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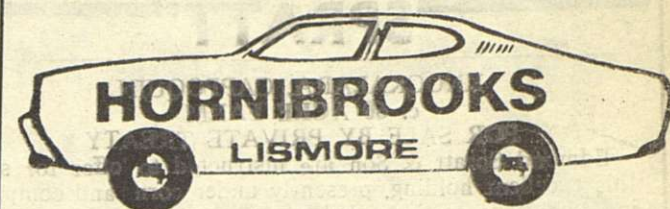
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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### GOVERNMENT IN EXILE

An editorial in a recent issue of "The Irish Law Times" was anything but complimentary to our parliamentary system. It says that the "appalling performance" of the Dail over the past ten years is a reflection on all the political parties.

Compared with Britain, the editorial says that the inactivity of the Dail is inexcusable. Last year, it conceded, the amount of legislation put through the Dail showed an increase but compared with Britain it was a pitiful performance. In the ten years to 1986, the Dail never once came near to equalling the output from Westminster.

In 1983, an election year in Britain, the incoming government extended its sitting by five weeks. Similarly, this year following another general election, the post-election session was extended until July 24.

The Dail rose for its summer recess on June 26 and is not due to resume until October. There can be little doubt about the truth in the statement that the last decade had exposed the Dail "as one of the laziest, most inefficient and top-heavy legislative institutions in Western Europe." That statement has been made by a sitting member of "the House," Deputy Michael McDowell of the Progressive Democrats.

"The Irish Law Times" asked whose interests were the Government serving by availing of a four-month summer recess. The Dail Deputies all make a big carry-on about being always "about the business of their constituents" even during these periods of recess. They have got away with this load of rubbish for too long and they must now be seen for what they really are, members of "one of the laziest, most inefficient and top heavy legislative institutions in Western Europe."

The Law Times editorial added: "Our Dail should be sitting over the summer engaging in a proper programme of legislative reform. Instead we are getting cuts and more cuts from our Government almost in exile."

And we must add ourselves, the query, why the Dail does not, in the context of these financial cutbacks, take a long hard look at itself and perhaps start some cut backs in this top heavy legislative assembly. It certainly would find it very difficult to win a verdict on a charge that for the return they are making they are not worth

### all the money the country has to pay them.

### EQUESTRIAN SUPREME

It is with pride that we extend our warmest and heartiest congratulations to Captain John Ledingham who proved himself an equestrian supreme at last week's Horse Show at the RDS Grounds, Dublin.

On Wednesday he participated in one of the most exciting Shell Puissance competitions ever seen at the Ballsbridge show. Out of the eleven horses which took part in the first round, six got into the jump-off over the red and white wall which had grown to the almost incredible height of 7 ft. 3 ins.

Britain's Nick Skelton went first on the Hickstead Derby winner "Raffles Apollo," and went clear. He was then followed by Captain Ledingham riding the Army horse Kilcoltrim. We held our breaths in our fists and our hearts missed a beat as he moved in toward the awesome jump but cheers—with a magnificent jump, he also cleared the wall.

Then the other Irish rider Kieran Rooney of Tipperary riding "Hyland Serpent" also jumped clear. The final result was a 3-way divide with the two Irish riders and Nick Skelton sharing the prize money of more than £5,000 "having provided Irish showjumping fans with one of the best spectacles ever seen in Ballsbridge."

That was on the Wednesday; however the show was far from over for the young Irish Army rider for the piece de resistance was to come on Friday with the Bank of Ireland Nations Cup event for the prestigious Aga Khan Trophy. Need we say anymore that with superb skill and brilliant horsemanship the young Irish team regained the trophy against all the odds.

It was Capt. Ledingham, this time riding "Gabhran" who was to inspire his side when he set the marvellous example of going clear in the first round being the first of the Irish riders to go. When the first French rider had gone clear in the second round it was really put up to Ireland and the young Capt. Ledingham, calling on all his experience and expertise, more than met the challenge, going clear and inspiring team mate Jack Doyle to do likewise—that put it in the bag for Ireland!

The other members of the victorious Irish team who were taking the coveted trophy for the 15th time were Eddie

## WEEK OF PRAYER AT MELLERAY GROTTTO

To mark the second anniversary of the reported apparitions and messages of Our Blessed Lady at Melleray Grotto a week of prayer and thanksgiving will be held at the grotto from August 16th to the 23rd.

Organised by the local Melleray Grotto Committee, thousands are expected to visit Melleray throughout the week. Already a 200-strong group from Belfast have intimated that they will be attending. They will be arriving on the Saturday night, August 15th for an all-night grotto vigil which commences at midnight until 12 noon on the Sunday.

People from all over Ireland are expected in Melleray during the week while coach loads from England and Scotland will also be coming.

The week of prayer will officially begin at 2 p.m. on Sunday the 16th with the reading of the theme of the day—"My Message Is Peace And Prayer."

At hourly intervals there will be five minutes of complete silence and stillness so that people can meditate and open their hearts to Our Lady and to God.

Prayers, rosaries and hymns will continue until 6 p.m. on the 16th and groups are invited to lead in reciting decades of the rosary.

At 8 o'clock rosaries and hymns will re-commence, and at 8.30 a formal welcome will be extended to everyone.

Between Monday 17th and Saturday 22nd rosaries will be recited and hymns will be sung from 3 to 6 p.m. and from 8 p.m. onwards. It is hoped that a number of choirs will be in attendance.

The following are the themes to be prayed for each day throughout the week-long celebrations: Sunday, August 16—"Justice In The World"; Thursday, August 20—"Youth Of The World"; Friday, August 21—"The Sick And The Suffering"; Saturday, August 22—"The Holy Souls"; Sunday, August 23—"Thanksgiving."

The organising committee recommends that during the week of the celebrations people would attend Mass frequently and that they would also consider undertaking a 24-hour fast.

On each afternoon during the week the video of the apparitions and messages of Our Blessed Lady at the Melleray Grotto will be shown in the local hall near the entrance to Mount Melleray Abbey.

### YOUTH PRAYER GROUP

Every Thursday evening from 8.30 to 9.30 and each Sunday afternoon from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. young people gather at the Grotto at the invitation of a "Youth Grotto Prayer Group" for prayers and hymns. All young people are welcome on these occasions and particularly those who play guitars.

### OTHER PRAYERS

On a year-round basis prayer groups, embodying people of all ages, gather at the grotto nightly from 8.30 onwards and also on Sunday afternoons from 2 o'clock onwards.

## Sean De Paor's Exhibition Of Water Colours

Dungarvan artist, Sean de Paor mounted his third annual one-man exhibition of water colours at the Ormond Hotel, Dungarvan this week and it was officially opened on Monday night by Padraig O Cuirrin.

Consul-General of Ireland in Boston, Mr. O Cuirrin, a native of the Ring Gaeltacht, was accompanied by his wife Johanna.

The exhibition contains 44 works, including five in oils and prices ranged from £25 for a water colour of a scene near Killarney to £160 for a study in oil entitled "Patience". Addressing the very large

crowd present, at the opening, Mr. O Cuirrin recalled that before retiring from the teaching profession, Sean de Paor had taught at Scoil Naistimta na Rinne for many years. He said that Sean's work which epitomised local scenes showed his great love for the locality in which he lived.

Palliser, who was born and reared at Comeragh House, Kil-

rossanty, explored and surveyed much of the lands which make up Alberta, Saskatchewan and Central Canada. The wheat-growing belt of Canada is still known as Palliser's Triangle.

Also at the ceremony on Sunday will be Prof. Irene Spry of Ottawa University, who has made a life-long study of the life and times of John Palliser. John Palliser died at Comeragh House and is buried at Comeragh Churchyard.

A full programme is prepared for the day which includes traditional song, music and dance from Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann and also music from Dungarvan Brass Band. Time 2.45 at Comeragh House.

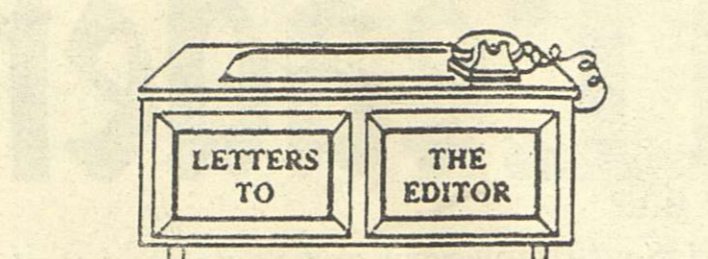

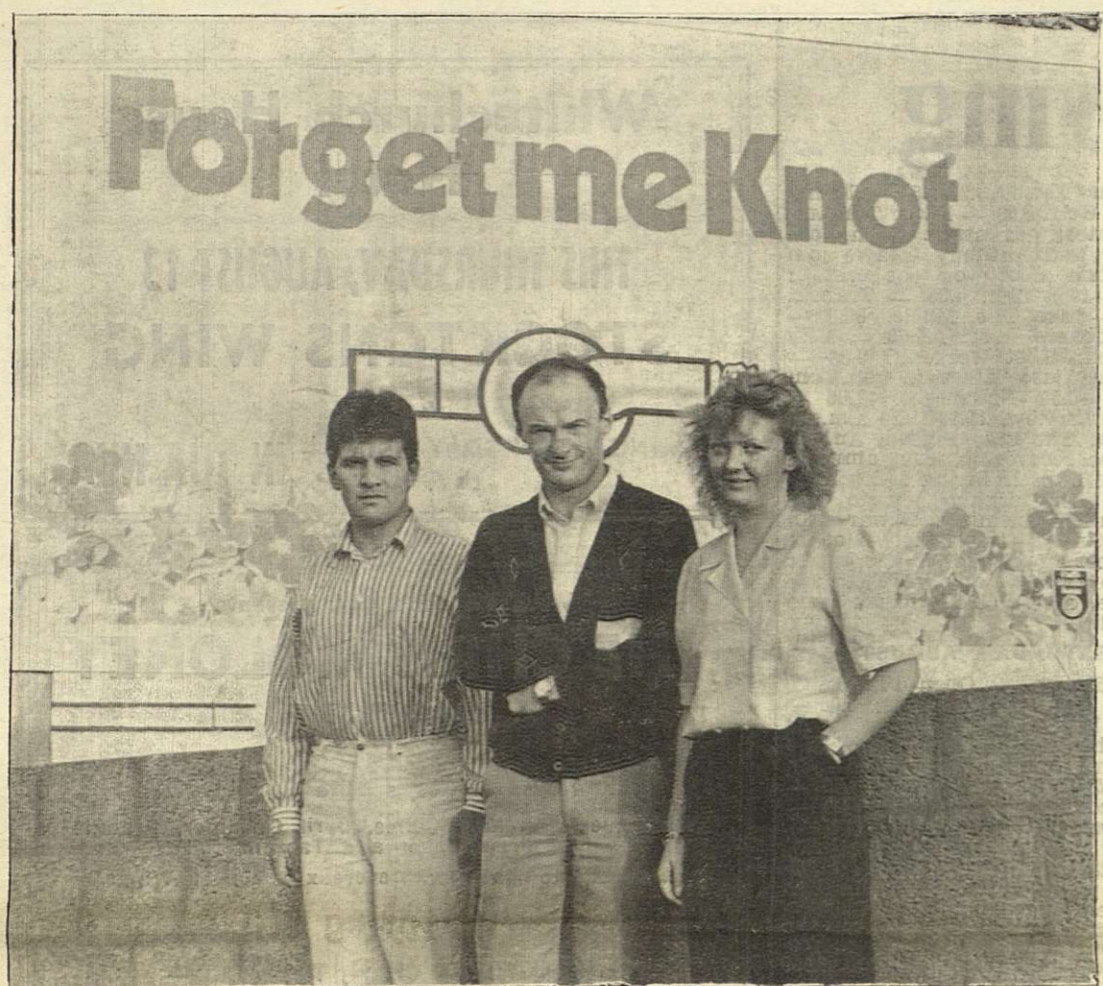
# IDA Backed Firms Created 1,700 Jobs In 1986

According to the Annual IDA Report for 1986, 1,706 first time jobs were created in IDA backed companies in the South East region during the year compared with 1,280 in 1985. This proved to be the first net gain in job creation since 1980 and was the best performance of any region in the country.

During 1986 the IDA South East Regional Office paid out £1.8 million in grants to small industries and in the first six months of this year £1 million has been paid.

The report adds: "We are extremely confident of the progress in small industry development in that this year the sector will contribute over 300 first time jobs or 10 per cent of the national total."

## Junior Chamber To Promote "No Smoking" Campaign

This year the Junior Chamber Dungarvan's major emphasis programme is entitled "No Smoking Please". The aim of this community awareness programme is to highlight the dangers to health caused by smoking and to offer assistance to smokers who wish to "kick the habit".

In Ireland it is estimated that 2,500 die prematurely every year because of smoking. Further the Department of Health estimates that 5,000 deaths each year from coronary heart disease, cerebrovascular disease and lung cancer are directly attributed to smoking.

approved assistance by the Regional Small Industries Board. By the end of the year ten were in production employing 27 people.

## WATERFORD CITY AND COUNTY

Manufacturing industry in the city and county continued to perform well with a net increase of 119 in employment. Waterford city, in particular, has developed into one of the most modern industrial centres in the country with a solid base of indigenous companies allied to a large number of advanced rapidly expanding overseas industries.

Garrett Ireland Ltd. completed a 50,000 sq. ft. extension to its existing factory and increased the labour force by 15 to over 130. In addition Garrett Turbine Engine Company established a new manufacturing facility in a 60,000 sq. ft. building on the Industrial Estate. This is a £17 million investment in a forging plant which will produce critical components for turbine engines using the most advanced technology. Twenty four of the projected 110 jobs associated with this project were in place by the year end.

Other Companies increasing employment were Bausch & Lomb in Waterford, Dawn Meats at Carralls Cross and M. D. O'Connor Son & Co. in Cappoquin.

At Dungarvan Sterling Drug commenced construction of an 85,000 sq. ft. factory. The £12.5 million project will manufacture solid dosage pharmaceuticals and will employ 150 people in the first two years of operation. This company will have its official opening in October of this year and by the end of the year will employ 75 people.

Under Technology Transfer one significant agreement was entered into during the year between Waterford Co-op and a leading Dutch manufacturer of Cheese, Wessanen, to establish a \$6.5 million Continental Cheese plant at Kilmeaden. This investment is one of the first ventures by an Irish Co-op into Cheeses as an alternative to producing intervention products.

Job losses were recorded with the closure of Triplex, Collins Bros. and O'Reilly's Natural Irish Foods.

Towards the year end work was completed on the new Food Centre on the Waterford Estate comprising of 43,000 sq. ft. divided into three units and constructed to the highest standards to comply with EEC and Department of Agriculture standards. Already two of these units have been occupied by Mrs. McCarthy Foods producing meat pies and Dulse Foods which produce frozen onions for the meat trade. This is the first IDA project of its kind in the country and all space is now reserved for incoming projects and we will be seeking to expand the facility with the addition of a food laboratory kitchen and freezing facilities.

### ABBEYSIDE V. KILGOBINET

Many readers who have seen great Abbeyside teams down through the years will find it difficult to appreciate that in this match they will line out as the underdogs in a game against Kilgobinet in the adult grade. section of the report be rejected. Denis McCarthy proposed that a small nominal fine be imposed. Nicholas Mac Craith proposed that an investigation into the second part of the report be held. S. O'Brien proposed that no penalty be applied, but that the club be asked to note the referee's comments.

Having discussed the matter at great length the chairman agreed to accept a proposition that no action be taken and this ended the discussion.

The game in question was a minor hurling semi-final between Lismore and Dungarvan and was described by Pá Meehan as a very tame affair.

Brian McSwenney, Fahá, and Liam Beresford, Emmetts who both sent off in the junior football game involving the above clubs will be suspended when the referee's report is clarified in regard to the sending-off. The Board gave the chairman and secretary the right to determine the term of suspension.

MONTHLY WEATHER BULLETIN

JULY WAS BEST SUMMER MONTH SINCE 1984

You'd better believe it: last month was the best summer month since 1984. It's official because it is recorded in the weather bulletin for July issued by the Meteorological Service.

The report states: Although it was not a spectacularly good month, this July proved the best summer month since 1984. It was notable for two very fine spells: during the first eight days of the month and from the 20th to the 24th.

Both maximum and minimum air temperatures were above normal. Maximum air temperatures for the month ranged from 20.1°C at Kilkenny and Shannon Airport to 16.7°C at Malin Head and Belmullet.

Dry spells but some heavy rain. Monthly totals ranged from 121.8mm at Malin Head (152% of normal) to 15.5mm at Rosslare (26% of normal).

HAIL AND THUNDER Hail was reported at Kilkenny on Thursday the 16th and thunder was reported on 10th and on 16th/17th.

SUNSHINE Totals varied from 70.2 hours at Claremorris to 194.6 hours at Rosslare. In west Ulster and north Connaught, many areas had less than 65% of normal sunshine while near the east, south and southern coasts totals were normal or just above.

WINDS Windiest days were the 19th, 26th, 27th and the 31st. Highest gust of the month was the 49 knots recorded at Malin Head on the 31st.

FOG Although fog was reported on over half the days of the month it was very scattered and usually light. It was most widespread on the 5th, 10th and 23rd.
