

## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### ABSENCE DID NOT MAKE THE HEART GROW FONDER

The old saying has it that absence makes the heart grow fonder but it must be admitted that this is not true in every case. Certainly it can be said that an absence from last Monday's annual meeting of Waterford Co. Council made few hearts fonder. Rather has it created regrets which most probably will cast long shadows into the future.

We are, of course, referring to the election of the Council Chairman for the coming year, which, had the original plan been adhered to, would have seen Labour Councillor Billy Kyne being invested with the chain of office.

Last year Fine Gael and Labour members of the Council reached agreement to alternate the chair for the two ensuing years. It was the Fine Gael turn last year and this time round the honour was to go to Labour with Cllr. Billy Kyne as the party's nominee. However, as exclusively reported in this column a few weeks ago, the agreement came under question when Ring Galtacht Fine Gael Councillor Jim Hartly threw a spanner in the works by declaring that he would not support Cllr. Kyne's nomination. No reason was given but it was no secret that Cllr. Hartly took umbrage at Cllr. Kyne's frequent criticisms of farmers for non-payment of health contributions and levies.

His party colleagues on the Council made it clear to Cllr. Hartly to come round to their way of thinking and to honour the commitment made to the Labour Party last year. Apparently the Ring Councillor remained unmoved and stated that he would not change his decision. On last Sunday evening crisis point was reached when, in reply to a number of phone calls from party members, Cllr. Hartly stated that he would not attend Monday's meeting. In the alternative we understand that Cllr. Hartly declared his willingness to support the other Labour member on the Council, Senator Brian O'Shea for the Chair or his own party colleague, Cllr. Pat Coffey. He was adamant that he would not vote for Cllr. Kyne.

Following this we believe Cllr. Kyne met with members of the Fine Gael party who conveyed Cllr. Hartly's decision to him and the question arose as to whether there might be an agreement to a draw from a hat or an approach made by Cllr. Kyne to the Fianna Fail party to hammer out a 2-year agreement about the chair with them. That was last Sunday night.

On Monday, shortly before lunch time, Cllr. Kyne met the Fianna Fail nominee for the Chair, Cllr. Patsy Kenneally and the possibility of reaching such an agreement was discussed. We believe Cllr. Kenneally, who is the Fianna Fail Party Whip on the Council, said that they would consider the matter. About half-an-hour before the meeting was due to convene, three members

of the Fine Gael party called to Cllr. Kyne's house to inform him that they had been on the phone to Cllr. Hartly who had told them that he would be in town and would be at the meeting. Following this conversation Cllr. Kyne again met Cllr. Kenneally and then told him that there was no longer any need to consider the offer made earlier.

That, as far as we can ascertain, is a fair resume of the comings and goings that went on up to meeting time. The fact of the matter was that Cllr. Hartly never turned up at the meeting and Cllr. Kyne was, as a result, left with no option but to take his chance with a draw. The outcome is fully reported elsewhere in our news columns.

Later on Monday following the close of the meeting, Cllr. Michael Quceally, Fine Gael Party Whip on the Council, in reply to queries from the Press, stated that he would be reporting on the outcome of the meeting to the Party's Constituency Executive and the question of taking action or otherwise would be a matter for them to decide. Cllr. Quceally expressed disappointment at Cllr. Hartly's absence from the meeting and admitted that Fine Gael had given a commitment to support Cllr. Kyne. He said that he had been informed that Cllr. Hartly was not going to attend the Council meeting but about half-an-hour before the meeting was due to begin he was told that Cllr. Hartly had indicated that he would be present.

And that is the situation as of Monday last. However, there can be little doubt but that Cllr. Hartly's action or rather inaction will have reverberations into the future. With the agreement with Labour now broken it is highly unlikely that Fine Gael will again get hold of the Chair during the lifetime of the present Council while the most likely outcome of last Monday's turn-about will be an understanding between Fianna Fail and Labour to share the chair until the next Local Elections. So it would seem that in downing Cllr. Kyne Fine Gael have cut a stick to beat themselves!

### OLD PHOTOGRAPHS SOUGHT

One of the photographs sought is that of An Athair Miceal Mac Craith who died in the Sean Phobal in 1919 and the other is that of Miss Lizzie McCarthy whom many of the older generation in Dungarban will remember as the frail and gentle old lady who had a small sweet shop at Lower Main Street in years gone by. ## Councillor's Protest At Short Time Agreement For Workers

Stating that he had seen in the local paper last week that the outdoor staff were to be put on short-time working, Cllr. C. O. Riain asked at a meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan, "is this true?"

The Chairman, Cllr. P. Kenneally replied that it was, unfortunately true. Cllr. O. Riain then said that when the Manager had mentioned the possibility of job losses at the estimates meeting he had given an assurance that if there were to be any cuts they would be made right across the board. "But", he said, "every time there are cuts, it's the outdoor staff that comes under the hammer and I want to protest against that."

Cllr. B. Kyne said that the Manager was not to blame because of the short-time arrangement but the Government which had cut the Council's financial allocation by £488,000 this year. This meant that no surface dressing would be done on the roads.

"It is the government that has put the Co. Council workers in Waterford on short-time," he said, adding "other counties with the advantage of having government Ministers have got an extra allocation to protect jobs but not so in Waterford." Cllr. Kyne went on to point out that in the short-time package agreed, the 200 workers involved would be drawing State benefit for 2 weeks out of 5 until the end of the year.

going on the dole because of the shortage of money."

**BRAVE DECISION**  
Stating that the decision of the Council workers to opt for short-time was a brave one as it saved jobs, Cllr. Kyne said that members should row back to that decision by being up-to-date on all aspects of Council expenditure. He also said that the people who had negotiated the short-time package, Tony Mansfield District Officer AT&GWU and Mr. Brian McNally, Co. Secretary, deserved a vote of appreciation as it was their common-sense that had kept all avenues open during the negotiations.

Cllr. S. Whelan then proposed that the Council write to the Minister for the Environment for an additional financial allocation to that they could avoid having to put the workers on short-time.

The Co. Secretary, Mr. McNally said that in regard to the position of the indoor staff, 4 of the administrative posts were not being filled while the Acting Co. Engineer, Mr. E. Mansfield said that a number of the Council Engineers were employed on a temporary basis and could be let go at the end of any month.

## Absent F.G. Cllr. Smashes F.G.-Labour Pact

What should have proved to be a routine exercise for the election of Chairman at the annual meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday saw a rather sensational turnabout when Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab.) who was generally tipped for the position found himself in a tied vote position with Fianna Fail nominee Cllr. Patsy Kenneally and lost out in the subsequent draw.

Under a pact, between the ten Fine Gael members of the Council and the two Labour members by which Cllr. James A. Walsh (F.G.) was elected to the Chair last year, a commitment was given by F.G. to support Cllr. Kyne's nomination for the position this year.

However a couple of weeks ago rumours surfaced that Cllr. Jim Hartly had declared at a local Fine Gael meeting that he was not prepared to support Cllr. Kyne but it was felt at the time that he would withdraw his objection before the Council's annual meeting and respond to appeals from his colleagues to honour the Party's commitment.

On Sunday evening it appears that Cllr. Hartly was still sticking to his guns and a good deal of "to-ing and fro-ing" which continued up to half an hour before meeting time on Monday followed when Fine Gael mem-

bers following last minute phone calls were left with the understanding that Cllr. Hartly was on his way to Dungarvan and that he would attend the meeting.

The fact of the matter was that Cllr. Hartly failed to turn up and was absent from the entire meeting. His absence left the Fine Gael-Labour group and Fianna Fail in a tied position with 11 votes each and in the subsequent draw, which was the agreed procedure, luck favoured the Fianna Fail man.

At the outset, the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. James A. Walsh (F.G.) gave a review of his year in office describing it as a very difficult one financially for the Council. As a result he said that many harsh and unpalatable decisions had to be taken and the Council had been forced to put workers on short-time which was something they all regretted. He then thanked the members of the Council, the County Manager and the senior officials for all the help and co-operation he had received during the year.

### NOMINATION

Senator Brian O'Shea (Lab.) then proposed his colleague Cllr. Kyne for the Chair pointing out that Cllr. Kyne was admirably equipped to carry out the task having had the experience of being Chairman of Dungarvan U.D.C. in 1984/85. "A very fine tradition of public service was set by his father the late Deputy Tom Kyne who was a previous Chairman of this Council and he has a great deal to live up to in this," he said.

Cllr. P. Coffey (F.G.) who seconded said that Cllr. Kyne was always forthright in what he had to say even though at times it did not suit everybody but he had given valuable service to the public since he became a member of the Council.

Cllr. S. Dunphy (F.F.) then proposed Cllr. Patsy Kenneally pointing out that he was the Council's Vice-Chairman in 1985/86. The proposal was seconded by Cllr. Paddy Cahill (F.F.).

A roll call vote was then taken and resulted as follows: For Kyne — Cllrs. Kyne and O'Shea (Lab.), and Cllrs. P. Coffey, Quceally, Carey, O. Coffey, O'Riordan, O'Halloran, McDonnell, Casey, Walsh (all F.G.) — 11. For Kenneally — Cllrs. Kenneally, Swift, J. Fahey, S. Fahey, Dunphy, Cahill, Whelan, Cunningham, Wilkinson, Quirke, O. Riain (all F.F.) — 11.

The names of both nominees were then placed in a box and the name drawn was that of Cllr. Kenneally who was then declared elected.

Cllr. Kenneally was then congratulated on his election by the outgoing Chairman who wished him well during his year in office. Cllr. Kyne then rose and having congratulated Cllr. Kenneally he remarked that "looking to those friends on my right (who are the Fine Gael members sat), I see they are hale but not hearty!" This comment was taken as a direct

reference to the absence of Cllr. Jim Hartly. Cllr. Kyne went on to say that he was not upset by the outcome of the election as he felt it was going to happen but he did find fault with the fact that one member of the Fine Gael Party had not kept the agreement which the party had entered into last year.

Cllr. Kyne then went on to say: "I don't know why Cllr. Hartly is missing to-day, whether it is that he is disillusioned with Fine Gael or with the Council or with me. However, if it is because I have spoken out against farmers who have failed to pay their health contributions and other levies I can assure Cllr. Hartly that this won't stop me and that I will continue to talk out in this matter in the future."

Stating that there was now an onus on the Fine Gael party to clarify Cllr. Hartly's position

for failing to honour an agreement entered into by the party, Cllr. Kyne declared that "no single member of the party should have been allowed to exercise a veto to keep me out of the chair."

The new Chairman was then invested with the chain of office and having thanked his party for nominating and supporting him he expressed sympathy with Cllr. Kyne. "Billy is a friend of mine and it's just the luck of the draw but beidh la eile agat" he added.

### VICE-CHAIR

On the proposal of Senator O'Shea seconded by Cllr. P. Coffey Cllr. Kyne was then proposed for the post of Vice-Chairman and declared elected unopposed.

## School Transport In Lismore Is Of "A Reasonable Standard"

In the course of a letter from the Transport Branch, Department of Education, Dublin, circulated to members of Waterford County Council at a special meeting in Dungarvan last Monday a complaint made at a previous meeting of the Council regarding school transport arrangements for children attending the CBS and Presentation Convent in Lismore who travel from Coole and Seemaicua in the Ballysaggart area and from Monamon Lyrenacalee and Shruh in the Lismore area was referred to.

Having outlined the manner in which school transport services are organised the letter stated that the case referred to above had been investigated following receipt of the complaint and the position was that the vehicles which served these areas were required to operate a number of trips. This resulted in some pupils having early morning pick-up times or having to wait some time in the evenings.

It should be noted however, the letter then stated, "that all of the children concerned are collected short distances from their homes and there is practically no walking

distance involved for any of the children to board the transport services. This is considered a reasonable standard of service in the context of the general operation of the Post-Primary transport service throughout the country in the circumstances, the existing arrangements are the most which the Department can offer these pupils."

### DISAPPOINTED

Cllr. W. McDonnell who raised the complaint in the first instance said that he was very disappointed with the Department's reply. He said that very young children were now called for before 8 o'clock in the morning and were in Lismore by 8.30 a.m. and they had to remain there until 4 o'clock in the evening. "It is wrong that children of 4, 5 and 6 years of age should have to spend so long at school," he said.

Cllr. J. Quirke agreed and stated that the time was far too long for the children to be away from home. He added that in some cases the pick-up points were so far from the children's home that they had to be driven to them.

It was agreed to ask the Dept. to reconsider the position.

CYCLING

MILK RAS: PAUL McCORMACK WINS

Dubliner Paul McCormack who had no team support, won the 1987 FBD Milk Ras which ended with the criterium stage at Dun Laoghaire last Sunday and which, during the previous eight-days, saw the cyclists complete a circuit of Ireland which included a stage which passed through Lismore, Cappoquin and Dungarvan on Friday.
While the young Dungarvan cyclist, Stephen Spratt who won the Ras last year did not figure in the final general classification, he proved his great strength as a cyclist by winning all the mountain stages winding up as overall King of the Mountains with 44 pts. His American pal, Greg Oravetz who was second, 5 pts. behind had the added satisfaction of being the Overall Points Winner with 67 points.
The Tipperary Yoplat team of which both were members looked invincible for the greater part of the Ras but in the end dropped from first to third in the team contest.
Essentially the Ras was turned on its head during the Thursday stage when Spratt scored a magnificent solo victory into Malloy and the top three overall and many other contenders lost out by the tactics observed.

FOOD POISONING
It was after this stage that three of the Yoplat riders, Spratt, Oravetz and Stephen Delaney contacted what appeared to be food poisoning but Spratt and Oravetz managed to overcome this major set-back and on Sunday morning Spratt displayed true grit when he went out and won the mountain time trial to hold on to the Mountains classification. He did it in style winning the grind from Ashford in Co. Wicklow up to the Devil's Glen in 9 minutes 33 seconds, but his team mate Oravetz showed equal courage finishing second only two seconds behind.
For the record Greg Oravetz had the satisfaction of winning the opening stage of the Ras on the previous Saturday when he was first home in the opening leg from Dublin to Killeshandra and again registered a win in the Buncrana stage on Monday.
Another very promising young Dungarvan cyclist, Ger Wyley also participated in the Ras and in his first major stage race acquitted himself admirably, gaining an immense amount of experience which is bound to stand him in good stead in future outings.

I.F.A. CALL FOR PLAN TO FOLLOW GOODMAN EXPANSION

The IFA has reiterated its call for Government support for an expansion of the national beef-cow herd following the Goodman International expansion plan.
The availability of the raw material is a basic pre-requisite of the proposed expansion of the meat processing industry, according to the Association's Livestock committee chairman, Tim Boland.
"Unfortunately, this fundamental truth is in danger of being ignored by the Government," he said.
Mr. Boland called on the Minister to establish a target to increase the national beef cow herd by a minimum of 150,000 over the next three years and put in place the financial incentives necessary.
The measures necessary include a low interest finance scheme on a simplified basis for extra cows. In disadvantaged areas it would be allowed to borrow up to £500 per extra beef cow kept with a moratorium on payments for up to two years. This should be made available at 6%.
"This scheme would enable farmers in an area where the average herd size is 6.7 cows and where cash flow is not adequate, to expand their herd size," he said.
"In non-disadvantaged areas where there are currently 125,000 beef cow herds, there is now tremendous potential for expansion in the light of cut-backs in dairying and tillage.
"The Minister should endeavour to make available to farmers a payment similar to the beef cow retention premium which is 100% redeemable from Brussels. Similarly, he should make low-interest type loans also available."
Mr. Boland stressed the need to also make these loans available to dairy farmers wishing to keep extra beef cows above their 1986 cow level. He added that the essence of this particular low interest finance scheme must be simplicity and a simple form — once approved by ACOF and the Department of Agriculture, the applicant should be included in the scheme.

# Dungarvan Gang On Crime Rampage

A gang of five youths including one juvenile went on a rampage of burglaries, larcenies, receiving stolen goods and malicious damage in and around Dungarvan in a six weeks period from May 4 to June 7. Four of them wound up at Dungarvan Court last week where they were convicted and sentenced to periods of detention ranging from six to twelve months; the fifth had previously been brought before a sitting of the District Court in Cork and put on remand. All pleaded guilty to the litany of charges preferred against them.

Supt. M. English told the Court that the gang, in the course of the rampage, visited a number of premises consistently over the period and their aim was mainly to steal drink such as crates of lager and cider in all about £1,600 worth of goods and cash were stolen, of which only £400 was recovered, while they were also responsible for a considerable amount of damage. In regard to the latter the Superintendent said that the worst feature of this was the damage they had done to shrubs, trees and ornamental flower pots which they tore up and destroyed on their way home at night.

### SAME STORY

The next defendant, charged was Timmy Keohan (20), 1 Fenian Place, Abbeyside and in this case, Det. Garda John Molloy gave evidence of arresting and charging the defendant who pleaded guilty.

Supt. English said that this defendant was another member of the group and the story was the same as in the previous case. Again while the defendant was involved in robbing money and beer, the worst feature was the damage they did to the shrubs and flowers on their way home at night.

Mr. King who also appeared for this defendant said that he had acted in concert with the others. He had not been in trouble before and was prepared to give an undertaking not to get into trouble again.

District Justice O'Connell convicted on all charges; six months detention on each charge, sentences to run concurrently.

**AGAIN THE SAME STORY**  
Michael Keohan (17) brother of the previous defendant was next charged and Det./Gda. E.

O'Sullivan and Gda. T. Murphy gave evidence of arrest and of charging the defendant. He also pleaded guilty. Supt. English said that again the story in this instance was the same and again he said that the worst feature of the matter was that these young hooligans could not go home at night without interfering and rooting up the shrubs and flowers that have been placed around the town.

Mr. King who also appeared in this case said that the defendant was unemployed and unable to get a job.

District Justice O'Connell convicted and sentenced the defendant to 6 months detention on each of the charges, the sentences to run concurrently. "There is absolutely no excuse for any of them. They are all now young criminals but if they are not taken in hand they will then become adult criminals," he said.

The 16 1/2 year old juvenile involved with the others was dealt with at a sitting of the Children's Court held in Chambers and he was also sentenced to 6 months detention on each of the charges preferred against him, the sentences to be concurrent.

Recognisances in the event of an appeal were fixed in all the cases.

## Complete Conflict Of Evidence In Unusual Fishery Case

At the conclusion of evidence in a case at Dungarvan Court in which four cousins took out a private prosecution against two others alleging illegal fishing on the Colligan river on May 3 last, District Justice W. F. O'Connell said he had never before encountered such irreconcilable evidence in a case.

Complainants in the civil action were Martin O'Riordan, 88 Childers Estate, Dungarvan; Garvan and John O'Riordan, 19 Shandon, Dungarvan; and Martin Anthony O'Riordan, 34 Caseville, Dungarvan, all of whom alleged that Arthur Daly 1 St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan, and John Paul Whelan 45 Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, kept a fixed monofilament net across the river Colligan at Ballinamuck on May 3.

Martin O'Riordan told the court that he was trout fishing on the river around 9.30 p.m. on that date when he saw Daly and Whelan stretch a monofilament net right across the river from one bank to the other. They also tied a bag of stones to the net and began "beating" the river at either side of the net to drive the fish into it.

The other three complainants corroborated the evidence of the previous witnesses. The defendants however categorically denied the allegation and would come into court with a fabricated story. One was that he and Whelan were members of the local Freshwater Anglers Club, and another was jealousy. He admitted

and insisted they were fishing only with a rod and line. Daly said there were a number of reasons why the O'Riordans had been banned from fishing for three years on the river in 1984 by the District Court.

"The O'Riordans however have given a made-up story to vent their feelings about me," Daly added.

John Paul Whelan said the O'Riordans thought they owned the river Colligan and resented him and Daly fishing on it.

**SOME DOUBT**  
District Justice O'Connell said that given the complete conflict of evidence he must have some doubt about what happened that night on the river. He dismissed the case against Daly and Whelan but refused to give costs to them. Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal.

The Superintendent went on to say that the defendant had a number of previous convictions against him and had served a few periods of detention. It was only last April that he had been sentenced to 4 months here in Dungarvan but it was decided not to issue the warrant until "So to all intents and purposes," said the Superintendent, "he was on bail when he became involved in this latest list of charges."

Mr. E. P. King, Solr. (J. F. Williams & Co.), who defended said that O'Riordan was not yet 20 and was unemployed. He had said Mr. King acted in concert with the other defendants in the commission of these crimes were fixed in the event of an appeal.

**REA WANTS MAJOR INITIATIVE ON FARM TALKS**

IFA President Joe Rea has accused the EEC Council of Agriculture Ministers of a collective derogation of responsibility following their failure to agree a farm price package. He said this will lead to further and deeper cuts in farmers' incomes. The EEC Commission will take advantage of this failure to implement the negative aspects of the proposed package.

The planned price cuts and the failure to get full devaluation of the Irish Green Pound along with the already £25m. loss by farmers will have a detrimental effect on incomes. Mr. Rea called on the Government to launch a "significant European initiative involving the Minister for Agriculture and the Taoiseach aimed at getting the Agriculture Ministers back to the negotiation table."

He warned against heads of government taking responsibility for fixing farm prices. It would create a dangerous precedent which in future years could be exploited by Member States wishing to reduce the importance of the CAP.

"Having not more than a month ago said yes to the European Community, we must now resolve to play the fullest possible role in making the community work for all its members, both large and small," he said.

The Irish Water Safety Association advises that persons using small boats should be prepared for emergencies before they leave shore and recommends the following:  
1. Ensure the craft is seaworthy.  
2. Know how to swim.  
3. All passengers should WEAR a lifejacket.  
4. Carry emergency equipment suitable to the craft.  
5. If capsized, stay with the craft until help arrives unless the shore is very near.  
6. Alcohol and boating should not be mixed.  
7. Leave a message with some reliable person saying where you are going, who is with you and when you intend to return.



# Senior Football Championship Still Wide Open

**NEXT WEEK-END**  
With the senior football championship still wide-open, as twelve teams playing on Sunday next, have everything to play for. In fact a careful study of the form book and the points table show that after this series of matches, the sorting-out process may not have been completed. As I read the form book at the moment, it is possible to lose two matches and still be there at the finish.

This situation makes next Sunday's six match programme very interesting. Only one of the twelve teams playing Rathgormack has lost more than one match so far.  
The success of the County senior football team in the early part of the Munster championships meant a rearrangement of our club championship with the result that this competition is now running behind schedule and the County fixtures committee are faced with a few problems if they are to finish on time. Seamus Grant told me over the weekend that it will finish on the date originally planned. The long-range forecasters have already listed the present champions, Kilrossanty, Stradbally, Ferrysbank and Clashmore, as being the clubs likely to fight out the finish on the last Sunday in August, but come next Sunday night, some of these opinions may be changed. It's all very interesting.

Since the introduction of the league system into the senior championships over the past few years, the divisional championships have taken a back seat as far as publicity is concerned and complaints have been made recently about the situation which has worsened this year with the inclusion of the senior football in the league system. I must also point out however, that the introduction of the same system into practically all the divisional competitions, hasn't helped the publicity angle. We are now so smothered in field activity that it is becoming more and more difficult to excite public interest in our games, regardless of how much is written about them. I would also like to say that lack of publicity is not responsible for the poor performance at the vast majority of our championship matches. Because of the fact that our club championship matches have quadrupled (at least) over the past few years, supporters are now just coming along for the games in which their own clubs are involved, except for the semi-finals and finals. Time and money are relevant factors, as well.

**DUNGARVAN v. BALLYGUNNER**  
This is the only senior hurling game listed for the weekend and unless there is a complete reversal of form, Ballygunner should continue with their unbeaten run and almost assure themselves of a place in the concluding stages. In this section it will be a race between Mount Sion, Portlaoise and Ballygunner and two will go forward to the semi-final stages. Dungarvan have lost three games and are now out of the running and the only benefit that would accrue to them if they win is that they would avoid the possibility of relegation.

**NIRE v. KILMACTHOMAS**  
Both sides have won and lost a game so far and this makes it a vital game for both sides when they clash in the opener at Fraher field on Sunday. Defeat could signal the end of the road as far as the present championship hopes are concerned. In this section it will be a race between Mount Sion, Portlaoise and Ballygunner and two will go forward to the semi-final stages. Dungarvan have lost three games and are now out of the running and the only benefit that would accrue to them if they win is that they would avoid the possibility of relegation.

**KILMACTHOMAS v. CLASHMORE**  
Kilmaclomas who flopped in the County final last year, were surprised by Ferrysbank in the remarkable improvement and a return to form when beating Tramore by nine points in their second game. The men who took them to the final last year are again beginning to shine for Kilmac and the likes of Fintan O'Brien, John Whelan, Derry Kiely, Peter Coughlan, Jim Burke, M. Hallahan and company get going they can be a very difficult side to beat. The Guirys, Richard, Sean and Michael, with Michael Ryan, P. J. Murphy, P. Walsh, etc. will all try hard to show that their rather unexpected win over Rathgormack lately was no fluke and will make Kilmac fight all the way. However, Kilmac must be given the vote to win.

**CLASHMORE v. BUTLERSTOWN**  
Clashmore have two good victories to their credit and will obviously expect to do well here if they are still without the players who were not available against Ballinacourty. I can imagine them being in a spot of trouble as Butlerstown who lost by six points to Kilrossanty in their first game played very well against Dunhill when they beat by three points in their next match. This is pretty good form and could be good enough to beat Clashmore. With some very lively players including Michael McGrath, Tom Leonard, Pat Daniels, The Crowleys, M. Power, D. Mahon and a few others they should be good enough to carry them through and leave them level on points with Clashmore. As of now six of the seven clubs in this section are still well in contention and it will take a couple of rounds more before the sort-out is done.

**BALLINAMEELA v. KILROSSANTY**  
Ballinameela played poorly when losing by 0-9 to 0-3 against

Clashmore in the first round, but showed fair improvement when drawing with Ferrysbank in the senior league two weeks ago. In the replay they were beaten by a goal, but showed further improvement on their championship form. However, I cannot make a case for their beating the County champions, Kilrossanty who are in great shape just now and look to be on course for their third in a row. In their first match this season they had wins against Brickeys and Butlerstown. The latter team kept well in touch all the way but there was no doubting the ability of the champions, who eventually won deservedly. With Pierre White, Jim Maher, Pat Keating, Pat Quinn, Pat Hayes, Tom Behan of the County team included on their team, they are very unlikely to be shocked.

**FERRYSBANK v. STRADBALLY**  
Given a choice, everyone would name this game as the match of the day and I can see a tremendous crowd at Kilmaclomas on Sunday night for this exciting clash. Ferrysbank who contested the County final about three years ago are in splendid trim and have won both their matches so far. They beat Kilmaclomas in their first match and defeated Dungarvan by a single point in the second. Stradbally because of their heavy involvement with the County team, have played only one game and in that match they beat the Nire by seven points. They have a new-look side in action this year and on their last and only outing so far they held for the first time in almost a decade without a Coffey or Aheane on the team.

Like Kilrossanty they have many County players including, Pat Curran, Kieran Heffernan, Eoin O'Brien, David Kirwin and with Fintan O'Brien, Aisling Curran, Paul Mullaney, Nicholas Connors, Noel Weldon, etc., they may just about win, but they can have no reason to be very confident as this is one of the stiffest tasks to be faced by them in this entire championship.

**BALLINACOURTY v. DUNHILL**  
When a club is involved in both senior hurling and football, the rhythm of their progress is certain to be broken and this seems to be affecting both Dunhill and Dungarvan who are the only two so involved. Dunhill beat the Brickeys narrowly in their first game and were then beaten by Butlerstown in their next match, having played hurling in between. It is an important game for both as each side has lost a game so far and being four points down will put the loser in a trouble spot.

Ballinacourty had the unusual experience of scoring fifteen points and being beaten in their first and only game so far. They squandered too many fine scoring chances in the game at Ardmore and cannot afford to do this again. Their display in that game was good, but they really didn't start playing until well into the second half. If they hit form early in the game at the Stradbally venue on Sunday they may get their best two points. They will have Willie Kiely, Brian O'Gorman, Donal Looby, Ger Collins, Michael Collins, Conor Clancy, Gerry O'Connor, John Mulligan, Michael O'Riordan, Joe O'Riordan, Bosco O'Mahony, Ray Maloney, Mce. Foley, Seamus Power, Jimmy Healy, Timmy Organ, etc., to select from.

**TRAMORE v. RATHGORMACK**  
Rathgormack with an outside coach preparing them for the championship, had a disappointing start with two narrow defeats. Kilmac set them back two points when they beat them by 1-11 to 2-6 and then two further league points were lost when the Nire beat them 0-8 to 1-4 two weeks ago. Tramore's form is also a disappointment to their followers as having defeated Dungarvan by a single point they went on to get a bad beating from Kilmaclomas. If Rathgormack

lose here then they are out of the championship and if they win, it is possible that both themselves and Tramore are out. Tramore have got to win this one and on the basis of their form to date, I cannot fancy their chances of winning. This is one that could end in a draw, and this also would be of no benefit to either side.

**OTHER GAMES**  
On the divisional front, the clash between An Rinn and Shamrocks at the Cappoquin venue on Saturday evening, is the one likely to arouse most interest. This should provide us with one of the best intermediate football games of the present season and the winners must be hotly fancied to go the distance. An Rinn recently showed a return to their best form when beating Affane and will fancy their chances here in spite of the presence of Dan Casey and Liam Dalton on the Knockmore team. I think that Shamrocks will win.

**TALLOW v. BALLYDUFF**  
Not as attractive as the game going on at nearby Cappoquin on the same evening, the above neighbours will have things to themselves here in Lismore. Ballyduff are favourites and it will be a big surprise if they don't win.

## SUSPENDED PRISON SENTENCE FOR UTTERING FORGED CHEQUES

A 32-year-old Dungarvan woman, who obtained goods and cash totalling £1,062 by uttering forged cheques in business premises in a number of centres, was given a suspended prison sentence by District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court.

Mrs. Philomena Coleman, 64 Childers Estate, Dungarvan, pleaded guilty to a series of charges of obtaining goods and cash during the months of April and May in stores and supermarkets in Dungarvan, Waterford City, Cork City, Clonmel and Kilkenny by issuing the forged cheques.

Supt. M. English told the court that Mrs. Coleman was given the stolen cheques by a friend and she then proceeded to "take to the road" with them. She had no previous convictions.

## DISTRAUGHT

Mr. Eamonn P. King Solr. (J. F. Williams & Co.), said Mrs. Coleman was distraught following a tragedy in which the man she had been living with was drowned. She was looking after her twelve-year-old daughter and was living on £41 a week and succumbed to the temptation. She had an exemplary record up to this but given her circumstances the question of paying compensation would be very difficult.

Having considered the case over the luncheon recess District Justice O'Connell sentenced the defendant to four months imprisonment on each charge, the sentences to run concurrently. However he suspended the sentences on Mrs. Coleman undertaking to pay a total of £85 towards compensation to the various injured parties by September 23. "I am doing this because her circumstances are so bad," the Justice added.
