Defeat For 'Seconds' In Cork Cup

Dungarvan 6, Kinsale 14
At Dungarvan on Sunday last the 2nd team were defeated by Kinsale in the Cork Cup. This was a hard and typical cup game in which the forwards

dominated and Kinsale emerged winners, having proved they were superior.
Dungarvan, playing with the wind in the first half, were pressuring the opposition but their only reward in this period was one penalty to lead by 3 points to nil at half time. Much as Dungarvan tried in the first half, they were held at bay by a resolute Kinsale defence.

In the second half it was Kinsale's turn to put on the pressure and Dungarvan began the half by defending well and absorbing whatever Kinsale threw at them. In one of their rare incursions into the Kinsale 22 they were awarded a penalty which Paul Mullane converted to put Dungarvan 6-0 ahead.
However, Kinsale were gaining the upper hand in the forwards and their pressure was rewarded with a try. Dungarvan were at this stage being outplayed in the set scrums and rucks and were defending desperately. Inevitably the Kinsale pressure told and in the closing minutes they scored two tries and one convert to leave the final score Kinsale 14, Dungarvan 6.
