Dungarvan will host its first major conference of national importance from April 27 to May 1 next and at a Press Briefing last Monday, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that the business people not only of the town but of the entire area of West Waterford should all put their best foot forward to ensure that the conference will turn out to be 100 per cent successful.

Well over 200 delegates from all over the country and Northern Ireland will converge on Dungarvan next Monday week and will remain in the area throughout the ensuing week. It is estimated that between these and the many other visitors who will come, a lot of money will be involved with an estimated expenditure of between half and three-quarters of a million pounds being generated.

Should Dungarvan prove its worth with this initial effort it is fairly certain that it would become an established centre for such conferences in future years. This would indeed be a major economic boost for the entire West Waterford area and it is up to each and every one of us to ensure that this will happen.

DUNGARVAN PAROCHIAL CASH BOOK

For some weeks now we have been publishing extracts from the Dungarvan Parochial Cash Book compiled by the then Parish Priest of Dungarvan, Very Rev. James V. Cleary, D.D., P.P., and covering a period commencing in 1875. It details the cash transactions involved in the administration of St. Mary's Parish Church in those years with comments on the social conditions of the times in some instances.

Last week we had the extract concerning the initial meeting held on October 5, 1879 at which it was decided to install 13 stained glass windows at a total cost of £1324 and on November 4 of that year, Very Rev. Fr. Cleary noted in the Book: "The following gentlemen gave their names, collectively and severally, together with mine, to the National Bank, for security for moneys that may be drawn by me, for any amount under £500 in the first instance, on account of the Stained Glass Windows and alterations connected with their erection in the Parochial Church: Doctor Henry Anthony; Wm. Gibbons; Patrick Flood; Richd. Phelan; Maur. Hackett; Wm. Ryan; Thomas McCarthy; P. McCarthy of Ballinamuck Mills; T. O'B. Williams; Denis F. Slattery, Solr.; Richd. Curran; John E. Mahony C.T.C.; R. Edw. Brennan; Peter Walsh; Thomas O'Neill."

The following entry appears over date January 1, 1880: "A succession of bad harvests for

three or four years and the competition of American produce in the English and Irish markets have reduced our agricultural and trading classes to a state of poverty bordering on destitution. There is neither money nor credit, and consequently there is no employment of labour. The potatoes are nearly exhausted and the poor cannot buy Indian meal. We apprehend a famine in Spring."

This entry shows that things don't change much as such economic conditions apply to present times as they did in 1880!

On December 29, 1879, it was recorded that the following paid in 50 guineas each towards the stained glass windows: Dr. Cleary, Dr. Anthony, Kate Hackett, Mrs. Thomas Sheehan, Patk. McCarthy, Ballinamuck, Richard Kiely, Patk. Power, Square, Mrs. Maria O'Brien, Captain John Carbery, Maurice Hayes, Miss Margaret Ryan, Edward Kennefick, Mrs. Mary Cleary and Mr. Thomas O'Neill paid £26-5-0 each for 1/2 window.

The concluding entry for the period is dated St. Patrick's Day, 1881 and states that: "Total Receipts, ordinary and extraordinary since 1 Jan. 1876 £3111-19-3," and that entry is signed "James Vincent Cleary, Bishop of Kingston."

The only reference to the consecration of Dr. Cleary as Bishop is contained in the following final statement for the period: "At a meeting in the Vestry of the Parochial Church held 21st March 1881, at which all who contributed to the erection of the Stained Glass Windows and the Stations of the Holy Way of the Cross, as also the gentlemen who on the 4th Novr. 1879 gave their names to the National Bank for security to the extent of £500 to be drawn by the Parish Priest for the Church improvements, attended, it was unanimously resolved that a vote of thanks be given to the Most Revd. Dr. Cleary, Lord Bishop of Kingston, late Parish Priest, for the successful management of the financial affairs of the parish during his five years' Pastorship, and, inasmuch as his Parochial Accounts have been audited and found eminently satisfactory by four gentlemen of the parish, those four are requested to sign their names in the Parochial Book to signify the complete acceptance of them by this meeting."

The statement was signed by Wm. Gibbons, T. Flood, Maurice Flynn and James Farrell (somewhat indecipherable).

LEAKING CHUTES AND DOWNPIPES

Friday of last week was a particularly wet day but anyone who walked along the footpaths in Dungarvan, particularly those in O'Connell Street, were assured of an extra heavy drenching as the rainwater cascaded down in torrents from leaking chutes and broken downpipes.

Residents Concerned About Ring Road Junction

When Cllr. B. Kyne moved a motion at the April monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council calling on the Council to change the "staggered" junction on the new by-pass road at Strandside South, Abbeyside, he said that he did so because people living in the area had expressed fears about the safety of the junction especially for children who would have to pass through it going to and coming from school in Abbey-side.

He said that traffic on this road when it was opened would probably be travelling very fast and as he saw it, the only two solutions to the problem was either an underpass or traffic lights and even where the latter were concerned he felt there would be a need for an advance warning. "The local people are not convinced that the junction as it is laid out at present is safe, especially for pedestrians and particularly for children," said Cllr. Kyne. Cllr. M. O'Riordan seconding

the motion said that over 90 school-going children would have to cross through this junction four times a day and it was essential that it be made safe for them to do so.

Cllr. J. A. Walsh, Chairman, said that members of the local Committee had already met him about the situation and at present the Co. Manager and the Co. Engineer were having discussions about the junction.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, said that he could appreciate the concern of the people, which he also shared, about the pedestrian use of the junction. At present he was having discussions with the technical experts about the situation and would be meeting a small deputation of the people concerned within a fortnight. "I am sure," Mr. Hurley said, "that following our discussions we will be able to formulate something that will be satisfactory to all concerned and I will report back to the Council about the matter in due course."

Plans Announced For Dungarvan's First Major Conference

At a Press Briefing held in the office of the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, at Arus Brugha, Dungarvan last Monday morning, plans for the holding of the Annual Joint Conference of the Library Association of Ireland and the Library Association of Northern Ireland were outlined by the Conference Secretary, Mr. Donal Brady, County Librarian. The Conference will com-

ence on Monday afternoon, April 27 and will continue until Friday, May 1. The Conference centre will be located in Lawlor's Hotel.

Apart from the routine business of addresses and discussions the organisers plan to afford the delegates an opportunity of seeing for themselves the scenic areas of West Waterford by organising visits to places of beauty and of interest. This main social function of the Conference will be the Conference Dinner which will be held on the Thursday night with the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Padraig Flynn as the Guest of Honour and principal speaker.

The County Manager, Mr. Hurley said that even at this early date the bookings for the conference were extraordinarily good with a positive booking already for 150 delegates while 90 more had also been nominated and bookings for these were being expected. "A lot of money is involved for Dungarvan and West Waterford where this conference is concerned," said Mr. Hurley, "and we estimate that between half and three-quarters of a million pounds will be spent locally during the week." That, he added, was quite a lot of money.

PUT BEST FOOT FORWARD

Mr. Hurley then went on to express the hope that the people of the county and in particular the people of Dungarvan and west Waterford would grasp the opportunity to show that Dungarvan was an ideal centre in which to hold a major conference of this size.

Co. Council Faces New Cash Crisis

Members of Waterford Co. Council were told by the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday that the Rate Support Grant allocated by the Department for 1987 was £490,000 less than last year and as a result they were now facing a deficit in excess of £1 million. The outlook is anything but bright," said Mr. Hurley.

Council Chairman, Mr. J. A. Walsh remarked: "Our situation has become doubly worse since we last met to discuss this year's estimates." The Council will meet on Monday, April 27 to deal finally with the estimates for the coming year.

Mr. B. J. McNally, Co. Secretary said that the allocation from the Dept. on foot of the Rate Support Grant for 1987 was £4,937,700 and this was a reduction of £488,300 on the 1986 figure. "The draft estimates discussed by the Council on March 30 assumed a grant of the same level as in 1986 and accordingly, the deficit shown as £564,000 in that document is now over £1 million," he said.

Mr. McNally added that the extent of the deficit required a fundamental reconstruction of the total estimates and this could not now be completed in time to meet the date fixed for the Statutory Estimates meeting to be held on April 21. He asked that the meeting be re-fixed for April 27.

The Manager said that never before had they so much trouble in planning their strategy to provide for the services required and the implications for employment, across the board were very ominous for all concerned. He said that while the present financial position continued he would be recommending no further involvement in any major capital

schemes as they would be unable to fund them. "We will have to drastically trim our sails and cut our cloth according to measure," said the Manager, adding that the members themselves would be the ones to decide at the Estimates meeting what services were to be curtailed or even cut out as he believed it was unrealistic to expect any additional funding from Central Government.

DOOMED TO FAILURE

Cllr. C. O. Rlain said that it looked as if Local Authorities were doomed to failure unless the Dept. came up with some kind of funding as local charges would not realise the kind of money needed to keep the services going. "I think that the sooner we're abolished the better," he said.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that the Local Authorities were only reacting to the tough decisions already made by the Government as a result of which a million pounds had been taken from this Council since they last met to discuss the estimates two weeks ago. It would seem now, he said, that as a result of these cuts that a significant number of workers may have to be let go as no money would be available to pay them. "A massive number of our workers must be facing unemployment," said Cllr. Kyne, "while millions are uncollected in health charges and unpaid rates and land tax are owed to the Government and local authorities. If that is the choice given by the Government then it will be hard on me to back up any increases in water charges or hospital service charges."

The Chairman, Cllr. Walsh said it was now very clear that harsh decisions would have to be taken at their estimates meeting which was then unanimously fixed for Monday, April 27.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q. — Is every woman entitled to Maternity Leave?

A. — Virtually all women who are in employment when they become pregnant and who are paying social insurance contributions are entitled to Maternity Leave.

Exceptions are:
1. Women who work for less than 18 hours per week.
2. Women in "subsidiary" employment as specified by the Dept. of Social Welfare (Home Help and Lollipop Ladies are examples).
3. Women employed by their husbands.

Some employees already have an entitlement to Maternity Leave as part of their conditions of employment. If this contract is more favourable than the new Maternity Protection of Employees Act 1981 then it may continue but it may not be less favourable.

The Act provides for at least 14 consecutive weeks leave. Generally speaking, four weeks of this leave must be taken before the expected date of the birth and four weeks must also be taken after. The remaining six weeks may be taken as the employees choose before or after the birth. A woman would not lose any of her entitlement if her baby arrives early.

The employee is obliged to follow specified procedures in order to ensure her maternity leave.

(a). At least 4 weeks before the date on which she starts her maternity leave the employee must give notice to her employer of her intention to take maternity leave.
(b). She must provide her employer with medical evidence of the expected date of birth.

If a woman intends to take extra maternity leave (she is entitled to take four extra weeks unpaid leave) she must notify her employer of this at least four weeks before the date on which she would normally be expected to return to work. The woman who takes maternity leave has a right to return to the same job or a suitable alternative, under the same

terms as she had prior to her leave. On the other hand there is no obligation on the woman to return to work.

In order to avail of this right to return to work she must notify her employer (in writing) of her intention to return to work at least four weeks before she expects to do so. She must confirm this again in writing, between the 4th and 2nd weeks before she expects to return.

An employee may be paid while on maternity leave by her employer, if this is part of her contract of employment, or by qualifying for Maternity Allowance under the Social Welfare Scheme.

Fined For Breach Of Food Hygiene Regulations

Franco Rocco, 30, Grattan Square, Dungarvan was charged at Dungarvan Court on 9 separate counts for breaches of the Food Hygiene Regulations in respect of his "take-away" premises known as Ken's Kitchen, Grattan Square, on several dates in 1985-1986.

The prosecution was brought by the South Eastern Health Board and Mr. J. O'Connor, Environmental Officer told the court that he first visited the premises on February 11, 1985 and subsequently on five other occasions, the final inspection being made on October 31, 1986. He said that notices of the various breaches under the regulations had been served on the defendant but despite this there were no improvements when he last visited the premises in October last year.

Witness then detailed the alleged offences which involved improperly kept cooking equipment, faults in the preparation and storage of food in the cooking area and improperly kept toilets.

It was pointed out that there was a previous conviction under the hygiene regulations against the defendant in respect of a premises in Tipperary. Mr. J. Lavan, Solicitor, on behalf of the defendant, said that the premises which were the subject of the present prosecution had, in fact, been cleaned up when the Environmental Officer called last October. The reason that the recommendations of the officer had not been carried out was that structural improvements which were to be carried out at the premises were held up by the contractor. Arrangements had now been agreed to go ahead with this work without further delay.

PARTICULARLY BAD CASE

District Justice W. F. O'Connell said that this seemed to him to be a particularly bad case. It had been going on since

1985 and despite five visits by the Health Board Officer, no substantial improvements had been made. "These visits by Health Board officials to premises such as this are the only protection the public has that

the food offered is prepared and cooked in hygienic conditions," he said, adding, "the defendant in this case was quite irresponsible."

Convicting the defendant on all counts, the District Justice

imposed fines totalling £150 on foot of five of the charges and marked the other four proved and taken into consideration. He also allowed £150 costs and £50 witness's expenses to the Board against the defendant.

FINED £20 FOR CRASHING THROUGH RED TRAFFIC LIGHT

John Duggan, Childers Estate, Dungarvan was fined £20 at Dungarvan Court when he was convicted on a charge of driving through a red traffic light at Kilrush on January 30. Garda J. Martin who prosecuted said that the offence occurred at 4.44 p.m. on the day in question.

RNLI AWARD FOR YOUGHAL WOMAN

Mr. Alan Stanford, a star of the television series 'Glenroe' and the Gate Theatre, Dublin, presented awards on behalf of the RNLI to voluntary fundraisers at the RNLI Ireland annual presentation of awards ceremony in the Mansion House, Dublin last Thursday night.

Mr. Hugh Hamilton, Convenor of the 'City of Dublin' Lifeboat Appeal presided over the RNLI Annual Presentation of Awards Ceremony. With regard to the 'City of Dublin' appeal, Mr. Hamilton stated that to date £170,000 of the £250,000 target had been raised. The new Howth lifeboat for which this money is earmarked will be officially named RNLI 'City of Dublin' on 16th May, 1987 by Mrs. Miriam Ahern, Lady Mayoress of Dublin.

Mr. Ray Kipling, Assistant Director of the RNLI, in his address, to the large audience of lifeboat volunteers, praised and thanked them for their continued work on behalf of the RNLI. In particular he complimented the Dublin branch members on raising the appreciable sum of £23,588 during 1985-86.

Mr. Kipling went on to report that £29 million will be the cost of providing the lifeboat service in 1986-87 and that this sum will come from voluntary sources. The modernisation of the life boat fleet in Ireland will continue during this year with the stationing of the seventh Arun class lifeboat at Inishmore, Co. Galway. Mr. Kipling also stated that 1986 was the busiest year ever for the Irish fleet of the RNLI, which launched on 260 services (1985-264) and saved 127 lives (1985-112).

Mrs. Harvey Williams of Youghal was awarded the Inshore Silver Badge in recognition of her 10 years' work as Honorary Secretary of Youghal Ladies' Guild.

G.A.A. Notes

Waterford will make Galway fight all the way

NEXT WEEKEND

Understandably, everything is overshadowed by the National Hurling League semi-final between Waterford and Galway at Portlaoise on Sunday next but we must not get so carried away that we overlook the two senior football championship games that are listed for decision on Saturday.

Because of the big match, all but these two are postponed and the others will be 'slotted' in, where possible during hurling week-ends as the season progresses.

AT KILMACKTHOMAS

Here Bricekys will receive their baptism of fire in the senior championship when they play Dunhill in a game that is given a 6.30 p.m. start. Dunhill will start favourites because of their greater experience in the grade, but going on the several very good displays of their next intermediate champions, Bricekys, in last year's competition, this will be closer than some people imagine. If they are fully 'tuned up' for the clash, the Western team could very well surprise.

AT PORTLAW

Ferrybank who surprised Clashmore in the senior league at Fraher Field three weeks ago will fancy their chances of beating last season's championship runners-up, Kilmackthomas, when they meet at Portlaoise on Saturday. Bad weather forced the postponement of the match in which Kilmack were to have opened their senior league campaign two weeks ago and this leaves them without a competitive trial spin that could prove a disadvantage. Ferrybank are favourites and may earn the two points.

THE BIG ONE

The league game has been switched to Portlaoise from Thurles for a number of reasons. Our opponents, Galway, are also engaged in the league football semi-final against Dublin and this match was originally fixed for Portlaoise. The G.A.C. obviously considered it unfair to play Galway at different venues on the same afternoon. Also a problem might result from the fact that Tipperary are due to play the other semi-final away from Thurles on Sunday.

We are now part of a very attractive double-header and our match being first (2.15 p.m.) we will be able to relax in comfort for the Dublin v. Galway football semi-final.

How nice relaxing it will be if it happens to beat Galway in the opening tie!

Our chances of achieving another shock result must be at very long odds, even though many of our very loyal and dedicated supporters now believe that all things are possible, we having beaten the All-Ireland champions, Cork, some weeks ago. In that game, Waterford rose to new heights and played their best hurling, but we must face the fact that the element of surprise was a definite factor in deciding that quarter final. To some extent Cork took us for granted and in no way will this happen on next Sunday. Galway have played in an All-Ireland final and a National League final without success within the past eleven months and they will have nothing undone here to make sure that they at least qualify for the final again this year.

In Conor Hayes, Sylvie Linnane, Joe Cooney, Kevin Kilkeny, Tony Keedy, Martin Knighton, Noel Lane, Bernie Ford, Anthony Cunningham, Michael Murphy, etc., they have a team of tremendously skilled and experienced players who are physically more matured than our younger and less experienced team.

Over the week-end I spoke with a Galway man, whom I consider to be a very sober judge of football and hurling affairs, and he told me to have no doubt about the result, as Galway would win — more especially now that Waterford have set off the alarm bells in good time.

Waterford selectors have passed a vote of confidence in the side who beat Cork and have made no changes. Their courage and confidence will have benefitted in a big way from the Cork game and all fears about reputations and all that, and as well that they re-

luse that this is a bonus match and already they have achieved much more than was expected of them in a very short time. Remembering these matters should prove a psychological advantage. We are sure to give them a great game and make them fight all the way and I'll be happy if we go close enough to give them a fright. Of course like everyone else I'll be excited and delighted if we do better than that.

This year it will be strictly confined to members of the association and club officers will be held responsible for the bona fide of applicants who must be playing members on under 14 or under 16 hurling teams, players on a camogie, or ladies football team, or have participated in 'Scor'. The overall cost will be £3,560 and it is expected that some of the cost will be defrayed by sponsorship. Students and clubs will each pay £30. Both East and West interviews will take place on May 16th, at Portlaoise at 11 a.m. and at Dungarvan at 3 p.m. The course at Colaiste na Rinne will be from July 21 to August 14.

Easter In Royal Tara

(The greatest miracle of that Easter morn was that St. Patrick came out alive from Tara)

On Holy Saturday, Saint Patrick on reaching the place now called Slane, caused a tent to be erected, and lighted the Paschal fire about midnight, preparatory to the celebration of the Easter solemnity.

The Christian Easter coincided with the Druid Spring Festival. By Irish law no fire could be lit in the surrounding countryside until the great fire from the top of Tara hill be visible. Suddenly there was consternation. The King on seeing the fire that the saint had kindled and on hearing from his druids who it was had come into the neighbourhood, ordered the apostle to be brought before him.

The scene at Tara on that Easter morning was truly remarkable. Patrick was not

unaware of the pagan perfidy practised against him but placing his confidence in the protecting power of the Lord and chanting a solemn hymn of invocation which he composed himself called "St. Patrick's Breastplate" he advanced at the head of his priests in processional order between the ranks of druids whose hatred could barely be held back.

Patrick was clothed in white robes and on this occasion he wore his mitre and carried in his hands the crozier called the staff of Jesus. Eight priests who attended on him also wore white robes. The King was seated in barbaric state in the great banqueting hall capable of holding a thousand people, his eldest son, Fortchern, at his side. Chiefs with spears in their hands stood around with wolf-hounds in check. What this High King must have thought as he looked down from his throne at the band of simply garbed, singing men who advanced fearlessly, armed only with some symbols of their faith!

The Saint accorded all possible respect to the King. Asked

why he had broken the law, Patrick explained that the Paschal fire took precedence over the pagan fire. "I have lit a fire this Easter day in Ireland that will never be put out," said Patrick. The saint then expounded the doctrines of Christianity to the King and his assembly and made many converts. Laegaire himself was not among them but his queen and two daughters were converted.

FAVOURABLE IMPRESSION

The greatest miracle on that Easter morning was that Patrick came out alive from Tara. Laegaire saw Patrick as a brave, honourable, learned man. He made such a favourable impression on him that he gave the saint his royal permission to preach wherever he chose, on condition that he did not disturb the peace or deprive him of his kingdom.

That Easter Sunday in Tara was the commencement of Patrick's Irish mission, in which he continued to labour for more than thirty years.

GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT
The best responses to Nitrogen application will be for the next two months at stocking rates of 1 livestock unit/acre. 4 bags of 27½. Net should already have been applied. Apply another bag at the end of April. Allow ½ acre/livestock unit of grazing area at this Nitrogen rate.

SILAGE
A big yield of 1st cut silage is very important. Up to 50% of farm should now be closed for cutting.

SUCKLING
All cattle farmers should consider breeding at least 20% of their own cattle requirements from suckler cows.

A fall in calf and store supplies is likely in the coming years, also the quality of animal from the dairy herd leaves much to be desired.

Black whiteheads (Hereford x Friesian) cows make ideal suckler cows.

Any farmer with heifers (Black Whitehead) fattening, should consider selling them for breeding if he cannot afford to bull them.

GOVERNMENT DECISION REGRETTABLE

The Government decision to abolish the Young Farmer Installation grant has been described as regrettable by the IFA.

The scheme was a very positive measure in bringing about structural change in Irish agriculture, according to IFA Rural Development Committee chairman, Donal McDaid.

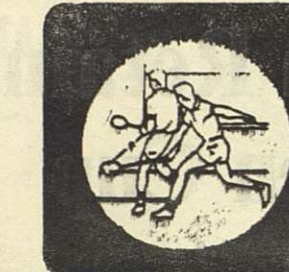
Pointing out that the scheme helped in the transferring of farms, Mr. McDaid said the Government should have sought improvements under EEC regulations rather than abolishing the measure.

"As the EEC financed 50 per cent of the cost of the scheme, the saving to the Government will be minimal," he said.

Mr. McDaid was also critical of the Farm Improvement Programme outbacks which resulted in grant rates being cut by 10 per cent. "It is difficult to understand the Government's strategy for the development of agriculture if they are going to cut the Farm Development scheme which is substantially funded by the EEC," he said.

"By abolishing these EEC schemes, Ireland is throwing away its negotiating rights in seeking financial assistance from Brussels for future structural measures."

Details Of 9-Day International Milk Ras

It is hard to believe that, in its fourth decade, a race so rich in Irish tradition as the FBD MILK RAS could still be breaking new ground. But that's exactly what this year's renewal, starting in Dublin on June 20, 1987 and finishing with a criterium in Dun Laoghaire on June 28 will be doing.

For the first time ever, the race will go over the fearsome gap of Mamore in Donegal as part of a fabulous stage around the beautiful Inishowen Peninsula. The field of over 100 cyclists may be entering different sentiments under their breath that day for the Gap follows two other difficult climbs on a really tough day.

Indeed such is Dermot Dignam's, the Ras organiser, devotion to climbing that there is a king of the Mountains prize on every road stage, making it this one of the hardest tours ever. As part of a route that will take the riders from Main Head to Tramore, there are four new stage finishes for the Ras—Derry, Bunrana, Tipperary Town and Wicklow. Despite the distances to be covered by the race in just nine days, it is a tribute to the Organiser's ingenuity that long transfers have been avoided, with only one scheduled between Sligo and Roscommon.

One very interesting stage comes near the finish with a 4 km. time trial up the steep Devils Glen in Wicklow on the final morning. Although it is not a long Time Trial it is over a hard climb and remembering that a half a minute covered the first three home in last year's Ras, it is not beyond the bounds of possibility that the race could be decided here.

Because the opening stage to the well-known dairy town of Killeshandra is quite a long one, the prologue has been left out this year. But sprint bonuses of a few seconds may be given on the stages to open up the General Classification. A decision on that will be made nearer the race itself.

That's not to indicate that this will be a sprinter's tour for all those climbs will surely find them out. As well as the Gap of Mamore on the third stage, there's also the Black Mountain and the run up to Main Head itself. Stage 9 is also very tough with four hard climbs

TOMAS KIELY

AN APPRECIATION

Tomas Kieley was a big man in physique, of course, but even more so in heart and in spirit. He was what the Indian people would call "a great spirit." His greatness of spirit manifested itself especially for me in the deep respect — reverence would not be too strong a word for it — which he showed to all who had dealings with him whether in the business, social, or personal sphere. In a word, he cared about people — about his family, his relatives, his neighbours and friends, his business associates. I myself, on several occasions in my lifetime, was the happy recipient of his care and concern, and for that I acknowledge my profound appreciation.

When we were children, if we could ever get going places with Tomas — and we very often did — we were sure of a great time. He would pile us into the back of the truck, we would seat ourselves on a few bales of hay or straw, and on arrival he would see to it that our childish need for sweets, ice-cream, and lemonade were well and truly catered for.

For me, Tomas was synonymous with the truck. As a child, I used to think that he had a truck because of the way he often drove a car! How we will miss his distinctive figure behind the wheel, arm invariably leaning out the window, on the "bor-en" and on the road into town. How often he picked us up on the way to school, put us into the back of the truck, often among eight or ten calves, unperturbed by the fact that our hands and legs would be tattooed with calf lick-marks for the rest of the day. But despite having to share our transport with the calves, we were still very thankful to Tomas for enabling us to save our shoe-leather on the long, cold windy road between Knockateamore and Dungarvan.

Tomas's truck was for me almost a symbol of home. I knew it was home in Dungarvan, not so much at the sight of our beautiful harbour or our splendid parish church, but at the sight of Tomas's truck parked in the Square, or around Mickey Landers' corner, or at Tom Mulcahy's corner, or outside the Friary Church where Tomas might have gone to say a prayer for me or to attend the Mass he loved so well.

What brings me to the focal point of Tomas's life. He loved the Mass and attended it almost every day for the last twenty years and more. Even by Irish standards, where devotion to the Eucharist is still — thank-fully — strong and deep, Tomas's devotion was unusual. He was a devout man in the truest sense of that word — he took absolutely seriously the role and presence of God in our lives. I firmly believe that if more people took God's reality seriously, our world — and our country — would be much better places.

Yet, Tomas was a man who enjoyed life to the full — he loved horses, cards and football and hurling. For him, there was never any incompatibility between enjoying life and being prayerful and devout. In a word, he gave us all a model of how to be playful and prayerful at the same time. In his life, playing and praying were easy partners. It is sometimes thought that to be religious is to be dull and uninteresting. How wrong that view is! Religious Tomas certainly was, but dull and uninteresting he never was. On the contrary, what a wonderful character he was and what a splendid personality he had!

To Mary, his wife, and to his family, I extend my deepest sympathy. We have all been enriched through knowing Tomas. Ar dheis De go raibh a namh dibhils. — (M.G.K.).
