MOTORIST FINED, DISQUALIFIED AND ENDORSED

John Condon, Brenan, Stradally was fined €150 with an endorsement and disqualified for 12 months when he was convicted by District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court on a charge of driving with excess alcohol on March 5.

Garda M. Dunne said that at 3.45 a.m. on March 5 last he was in the patrol car at Bridge St., Dungarvan. He saw a motor car being driven along the street which turned into the Quay and then into the car park where it pulled up.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr, who appeared for the defendant asked for a dismissal on the grounds that there was no evidence to indicate that it was the defendant who had actually been driving the car on the occasion.

The District Justice then imposed the penalties stated and Mr. Gordon stating that the defendant was 23 years and a farm machinery driver asked that the operation of the disqualification be postponed until September 1 next as it would be a busy time on farms until then.

CEREALS — DISEASE CONTROL Mildew levels are increasing in Spring Barley, especially in the varieties Brit, Fleet, Klaxon and Escort. Mildew is also prevalent in wheat and oat crops.

Up to 2,000 gallons per acre can be spread on silage aftermath. If spreading on grazing area, dilute 50:50 to avoid scorching.

URGENT NEED FOR HEALTH PROMOTION IN INDUSTRY

Con Power, Director of Economic Policy, Confederation of Irish Industry, at the opening of the Employment Assistance Programme (EAP '86) Conference held in the Ardree Hotel, Waterford, last week spoke of the high level of absenteeism in this country.

A report published recently by the ESRI quoted an OECD report that the duration of illness per worker is considerably higher in Ireland than in other OECD countries. In 1981, for example, there were 34 days of sickness absence per worker in Ireland, 23 in Sweden, 20 in the UK, 17 in Italy, 14 in France, 12 in Luxembourg, 9 in the Netherlands, 5 in the USA and 4 in Finland.

It must be pointed out, however, in this context that international comparisons of sickness absence data are difficult to make due to differences in coverage of social insurance schemes and differences in the administration of sickness benefits.

The trend in higher rates of sickness absence levelled off in countries such as the UK, France, Germany and Norway even when the real value of sickness benefits increased during the 1960s and 1970s, whereas sickness absence in Ireland continued to rise. It is obvious that with the constraints on public expenditure in Ireland, there is an urgent need to reduce public expenditure on sickness benefit by lowering the sickness absence rate.

PLANS FOR LISMORE COMMUNITY SCHOOL ADVANCED
