PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

WINTER TIME

Although we appear to have been in a continuous winter, apart from a few weeks in June and odd days here and there in July and August, winter time "officially" came into operation at 2 a.m. last Sunday morning, October 23. It could be the last occasion on which we will have to put our time pieces back.

For a couple of years now discussions have been taking place on the harmonisation or synchronising of time among the member states of the European Community. So far the proposal has failed to secure the necessary approval of the various countries but it would appear that the main obstacles are fast disappearing and that an agreed solution will be reached by 1989.

There are at least two schools of thought where the time change is concerned. One, mainly involved in trade and business, favours the same time throughout the entire year while the other, principally the farming community has voiced strong objections to any proposal to continue "summer" time throughout the winter months.

In essence the problem boils down to whether we prefer longer dark mornings which would be part of having summer time throughout the entire year or longer dark evenings, such as we now have, as part of the traditional changeover to winter time.

Doctors are, we are assured, anxious to co-operate with this move as currently almost one-third of deaths on the roads are alcohol related. However the situation has improved considerably in recent years as drivers have become more aware of the dangers and penalties involved.

We understand that a meeting between members of the IMO's Ethics Committee and Officers of the Department is to be held to discuss the problems that could be faced by doctors in case the proposed changes in the Act are introduced into the legislation.

While any action which might tend to curb drunk driving is to be welcomed, it is extremely doubtful that the taking of a blood sample without the consent of the person concerned, who may either be injured or indeed unconscious following an accident, would not be ethically correct.

THE MASTER OF THE LEASH

The heavy rain that spoiled the unveiling of the restored monument to Master McGrath last Saturday evening in no way dampened the enthusiasm of the fine gathering of coursing enthusiasts and sporting people in general who gathered to honour what very correctly was described as an historic occasion. The white marble relief of the great three times winner of the Waterloo Cup which had been vandalised three years ago had been very professionally repaired and renovated and looked as good as new.

It is indeed an imposing monument and we thought as we stood in the downpour at the unveiling how nearer the mark it would be had the relief been carved in black marble, for the great Master McGrath was a small black greyhound with a white spot on his neck. It was just a passing thought, though.

It is perhaps worthy of note for readers who might not already be aware of the fact that when the famous greyhound passed away in his kennel at Brownlow House, Lurgan during Christmas, 1872, his "memorial," which appeared in a Dublin periodical ended thus: "For generations to come coursers will narrate his history, and when the men of the present day have passed away his achievements will remain green and unfaded midst the Chronicles of the Leash."

The prophecy has indeed proved to be correct and in such gatherings as we saw at his monument at Ballymacmague outside Dungarvan last Saturday evening his memory is perpetuated.

Master McGrath's "memorial" published a few days after his death also read in part: "The great Master of the Leash is no more. The lion-hearted McGrath is gone. That invincible greyhound has reached the bourne from which dogs

Under new changes planned by the Department of the Environment in the Road Traffic Act, suspected drunk drivers will no longer be able to avoid blood tests after car accidents.

Under current legislation, the taking of a blood sample for alcohol tests without the person's permission is an assault and this has been described as a loophole as it is a defence which has been used frequently by drivers who may be 'over the limit.'

The Department is on record as stating that the taking of samples from a person who is injured and incapable of making a decision themselves is allowed in other countries and they were now considering introducing the change here as part of road traffic legislation in a further drive in the fight against drunk driving.

However, the Irish Medical Organisation has warned that the planned changes would raise serious ethical issues for the country's doctors. It points out that if the Government goes ahead with the move, doctors would have to be protected from prosecution by accident victims.

The situation at present is that if one is over the alcohol limit and involved in an accident, he or she can feign injury, go to the hospital and escape a blood test and this is the loophole which the Department is now anxious to close.

Weather Spoils Unveiling Of Restored Master McGrath Monument

Following a bright sunny morning the weather unfortunately changed for the worse last Saturday evening and rain fell heavily at 3 p.m. when the unveiling of the restored Master McGrath Monument took place at Ballymacmague, Dungarvan. However, despite the rain a fine crowd of sportsmen and coursing enthusiasts gathered to witness the occasion. The rain did not dampen the enthusiasm of the fine gathering of coursing enthusiasts and sporting people in general who gathered to honour what very correctly was described as an historic occasion. The white marble relief of the great three times winner of the Waterloo Cup which had been vandalised three years ago had been very professionally repaired and renovated and looked as good as new.

The original monument, was twice vandalised and badly damaged by members of the self-styled Animal Liberation Front (ALF) in 1985 but members of the Dungarvan Coursing Club with the assistance of a very active Local Community Committee set about raising funds to restore the monument to the great Master McGrath. How well they succeeded in the task is evidenced by the manner in which the perfect restoration work has been carried out. The work was carried out by the firm of Hughes Monumental Works, Clonmel under the supervision of Mr. John O'Dwyer and cost in the region of £2,000 to complete.

Mr. Michael Fives former Chairman of Dungarvan Coursing Club and former President of the ICC presided and Mr. Gerry Desmond, Chief Executive of the ICC, acted as M.C. and welcomed all present to the historic occasion of the unveiling of the renovated monument to Master McGrath. He said that the presence of Sir Mark Prescott of the Waterloo Cup Committee who had come from England especially to

honour the occasion showed the position still held by Master McGrath not only in the eyes of English coursing enthusiasts but among sporting people all over the world. He congratulated the members of Dungarvan Coursing Club and of the Local Community Committee for the great work they had done and he paid special tribute to Hughes' Monumental Works, Clonmel and to Mr. John O'Dwyer and his staff for the very fine job they had done in the restoration of the monument.

The unveiling ceremony was then performed by Mr. Seamus O'Grady, President of the Irish Coursing Club who addressed the crowd as rain lashed down. Having briefly traced the history of the great greyhound, he said there were people in their society who wanted to forget the great coursing tradition set by Master McGrath and who were opposed to coursing and who were prepared to support that opposition by means of unlawful activities. But, he said they would never succeed as coursing enthusiasts throughout the country would continue to practice the sport as they were permitted to do within the law.

"Irrespective of what happens," said Mr. O'Grady, "and those people could come along and blow up this magnificent statue to-morrow, we will continue as is our democratic right, to support coursing and ensure

that the history of Master McGrath, and of coursing will live long in this country."

GREATEST COURSING EVENT

Sir Mark Prescott recalled that the reason they were all there that evening was because Master McGrath had been bred and reared in the neighbourhood. He expressed the hope that his presence at the function would indicate what Ireland and the Irish meant to the greatest coursing event in the world. He said that in the years that Master McGrath won the Waterloo Cup (1868-69-71) he had raised the attendance at the Altcar event from 36,000 to 127,000. "We need another Master McGrath to bring such crowds back to coursing in England now," he said to the warm applause of the crowd.

As the rain continued unabated, the M.C. Mr. Gerry Desmond, said they would adjourn to the nearby Monument Bar of Mr. Ned Quill for the remainder of the speeches. This was done and we understand a highly entertaining evening ensued.

The attendance at the event also included Mr. Austin Hallahan, Chairman Dungarvan Coursing Club and Chairman U.D.C., Clr. Billy Kyne Chairman Waterford Co. Council, Mr. Billy Walsh, Bord na gCon, Mr. Matt Bruton.

HOUSING CUTBACKS TO FOMENT TROUBLE AND UNREST

A warning was issued during the week by Clr. R. A. Walsh, Dungarvan U.D.C., President of the Association of Municipal Authorities, that the policy of the Dept. of the Environment in making a 20% cut in grants for the provision and improvement of local authority housing was a sure recipe for lengthening housing queues and a sure way of fomenting trouble and unrest.

Clr. Walsh said that he had to protest most vehemently at the proposed further cuts in the Department's financial allocation for the coming year. "As the Minister and the Department are well aware, the present state of financing Local Government is in a perilous state and to propose inflicting further hardship at this point is quite unreasonable," he said.
