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

A TIME BOMB ON WHEELS

In a recent interview, the Chief Fire Officer of Cork City, Tony McCarthy expressed his growing concern at the freedom with which trucks carrying dangerous chemicals are able to move through the city. Prior to moving to Cork, Mr. McCarthy was the Chief Fire Officer here in Waterford with headquarters in Dungarvan where he was well and popularly known.

Chief McCarthy's worries are centred on the transportation of dangerous substances around the country where the situation at present exists that a truck can leave any point at any time carrying the most potentially dangerous substances without notifying the relevant authorities which in such cases are the Fire Departments and the Gardai.

However, virtually every substance with hazardous properties is covered in some respects in major new legislation introduced in January of last year. Chief Officer McCarthy points out that there are two main categories involved in the carriage of these dangerous substances. These are the oil, chemical and gas companies who transport such substances on a regular basis and were "reasonably safety conscious" and the small operators who were the cause for most concern. He said that too often independent, inexperienced truckers carried dangerous goods through cities and towns without even knowing what they were carrying.

These "blind" and potentially deadly consignments were, he said, being transported around the country every day usually destined for agriculture and small businesses where people taking delivery were not familiar with the potential dangers. "It is time to stand back and look at the situation," he said, adding, "we have survived a long time and I would be afraid that the day of the serious accident is not too far away." Ideally, Chief McCarthy believes that we should adopt "the better" European method of dealing with the transportation of dangerous substances which includes the restriction of such traffic to off-peak times only, when roads are quiet and streets are not crowded and the prior notification to the relevant authorities of the routes to be taken, the driving times and the exact nature of the cargo involved.

Chief Officer McCarthy's remarks are especially relevant to a situation which occurred within the past few weeks in Dungarvan when a virtual time bomb on wheels was cleared out of town before it could have caused a devastating explosion.

On Tuesday morning, May 17 an LPG gas tanker from Arklow was delivering gas to a

premises at Lower Main Street when it was discovered that a safety valve was leaking. The substance expands at such an enormous rate that a little can cause a major explosion when it mixes with the oxygen in the air. The Dungarvan Fire Brigade and the Gardai were alerted and the area was cordoned off while the tanker driver, displaying great courage, got into his cab and drove the vehicle out the Youghal Road and on to open ground at Killossera away from any houses and people. Thankfully the problem was resolved without any dire consequences but we have been told on the very best authority that for a short period the whole lower end of the town in the vicinity of Lower Main Street and Church Street was in danger of going up in a puff of smoke.

This is really a very frightening thought and it shows how very relevant the remarks of Chief Officer McCarthy and indeed those of all our other Fire Officers are in regard to the handling of all these dangerous substances. It is indeed time to stand back and take a long, hard look at this very serious problem before a major catastrophe does occur.

NEW AGRICULTURE ACT

On Monday of last week the members of the former County Waterford Committee of Agriculture, or at least most of them, held a meeting at the ACOI Office in Dungarvan to which the four TDs for the Constituency were invited. The meeting was called to lobby the TD's to make representations to Minister for Agriculture Michael O'Kennedy to include a section in the new Agriculture (Research, Training and Advice) Bill, 1988 then before the Dail, to provide for the re-establishment of agriculture committees on a county basis.

The Bill which was passed by Dail Eireann on Wednesday, May 25 provides for the establishment of a body to be known as Teagasc—The Agriculture and Food Development Authority—and the transfer to it of the functions previously administered by An Foras Taluntais and ACOT.

Section 17 of the Act provides for the establishment of committees by Teagasc, stating that it "may establish committees to assist and advise it in relation to the performance of its functions" and that "there may be paid out of the income of Teagasc to members of a committee established under this section such allowances for expenses incurred by them as Teagasc may, with the consent of the Minister and the Minister for Finance, determine."

Whether this section will cover the setting up of County

No Preferential Grant Aid For West Waterford

Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Minister for Industry and Commerce the reason the West Waterford and Portlaoise areas were not included in the list of areas he announced for preferential grant aid for industry when the unemployment levels in these areas are high; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

In the written answer on Wednesday, May 25, the Minister, Mr. Albert Reynolds stated: The basis for the recent Government decision agreeing to the designation of certain counties for the higher rate of fixed asset grant was a report entitled "Designation of Areas for Industrial Policy" produced by the National Economic and

Social Council in September, 1985 which recommended objective criteria for determining the areas to be designated.

These criteria are based on labour market imbalance, which is a broadly defined measure of unemployment. The Economic and Social Research Institute was commissioned to determine the actual areas which merited designation under the NESO formula. The ESRI analysis has determined that the following non-designated counties merit the highest priority for designation, i.e. Louth, Wexford, Wicklow and Offaly. It is on this basis that the Government decided to accord these counties designation status.

SEA ANGLING

Youghal Fishermen's Strike Hits Dungarvan Event

In addition to the bitter five months old rod licence dispute which has decimated tourism, especially in the West of Ireland, a new fisheries row flared last Thursday night after a heated confrontation between fishermen in the East Cork area and Southern Fisheries Board Officers over the seizure of illegal monofilament nets in Youghal.

The fishermen have alleged that southern angling clubs were providing a sum of £30,000 to the Fisheries Board to fund a fresh campaign to stamp out the use of the illegal nets for salmon fishing along the south coast. The confrontation took place at Youghal pier and gardai had to be called as more than 200 locals prevented Fisheries Officers from landing a boat containing nets which had been seized. The Officers were, as a result, forced to go back out and find an alternative landing point.

Later on Thursday night about 150 fishermen based in Youghal decided to refuse to bring anglers out in their boats because, as they claimed the anglers had financed the new clampdown mounted by the Fisheries Board. A spokesman for the fishermen warned that they would prevent private boat owners from taking out anglers, even if it meant using physical force.

In the meantime the Fisheries Board has strongly refuted the allegations that they were mounting a new campaign of net seizures or that they had received any monies from angling associations for such a campaign.

DUNGARVAN EVENT HIT

The Youghal row spread to Helvic on Saturday last, when local fishermen decided to support their Youghal colleagues and to refuse to take anglers out in their boats. Spokesman for the Helvic fishermen, Richie Tobin, informed the Dungarvan Sea Angling Club of this decision on Saturday. The club was forced, at short notice, to cancel their important Inter-Firms Competition scheduled for Sunday. In excess of 70 entries had been received for this and club officials then had to make contact with these to inform them of the last minute cancellation.

In view of the strong denial issued by the Regional Fisheries Board that angling clubs had contributed no monies for the alleged net seizure campaign, the decision of the Youghal and Helvic fishermen to slap a ban

on the local sea angling clubs does not make any sense. At a time when we should be doing everything to boost our tourist attractions and amenities such senseless boycotts, almost amount to a kiss of death.

RUBBISH

Dungarvan Sea Angling Club are to stage one of their major annual fixtures next Sunday, the King and Queen of the Sea competition, and the Club P.R.O. Damien Dillon told the "Leader" that irrespective of any intimidation that might be expected, the competition will go ahead. He said that the claims made by the fishermen

concerning money alleged to be paid to the Fisheries Board by sea angling clubs were utter rubbish. "What they do when they go out fishing is none of our business, our concern is just to get on with our own competitions," he said.

Should the dispute not be resolved before Sunday, the competition will be serviced by local boatmen in Dungarvan and Abbeyside but because the number of boats may, accordingly, be limited the competitors can only be accommodated on a first come, first served basis. It is to be hoped, however, that wiser counsels will have prevailed before then.
