

# HIGH COURT RULES ON SERVICE CHARGES

At a recent sitting of Dungarvan Court, a picket was mounted outside the Courthouse by members of the local branch of NATO (National Association of Tenants Organisations) protesting against special water charges while inside judgments were entered for sums of £25 and £50 against a big number of urban defaulters who had either failed or refused to pay the charges on the grounds that they were not obliged to do so as they represented double taxation.

Since then, however, the situation has changed and last week the High Court in Dublin ruled that these service charges must be paid and groups protesting against the charges were told in no uncertain terms that they just must pay-up.

The decision handed down by Mr. Justice D. Costello resulted from an application for an injunction by Offaly County Council against a number of residents who prevented Council workers from disconnecting the water supply to a house of State trading organisation. a protesting occupier who had refused to pay the charge.

Giving judgment, Mr. Justice Costello said it seemed the local charges were properly raised and the money was due by the residents. It seemed also that the power to disconnect the supplies had been validly exercised by the Council.

This decision will have farreaching consequences for those protesting against these service charges and should clarify the position of the local authorities once and for all. It shows that they now have the authority of the Courts to back them up and defaulters would be well advised to reconsider their positions. The decision could also have consequences for those who continue to advocate the non-payment of the charges as they could now possibly be found to be in contempt of a



# DEPARTMENT **INSPECTOR TALKS ON SHEEP SCAB** DANGERS

Mr. Jim O'Brien, Veterinary Research Officer, Department of Agriculture talked to the members of Co. Waterford Sheep Dipping Advisory Com-mittee about the dangers of sheep scab at their meeting in Dungarvan. The talk which lasted for approximately one hour was described as very wonthwhile and contained a lot of new information.

The talk detailed what sheep scab looked like, how to deal with it and how to control it. Plointling out that sheep scab had been on the statute books since 1904 and was still not eradicated Mr. O'Brien stressed the need to educate farmers about the situation. He said that scab could be eradicated as the tools to do it were avail. able. Proper dipping would, he said, control the disease but all sheep would have to be dipped during the dipping period and it could flare again in sheep free of the disease if they were

not dipped annually. Mr. John Power, Department Veterinary Officer for the County said that they were doing a very good job in regard to sheep dipping in the county at present.





Q.—What are the advantages of participating in the Social Employment Scheme? A.—The Scheme is designed to

To participate in the Scheme you generally must be over 25 and in receipt on Unemployment Assistance. Until recently it was necessary to be on Unemployment Assistance for twelve months. This time the requirement no longer applies. The scheme has been further extended to include people over 25 who have been on Unemploy-ment Benefit for at least twelve months

Participants are given one years employment under the Scheme and work an average  $2\frac{1}{2}$  day week. Employees may take on other remunerative employment on those days when they are not working on the Social Employment Ssheme.


