





GOVERNMENT DECISION REGRETTABLE

The scheme was a very posistructural change in Irish agri-culture, according to IFA Rural Development Committee chairman, Donal McDaild.

Pointing out that the scheme helped in the transferring of farms, Mr. McDaid said the Government should have sought improvements under EEC regulations rather than abolishing the measure.

'Als the EEC' financed 50 per cent of the cost of the scheme, the saving to the Government will be minimal," he said.

Mr. McDaid was also critical of the Farm Improvement Programme cutbacks which resulted in grant rates being out by 10 per cent, "It is difficult to understand the Government's strategy for the development of agriculture if they are going to cut the Farm Development scheme which is substantially funded by the EEC," he said.

'By abolishing these EEC schemes, Ireland is throwing away its negotiating rights in seekiing financial assistance from Brussels for future structural measures.'
