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VIPs AT DUNGARVAN GOLF CLUB

The annual Yoplait Amm-Amm competition at Dungarvan Golf Club over last weekend attracted a big field of competitors, all of whom got plenty of fresh air at the bracing seaside course at Ballinacourty over the two days.

Sponsored by Waterford Co-op Society, a number of VIP's responded to the invitations to participate and these included the head of one of the country's largest supermarket chains and a Government Minister.

The competitors went out in teams of four and playing on the team of Mr. Stephen O'Connor, the Co-op's Chief Executive, were Minister for Agriculture & Food, Mr. Michael O'Kennedy, Mr. Don Tidy, the supermarket chief who was the centre of a dramatic kidnap drama which electrified the nation a few years ago and Mr. Dan Hurley, Waterford County Manager.

In the normal manner Minister O'Kennedy was accompanied by his driver/bodyguard while members of the bodyguard which Mr. Tidy has ever since his kidnap experience were also never too far away from him. In addition two detective/gardai from Dungarvan were also on hand in case of any emergency but thankfully none arose.

FOR MAJOR BRITISH TOURNAMENT

And while on the subject of golf we are pleased to note that a former Waterford hurler is to carry Munster hopes into the British Open Golf Championship for Seniors (over 55) which will take place at Royal Burgess and Bruntsfield Links on August 3 and 4. He is Jack Fives, member of the well-known and highly popular Fives family of Tourin who worked in Fords of Cork for 33 years.

Jack, a member of Cork Golf Club and formerly of Monks-town, plays off a four handicap. With his brothers Moss, Tom, Paddy and Jim he played hurling for his home club Tourin in the late forties and 1950's. And in those days the "Leader" had a famous local correspondent in Cappoquin, one John F ("Jampot") Ryan who often wrote that three fives (15) made up the personnel of any team but a team with five Fives could not be matched or beaten and that is probably why Tourin enjoyed such supremacy in those days!

DISC PARKING IN DUNGARVAN

Large signs located on the principal roads leading to Dungarvan proclaim in bilingual terms that disc parking is in operation in the town. The parking regulations apply to those streets where one and two hour restrictions were in force prior to the introduction of the new system. O'Connell Street is one of the streets where disc parking now operates on a one-hour basis with the additional free half-hour as included in the

regulations by the local Urban Council.

On Friday last July 22 we noticed a car which was parked in the street for long periods, on one stretch from before 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. and it displayed neither a parking disc nor a parking docket during that period.

In our own case (as is also the case of other traders and residents in O'Connell Street), we have to be most careful when parking for a period in the street to place the vehicle outside the disc parking zone or if within it to display a parking disc and to ensure the vehicle is left there for not more than the hour and a half permitted. Otherwise it will be tagged with a parking docket.

Does this then mean that the disc parking system is being operated on some kind of selective basis or can there be some other explanation for it?

PROFILE ON CO. COUNCIL'S NEW CHAIRMAN

The election of Cllr. Billy Kyne as Chairman of Waterford County Council last month saw the well-known Abbeyside man realise one of the main ambitions of his career in public life to date. Cllr. Kyne is a member of both the County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council and has already had the honour of being elected first citizen of his native Dungarvan when he was chosen as Chairman of the local Council for the year 1984/85.

There was a most interesting profile of Cllr. Kyne in the July issue of the Abbeyside "Parish News" and it is from this that we quote now to inform our readers of the background of the man who is carrying on, in the family tradition set by his late father, the principles and policies of the Labour Party in Co. Waterford.

Billy Kyne was born in December 1947, the fifth and youngest in the family of Tom and Abbie Kyne who then resided at King Street, Abbeyside. His elder sister, Mary, is a nurse with Dungarvan Crystal while his other sister, Ann, is married to Mr. Dan Lynch, Publican, Middleton. He has two brothers, Anthony who lives in Wales and Garvan, a sea-captain on the Continental Lines and formerly with Irish Shipping who, between his sea voyages, continues to live in the old home at Murphy Place to where the Kynes moved in 1957.

Educated at Abbeyside National School and the Friary College, Dungarvan young Billy became a member of the Abbeyside Boy Scouts and joined the Abbeyside soccer club. His sporting interests were subsequently devoted almost entirely to soccer and as well as being a player, he became involved as an organiser. Indeed his interest in soccer is still very much alive and he was one of the 13,000 Irish supporters who had the privilege of being in Germany last month to see Ireland's soccer heroes come of age on the European soccer scene.

He joined the workforce of Waterford Co-op as an apprentice fitter in 1966 and having qualified he remained on in employment there. In 1974 he married the former Kay Donnelly of Keating Street, Dun-

Dungarvan Charity To Benefit From Court Appeal

A Dungarvan charity is to benefit to the extent of £200 with a down payment of £60 on the direction of Judge D. P. Sheridan arising from the hearing of an appeal at the Trinity Sittings of Dungarvan Circuit Court, which opened at the Courthouse, Dungarvan last Tuesday.

Martin Lennon, Beechwood Grove, Portlaoise who was originally fined £35 and disqualified from driving for 12 months following his conviction at KilmacThomas Court on April 15, 1987 on a charge of driving with excess alcohol at Bonmahon on August 24, 1986 appealed against the conviction at the Circuit sessions held in Dungarvan in July 1987.

At that time Judge Sheridan agreed to adjourn the matter for 12 months to allow the defendant to pay a sum of £200 in the meantime to a charity to be nominated by the court. The appeal again came before the court by way of review last Tuesday.

Martin Lennon in evidence said that he had been working off and on for the past several months. He had saved £60 and other money was due to him in August.

In reply to Judge Sheridan

witness said that this money would go towards paying the balance of the £200 and also the amount of the fine.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., who appeared for the applicant, told the court that Lennon had not come under garda attention since the last hearing.

Judge Sheridan then asked the State Solr. Mr. A. V. Maher, who prosecuted for the name of a local charity and Mr. Maher recommended the Sesame School for handicapped children in Dungarvan, a charity which he said was funded mainly by local contributions.

Judge Sheridan said that, usually he directed such payments to be made to the St. Vincent de Paul Society but he felt it would be no harm to make a change in this case and he directed that the £60 paid in by the defendant be handed over to the Sesame School and that when the balance of £140 was paid that this also be paid over to the Sesame School.

He then adjourned the appeal temporarily to the next sessions which he said would give the defendant ample time to pay the balance of the compensation amount fixed.

LIFEBOAT AND HELICOPTER IN HOAX SEARCH OFF HELVICK

Storm force gales accompanied by torrential rain lashed the south coast in common with other parts of the country on last Sunday night and at the height of the storm shortly before midnight, Dunmore East lifeboat was launched in four conditions to answer emergency distress flares spotted off Helvick Head at around 10 p.m.

The lifeboat, headed to the scene between Helvick and Mine Head and carried out a search but nothing was found. Early

on Monday morning a helicopter of the Air-Sea Rescue Service carried out a further search of the area but found nothing either.

Some early reports suggested that the flares, about seven in numbers seen at five minute intervals, may have been sent up by a yacht, heading east after the Cork Week Yacht races at Crosshaven. However, it was confirmed later on Monday that the flares were set off by young people at a bonfire party in Ring on Sunday night and the whole thing turned out to be a hoax.

COMPLETELY IRRESPONSIBLE

On Monday evening Dr. Brendan Farrell launching officer of Dunmore East Lifeboat "St. Patrick" expressed outrage and condemned the utter irresponsibility of the action of those who discharged the distress flares during the bonfire party in Ring on Sunday night. He said that he was furious that the lives of the lifeboat crew had been placed in such jeopardy by being called out at the height of the gale to go on a long, dangerous and wasted trip as a result.

STORM DAMAGE

Despite the intensity of the storm stated to be the worst July storm on record, no great damage has been reported although orchards, except those in sheltered locations, got a bad fleecing with more young apple winding up on the ground than remained on the trees, after the big wind.

CYCLING

TOUR OF IRELAND - YOPLAIT STAGE-END

The junior tour comes to Dungarvan for the first time on Wednesday August 3. This race for U-18 year old cyclists is the most prestigious event of its kind held in the home counties. The six day event which starts in Cork and makes its way to Dublin, will have an over night stop in Dungarvan after the fourth stage from Limerick.

In last year's record entry of 180 riders expected to be equalled it promises to maintain a very high standard of racing especially with a record entry of overseas riders.

Locals will have plenty to cheer about as Robert Power, the new Irish Road Race champion will be riding and is one of the favourites for the overall honours. He is a rider of exceptional all round ability which is essential for this type

of racing, and with his current good form which he has carried through from the recent world championships where he was brought down in a crash he will be one of the most closely marked riders.

It will be remembered by many as Stephen Spratt's first big break through when he won the race in '83 and was 4th in '84. Other past winners are Gary Thomson who won a stage into Dungarvan in the '83 Milk Ras, and Martin Early who now rides on Sean Kelly's Kas team.

The stage to Dungarvan will be over 70 miles starting in Limerick at 11 a.m. and is expected in town at 1.30 p.m. to finish in Grattan Square after 3 laps of the by-pass circuit. The fifth stage will leave the Square at 10 a.m. on Thursday morning enroute to Arklow.

Tallow Credit Union Reaches Magic £1 Million In Savings-

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Appeal Against Dangerous Driving Conviction

James O'Brien, Kilmolash, Cappoquin, successfully appeared at Dungarvan Circuit Court against conviction on a charge of dangerous driving arising from a collision which took place at Cook Street, Cappoquin on December 20, 1987. He was convicted at Cappoquin Court, on February 2 last and fined £50 and ordered to pay £50 expenses.

Mr. A. V. Maher, State Solr., who prosecuted said that Liam Kavanagh, the driver of the car which was struck by the car driven by Mr. O'Brien was not available to give evidence in the appeal as he had

left the jurisdiction but Robert McCarthy who was a front seat passenger in Kavanagh's car on the occasion was present in Court.

Robert McCarthy, Ballyduff, then gave evidence and said that on the day in question he was a front seat passenger in Mr. Kavanagh's car and at 1.30 p.m. they were driving from Dungarvan to Cappoquin. As they approached Flynn's Guest

House, at Cook Street, where Mr. Kavanagh was staying the driver indicated that he was moving to the right, and the other car then came up from behind them as if it was going to pass-out and struck them on the right-hand side. Their car was pushed into a wall by the impact. After the collision witness said he got out, and spoke to the other driver who said he was going to pass on their left

but found there was not enough room. He then panicked and went to pass on their right side.

Garda O. Croke, Cappoquin said that he went to the scene of the accident at 1.50 p.m., that day. He met the drivers of the two cars involved and made a sketch which was produced. He said that Cook Street was an exceptionally narrow street and prior to the accident, O'Brien was driving behind Kavanagh and went to over take him. Witness added that he checked both indicators in Kavanagh's car and found both in working order.

At this stage Judge Sheridan said he was satisfied that the defendant's driving on the occasion was not dangerous whatever about being careless and he reduced the charge accordingly.

The defendant James O'Brien then gave evidence and said that on the day in question he was driving to a match in Fermoy. He was behind a car which braked several times as they approached Cook Street and he got the impression that it was going to pull-up on the left. It was then that he made to pass the car on the right but just as he was about to pass the car turned over to the right and although he tried to avoid it he failed and there was a collision. The other car gave no indication that it was going to pull into the right. Witness added that he was not going at an excessive speed and was doing about 25 m.p.h. at the time.

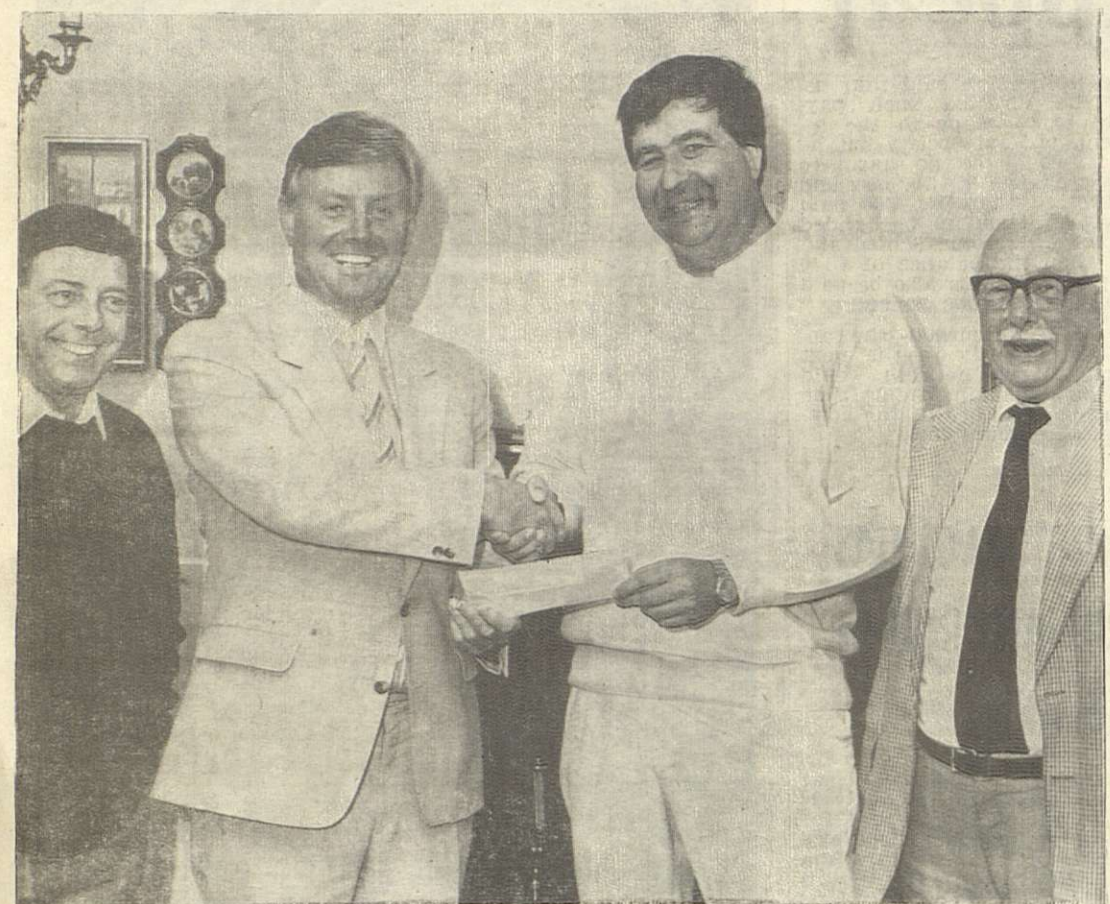
Judge Sheridan remarked that the roadway at the point was very narrow and there was very little room for 2 cars to pass there.

The defendant resumed his evidence and said he had no recollection of having any conversation with Robert McCarthy. "I never said anything to him about panicking and only spoke to the Garda" he said.

A FAIR WHACK
Witness concluded his evidence by saying that there was £1,400 damage done to his car and £1,600 damage to the other car.

Judge Sheridan then said that he had found Mr. McCarthy's evidence that of a very reliable and very honest witness and was not impressed by the two witnesses for the defence either. "But", he said "without Mr. Kavanagh to give evidence, the case is something like Hamlet without the prince". He then dismissed the reduced charge of careless driving against the defendant and said that he would allow the parties to follow their own civil remedies in the matter.

Mr. J. Martin B.L. (Instructed by Mr. M. J. Hanrahan Solr.) appeared for the defendant.

IFA WELCOME EEC BEEF MANAGEMENT DECISION

The decision of the EEC Beef Management Committee to increase the export refunds of live cattle by 13% from Wednesday, July 20, has been welcomed by IFA.

This was stated by Mr. Tom Leahy, Chairman of Waterford IFA Livestock Committee, who said the decision represented an important element of competition within the beef market.

Producers, he said, will see it as a safety net under cattle prices in view of the fact that the Commission had already reduced intervention support under the recent Price Agreement which took effect from Monday, July 11.

Mr. Leahy said that the live trade has declined sharply in recent years from 277,000 in 1981 to 59,000 tonnes in 1987, which represents a mere 3.3% of the total cattle kill. This, he said, was due to the lack of support for the live trade.

Mr. Leahy also welcomed the sale of 200,000 tonnes of beef from intervention stores to Russia as the high stocks of 750,000 tonnes in intervention had cast a cloud over the overall market.

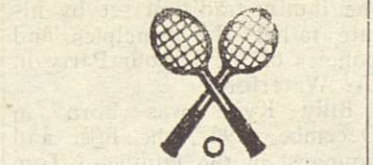
NEAR PERFECT WEATHER FOR OPEN WEEK!

Tennis For Elite Only In Dungarvan?

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their monthly meeting last Monday week made complaints that tennis courts at the Causeway, Abbeyside, developed by public funds, were now reserved for the use of an elite group and that the public generally were excluded.

The matter was raised by Cllr. P. Power who referred to the fact that additional courts to those already in use were now being developed at the Causeway complex. He could not understand why the 4 new courts were not placed in some other area of the town where they could be used by the general public and not become the exclusive use of members of the club now operating at the Causeway.

Cllr. Mary Dixon said that she was aware that two girls went into the Courts at the Causeway recently and they were hunted. "It was taxpayers' money that went into the place and the public should be entitled to play there and it should not be reserved for the elite," she said.

Cllr. T. Wright said that numerous youngsters had come to him to complain that they had been hunted when they went there. "I thought that there was a place here for the public to play on," he said.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that they had to realise that there was a club at the Causeway which administered and controlled the tennis courts and the courts had been given to the club on this understanding. As far as he was aware anyone who wanted to play at the Causeway had to first join the club. "A person just can't walk in and play there," he said.

Cllr. Dixon said that she was not knocking that but she wanted to make the point that this was a public place, whereas

the public should be able to play. "Lots of children don't have the £20 to pay to join the club and it's not fair to them," she said.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, said that two new courts were being laid down at the Causeway but he did not know off-hand whether these would also now come under the jurisdiction of the Club or not.

Cllr. Dixon said that she was of opinion when the place was first developed that children

could go in there anytime and play a game. "I think that it should be possible for any youngster who wants to go in to have a game there at anytime," she added.

The Chairman, Cllr. A. Hallahan said that it would be as well for the Council to ascertain whether the facilities at the Causeway were restricted totally to the members of the club or whether the new areas now laid down were available to the public.

LOTTERY FUNDS

The Town Clerk pointed out that the development at the Causeway was being carried out by the County Council and not by the Urban Council and the cost was being funded by money from the National Lottery.

The discussion ended with Cllr. Wright remarking that the respective of which the club there has to say I think it should be put to them that the ordinary Joe Soaps should at least be left in to use the practice courts."

It was agreed that the query suggested by the Chairman should be put to the Committee of the Tennis Club for their observation.

However Cllr. Wright at once objected stating that he was not in favour of the children doing this road safety work as they were unable to be there all the time that the traffic control was required. As an amendment he proposed that an adult warden be appointed as had been approved by the Council in 1986 and for which money had been provided at the time.

Mr. White then pointed out that under the regulations of the National Safety Council, a junior and an adult scheme could not operate side by side.

Cllr. Mary Dixon seconded Cllr. Wright's proposal but the Chairman, Cllr. A. Hallahan, ruled it out of order and despite Cllr. Wright's continued calls to obtain legal advice on the point he put Cllr. O'Riordan's proposal and declared it carried on a 6-2 vote.

BLUE FLAG AWARDS FOR ARDMORE, CLONEA DUNMORE

The Blue Flag of Environmental Excellence for 1988 has been attributed by an international jury to 392 beaches and 102 ports and marinas throughout the European Community. Of these 392 Blue Flags, 19 have attributed to Ireland and of these 3 have been attributed to beaches in Co. Waterford at Tramore, Clonea (Dungarvan) and Dunmore East.

The Blue Flags Project was started throughout the European Community in 1987 as part of the European Year of the Environment. It sets a number of criteria often higher than strictly required under Community law.

The beaches of Ardmore, Clonea and Dunmore were also awarded the Blue Flag in 1987 so it can be seen that the proper environmental standards are being retained at all three.

At the presentation of the Blue Flags in Dublin last week, Mr. Terry Stewart, Director, European Commission, Dublin heartily congratulated all the winners and said that he had no doubt as they became more familiar with the scheme many more beaches would be included — there are 600 miles of sandy beaches around the Irish coastline. He added that it was important that anyone visiting Irish beaches should be as far as possible assured of high standards.

"The Blue Flag" said Mr. Stewart, "is only one part of an overall movement to improve the environment throughout the Community. Ireland has many advantages and the protection of the environment can now be seen to have substantial economic benefit".

WHAT TO DO AT A WATER BASED ACCIDENT

If you happen to be at the scene of a water based accident or you hear a cry for help from someone in difficulties in water, the Water Safety section of the National Safety Council advises that you should:

- Assess the situation for a moment or two;
- See if there is anything about that could be used - a ring buoy, a long stick, piece of rope etc.;
- Can the person be reached and pulled to safety?;
- Can you throw something that is buoyant and which can be grasped;
- Can you wade out to the person safely?;

Swimming rescue should only be attempted as a last resort and then only by trained lifesavers.

If you see a need for a marine rescue you should dial 999, ask for the Emergency Services, give the location and state the emergency.

They went home in high expectancy and relishing the prospect of another set-to with Mount Sion and a chance to prove that they were 'caught on-the-hop' three weeks ago. But this never happened. Mount Sion went about their business in a proper way and beat the favourites, Ballygunner narrowly but fairly in a game that was enjoyable without producing brilliant hurling.

Ballygunner are on record as having said that winning a county championship without beating Mount Sion on the way was not the same thing. They may now say that there will be something special about beating them in the County final. That would certainly be regarded as a great bonus for the city challengers. But at the moment we cannot write too much about any such possibilities. There are two others left in the championship as well.

Portlaw have exposed their anger over the manner in which the final round of the senior hurling championship was arranged. Playing Roanmore and Tallow a week early and having Roanmore qualify, meant that themselves and Clonea were really playing for nothing. Had the situation been reversed, had the difference that it would have made, was that the status of the Portlaw/Clonea match would have been much higher and that is on the presumption that Roanmore, regardless of when that particular game would have been played.

Kilgobnet won two precious league points when beating Abbeyside in their intermediate tie at Fraher field on Sunday. Unquestionably the feature of this match was the remarkable accuracy of young Pat Power who gave an exhibition of sharp shooting that is rarely seen in games in this grade (or any other) here. I suppose one could also say that a feature of the game from the Abbeyside point of view was the amount of fouling by the losers. Ten of Kilgobnet's points came from free Abbeyside's biggest weakness was in their forward division who missed several scoring opportunities.

For patrons the worst value of the week-end perhaps of the championship was the Ballyduff/Dunhill senior hurling match at Fraher field on Saturday. It was the most lopsided game of the entire championship and a match of the previous week-end and for the most part, this schedule involved a switch from football to hurling, resulting in an unbearable strain on players.

Dunhill looked battle-weary going out, on to the field and it was sad to see them struggle against Ballyduff. Winning the hurling and football double was achieved by Mount Sion when both championships were played on a knock-out basis and there was ample breathing space between matches. It is much different when competitions are on a league system and players are required to line out every week-end. Ballyduff didn't have this problem and were fresher and more eager and this helped them to win so easily.

There are quite a few problems to be sorted out by the Western Board's fixtures committee when they meet at Dungarvan on to-morrow, Thursday night. They intend to produce a month long fixture schedule. Among other matters discussed will be the under 21 football championship, which may be run on a 'blitz' system.

In the Silver Master Singles, our representative in this Grade 'A' competition was Deeky Mulcahy who was defending his All-Ireland title which he won last year. He defeated Limerick's D. Duggan in two thrilling games on the score 21-17 and 21-18. So it was a real cliff-hanger in these two games with Mulcahy giving one of his best ever displays.

In the Masters Doubles, our representatives were M. Butler and J. O'Connell and they were very well and gave impressive displays in winning 21-6 and 21-7 over the Limerick pair. Having so outclassed Limerick our men will now be fancied to beat Tipperary in the semi-final which comes up shortly.

Some awful decisions that had to be seen to be believed, made it impossible for our representatives J. J. Wright and M. Butler in our contest with Tipperary. His bias in favour of his own county made it easy for Tipp, and had a neutral judge officiated here, the Waterford club, Kilgobnet, who lost narrowly on the scores, 21-17 and 21-19, could have won.

Dungarvan Town Dump To Be Extended

The Dungarvan town dump at Ballinamuck which has given rise to many controversial discussions in the past because of its proximity to the River Colligan is to be further extended. The existing dump which covers an area of more than 8.5 acres is to be extended by a further 6.5 acres, at the request of Waterford Co. Council who are now responsible for the control and management of the dump. The request was approved by Dungarvan Urban Council at their July monthly meeting.

Mr. D. McCarthy Town Engineer in reply to a query by Cllr. B. White said that the extension was required because the dump was being filled at a much faster rate than had been estimated when the last extension took place. It was supposed to last for 5 years then but had been filled in half that time.

Cllr. T. Wright, stating that he did not agree with the location of the dump so close to the river because of pollution, proposed that this further extension be refused.

Cllr. P. Power also said that he had always been opposed to the proximity of the dump to the river and he seconded the proposal.

Stating that the local freshwater anglers were pleased at the way the last extension to the dump was being managed, Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that he had visited the Colligan in the vicinity of the dump a few days previously and had found the water in the river crystal clear. "If the proposed extension will be under the same management and control as the last one, I would be in agreement with it and I propose that the extension be approved" he said.

Cllr. B. White said while he acknowledged the good work which was now taking place at the dump he would oppose the new extension because of the underestimate of the usage for the last extension.

Cllr. M. Dixon seconded Cllr. O'Riordan's proposal which on a vote was declared carried by a majority of 6-3 for Cllr. Wright's proposal.

FARM SAFETY

Summertime imposes a heavy responsibility on farmers for safety on the farm, particularly in regard to children and visitors.

Danger points are:

- 1-Riding on tractors and trailers.
- 2-Loading bales.
- 3-Chemicals in storage and spraying.
- 4-PTO shafts.
- 5-Unhung gates.
- 6-Unfenced slurry compounds and uncovered effluent tanks.
- 7-Overhead electric cables.
- 8-Agitating slurry tanks in enclosed spaces. Beware especially where sludge effluent is mixed with slurry.

Remember to unload that shotgun or rifle and to keep it and ammunition out of harms way.

ARABLE SILAGE

Where peas are included, harvest when the bottom pods are about one inch and top still in flower. If no peas included, harvest oats when fully headed, or barley when the milky ripe stage is reached. Use 25% more acid on arable silage than on grass.

KALE

Flea beetle in Kale can be controlled by spraying with Decies or BHC Pinholes in the cotyledon leaves are the signs of attack.

DUNGARVAN QUAY REALLY LOOKS SHABBY SAYS CLLR.

The need to clean up the quay area in Dungarvan was stressed by Cllr. Mary Dixon at the July monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council. Tourists and visitors to the town went down there, she said, and with the protective chains and some of the stores derelict looking, this was not good enough. The whole place should be cleaned up and seats placed there where people could sit and relax.

Cllr. Dixon said that she also objected to the manner in which goods were littered about the quay from stores located there and she felt that the Council were far too lax in dealing with this. "The place really looks shabby and it's not good enough" she added.

Cllr. P. Power agreed and said that the quay certainly

needed to be cleaned and tidied up. Mr. Denis McCarthy, Town Engineer said that some of the stores at the quay were at present the subject of a planning application under which they would eventually be cleaned up.

The Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White, pointed out that the Council had, in the past, taken legal proceedings about the goods left out which obstructed the quay. He added that there would be considerable disruption along the quay between now and the end of the year because of the new sewerage scheme and there would be no point in doing anything there until this work was completed.

However the points made by Cllr. Dixon and Power were noted for future reference.

It was in 1948, one year after Billy was born, that his father the late Tom Kyne was first elected to Dail Eireann as a member to the Labour Party and he was re-elected as a Dail Deputy for the Constituency from then for a period of 24 years until 1977 with one break in service. This long involvement with politics and public life by the Kyne family was, no doubt, a factor in having Billy decide to venture into public life and he was elected for the first time in 1979 when he took his seat as a member of the Labour Party on the Urban Council. When his father, who was a member of the County Council, died in 1981, Billy was co-opted to fill the vacancy and in the subsequent local elections in 1985 he was elected in his own right as a member of that body.

In addition to his membership of the County Council and Urban Councils, Clr. Kyne is also a member of the South Eastern Health Board and of the County Vocational Education Committee and he operates a regular "clinic" where members of the public, regardless of their political persuasions, can come and discuss problems relating to the various public services with him. In this regard he made the point that he sometimes gets credit for "getting" things for people when in fact these people get only what they are entitled to.
