CO. COUNCIL CONGRATULATES THE "LEADER"

Members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday joined in congratulating the "Dungarvan Leader" on the occasion of the golden jubilee of its establishment.

Proposing the formal vote of congratulations, the Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, said that on December 24, 1988, the "Dungarvan Leader" had completed 50 years in business remarking that "this was no mean achievement in difficult times." He added "we congratulate the firm on this and wish them well for the future."

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. M. O'Riordan and supported by Cllr. P. Cahill, Kilmeaden who commented that the "Leader" is a paper that I get and read every week."

The proposal was then passed unanimously.

PERSISTENT FLOODING NEAR CAPPOQUIN INDUSTRIAL ESTATE

Cllr. Senator Brian O'Shea at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday said that he had been asked to draw attention to the recent flooding of the road at the Industrial Estate in Cappoquin and he asked if the County Engineer had any proposals to improve the situation there.

Cllr. James A. Walsh, Cappoquin said that when he travelled over the road to Mass last Sunday morning the flooding was so bad that he thought it had been caused by a burst pipe. He added that the flooding there has been

much more persistent now than it was previously.

Cllr. Walsh also said that there had been frequent breaks in the water supply in the area in recent times.

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer, said that he was not aware that flooding on the road was persistent. He added that he would have the matter looked into and would report on it to the next meeting of the Council.

An Daonra i nGaeltacht Phortlairge

Ag freagairt ceist i dtaobh daonra na gCeantar Gealtachta sa Dail le deanai, duirt an t-Aire Stait i Roinn na Gaeltachta (Mr. D. Gallagher) go raibh 1,439 daoine (753 fir agus 686 ban) sa Cheantair Ghealtacht i gCo. Phortlairge de reir an daonairimh is deanai.

Plans for the realignment of the N25 road at the Sweep (Killongford to Windgap), Dungarvan, were outlined at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday. The proposals had been submitted to the Department of the Environment in May, 1988 and the County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, reported that the Department's approval had now been received. The Secretary's report then added that "steps are being taken to make a Compulsory Purchase Order for the necessary lands involved so that when finance is allocated, the commencement of the physical work will not be delayed."

Outlining the proposals to the Council, Mr. Don O'Sullivan, Senior Executive Engineer Roads, said that the cost of improving the 2 mile length of road at the Sweep to bring it up to National standard would be about £5 million. The scheme was a costly one because of the terrain involved with the road rising from sea level to a height of 400 feet in a short distance. It was proposed to have a single carriageway with a climbing lane involving a 4% gradient on the new road.

"The two hairpin bends will," said Mr. O'Sullivan, "be taken out and the new road will take a totally different line. When it is completed the existing road will remain intact and will continue to serve the houses and farms located on it but no new access points will be allowed in the new road."

Mr. O'Sullivan then said that the major undertaking would involve the handling of about 600,000 tonnes of earthwork; about 50 acres of land would be required which it was proposed to acquire by means of a CPO from the 12 landowners involved — this method was absolutely necessary for such a large scheme — and the time from the start to the completion of the job would take 2 to 2.5 years.

Replying to a question by Cllr. James A. Walsh who asked when it might be ex-

pected a start on the job would be made taking for granted that there was no hold up in the preliminaries, the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, said that they hoped to make a start in late Spring 1990.

MASSIVE OPPOSITION?

Cllr. P. Kenneally said that he could see massive opposition to the proposals now before the Council as the holdings in some cases would be rendered useless as there would be fragmentation caused by the line of the new road.

Co. Manager — That's the reason why it's proposed to proceed by CPO.

Cllr. M. Queally thought that it would be better if the landowners involved were first approached as they could possibly organise opposition to a CPO if the Council moved that way. "If any of them should disagree with the proposals then by all means use the CPO," he said.

Mr. O'Sullivan, the Engineer, said that during the course of the preliminary surveys, he had spoken to a number of the farmers in-

involved and no objection in principle had been made to the proposals. Despite this he thought acquisition by CPO would be the neatest way to handle the matter.

Mr. Hurley, Co. Manager, pointed out that officers of the Council would still discuss the matter with each of the 12 landowners involved before anything else was done.

On the proposal of Cllr. P. Cahill seconded by Cllr. C. O Riain, the plans as outlined were then unanimously approved by the Council.

RECENT DEATHS

MR. JOHN MCCARTHY

We record with sincere regret the death of Mr. John (Johnny) McCarthy, Western Terrace, Dungarvan, which occurred at the District Hospital, Dungarvan, on Thursday, December 29.

Johnny hadn't enjoyed the best of health for some time but thanks to the loving care of Sr. Baptist and the staff of the District Hospital and the love and support of his family, he bore his cross with true Christian dignity and resignation.

Johnny was born in 1910 and having finished his schooling at the local C.B.S., he took up employment in the transport section of A. Moloney & Sons, Main Street, who ran a thriving grain business at that time.

He also took a keen interest in Trade Unionism and was one of the founder members of the local branch of the A.T. & G.W.U.

He took an active interest in politics and in the mid 1950's he was elected a Labour member of Dungarvan U.D.C., where he fought against bad housing and the scourge of unemployment in the town.

Johnny later took up employment with the Health Authority as an ambulance driver and was a valued member of Dungarvan Fire Brigade for many years and his staunch and loyal service to the Brigade was recognised when he was made an honorary life member.

Johnny also found time to follow sport and he had a great love for hurling and football and he followed avidly the fortunes of the early Eire Og teams.

He was member of a very old and highly respected Old Boro' family. Possessed of a most unassuming nature, Johnny was one of nature's gentlemen, whose passing, even in the fulness of years, has been the cause of much sorrow to his legion of friends.

He was a great family man who will be sadly missed by his sorrowing wife, family and relatives to whom we extend deep and sincere sympathy on their sad loss.

His remains were removed on Friday evening from the hospital mortuary to St. Mary's Parish Church and were blessed and received by his son Rev. Pat McCarthy, O.S.A., assisted by a huge choir of clergy.

On Saturday morning Fr. Pat was principal celebrant of the con-celebrated Requiem Mass. The co-celebrants were Very Rev. M. Nolan, O.S.A., Prior General, Rome, Very Rev. M. Brennock, O.S.A., Prior, Rev. J. Hooper, O.S.A. and

Very Rev. J. O'Sullivan.

The Lessons were read by Johnny's elder son Jack while Fr. Pat, in a brief homily reminded the huge attendance that in death life is not ended but elevated to a higher and more rewarding plain.

Following Mass the burial took place in the adjoining cemetery. Fr. Pat McCarthy officiated at the graveside, assisted by a huge choir of local and visiting clergy.

POLLUTION CAUSED DUNGARVAN BAY FISH KILL

When Cllr. Michael O'Riordan sought information by way of notice of motion at the January monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan as to whether there was a fish kill in Dungarvan Harbour on December 8 last and if this was true what action had been taken by the Council, he was informed by the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, that there had, in fact, been a fish kill on the day in question in the harbour.

The County Engineer went on to point out that December 8 was a Church Holyday and by the time the Council had been notified there had been a change in the tide and the damage had been diluted. However the matter had been traced to a local industry and a prosecution against it was pending.

Cllr. O'Riordan expressed his great concern at the incident pointing out that the fish kill had taken place at

a time when spawning salmon were making their way into the river Colligan to spawn.

The Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne said he understood that a local industry in Dungarvan was at present in negotiation with the Council to acquire a licence to discharge effluent into the harbour. He asked that a report as to how advanced the negotiations were be submitted to the Council's

next meeting. "I am not content to be reacting to what happens in the harbour and if the industry responsible for the pollution can be isolated then, in fairness to the other industries in the town, it should be named," he said.

Senator Attacks Minister On Proposals For Hospital

In a recent statement concerning the present situation in regard to the future of the Old County and City Infirmary, Waterford, Senator Katharine Bulbulia points out that the Department of Health caused the Infirmary to be closed almost one year ago. At that time, verbal assurances were given to the Infirmary's Board of Governors that the Department would have no objections to the Infirmary continuing to operate as a Private Hospital. These assurances were given by an Assistant Secretary at the Dept. of Health.

Presumably, the statement goes on, this information helped to shape the painful decision to close, which was forced on the Governors of the Infirmary. Shawline Ltd., have now purchased the Hospital. They have stated that they are prepared to operate a 50 Bed Private Hospital if they are given recognition for insurance purposes from the V.H.I. and have written confirmation from the Dept., of Health that the Dept., has no objection to the new Hospital. The Minister of Health has failed to comply with this latter, quite reasonable and straightforward request from Shawline.

Shawline are prepared to spend £2 million converting the Hospital and when in operation there will be 90 -100 full time jobs. Obviously during the construction and refurbishment period, there will also be considerable employment.

SHAWLINE REQUIRE NO GRANTS

"Because of his stated reluctance to intercede", Senator Bulbulia then states, "the Minister has put in

jeopardy, the provision of this badly needed facility for Waterford and the full time jobs which accompany it.

"Meanwhile the pressure on services at Waterford Regional Hospital, Arkeen is acute and V.H.I. subscribers in Waterford and surrounding counties are disadvantaged. It is quite simply a disgraceful situation and should not be tolerated."

MILK PRICE RISE IS WORTH £12m TO DAIRY FARMERS

"Milk prices will rise again from the 1st of January 1989" said Michael Drea, Chairman of IFA's National Dairy Committee, in a statement issued recently.

"A price increase of 1.2p/gal is due in line with a green pound devaluation of 1.55%" said Mr. Drea. The price rise is worth £12m to Irish dairy farmers in a full year.

Mr. Drea said 1988 had been a record year for dairy farmers with milk prices rising up 12p per gallon since the start of the year due to the dramatic improvement in European and world dairy markets. And he welcomed an end-of-year bonus payment by Bord Baine of £1.5m which was decided recently.

Mr. Drea continued: "It has also been a record year for the dairy co-ops lead-

ing to a significant strengthening of our dairy industry."

"There are now reasonable prospects for stability in international dairy markets in 1989. The industry must take advantage of this favourable climate to meet the challenge of rationalisation so as to secure the future prosperity of Irish dairy farmers."

Elderly Rural Neighbours Watch By I.F.A.

The IFA has renewed its standing instruction to County and Branch Officers and ordinary members to ensure that elderly people living alone in rural areas are visited at least once or twice daily by their neighbouring farm families.

IFA Deputy President, John Donnelly, said that this was being done both as a security check against the type of cowardly attacks recently suffered by a number of defenceless old people, and also as a means of seeing that their basic needs of food, water supplies and heating are adequately provided for.

Mr. Donnelly also called for a constant state of local community alert for any suspicious or unusual movements of persons or vehicles, which should be promptly reported to the Gardai.

"Care for the safety and well being of our senior citizens is a deeply rooted tradition in rural Ireland and this Winter season is a most opportune time to reaffirm that commitment," added Mr. Donnelly.

No Deal Better Than Bad Deal

In a comment following the break-down in negotiations on the recent EC beef regime, IFA President, Tom Clinton, who had been in Brussels to monitor the talks said that he welcomed the fact that the beef proposals were rejected.

"For the time being, no deal is better than a bad deal", he said. The IFA President also welcomed the increase in support for Ireland's special position particularly from the French and said that the Minister would have to continue to oppose the serious weakening of the beef intervention system until such time as proper safeguards were put in place.

Mr. Clinton said that Minister O'Kennedy was right to stand his ground on this vital issue and urged him to redouble his efforts to safeguard Ireland's beef industry in the negotiations in the New Year.

Farmers Must Maintain Drive Against Silage Pollution

The dramatic improvement which farmers have achieved during the year 1988 in preventing water pollution from silage effluent, was highly commended by the Minister for the Environment, Padraic Flynn, when he met a delegation from the IFA National Industrial Committee led by John McCullen, National Hon. Secretary IFA, recently, at Leinster House.

It was agreed that, having reduced this aspect of water pollution by 75% (with fish kill incidents from farm sources, as recorded by the Central Fisheries Board, down from 82 in 1987 to 22 in 1988) a renewed effort would be made in the coming year towards eliminating silage-related pollution problems.

Industrial Committee Chairman, Liam Ellis, pointed out that this achievement in 1988 highlighted the effectiveness of the information / education / awareness programme which was mounted by IFA and Teagasc (ACOT), commencing in Autumn 1987. He urged the Minister to take full account of this

proven experience of persuasion being more effective than any coercive legislative measures where farmers are concerned.

INDUSTRIAL POLLUTION

Turning to the growing concern among farmers over the potential hazards of industrial pollution, with special reference to chemical manufacturing plants, there was full accord between Mr. Flynn and the IFA delegation that Ireland's clean and relatively unpolluted environment, which underpins both our major food industry and our expanding tourist sector, must be safeguarded.

John McCullen emphasised that IFA is all in favour of further industrial development, with appropriate and foolproof safeguards and independent monitoring systems for environmental protection.

SERIOUS MILK SUPER LEVY SITUATION

The Department of Agriculture and Food has announced that estimated milk deliveries in the first eight months of the 1988/89 super levy year, i.e., April 1 to November 30, amounted to 920 million gallons.

These figures, which of course, are provisional, indicate that national deliveries are now running at about 2% above quota. While this constitutes a further improvement in the national quota position, the situation remains very serious and if the excess over quota were to remain at the present level, the country's super levy bill at the end of March next would amount to approximately £24 million.

The Department stated that, while it welcomed the improvement for the month of November, this trend would need to be main-

tained over the remaining months of the quota year if the country is to avoid superlevy bills.

In order to get back under quota, deliveries between now and the end of next March need to decrease by over 7% on those made in the same period last year. Producers are therefore urged to maintain regular contact with their Teagasc advisers and co-operative/dairy management regarding the action to be taken to ensure that supplies are brought back as gradually as is possible at this stage, to the levy limit.

At the sale of Pedigree Friesian Calves from one to six months old, from the renowned Knockgarron Herd, property of Edward Sheehan of Cappagh on December 17, 2,300 gns. was paid for a six month old calf.

Prices (in guineas) — 2,300, 1,700, 1,500, 1,400, 1,200 (twice), 870, 820, 750 (twice), 770, 720, 650 (twice). Twenty-six calves averaged 828 gns.

AWARD FOR MICHAEL DILLON

Michael Dillon, the well-known and popular agricultural journalist, received the Bastow Award last week in recognition of his contribution to the beef industry over the past 40 years.

The journalist and broadcaster, who first appeared in the Mart and Market TV programme in 1965, was presented with his award by Agriculture and Food Minister, Michael O'Kennedy. The award was sponsored by the Irish Meat Processors Association.

CREAMERY MILK SUPPLIER OF '89

The National title of Creamery Milk Supplier of the Year is again being opened up to dairy farmers throughout the country. The sponsors of the competition, An Bord Baine and the Irish Farmers Journal, have announced that the competition will run again for the 8th year, with the search commencing since 1st January.

The competition sets out to identify Ireland's top supplier of creamery milk. The winner will receive the prestigious title, a prize worth £1,200 and the Farmers Journal Golden Cow Trophy. The winning creamery will be presented with the Board Baine trophy. Runners-up will receive £600 and £300, in addition to special scrolls and souvenirs, which will be presented to all finalists in the competition.

Co-ops nationwide are being invited to nominate their best supplier for the award.

NOTABLE WEATHER FEATURES IN 1988

The most notable features in the weather during 1988 according to the official Met Office report were:

- (1) — The windstorm of February 9th.
- (2) — Dry pleasant weather in April and June.
- (3) — July's record winds and low pressures.
- (4) — Flooding in parts of Munster in October.
- (5) — Dry November — problems with smog.
- (6) — Mild, dry December.

Annual rainfall totals ranged from nearly 1588 millimetres at Cahirciveen to 693mm at Dublin Airport. Percentages of normal varied between 123% at Clones (where it was the wettest year since 1966) and 92% of normal at Dublin Airport where it was the driest year since 1977; in most areas totals were above average.

Mean air temperatures were above normal everywhere; at some stations it was the warmest year since 1983 but at Malin Head it has been the warmest since 1971.

Mean maxima ranged from normal or just above near the south coast to 0.5°C above normal. No very high temperatures were recorded during the summer and the 25.1°C recorded at Birr in June was the highest of the year.

The cold spell in late November provided the lowest temperatures of the year (-6.9°C at Birr and Mullingar) but in general frosts were infrequent and mean minima were mostly

between 0.3°C and 0.9°C above normal.

SUNSHINE TOTALS

Sunshine totals ranged from 1557 hours (95% of normal) at Rosslare to 1032 hours (86% of normal) at Claremorris. Percentages of normal ranged from 84% at Malin Head, where the total was only 16 hours higher than the remarkably dull 1983, to 98% of normal at Clones. On June 13th, Shannon Airport recorded 15.8 hours of sunshine, its highest daily total since recording began there in 1946, but several stations recorded 16.0 hours in June.

The most severe winds occurred on February 1st and on February 9th when Belmullet recorded 93 knots, the highest gust of the year. The gales of July 24th/25th were unusually severe for a summer month, and Malin Head, in recording 74 knots, exceeded its previous July record by 20 knots.

There was widespread thunderstorm activity on July 3rd.

WHAT IT SAYS IN THE PAPERS

The public cannot be blamed for becoming confused when they read what is said in the papers — that is the national 'dailies' — about the economy of the country or hear what the politicians have to say about the subject on radio and television.

During the past week the papers told us that the end-of-year jobless total in the country was 243,000 but the Industrial Development Authority (IDA) made a big boast that it had created 12,000 new jobs during 1988, while the Minister for Industry, Mr. Ray Burke, claimed that the government was well on its way to achieving the job target set in the Programme for National Recovery!

At the same time it was admitted that 25,000 people had emigration forced on them in 1987 and a further 36,000 had to leave the country last year.

On Monday, a consultant economist to Allied Irish Banks, Dr. Brendan Menton, announced that the economy is back on the path of "substantial growth" and that it is "on target for a 3 p.c. growth". In the same paper, also on Monday we were told that in a pre-Budget submission to the Government, Focus Point, an organisation concerned with the welfare of the less-well-off, claimed that half the child population of the country — a total of nearly half a million children — were now living in families whose main income was social welfare.

Is it not easy then to see why the public are so confused when they are bombarded with so many contradictory "facts".

Budget Day is now almost on us and in the run up to it it seems to be the accepted

strategy of the Government to encourage this confusion with the Minister for Finance, on the one hand, keeping the banking establishments happy by telling them the economy is booming while at the same time telling the unfortunate taxpayers, the poor, the sick and the jobless that it is threadbare and that there's nothing to provide any extras for them.

Indeed we well might ask 'who's conning who?'

FINANCIAL ALLOCATIONS FOR REGIONAL HEALTH BOARD

Members of the South Eastern Health Board are due to meet in Kilkenny this week to consider the financial allocation made for the provision of the Board's services for the coming year.

The Board officials have already been informed by the Department of Health that a total of £90.90 million has been allocated for 1989. This is the same amount as the final allocation for 1988 but is £2.46 million less than the amount required to continue services at the same level of real spending as in 1988.

As the Board's Chief Executive Officer, Mr. P. G. McQuillan points out in his finance report to the meeting, the Board will again be

faced with the necessity to cut spending, by approximately £2 million this year. He points out that while the cut is less severe than in previous years, it is coming on top of a long period of cut-backs and there would have to be a continuing concentration on economy, on efficiency, on control, reducing work absences and ensuring the collection of all possible revenue.

While the CEO's report points out that the wards at present closed in the various acute hospitals in the region will continue to be kept closed for this year, he had some little heartening news by stating that the Board were not faced, as was the case this time last year, with the prospect of further closures.

That the rigid economy drive would have to be maintained was stressed by Mr. McQuillan when he states: "we are unable to relax on any curtailments already in operation, to restore any suspended services or to commence any new services for at least another year."

Admitting that there were many members of the public who could not now get all the service they were used to or get it as promptly in some cases, the Health Board CEO adds that "all that can be said is that we will try to continue to do the best we can with the public resources available and that we welcome all constructive criticism which will enable us to do this."

In conclusion Mr. McQuillan states that he could not complete his report without expressing his appreciation of the efforts of so many people in the region who met the cut-backs that had to be imposed in the spirit of the times and succeeded in keeping spending within budget under great pressure. "This," he added, "is in the best tradition of public service and will continue to be so."

POPULAR GARDA SERGEANT RETIREES

Garda Sergeant Sean Clancy retired from the Garda Force this week having completed a period of service of 30 years, or to be exact, a period of 30 years and a day as a member of the force. He had served the final seven years in Dungarvan from where his retirement was officially recorded on last Monday

night.

A native of Tullamore, Co. Offaly, Sergeant Clancy during his 30 years service, served in such widely separated stations as Clonakilty and Donegal and he has been attached to the Waterford-Kilkenny Division for the past nine years.

Since his advent to Dungarvan his popularity and pleasant personality won him many friends while he was a general favourite with all his colleagues.

Sergeant Clancy's retirement was marked by his garda colleagues at a function held at the Gold Coast, Dungarvan just prior to Christmas at which a presentation in appreciation of his services to the force was made to him.

The occasion was rather unique as in addition to the presence of Supt. P. J. Hayes, Dungarvan, who paid an outstanding tribute to Sergeant Clancy, the gathering also included four retired Garda Superintendents, J. Barrett, M. English, P. Crowley and J. Murphy.

Sergeant Clancy has resided in Tallow since his advent to Dungarvan and is married to the former Miss Keniry of the Devonshire Arms Hotel there and he now returns to the Brideside town where we wish him many years of pleasant retirement with his family.

LATE SEAN HANCOCK, TALLOW

The recent death of Sean Hancock, Chapel Street, Tallow evoked profound regret in his native town and environs where he and his family as shopkeepers were immensely popular.

Sean always imbued with a great sense of nationalism enlisted in the Defence Forces in the early thirties and serving with great distinction he gained promotion on many occasions in a period which covered the emergency years and well into the forties in which time he was assigned as instructor to LDF recruits then in County Donegal.

After the cessation of hostilities he returned home to assist at the drapery business with his late father Thomas Hancock.

Involving himself with the social life of the town he was very active with the affairs of the Temperance Hall now St. Patrick's hall. A life long pioneer as well one of his great loves was Irish cultural pursuits and he was a dynamic force behind the Irish language classes for many years in the town.

The welfare of the town and its people held a deep interest for him always and when the credit union was born in Tallow a good many

years ago Sean was again to the fore and served as its first chairman and it must have given him as well as his compatriots of that time great joy to see the branch come to fruition so quickly and reach a very high position in the country at the present time.

In the Words of Goldsmith "his house was known to all the vagrant train" and we who knew him so well over the years often dropped into his shop for a few words in Irish or English where there was always a cead mile failte.

Sean was a man who lived for Ireland, a true Irishman and Brideside man, and while we will miss his passing we will always cherish many memories of this great man.

IRISH POST AND PHONE CHARGES MUST BECOME MORE COMPETITIVE

Speaking in a debate on

Clashmore Publican Acted In Self Defence

A Co. Waterford publican and a member of Waterford County Council was acquitted of assault when he appeared before District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Youghal Court last Friday.

Justice O'Connell held that Gary O'Halloran, The Decies Bar, Clashmore, was provoked by the complainant and that he had only acted in self-defence.

O'Halloran, who is a Fine Gael member of Waterford County Council, pleaded not guilty to assaulting Frank Duffy, Aghlish, Cappoquin, on June 5 last.

Duffy told the court that he tendered a £20 note to O'Halloran for his final drink at the defendant's licensed premises on the night of June 5. He received no change and when he asked O'Halloran about his change some time later he was viciously assaulted.

"He gave me several belts," said Duffy, "and he almost choked me. He nearly killed me outside on the road and I was afraid to go to Clashmore the next day because I feared he might finish me off."

Garda Frank Sweeney told of going to Clashmore village after receiving a report of an incident. He met Duffy who alleged that O'Halloran had assaulted him.

Garda Sweeney said Duffy's shirt was torn, he had cuts on his knee and elbow and was distressed and shocked. He had drink taken but was not incapable.

Gary O'Halloran said in evidence that Duffy's final drink was a drop of brandy for which he was a very slow about paying. At no stage did Duffy tender a £20 note, but he subsequently approached witness and asked "what about that £20 note I gave you."

The defendant said he offered to check the pay-role in the cash register for Duffy but he wouldn't listen. He became louder and witness decided to walk out of the bar knowing that Duffy would follow him. "I did so because I didn't want a serious fracas on the premises," he said.

A GLANCING BLOW

O'Halloran said Duffy made a swipe at him and struck him a glancing blow on the side of the head. Witness then went to the telephone to ring the gardai but Duffy began kicking the door.

"When I came out of the kiosk Duffy jumped on me and knocked me to the ground," O'Halloran went on. "I struggled and got him off me but he jumped on me a second time. I was viciously assaulted and had to defend myself but I did not assault him."

District Justice O'Connell said he believed Duffy was assaulted but that it was in self-defence by the defendant. "I think O'Halloran was provoked and I do not accept Duffy's story about the payment for the drink," he added, dismissing the charge against O'Halloran.

TWO CHARGED

Later in the court, and arising from a related incident, Duffy and John Farrissey, College Road, Ardmore, were charged with assaulting O'Halloran in Clashmore on the night of August 14 last. They were also charged with being drunk and disorderly, and there were applications to bind them to the peace.

The court heard how the two defendants arrived at

O'Halloran's pub that night armed with a sledge-hammer. Farrissey called O'Halloran a tramp and a robber, while garda evidence was that Duffy was very aggressive towards O'Halloran.

However District Justice O'Connell dismissed the assault charges, and when told that Duffy was of impeccable character up to this he adjourned the drunk and disorderly charge generally and refused the application to bind him to the peace.

Farrissey, however, who it was stated had a whole spate of previous convictions "for all kinds of offences," was fined £25 for being drunk and disorderly and was bound to the peace for one year.

The Justice also commended Garda John F. Hunt, who, he said, had acted with considerable diplomacy that night and had defused a potentially explosive situation.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q. — Is there any grant available to help make a house suitable for a disabled person?

A. — There is a grant available to improve your house to accommodate a disabled person. This grant may be given where an extra room or other structural changes are necessary for the accommodation of the handicapped person. Work which might qualify includes the building of an extra room, the provision of a downstairs toilet, the provision of ramps, widening of door openings, etc.

Applications should be made to the local authority which will decide if the proposed work is necessary. The amount of the grant is the full cost of the work in the case of non-vested local authority house or flat or two-thirds of the cost (up to a maximum of £5000) in other cases.

The deceased's grandsons David and Eddie have given us sterling service from their youngest playing days.

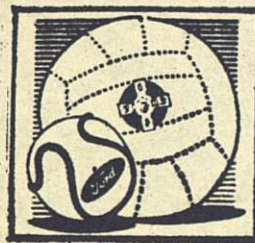

Public Lights In West Waterford Like Old Fashioned Flashlamps

Cllr. Willie McDonnell, Tallow stated at the January monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan that the public lights in the West Waterford towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow were now the worst in Ireland and reminded him of nothing more than old fashioned flashlamps.

Cllr. McDonnell was proposing that the Council erect additional public lights in the three towns and that the voltage on the existing lights be doubled owing to their present inad-

equacy. He said that this was an appalling situation in West Waterford and while he said that the traders and private people in the towns concerned who had erected

Christmas lights at their own expense and in their own time were to be congratulated, he could not say the same for the E.S.B. "The public lights in these towns were never as bad as they are now, they must be the worst in Ireland and remind me of nothing more than old fashioned flashlamps," he said.

Cllr. James A. Walsh agreed that the quality of the public lighting was certainly of the poorest kind in each of the towns and something would have to be done to improve it.

Cllrs. Jimmy Quirke and Ollie Wilkinson supported the proposal.

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley then informed the members that he was at present having discussions with the E.S.B. on the cost of upgrading the lighting system in Cappoquin as an experiment. "If this works out satisfactorily then we can deal similarly with the other towns at intervals," he said. But, he said, there could be no question of any extra lights in the coming year as there was no money available for them.

The Council decided to place the matter on the agenda for the next meeting pending the outcome of the County Manager's discussions with the E.S.B.

CHILD CYCLISTS A MENACE TO THEMSELVES AND OTHERS

Christmas is over and there are now about 40,000 new bikes on the road. Many of them will be ridden by children who know little or nothing about the Rules of the Road, or how to cycle properly. Years ago, parents used to go out cycling with their children and wear them gently into coping with traffic. Nowadays children are often allowed out into busy roads without any idea of how to

do a right turn or how not to get caught under the back wheels of a truck — a common form of serious injury to cyclists.

How can parents help to keep their children safe on their new bikes?

Here are a few guidelines:

(1) — Never forget that a bicycle is a vehicle, not a toy. It is small wonder that the most likely age to be killed or injured on a bicycle is between 12 and 15.

(2) — Don't let your child out on to the road until he can balance properly, and look behind and signal without wobbling.

(3) — Make sure your child knows the importance of not getting on the inside of any vehicle turning left.

(4) — Never let your child cycle without lights, reflectors and bright clothing or a reflective Sam Browne belt, except in broad daylight.

(5) — A precondition of being allowed to cycle on the road, should be a thorough knowledge of all the Rules of the Road which apply to cyclists.
