He added that the only type of salmon nets which could now be purchased were monafilament nets.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q. — I hope to sell my car privately in the near future. A friend was telling me that when you sell your car now you when you sell your car now you no longer hand over the registration book to the buyer. wonder could you please explain

the new situation to me. A. — Since February of 1983 the onus is on the seller of a car to ensure that the new ownership is registered with the local motor taxation office. It is in the interest of the seller that the motor tax office be notified promptly of the change of ownership. Otherwise the seller would continue to be regarded as the registered owner and could be held responsible for parking offences and offences relating to uninsured driving of the car

In the case of a private sale, both seller and buyer should fill up a joint declaration of sale a special form (Form RF2) on a special form (Form RF2) obtainable from the motor tax office; the buyer enters his/her name and address in the regis-tration book and the seller sends both form and book to the motor tax office. The motor tax office will forward the book to the new owner after updat-the buyer keeps a detachable part of the form RF2 as confir-mation of the sale). The same procedure is followed where a dealer is selling to a private dealer is selling to a private buyer, but a slightly different procedure is followed where a private individual is selling to a dealer. face income tax bills of possible tens of thousands of pounds unless a radical review of the income tax code as it relates to stock relief, has been made by former ICMSA Economist and current County Tippenary Chairton: M. In a statement issued from Limerick, Mr. Blake identified three categories of farmers as being at risk:

1. - Flarmers who attempt to solve their financial problems by disposal of stock.

2. — Farmers who trans er part but not all of their hold-ings to their son/daughter to qualify for the Young Farmer Installation Add.

3.—Farmers who suffer a ser-ious reduction in stock numbers through disease eradication but not compulsory disposal. 4. — Farmers who d'spose of

stock as a result of entering the Milk Cessation Scheme.

He explained stock relief is an allowance which farmers can avail of in order to reduce their tax Itability when the stock numbers and values are in-creasing. This may be a con-siderable advantage in times of expansion but when there is substantial drop in numbers at the end of an accounting year the income tax liability arising Mr. Blake stated that many

farmers experiencing severe financial difficulty are in many instances being strongly advised by lending institutions to dis-pose of stock in order to meet part or all of their financial commitments. However once the stock are sold to meet bank de-mands the farmer can then be faced with an income tax liability of ten, fifteen or twenty thousand pounds in income tax, depending on the level of stock relie claimed over previous years



EEC BEEF PREMIUM SCHEME 1987

This Scheme will operate in Ireland from 6 April 1987. Applicants must be registered hendowners under hte Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme.

From 6 April onward herdowners may apply for the EEC Beef Premium of about £14.70 (equivalent to 18 European Currency Units) on male cattle of at least 9 months of age which have been kept on their holdings for at least 3 months before date of application.

ARRANGEMENTS BETWEEN 6 APRIL 1987 and 13 JUNE 1987

During the period 6 April 1987 to 13 June 1987 herdowners may apply for Premium only on male cattle of at least 9 months of age sold at Licensed Meat Export Premises on at specified Mart Sales. Herdowners should not apply for Premium on cattle retained on the farm during this period as those cattle will be inspected later in accordance with the arrangements set out below for the period after 13 June 1987.

Special Application Forms to cover cattle sold up to 13 June will be available from this week at the local offices of the Department of Agniculture, ACOT Offices, Post Offices and Marts.

Herdowners selling male cattle at Marts or Meat Factories should complete and sign the applications BEFORE THE CATTLE LEAVE THEIR FARMS and must hand the forms to the Department of Agriculutre's Inspecting Officer immediately they arrive at the intake point. The cattle will then be inspected and eligible animals will be ear-punched at the Marts. The applications will be retained and payment will be made from October 1987 onward on those animals found to be eligible for Premium.

Inspections will be carried out in Meat Factories whenever they are open to receive male cattle. Marts will be manned by Inspecting Officers during the normal entry times for sales of male cattle. The detailed arrangements for each Mart will be advertised in the local press and on posters in each Mart.

ARRANGEMENTS FROM 15 JUNE ONWARDS: During the period 15 June 1987 to 10 July 1987

herdowners may apply for Premium on all male cattle of at least 9 months of age which have been kept on their holdings for at least 3 months before date of application.

An application form will be posted in late May to each herdowner. On receipt of these forms, herdowners should list all their eligible male cattle thereon-including those they intend to sell later-and should return the completed applications to the Headage Payments Section of their local office of the Department of Agriculture not later than 10 July 1987.

On-farm inspections on foot of these applications will commence in late June and continue until November 1987. The inspections at Marts and Licensed Meat Export Premises will also continue in order to facilitate herdowners who sell some of their male cattle before the on-farm inspections take place.

Herdowners will receive with the application forms. posted to them in late May a number of Inspection Certificates to allow male cattle sold at Marts or Meat Factories after they have submitted their June 1987 applications to be inspected.

These Centificates will be used as follows:

(1) Herdowner lists male cattle being sold on Inspection Certificate and completes and signs the Certificate BEFORE THE CATTLE LEAVE THE FARM.

Meat Factory the herdowner hands the completed Certificate to the Department's Inspecting Officer. (3) Inspecting Officer inspects the male cattle, punches

- those at the Marts and returns the Certificate, duly endorsed, to the herdowner after inspection. (4) Herdowner keeps Inspection Certificate(s) returned
- to him at Mart or Meat Factory until his on-farm inspection takes place.
- (5) The Inspecting Officer visiting the farm accepts for premium all eligible male cattle found on-farm and all those certified per Inspection Certificate(s) as being eligible for premium subject to a maximum of 50 per applicant for 1987.

Payment of premium on these cattle will commence in
