



He said that the stuation was still not clear at that time but understood that the new date for Kevin's trial had been fixed for May 27. 



A. — Your wife will qualify for a travel pass in her cwn right when she reaches age 66. In the meantime she can travel free only when accompanying

free only when accompanying you. As a retired civil servant you will not be getting a social wel-fare old age pension and there-fore you will not automatically get a travel card. Insteal you will have to apply for one. You will get the application form from your post office and you should apply for the card one month before you reach 66.

GOVERNMENT NOT SERIOUS ABOUT COMPLETING WATERFORD REGIONAL HOSPITAL

ford said:

"Looking at the South-East-ern Health Board region and in particular the new regional hos-pital which is under construction at Ardkeen, I am very con-cerned about whether this Government are serious about con-tinuing that project. I asked the Minister of State the same ques-tion before the recess at Easter and he said it was a matter for another day. Let me give some figures which illustrate why I am concerned. In 1984 we were am concerned. In 1984 we were informed by the then Minister for Health. Deputy Desmond. who gave the go ahead for this hospital, that the hospital would cost £40 million to con-struct. It would cost a further £10 million to equip and would cost a further £26 million per year to staff and run year to staff and run.

"Let us examine the South-Eastern Health Board budget as it is. The budget for general hospitals in the South-Eastern Health Board region in 1987 was £34 million. That has been re-duced to £31.5 million in 1988. 




