financial, people have pooled their resources and helped each other in many ways down through the ages. The need for money was not always readily satisfied by the established fin-ancial outlets, especially those needs of comparatively small amounts. People resorted to "Loan Sharks" (Moneylenders), as some still do, consequently, there was a vacuum, and Credit Union arrived to fill it. The Members of Dungarvan Credit Union have Savings in excess of £1,500,000. A reasonable Dividend (usually 6%) is paid annually on Sav-ings. This Dividend is subject to Income Tax, but not the Re-tention Tax (1986 Budget). Savings are also automatically in-sured (subject to age and phy-The early days (or night) of sical requirements) at no cost to the member.

The early days (or night) of the Union were spent in the Courthouse, where in a small room, members were enrolled and deposits were taken by the organising Committee and other voluntary helpers. It was a slow and painstaking growth, and during the first year, doubts were expressed as to the viability of the venture, but "as from small acorns great oaks grow," so did the Credit Union, persistence and dedication suc-ceed. The success of the pion-eers in those early days can be gauged from the results of 21 years. There are now 2900 active members in the Union. The pioneers in 1965 envisated a potential membership of 2000. A Net Increase of over 400 was recorded in 1986.
