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

## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### THE RESTORED MASTER McGRATH MONUMENT

In the course of a letter to the Editor, Major W. S. Brownlow, Regional Chairman of the Northern Ireland Committee of the British Field Sports Society and cousin of Lord Lurgan whose name will ever be associated with the wonder greyhound, Master McGrath, writes to say that he was delighted to read in the "Dungarvan Leader" about the unveiling of the restored monument of Master McGrath.

Major Brownlow's letter states: "By a strange coincidence this pointless act of vandalism (the damage to the monument) by the so-called Animal Liberation Front occurred while we were down for the 1985 Clonmel meeting."

It then goes on: "I had brought the new Director of the British Sports Society from London, who had never seen Irish coursing, and we were staying with Major Victor McCalmont at Mount Juliet. On coming into breakfast, he asked if I had heard the news? On arrival at Clonmel, we were met by Mr. Michael Fives who, as he shook hands, produced from his pocket the shattered marble ear of our family and Irish hero, Master McGrath!"

"A month later we were staying in Co. Cork and lunched with the Galweys, the descendants of his breeder, James Galwey of Colligan Lodge, and then went to visit the desecrated monument."

Major Brownlow then refers briefly to the history of Master McGrath recalling that, "His life was full of hazards, having been born the runt of the litter, James Galwey told the stable lad to put him down, then relented and gave him to him. Later Lord Lurgan liked and bought him. He might have won the Waterloo Cup four times but, on his third attempt, was doped and nearly drowned in the drain at Altcar."

The letter then states: "I would like to congratulate the Irish Coursing Club and all those who made the restoration of this historic monument possible" and it goes on to conclude as follows: "The big bronze statue of him which used to stand in Brownlow House, Lurgan, and which was taken to England by the third Lord Lurgan at the turn of the century, is now with my cousin, the present Lord Lurgan, in Hampshire. This, too, suffered indignity when it was cut from its massive plinth, presumably to be melted down by the thieves. Luckily its weight defeated them, as it was dumped in a flooded drain and found months later! He is now back on his plinth and, in due course, I will bring him home to Ireland. When he does return, I hope that we will be able to get some of those who restored the Dungarvan monument up to Co. Down to celebrate his return and to see some of the paintings, prints and memorabilia which we have of him!"

Certainly Major Brownlow's letter shows how every much

alive the memory of the great Master McGrath still is and the letter will, we feel sure, be read with great interest not only by all who have been involved in restoring the monument in Dungarvan but by all who love sport in any of its forms.

### A GREAT AND TRAGIC LOSS

The suddenness with which John Beecher was snatched from life last Saturday left us all numb and shocked. His death under such tragic circumstances has been a great loss not only to his beloved wife, son, daughter and family but to the entire community.

He was a life-long supporter of the "Leader" and throughout his travels, before he returned home, he kept in touch with his native Tallow and the West Waterford area as a regular weekly subscriber to the paper.

A sincere and helpful friend he will be sadly missed and mourned and we can only endorse the tributes paid to his memory elsewhere in this issue of the "Leader."

## Co. Council Face £27.30 Rate For 1989

The Annual Estimates meeting of Waterford Co. Council will be held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Monday next, November 14 when the members will consider a rate demand of £27.30 in the £ for the year 1989. This represents an increase of 3 per cent in the current year's rate or 79p in actual money terms.

While there is a proposal to increase the controversial water charges by 3 per cent for next year no increase is proposed in the case of the new refuse collection charges which were only recently introduced.

There is still quite a big backlog in the collection of water charges around the county and in a new get tough

policy where defaulters are concerned, households are being disconnected at the rate of six a day. County Finance Officer, Mr. Paul Clerkin in reply to a query from the "Leader" stated that a schedule for the disconnection of six defaulting households per day where arrears were in excess of a year had been prepared. This was the maximum number which the Council team could handle on a daily basis, but he added that in most cases a number made

last minute payments and this reduced the number disconnected to three or four a day.

The Council's disconnection policy has been in operation for the past five weeks and of the initial 240 warning notices sent out more than 30 households have had their supply terminated. On the payment of the £95 annual charge, plus arrears, and a £50 reconnection fee, a number of homes have been reconnected.

Most of the disconnections to date have taken place at the eastern end of the county in the Tramore and Portlaw districts where the Council has experienced most difficulty in collecting the charges but a number of defaulters in the Dungarvan rural area have also had their supply disconnected.

The 'pay or be disconnected' approach by the Council has been proving successful and as a result, approximately 65% of householders, have now paid their charges.

## Tallow Filling Station Gutted By Fire

The petrol filling station and tyre centre and garage owned by Mr. Noel Henley at The Grove, Tallow was completely destroyed when it was gutted by fire in the early hours of last Saturday morning.

Mr. Henley and his son having attended the bloodstock sales at Goffs in Naas, were returning to Tallow at about 2 a.m. when they discovered the fire. Broken glass in the door panel indicated that the premises had been broken into.

The Fire Brigade were at once alerted by Mr. Henley but the fire quickly enveloped the entire area and reduced the building to a charred shell.

On the same night (Friday) a car owned by Mr. Michael Walsh, who conducts a boot and shoe repair business in Dungarvan, was stolen from outside his house at Caseyville shortly after midnight but it was returned, although parked in a different position, in or about 4 a.m. on Saturday. Later that morning, Mr. Walsh found the car had been damaged and discovered a cheque book and other documents which turned out to be the property of Mr. Henley in the back of the stolen car. He reported the matter to the Garda in Dungarvan who then investigated the matter. We understand that a person has been charged and will appear later in Court.

## YOUGHAL COURT FISHERMEN MUST PAY £1,470 IN FINES AND COSTS

A total of 20 defendants, many of them from West Waterford, pleaded guilty to charges relating to illegal salmon fishing activities during the months of May and June last, both in Youghal Bay and on the River Blackwater when they were charged before District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Youghal Court last Friday.

Fines totalling £560 were imposed on the defendants, who were also directed to pay prosecution costs amounting to £910. Mr. David Keane, Solicitor, prosecuting on behalf of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board, said the number of defendants indicated the extent of the illegal salmon fishing problem in the area under the jurisdiction of the board.

Among the defendants was 76-year-old William Ronayne of Cooilbagh, Clashmore, described by his solicitor Mr. John Brogan as an old age pensioner. The lowest fine was imposed on him, £10, but he was directed to pay £30 costs.


The other fines ranged from £20 to £50 with costs against defendants varying from £30 to £75. Prosecutions against other defendants were put back one month after it had been indicated they would be seeking free legal aid.

## NEW POLICIES NEEDED TO COUNTER FLIGHT FROM LAND

Mr. Sean Kelly, President of the Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers' Association welcomed the comments by the President of European Commission, Mr. Jacques Delors on the desirability of maintaining the farming population.

Mr. Kelly said that the achievement of this objective will require new farm policies by the EEC and he urged Mr. Delors to have the Commission bring forward a positive programme of policies. "Words alone will not halt the flight from the land," he said, adding: "We have had much rhetoric on this issue since we joined the EEC, 16 years ago."

## BIG IMPROVEMENT IN CATTLE PRICES

There will be a substantial improvement in cattle prices to farmers following the decision of the EEC Beef Committee in Brussels to substantially increase the export refunds on beef by 10.3% or 6.13p per lb carcass weight. This was stated by Mr. Gerald Smith, Chairman of the I.F.A. National Livestock Committee recently. Mr. Smith said "Furthermore, the Commission decided to extend the current Aids to Private Storage Scheme by a further four weeks which in effect allows the Irish beef factories to slaughter cattle up to 23, December 1988 under the scheme. These improvements in the market support schemes for beef will increase beef exports outside the Community and reduce sales of beef into intervention.

Farmers Welcome Single European Market

The Irish Farmers' Association has always recognised that Ireland's future is inextricably linked to the European Community and the IFA's approach to the Single Market is both positive and realistic. These two statements by Mr. Tom Clinton, President of the IFA are contained in a foreword to a Guide to the European Single Market which was launched by the association recently. The guide which was compiled by IFA chief economist Con Lucey sets out the overall Single Market proposals in a very clear and easily understandable form, and outlines their implications for farmers, the food industry and the Irish economy. It cannot and does not try to state just how the proposals will finally be turned into legislation and regulations, but it indicates the range of possibilities. After the benefits expected from increased economic activity in the Community and free movement of goods the guide points out that the Single Market means intensification of competition, and only the fittest will survive and prosper. Having highlighted the benefits which an exporting country like Ireland will gain from the elimination of customs posts and all the paper work and delays at present associated with crossing national borders in deals with certain countries, the guide also points out that the Single Market means the elimination of MCAs. Non-tariff barriers on technical grounds will have to go, and financial services must be opened up.

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WIDE DIFFERENCES

There are wide differences between the indirect taxes imposed on the different Member States and these can distort trade because of the way that they affect prices and the pattern of production and consumption. The guide says that the Commission has proposed a harmonised VAT base, and two VAT rate bands as well as certain administrative changes necessitated by the removal of customs frontiers. It is suggested that a low VAT rate of 4% to 9% would be applied to 100 essential energy for heating and lighting pharmaceutical products, books and newspapers, passenger transport, and food. Lucey also thinks that a similar low rate might be applied to farm feeding stuffs and to fertilisers. He says that a standard VAT rate band of 14% to 20% would be applied to all other goods and services including those that are already exempt.

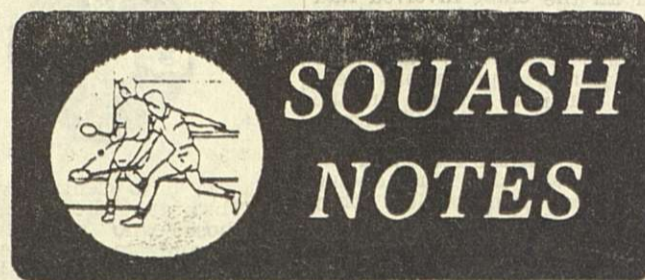
There has been strong opposition in Ireland and in the UK to applying VAT to food but critics have pointed out that that exemption helps the well-off sectors of the population just as much as the poor, and that it would be more equitable to give direct aid to those in need. Mr. Lucey's study suggests that when the harmonisation of VAT is complete in this country there would be a slight gain to the exchequer which could be used for the extra social welfare payments needed. The changes would require an increased flat rate return for those farmers who are not registered for VAT.

Excise duties on a number of items would also be harmonised under the Commission's proposals as we know and the possible extent of the reductions is outlined. Examples of excise variations are given and for instance there is no duty on wine in Italy and Greece, but here it is £2.28 a litre, and the tax on petrol varies even more.

CHANGES IN CAP

The guide discusses changes which will take place in CAP the need to harmonise animal and plant health regulations, food law and the implications of the Single Market for the structure of the food processing industry in Ireland, and it includes chapters on balanced regional development in the Single Market, European integration and the implications for Irish economic policy. This guide does not pretend to be the last word on any aspect of the Single Market, but it does give a very clear general outline of the proposals affecting farmers which will be discussed and negotiated upon for the next four years. It is important that citizens should understand what these discussions are about and that is why this guide is worth reading.

Successful Tallow Fruit Farming Enterprise

(Dungarvan Leader Special)

With the EC restrictions imposed on milk production in recent years, many farmers here in Ireland have been looking for an alternative source of income from their properties to enable them to maintain their lifestyles at a reasonable level.

One of the outstanding examples of this new alternative enterprise policy in the West Waterford region is the production of apples on a hilly farm that adjoins the banks of the river Bride and which is just over one mile from Tallow town. The Bride Valley Fruit Farm which is well-known to many customers over a very wide area has been producing fruit since early in the present century and down through the years has seen many changes in both the varieties of fruit grown and the marketing arrangements of the finished product.

In the early 1900's the fruit was sold to and marketed by the late Paddy Aherne, Sheehanes, Ballyduff through whom it found its way by horse and rubber tyre cart to Cork, and to the old Tallow Road railway station for other destinations. By 1948 the then Government had founded the Co-operative Fruit Growers Society based at Shandon Dungarvan. This proved a central marketing depot for many growers in Co. Waterford, Co. Cork and South Tipperary but a dispute over prices between the Co-op management and the late William McDonnell in 1962 finished the supply of fruit from the Tallow farm to the Co-op in Dungarvan. The McDonnell family then went about selling its own produce and successfully found markets with wholesale fruit distributing companies in Cork City and are today selling to the same fruit outlets as they did twenty-five years ago.

The produce of the McDonnell Fruit Farm is sold in many of the big Supermarket chains such as Quinnsworth, Roches and Dunnes, throughout Cork and Kerry while up to 25% is now sold at the farm store. Home sales have proved to be one of the big successes of the business, and people from as far away as West Cork, Limerick and Cork City travel frequently to Bride Valley for apples.

The present owner of the business Mr. Willie McDonnell, MCC, who has other farming and business interests, freely admits that apples are his top priority. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS Q—I am being sent by my company to work for nine months at the firm's plant in Cologne, West Germany. What will my social insurance position be when I go? A—Generally workers are covered by the social security laws of the E.C. country where they work. However, if you are sent by an employer here to work in another E.C. country for anything up to 12 months, you will remain liable for Irish PRSI while you are away. 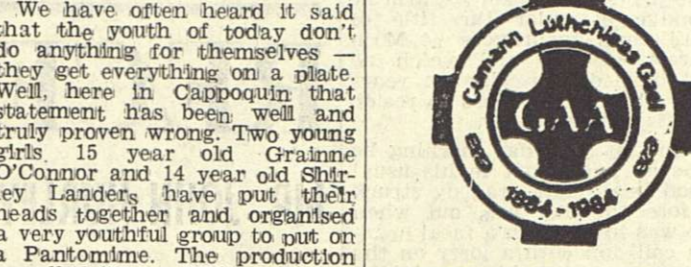
**CAPPOQUIN MACRA NA FEIRME NOTES**

## IMPRESSIVE FINAL TRIBUTES TO OUTSTANDING TALLOW MAN

### —OBSEQUIES OF THE LATE JOHN BEECHER

The Church of the Immaculate Conception, Tallow, was packed to overflowing last Monday when the Concelebrated Requiem Mass for the late John Beecher commenced at 2 p.m. In addition to practically everyone in the Brideside Town, a huge crowd from many outside areas had gathered to pay their final tributes to one of the most highly respected, most popular and best loved members of the community.

John Beecher was a man of many parts, full of life and actively associated with all movements concerned with the welfare of the community at large. He lived with his wife and family at Ballyvergan outside Youghal and was principal of the insurance brokerage firm he conducted under the title of Talliscapra, near Mad Street, Lismore and which he established himself some years ago when he returned to reside in his native county.

On last Saturday morning he was up and about in his usual good health but tragedy struck before the day was out when he was involved in a fatal head-on collision with a lorry on the Dungarvey road near Middleton. It is thought that the 60-year-old insurance broker suffered a heart attack seconds prior to the impact. Members of Middleton Fire Brigade had to cut him from the wrecked car and he was rushed to the South Infirmary, Cork but died shortly afterwards.

John Beecher was truly one of nature's gentlemen. A man of integrity, understanding and great compassion, his charity knew no bounds and no one will be able to reckon the extent of his charitable acts as apart from himself and those involved, no one else knew about them.

A great Irishman, he was also a great Waterford man but above all else a great son of the Brideside Town which he loved with a burning love. His concern for his fellowmen was boundless and his commitment to the material welfare of the communities where he resided and worked was absolutely total.

An ardent member of the G.A.A., he was deeply involved with his hometown club in Tallow and was also a founder member of the Youghal Lions Club whose motto "we serve" so typified his own attitude to life. A great lover of music he possessed a fine tenor voice and four years ago he was a finalist in the Cork Over 50s talent competition and only just Thursday night sang in a heat of this year's competition.

His remains were removed to the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Tallow last Sunday night, accompanied by a large and most representative cortege. On Monday afternoon the Principal Celebrant, of the Concelebrated Requiem Mass was Very Rev. Fr. Paul Beecher, P.P., Cahir (brother) who was assisted by Very Rev. Fr. Michael Russell, P.P., Fourmilwater and Very Rev. Canon Patrick Quealy, P.P., St. Peter & Pauls, Clonmel and a total of almost 20 concelebrating priests from all over the diocese. Very Rev. Fr. M. Walsh, P.P., Tallow acted as M.C.

Soloists during the Mass were Mr. Con Ryan, Mrs. Lena Walsh, Mrs. Myra Roche and Miss Mary Roche. Presiding at the organ were Alice Tobin and Betty Moloney, while the violin solos were played by Sheila Ryan.

After Mass, the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of one of the biggest gatherings of mourning relatives and friends ever seen in Tallow. The last prayers at the graveside were recited by Fr. Beecher, assisted by the full choir of clergy present.

Immediate chief mourners were Mrs. Elizabeth Beecher (wife), Timothy and Slobhan (children). Very Rev. Paul Beecher, Michael and Jim (brothers), Sr. M. Cecilia, Sr. M. Leila and Josephine (sisters), nephews, nieces, etc., etc.

### GRAVESIDE EULOGY

Mr. James Tobin, Chairman Waterford G.A.A. County Board, from nearby Knockmore, then paid a final tribute in a touching graveside eulogy to the man who had won a special place in the lives of all whose privilege it was to know him and in the course of which he said:—

We are gathered here on consecrated ground to pay our last respects to our dear friend John. I feel so inadequate for this task but deeply honoured to be chosen to speak about one who had won a special place in our lives and in our hearts.

John was a man of honour, honesty and truth. Those who knew him in business knew him to be completely honourable and upright. A mutual friendship developed between John and each individual client. Not for him the high-powered sell or hyped-up sales gimmick. He was always on the side of his customer whose welfare came first. His advice was based on truth and an eagerness to identify with others whose problems he loved to share. His kind gentle nature would not allow him to give anything but the best advice to all.

He was a Tallow man to the core. No matter where his travels took him, no matter what interests claimed his attention, his big love always remained in

Tallow which he visited regularly and frequently. And despite his ever-increasing workload he made time to visit and chat with his friends and discuss in his own vigorous fashion the problem areas which concerned him and how solutions might be found.

The G.A.A. was of passionate concern to him. He loved the games and took special pride in all of Tallow's successes. He wanted Tallow to set high standards and was hurt when he witnessed an acceptance of any but his own idealistic standards.

We record with regret the death of Mr. John (Jack) Hurley, Ballinagool, Mor Ring, which occurred at a Waterford hospital on Wednesday October 26. He was in his early sixties and had been ill for some time.

He was a well known and popular member of the Ring community. One of nature's gentlemen, he was held in high esteem by all who knew him and his passing has been the cause of much sorrow to all, but more especially to his sorrowing brother, sisters and other relatives to whom we extend deep sympathy.

His remains were removed from the Dungarvan Hospital Mortuary on Thursday evening to Ring Church where they were received and blessed by Rev. Fr. Desmond C.C.

Fr. Desmond celebrated Requiem Mass on Friday morning for the repose of his soul and also officiated afterwards in the burial in the adjoining cemetery.

Although Kathleen hadn't enjoyed the best of health for some time, her passing evoked feelings of profound sorrow and regret in the 'Old Boro' and far beyond, for Kathleen was the beloved wife of Declan, U.D.C. Hon. President, and former Secretary of Waterford Co. Board C.L.C.G. and mother of Paul, Billy, Eoin, and daughter Phil, to whom we extend our condolences.

Almost on the eve of her 78th year, Kathleen was called home to her eternal reward. The last year of her allotted span was spent in the loving care of the Matron and staff of St. Joseph's Hospital, where she bore her heavy cross with true christian fortitude.

Kathleen was the last surviving member of the Duggan family who resided in Abbey Street, Cahir. Around the mid-30's Kathleen came to Dungarvan to work for Mary C. Power, who ran a most successful business in O'Connell Street at that time. In her younger days she was interested in the music of the era and was also keen on dancing. She was a deeply religious woman, who for many years was a member of the Children of Mary. Since the Goode household was at the centre of G.A.A. affairs in the glory days of Waterford's rise to hurling prominence, Kathleen proved herself a most capable receptionist, telephonist and diplomat. One shudders to think of how many people called to her home in search of precious Croke Park tickets, yet one and all were always greeted with the utmost courtesy and respect. A devoted wife and mother, she will be sadly missed.

Kathleen was a most popular lady in the town and the numbers present at her funeral obsequies speak volumes for the esteem in which she was held. On Tuesday evening, flanked by a guard of honour of members of the Planna Fada Party, her remains were brought from the Hospital Mortuary to St. Mary's Parish Church which was thronged with mourners.
