

REMEMBERING OTHER DAYS



In deference to a request from Abbeyside Pattern Committee we devote our "Remembering Other Days" corner this week to recalling the great tragedy of the 3-masted schooner "Moresby" of Liverpool (pictured above) which foundered in Dungarvan Bay off Ballinacourty Point on Christmas Eve. December 24, 1895. She became a total wreck with nineteen of the crew being lost and only five saved.

In 1899 Dungarvan Urban Council, being the Harbour Authority, marked the wreck with a fixed white light placed on a green painted Wighan Buoy. This buoy marked the wreck until 1812 in which year it was blown up and sold for scrap. The buoy was beached and in 1930 it was reconditioned and put back into service until August 1954 when it broke from its moorings in a gale and was brought into the Causeway where it lay until recently.

The Abbeyside Pattern Committee now plan to recondition the buoy once more and to erect it as a memorial to those who died in the wreck and as a tribute to the bravery of the gallant Dungarvan Lifeboat crew who braved the storm in an attempt to save more lives.
