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CHARITY COLLECTIONS

At a recent meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the following resolution received from Killarney Urban Council was unanimously adopted: "That we request the Minister for Justice to introduce new legislation immediately with regard to the issuing of permits for so-called charitable organisations who are selling cards in cities and towns throughout the country causing much annoyance to the general public, especially elderly people and tourists."

We wholeheartedly endorse this resolution as we have seen strangers in Dungarvan from time to time carrying out what can only be described as an aggressive sales campaign selling raffle tickets and cards. These people usually take their stands outside the Banks and subject people going about their business to their annoying demands. Whether they are always covered by permits is immaterial; it's the manner of their persistent approach which is annoying and which most people find objectionable.

Incidentally while on this subject of charity collections we think that as far as the general public are concerned it would be well for the various organisations now seeking aid for those Third World areas which are experiencing crises caused by flooding and famine to synchronise their efforts.

We are all well aware of the present desperate plight of the people of the Sudan, of Bangladesh and of Ethiopia and are not unmindful of the need to help them. Last Sunday the Gorta organisation conducted a church gate collection for this purpose and we are sure that the public contributed in their usual generous fashion. However next Sunday has been designated by the Concern organisation as "Sudan Sunday" when the public will again be asked to contribute for the same purpose. Then the Gorta organisation is making daily appeals through the media for funds also for Sudan, Bangladesh and Ethiopia.

We think it is a bit much that the public should be subjected to this almost incessant barrage from varying organisations all seeking assistance for the same purpose. Wouldn't it be a good idea if they could join forces in a single appeal and so save the public from much of the embarrassment they are subjected to when Sunday after Sunday they have to run the gauntlet of collectors.

VANDALISM

There has been a great deal of vandalism of public property in and around Dungarvan in recent months. At the last meeting of the local Urban Council the damage to the children's playground at Quann's and the removal of ropes from lifebuoys around the seafront was condemned and a call was made to the

public to display some civic spirit by reporting acts of vandalism to the authorities whenever they saw them happen.

There has also been a great deal of window breaking around the town and district while on Wednesday night of last week a big number of cars parked outside a local hotel had their tyres slashed and were badly damaged in other ways.

WRONG CATEGORY

In the National Tidy Towns Results 1988 published last week by Bord Fáilte, the awards and marks were allocated under six different categories, A to F, on the basis of population.

The return for Dungarvan showed it classified as Category E which was for towns with a population in the 3001-5,000 range. On the other hand Tramore was classified as Category F which is for entries with a population of 5,001 and over.

GUIDE TO THE RIVER BLACKWATER

A few weeks ago we referred to J. R. O'Flanagan's "A Guide To The Blackwater," loaned to us by Mrs. McGrath of Sunlawn Cappoquin and to the references in the book about Lismore Castle. In these it was stated that King James II visited the castle in 1689 but we have been taken to task on this on the point that the brief reign of James II ended in 1688 so that he could not possibly have been in Lismore a year later. The error made by Mr. O'Flanagan, it would appear, when he was compiling his "Guide" in 1844.

Despite that, we return to the book again this week for a further reference in regard to Lismore. Having commented that Lismore, as the place where the compact was made under which the chiefs of Munster together with the hierarchy swore allegiance to Henry II in 1172 and under which Ireland was given over to English rule, author O'Flanagan goes on to write about the Lismore Cathedral in the following terms:

"The Cathedral Church is close to the castle; the approach is from the town, through an avenue with a fine row of trees. It is the only remaining ancient church of those formerly here (some say as many as twenty), and was dedicated to St. Carthach. This sacred edifice was often in considerable danger. In 1173, when Raymond le Gros and Strongbow wasted the Decies country, they extorted a large sum of money from the then bishop to prevent the cathedral from being burned. The great care bestowed did not always avail. It sustained considerable damage in Elizabeth's reign from Edmund Fitzgibbon, called the White Knight, so called most probably from the colour of his armour. It was restored in 1663, at the

TIDY TOWNS

Ardmore Scores Top Marks In County

Ardmore with a total of 175 marks out of a maximum of 200 (87.5%) again proved to be the highest marked entrant in Co. Waterford in the 1988 Bord Fáilte Tidy Towns Competitions, the results of which were announced last week.

Overall national winner was Carlingford, Co. Louth, which scored a total of 181 marks — 6 marks ahead of Ardmore. Marks allocated to the various entries from the County were as follows with percentage score in brackets:

- Category A (not exceeding a population of 200): Abbeyside 139 (69.5); Ballymacarby 171 (85.5); Clashmore 159 (79.5); Passage East 174 (87.0); Villierstown 157 (78.5)
- Category B (pop. 201-500): Ardmore 175 (87.5); Crooke 155 (77.5); Stradbally 173 (86.5)
- Category C (pop. 501-1,500): Cappoquin 157 (78.5); Lismore 154 (77.0); Portlaw 145 (72.5); Tallow 132 (66.0)
- Category D (pop. 1,501-3,000): Dunmore East 171 (85.5)
- Category E (pop. 3,001-5,000): Dungarvan 152 (76.0)
- Category F (pop. 5,001 and over): Tramore 163 (81.5)

ARDMORE LOSE MARKS ON APPROACH ROADS APPEARANCE

Although Ardmore dropped marks in this year's Tidy Towns Competition it still

scored enough to win the County Award for the 8th time in a row. With a total of 175 out of a 200 maximum, 3 less than last year, it might well have figured in the national awards were it not for a drop in the marks for the appearance of approach roads (from 33 to 31) and the presentation of residential area (from 18 to 17).

The Secretary of the Ardmore Tidy Towns Committee, Mrs. Caroline Bor, n-Walsh, has expressed the hope that with a return to full community involvement they would do much better next year and return to their former high standard.

The following is the Adjudicators Report for Ardmore: **Effort (40) - 37** — Despite the obvious enthusiasm and commitment of the committee this year is a little disappointing as you know there must be scarcely anything out of place in a Tidy Town. Quite a few problems are noted in Ardmore this year. Your detailed report was most helpful during the adjudication.

Political Patronage Alleged In V.E.C. Teacher Allocations

While he did not wish to make a political issue of the situation he had to say that the teacher allocation as far as the Co. Waterford Vocational Schools was concerned was political patronage of the worst kind stated Cllr. B. Kyne at a meeting of the County Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan last Monday. Referring to the teacher allocation to the county for 1988/89, Cllr. Kyne said that it was quite clear that Waterford had been singled out for particularly unfair treatment. "Constituencies which have senior Government Ministers have received very fair teacher allocations but Waterford which has always been known as the gentle county has been discriminated against, to an extent that can only have a devastating effect on the quality of vocational education in the county," he said.

Cllr. Kyne went on to say that it was time for the local Fianna Fáil Deputies to come out openly and to take up the issue with the Government.

Cllr. P. Coffey Chairman, said that the V.E.C. had already circled the four T.D.'s in the constituency about the teacher allocation problem and had urged that they take up the matter with the Minister for Education. He expressed concern at the latest developments and warned that the very future of two of the most successful vocational schools in the country could be jeopardised by the unequal manner in

which they were now being treated by the Department.

MOST CATASTROPHIC Strong criticism was also voiced by members, at the absence of remedial teachers for the Vocational Schools in the county and it was felt that this could be the most catastrophic failure of all on the part of the Department.

Finally it was agreed to request the two Fianna Fáil T.D.'s for the constituency to directly take up as a matter of urgency with the Department the matter of the teacher allocation for the county and it was also decided that until a final decision on the matter was reached by the Department, the principals, vice-principals and the T.U.I. representatives be invited to attend all meetings of the Committee.

COUNTY ROADS HAVE BEEN ABANDONED SAYS CLLR.

Moving a motion at the September monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan that a request be made to the Government to allocate a percentage of National Lottery monies each year to Local Authorities for the sole purpose of county roads maintenance, Cllr. J. A. Walsh said that the present and past governments had adopted a policy of abandoning county roads and as a result, millions of £'s spent in the past had now gone down the drain.

"Something must be done if we are to save these roads and the situation must be regarded as an emergency and treated as a high priority," he said.

The motion was seconded by Cllr. C. O'Riain who said that the condition of the county roads was deteriorating rapidly as no work was being done on them. "In a short time they will be impassable," he added.

The motion was passed.

HEDGE CUTTING Cllr. Walsh also moved a motion requesting the Council to include as a priority the cutting of hedges and the scarring of roads at the Council's next estimates meeting. He said that the present condition of the hedges gave a bad effect to the work being done by the Council. It was decided to refer the motion to the Estimates meeting.

O'Connell at Dungarvan Court last week on a charge of stealing floor boards valued £20 the property of William Foley from the Ashcroft housing estate Abbeyside on October 16 1987.

William Foley in evidence told the court that he was a building contractor and they were building a housing estate known as Ashcroft at Abbeyside. There was a lock-up shed on the site where materials were kept but some material was also left around the houses that were being erected. He was shown a number of floor boards by Garda Twomey which were similar to ones used on the site. These could have come from the site but he could not be certain of that.

Cross-examined by Mr. Lavan witness agreed that he was one of two directors of the firm building the houses at Ashcroft and the timber concerned would have been the property of the firm.

NO DOUBT District Justice O'Connell giving his decision said that he completely accepted Garda Twomey's evidence that he had found the defendant at 4 o'clock in the morning with these boards in his possession and he had no doubt but that he stole them and he accordingly convicted him.

Inspector Hayes then stated that the defendant had a long list of previous convictions. Mr. Lavan for the defendant said that there had been no proper identification of the boards submitted to the court and the value on them was not very great. He added that the defendant was in rather poor circumstances.

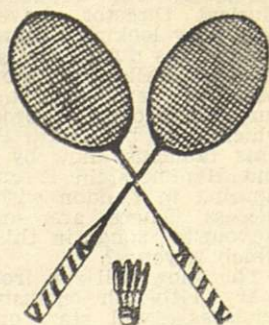

Twomey stated in evidence that at 4.10 a.m. on the date in question he was on duty at the Garda Station when he got a phone call as a result of which he went to Abbeyside in the patrol car and the defendant in the vicinity of his own home. He said that the defendant had 8 lengths of floor boards under his arm.

Witness went on to say that he questioned Needham who told him that he had got the timber from a building site "down the road there." Needham, he said, admitted that he had no permission from anyone to take the timber and said that he wanted it to fix his pigeon house.

Cross-examined by Mr. Lavan who asked who had made the phone call, witness replied that he did not know as it had been an anonymous call.

Sean Needham giving evidence on his own behalf said that when Garda Twomey met him he had the timber in his possession but he said that when the Guard asked where he had got it he told him that he had got it from McInerney's, which was another building site. The boards he had at the time had been thrown around the site there and he took them "as he felt they had been abandoned," he said.

Cross-examined by Inspector Hayes witness agreed that he kept pigeons and that he told Garda Twomey that he wanted the boards to fix his pigeon house. He denied that he had said he had got the boards at the Ashcroft site.

Questioned by the Inspector as to why he had done this at 4 o'clock in the morning, witness replied "I don't sleep much 2 or 3 hours do me. That morning I couldn't sleep so I decided to get up and make a cup of tea and to go for a walk."

DUNGARVAN MAN OPTS FOR JURY TRIAL

William Fraher, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, was remanded on continuing bail at Dungarvan court last week when he made a brief appearance before District Justice W. F. O'Connell.

Fraher is charged with (1) entering the dwellinghouse of Patrick Foley at Boherard, Dungarvan, between May 5 and 31 and stealing a single barrel shotgun valued £50 and (2) on July 15 at Ballinamuck Middle, Dungarvan, entering the dwellinghouse of John and Martin Moylan with intent to steal and also have in his possession a single barrel shotgun.

Fraher intimated to the court that he would be opting for a jury trial and District Justice O'Connell remanded him on continuing bail until October 12. Addressing the Court, Fraher said he wanted to state that he had nothing to do with these two crimes.

Garda Inspector P. J. Hayes prosecuted and Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr. represented the accused.

Everybody in Ireland now knows the name of Sudan, and the word Sudan means human suffering on a terrible scale. When we talk in thousands and millions the real pain can escape us. There is no escaping it when you are on the spot. I was in Muglad camp in South Kordofan one evening in late August. An exhausted old man collapsed at the edge of the camp after a five day walk. He was helped to the area near the kitchen where CONCERN workers were cooking a meal. Later I saw him crawling about. Next day I found him in a tent where extreme cases lay down to die. Next day I inquired. He was gone. Another of the thousands for whom the struggle is too great.

CONCERN works with the poorest and the most needy. They suffer all the time and suffer most when things are really bad. We try to bring

your caring to them — from people to people. They are not just numbers on the news.

CONCERN has already appealed for Sudan and the response has been generous indeed. I met in South Kordofan in late August. I ask again.

WINTER FINISHING-BEEFMS RESULTS

Margins from winter finishing of cattle in the 1987-88 period were slightly up on the previous year, in spite of a drop in the value added per animal according to a report published by Teagasc — the Agriculture and Food Development Authority.

Average gross margin per animal was IR£198, arising from gross output of IR£228 and direct costs of IR£120. Gross output is the difference between the sale value and purchase value per animal.

The main reason for the slight improvement in margins was the fall in some items of costs principally feed, fertiliser and interest charges.

A substantial proportion of the margin from the winter finishing system comes from the increase per 100 kg between autumn and spring in 1987-88 the average price increase was IR£7.60 per 100 kg, well down on the previous year's IR£15.66. This reduction in the autumn-to-spring price increase occurred only in steer prices. The corresponding price rise actually improved in the case of heifers for winter finishing.

Extremely high levels of management have enabled farmers in this BEEFMS study maintain their margins last winter. A stocking rate of 4.4 animals per acre, combined with an average daily live-weight gain of 0.94 kg per animal, indicates the progress which the top winter finishers have made in recent years.

However, the report points out that maintaining last winter's rate of improvement in technical efficiency is virtually impossible. Moreover, a further reduction in production costs per animal is most unlikely in the coming winter finishing period.

These factors and the increased store prices this autumn will mean that margins from winter finishing could be in for a substantial fall in the 1988-89 period.

Members of Waterford County Council at their September monthly meeting in Dungarvan made a call for the provision of National Lottery funds for the erection of public toilets in Lismore and Cappoquin.

Motions in the names of Cllrs. W. McDonnell and Quirk requested the Co. Manager to apply for funds from the proceeds of the National Lottery for the purpose of providing a public toilet in Lismore. Both members said that they moved these motions at the request of Lismore Town Commissioners.

Public Should Watch Out To Curb Vandalism

SHEEP SCAB

As part of the continuing efforts to eradicate sheep scab, the Department of Agriculture and Food has called upon all sheep farmers to have their sheep dipped during the period fixed by their local authority.

The Department emphasised that, proper dipping of sheep in the autumn, when the scab mite is most active, would go a long way towards eradicating the disease completely. Farmers who buy in sheep are advised to have them dipped before letting them mix with their flocks. Sheep scab is a highly contagious disease and for this reason flock owners have a duty to their neighbours as well as to themselves to ensure that, by proper dipping, their sheep are kept free of scab.

Flock owners who fail to comply with the sheep dipping regulations are liable to prosecution and could also forfeit grants under the Sheep Headage Payments Scheme.

At the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, Cllr. T. Wright, again drew attention for the need of a properly equipped children's playground in the town. He referred to the play equipment which had been at Quann's and said that this now required to be replaced.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that the fact was that the swings and other things at Quann's were continually being vandalised and replacing them was not much use. "We must face up to the reality of the situation," he said.

Cllr. A. Halkhan, Chairman said that this problem of vandalism in the town was not one for the Council alone. The children's play equipment at Quann's which had originally been sponsored by the local Junior Chamber was used by ordinary people and it was up to these people to report any vandalism when they became aware of it.

Mr. D. McCarthy, Town Engineer referred to the cost of such replacement and asked where the money for it was to come from.

Cllr. Wright replied that money could be found for lots of things so why not for this.

Cllr. P. Power agreed that the replacement of this play equipment should not be cut out. "But," he added, "we certainly should try to cut out this vandalism in the town."

Cllr. D. Goode said that an iron seat which was placed in the park had been moved and thrown out over the wall.

"and," he added "it could not be any young children who did it because the seat was very heavy."

Cllr. Goode also deplored the fact that vandals had also in recent times removed ropes from many of the lifebuoys which the Council had placed around the harbour.

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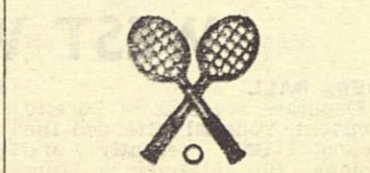

L.A. CAMPAIGN FOR PAYMENT OF SERVICE CHARGES

The County and City Managers in local authorities around the country launched a six week campaign to make people aware of the costs of the services provided by the local authorities and the need to recover some of these costs from consumers.

Speaking on behalf of the County and City Managers, Mr. Frank O'Brien, Meath County Manager said that the campaign sets out to address a number of myths about the services which the local authorities provide.

One myth professed by people who have not yet paid their water bill is that water is cheap and water charges are used to subsidise other services. "This is not so," Mr. O'Brien stated. "The charge imposed rarely exceeds one-third of the real cost of water production. Water has to be extracted at source and delivered to treatment works for purification. All of that is expensive in terms of pumping, piping, chemicals, maintenance and labour. Then come the costs of getting water to the users, including storing the water for emergencies like fires, dry periods or demands of industry."

A second myth is that: "we don't use much water anyway," Mr. O'Brien continued. "The truth is that on average we consume 40 gallons of water per person per day."

Irish homes and businesses have good supplies of excellent water and are only being asked to pay a moderate contribution to ensure that these high standards can be maintained.

"Local Authorities have to pay for all the services they offer," Mr. O'Brien concluded. "We're asking those of you who have not already paid your share to do so now."

WAIVER SCHEME

Every local authority has a waiver scheme for people who are experiencing particular financial pressure and in these cases instalment arrangements can be made on request. In addition, every local authority will take a sympathetic view of consumers who've run into problems with arrears.

Local authorities nationally provide consumers with the essential service which make life liveable. These services include water, sanitation, refuse collection and fire brigade.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q—I pay £85 rent per month on my flat. I live in private rented accommodation. Can I claim tax relief on my rent?

A—If you are 55 or over (or if you reach 55 years before April 6, 1989) you can claim tax relief during the tax year April '88-'89 in respect of rent paid in the calendar year 1987. It is necessary to fill up a special form in order to avail of this allowance. As it is a tax allowance it is only of benefit if you are liable to pay tax. The maximum amount of the allowance is £750 for single and widowed people and £1,500 for a married couple. It is necessary to produce rent receipts as evidence that you paid rent in the relevant year.

This tax relief does not apply to rents paid for local authority housing or to Government Department houses.

Only the actual rent will be allowed against tax. If you have anything like heating or lighting included in your rent, this will be deducted before the amount of tax allowance is worked out. Contact your tax office to apply for this allowance.

can foretell that it will not take another 90 minutes of exciting stuff before the issue is resolved for once and for all.

It is always difficult to write about replays. Trying to foresee the one big factor that will prove to be the deciding one is not much easier than trying to pick the winner of a handicap horse-race.

As I said at the beginning, it is very difficult to forecast the result of a replay and this one is no different. A win for St. Mary's would add considerably to the problems of the Board for the drawn match I gave a hesitant vote to An Rinn so now (but for no good reason), I will stick to my forecast.

My humble opinion on such records means absolutely nothing and I only publish them to make the point that the great Monastery team are not invincible in replays, as some people think. What may be more important is that 1988 is the golden jubilee of their first title winning effort when they defeated their greatest rivals, Erin's Own in 1938.

Many of those who enjoyed the drawn match felt that Ballygunner took too long to settle and that this was in contrast to their normal practice as in their games to date in this championship they have always begun very well.

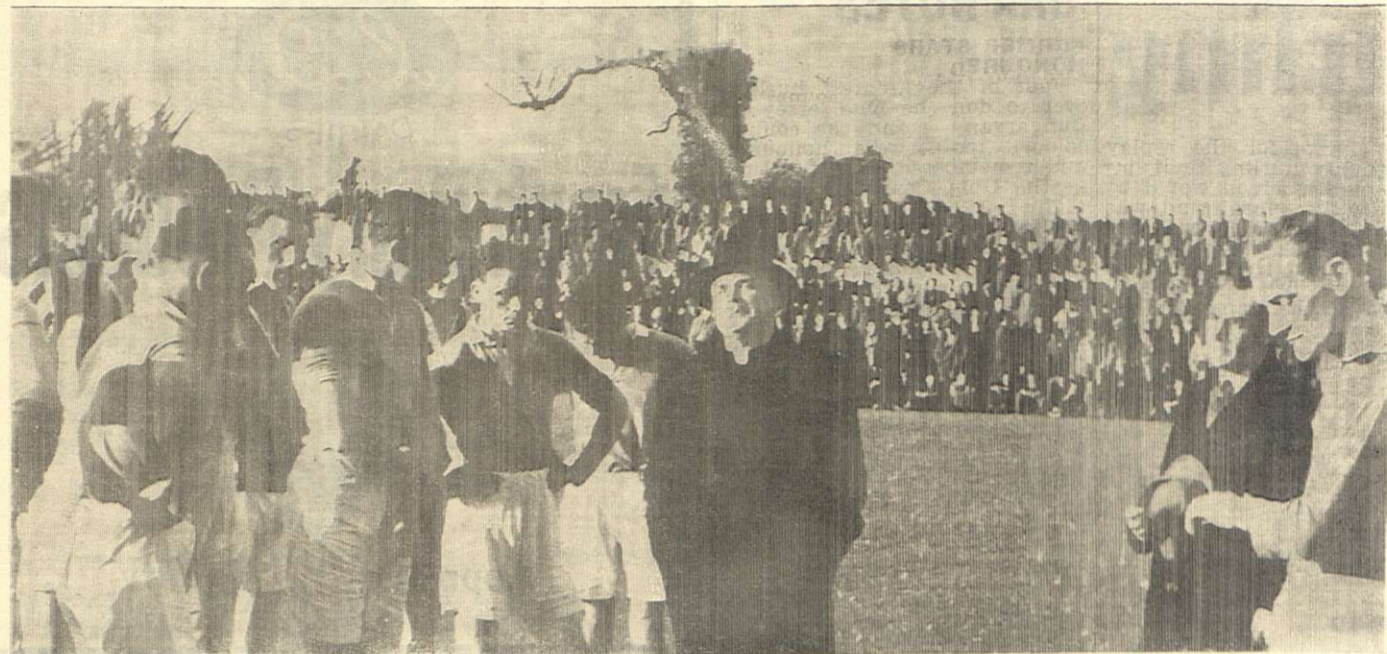

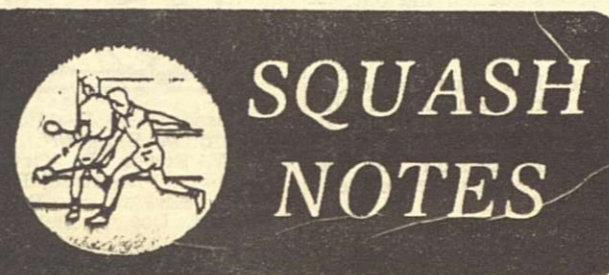

3 a.m. Raid On Dungarvan Brewery

"There is far too much of this crime going on," District Justice W. F. O'Connell commented at Dungarvan Court last week when he imposed a suspended prison sentence on 27-year-old Michael Butler, an unemployed labourer of 3, St. Patrick's Crescent, Dungarvan. Butler pleaded guilty to entering St. Brigid's Well, Brewery as a trespasser in the early hours of Sept. 10 and stealing ten crates of beer valued £100. He also pleaded guilty to causing malicious damage to a door of the brewery to the amount of £70.

Garda Inspector P. J. Hayes told the court that Butler and another man scaled the boundary wall of the brewery and forced their way into the premises where they removed the crates of beer. However the gardai were alerted and Butler and his accomplice were found lying on the roof at 3 a.m. The Inspector said only six of the ten crates of beer had been recovered.

A DRINK PROBLEM Mr. Niall King, Solr., said that Butler has a drink problem, but in fairness to him he had never previously been in trouble.

District Justice O'Connell sentenced Butler to three months imprisonment on each charge the sentences to run concurrently. However he suspended the sentence on condition that defendant pays £100 compensation by December 1st.

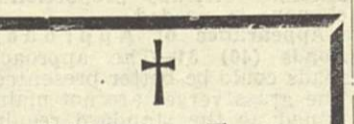

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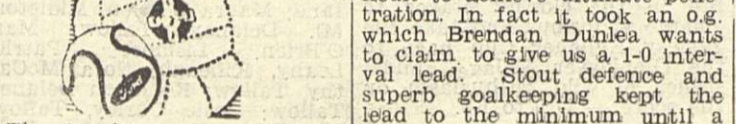

Snubbing Of County Council Chairman Should Not Be Tolerated

Members of Waterford Co. Council at their September monthly meeting in Dungarvan hit out strongly at the manner in which the Chairman of the Council was snubbed by certain organisations in the County. The matter was raised by Cllr. P. Coffey who referred to the failure of the Friends of Tramore Race Course, to extend an invitation to the Council Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne, to a recent press conference about the withdrawal of the Whit Monday fixture from Tramore by the Racing Board.

Cllr. Coffey said that, while he didn't wish to make the matter controversial he felt bound to voice his disappointment that Cllr. Kyne had not been invited to the Tramore Press Conference. He said that the Mayor of Waterford had been present, and rightly so, but as Tramore was within the administrative area of the County Council it was only right that the Co. Council Chairman should have been invited also. Cllr. John Carey agreed and said that the Council Chairman should not have been snubbed in this fashion. He went on to accuse the G.A.A. of similarly ignoring the Council Chairman on big match occasions and said that when he was Chairman of the Council, such snubbing were allowed into the side-line at Walsh Park but he and members of the Co. Council were snubbed. "That's just not on and it's high time that we took up the matter where this type of victimisation is concerned," he said.

Cllr. Patsy Kenneally said that this kind of treatment of the Co. Council Chairman had been happening in many instances for some time, and it was something which should not be tolerated any longer. Cllr. Tom Cunningham also spoke out against the manner in which the Council had been snubbed by the Tramore group but Cllr. B. Swift, T.D., said that while he agreed the Chairman should have been invited to the press conference he would say that the matter had not been deliberate and that it was rather an unfortunate oversight by those concerned. The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley thought that the Council should not get bogged down in this discussion. The Co. Council was the bigger authority and procedural moves could, he felt, be worked out between the Council Chairman and the Mayor.

Ardmore Scores Top Marks In County

There are several untidy yards and side areas which should be identified and a suitable course of action devised for each. These are just as significant as the buildings in view from the street and must receive equal attention.

Something will really have to be done about the storage of timber near the Roman Catholic Church.

Presentation of Buildings (35) - 25 (24): The Bride Valley Stores were very well presented in strong black and white. The Boyce Alms House was also well presented. O'Brien's Garage was colourful and bright. Smaller buildings also caught the eye. The Credit Union House, the bow window of M. Cunningham's shop in West Street and the two cottages beyond the GAA grounds all contributed to a pleasing overall scene. Split chimneys, a local feature, not noted elsewhere was interesting. The Catholic Church was well presented while the attractive doorway and coloured glass eyes at the Rectory on West Street were of interest.

Presentation of Natural Amenities (30) - 19 (18): The grotto on the Youghal Road is well presented as was the flower planting at Don O'Brien's car sales. Trees on the main Street is of a good standard but there is a need to replace dead or stunted trees. The wall of the GAA grounds is not suitably presented. Pebble dashing or painting should be arranged.

Appearance of Approach Roads (40) - 27 (26): All the approach roads seemed clear of litter and weeds grass growth had been removed from the base of the walls. This gives an excellent first impression. Praise-worthy is the rebuilding of the fine stone wall on West Street. This is a splendid initiative. All the town nameplates are clean and well presented. The black and white seats on the Waterford Road approaches are particularly striking.

Presentation of Residential Areas (20) - 13 (14): Many houses were individually well presented with interesting gardens. The Local Authority Housing of Chapel Road had a number of excellent gardens. Perhaps a need for greater collective effort to improve the communal open spaces. The use of flowers and shrubs to brighten blank walls is recommended.

Summing up the adjudicators had this to say: "Clearly a great deal of work has been undertaken. Encourage increased participation and collectively you will advance Tallow substantially in the competition."

expense of the Earl of Cork; and has been lately repaired, when a square tower, surmounted by a light and tapered spire, was added.

"The entrance is at the extremity of the south transept, under a pure Norman arch. The windows of the choir are of stained glass, and the bishop's throne and prebends' stalls richly carved oak. There are many tasteful monuments to the deceased members of families in the neighbourhood - Musgrave, Chearnley, Lovett and others. Among the more striking are the tablets to the memory of Archdeacon Ryan and Dean Scott. One ancient tomb, inscribed to the family of MacGrath, dated 1548, is richly sculptured; on the side stones are figures of the apostles in bas-relief, the upper stone is divided into compartments; time has nearly obliterated the design and inscription." (Remember this was written in 1844!)

O'Flanagan then goes on to relate: "Near the church are two small caves, and one in the grove near the castle. Several entrenchments, vestiges of war's footsteps, are in the neighbourhood. A double trench, called Rinke-Bo-Padruic or Dance of St. Patrick's Clow, is in this parish; of which the legend is, that it was the work of St. Patrick's cow, when she went to Ardmore in search of her calf which had been stolen. Dr. Smith conjectures it is the trace of an ancient highway from Cashel to Ardmore, between which two places there was formerly frequent intercourse. A single trench runs from Cappoquin along the side of the mountains into county Cork, supposed to have been a "boundary or fence made to preserve the cattle against wolves."

Having referred to the general fertility of the countryside hereabouts, O'Flanagan refers to the presence of chalybeate (iron) springs and to an abundance of limestone, silicious rock, conglomerate and sandstone and to the fact that iron, copper and lead ores though formerly worked were now discontinued for lack of fuel. He then states: "It is, however, hoped the facility afforded by the navigation of the Blackwater will cause this evil to be speedily remedied. Let manufacturing industry prevail - let the labouring mechanic find employment, and peace and order will be united to temperance. Let not our lovely river flow unheeded by as "a sealed book." Employ the people. The river presents no obstacle, but there is work to be had - establishing bea-

cons and guides through the channel, constructing quays, landing places; clearing banks, giving means of employment, and directing the energies of the people to useful works."

Without doubt the navigational possibilities of the Blackwater must have aroused great hope in those times around 1844. Can they, we wonder, be of any use in modern times on a tourism basis if not for commercial purposes?

AGHADEE

While looking for a suitable choice for the ballad corner this week we came across the following in a collection called "Songs and Ballads of Kerry," and it took us back to other times in days gone by and reminded us of old friends many of whom I have since passed from this world. PLANS TO RAISE QUALITY STANDARDS IN SOUTH EAST REGION
