DUNGARVAN AND ABBEYSIDE

Saturday next May 24 will mark the beginning of what promises to be a memorable nine days in the parishes of Dungarvan and Abbeyside and indeed for the people of all the other adjoining parishes as well. On that day the Solemn Novena to our Mother of Perpetual Succour will come to this area for the first time and it will be preached and celebrated in St. Mary's Parish Dungarvan and in Abbeyside Parish Church.

There will be four sessions in each church daily for the nine days and the times are published elsewhere in this issue. The Novena or Festival of Faith will be preached by seven Redemptorists-six from Limerick and one from Australia who is at present in this country doing a post-graduate

theological course. Members of the Order have been in the area over the past fortnight laying the founda-1 tions for the running of what is hoped to be a most successful and fulfilling period of religious renewal for all.

As one of the Order explained last week-end this is a regional novena rather than a mission either. It will embrace not only the parishes of Dungarvan and Abbeyside but all the parishes within a radius of many miles of the town. from all the arguments on the matter which he had listened in the ownership of Dungarvan U.D.C. and accordingly substantial purchase costs would be involved. There would also be significant costs involved in carrying out detailed site investigation to establish the pre-cise scientific suitability of each to develop it and to enter into site. I am satisfied from the examination I have carried out that none of the sites merit such investigation at this time. We have carried out a detailed and critical examination of the proposal to extend the existing waste disposal site at Ballina muck. This examination has been carried out by An Foras Forbartha, who are an inde-pendent State Agency set up to provide such environmental advice to Local Authorities. Their report has shown that the Ballinamuck site is suitable for the purpose and, that provided certain controls are exercised, it will not have any adverse environmental affects. Ballina-muck is ideally located in relation to Dungarvan and its hinterland, and it is already in the ownership of the Urban Council. Accordingly, I again recommend strongly that the U.D.C. proceed with the development of the Balliannuck site.



It Started With Two! - Reflections Of A Celebration At Knock Shrine

Kenya, and in hospital clinics in Nigeria: you'll find them in mud-huts in Peru, and in high schools in Florida; you'll find them in social work in Central America and South Africa; you'll find them in schools and hospitals of Dungarvan or Zambia. They are, of course, the Irish Mercy Sistens — 22,000 of them — the third largest reli-gious Order in the Church. Only two male orders—Jesuits and Franciscans—have higher numbers, and, though the French Sisters of Charity were once more numerous they now have been overtaken by the Irish Mercy Sisters. Little did their founder, Catherine Mc-Auley anticipate such a bright future, when she opened a house for Dublin poor at Bag-got Street in 1827.

"I never intended founding a religious congregation," she could say later. "All I wanted was to help the poor because that seemed to be what God was asking of me." But just as the small acount grows into a solid cells tree, where brenches solid oak tree, whose branches provide shelter for many living creatures, so too, the Sisters of Mercy have increased in num-ber so that from Canada to Guatemala, from Zambia to Argentina, from Belize to New Guinea, you'll find Irish Sisters of Mercy building up God's Kingdom. Whenever there are sick and poor wherever people are lonely or in need, there you will find the followers of Catherine McAuley. That's why she built in Baggot Street, that's why she travelled the length and breadth of Ireland "all I wanted was to help the oor." The Irish Mercy Staters, like the great oak, provide mercy and home love for many of God's creatures. The founding of Catherine Mc-Auley's congregation must rank as one of the major events in the Church of the 19th century. Yet as the great foundress recalled later: "It started

with two; Sister Doyle and I."
Reflections such as these
came to mind as I stood in the
huge square outside Knock Bastilica on April 5, 1986. Gathered at the Shrime were about 2,000 eren Mercy Sisters from the 27 different regions, as well as many Church dignitaries. In any re-ligitous Order constitutions are a "must." The Rule of Order lays down the guidelines, it ex-presses the vision and goal of the Order.

But the Constitutions are the flesh, blood and sinews of the Rule. They define, in concrete terms, how to realise that vision. Furthermore, to be accepted the Constitution must have Papal approval. The first Constitutions were approved in 1835, and the final draft was submitted and approved four

A LONG TIME

But times change. One hundred and fifty years is a long time in the history of any insituation and different circumstances require different approaches. What was valid in the Ireland of the 1840's need not necessarily answer the needs and challenges of the 1990's. So it is with the ori-ginal Constitutions of the Mercy Sisters. It is the day of their second foundation, the day when a new generation of Sisters commit themselves anew to Mercy way of life as first map-ped out for them by Catherine McAuley. Hence the participa-tion of the Cardinal, the Papal "Today is a day of great joy and celebration for the Sisters

of Mercy both in Ireland and Nuncio and a representative abroad. It is appropriate that cross-section of the Irish Bishops in today's ceremonies, is both an act of gratitude for the plasif, and a voite of confi-dence for the fluture. The new constitutions, based on the Gospels and preserving all the essentials of Catherine Mc-Auley's legalcy, will provide the Sisters with a sure guide for living out their vocation."

For over 150 years the Sisters of Mercy have lived and worked in practically every small town in Ireland. Their contribution to all aspects of Irish life has been immense— their work in hospitals: and Homes, their work for the so-cially deprived and in educa-tion of incalculable value. They never beat the drum' to pro-claim their works, yet, Dun-garvan, like every Irish town, owes them an enormous debt.

132 years of service in this town is a long time, but thank God! the 'quality of Mercy is not strained!"



CALL FOR MORE PRODUCTIVITY

"There has to be a direct link between pay, performance and success," An Post's Chief Executive, Gerard Harvey told Post Office supervisors last Friday. He was speaking on the need for more productivity in the postal service at the annual conference of the Communication Managers' Union in Wexford.

Mr. Harvey said there were two major problems in the postal service - pressure of wage costs on revenue and relatively low output per employee. Wage costs now represented three-quarters of all costs and high pay increases could no longer be sustained by raising postal charges.

Certainly with the highest postal and telecommunication charges in Western Europe at present there can be no justification for a funther hike so any slack will have to be met by increased productivity.
