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
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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### NO CHANGE PROPOSED IN WATERFORD

The Boundary Commission set up by the Government to report on proposed alterations in constituency boundaries in consequence of population changes as revealed in the last census has now submitted its report. It contains some very radical changes which have been the cause of deep and disturbing concern not only for all the opposition political parties but for several of the Government party as well.

In the terms of reference, the members of the Commission, headed by the President of the High Court, Judge Finlay, were, among other things, recommended as far as possible not to breach county boundaries. In reference to this it was felt that the part of the old Waterford Constituency embracing the Nire Valley area into Clonmel, now in the South Tipperary Constituency, might be restored to Waterford.

In considering the position viz-a-viz Waterford and South Tipperary, the Commission, we understand, considered four options. In regard to the number of voters, South Tipperary was below the national average while Waterford was somewhat above and the question of transferring voters from the latter to the former was among the options considered.

In order to top up South Tipperary to the required number of voters it would be necessary to transfer portion of North Waterford extending to the east as far as Portlaw or Kilmacthomas or westward to include, Cappoquin, Lismore and Ballinacorney.

However, in the final analysis, and having considered the various options, the Commission recommended no change as far as Waterford is concerned and the status quo remains.

The Commission's report remains a hot potato for the government and whether they will just shelve it now and forget it remains to be seen.

**A MONK FOR SIXTY YEARS**

This week it is a privilege for us to extend felicitations to Rev. Fr. Colman (Foley) OCSO, Mount Mellerey Abbey on the occasion of the diamond jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood as a member of the Cistercian Order.

Fr. Colman hails from the Kingdom County and was born in the Dingle peninsula within the shadow of Mount Brandon, named after that other monk, St. Brendan, who in former times is reputed to have conquered the mighty Atlantic long before Columbus got the credit for doing so.

A young 83, Fr. Colman has been blessed with excellent health throughout his life and although he has spent all the

sixty years of his monastic life within the hallowed confines of Mount Mellerey, he has never lost touch with his beloved Kerry which he has visited on a regular basis down through the years.

### UNIQUE MEETING IN RED SQUARE

Talk of the Soviet Union and Moscow and one would probably think automatically of Mr. Gorbachev and then, by association, of President Reagan. These are places with which the names of these two world leaders can easily be coupled. Mention the Red Square in Moscow and one may be forgiven for thinking of the young German pilot who created consternation a couple of years ago by breaching the Soviet air defences to land a small civilian aircraft there but then other things can happen there too.

The week of October 31-November 7 last which coincided with the mid-term break in the schools here showed the new interest which Irish people, especially of the younger generation, are displaying in Russia. We learn that in that week, several groups from Ireland, totalling in all approximately 1,000 persons, converged on the Russian capital, Moscow, in the course of a "getting to know Russia better" plan as permitted by the new Glasnost policy of the Soviet leadership.

# Estimates Meeting Flops

Despite a spate of proposals, members of Waterford Co. Council failed to reach agreement on striking a rate for 1989 at their annual estimates meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday. Stumbling block was the proposal to increase the current water charge by £3 which was strongly opposed by the Fine Gael and Labour members while the Fianna Fail group showed continued disunity in their approach to the various proposals one member, Cllr. Seamus Dunphy, presently domiciled in London from where he travelled, voting against all proposals made in protest against the failure of the government to reform the Local Government system.

After discussing the matter for more than an hour there was a total of five proposals made, by various members and at that stage, the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne, stating that the situation was getting ludicrous and that the meeting was entering the realms of farce decided to adjourn the proceedings for 10 minutes "to enable the various groups to discuss the matter among themselves" to see if some semblance of agreement could be reached.

Fine Gael and Labour then went into their own "huddles" while the Fianna Fail members at first were in three groups and then two. When the meeting re-assembled as many as four proposals were still made but each in turn was defeated and finally the Chairman, stating that it was evident no majority agreement could be reached declared the meeting adjourned.

### CO. MANAGER'S REPORT

In his report, on the Estimates to the Council, the County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley pointed out that reductions in the Rate Support Grants in 1987 and 1988 with a further reduction of £195,000 for 1989 meant that there was now almost £14 million less in Central financing for the council than in 1986.

Other points in the Manager's report were: Because of this reduction it is inevitable that the standard of services and their extent must fall, the options to meet the shortfall was a reduction in expenditure

or increased receipts or a combination of both; an increase of £1 in domestic water charge would yield £6,000 while 1% increase in the rate would yield approximately £10,000.

The report asked members to note that due to the Early Retirement Voluntary Redundancy Scheme (under which 88 staff members left the service) pension payments for 1989 would amount to £1.125 million (up £150,000) representing 20% of the payroll.

Mr. Hurley then stated: "I am fully conscious of the many difficulties that families and ratepayers face in trying to meet their financial obligations. Every facility has been extended to meet these needs but if the services are to run, every-

one must make their contribution and I expect the full support of the Council in ensuring that this is achieved."

Adding that these last few years had been years of frustration both for members of the Council and staff alike in attempting to give a good service to the public, Mr. Hurley expressed the hope that by the time the preparation of the 1990 Estimates came about a decision will have been made by the Government, which would enable local Councils know where they were going.

In total, the estimates as presented, provided for a total expenditure of £14.6 million and called for a rate of £27.30 (a 3% increase) and an increase of £3 to £8 in the domestic water charge.

**MEMBERS' VIEWS**

Cllr. James A. Walsh objected to the increase on the grounds that the Council was being asked to make up the shortfall caused by the government cutbacks.

Cllr. Pat Coffey said that water charges had been increased 2 or 3 times in the last 10 years and he held that the present government policy would cripple all local authorities.

Cllr. Brian Swift T.D. said that the Council's credibility could be damaged if they failed to pass the estimates.

Cllr. Garry O'Halloran said the Council's roads were falling apart due to recent flood

# Council's Move To Quell Vandalism In Dungarvan

Proposals, to set up a special committee, in an effort to counteract vandalism in the town were made at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held last Monday night.

The proposal was made by Cllr. B. Kyne following the reading of a letter from Mr. Michael P. Norris, Area Superintendent, E.S.B., Dungarvan in which he informed the Council that an examination of the public lights at Childers Estate on Monday, November 7, showed a considerable amount of damage.

"The cables to 3 lights" the letter stated, "connected on June 15 had been cut and this resulted in a public lighting 'black-out' to the estate. The cost of repairing this fault and replacing other public lights vandalised is £477.40 plus VAT." The letter added: "Previous repairs to the public lights in this estate were futile as the lights were later vandalised."

The Chairman, Cllr. Austin Hallahan, said that there was a small element in the town whose aim seemed to be wanton destruction. "These people," he

said, "can no longer be tolerated and action must be taken to put an end to these criminal acts involving the destruction of public property."

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. R. Walsh who agreed that quite a lot of problems existed in Childers Estate.

It was then approved unanimously and it was further agreed to discuss the establishment of such a committee with the County Manager.

**MORE VANDALISM**

Since the above matter was discussed at Monday night's meeting we learn that more E.S.B. property has been vandalised and stolen. For some time the E.S.B. in Dungarvan have been waiting for suitable weather to connect power into the new itinerant half at Shandon and succeeded last week in extending the necessary cable. However, when they went to make the final connection in the past few days they found that 800 metres of the copper cable had been cut and stolen.

Last Minute Plea Saves Woman From Jail

A woman sentenced to prison for 4 months when convicted of a spate of larcenies at Dungarvan Court last week was saved from the jail sentence following a last minute plea by her solicitor and a recommendation from a garda officer.

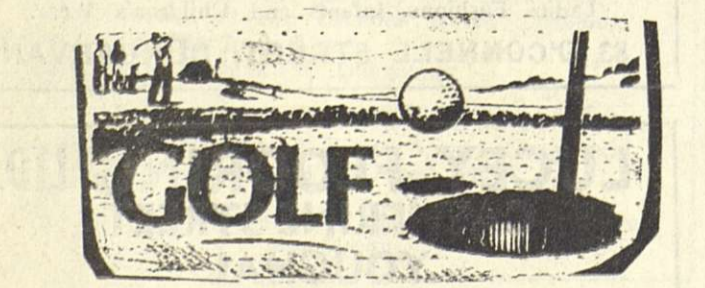

(Continued from Page 1) and water damage and that repairs to one of our areas were given priority. Car. Ollie Wilkinson said it seemed to him that rural Ireland was being cut out. He said that a road in his area was now in such a condition that a school bus was refusing to travel over it. Senator Brian O'Shea said that he was opposed to special charges in accordance with Labour Party policy on the matter. Five proposals, one after the other came up from the floor of the meeting and it was at this stage the Chairman suggested the brief adjournment. On resumption, Cllr. Walsh withdrew his proposal of a £1 increase in water charge and 1% on rates but this was re-proposed by Cllr. Tom Cunningham and seconded by Cllr. Sean Fahy. This was defeated by 12 votes to 10.

Cllr. C. O'Riain then proposed and Cllr. Paddy Cahill seconded that a decision be referred until the Minister for the Environment met a deputation from the Council to discuss an increased financial allocation and this was defeated by a 13-9 vote.

A proposal by Cllr. Brian Swift seconded by Cllr. Patsy Kennedy that the Estimates as presented be adopted was defeated 15-7. Finally a proposal by Cllr. Cahill seconded by Cllr. Swift of a 3% increase on the rate with no increase in water charge was defeated 13-9.

At this stage the Chairman said that it seemed they were only "flogging a dead horse" as no agreement on any proposal could be reached and he suggested the adjournment of the meeting. Cllr. O'Riain was then on his feet, declaring that "it is his duty to say that the Fianna Fail Party have acted in a very responsible manner to-day and I must compliment the Chairman for his handling of a very difficult matter." The Council then agreed to adjourn further consideration of the estimates until Monday, November 28.
