Christmas'88 Was Quiet And Orderly For Us

The most notable feature of Christmas 1988 through-out Co. Waterford was its unseasonably warm weather. Over the entire period, day temperatures averaged 12°C (54°F.) which put us on a par with such Mediterranean sunspots as Majorca. According to the Met Office the country as a whole en-joyed the mildest December for over 14 years with records being broken during the Christmas holiday break when temperatures ranged from 11 to 14 degrees — four degrees higher than normal. For the most part it was also mainly dry, the outstanding exception being St. Stephen's Day which saw a steady rainfall for most of the day although it still remained very mild. The long spell of abnormally fine weather is expected to end this week when conditions are likely to become more changeable with a greater risk of rain.

MANY LIVES LOST

While no outward incidents to mar the festive season in Dungarvan or throughout the western end of the county have been reported by the gardai, in other areas it has proved to be one of the worst Christmas periods for accidents in recent years with a total of 21 people losing their lives. Ten people were killed in road accidents, seven children died in house fires four in Bray and three in Ballyragget, Co. Kilkenny — the bodies of three people were recovered after drownings and a young man was crushed to death in a freak accident outside a Dublin Supermarket.

Supermarket. Added to this, the dreadful pre-Christmas disasters of the Armenian earthquake, the London rail crash and the blowing up of a Pan-am Jumbo Jet over Scotland while on a flight to New York, claimed countless lives and cast a gloom internationally over the entire Yuletide celebrations.

DRIVERS WERE CAU-

The drunk driving campaign mounted by the Gardai, the National Road Safety Association and the Department of the Environment for the Christmas period proved to be a wonderful success as drivers responded favourably to the warnings issued to keep out of the driving seat.

On inquiry at Dungarvan Garda Station on Monday morning last, the "Leader" was informed that only one driver failed the breath test in the area over the Christmas and a Garda spokesman reported that everything had generally been quiet and orderly.

PETROL "BOMB"

The only untoward incident the Garda reported was what was described as a petrol "bomb"attack on the exterior of Minnies Lounge in Abbeyside which occurred around 3 a.m. on Friday morning, December 30. The "bomb," a bottle of petrol, was thrown at the premises and ignited but fortunately the only damage was the minor scorching of an entrance door. "Had the "bomb" gone through the window it could have resulted in a serious fire at the premises" said the Garda spokesman.

The incident was immediately reported to the Gardai when it occurred and following a swift investigation a young man was approached and he will appear on a charge in court in due course.

IN THE CHURCHES

The fine weather on Christmas Eve saw bigger than usual crowds out and about and the now early "midnight" Masses saw huge congregations pack the churches in all areas. Masses on Christmas morning also saw the Churches crowded and it was on these occasions that the real spirit of Christmas became manifest and was truly observed as wishes for happiness, peace and joy were freely exchanged.

CHARITY SWIM

The annual Christmas Day Charity Swim at Clonea Strand organised by the Dungarvan Lions Club attracted a large number of swimmers and spectators, all of whom could not have wished for more favourable weather for the event.

DRASTIC WEATHER CHANGE

CHANGE There wes a drastic change in the weather on Tuesday last when strong winds and rain replaced the mild conditions that had prevailed for the previous few weeks. Changeable conditions over the next few days are forecast.

COUNTY ROAD REPAIRS WILL COST ALMOST £0.5 MILLION

Following in the wake of the flooding which resulted from the disastrous rainstorms last November, many roads throughout County Waterford and particularly in the West of the County suffered serious damage and the cost of carrying out anything in the nature of adequate repairs to restore the road surfaces is providing the County Council with a major headache.

major headache. The kernel of the problem is, of course as in so many other instances, finding the money so that the much needed repair works can be carried out. The County Council has submitted a schedule of the work required to restore the roads to the Department of the Environment with a request for a special allocation of funds to enable the work to be done.

When the matter was raised in the Dail last month, the Minister, Mr. Padraig Flynn informed Deputy Austin Deasy that following the severe weather in November he asked local authorities in the affected areas to prepare reports on the extent of flood damage which had occurred. He also sought their views on immediate remedial measurers which they considered necessary and on the question of works which might usefully be undertaken to prevent a recurrence of flooding. Among the reports he had received in reply to this request was one from Waterford County Council and he was considering what further action should be taken in the matter.

COULD NOT INDICATE

It was then pointed out to the Minister by Deputy Deasy that the cost of the repair work in Waterford, specifically for roads, was in the region of £440,000 and he asked if the Minister could give some indication as to when he would be able to give money to the Co. Council and to say how much.

Mr. Flynn agreed that the figure mentioned was roughly correct but he said that he could not say what the final outcome would be until he had considered the reports from all the other local authorities so affected.

Deputy Deasy proceeded to press the case for Waterford by pointing out that the Waterford County Engineer (Mr. John O'Flynn) had submitted a very comprehensive report of the damage to the roads in the County and which, because of the Council's extremely restricted financial position, they were unable to repair. "Some of the roads in the County have been made totally impassable because of flood damage," he said.

Minister Flynn replied that he was aware of some of the difficulties referred to by the Deputy but until he had considered all the reports from the other counties he was not in a position to say what money could be made available to relieve the situation in Waterford.

EC FUND NOT APPRO-PRIATE

Referring to a suggestion that EC funds be sought for such repairs and damage, the Minister said that approximately £2.3 million had been set aside by the EC in 1988 to assist people in the Community who were victims of natural catastrophies. "But", the Minister added, "application for assistance from such a fund is not appropriate in this case".



that "it was stitched into the pollution legislation" that the County Council was the authority for the purpose of the Act. A report would be got from them about the complaint, he said.

The Town Clerk said that the difficulty there was that in order to successfully prosecute any offenders, a witness who would be prepared to go into Court and give evidence was required. "If we can get such a witness we will certainly prosecute, he said.

Dungarvan Projects At Aer Lingus Young Scientists Exhibition

Two Dungarvan projects will be among the entries at the 25th Aer Lingus Young Scientists Exhibi-tion in the RDS in Dublin from January 6th to the 8th 1989.

Alan Drummey, a pupil at Dungarvan Vocational School has constructed a computer controlled Robotic Arm while Gerry Power and Kieran Maher from the same school have combined their talents to examine pollution in Dungarvan Harbour and its ef-fects on the animals in it.

At the moment in 31 countries - the missing one is Leitrim — 1,000 young scientists, aged 12 to 18, have been busy finalising investigations, constructing models, writing charts, and programming computers. They have entered 517 projects -272 Individual and 245 Groups — representing an increase of 14% over last year.


This year there will be between 12 and 14 new judges, including, for the first time, a judge from the UK — Dr. Maurice Ebison of the European Physics Society. The panel of 60 judges will have a new Chairman. Mr Donal Downing, the newly ap-pointed Aer Lingus Chief Operations Officer, is taking over the post.

Judging begins today Wednesday 4 and will continue through Thursday and Friday. The exhibition will open to the public at 10 a.m. on Friday 6. At 5

p.m. An Taoiseach Mr. Charles Haughey TD will perform the official opening and announce the top prizewinners.

On Saturday, January 7, at 12 noon the Lord Mayor of Dublin Deputy Ben Briscoe will present all of the prizewinners with their awards, and the Exhibition will open to the public from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Satur-day and Sunday January 7 and 8.

£15,000 PRIZE FUND The 25th Exhibition has a £15,000 prize fund. The 1989 Aer Lingus Young Scientist (s) of the year will receive a cheque for £1,000, a perpetual trophy, a trip to attend the Nobel Prize ceremonies and Ball in Stockholm. A top award winner will go to the International Science and Engineering Fair in Pittsburg in the US, sponsored by Westinghouse.

It is the same as saying to God, I know I promised that and that, but sorry I want that one back. It is time we started realising the purpose of our life, and took God's words seriously. 40,000 Armenians died without a moment's notice. You must have been horrified with the train crash near London, and more recently the plane crash in Scotland. No, none of us can be sure about the termination of our stewardship. As I said: open your hearts to Jesus. Let Him set up home with you. It will make you a new person.

25 Dumped Salmon Found In Colligan Estuary

No fresh developments were reported this week in the investigations into the finding of 25 dead salmon in the estuary of the river Colligan at Ballyneety Bridge, Dungarvan on

Wednesday of last week. Following reports from the gardai and local angling and conservation groups in Dun-garvan on Wednesday, offi-cers of the Southern Regional Fisheries Board visited the scene and carried out an inspection along a mile long stretch of the river but no other dead fish, apart from the salmon found lying under the bridge in a few inches of water, were found. This fact strengthened the theory that the salmon had been dumped into the river some time previous to the discovery. Mr. Patrick Kilfeather, the Fisheries Board Pollution officer told the press: "If the salmon had died from pollution it is very probable that we would have found other dead fish in the area". He added that the condition of some of the salmon was not very good while there was also evi dence that some of the fish had been cut open.

Also at the scene of the discovery at Ballyneety Bridge on Wednesday after-noon was Supt. P. J. Hayes, Sergt. Tadg O'Donovan and Det/Garda J. Molloy while local Councillor Michael O'Riordan who is himself a keen angler, also visited the scene and expressed concern at the find.



This indicates the outstanding success of the Safe Driving Christmas Campaign operated by the Garda Siochana and the responsible manner in which drivers in general responded to it.

Unfortunately the good record returned locally did not apply nationally as there was an abnormally high rate misadventure and of tragedy reported from other areas. The toll on the roads was heavy while two tragic fires, in Bray and Co. Kilkenny, took the lives of seven young children.





A. - If you go into a private or semi-private room in a public hospital or to a private hospital you have to pay the full costs involved - you do not carry your public entitlement with you. The current daily cost of

staying in private beds in public hospitals is as follows:

Health Board Regional

and Voluntary Teaching: Private - £96.00, Semiprivate — £70.00;

County Hospital and Voluntary Non-Teaching Hospital: Private — £73.50, Semi-private — £55.00;

District Hospitals: Private - £36.00, Semi-private -£27.50.

As well as paying for the private bed you also have to pay the consultants involved.





Separate bus company and garda investigations are continuing into the accident in which 29-year-old Noel Kent of Togher was killed at Killeagh village.


A confidential report on the post mortem has been made available to Coroner Dr. C. F. O'Connell who expects to hold the inquest shortly at Midleton Courthouse.

INTERESTING OPINIONS IN CHAMPIONSHIP FORMAT

This is an 'airing of views' more than a discussion and in all about 20 members spoke at the December County Board meeting in Lismore

Nioclas Mac Craith, who had previously proposed this way of getting clubs' views on the championships, said the league style championship was a good idea, but there were far too many teams with the result that clubs were put under too much pressure. Games coming in close succession was not a good thing, he said, as teams should have time for training, for coaching, rest-

ing and even for talking. Billy Jones, De La Salle, said that divisional championships should be run on a knockout basis and leave the senior championships on a league system.

Eamon Martin, Brickey Rangers, said the only way to play a championship was on a knockout system. He told the meeting that when he came to reside here thirteen years ago and competitions were on a knockout basis, the interest was tremendous and the newspaper coverage of every game was excellent. Now, with so many games to cover, pub-licity was not nearly as good. Leagues should be run as well as the championships.

Phil Fanning spoke about standards in the County and expressed the opinion that at

club level we were not far behind all the others. He instanced the recent club games in which Mount Sion and Kilrossanty both reached the Munster finals and were narrowly beaten.

John Jackson said we should set up a ten-man committee to examine the whole championship structure and come back with a report after ten months. Any adjustments could then be made for 1990.

Noel Fleming thought there were far too many championships and as a result it was too easy for mediocre players to find a place on a team.

Eamon Murphy said that everything in the championship line needed to be reviewed.

Eddie O'Halloran said that at the beginning his club were in favour of the league system, but like many others, they were inclined to the view that the knockout system was best.

James Tobin wondered how an 'A' and a 'B' senior championship would function.

At the end of the night, the Chairman stated that while the opinions expressed were interesting, the format of the championships could not be decided on until motions to convention and that these, if approved, could go forward as recommendations to the Board meeting in February.


TOURANEENA NOTES
