





# FARMERS GET ONLY WHAT'S LEFT OVER

Mr. T. J. # Warm And Mainly Dry Start To Summer

June started cool with scat-tered showers and as a depres-sion moved eastwards across the country on 3rd winds veered from southwesterly to northwesterly. The start of the Bank Holiday week-end on Saturday 4th and Sunday 5th was cool but mostly dry. However, on 6th an active frontal trough brought rain eastwards across the country. A depression forming on the trough line slipped southwards on 7th and from the 8th to 17th we were on the the 8th to 17th we were on the southern side of a ridge extending from the Azores to Scandinavia. As a result we had warm dry air of continental origin over us and light winds between easterly and northerly in direction. Between 18th and 25th the airflow was more from the Atlantic but, while minor troughs did give some spots of rain, the ridge was still the dominant feature; its axis was over Ireland between 22nd and 24th but, it, moved southwards during 25th. Early on 26th a trough associated with a depression which formed just on pression which formed just on the east of Ireland moved southwards giving some heavy rain. On 27th, with the ridge rebuilding to the north of Ireland we were in a light northeaster-ly. However, during the 28th and 29th the Atlantic low pressure systems eroded the ridge

and on 30th a depression centred near Ireland was the dominant feature of the weather

### HIGH TEMPERATURES

The first seven days were cool but between 8th and 15th day-time temperatures were high except in those coastal areas affected by onshore winds. The maximum temperature at Clones exceeded 20°C each day from 8th to 15th. Some of the highest temperatures of the month were recorded between 11th and 15th, the highest being 25.1°C read at Birron 14th. Between 16th and 21st daytime temperatures dropped a little but were still above or about normal. The period 22nd to 25th was again warm with maximum temperatures ranging from 20.0°C to 24.5°C in most areas.

Mean maximum air tempera-tures were the highest for 12 to 18 years at many stations: they were between 0.9°C and 2.2°C above normal at most sta-

After unsettled conditions during the first seven days there was a spell of dry weather between 8th and 25th; there were a few minor interruptions, the 21st being the only day in which more than one milimetre

was recorded at any of our synoptic stations. Shannon Airport and Valentia Observatory (Cahirciveen) had nineteen consecutive days with no rain between 7th and 25th. Parts of the northwest and west escaped lightly in the widespread rain of the northwest and west escaped lightly in the widespread rain of 26th and indeed at the end of 29th the western half of the country had recorded only between 24% and 50% of normal rainfall while the eastern half had recorded between 55% and 95% of normal Belmullet (1957) and Claremorris (1944) were on course for their driest June on record but on 30th a rainbelt gave 20 to 40 millimetres of rain over much of Connaught and over much of Connaught and Munster. Nonetheless Belmullet had only 49% of its normal June total while Malin Head (54%) now has had three successive months with less than 60% of normal rainfall.

### SUNSHINE

tures were the highest for 12 to 18 years at many stations: they were between 0.9°C and 2.2°C above normal at most stations but on coasts in the northwest, north and east they ranged from 0.3°C above normal to 0.2°C below normal (at Malin Head). Mean minimum temperatures were above normal everywhere, the deviations varying from 0.7°C at Birr to 1.4°C at Galway. Lowest nightime temperatures were recorded in the periods 2nd to 5th, 13th to 15th and 22nd to 23rd while the mildest nights occurred between 19th and 21st and from 25th to 27th.

Mean air temperatures were mere the highest for six to twelve years generally but were than highest since 1970 at some stations in Munster and Connaught.

SUNSHINE

Totals ranged from 200 to 210 hours near the south coast to less than 141 hours at Malin Head Near northwestern, northern and eastern coasts able for the seaside and sunshthing are normally associated with temperatures in excess of 20°C. In spite of having the lowest total Malin Head had four successive days with 15.5 hours or more sunshine: no other station had more than two such days.
