## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### BIG HAPPENINGS IN DUNGARVAN AND ABBEYSIDE

Saturday next May 24 will mark the beginning of what promises to be a memorable nine days in the parishes of Dungarvan and Abbeyside and indeed for the people of all the other adjoining parishes as well. On that day the Solemn Novena to our Mother of Perpetual Succour will come to this area for the first time and it will be preached and celebrated in St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan and in Abbeyside Parish Church.

There will be four sessions in each church daily for the nine days and the times are published elsewhere in this issue. The Novena or Festival of Faith will be preached by seven Redemptorists—six from Limerick and one from Australia who is at present in this country doing a post-graduate theological course.

Members of the Order have been in the area over the past fortnight laying the foundations for the running of what is hoped to be a most successful and fulfilling period of religious renewal for all.

As one of the Order explained last week-end this is a regional novena rather than a parish novena nor is it a mission either. It will embrace not only the parishes of Dungarvan and Abbeyside but all the parishes within a radius of many miles of the town. For that reason huge crowds are expected to converge daily and nightly on both centres of celebration.

### VERBAL CLASHES AT COUNCIL MEETING

Sparks flew on a couple of occasions at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night when the County Manager was involved in verbal clashes with members.

In the first instance a deputation from the Dungarvan Rowing Club headed by John R. Walsh a founder member and including Maura Curran, Captain and Greg Ashe was received by the Council. Reading from a prepared letter, copies of which were circulated to the Council members and press, Mr. Walsh recalled the near drowning accident in the Colligan estuary involving two teenage members of the club a fortnight before. The letter went on to accuse the County Council of "callous indifference" and referred to "the hypocrisy of commentators and supposedly responsible officials who constantly bemoan vandalism, etc." and claimed that "the manner in which Dungarvan Rowing Club has been crushed out of existence will stand as a testimony to those who ordained it and allowed it to happen."

Mr. Walsh made no bones about being angry in reading the letter which ended, "If you, the members of Dungarvan Urban District Council wish to retain a Rowing Club in Dungarvan, we respectfully request that you get a full engineering report on ways of dissipating the strength and flow through the new bridge (to be built at the new Causeway). The consultant engineer to be by agreement with the Rowing Club and the cost to be got from the By-Pass budget. The Club will remain open until the end of this regatta season in July. Its future will depend on the response made."

When the members of the deputation had withdrawn Cllr. D. Goode said that he did not see eye to eye with the remarks of John Walsh about the Council and he did not for one moment accept that any callous indifference had been shown. All the members of the Council agreed that every possibility of helping the club should be explored.

The Chairman, Cllr. R. Walsh maintained that an inland lake at the Colligan estuary such as he had always been looking for was still feasible and would prove the ideal solution to the problems of the Rowing Club. He then launched into a scathing attack of the evidence given by the engineers on behalf of the Council at the public sworn inquiry held in connection with the making of a Bridge Order for the new Causeway bridge. He referred to blatant lies and alleged that "steamrollers had been brought in to crush a nut."

When he asked the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, if he wished to make any comment on the Rowing Club letter, the latter at first replied that he really did not wish to do so. However following further remarks by the Chairman, the County Manager told him that "both the language of the letter and of yourself has been most provocative and emotive and does nothing to help the position of the Club." Mr. Hurley went on to say that if further discussions on the club's problems were required his door and that of the Council's senior officials were open. He added that the many offers made to the Rowing Club to help had all been turned down. In regard to the suggestion that money for an engineering report should be got from the By-Pass budget as contained in the Rowing Club letter, he said that the Department of the Environment would never agree to this. Mr. Hurley said that it might be dangerous to publish the Rowing Club letter but that was a matter for the people concerned.

Finally the Chairman announced that the Rowing Club letter would be referred to the County Council and that ended that.

The second verbal clash occurred between the Manager and Cllr. B. Kyne following the Council's rejection, on the Chairman's casting vote, of the Engineer's recommendation that the existing town dump at Ballinamuck be extended (the report on this discussion appears elsewhere).

Incidentally the Council meeting was adjourned at 10.30 p.m. when only five of the eighteen item agenda had been dealt with. The meeting will resume next Monday night at 8.30 p.m.

### THE SWALLOWS HAVE COME

While out in Helvick last Sunday evening I spotted the first swallow of the summer flying over the pier. It is difficult to mention the word summer in this context as all we have had so far is winter without any spring.

Accepting the old saying that "one swallow doesn't make a summer" we paid no more attention to the matter until we saw a few more of the swift moving visitors flying around Abbeyside on Monday evening.

It just shows how wonderful nature is. Perhaps the arrival of the swallows presages better weather ahead. Let's hope so!

### FOR AND AGAINST

Despite the protests made by the Irish Fishermen's Organisation, by the inshore fishermen themselves and by local authorities such as Waterford County Council to the Minister for Fisheries on the need to legalise monofilament nets for use in the capture of salmon, we noted a contra view expressed in the minutes of a meeting of the South Eastern Regional Development Organisation (SERDO).

At the SERDO meeting held at the end of March Cllr. P. Ryan (Carriek-on-Suir UDC) stated that it was important that the Board object to a proposal to make monofilament nets legal because of the very serious effects this would have on salmon fishing in the Re-

## Casey Electronics Got An Offer They Couldn't Refuse

In the course of a prepared statement on the decision of Casey Electronics to locate their new industry in the Industrial Estate in Waterford City instead of being able to locate in Dungarvan, Cllr. B. Kyne at the May monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council criticised the lack of co-operation by various agencies which the Casey Company had been subjected to in setting up the industry.

He said that nobody in the Dungarvan area had to be told of the efforts of the Casey T.V. Company and how, over the years, this family business has progressed to be now in the position to compete with the Japanese in the production of high quality T.V. sets.

The Company like any other needed support not just from the IDA but from the Banks and the Local Authority, he said. He went on to say that in November, 1983 and December 1984 the Casey Company sought a suitable factory premises were informed by the IDA that a site, later acquired by O'Reilly's Irish Foods in Dungarvan could not be given to them for various reasons. However since

then, due to the intervention of Minister for Agriculture, Austin Deasy, the IDA re-evaluated the Casey project and had agreed to grant aid it.

"But in the meantime," said Cllr. Kyne, "the Casey Company have been buffeted by the continuous need for finance to develop their research and development for this high technology project. They were forced to borrow at interest rates of up to 28% and you can appreciate the difficulties this caused. The Local Authority and County Development Team helped to the best of their ability but the fact of life is that a suitable IDA factory was available in Waterford City and they offered it to the Company."

Cllr. Kyne then added: "It was exactly what was wanted and was an offer that the Company could not refuse as it was obviously much cheaper to accept it than to develop from a green field. But it galls me to think that this Dungarvan based company was twice-refused by the IDA for a site in Dungarvan which was given to O'Reilly's Foods while our Banking interests locally were not entirely without some blame either."

### SENSE OF DISAPPOINTMENT

Cllr. Kyne concluded his statement by saying that he could well appreciate the efforts of Sean Casey and his family and he understood why he had to move to Waterford and he wished the Casey project every success. "But," he said, "there is a sense of disappointment in this town over the news but I feel people should appreciate the rebuffs and disappointments experienced by this Company in being this project off the ground. The hard facts of business life are that Dungarvan wasn't able to match what Waterford could offer and what has been Dungarvan's loss has been Waterford's gain."

Cllr. R. Walsh, Chairman said that they were all very sorry to hear that this industry was to go to Waterford.

## Casting vote knocks proposal for town dump extension

Strong recommendations by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley and by Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer and Mr. Tom Mulcahy, Town Engineer submitted to the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban

Council last Monday night that the proposal to extend the town dump at Ballinamuck be approved were rejected by the casting vote of the Chairman, Cllr. R. Walsh, following a 4-4 tie vote. The decision resulted in a verbal clash between the Manager and Cllr. B. Kyne.

Before the meeting was a report from the County Engineer which stated that following the discussion on the matter at the Council's March meeting he asked Mr. T. Mulcahy to examine the five alternative sites for a dump suggested by Councilors. He also personally examined the sites himself which were located at Kilminlon (formerly used by Quigley Magner), two quarries at Ballyharahan, Strikes Hill (occasional) used in the past by Irish Leathers, and the marsh land beside the old railway line at Ballymacmaigue.

### NONE SUITABLE

The report ended with the following conclusions and recommendation—

"None of the above sites are in the ownership of Dungarvan U.D.C. and accordingly substantial purchase costs would be involved. There would also be significant costs involved in carrying out detailed site investigation to establish the precise scientific details of each site. I am satisfied from the examination I have carried out that none of the sites merit such investigation at this time. We have carried out a detailed and critical examination of the proposal to extend the existing waste disposal site at Ballinamuck. This examination has been carried out by An Foras Forbartha, who are an independent State Agency set up to provide such environmental advice to Local Authorities. Their report has shown that the Ballinamuck site is suitable for the purpose and, that provided certain controls are exercised, it will not have any adverse environmental effects. Ballinamuck is ideally located in relation to Dungarvan and its hinterland, and it is already in the ownership of the Urban Council. Accordingly, I again recommend strongly that the U.D.C. proceed with the development of the Ballinamuck site as a matter of extreme urgency as the present site has reached the end of its useful life."

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager then stated that he was satisfied that it was operated as set out in all the arguments on the matter which he had listened to that fishing interests in the river would not be affected by the proposed extension. He recommended to the Council that if they accepted this proposal he would ask the Co. Council to develop it and to enter into a partnership agreement with the Urban. "I think if we do this that we can control the dump and operate it properly," he said.

would be involved in this or whether the cost would be prohibitive," he said.

Cllr. R. Walsh, Chairman said that he had submitted a proposal which had not been included in the Engineer's report. (At a later stage of the discussion he said that this suggested that the Western Bay be used as a dumping area with a view to reclamation.)

Mr. J. O'Flynn, County Engineer then stated that the proposed extension of the dump at Ballinamuck would not cause pollution in the river provided that it was operated as set out in the Foras Forbartha report and no toxic materials were dumped there. "Time is running against us as the existing dump is almost filled," he said, "and it is now urgent that a firm decision on the matter be taken and I recommend strongly that the Council take the advice contained in the Foras Forbartha report."

At this announcement, the Manager declared that he would have to put a notice in the papers declaring that the dump is to be closed forthwith. Cllr. Kyne interjected that the Manager would have to accept defeat as well as victory. "It is now your duty and that of the officials to go out and look for an alternative site and a display of pique does not help the situation," he added.

The Manager denied that he was piqued but said that he was now put in an impossible position by the Council's decision.

The discussion then ended.

### THE VOTING

Cllr. D. Goode then proposed and Cllr. Dixon seconded that the recommendations to extend the existing dump at Ballinamuck be approved.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan and Cllr. T. Wright proposed and seconded a direct negative.

Before a vote was taken the Manager reminded the members: "This is decision night and if you say 'no' to the proposal then the dump will close within a week to all the people from West Waterford."

The vote was then recorded as follows: For the proposal to extend — Cllrs. Dixon, Goode, Cotter and Hallahan (4); Against — Cllrs. Kyne, Wright, O'Riordan and Walsh (4).

The Chairman, Cllr. Walsh then gave his casting vote against the proposal and declared it to be lost.

At this announcement, the Manager declared that he would have to put a notice in the papers declaring that the dump is to be closed forthwith.

Cllr. Kyne interjected that the Manager would have to accept defeat as well as victory. "It is now your duty and that of the officials to go out and look for an alternative site and a display of pique does not help the situation," he added.

Her 105th birthday celebration was a memorable one in the Yonkers Nursing Home where Mrs. Cashin is regarded as "a very special" lady. Among messages of congratulations was one from President Reagan.

A deeply religious lady, Mrs. Cashin still enjoys remarkable health. She worked hard all her life and while not one for alcohol, always liked nothing better than a glass of sherry with her main daily meal.

Mrs. Mary Hickey of Faha, Ring, recalls her visit to the homeland twenty years ago and remembered that on her very first night at home she insisted on them all going down on their knees to recite the rosary. "She was a deeply religious lady" said Mrs. Hickey.

Mrs. Cashin's grandson, Paul Cashin, a towering 6'7", visited Ring and Ardmore last year and has been a regular visitor to the land of his grandmother's birth. He is, in fact, contemplating living permanently in Ireland in due course. The centenarian has many other cousins in the Ring gael-tacht, and we send her many congratulations on reaching that incredible 105-year milestone. Long may she continue to enjoy good health.

# Motorists Fined And Banned At Dungarvan Court

Nicholas Turner, Klossera, Dungarvan was charged at Dungarvan Court last week with driving with excess alcohol at Shandon Street, Dungarvan, on November 23 1985.

Mr. Joseph Hurley (retired Garda Sergeant) in reply to Inspector P. J. Tierney who prosecuted gave evidence of stopping a car driven by the defendant at Shandon Street at 11.30 p.m. on the night in question. He formed the opinion that the defendant was unfit to drive, arrested him and took him to the Garda Station where a blood sample was taken. This subsequently showed a blood alcohol concentration of 141 mgrms.

On reply to Mr. E. P. King, Solr. J. F. Williams & Co. who appeared for the defendant, Mr. Hurley admitted that there had been a mix-up about the name of the defendant in the Station when the blood sample was being taken but said this had been rectified by the doctor. Mr. King then told the Court that the defendant had now left the country and was at present in South Africa.

District Justice O'Connell convicted and imposed a fine of £50 with a 12 months disqualification from driving. He fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal.

### RECKLESS DRIVING

Felix Shields, Clash, Ballinacourty, Dungarvan was charged with dangerous driving at T. F. Meagher (Bridge) Street, Dungarvan on January 11, 1986 and with driving with excess alcohol at Clonea Road, Abbesside, on the same date.

Garda D. Sheehan stated in evidence that he was an observer in a garda patrol car on Saturday, January 11. With the driver and another garda they were parked at Gratian Square at 2.15 a.m. He heard a revving car coming down Mary Street and then saw it drive through the traffic lights at high speed across the Square and along Bridge Street. There was a big number of people on the street who were coming out after disco in the hotel but the car never slowed down.

Witness said they followed the car across the Causeway and it stopped at the traffic lights at Abbesside. He got out and knocked on the side window of the car but the driver took no notice.

Witness went on to say that he then banged on the roof of the car and shouted a verbal, please stop. The car revved up as the lights were about to change and went off up Sexton Street. He got back into the patrol car and they followed the other car out the Clonea Road where they overtook and stopped it. When he asked the defendant what the idea of his reckless driving was the reply he got was "the gardai always get their way."

Inspector Tierney who prosecuted said that the defendant was taken to the Garda Station where a urine sample was taken. This subsequently showed an alcohol content of 243 mgrms.

Mr. E. P. King, Solr. for the defendant said that he was 34, married with 5 children and a glass outlier. He submitted that there was no real evidence to sustain a charge of dangerous driving and asked that this be reduced.

District Justice O'Connell said that he would have to treat the driving as dangerous because of the garda evidence. He added that a man of the defendant's age should be more responsible. On the excess alcohol charge he imposed a fine of £100 with a 12 months disqualification and an endorsement. On the dangerous driving charge he imposed a

fine of £50 with a concurrent disqualification of 1 month and a further endorsement.

### LOW CONCENTRATION

Conor Clancy, 23 Murphy place, Abbesside was charged with driving with excess alcohol at Youghal Road, Dungarvan on January 23.

Inspector Tierney stated that Sergeant O'Sullivan, Traffic Corps was on duty at Youghal Road and stopped a car driven by the defendant at 11.15 p.m. which proved positive and was taken to the Garda Station where a blood sample was taken. This subsequently showed an alcohol concentration of 122 mgrms.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr. for the defendant said that he was aged 23, a fitter-welder and single. He pointed out that the alcohol concentration was very low and he asked that the disqualification be postponed until mid-June because of the defendant's work.

District Justice O'Connell imposed a fine of £25 with a 12 months disqualification and postponed the ban until July 1.

COUNCIL TO ORGANISE ANTI-LITTER COMPETITIONS IN SCHOOLS

As their contribution to Environmental Awareness Year sponsored by the EEC, Waterford County Council are to organise a series of anti-litter competitions in schools throughout the county. At the Council's monthly meeting held in Dungarvan, the County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, submitted the following report on the subject: 'Waterford County Council achieved the distinction of winning the Bord Fáilte Award for the tidest County in 1984 and 1985. The achievement of this success was a combined community one - the Local Development / Tidy Towns Committees with the Local Authorities. To build on this effort and to encourage participation on as wide a scale as possible, consideration has been given to getting the schools and school children involved in a number of projects with a practical application. What is envisaged is a three-part competition on the following lines: (a) General Appearance of School and Grounds - Absence of litter in grounds and on approaches. (b) School effort in promoting an anti-litter campaign in the area - Foster Competition. (c) Positive action in a special clean-up and/or maintenance project in the town or village or some local amenity/facility in rural areas. With awards being made on an electoral area basis and an overall County winner it will provide a wide opportunity for the school to participate in the local overall effort towards litter control and improvement of the locality. If the Council agree that such a scheme be implemented it could be partly implemented in 1985 with the full scheme in 1987. The report was unanimously approved by the members of the Council.
