

## Committees Of Agriculture The eight members of the Co. Going Or Gone?

Waterford Committee of Agri-culture who turned up for the Committee's December monthly meeting at the ACOT Office in Dungaryan last Monday were not quite sure whether the Committee had been or was about to be abolished.

At the outset the Chairman Cllr. W. McDonnell, said that it looked very like they were attending the Committee's last

"Not only has he said that the Committees are to be abolished," said the Chairman "but he also cast a slur on us by saying that we are only talking shops. I refute that and say that the Committees throughout Ireland have done an impresse amount of good for for

snops. I refute that and say that the Committees throughout Ireland have done an immense amount of good for farmers and were the leading bodies to stand by farmers. The Cllr. McDonnell in conclusion and "in case this is our last meeting," then extended Christmas greetings to the members, officials and press.

Committees will be a big loss to farmers and I am shocked by the proposal to abolish them."

Clir. T. Cunningham said that while he was surprised at the proposal the powers of the Committees had been diminished for a number of years and for the past three years the writing had been on the wall.
