PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

NATIONAL LOTTERY FUNDS

In a recent issue of the "Leader" it was reported that the Minister for the Environment—Mr. Padraig Flynn, T.D. had informed Deputy Jackie Fahey that under the new scheme of Amenity Grants financed from the National Lottery surplus a number of projects in Co. Waterford had been approved for grants.

Six schemes were then listed and among them were two which were to receive grants of £10,000 each as follows: for seating and planting at Lismore Tennis Courts and for seating and planting at Cappoquin Tennis Club.

The publication of the report in the "Leader" prompted Mrs. Mary Morrissey, Chairwoman of Lismore Town Commissioners at a subsequent meeting of the Commissioners to say that they were not aware of any Tennis Club in Lismore and that they would like to know what committee in the town would receive the £10,000 mentioned.

It has since been brought to our notice that there is no Tennis Club either in Cappoquin and a similar query as to what organisation is to get the grants there has been made.

The allocation of these National Lottery funds has given rise to a great deal of dissatisfaction countrywide. While we accept that one of the principal reasons for the setting up of the Lottery was to assist and develop sporting amenities, the manner in which the money is dispensed must be condemned.

In the course of a reply to a Dail Question on the subject on April 26, the Minister for Finance, Mr. MacSharry told Deputy D. Creed that the allocation of national lottery funds to different spending areas was decided by the Government and that spending Ministers were responsible for the selection of individual projects within their own areas.

This procedure has very rightly given rise to a great deal of criticism of the Government by the Opposition political parties. Fianna Fail has been accused by the PD's of squandering public money for political gain and the manner in which public funds are being dispensed at the personal whim of senior and junior Ministers has been described by them as scandalous.

The Parliamentary Labour Party has claimed that Fianna Fail is turning the National Lottery into a vehicle for the "cheapest" form of political patronage and further that Fianna Fail deputies, senators and councillors were "vying with each other" to be the ones to hand out the cheques from the Lottery to every community project that was allocated a grant.

There can be no doubt but that Fianna Fail is cashing in on the dispensing of these National Lottery grants but there can equally be no doubt that if the boot was on the other foot and the Opposition was in power they would follow a similar procedure. The money collected by the National Lottery comes from the public at large and should not be used as "a slush fund" by any political party to buy popularity and votes for its representatives. Rather should an independent, impartial body be established which would deal with all applications and award grants on a basis of merit.

Having said that, we must go back to the questions raised about the non-existent tennis clubs at Lismore and Cappoquin. As there are obviously no such clubs at present in these towns it must be asked who will receive the £10,000 allocated to the "phantom clubs" mentioned. Perhaps Minister for the Environment Flynn or Deputy Fahey would be willing to let us into the secret!

ITINERANT HALTING SITE VANDALISED

A recent High Court declaration on the provision of serviced halting sites for itinerants by local authorities indicates that Dungarvan is again ahead of most other local authorities in the country where this matter is concerned. Thanks to the foresight of County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley and members of Dungarvan Urban Council, a fully serviced halting site for itinerants was almost ready for occupation in the Shandon area of the town recently.

That is until a group of itinerants descended on the facility about a fortnight ago, forcibly took possession of it and caused a great deal of damage and vandalism to it.

Indeed over the same period, a swarm of itinerants hit the town like a plague of locusts, parking their caravans along the link road at Shandon leading from the new bypass and moving around the various localities in the urban area pestering and intimidating people with their persistent begging and other activities.

Such goings-on and other questionable activities can do nothing to endear the itinerant or travelling people with those of us in settled communities. If they wish to be accepted and have facilities such as laid down in the High Court provided for them then they must be prepared to conform and to behave in a civilised manner.

When the senior officials of the Urban Council finally managed to have the itinerants moved out of the town last Monday there was a general feeling of relief. And as soon

Minister Is Treating Cllrs. Like Children

The Minister for the Environment, Mr. Padraig Flynn, again came under fire at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday and, as on the previous occasion, the attack was initiated by a member of his own Fianna Fail Party.

Cllr. Paddy Doherty from Killmeaden who later claimed that he was the oldest member of the Council and of the Fianna Fail members on the Council accused the Minister of shameful treatment of Waterford Co. Council and Council members in general.

The matter arose from a letter from the Minister's Department, replying to a request from the Council for a special grant to upgrade and improve the road from Waterford City to Waterford Airport. This stated that the cost of any such improvement works would have to be financed from the Council's own resources.

In a comment on the letter, the Co. Manager, Mr. D. Hurley said that the Department's suggestion "was wholly unacceptable as the present level of Block Grant (allocated to the Council) is inadequate to maintain our existing roads. He said that the Council should seek an allocation of, say £10,000, to enable a survey and design work in relation to the road to be carried out in the current year.

Cllr. Cahill said that the Minister should be asked to say what he intends to do. At the last Fianna Fail Ard Fheis the Minister had said that he would fill every pothole in the country. "But," said Cllr. Cahill, "he hasn't done so and I think that he should do what he says or shut up."

Cllr. Cahill went on to say that, as a member of the Board of Waterford Airport he was angered that the Minister refused to give the financial allocation requested to Waterford but it seemed that he was more interested in ploughing all his Department's money into the Knock Airport which was in his own constituency.

"This Minister," Cllr. Cahill then said, "has no time for Co. Councillors and he is treating us like children and I think that's a bloody shame. We should condemn his attitude particularly in relation to Co. Waterford."

Senator Brian O'Shea (Lab.) condemned the treatment which Waterford Airport had received from the very beginning. All they had got to date was £10,000 in State grants while the Connacht Regional Airport had got £1.33 million. "I do not begrudge them what they have got but I think this county should get something like what it is entitled to get in comparison to other counties," he said.

Congratulating Cllr. Cahill for what he had said, Senator O'Shea added "we're too quiet around here and take a kick in the teeth while they get £1.33 million up in Knock."

Deputy Brian Swift (F.F.) vehemently disagreed with the remarks about Minister Flynn who was, he said, only performing as a member of a government which was engaged in putting the finances of the country right. It was only a couple of months ago that they praised the Minister for bringing in the best ever tenant purchase scheme.

The formal vote of sympathy and the resolution to adjourn was proposed by the Chairman Cllr. P. Kenneally and seconded by Cllr. J. A. Walsh with all members associating themselves with it.

Sympathy was also extended to the family of Mr. Bill Heffernan, Stradbally, who collapsed and died suddenly in Dungarvan last Sunday shortly after attending the Waterford-Tipperary C.F. game in which his son, Kieran played an outstanding game in goal for the home county.

Cappoquin Man Freed From
Spanish Prison

Kevin O'Connor, the 21-year-
old son of Mr. and Mrs. John
O'Connor, Carrigeen, Cappoquin
who has been held in prison in
Santa Cruz on the Spanish
Island of Tenerife without trial
for the past three-and-a-half
months was released following
a dramatic development in his
case on last Monday night.
Earlier in the day on which
his trial was to go ahead, his
parents had been informed by
European Parliament member
Niall Andrews in a phone call,
that the trial had yet again
been postponed. Kevin's father
then, in a last despairing effort,
endeavoured to have a meeting
with the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey,
arranged in an effort to get
the Irish Government to inter-
vene.

But then came the dramatic
news on Monday night that
Kevin had in fact, been released.
Kevin's uncle, Mr. Connie
McCarthy and his brother John
were in Tenerife to attend the
trial which was expected to
take place on Monday and it
was John who relayed the joy-
ous news of Kevin's release
when he phoned home to his
parents on Monday night.
Details as to what happened
are still rather hazy but we
understand that at 8 o'clock on
Monday night, prison authori-
ties in Santa Cruz opened his
cell door and set him free. In
his phone call John stated that
Kevin was both physically and
mentally exhausted after his
15-week nightmare during
which he was forced to live "in
a living hell with drug addicts,
muggers and rapists."

home in the hope that
Kevin and John and their
uncle Connie would be back in
Ireland for this coming week-
end. He said that the situation
was still not clear at that time
but understood that the new
date for Kevin's trial had been
fixed for May 27. "Whether he
will be allowed home on an
undertaking that he would re-
turn for the trial on that date
we don't know as yet," Mr.
Kieran O'Connor, another uncle,
stated.
He then went on to say that
after his long and harrowing
ordeal in the Spanish prison,
the first month of which he
spent in solitary confinement,
and the fact that many of the
prisoners were aids infected,
Kevin was utterly exhausted
and that it would take him

quite a while to recover from his
terrible experience.
It was on January 24 last
that the awful sequence of
events began when Kevin and
16 Britons were arrested follow-
ing a fracas in a local bar. From
the outset Kevin has maintain-
ed that he was not involved and
that he was only an innocent
bystander when the police ar-
rived and he was arrested with
the others and taken into cus-
tody.

be examined by a vet. Use tail
painting as an aid to heat de-
tection. Keep in mind shortage

when deciding on choice of bull.
SILAGE EFFLUENT
Silage effluent must be con-
trolled. Keep roof and yard
water separate and trap silage
effluent into a collection tank.
CEREALS
Crops are moving through
growth stages very quickly. Re-
gular twice weekly inspections
are necessary for deciding on
disease prevention, disease de-
tection and application of
growth regulators.

FINANCE BILL

The draft of the Finance Bill
now before the Dail could seri-
ously jeopardise the planned re-
payments of credit by farmers
to their Co-op's and lending
agencies, said Mr. Kelly, Presi-
dent of I.C.M.S.A. in a statement
issued from Limerick.

Mr. Kelly said the Powers of
Attachment now being provided
in the Finance Bill could give
first claim on the farmers'
cheques for produce to the Re-
venue Commissioners.

"Many dairy farmers in par-
ticular," said Mr. Kelly, "have
entered into arrangements with
their co-op's to make monthly
payments from their milk
cheques to lending agencies as
part of a normal programme of
repayments of loans.

"Now this process will be
seriously jeopardised if the Re-
venue Commissioners get a
priority claim on farmers' milk
cheques.

"The usual credit extended to
farmers by the Co-op's for fer-
tilisers and feedstuffs could also
be put in jeopardy. Payments
of this credit is usually made
by farmers through deductions
from this milk cheque over the
peak months of milk supply," he
said.

"I am sure that the Revenue
Commissioners will be aware of
this situation and will take steps
to ensure that the interests of
farmers are protected."

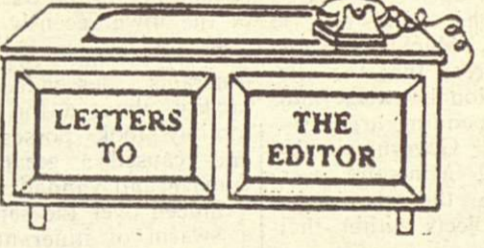

Dear Sir,
First of all I would like to
thank the many people who got
in touch with me following pub-
lication of my letter in your
issue of May 8th 1987, concern-
ing my wrongful removal as
Treasurer of the above, a posi-
tion which I had, until then,
occupied for a long number of
years. But surprisingly, or
maybe not, once I had revealed
the true facts of the situation,
there was no response to that
letter from the Chairman or
other executive Officials of the
Association.

All those who contacted me
expressed appreciation at the
manner in which the money col-
lected for the Association had
been invested, while some
questioned why St. John's School
was not short of money. Well
over a period of 21 years an-
nuals totalling £23,400 was de-
manded by and paid over to
the Board of Management of
the School, and when I as Treas-
urer of the Association asked
for reasons for the expenditure
of the money it was informed
that it was no business of mine
nor of the Association.

In addition to the money pro-
vided by the Association the
Board of Management also re-
ceives a special Capital Grant
annually from the De-
partment of Education for the
School, while further funds are

made available to it by way of
other private subscriptions from
time to time, so in fact there
should be no shortage of money.
Up to 1984 it was the Associa-
tion which always paid the Fire
and Accident Insurance on St.
John's School, but in that year
that item was also taken away
from the Association, and it was
then insured by the Board of
Management in the name of
"St. John's School for Handicapped
Children." When I questioned this
I was again told that it was
none of my business. However,
as I see it, the School was al-
ways St. John's School endowed
by the Association and never the
property of the Board of Man-
agement. As far as I am aware,
no properly convened Annual
General Meeting of the Associa-
tion was held in 1985, 1986, 1987,
or so far in 1988, and the public
who have contributed, the bulk
of Association funds are surely
entitled to know how and by
whom the authority the change
which I have referred to took
place.

Now I understand that a fur-
ther Church collection for
which I feel there is no neces-
sity, is to be held, but I think
it might be more appropriate
that an Extraordinary General
Meeting be held at which the
Association's Financial Position,
and many other problems that
might arise can be discussed in
public.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q.— I am coming up to age 66 and my wife is aged 64. I want to enquire about the free travel pass. I am a retired civil servant. Will my wife be able to use the pass?

A.— Your wife will qualify for a travel pass in her own right when she reaches age 66. In the meantime she can travel free only when accompanying you.

As a retired civil servant you will not be getting a social welfare old age pension and therefore you will not automatically get a travel card. Instead you will have to apply for one. You will get the application form from your post office and you should apply for the card one month before you reach 66.

Monthly Weather Bulletin

April Had Good Dry Spells

According to the monthly weather bulletin of the Meteorological Service for April, a rain belt moved south on Friday 1st and behind it we had a cool showery northwesterly airflow. With winds veering northerly to northeasterly and pressure rising, the remainder of the Easter week-end was dry and sunny with daytime temperatures rising gradually. Light northerly winds prevailed until 9th but the winds then became variable. In the vicinity of Ireland high pressure cells continued to dominate the weather charts, with the main centre shifting gradually to the northeast of us but remaining an important feature of our weather for the remainder of the month as it blocked the west-east movement of the Atlantic rainbelts. Between 14th and 21st southerly winds were dominant and with the warm-frontal rainbelts moving northwards over the country all areas had rain at times but it was mild. During 22nd a more easterly wind developed and while the Atlantic rainbelts occasionally affected the west and south, especially on 23rd and 24th it was not until the high pressure to the east had weakened considerably and moved into Scandinavia that the influence of the Atlantic low-pressure systems began to dominate our weather and rain spread slowly north during 30th.

RAINFALL
Except for 1st when we had showers, some of hail, the first thirteen days were largely dry. Between 14th and 21st the warm southerlies brought rain at times to all parts and between 18th and 20th thunder was recorded at some stations. Between 22nd and 24th there was occasional rain in the south and west, some of it heavy. The 25th was dry everywhere while on 26th there were occasional showers. The Atlantic rainbelts affected the south and west only marginally between 27th to 29th and amounts of rain were small. During 30th, with a deep depression slowly approaching from the southwest, rainbelts moved northwards to affect all areas, over much of the country rainfall amounts were less than 1 millimetre, but Cork Airport had 16mm, its heaviest fall of the month. Only at Roche's Point (111%) did the total rainfall for the month exceed normal. In most areas totals were 80% of normal or less and over much of the midlands and east were less than 50% of normal. At Kilkenny it was the driest April since 1976 but at Birr it was the driest since the remarkable low 3.9mm recorded in 1938. Birr had only 4 days with rainfall of 1mm or more, compared with an average of 11 days.

TEMPERATURES
The Easter week-end holiday was marked by cool nights with air frost below normal on 1st and 2nd to above normal on 5th and 6th. Maximum temperatures were above normal between the 11th and 22nd with the period 15th to 22nd being marked by high temperatures both by day and night. Thereafter daytime temperatures were above normal only on 25th and 26th. Besides the period 2nd to 5th, air frost occurred during the period 10th to 12th and on 25th.

Mean maximum temperatures were above normal except near the southeast coasts where on-shore winds prevailed and prevented the rise in temperature which caused mean maxima to be 0.9°C below normal at Kilkenny when they were 0.6°C below normal at Rosslare. At Belmullet and Cralemorris the mean maximum was 1.3°C above normal. Mean minimum temperatures ranged from 0.4°C above normal at Roche's Point to 1.2°C above normal at Shannon Airport. Thus mean temperatures were about 1°C above over much of the north and west but were only 0.1°C above normal at Roche's Point. The mean of 9.6°C recorded at Belmullet made it the warmest April there since recording began in 1957. Near the south and southwest coasts the highest temperatures of the month were recorded on 5th but elsewhere the period 18th to 22nd was warmest.

Highest temperature of the month was 17.9°C recorded at Galway on 18th while the lowest temperatures were -1.9°C recorded at Birr on 12th and at Kilkenny on Sunday the 10th.

SUNSHINE
Over the Easter holiday period, 1st to 5th, many areas in the north, west and midlands had totals of between 40 and 50 hours of sun and nearly all stations had much more than 30 hours of sunshine. Thereafter such generally sunny conditions occurred only on 11th, 12th, 19th and 25th. Totals for the month ranged from 158 hours at Dublin Airport to 109 hours at Cork Airport while percentages of normal varied between 83% at Cork Airport and 97% at a number of stations in the midlands, east and north. The period 14th-17th was dull nearly everywhere but, on 19th the highest daily total of the month 12.4 hours was recorded at Dublin Airport.

WIND
There was a marked absence of strong winds; indeed nine of our fifteen stations had no gale gusts during April. Main Head had the highest number of days with gale gusts—eight, but this compares with its average of twelve. Highest gust was 48 knots (55 m.p.h.) recorded at Valentia Observatory (Cahirciveen) on 30th.

FOG
There was patchy and usually quite short-lived radiation fog between 3rd and 7th and again on 11th and 12th. During the warm sector conditions there was some hill and coastal fog between 14th and 19th chiefly near the south and to a lesser extent near the west coast. Thereafter while it was hazy at times there was very little fog.

PERCENTAGE OF POSSIBLE SUNSHINE
With summer approaching and the length of day increasing it is possible to have up to 15 hours of sunshine during May. Unfortunately days with unbroken sunshine are rare, and on average less than 10 days with over 75 percent of possible sunshine are recorded each summer.

Waterford literally resurrected themselves from the dead to thwart Tipperary in this first round Munster senior football championship game played before a good sized crowd at Fraher Field, Dungarvan on Sunday last.

Having been outplayed throughout the first half, trailing by 0-8 to 0-3 at the interval and still being five points down 0-9 to 0-4, seven minutes into the second half, they looked completely demoralised and only one result seemed possible. Waterford were playing so badly in fact that an emphatic Tipperary win looked imminent.

But then came the transformation, ignited by the inclusion of Saviours Derek Wyse in attack. And in the twinkling of an eye the game was completely reversed as the home

side staged a miraculous recovery to win by four points and secure themselves a semi final tilt with Kerry.

Waterford's form in the league was completely inconsistent and they lost games they were expected to win easily. They were totally unpredictable and looked to be doing their Jackyle and Hyde act all over again as they sat back throughout the first half and gave Tipperary the freedom of the park.

They trailed from the word go, were three points behind before raising their first flag in the 16th minute and despite having two points on the trot, they never got into the game and were trailing 0-8 to 0-3 at the break.

Tipperary in fact were not flattered by their interval lead as they had missed some very easy chances in the first period. The second half continued where the first half left off with the visitors continuing to dominate. Tipp were 0-9 to 0-3 ahead by the 35th minute and looked to be coasting to an easy win when Waterford brought on Derek Wyse for Jimmy Healy.

There was no denying Waterford their victory at this stage however as they came storming back and Noel Weldon combined with Derek Wyse to put Jimmy Maher through for their third goal in the 57th minute.

A shattered Tipperary rallied their forces and a brace of points from Michael Cunningham cut the arrears to two points with two minutes of normal time left. It was Tipperary's final effort; however as Waterford came back strongly for points from Jim McGrath and Derek Wyse to seal a fine victory which had looked well beyond their capabilities well into the second half.

REMARKABLE RECOVERY

It was truly a remarkable recovery by Waterford. In their period of dominance they looked exceptionally good and one could only wonder how the trend of the game would have developed had Waterford played with the same flair and verve from the start.

It must have been a shattering experience for Tipperary who looked winners for such a long time. They battled all the way but they had no answer to Waterford's resurgence when the chips were down.

DRIVER TESTERS IN DUNGARVAN

Minister for the Environment (Mr. Padraig Flynn) replied as follows: Driver testers operated in Dungarvan in each of the weeks ended 9th and 16th January, 1988. One tester was assigned to Dungarvan in each of the weeks ending on 30th January, 27th February, 5th March and 12th March, 1988. Arrangements were made early last month to assign one tester to Dungarvan this week. Two testers have been assigned to the area for the week commencing 23rd May, 1988.

In assigning driver tester duties at any of the 47 centres in the country, my Department must take into account: (a) the level of demand for tests in the area, and (b) the need to maintain a uniform waiting period throughout the country, as far as practicable.

Driver testers will continue to be assigned to the Dungarvan area on this basis.
