel came to visit and confer with him and from this heavenly messenger Patrick for the Irish people asking on their behalf certain promises from the Lord. "That the Irish would hold fast to the Faith until the end of time; that a tidal wave would inundate the island seven years before the Last Judgment, thus sparing his people the fearsome spectacle of fire which would destroy the world on the Last Day; that no enemy would ever hold Ireland by force or consent and that every Irishman doing penance, even in the last hour, would not be

# "NEED TO RESTORE SENSE OF REAL VALUES" SAYS MUNSTER MEP

There was need to restore a sense of real values to many people in all age groups in this country including some in high positions in church and state, Munster Independent MEP, T. J. Maher said when examining the official opening of the nine day West Waterford Drama Festival in the picturesque Waterford village of Ballyduff on Sunday week last.

Mr. Maher, complimenting the organisers of the Festival and the Amateur Dramatic Societies involved, emphasised the importance of all aspects of our culture and heritage to us as one of the small member states of the expanded EEC. There was, Mr. Maher said, for some unexpected reason, a lack of enthusiasm in high places for a serious and concentrated effort to promote a more intensive national interest, particularly through our educational system in Irish culture.

There was also a less than satisfactory approach to the teaching of Irish history at Primary and Secondary level in our schools. The people of provincial Ireland, under native government, have to endure Dublinitis, Mr. Maher said, which was not unlike the influence of the Anglo Saxon Pale under British rule. Then the people refused to be other than Irish. It was now time, Mr. Maher said, that we told our own government that we want more emphasis on Irish culture, Irish heritage and Irish history, national and local in our Primary and

Secondary schools. We need to teach our young people to be at least equally aware of their responsibilities to their country as of their rights under its constitution.

Continuing, Mr. Maher said Amateur Dramatic Societies over many years had played an important role in the social and cultural activities of Urban and Rural people in Provincial Ireland. Drama Festivals, he went on, had added a new and welcome dimension to their activities by providing an incentive, and at the same time a challenge to raise standards and providing an expert assessment of the participants in individual and collective roles within their respective Drama groups.

## WAYS FORWARD

Mr. Maher said, that while this country was faced with extremely serious social economic and financial problems, there were ways forward to better times, provided we were prepared to work hard enough to create them. Tourism, Mr. Maher said, was one of the industries where intensive practical promotion could give quick returns, creating jobs and generating wealth for less investment than in any other section of the economy. He said that already he made a public appeal to the government to declare 1986 Irish Tourist Year. The only response from the government, Mr. Maher went on, was to lump this important Depart-

ment with two other Departments when it should have the sole attention of one Senior Government Minister.

Local Communities must, interestingly, themselves more in the economic development of their Region. Tourism was an industry with potential for all areas. Mr. Maher said, every part of Ireland has something different and special to offer the visitor.

## UNITED EFFORT

Calling for united efforts at all levels in communities to help in job creation, Mr. Maher proposed that each parish in Ireland should examine how, with the aid of local Drama Groups they could present the history of their area in Pageant and make the occasion of staging such a pageant the local point of a major drive to promote the Tourist potential of their area.

Such an activity, Mr. Maher said would have multi beneficial effects on the regions, social, economic, cultural and educational developments as well as providing a meaningful role for many people in relating the story of their place.

We could, he said, replace imported canned entertainment with real Irish life for Tourists. Our future depends particularly in Tourism, on our ability to offer our visitors only what is truly Irish entertainment. Food and drink of the best quality at good value. That we can and must do if we are to promote jobs for our people.

# COLLINS WELCOMES IDA GRANT ASSISTANCE TO SMALL INDUSTRIES IN WATERFORD

Mr. Eddie Collins, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Industry and Commerce and at the Department of Energy, last week welcomed the announcement by Mr. Michael Noonan, T.D., Minister for Industry and Commerce regarding details of small industry projects which have been grant assisted by the IDA in recent months.

In relation to Waterford Mr. Collins said that he was very pleased that a total of eight small industry projects in Waterford City and County had been grant aided by the IDA in recent months. Mr. Collins said that Mr. Noonan's announcement was in addition to an announcement by him last December when he had the pleasure to announce approval

of IDA grant assistance to 29 new and expanding small industry projects in the South East region, 9 of which are based in Waterford.

Three of the new projects are located in Waterford City, one each in Dunmore East, Crooke, Portlaur and Tramore and one in Kilmacthomas.

Waterford Pressure Vessels Ltd., Kilmacthomas, is being set up by Mr. Thomas Murphy and Mr. Leslie Brown to produce high pressure filters and vessels for the gas pipeline industry. The capital investment of £47,100, part of which is being funded by IDA, has created 2 jobs and a further 4 jobs will be created over the next 2 years.

Stressing the importance of

Small Industry in Ireland, Mr. Collins said that in the small industry context Ireland's performance in the international field is excellent, and activity on this front has to-date been very encouraging. He said that the employment share of small establishments in Ireland is higher than most developed countries, and the Government's determination to expand the small industry sector stems from a recognition that small industries are enduring and adaptable.

Mr. Collins added that while many large and small firms have failed as a result of the international recession, employment in grant aided small firms has increased by almost ten thousand within the past five years.

**FEED SHORTAGE**  
 Silage is available to purchase in areas of the county and it is costing approx. £16 to £18 per ton (self collection) or up to £22 per ton (delivered). These prices are for good quality well preserved silages.  
**EARLY GRASS**  
 Urea is suitable for early grass when the soil surface is wet. Do not use Urea when (1) Soil conditions are very dry or (2) if the field has been limed in the past 6 months. Spread 1 bag (46% Urea/Acre) Check grass growth on fields fertilized with Urea in early February. CAN (27%N) or Nitrogen compounds are suitable for early grass. Spread approx. 40 units of Nitrogen (1 1/2 bags CAN) per acre. Avoid spreading before heavy rainfall in order to reduce losses caused by surface runoff. Use Urea rather than CAN on fields that have been heavily coated with slurry, as this reduces losses due to denitrification bacteria.

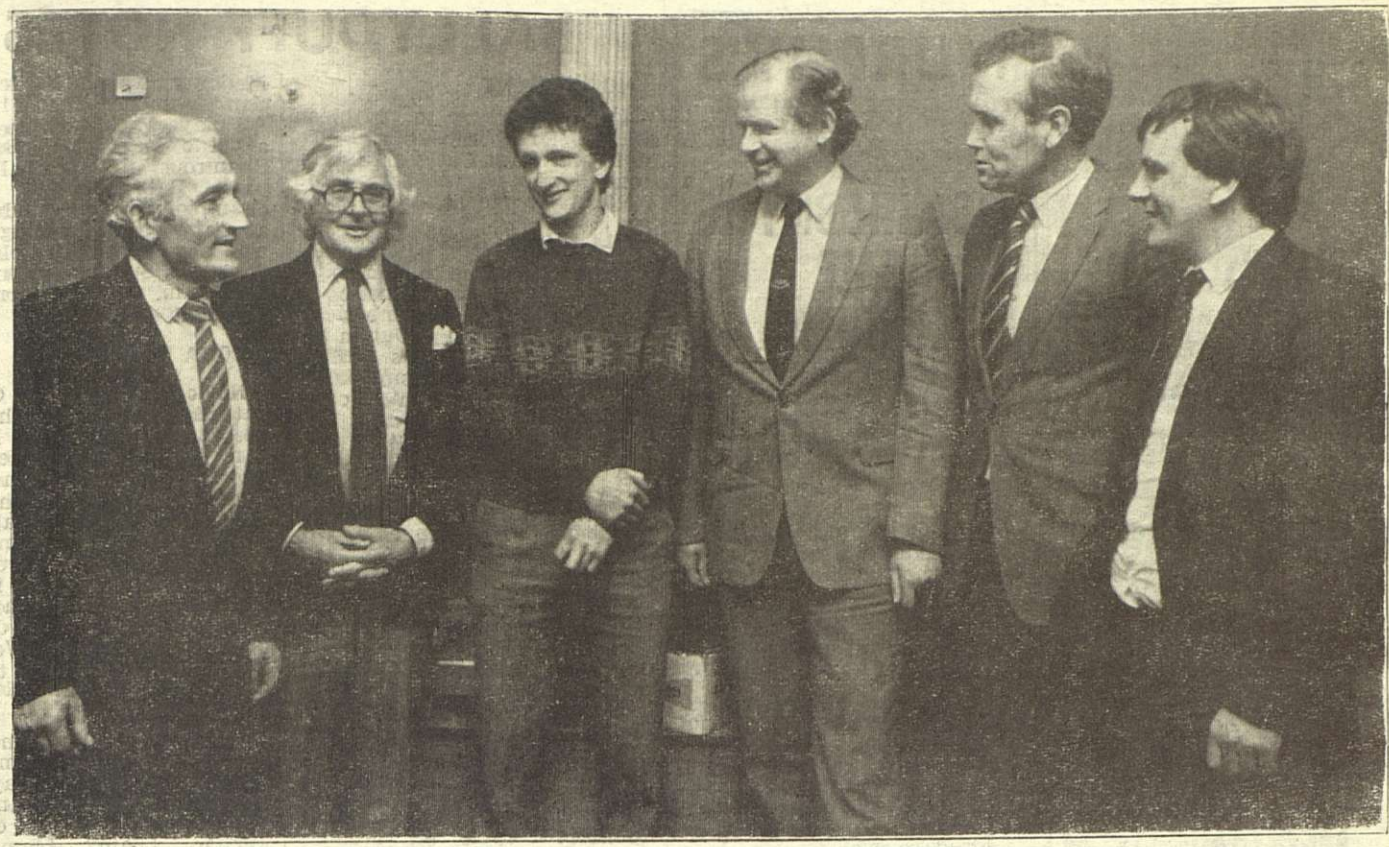

ONE LAW

Under the above caption the editorial comment in the current issue of the Incorporated Law Society of Ireland "Gazette" refers to the failure of successive governments to enforce the law of the land. Having referred in particular to the continued operation of pirate radio stations it then states:
