#### 4. EEC Calf Premium Scheme

Farmers with calves born in the State between 16 June 1987 and 15 June 1988 may apply for premium on such calves that have been ear-tagged and recorded in a Calf Register by the breeder and given a Certificate of Birth by him if subsequently sold and that are alive at six months of age in the State. Farmers must have their calves ear-tagged before inspection, must

produce at inspection properly-completed Calf Registers and also Certificates of Birth in respect of bought-in calves. The current rate of payment is £7.60 payable after a calf has reached six months of age but is subject to change.

#### 5. EEC Special Beef Premium Scheme

Registered herdowners under the Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication Scheme may apply for this premium on up to 50 male cattle of at least 9 months of age at date of application which have been ear-tagged, fattened on their holdings and kept on those holdings for at least one month after application or until inspection whichever is later. Only the male cattle found at on-farm inspections will qualify for premium. The current rate of payment is £15.20 per eligible male animal subject to payment being made on not more than 50 animals.

COMPOSITE APPLICATION FORMS -Composite application forms for all schemes above have been posted to herdowners. Intending applicants who have not received a form should' request one immediately from the local office of the department. Applicants who are ineligible for one or more of the Schemes covered by the composite application forms they receive may nevertheless apply for any other Scheme(s) covered by those forms for which they are eligible.

Applications will be subject to the detailed terms and conditions applicable to each Scheme entered. Applications should be submitted to the Headage Payments Section of the Local Office of the Department without delay.
