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HE'S STILL AN EXCEPTIONAL MAN ON A BIKE

The Alpe d'Huez stage in the current Tour de France last week proved a sad day for Sean Kelly and for Irish sport and for none more than his host of ardent fans and followers here in his native Co. Waterford. It spelt the great hearted Waterford man's demise from the race on which he had set his ambition to win. His crashing fall on the mountain run had done more damage than had at first been anticipated. But in typical Kelly style he made no excuses and admitted as he was losing ground that he knew his race had been run.

Professional cycling is a rough, tough and dangerous sport and to remain at the top as long as Sean Kelly has done calls for supreme dedication and indeed sacrifice. He has raced an average of 180 days per season since 1984, far more than any cyclist of his calibre. His record of 18 classics and World No 1 ranking since then is testimony to his talents.

Sean Kelly was, and still is, an exceptional man on a bike and even though he is now 32 years old, he is far from finished. We salute him and look upon him as still one of the greatest.

NO EMERGENCY SERVICE

Speaking at the scene of the horrific accident in Abbeyside last Monday evening as a result of which a young man lost his life, Kilmac Veterinary Surgeon Pat Morrissey deplored the lack of a proper and adequate emergency service to cope with serious accidents that occur at this end of the county.

There can be little doubt but that in the absence of fast and adequate treatment shock can reduce the chances of survival in seriously injured cases and no matter how fast an ambulance may travel it will take at least half an hour to get from Dungarvan to Waterford—at a time when minutes might be vital.

A POLITICAL DECISION

Following a fierce battle for survival between St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel and Our Lady's Hospital, Cashel for the role of the single hospital for the South Tipperary area which is to emerge, it was decided by the members of the South Eastern Health Board at their monthly meeting in Kilkenny last Thursday that the new hospital should be based in Cashel.

The decision came as a complete surprise as all the pre-vote statistics favoured the choice of Clonmel. But more surprising was the outcome of the vote which saw 14 members favouring Cashel as against 12 for Clonmel with as many as 6 members abstaining when the crucial vote was taken. It all pointed to a very

distinct pattern of political pressure and that in fact the decision was a political one rather than one based on providing the best service for the greatest number of people.

Since the Board meeting last Thursday and in light of the outcome, the Clonmel Hospital Action Group has decided to ask the Minister for Health to examine allegations of political interference in the Board's controversial vote. The Chairman of the Group, Dr. Paul O'Regan has expressed dismay at the decision which he says was made on purely political grounds. He has claimed that some of the politicians who voted for Cashel have admitted that they came under tremendous political pressure to vote for Cashel while the number of abstentions showed how serious the situation really was.

From a local point of view one of the more surprising aspects of the decision was the abstention by Cllr. O'Halloran, one of the two Waterford County Council representatives on the Health Board, in the crucial vote despite the fact that at the Council's monthly meeting on the previous Monday, the members had unanimously decided to support the case for Clonmel which serviced the west and north areas of Waterford to a considerable extent.

The cost of bringing the Cashel hospital up to the standards required has been estimated at £10 million while it was estimated that the cost of rehabilitating the Clonmel hospital would be £2 million. On this basis and apart altogether from the alleged political pressures which are stated to have swayed the result, the Health Board decision in favour of Cashel would appear to be quite foolish. Whatever chance the Board might have of finding £2 million to do up Clonmel there would seem to be no earthly hope of getting the £10 million needed for Cashel now that a further 10 per cent cut in the financial allocations for all government departments, including the Department of Health, are forecast for the coming year.

In fact the Board's decision might well mean that both Cashel and Clonmel will now lose out in the long run.

BANK AWARD FOR GOOD TURN

One of the first winners of the Bank of Ireland Service Quality Awards—a scheme introduced by the Bank last month on the theme that one good turn deserves another—is well-known Dungarvan electrical contractor and popular greyhound owner, Mr. Johnny Byrne, "Rosario," Clonea Road, Abbeyside.

Johnny was more surprised than anyone when he was informed that he had been chosen as one of the two

Crisis Situation For Roads In County

In the course of a discussion at the July monthly meeting of Waterford County Council on the progress report on roads submitted by the County Engineer, Cllr. G. O'Halloran referred to the rumours that further drastic cuts were to be made in the government allocations for the coming year and asked what the lasting effect any further reduction in the Roads Block Grant would have in the county. "We are now in a crisis situation as far as the roads are concerned and the situation is so bad in many cases in the Clonmel area that the people there are literally risking their lives every time they take the road to Dungarvan", he said.

Cllr. C. O'Riain agreed and said that he was sick and tired of listening to the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Flynn, warning Local Authorities to economise and about further cut-backs. He thought that the Minister was completely out of touch with the situation. "We have now been told", said Cllr. O'Riain, "that there is to be cut-backs totalling £400 million principally in the Departments of Social Welfare, Health, Education and the Environment for the coming year. If that is so then there will be no point in any Local Authorities meeting as they will have no money and it will be just as well for the Minister to come along and abolish them altogether!"

Mr. O'Flynn, County Engineer said that they now had had two successive years of very substantial cut-backs and if there were further severe cut-backs next year, road surfaces would deteriorate further as there will be no money to do any work or to provide any employment. "There will be more severe damage done to the roads if we have any bad rainstorms or frost and snow during the coming winter", he said.

Cllr. P. Kenneally agreed that the roads in the Aglish-Clashmore area were in very bad shape at present and milk lorries were threatening to give up collecting there unless something was done to repair them.

HORRIFIC ACCIDENT CLAIMS LIFE OF YOUNG MOTOR CYCLIST

Shortly after 6 p.m. on last Monday evening, July 18, a horrific accident which occurred at Sexton Street, Abbeyside, claimed the life of 18-years-old Francis Reynolds who lived at 24, McCarthyville, Abbeyside with his parents and the other members of his family.

He had returned home from England only some days before and was riding his newly-purchased motor cycle on his way home from Dungarvan when he was involved in a head on collision with a small truck in the vicinity of Radley's Lounge Bar. Although he was wearing a helmet, he sustained severe injury to his head while he also suffered multiple injuries to his arms, body and legs.

One of the first on the scene was well-known Kilmacthomas Veterinary Surgeon, Pat Morrissey who at once rendered assistance and he was shortly

joined on the scene by Doctors Anne Casey, Isabel Brennock and Richard Brady. Heroic efforts were made by the entire medical team to help the very badly injured young man until the ambulance arrived and he was rushed to Ardkeen Regional Hospital, Waterford where he died shortly after arrival.

The driver of the truck, Mrs. O'Grady, Tinalra, Ballinamult was badly shocked after the accident but was not injured. For a period after the terrible accident, traffic along the main Waterford road had to be diverted until the roadway was cleared.

We join in extending to Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds and the other members of the family our deepest sympathy on the great loss they have sustained as a result of such a desperately tragic accident.

Last Round-Up In Senior Hurling Championship

NEXT WEEK-END
The coming week-end will see the last round-up in the senior hurling championship, but countywide, all interest will be focused on the clash between table-toppers Ballygunner and Mount Sion. Walsh Park as this game, conceivably will determine the pairings for the county semi-finals later in the month.

Should Mount Sion win or draw, the championship will be all over as far as the others in their group is concerned, but should Ballygunner win then the match between Ballyduff and Dunhill at Fraher Field on Saturday evening will decide Mount Sion's opponents in the play-off for second place in that group.

The situation in group 'B' is that both Tallow and Roanmore have qualified and the championship is all over for the remaining four clubs in the group in which Lismore and Shamrocks met to decide which club represents their group in the relegation match later.

MOUNT SION v. BALLYGUNNER

With so much hinging on the outcome of this one, Walsh Park is certain to see a big influx of Western hurling fans on Sunday afternoon. Most of the interest will relate to Mount Sion's performance and fate in the game, as should they lose, county champions Ballyduff or Dunhill will be brought back into the championship. This match is being talked about quite a bit and opinions vary about the result. Mount Sion seem to be the popular choice, due no doubt, to the fact that Ballygunner struggled against Cappoquin. It must be taken into consideration that since that afternoon, Ballygunner have beaten Ballyduff also, and the collapse of the champions in this case was similar in pattern to their failure in the Mount Sion match. Ballyduff faded out towards the finish and it was towards the end that both Mount Sion and Ballygunner got on top of Ballyduff.

In round one of the championship, Ballygunner defeated Dunhill by two goals and in round two Dunhill beat Mount Sion by six points. On the basis of these two performances, Ballygunner would stand a great chance of winning here. I would rate the Ballygunner team that I have seen to be more in the mould of champions, than the present Mount Sion team who have several young players, who while playing very well, lack the maturity needed in a vital game such as this.

Veteran Jim Greene continues to be Mount Sion's top scorer with a total of 8-2 of their 8-26 scored in their last two matches. The former great county player, in my opinion is unlikely to continue to keep this up for the remainder of the championship. If Greene is contained by the Ballygunner defence, Mount Sion will have to depend on other arms of their attack to get the vital scores to keep in touch until the finish. These include Pat Ryan, Pats McGrath, Eamon Ryan, David Power, Padraigh Fanning, all of whom have figured in the scoring to-date.

It is interesting to recall that when they played in their final match last year they each scored 3-13, but in a play-off Ballygunner gave Mount Sion a roasting (5-8 to 0-7) and put the Monastery team out of the championship. That win will give Ballygunner the confidence they need to overcome their city rivals again. The Gunners have made extraordinary progress since 1986 when they suffered a very heavy defeat at the hands of Mount Sion (4-16 to 2-5) and in the present championship, players like Billy Sullivan, John McDonald, Anthony Cooney, Gerry and Jimmy Connors, Liam Hartley, Conor and Cian Cantwell, Niall Warren, etc., are all playing great club hurling. I am on record as having written on many occasions that writing off Mount Sion is a risky business, because even their present generation of players have a knack of producing the goods when not expected to, but here, I am going for a Ballygunner win, as in my book, that is the way the form book reads just now.

PORTLAW v. CLONEA

Way back in the early stages of the championship, this was one of the local derbies that we all looked forward to and it was hoped that the clubs would be close enough on points to make the result of their meeting vital to both. They certainly got that close to each other (each on 4 points) but unfortunately the result, as far as the remainder of the championship is concerned, is meaningless. Pride, which is a localised form of prestige, will motivate both into giving of their best and this could make it entertaining for the public while waiting around for the Mount Sion/Ballygunner clash. Portlaw seem to be the popular fancy.

BALLYDUFF v. DUNHILL

The good thing about this game is that both clubs will enter the fray believing that if they win they will remain in contention for the county title. As of now and as of Saturday evening when they line out at Fraher field they are in contention so one must therefore expect to see this match fought with real championship fervour. It being the last chance for the reigning county champions to 'stay alive', they can be expected to make an all-out bid for victory here.

Shocked by the underdogs, Cappoquin in their game here three weeks ago, Dunhill will make a bold bid to remain on as the only club with chances in

both hurling and football. Dunhill are a very fit team and this tremendous fitness won them a place in the football semi-finals at rain-soaked Stradbally on Saturday evening. Dunhill, it will be remembered, beat Mount Sion, who in turn defeated Ballyduff, but they to confuse the form book, Cappoquin who lost to Ballyduff, defeated Dunhill. The form book is not a help so here one must rely on his intuition. If I am right, then, Ballyduff will win.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING

Two matches listed in this championship will advance the competition to the halfway stage. On Friday evening table-toppers, Colligan play Stradbally and on Sunday in the afternoon feature game, Abbeyside will clash with Kilgobinet. Colligan are safely in to the semi-final, but a win against Stradbally on Friday would put them through to the divisional final. Stradbally played fine hurling against Abbeyside in round one and will trouble the favourites all the way here. On form the team who are just back from a two-year stint in the senior championship, will be expected to make sure of that place in the divisional final.

Abbeyside and Kilgobinet met last year and then Abbeyside just managed to get by. It could be more difficult for them here with players like Michael Collins, Conor Clancy and Thomas O'Mahony all not available. Kilgobinet, had a good win against Ballinameela and failed narrowly to Colligan in the early rounds, and therefore must be strongly fancied.

JUNIOR HURLING

Clashmore and Tourin meet in junior hurling at Cappoquin on Saturday and while Tourin's fate is already sealed as far as the championship is concerned, a win for Clashmore would give them an outside chance of remaining in contention. A win for Clashmore looks to be almost certain.

ARDMORE v. ST. MARY'S

Both are in contention for a place in the knock-out stages and the result here will bring the winners a step nearer the semi-finals. Presuming that Clashmore will beat Tourin on Saturday evening a win for Ardmore here on Sunday would level three teams. Ardmore, Clashmore and St. Mary's all level on four points with four matches played. An Rinn with all five games played have 9 points and are into the semi-final as are Ballysagart. With one place remaining to be filled, three of the above contestants have it all to play for over this week-end. St. Mary's will be slight favourites to beat Ardmore.

STRADBALLY v. KILROSSANTY

This very attractive junior hurling tie is listed for Abbeyside on Sunday evening and with the winners going through to the section final against Dungarvan it will be a match well worth watching. It speaks volumes for the strength of both clubs that they are able to continue in both senior and junior football championships without interfering with the personnel on their junior teams. Kilrossanty who fielded a very strong team in the early rounds are fancied to win this one.

FAHA v. MODELIGO

This will be a vital game for Faha and it will be their biggest assignment to date. Their victories over Emmetts and Seana Phobal will improve Faha's confidence and if displaying the same spirit which saw them safely over Seana Phobal last week, Faha might just, about, qualify.

EIRE OG v. GERALDINES

This junior hurling 'B' championship tie at Fraher field will wind up the week-end activity. The result may show Eire Og having their second win of the season.

WESTERN BOARD MEETING

The withdrawal of both Tallow and Ballyduff from the intermediate football championship, was the chief topic for discussion at Thursday night's meeting of the Divisional Board at which Denis McGrath, chairman presided. Representatives of both clubs explained the circumstances which led to their withdrawal and for the most part the members found the reasons unacceptable. Both Ballyduff and Tallow were fined £20 each, Cappoquin junior hurlers, who were unable to field against Tallow because five of their players were doing examinations, were granted a reprieve on the proposition of Eddie Cunningham. The decision was unanimous.

The matter of neutral umpires at matches and the fixing of games for venues where dressing rooms with showers was raised by Nicolas Mac Craith and reference was made to the recent decision by County Board on the same subject. A number of speakers, including John Moore pointed out the difficulty in obtaining neutral umpires when a referee's regular umpires were involved in matches with their own clubs.

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

The three outgoing county senior hurling selectors, Tony Mansfield, Phil Fanning and Ollie Wilkinson, were unanimously re-elected at Monday night's meeting of the County Board which was presided over by chairman James Tobin. The fact that no other members were nominated, was taken as a vote of confidence in the three men who have worked very hard over two years with the team. An effort to have the term extended to two years, was not pursued when the chairman stated that the decision of the previous meeting did not in-

clude a two-year clause, but when the year ended, the term could be extended for a further term.

Five minor hurling selectors were also appointed and in this selection the Board departed from the normal policy and unanimously agreed to the appointment of five members who

have worked with under-age teams under the jurisdiction of County Bord na n-Og for several years. Many speakers, including, Phil Fanning, Tony Mansfield, John Moore chairman, Bord na n-Og, and Rev. Fr. P. Fitzgerald, county hurling officer spoke in favour of the proposition. The following five

are appointed for a two-year term, Peter Power, St. Patricks; Pat Collins, Dungarvan; Joe Carton, De La Salle; Martin Kennedy, St. Mary's and John Butler, Mount Sion.

The under 21 hurling selectors will be selected by Coláiste Gnótha and submitted to the August meeting for ratification.

Clubs may submit nominations. The football selectors will be named in about ten days time, by Cláiste na Peil. They had been asked to have their nominations for this meeting, but were forced to delay the selection, because of one or two problems. The county chairman got approval from the meeting to

allow the nominated football selectors operate, after they had been notified to the county secretary.

Nicolas MacGrath commented on the amount of money expended on training and expressed the opinion that more time and money should be devoted to training the skills, etc., than

on challenge and practice games. It was pointed out that the senior hurling team 'earned' almost as much as was spent on training the team and that receipts from the football league exceeded what was spent in training and travelling.

Mr. O'Flynn said that a roundabout which was the alternative to the traffic lights would be the perfect solution there but this was not possible designwise while it would also have proved extremely costly. He said that reports of the accidents which had occurred at the junction showed they were due in the main to excessive speeding. Some modifications had been carried out there and he hoped these would improve the situation at the junction.

Referring to the petrol station being built at the junction, Mr. O'Flynn said that permission for this had been granted 5 years ago and before the Co. Council took over the responsibility for the urban roads. The entrance to the junction would be on the Cappoquin side of the junction. He agreed that it could be the cause of accidents but he added "there's nothing we can do about it now and I just hope there won't be any".

The Chairman reiterated the point that "there is real disquiet among the public about this petrol station at that junction" before the discussion ended.

CO. WATERFORD SHEEPDOG TRIALS AT MAHONBRIDGE, KILMACTHOMAS

3 Men In A Boat Knew Nothing About Fishing

It was a case of 3 men in a boat who knew absolutely nothing about fishing said Mr. E. P. King, Solr. (J. F. Williams & Co.), when he appeared for three defendants charged on a number of counts for fishery offences at Dungarvan Court last week.

Before the court were Dungarvan men Patrick McGrath, 46A, Mary Street, Thomas Gough, 37 Congress Villas and Joseph Duggan, Kilrush Park. The charges arose from the use of an illegal monofilament drift net off Muggorts Bay, Ring and all the offences were admitted.

Mr. Fergus Power, Solr. for the Southern Region Fisheries Board who prosecuted said that on May 20 last, fishery officers saw the defendants in a green motor boat going towards a monofilament drift net. The officers spoke to the defendants who admitted the net was theirs. He said that they also admitted that they were fishing without a salmon licence. The officers did not seize either the net or the boat as they were entitled to do.

Mr. Power added that there were no previous convictions against any of the defendants. In addition to any penalties he asked for £60 costs against each.

Mr. King then made the comment quoted at the outset and added that the defendants had purchased the net with the boat but had caught nothing. They

had never fished before in their lives and all were unemployed. "After this they are not likely to be seen fishing again," he added.

Each of the defendants was convicted on two counts and fined a total of £50 and each was ordered to pay £50 costs in addition.

MORE MONOFILAMENT NET FINES

Patrick Mulcahy, 1, Childers Estate, Dungarvan and Thomas Leahy, 1, McCarthyville, Abbeyside pleaded guilty to a number of charges arising from the use of an illegal monofilament drift net for salmon fishing off Heilvick on May 20 last at Dungarvan Court last week.

Mr. Fergus Power, Solr. for the Southern Region Fisheries Board who prosecuted said that on the date in question, fishery officers of the Board saw a drift net at sea and saw the two defendants going away from it in a boat. The officers moved in to seize the net and the defendants then returned and admitted that the net was theirs. The officers took a sample of the net but did not seize it.

Mr. Power said that Mulcahy had a previous fishery conviction against him in 1984 but Leahy had no previous conviction. In addition to any penalties he asked for £85 costs against each of the defendants.

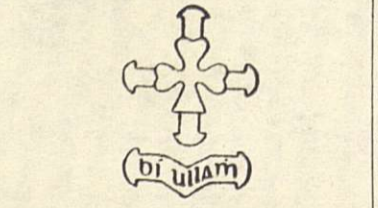
Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr. for the defendants said that all the charges were in respect of the

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BALLINAGOULD FISHERMEN FINED

When Thomas Manahan and Eamonn Donovan, both of Ballinagoul, Ring were charged with fishery offences under a number of counts at Ballinagouna Lower on May 12 last they pleaded guilty to the charges at Dungarvan Court last week.

Mr. Fergus Power, Solr. for the Fisheries Board, who prosecuted, said that the defendants had a salmon drift-net drifting beside their boat when the fishery officers came up to them but it was in excess of the permitted 35 meshes. They also had 5 salmon in the boat which they refused to hand over. He said that Manahan had a salmon licence for a net of up to 35 meshes and that as Donovan had a previous conviction for a similar offence he would, in addition to any fine, also have to be disqualified from fishing for 3 years.

Mr. Power also asked for £85 costs against each defendant. Mr. E. P. King Solr. for the defendants agreed that they should have given up the salmon on demand but added that the charge of impeding the officer's on the occasion was a very technical matter. District Justice O'Connell fined Manahan a total of £65 with £20 in respect of each of the 5 salmon in his possession. In the case of Donovan the fine totalled £140 with an additional £20 for each of the 5 salmon and he was also disqualified from fishing for 3 years. Each of the defendants was also ordered to pay £75 towards the costs.

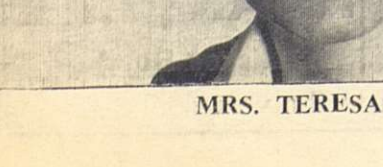

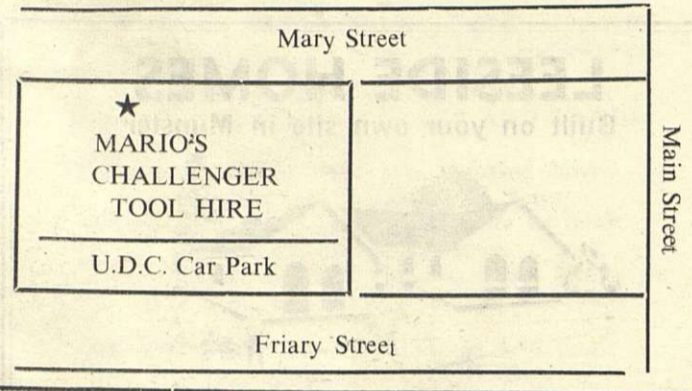

REFEREE'S REPORT

The chairman told the meeting that for the first time this year, there was nothing arising from the referee's reports and this was a welcome change. Rev. Fr. Fitzgerald said he was absolutely amazed that referees never reported the use of bad and filthy language. He said he had never heard a referee read that complained of this. He said it was disgraceful and disgusting and it was high time that some drastic action was taken to eliminate this and he reminded referees that they had a big responsibility in this matter.

Nicolas MacGrath reported on the Gaeltacht Scholarship interviews and said the standard was very satisfactory. He said that 22 had applied, but only 15 were awarded. Some of the applicants did not turn up on the day as some had either misread or ignored the instructions given on the application form. P. S. Coleman said he had received a complaint that one applicant had been given to understand that the interview date had been postponed. The chairman thanked Nicolas and the people who had performed the interviews for the Board.

Abbeyside Ballinacourty clubs were given permission for a tournament to mark the official opening of their field on August 14th. Cappoquin and Butlers-town were given permission to run tournaments, also.

STAND TICKETS

The quality of the seats for stand and sideline which were allocated to this county for the Munster final was very severely criticised by several delegates and also the poor stewarding arrangements at Limerick on last Sunday. Disgraceful and diabolical was how several members described the seating position in which Waterford patrons were placed. John Lyons complained about the position in which wheelchair patrons were placed and said apart from the fact that they could not see the game, they would have been in danger had there been a sudden exodus from the area of the stand. The chairman said the matter would be taken up by our delegates to Munster Council.

When the championship progress report was being dealt with Tom Cunningham referred to the situation arising from the fact that Roanmore and Tallow had finished level on points in their group. He said that a play-off to decide which should be placed first and second, should not take place and that this problem should be resolved by arrangement. After a long discussion it was agreed unanimously that the names be drawn from a hat when next Sunday's programme is completed. The same will apply in the case of Mount Sion and Ballygunner if they finish level on points.

Frankie Cullinane, Portlaw, informed the meeting that his club were due to meet on Tuesday to decide if they would play their game on Sunday next. It was now a meaningless match and with several players gone on holidays, the club were unlikely to interfere with their junior team.

THE RELEGATION GROUP
All four clubs who are in contention for relegation are Western based units, whatever the outcome of this intermediate hurling championship in this division will have an addition to the group next year.

The teams involved are, Dungarvan, Cappoquin, Shamrocks and Lismore. The way the four are situated at the moment, it could possibly take five instead of three matches to sort out the business.

Cappoquin, who play Dungarvan at Lismore on Sunday afternoon, have two points so if Dungarvan who have none, do win then the sides must meet again to decide which will represent the group in the actual relegation match.

Exactly the same situation obtains in the other group which is being propped up by Lismore and Shamrocks at the moment. Lismore have two points and Shamrocks have none. A win for Shamrocks would mean a play-off between the two to decide who plays Cappoquin/Dungarvan.

Cappoquin made great improvement over the past month or so, giving Ballygunner a fright, and then beating Dunhill. Dungarvan on the other hand have fared very badly and were beaten in all four matches. On form anyway, Dungarvan look to be the team destined to finish at the bottom of their group.

Lismore will find Shamrocks quite a handful in their match at Tallow, but they will have the consolation of knowing that should Shamrocks win, a second game will have to be played to decide the issue, because at the moment, Lismore have the two points. Shamrocks played very well against Tallow, in Tallow, but here they will be without Liam and Ollie Ahearne and this will be a major blow to their chances. Lismore are given the vote. If these predictions work out this way then the relegation game will involve Dungarvan and Shamrocks.

MUNSTER FINAL TICKETS
If all the Munster final tickets which issued from the County Board here were used, then a total of 1,500 Waterford people attended the games at Limerick on Sunday. The demand for tickets was unprecedented and Board officials were keeping their fingers crossed that the final did not again end in a draw.

UNDER 16 VICTORY
Someone described it as the most encouraging result for Waterford for a long time when the East Waterford under 16 hurlers defeated the favourites, East Clare in the final. It was a

tremendous display and we hasten to congratulate everyone concerned with the welcome achievement.

THE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

When the league section of the senior football championship finished on Sunday evening a total of forty-two games had been played and it is amazing now how few of them will be remembered. It was probably the most lacklustre and uninteresting championship played in the county for a long time.

It seems to me now that another look should be taken at the system and, perhaps, consideration given to a return to the knock-out arrangements again. When I mentioned this to a colleague recently he made the point that the intermediate and junior football championships are a great success and being followed with tremendous local interest and that these, also, were played on a league basis. This being so, one must go further to find the answer to what is wrong at senior level. Perhaps it is the fact that fourteen senior football teams is far too many in a county of our size? Another suggestion came to me that the number of clubs allowed to enter for senior football be reduced to eight and six clubs be demoted to the intermediate championships. An eight team group with all teams meeting would involve twenty-eight games up to the knock-out stage (as against forty-two at present). The top three teams to qualify and the second and third to play-off for the right to meet the top team in the county final.

This might be worthy of consideration and there may be better systems, but whatever is done, there must be a change. At the end of round seven the table reads:—

"Around The Boree Log" is a book of verses about the Irish settlers in Australia. The name of the author, "John O'Brien", hides the identity of Fr. John Hartigan who travelled widely as a priest through Australia in his time and who, when his collection of verses were published, became known as the Poet Laureate of the Irish settlers in Australia.

"Around The Boree Log" has been given a new lease of life by the recital of a series of verses from the book on Radio Eireann during the past week and our choice for the ballad corner this week is the title poem in the book. It is interesting to note that the word "boree" is the aboriginal name for the Weeping Myall, the best firewood in Australia except Gidgee:—

and rain,

I want to feel the pulse of
love that warmed the blood
like wine;
I want to see the smile above
this kind old land of mine.

So come you by your parted
ways that wind the wild
world through,
And make a ring around the
blaze the way we used to
do;
The "fountain" in the sooted
corner will sing the old, old
song
Of common joys in homely
vein forgotten, ah, too long

"The years have turned the
rusty key and times is on
the log,
Yet spend another night
with me around the boree
log,
(repeat after 4th & 6th
verses).

Now someone driving through
the rain will happen in, I
bet.
So fill the fountain up again,
and leave the table set.
For this was ours with pride
to say — and all the world
defy—
No stranger ever turned away,

Open Space At Townparks, Lismore

In a report submitted by Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager to the July monthly meeting of the County Council it was recalled that following representations from the Residents Association and local Council members, it was agreed that the open space at Townparks, Lismore, would be left as an open space to be developed by the residents.
