A FUTILE EXERCISE?

Dungarvan or at least that area of the town adjacent to the new Ring road at Shandon has been plagued by itinerants and their animals for the past few weeks. Up to a dozen or more caravans have been parked in an open space in the vicinity of the Urban Council's industrial estate.

The main damage, apart from the litter and nuisance caused by the itinerant families, comes from the many horses and ponies which have been turned loose in the locality to be allowed to wander at will, especially after nightfall.

There are several new housing estates in the area and the residents have been subjected to a great deal of trouble and have suffered an amount of damage and much loss as these animals wander into their gardens, destroying trees, shrubs, flowers and lawns which have cost a lot of money not to mention the time spent and the hard work involved in planting and preparing them.

Local Councillors have made complaints about this trespass and damage on several occasions and the County Manager and Town Clerk have responded by arranging for a "round-up" of the straying animals and having them impounded.

Such a round-up took place on Wednesday last week when Urban Council workers assisted by local Gardaí went to the area. The horses and ponies were then taken to the public pound in Clonmel but almost before you could say "Jack Robinson" they had been baled out by their owners and were back once again at the itinerant encampment at Shandon. This indicates that where the travellers are concerned money is no object as they readily paid the pound charges to enable them to take the animals back.

The Local Authority then proceeded against the itinerants themselves and sought and got an injunction to remove them from the area at the sitting of Waterford Circuit Court on last Friday but obviously this has not proved successful either as the caravans and the animals were still on site on Tuesday evening last.

A senior official stated that the only method which might prove successful in dislodging the unwanted caravanners was a committal order under which those who disobeyed a Court order could be whisked off to prison forthwith. However he said that the law as it stood at present was slow and cumbersome and before such actions could be taken the offenders would have moved away temporarily.

The affair now seems to have turned into something of a poker game between the Local Authority and the itiner-

ants and it will be interesting to see how it works out in the end.

ENTENTE FLOREALE

And now as the excitement mounts and the final touches are put to the great effort, the residents of Ardmore will await the decision of the Judges with bated breath.

Ardmore, West Waterford's seaside gem, is the place to be these days. Plenty of entertaining functions have been arranged for the coming weeks and provided the sun shines it will not only be a case of Entente Floreale but Entente Cordiale for all as well.

Referring to the recent sod turning ceremony for the new Sterling Drug plant at Knockbrack, Dungarvan, Cllr. James A. Walsh, Chairman, speaking at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday extended a welcome to Dungarvan to the executives and senior officials of the Sterling Drug Corporation. He expressed the hope that their relations would prosper for the future as the starting up of the new plant would ensure further prosperity for Dungarvan and West Waterford. He then paid tribute to the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley and to the other senior officials of the Council for the major roles they played in securing the new industry for the town.

Cllr. B. Kyne fully supported the Chairman's remarks and again congratulated the County Manager for the great initiative he had displayed from the time that negotiations for the industry first commenced. Cllr. Kyne said that congratulations should also be extended to the Stafford Miller plant. Because of the success which has been enjoyed by Stafford Miller since they commenced operations in Dungarvan it made it easier to attract other such American industries to the town. "They have proved our flagship and have proved an unique role," said Cllr. Kyne. "and I would like our Secretary to convey our congratulations to the Stafford Miller management and staff for this."

This was also unanimously agreed.

ARDKEEN HOSPITAL

Lots Of Promises But Nothing Happening

They had several promises made that work on the new regional hospital at Ardkeen was to start soon but nothing had happened so far said Cllr. Jackie Fahey, T.D. at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan when he moved a motion asking the Minister for Health, Mr. Barry Desmond, to receive a deputation from the Council to discuss the matter.

"We have seen other hospital projects further down the priority list than Ardkeen being proceeded with while we have been put on the long finger," he said.

E.E.C. REGIONAL FUND GRANTS

The European Commission has approved grants from the European Regional Development Fund amounting to £5,014,927 in respect of 11 investments in Ireland. These include £284,238 to Dungarvan Urban Council towards the town sewerage scheme and £953,500 to Waterford Co. Council for phase 1 of the road development at Newtown-Carroll's Cross.

Heated Exchanges Between Fine Gael And Labour Members

Last Monday was a sultry, close afternoon, and the members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan sat relaxed in their shirt sleeves at the Courthouse as the routine business of the meeting proceeded. Most were in a rather sportive mood. What appeared as an innocuous item on the agenda came up, "Sheep Dipping Regulations 1986 (similar to 1985)", and suddenly the whole tenor of the meeting changed.

It happened as Labour Councillor Brian O'Shea referred to the recent decision to send a representative to the joint Cork/Kerry Sheep Dipping Committee and asked whether the allocation provided in the Council's estimates would be sufficient to pay for the ordinary sheep dipping services in the county and in addition pay for the travelling expenses to be incurred attending the joint Cork/Kerry Committee meetings.

Cllr. O'Shea went on to say that as these expenses would be additional to the allocation provided he thought that the only way to pay for these was to increase the charges for sheep dipping and he proposed that this be done.

Fine Gael Councillor, Senator M. Quaal, at once crossed swords with Cllr. O'Shea and said that he was surprised that a man with the intelligence of Cllr. O'Shea should draw up such an issue when he knew that it hadn't a hope of being passed. "This is the greatest piece of nonsense I have ever heard and what he is suggesting is like asking us to increase the service charges which were already approved at the estimates meeting," he said.

The other Labour member Cllr. Kyne fired back at Senator Quaal. "I don't see what right you have to question the intelligence of any Councillor, we all know what people like you pay. You don't pay much".

WITHDRAW CALL

Cllr. W. McDonnell (F.G.) jumped to his feet stating that he found this personal remark by Cllr. Kyne insulting and offensive to Cllr. Quaal. "It was uncalled for and I ask him to withdraw it," he said.

Cllr. Kyne said that he would not withdraw and when Cllr. McDonnell repeated his request in a louder tone, Cllr. Kyne responded by telling Cllr. McDon-

nell, "the more you raise your voice, the less likely I will be to withdraw."

The Chairman, Cllr. James A. Walsh (F.G.) then asked Cllr. Kyne whether he was prepared to withdraw the remark. Cllr. Kyne again refused and Cllr. O'Shea stated "the personal remarks were not started by me.

they came from over there," as he nodded in the direction of Cllr. Quaal.

Cllr. Quaal then said that he did not want to make an issue of the matter stating that he "could take the remarks especially when they came from Cllr. Kyne."

Cllr. O'Shea's proposal which

was seconded by Cllr. Kyne was then put to the meeting and received only 3 votes, Cllr. M. O'Riordan (F.G.) also voting for it. It was opposed by 12 members and accordingly declared lost.

Cllr. J. Quirke (F.F.) then commented "that provides them with their answer".

ARE COUNTY COUNCIL OVERDOING ROADSIDE SPRAYING?

Whether the County Council were overdoing their roadside spraying was a matter raised by Cllr. B. Kyne at the monthly meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday. Cllr. Kyne thought that far too much herbicide spray was used around the road delineators to kill off the grass along the road margins so that they could be clearly seen. Last year he said he had stressed that the use of sprays for this purpose should be carefully monitored so that the effects on wildlife would be minimised. However, Cllr. Kyne went on to say, that this year he became obvious that sprays were used to a greater extent than ever and people who travelled around could see that big tracts of roadside, especially in the Colligan area, had been burned while ditches had also been sprayed in some places for no apparent reason.

Cllr. Kyne then produced some photographs to back up his points and said that the position required some explanation, especially where the Colligan area was concerned as this was being developed as a scenic area by the Council.

He went on to say that his observations last year and those of the Beekeepers Association had been totally ignored. "But he went on, "apart from the bee-keeping interests, this defoliation causes unseen damage to our wildlife and is dangerous to our environment and I feel that there is no reason for the indiscriminate use of such sprays."

Cllr. C. O Rlain supported the points raised and agreed that the use of weedkillers around the delineators along the roads seemed to be overdone and this was particularly evident along the Clonmel road.

WINDY DAYS

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that care was observed where sprays were used but it could happen that on occasions on windy days the spray would be spread about by the wind. He disagreed that damage was caused by the spraying and referred to the work which the Council were doing in landscaping the margins on many roads and keeping the margins and hedges trimmed and tidy.

Cllr. Kyne said that sprays should not be used on windy days and this was always a stated precaution in using them. "I think that we should have a defined policy on this spraying so that it can be curtailed to a minimum," he said. It was agreed that the position would be looked into for next year.

Cllr. P. Coffey praised the County Engineer and his department for the excellent job they were doing in keeping the road margins and hedges cut on the restricted budget, with which they had to operate.

COUNCIL PROTEST ABOUT LISMORE DUMP

At the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. W. McDonnell protested on behalf of the people living in the area about the dumping of industrial waste at the Council dump at Owbeg, Lismore. He said that the people had become so annoyed at what was taking place there that they had blocked the entrance with tractor's last week.

He then sought an assurance from the County Engineer that if and when further material from the source complained of was put in the dump there would be a JCB on standby to see that it was immediately covered. "The people certainly won't stand for a recurrence of what has been happening there," he said.

Cllr. J. Quirke supported and said that following an agreement which had been made with the firm concerned last year, things worked out alright up until now. "Things have got so bad there lately that the people can't live there because of the smell," he said.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer said that the firm concerned got permission to dump their waste material at the dump in 1984 subject to certain conditions but last week several of these conditions had been broken. When the position was drawn to their attention the Council had put in machinery to clean up the situation and a meeting with the people concerned was held.

Mr. O'Flynn added that at this meeting, Mr. E. Mansfield, Assistant Chief Executive Engineer in charge of Environmental matters, had arranged that the firm would pay the costs involved in the clean-up and a suggested alternative location for this dumping was also discussed. He said he was hopeful that what had happened last week would not occur there again.

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Costly Visit To Dungarvan Show

A County Wicklow farmer who paid a visit to the Annual Agricultural Show in Dungarvan on August 1 last year found himself faced with paying a £1,000 fine, mitigated to £500 as a result, when he was convicted at Dungarvan Court on a charge of using marked gas oil in his vehicle on the occasion.

He was Ivor Kearney, Tina-hely and he conducted his own defence to the charge. Mr. Joe Lavan, Solr appeared for the Director of Public Prosecutions. P. J. Moroney giving evidence on behalf of the prosecution said that he was an officer of Customs and Excise and on August 1, 1985 at Dungarvan Show he took a sample from the tank of the vehicle owned by the defendant which, on subsequent analysis, showed that it contained 21 per cent marked gas oil.

Ivor Kenny in his own defence told the Court that he had been using the vehicle drawing in hay on his farm in the week prior to coming to Dungarvan Show last year and had used red diesel for that. On the night before the Show, July 31, he bought £20 worth of white diesel which was put in the tank of the vehicle in order to travel to the Show. In the circumstances he was unable to understand how the Inspector found marked gas oil in the tank when he took the sample.

District Justice J. Mangan said he would have to convict the defendant on the charge which carried a mandatory fine of £1,000 but in the circumstances he would mitigate this to £500. He then asked the defendant how long he wanted in order to pay the fine and the defendant replied that "it would be easier for me to give up the vehicle than pay that money".

District Justice Mangan then said that he would fix recognisance in the event of an appeal and as the defendant left the Court he stated that he would lodge an appeal against the decision.

At the request of Mr. Gordon he fixed recognisances to enable an appeal to be lodged.

VAN DER POEL LEADS TOP DUTCH TEAM IN NISSAN CLASSIC

The man who chased Sean Kelly all the way round last year's Nissan International Cycling Classic, Holland's Adri Van Der Poel, is back for this year's race in October. Van Der Poel's Dutch based Kwantuum team is the first squad to sign up for the five-day pro-am Nissan event. Last year Van Der Poel won the final day's stage, finished runner-up to Kelly, and led Kwantuum to victory in the team race.

"This time we aim to win" said Kwantuum team manager Jan Raas when he signed contracts with Mick Bennett, Operations Director for Sport-Plus Ireland, the race promoters.

"When we came to the first race last year we didn't know what to expect, but once the event was over it was already on my calendar for 1986. My boys had such good form after-

wards that we had to come again". The Nissan event was the springboard for a staggering run of successes for Van Der Poel and the Kwantuum squad. Adri was runner-up in the final of the 1986 Italian Classic, the Tour of Lombardy (behind Kelly again) and then Ludo Peeters brought Kwantuum victory in the French Creteil-Chaville Classic.

Thundery Start To Summer

Although there were some good sunny days in June, the month was most notable for the thunderstorms that affected most areas at one time or another, according to the monthly bulletin issued by the Meteorological Service, Dublin. During the first half of the month the weather was generally cool and unsettled with mostly westerly winds. Around the middle of the month high pressure developed to the east of the country and the weather systems affecting us tended to come from the continent. This caused temperatures to rise but also brought an amount of thunderstorm activity, particularly in the last ten days of the month. These thunderstorms caused widespread damage and destruction, particularly on Friday 27th and Saturday 28th. In Dublin about a dozen houses were struck by lightning and at least one was gutted by the resulting fire. Power supplies, transport and communications were disrupted and computers, cable television and other electrical and electronic equipment knocked out.

A series of thundery troughs moved northwards across the country, mainly during the second half of the month. These brought some quite heavy outbreaks of rain to most areas. Amounts for the month were well above normal everywhere except in Kerry and the northwest. Birr was the wettest station with 101mm during the month, the highest June total since 1968. Roches Point, in Co. Cork had just over 100mm which is more than twice its June average. Belmullet in Co. Mayo had

the wettest day of June on the last day of the month with 35.2mm — almost an inch and a half of rain — was recorded. This is the greatest daily rainfall amount recorded there during the month of June in more than 30 years. The 10th was the wettest day of the month in Dublin; in most southern areas it was the weekend of the 20th and 21st, while in the midlands and west it was the last day of the month, the 30th. Belfast, was the driest place in the country with only 35mm of rain. Malin Head was also very dry in June; only 42.1mm of rain fell, the lowest June total in more than 10 years.

Most places had between 4 and 6 days with thunder which is the way above the June average, although it must be said that the incidence of thunder can vary quite a bit from year to year. The dates of most marked thunder activity were the 10th, the night of the 15th/16th in Dublin, the 21st and the period from the 26th to the 30th.

TEMPERATURES NEAR NORMAL

Temperatures were normal or a bit above in most areas. The south coast was the exception. Roches Point was almost half a degree below average whereas Clones was 0.9° C above. Shannon Airport had the highest mean temperature of the month with 14.4° C while Malin Head came bottom of the list at 12.5° C. The highest temperature of the month 25.5° C was recorded at Clones on Saturday the 28th. The night of the 10th/11th was the coldest with widespread ground frost and air temperatures falling to 1.0° C at Kilkenny.

SUNSHINE

The north and east got most sun during the month. Dublin averaged almost 6 hours a day whereas Claremorris in Co. Mayo got just over half that amount. Rosslare had 15.6 hours of sunshine on the 11th making it the sunniest day of the month. The 11th was the sunniest day in most eastern areas; in the west it was the 15th. Generally however, sunshine amounts were below average everywhere, ranging from a high of 92% at Dublin Airport to a low of 60% at Cork. Nonetheless most areas had a few good sunny days during the month, most notably Wednesday 11th, the weekend of Friday 13th to Sunday 15th, Wednesday 26th, Thursday 26th, and in the west, Saturday 29th.

THUNDERSTORM DATES

Malin Head, the extreme northern tip of the country, was the only station to escape the widespread thunderstorms that occurred during June.

WATER DANGERS FOR CHILDREN

The Irish Water Safety Association urges parents and persons in charge of small children to ensure that they are constantly supervised while playing in or near water. The back garden play pool or ornamental pond; the nearby river or stream; the uncovered rain barrel, well, water tank or slurry pit; holes or drains left after building operations, are all hazards for the very young and elderly, feeble persons. Private swimming pools should be locked or otherwise fenced off to prevent use when the pool is not under constant supervision.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q — I recently lost my job and have been unable to get another one here. Is it true that I can transfer my unemployment money to England to look for work?

A. If you have been receiving Unemployment Benefit for at least four weeks, you may be able to have it transferred to Britain (or any other EEC country). This does not apply however to Unemployment Assistance. To transfer your Unemployment Benefit you should inform your Employment Exchange or office of your plans as soon as possible but not later than a week before your departure. The local exchange may give you the necessary documents or they will get the E.I.U. (European Injuries and Unemployment) section of the Dept. of Social Welfare to prepare them for you. If the documents aren't ready when you are leaving you can ask the exchange to forward them to you.

would have got if you continued signing in Ireland. The exchange rate used for converting from Irish pounds to sterling may not be the same as the market rate. This is because the official exchange rate for social security purposes is set at certain times and does not fluctuate with the market. In Ireland, Unemployment Benefit lasts for 65 weeks for people over 18 years of age. However the maximum length that you can receive the transferred payment for is 13 weeks. Payment could end earlier if you had less than 13 weeks of your entitlement left, e.g. if you had already received payment for 50 weeks in Ireland you could only transfer your claim for a further 5 weeks. If you fail to find employment, and you decide to return to Ireland you should do so before you have used up all your 13 weeks entitlement. That way you will be able to continue your claim in Ireland until you have received payment for the full 65 weeks. If you return to Ireland after the 13 weeks are over you will have lost your entitlement to your remaining Irish Unemployment Benefit and you will need to find a job and pay PRSI for 13 weeks before you can requalify.

When you arrive in Britain you should sign on at an employment exchange within seven days. If you have the necessary documents with you they will pay your U.B. If you haven't you should still sign on to ensure that you will get your money sometime. You can ask the exchange at which you sign to contact your Irish Employment Exchange or the E.I.U. section of Social Welfare (Townsend St., Dublin 2. Tel. (01) 717222) to get them to send on the documents.

You will receive payment in sterling. You will get Unemployment Benefit and Pay Related Benefit at the rates you

Enforcement Of Fisheries Control Essential

Fish provides a very large part of the world's protein food, but the vast bulk of the supplies come from hunting rather than farming. This means that supplies can only be maintained by conservation methods, as there is no way of significantly increasing the fish output of the oceans.

Modern technology has greatly increased the efficiency of the fish hunter, who can locate the shoals electronically, use very efficient nets for catching the fish, and stay at sea for long periods in big trawlers, with the fish being taken in and processed by factory ships, without the need for the trawlers to leave the fishing grounds. If there were no conservation laws, and no controlled zones, the biggest and best equipped fishing fleets could sweep the seas so efficiently that they would wipe out most of the breeding stock, and use methods which would take out the young fish before they were at optimum size, and with certain types of tackle they could even damage the spawn on the sea-bed.

All that seems a long way from the fisherman on the west coast of Ireland going out in his curragh when the weather is good enough, with one small net, and even the thirty to seventy foot boats that make up the bulk of the Irish fleet are not really in the same class as the big trawlers. However, we do have some bigger trawlers now, and no matter how small the boats are, if there are enough of them they can take a lot of fish.

It is necessary to monitor stocks of the different species of fish, such as herring and mackerel, and place restrictions on the quantities that can be caught, in order to ensure that breeding stocks are kept up, and the Commission of the European Community has a control system which allows quotas for particular fish to the different member States, and which also controls the type of nets that are to be used.

This control system must be enforced by the national governments of the member States, and it is very important that it should be enforced effectively and impartially by all governments concerned, not only in order that the regulations should be effective, but also that they will be respected by fishermen as being even-handed and applying equally to every one in the industry, big or small. Only then will it be recognised that the regulations are for the purpose of conserving fish stocks, and nothing else.

NOT WORKING WELL

A recent report by the Commission to the Council of Ministers indicates that after three years of these regulations, the enforcement system is still not working as well as it should at national level, and in all member States concerned there are weaknesses, either in the way that the regulations are enforced, or in the powers of the inspectors whose duty it is to inspect catches of fish, and sometimes in the amount of resources available to do the job.

Ireland comes in for a share of criticism. The report says that the catch recording system in Ireland is based on information provided by the buyers, that there is almost no physical control of quantities by control personnel, that the catch area is determined by interviewing skippers or by assuming that the port of landing is indicative of the area, and there appears to be no attempt to compare this with information available from log-books.

The catch area is important, because for instance, herring fishing was banned in the Celtic Sea at one time, and could be in another place at another stage, as stocks go down. The report suggests that Irish catches of restricted fish are often under-reported, and says that Irish fishery officers do not have the right to inspect the books of buyers, but rely on summary information provided to them on an informal basis, and this is surprising. It is also stated that performance as regards inspection is particularly disappointing, given the major investment of Community money in inspection vessels and aircraft for Ireland.

CONTROL SYSTEMS CRITICISED

The French control system also comes in for severe criticism, where the quotas are managed by producers organisations as well as the official

administration, and these organisations seem to cater more for the requirements of the market than for the demands of conservation. The catch figures are obtained mostly from the auctions, and a month can pass before they are available to Ministry officials. Many other criticisms of the French systems of control are made, and in fact it is stated that there is a general failure to comply with the rules, and although a commitment was given last year to the Commission to improve matters, it is stated that there is no evidence to show that such a campaign has begun.

The Netherlands comes in for some criticism in spite of considerable efforts at control, but owing to over-capacity of the fishing fleet it is very difficult to apply restrictions. Germany is among the better countries, because there is under-capacity for the quotas allowed, and the UK is said to be making considerable efforts at control, but the results are not entirely satisfactory. There are also criticisms of Belgium and Denmark. As regards Spain and Portugal, the Commission's inspectors have only paid preliminary visits to these new member States and it will take some time longer to assess their control measures.

In the summing up of the report it is stated that member States have made discernible, but uneven progress towards improved enforcement since 1983, but there are still significant weaknesses and differences in enforcement between member States. These include lack of adequate national measures for enforcement as well as a range of deficiencies in real enforcement performance, and finally a lack of co-operation on some occasions by the national authorities with the Commission inspectors. This situation, says the report, cannot be allowed to continue and where the circumstances require, the Commission will not hesitate to use the powers provided under article 169 of the Treaty to require member States to comply with their Community obligations.

Drove Car With "Just About" Everything Wrong

When a Public Services Vehicle Inspector mechanically examined a Tallow motorist's car he found "just about" everything wrong with it, Tallow Court heard.

Before the court was Roger Hogan, Templevalley, Tallow, a 43-year-old unemployed farm labourer who was convicted of dangerous driving (by virtue of the condition of the vehicle) at Cockpit Lane, Tallow, on April 19 last. He pleaded not guilty.

Hogan however pleaded guilty to a number of other charges relating to defects in the car, including a defective service brake, defective front suspension, no foot-brake, defective parking brake and defective steering.

Hogan also pleaded guilty to driving without insurance on the occasion.

Garda Michael Dineen, Tallow, told of stopping the defendant and said Hogan had considerable difficulty in bringing the car to a halt.

Sergeant P. J. McCarthy,

Public Services Vehicle Inspector, said he examined Hogan's car on April 21 and among other things found the front brakes to be "totally useless" and the steering defective. "The vehicle was in a very dangerous state and overall was dangerously defective", Sgt. McCarthy said.

Mr. Joseph Lavan Solr, said Hogan had immediately disposed of the car after being stopped by the Garda. His client was unemployed presently and living on £35 a week.

On the dangerous driving conviction, District Justice Mangan fined Hogan £50 with an endorsement, and disqualified him from driving for six months. He fined him a further £100 with a second endorsement.

WEXFORD HAULIER FINED £400

John O'Dwyer, Friary Street, Dungarvan was fined £40, endorsed and disqualified from driving for 12 months when he pleaded guilty to driving with excess alcohol on May 11 at Friary Street.

Supt. English said that in this instance Sergeant O'Sullivan stopped the defendant at Friary Street, and while speaking to him about his car tax he formed the opinion he had drunk. He gave a breath test, which proved positive and then took the defendant to the Garda Station where a blood sample was taken. This gave a blood/alcohol level of 186 mgms. on analysis.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., said that the defendant was, in fact, outside the door of his own house at the time. He was a part-time fisherman who had not taken a drink for the previous seven years. He asked that the disqualification be deferred until the end of August.

Supt. English said he had no objection and District Justice Mangan, having imposed the penalties stated directed that the driving disqualification be deferred until September 1.

John Lawlor, Rathnure, Enniscestrycorb was fined a total of £400 at Dungarvan Court when he pleaded guilty to charges of allowing a lorry to be used without the required merchandise licence or certificate of road worthiness and for not operating a tachograph.

Supt. M. English who prosecuted said that a lorry owned by the defendant, who was in the haulage business and driven by Patrick O'Connor was stopped by Garda T. Brady, Traffic Corps, at Killosera, Dungarvan on December 13 last. He was hauling Christmas trees from Tallow to Dublin on the occasion.

The Supt. added that the defendant had a number of previous traffic convictions.

District Justice J. Mangan imposed fines of £250 in respect of the merchandise licence, £100 with an endorsement in respect of the certificate of road worthiness and £50 in respect of the tachograph.

Similar charges against the driver were dismissed. Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., appeared for both defendants.

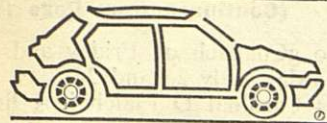

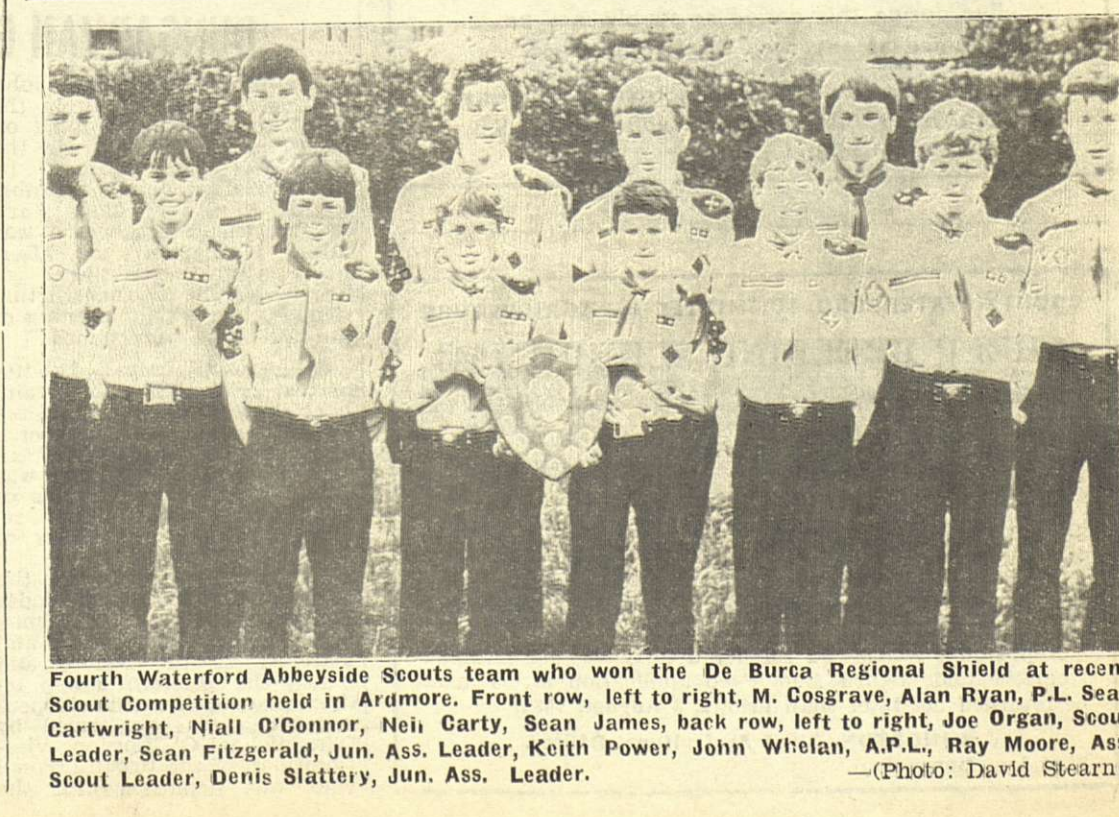

Switch On Of Floodlighting At Ardmore Round Tower

The brain-child of the late Rus Perks who did so much to put Ardmore on the map during his life-time was finally realised shortly after 11 p.m. on last Friday night, July 11, when the 97 ft. Round Tower in Ardmore suddenly and dramatically appeared against the night sky bathed in light following the official switch-on of the floodlighting which has now been installed. As a tribute to the memory of the much loved and greatly respected Principal of the Perks Funfair complex in Ardmore the switch-on was performed by his widow, Mrs. Rosemary Perks.

Its base while the old cathedral ruins which adjoin have another two and when switched on this historic landmark on the hill overlooking the resort now shines out in the dark and can be seen for miles around. It is indeed a memorable sight and adds greatly to Ardmore's historic landmark when viewed at night.

The Ardmore Tidy Towns and Development Association were the prime movers in having the flood-lighting installed with the full co-operation and

help of South East Tourism, Waterford County Council and the Office of Public Works.

Prior to the official switch-on an informal reception, hosted by the Ardmore Development Association, was held at Cliff House Hotel, Mr. John Fitzgerald, Chairman of the Tidy Towns Committee welcomed the guests "to this great occasion of the flood lighting of the Tower and Cathedral," and said that they were very proud that the plan had now been that to fruition. He thanked all the members of the Tidy Towns Committee and all associated with the project and he thanked in a special way the Friends of the Tower Association, without whose contributions they might not have completed it.

Mr. Fitzgerald then thanked Mr. and Mrs. Nugent, Cliff House Hotel, for making the facilities for the holding of the reception available to them free and the girls of the Tidy Towns Committee, who had prepared the savouries and snacks and cocktail sausages and sandwiches for the guests who attended.

Mr. Dan Hurley, County Manager in a brief few words said that he was most pleased to have been invited to the switch-on. To have projects like the floodlighting of the Round Tower completed did an enormous amount of good for the

image of the Local Authority. He paid tribute to the people of Ardmore who had come together to ensure the successful completion of the project, and said that as a result the Tower would now be seen by everyone when it was floodlit at night.

Mr. Hurley went on to say that the Tidy Towns Competition represented the marriage of a community effort on the majority side and the Co. Council on the minority side. He again thanked all associated with the project and said that they all could be very proud of Ardmore "and on July 24 when people from other shores come to visit they will be bound to take cognisance of this lovely village." This latter was a reference to the visit by the judges in the Entente Floriale competition for which Ardmore has been nominated this year.

Following the reception, the group moved out to the Round Tower where Mrs. Perks then performed the official switch-on.

Amongst those at the function also were Mr. B. J. McNally, County Secretary, Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, Mr. Jack Walsh, Assistant Regional Tourism Manager, Southeast-Tourism, while Mrs. Caroline Bowen-Walsh, Hon. Secretary of the Committee worked ceaselessly to ensure that the entire function went without a hitch from start to finish.

Vandals Desecrate Old Vault In Ardmore

Gardai in Ardmore under Sergeant M. Fahy, are continuing their investigations into the desecration of two graves on what is known locally as "McKenna's Tomb," a five-foot high flat-roofed cement vault, at Ardo, Ardmore, where Sir Joseph McKenna and his wife were laid to rest about 70 years ago. The vault is located in a field across the road from the ruins of Ardo House, which was the one-time house of Sir Joseph and Lady McKenna.

The attack on the vault was first noted in the middle of last week by a group of boy scouts who were camped nearby and the matter was reported to the gardai.

Investigations show that the vandals forced back two iron frames, which previously held stained glass windows, to gain entry to the tomb. Inside they ripped open the tops of the two sealed lead caskets containing the couple's re-

mains. According to mistaken local folklore, Lady McKenna was buried with her gold and jewellery and gardai believed these were the raiders' targets.

A large bag was found beside the caskets and is believed to have been left behind as the gang went away empty-handed after their macabre escapade. Sergeant Fahy, later said they were fairly certain Lady McKenna's jewellery and other valuables were what the vandals were after.

"They were on a loser all the time, however, because it is now certain that none of Lady McKenna's valuables were buried with her," Sgt. Fahy said. He added that their investigations are taking "a certain course".

The break-in at the tomb has outraged locals. "Slick minds were involved", one villager said.

Sir Joseph, who died around 1916, is believed to have been an elected MP. He predeceased Lady McKenna by a comparatively short period of time.
