

# Behind the SPOTLIGHT

The hour extension to 11 p.m. on Sunday nights with again, the thirty minutes drinking up time then added on was particularly welcomed when it came into operation for the first time last Sunday night.

However many publicans reported that the new extended nours only meant that drinkers arrived that little bit later than usual as they continued to observe their usual practice of coming in just for the last hour before closing time.

A significant change in the new Intoxicating Liquor Act concerns the fines that may be imposed for breaches. Fines of up to £50 may now be imposed 'found-ons' after closing

CLUBS IN A CRUX However a little known aspect of the new Act will create a major crux for sports and social clubs. Section 45 of the Act prohibits the publication of advertisements by any registered club for the holding of discos and other such functions except by notice posted inside the club premises or by circular issued to members.

The new Act also amends section 5 of the Registration of Clubs Act in that for the purpose of registration it will be necessary now to have 125 members as against the old requirement of 25.

The prohibition on the publication of advertisements for club functions such as discos will, without doubt, hit the fund-raising activities of many soccer, rugby, golf and rowing clubs which up to now have enjoyed a regular income from such sources.

The section dealing with the situation comes in at the tailend of the Act and received little or no mention during the passing of the Bill through the houses of the Oireachtas. We learn that the regulations covering the position were included only after intensive lobbying by the Irish Hotels' Federation which claimed that clubs were involved in "unfair competition" with hotels resulting in job losses.


