Kilrush Junction Like A Battlefield

Cllr. B. Kyne, Chairman, told members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday how he had almost been involved in a serious accident at the Kilrush junction outside Dungarvan on the previous day. Cllr. Kyne described how he was travelling in a car behind a bus as it came up to the junction. As the bus was turning right on to the Cappoquin road a car coming from the Cork direction was in collision with it. The impact wrecked the car while a great deal of damage was also done to the bus.

"That junction," said Cllr. Kyne, "is like a battlefield as there is a crash there every few weeks". He suggested that a sequence of flashing lights to warn motorists of a dangerous junction ahead and of the pedestrian crossing should be erected there.

Stating that the position there was absolutely frightening and very serious, the Chairman added that the junction could not be allowed to operate in the manner that it was at present. "People are asking questions about it and they are entitled to answers", he said adding that "the travelling public and especially strangers to the area must be protected".

Cllr. Kyne also said that when the by-pass road was being constructed it should have been made level instead of having a hill down on to the junction.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham suggested that a sub-committee of the Council be

appointed to meet with the consultant who had recently carried out a survey of the junction and discuss the problem with him on the spot. "Something will have to be done as the place is a death-trap at the present time," he said.

ROUNDOABOUT

Mr. John O'Flynn, County Engineer pointed out that in his report which had been placed before the Council last November the consultant who had carried out the survey at the junction stated that the placing of a roundabout there was considered but this was deemed to be impractical for a number of reasons including that it would impede the passage of pedestrians. He added that a number of the recommendations made by the consultant in regard to the junction were at present being carried out.

The Chairman remarked that this work needed to be done as a matter of urgency

but he also thought that some advance hazard flashing lights should be placed at the junction as well.

Cllr. T. Cunningham said "I still think that a roundabout there is the only solution".

Cllr. Jackie Fahey T.D., said that when the petrol filling station located at the junction started up it would aggravate the problem further as cars would be coming out into the pathway of the main traffic stream. "When that comes into operation", said Deputy Fahey, "the position will really be disastrous there."

Cllr. C. O Riain — That filling station should never have been allowed there in the first instance!

Finally the Council unanimously agreed that the recommendations for the junction contained in the consultant's report be carried out as a matter of urgency and further that the Chairman and two members of the Council (to be nominated by F.F. and F.G. parties) with the County Engineer meet the Consultant to discuss the matter further.

DENTIST NEEDED IN LISMORE

No replacement for the dentist in Lismore who had recently retired from the post had been appointed by the Health Board, Cllr. J. Quirke complained at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council. He said that as a result, children and others requiring dental treatment had to travel to Cappoquin and this was creating a great deal of hardship. He asked the Council's representatives on the Health Board to raise the matter at the next meeting of the Board.

Cllr. B. Kyne, Chairman and Cllr. G. O'Halloran, the Council's representatives on the Board both stated that it was because of the financial cutbacks, a replacement dentist in Lismore could not be appointed.

Cllr. O'Halloran said that he had been informed that as there had been cutbacks in the Board's financial al-

locations the service in Lismore was being discontinued and as a result children will have to continue to travel to Cappoquin for

treatment.

Both Cllrs. Kyne and O'Halloran however agreed to again raise the matter at the Board's next meeting.

PROTEST AT CLOSURE OF WATERFORD A.C.O.T. OFFICE

On the proposal of Cllr. Oliver Coffey, Standing Orders were suspended at the outset of the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday to enable him to raise the matter of the closing of the A.C.O.T office in Waterford City.

Cllr. Coffey stated that during the past couple of weeks a number of farmers in East Waterford had approached him expressing their concern at the closing of the ACOT office in Waterford. Since the office was opened in the city in 1980 it had served the farmers in the east of the County well and its closure now was a sore point with them, he said.

"The fact that because of the closure the farmers of the area have been trans-

ferred to Mullinavat, Co. Kilkenny is another sore point with them as they will have to go outside the County to do their business", he added.

Cllr. C. O Riain supported the points made describing the closure of the city office as a retrograde step.

It was then unanimously agreed on the proposal of Cllr. Coffey seconded by Cllr. Cahill to send a resolution to Dr. Pierce Ryan of An Bord Teagasc protesting against the closure.

Deasy Not To Contest Euro Elections

Deputy Austin Deasy announced at the week-end that he has decided not to be a candidate in the June elections for the European Parliament. The former Minister for Agriculture told the "Leader" that he was not interested in going to Strasbourg and it was his intention to remain in national politics for the future.

THE CRAFT OF SKIN CARE

For most people the face is the focus of attention and the most immediate expression of a woman's beauty. It is certainly the area of the body women most worry about. They spend a great deal of money looking after it with creams and lotions, and of course the traditional facials, special treatments and face-lifts.

Everything seems to depend on the face. All of this is done in an attempt to make sure skin stays smooth and young-looking, well coloured and free from blemishes. Skin is one of the most important criteria for sexual attraction between men and women. Perhaps this is the main reason the face seems so important. In this article we will be looking at skin and skin care from the inside. We will find out what skin is, and what can be done to care for it well and to prevent it from premature ageing.

Lasting skin beauty is a question of lasting care. It is the everyday way you treat skin that matters year after year. In return for caring for your skin it will give you what you desire: beauty that at the very least is skin deep.

Skin is far more than just a superficial covering for your body. It is your largest organ. It covers a surface area of about 17 sq. ft. and weighs between six and eight pounds. Your skin is a world all its own — living tissue composed of millions of cells bathed in a lake of liquid with the same salt content as seawater. All skin tissue is nourished by tiny capillaries which bring fresh oxygen and nutrients to the cells.

Your skin depends on the rest of your body for its healthy existence. Like all living things, in order to function well and look beautiful, it has to be free to carry out all its duties unimpaired by lack of proper nutrients or oxygen, poor circulation, illness, internal pollution, or prolonged stress, all of which threaten its integrity.

LET'S BEGIN AT THE INSIDE

It should go without saying (yet this is the most consistently ignored truth about skin care) that first-rate nutrition is a must. All the nutrients your body needs for optimum health, your skin needs to keep it young and beautiful, including the vitamins, minerals, protein, essential fatty acids, trace elements and unrefined carbohydrates. So many specific problems such as brown patches or early wrinkling are mostly the result of internal neglect.

Next time you are in the supermarket take a look at the skin of the woman in front of you and note what she has in her shopping basket. Almost invariably, you'll find that people with beautiful skins are buying lots of fresh fruits and vegetables, while the others have their trolleys full of refined foods, sugars and industrially prepared goodies.

Proper elimination is essential for skin health and beauty. You need a diet high in natural fibre or roughage, from raw vegetables and/or whole grains. If ever you find yourself constipated, take a couple of tablespoons of bran each morning with plenty of liquid, either sprinkled on cereals or in yogurt, or mixed in a glass of juice. The liquid is vital in providing the bulk necessary for the bran to do its work.

Finally, don't forget to drink plenty of water, an essential nutrient you may never have thought of. It helps detoxify skin, dissolving hard debris that interferes with proper circulation. Water also removes wastes which can

cause cellulite.

If your diet is more than 50% raw fruits and vegetables, you don't need to be concerned with drinking too much extra water, for fresh foods themselves contain large quantities of water. If it is not, you should drink at least six to eight glasses a day for the sake of your skin.

VITAMINS AND YOUR SKIN

Vitamin A — This vitamin helps the size and functions of the sebaceous glands. These are the oil glands which lubricate your skin. A shortage of vitamin A can result in enlarged pores, rough skin and acne.

The B Complex Vitamins — These vitamins help keep nerves healthy and relaxed and aid circulation to the skin. A lack of one or more of the B group can result in redness, tenderness, or ulcerations around the corners of the mouth. The B group is also useful in controlling excessive oiliness and in avoiding discolorations of the skin that often appear on the

face and hands in middle age.

Vitamin C — This vitamin is necessary to maintain the health of collagen fibres. It is these fibres which give it its elasticity and firmness.

Vitamin E — Dry, rough or tired looking skin often improves when vitamin E is taken in supplementary form. Like vitamin C, vitamin E, plays an important role in holding back the skin's ageing process.

SKIN DESTROYERS AND HELPERS

Stress can adversely affect skin, causing lumps and blemishes to appear when you least want them. Long term stress also contributes greatly to the ageing process. Few women realise that exercise has a vital role to play in keeping your skin young. Fine skin depends on enough sleep, staying away from such stimulants as coffee, alcohol and tobacco, all of which are bad news for a complexion.

B.O.W. AND OLD DUNGARVAN GARDA BARRACKS

Deputy Brian Swift has received the following letter dated January 27, from Mr. Noel Treacy, Minister of State at the Dept. of Finance which has charge of the Board of Works:

I write to you on behalf of Mr. John Butler, 5 St. Monica's Terrace, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford in relation to the local Boy Scouts' wish to be allocated some space in the old Garda Barracks in Dungarvan.

I wish to advise that the Commissioners of Public Works have received a number of requests from local groups who are interested in setting up various activities in the former Garda Barracks building located within the Dungarvan Castle Complex.

The Commissioners do not at the present time have the financial or manpower resources necessary to undertake the major scheme of works they envisage carrying out at the Dungarvan Castle Monument. Pending their being in a position to do so, they are prepared to make a temporary conve-

nience letting, to a local Boxing Club, of a ground floor area of the former barracks building, located within the National Monument Complex, which has a separate access and which can be readily segregated from the rest of the barracks building, thus making it the most suitable temporary accommodation within the complex for youth/sport activities.

The club will be required to carry out any works necessary (electrics, heating, plumbing, decoration, etc.) to bring that particular accommodation into usable condition and will also have to have adequate insurance cover.

Should the proposed letting fail to be taken up for any reason, the Commissioners will consider the other requests made, including that of the Boy Scouts, at that stage.

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT WITH FR. PADDY

IT IS A SERIOUS MATTER!

"Except you do penance, you shall all likewise perish". It follows from these words of St. Luke that it is the will of God that all should practice penance. Jesus Himself gave us the example, but in our days of plenty we seem to have lost our zest for sacrifice. True, Jesus did not lay down the way to fulfill His command, so the Church, as is her office and duty, imposed a precept to regulate the way and the times. However, due to vast changes in man's way of life and work etc., the law became increasingly difficult to observe, and was being widely ignored. Hence the Church set about updating the precept. She described that Ash Wednesday and Good Friday be observed as days of fast and abstinence, and further directed that all Fridays and the days of Lent (Sundays and Solemnities excepted) be kept as days of penance. The Bishops of Ireland have determined that acts of self-denial from food external work of charity or acts of piety would meet and satisfy this obligation.

I feel that up to going to press that we have mostly failed to shoulder our responsibility! What did you do last year? We must shake off the influences of "eat and be merry." Indeed, it goes against the grain, but then God's words are serious: you must do penance if you hope to save your soul. Experience proves that fasting and temperance enable one to repress and control one's passions. And, did not Jesus show us that feeling is a means to beat off the attacks of the devil. When we practice mortification, the exercise helps to strengthen our will power, and make us master of our bodies. Of course, you must be motivated by love of God, and then, when so engaged, you are in fact hard at prayer.

The Apostles on one occasion were unable to cure a possessed boy, and they asked Jesus: "Why were we unable to cast the devil out of the boy?" He answered: "This kind can only be driven out by prayer and fasting." It means that self-denial is an extremely powerful prayer. The Church wants us to be always watchful, but she realises that there are acceptable times to encourage us, so to speak, to enter the fray, and Lent is one of these seasons. In the first of last Sunday's readings, you heard Moses reminding the people not to forget their deliverance, and to celebrate it annually by giving thanks to God. Likewise, Mother Church is encouraging us to follow Jesus into the desert and pray and fast and do good work in preparation for Easter.

You perhaps have made your Lenten resolutions. Then pray daily that God will bless your efforts, but should you have neglected to bestir yourself, you should consider what Jesus said, and ask Him to help you. Whatever you save through your self-denial, give it to S.V.P. or some other such organisation. Give too from your resources to help Concern etc. And, when we thank God on Easter morn for His great goodness, joyfully we will be able to tell Him that we shared our blessings with our needy brother and sisters. Helping others is an essential part of Christian living.

FREE ADULT EDUCATION

Many people would like to increase the ability and confidence in putting pen to paper. Adults who had interrupted schooling in childhood, due to illness and other factors, can now continue their education in all levels of English reading, writing and spelling.

As each learner has different needs and goals, one tutor is assigned to one student. Each pair works privately together at a mutually convenient time and venue, usually one hour a week. Students progress at their own pace and some go on to join a small writing group, from which a magazine is produced twice yearly.

The service is provided by the Dungarvan Literacy Scheme, through the

V.E.C. A tutor training course will be held in the Vocational School, Dungarvan in April. No qualifications are needed for people over eighteen years, and the course is free of charge.

200 WORK/STUDY PLACES FOR IRISH IN THE U.S.

Up to 200 young Irish people are required to participate in a year long Au Pair/Study Programme to America during 1989. The novel programme involving 9 European countries was set up with the approval of the U.S. Government. It is co-ordinated by an organisation called the Experiment in International Living a non-profit educational exchange organisation operating in over 30 countries all over the world that has consultative status at UNESCO and the Council of Europe.

Under the programme selected participants are issued with a JL visa which allows them a fully legal 13 months stay in the U.S. For 12 months they work as an Au Pair for an American family and register for a study course of

their choice. They are entitled to spend the final month touring in the U.S. before returning home.

GARDAI MOVE ON TEENAGE VANDALS IN DUNGARVAN

There was a sequel to the front page lead story in last week's "Leader" when Gardai brought prosecutions against a number of Dungarvan teenagers at Dungarvan Court on charges of malicious damage and robberies last week.

Garda D. Sheehan charged 19-years-old John Connors, 64 Childers Estate on 13 counts with damage to and robberies from a number of cars parked by residents of Clonee, Kilrush, Springfield, Comeragh Crescent and Silversprings on the night of Thursday/Friday, February 2/3 and further that on September 23, 1988 he caused malicious damage amounting to £54 to a window at the VG Supermarket, O'Connell Street, Dungarvan. Apart from gloves, a microphone and a pedal cycle which were stolen on the occasion, the damage to the cars was estimated at more than £500.

When the charges were read over to the defendant by District Justice Smithwick and when asked how he wished to plead he replied guilty to each charge.

In evidence, Garda Sheehan said that following a number of 'phone calls on the night in question from people in the areas mentioned that their cars had been damaged, he investigated the complaints. With another Garda he later went to 64, Childers Estate where he met and interviewed John Connors, who, being cautioned, admitted the offences. Witness added that later, Connors came to the Garda Station where he made a statement about the matter of his own free will.

"WE'LL GO ROBBING CARS"

Garda Sheehan then read the statement in which Connors said that on Thursday/Friday night, February

2/3, he was in a house in Cathal Brugha Place and there a juvenile suggested that "we'll go robbing cars." The pair then went to Clonee where they broke the side windows of a car parked there and from there they went on to Kilrush, Comeragh Crescent, Silversprings and Springfield and at each place they smashed car windows and damaged wipers and robbed the cars of their contents.

Garda Sheehan agreed in cross-examination that the defendant was most co-operative when questioned and while he agreed that he was not the worst of characters, he said that every now and then "he went off in this fashion." The defendant had a number of previous convictions going back to 1982.

The Court was then told on behalf of Connors that his home circumstances were not happy, that he was prepared to make an effort to go straight but that he required help in some form to do this.

District Justice Smithwick remarked, "he simply can't go on like this and I think it's pointless giving him a chance as he will just go off and do the same thing again. Even though he has admitted the offences and been co-operative, I think that is a very poor comfort for the people who found their property damaged as he has done."

It was suggested that a Community Service Order might prove a suitable penalty and the District Justice then agreed to adjourn the charges to the

next Court on March 8 to enable the Court Welfare Officer to report whether a Community Service Order would be appropriate in the case. The Justice then remanded the defendant on his own bail of £100 with a surety of £250 put up by his mother until that date.

TEENAGERS FINED FOR "JOY RIDING"

Two 18-years-old girls pleaded guilty to a charge that on the night of February 6/7 at Cappagh they allowed themselves to be carried in a car which had been stolen. They were Jacki Reddy, Lower Glen, Modeligo and Eileen Rioridan, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan who was residing with Reddy at the time. It was stated that Reddy was unemployed while Rioridan was a student on a FAS course.

Det./Gda. John Molloy told the Court that on the night in question the two defendants were at Reddy's in Lower Glen, Modeligo when 2 juveniles who were known to them arrived with a stolen car and they all went off and spent a number of hours driving around in it. Neither of the defendants had any previous convictions.

In reply to Mr. Niall King Solr. (J. F. Williams & Co.) who appeared for the defendants, witness agreed that the girls were not involved in the taking of the car and both were co-operative when they were approached and questioned about the matter.

Mr. King then told the Court that one of the juveniles involved in taking the car was in care and was known to the girls and when they arrived with the car the girls decided to go with them to see that they didn't get into any further trouble. He said that Eileen Rioridan had left her home some weeks ago but was now prepared to return to the control of her parents. Convicting both the defendants, District Justice Smithwick imposed a fine of £50 on each of them.

CHARGED AT CHILDREN'S COURT

At the Children's Court held earlier in the chambers of the District Justice a number of underage defendants appeared on charges of malicious damage and larceny and burglary.

In the first case a 16-

years-old youth was charged with breaking and entering the Allrounder Sports Shop, Grattan Square on September 15 last and stealing assorted goods the property of Pearse Moloney.

Mr. J. P. Gordon Solr. who appeared recommended that the case would be met by placing the youth on probation and agreeing to this District Justice Smithwick placed the youth on probation for a period of 6 months in his own bond of £100. "If you behave yourself all will be well but if you do anything wrong this time you can be brought back for sentence," he warned the defendant.

An added word of caution was added by Mr. John Murphy, Senior Court Welfare Officer, Clonmel who told the defendant that there was a lot of misbehaviour in Dungarvan at present "and you should have nothing to do with those involved in it."

STOLE CAR RADIO

A fifteen-and-a-half-years-old youth was charged that on January 27/28 at Mary Street, Dungarvan he stole a car radio valued £279 the property of Michael Irwin, Megavision.

On the application of Det./Gda. John Molloy who informed the court that further charges against this defendant were to be prepared, the matter was adjourned and the defendant was remanded on continuing bail to the Court sitting on March 8.

STOLE A CAR

The next charges involved another local youth aged 15 years 11 months and he was charged that on the night of January 31/February 1 at Ballinamuck he took a car the property of Thomas Kearns, Boreenatra without the owner's consent and further that he stole assorted property to the value of £10 from the car. In addition this defendant was charged that on the night of February 6/7 he entered Modeligo NS with intent to steal.

Evidence of arresting the defendant was given by Det./Gda. C. Kiely and by Gda. D. Sheehan who asked that the defendant be remanded on continuing bail as inquiries into the charges were not completed.

District Justice Smithwick then adjourned the charges until March 22 and remanded the defendant on continuing bail.

DRUNK DRIVING CHARGES AT DUNGARVAN COURT

Thomas O'Connor, Summerhill, Kinsalebeg, was fined £75, had his licence endorsed and was disqualified for the mandatory 12 months when he pleaded guilty at Dungarvan Court to a charge of driving with excess alcohol at Duckspool on December 1 last.

Supt. M. Keane who prosecuted told the court that a blood sample taken from the defendant on the occasion showed a blood/alcohol concentration of 143 mgrms.

Mr. J. Murphy, Solr.(M/S. Murphy, McCullagh) said that the defendant had been at a wedding reception at Clonea and was on his way home when he was stopped at Duckspool. Pointing out that the concentration was not very high, Mr. Murphy said that O'Connor was a mechanic and a driver and the loss of his licence would be a very severe penalty for him.

District Justice P. Smithwick convicted the defendant and imposed the penalties set out above but added that in view of what Mr. Murphy had said he was prepared to add a recommendation that the defendant's driving licence be restored after 6 months.

An additional fine of £75 for having no tax on the occasion was also imposed on the defendant.

DRUNK IN CHARGE

Tom Walsh, Barrashinane, Ballymacarby, pleaded guilty to being drunk in charge of a car at the Quay, Dungarvan on June 27 last.

Supt. Keane stated that at 2.20 a.m. on the date in question, Garda T. Murphy found the defendant at the

Quay pushing a car with the key in the ignition. When the Garda spoke to the defendant he formed the opinion that he was unfit to be in charge of a car and he arrested him and took him to the Garda Station where a blood sample was taken. On subsequent analysis this showed a concentration of 256 mgrms.

The Supt. added that the defendant had been aggressive to the Garda and had not been very co-operative on the occasion and had a previous conviction in 1985 when he was fined £100.

Mr. J. P. Gordon Solr. for the defendant said that Walsh did have a few drinks on the night in question and had gone for some chips and then intended to go home. He found the car wouldn't start when he went to the quay and he was pushing it when the Garda came along.

Mr. Gordon added that Walsh was not a very articulate person and while he might have sounded truculent he had no intention of being unco-operative to the Garda on the occasion.

District Justice Smithwick convicted the defendant, fined him £200 and ordered his licence to be endorsed but as he was not actually driving on the occasion he said he would not disqualify him.

LITTER BUGS AND SUPERMART TROLLEYS

One of Dungarvan's best-known personalities has complained to us bitterly about the proliferation of litter and the abandonment of trolleys from the various supermarkets around the streets of the town.

She was particularly vehement in her condemnation of adults and mentioned as an example the manner in which they littered the floor and precincts of the local post office in the days leading up to Christmas despite the fact the litter containers were provided in the building. There can be no doubt but that we all have much to learn where this litter problem is concerned but unfortunately, as we have pointed out so often in the past, the so typical Irish mentality that nothing's wrong unless you're caught continues to rule.

We regret that the only solution to the problem appears to be on-the-spot fines of a stiff nature for offenders. Perhaps when the public finds itself faced with heavy penalties whenever they negligently discard litter they will then desist from doing so.

In regard to supermarket trolleys, they certainly constitute a hazard when abandoned on the streets after having been used. We do not point the finger of blame in this regard at the supermarkets but again at the public in the person of customers who use them. In this case the suggestion was made that a deposit should be charged for the use of trolleys repayable when they are returned to the stores concerned. Perhaps such a step might solve this problem.

EXPLAINING OSTEO-POROSIS

Brittle bones or Osteoporosis happens when bones become so thin that they break easily. This happens as we get older when our bodies remove calcium from our bones more quickly than it can be replaced.

Recently Ms. Berna O'Dwyer, Marketing Co-ordinator National Dairy Council, at the request of Central Dairies, Dungarvan spoke about Osteoporosis to pupils in the 14-18 years age group at the Presentation and Mercy Convents in Dungarvan, the Mercy Convent in Cappoquin, the Presentation Convent in Lismore, the Technical School in Dungarvan and St. Declan's Community

School in Kilmacthomas. Teachers in the schools were presented with cassettes dealing with the subject while leaflets about it were distributed among the pupils.

It is on record that Osteoporosis affects at least 10% of Irish women over 50 years of age. But the crippling condition can be prevented by eating a healthy, varied diet with adequate calcium especially during the teenage years and up to the age of 40 or so, when peak bone capacity is reached. Sufficient calcium will be provided by as little as a single glass of milk each day and with some regular exercise thrown in for good measure there need be no fear.

LISMORE FARM FETCHES QUARTER MILLION PLUS

One of the main talking points throughout West Waterford during the past couple of weeks was the price paid for the 116 acre farm in the Lismore area which went up for public auction at the Lismore Hotel on Thursday, February 2. There were seven active bidders at the auction for the property comprised in the farm situated at Ashbourne, Lismore and when bidding reached the staggering £250,000 mark, the eventual purchaser, Mr. Michael Fennessey, stepped in with a final clinching bid of a further £5,000 to make the property his at £255,000.

Mr. Fennessey who originally hails from the Ballyduff area has spent many years in America where he has become an enormously wealthy man. With a permanent U.S. address at Garden City, Long Island, New York, he returned on a visit to his native area some years ago and in the interim he has purchased many valuable farms in the Blackwater and Bride Valley and has developed one of these, Ballinroone Fruit farm, Ballyduff as his permanent Irish base. He and the members of his family now regularly commute back and forth from the U.S.

Mr. Fennessey has also made a huge impact in the bloodstock scene, having purchased a big number of top-bred National Hunt and Flat mares while he has recently imported a consignment of animals from the States together with a number of stallions which will undoubtedly form the base for what very soon must become one of the leading stud farms in the country.

We congratulate Mr. Fennessey on his latest acquisition and wish him continued success and prosperity in the future.

The vendor of the Ashbourne farm was Mr. Jorg Dreher from West Germany, who used to farm there in the 1960's. The property was sold by Brendan O'Meara, Auctioneer, Fermoy and E. A. Ryan and Co. Solicitors, Dungarvan had the carriage of sale.

NEW LAW TO CURB DERELICTION

Minister for the Environment, Pdraig Flynn T.D., announced details of the new Derelict Sites Bill 1989 last week which, when it becomes law, will place a duty on the owners and occupiers of all land to take reasonable steps to ensure that the land does not become or does not continue to be a derelict site. It will be the duty of local authorities to ensure that this requirement is complied with. The Bill also provides, subject to certain exemptions, for an annual levy on derelict sites in urban areas.

The Minister is on record as stating that it was high time that owners and occupiers of derelict land faced up to their responsibilities and the Bill was aimed at giving local authorities the necessary legislative power to tackle and control the problem.

On these grounds the new Bill is to be welcomed.

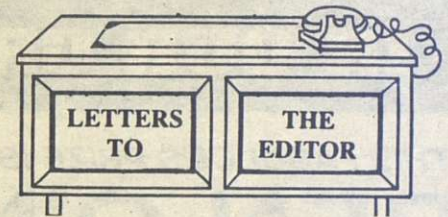

Court Sequel To Hurling Match Incidents

An incident in which it was claimed a player had his leg broken in two places when he was struck with a hurley by an opponent was related at Youghal Court when David Walsh, North Road, Shanagarry pleaded not guilty of assaulting Michael Cunningham, Cleary's Road, Gortroe and occasioning him actual bodily harm. Walsh brought a private prosecution against Cunningham for assault. The incidents took place during the course of a junior hurling match played at Gortroe pitch in Piltown, Youghal, on May 15, 1988.

Michael Cunningham stated in evidence that he came on as a sub on the Gortroe St. Ita's team at half-time that day. A high ball came in and he backed into Walsh who was playing for Russell Rovers, Shanagarry. "I then went up the field a bit," said witness, "and suddenly I got a severe blow from behind on the ankle and I fell to the ground. I saw Walsh behind me going back towards the goal. He was the player nearest to me."

Cunningham added that his leg had been broken in two places and he had been

in plaster for nine weeks.

In the course of cross-examination, witness denied that he had jabbed Walsh with his hurley.

POKE INTO RIBS

In the course of his evidence, David Walsh said that he was hurling for 31 years and was only once sent off and that was 16 years ago. He described how Cunningham and himself contested a high ball during which he had received a poke into the ribs from Cunningham. "I caught my breath for a few seconds", said wit-

ness, and when I straightened up I thought Cunningham was going to do the same thing again. I brought my hurley down to ward off the blow and it hit him in the ankle".

District Justice W. F. O'Connell dismissed the prosecution against Cunningham pointing out that at no stage of the game had the referee seen fit to caution him for rough play.

He then convicted Walsh on a reduced charge of common assault and fined him £30 with £84 in witnesses' expenses.

G.A.A. NOTES

WESTERN BOARD MEETING

As Board meetings go, this could not be described as one of the good ones. Several of the delegates from the clubs in the division left this, the first meeting of the new Board rather disappointed.

At the outset, Nioclas MacCraith, An Rinn surprised very many, by asking why the election of a fixtures committee was not listed on the agenda for the meeting. He said this was required by bye-law 3-08. Having pointed out that the particular bye-law required the Board to appoint and not necessarily elect, a fixture committee, the chairman, Denis McGrath stated that it had been the practice of the Officer Board to act as the fixtures committee for a long number of years and there had been no objections to this.

Finally he agreed to have the matter on the agenda for the meeting to be held on this Thursday night at Lawlor's Hotel.

At a later stage in the meeting a number of delegates pointed out that the delay in deciding on the composition of the fixtures committee would mean that the gradings and the format of the championships could not be decided upon until after the next meeting and James Bennett, Ballysaggart proposed that the fixtures committee be named to-night.

Several delegates agreed, but as Nioclas MacCraith, who had left the meeting at this stage, had been promised that the matter would appear on the agenda for the next meeting, the chairman ruled that the appointment would have to wait.

REGRADINGS

What must have been one of the most bizarre developments in the history of club regradings by the Western Board, happened when two club applications for regrading from intermediate to junior football were being considered.

An application by Tallow

club was supported by John Lyons who gave details of his club's declining standards and loss of interest in football in recent times. He said that because hurling was a priority in the club, they found it difficult to field last year and eventually had to concede a walkover in the championship. Several delegates supported their application, but quite a number were opposed. When a vote was taken, that application was declared lost by 25 votes to 20. The club then called for a roll-call vote and when this was granted and taken the result was reversed and declared passed by 31 votes to 29.

The situation was even more extraordinary in the case of An Rinn, whose intermediate club had a similar application. Having outlined their problems relating to ageing players and retirement, Nioclas MacCraith said they had not won a single game last year.

Again, some delegates spoke for and some against but when a vote was taken the application was decisively beaten on a count of 26 against 16 for. Another roll-call vote was asked for and granted — although in this case there was an objection to a revote because of the margin. The roll-call vote showed 30 in favour and 27 against, so the application was declared successful.

The affair has been the subject of much discussion since the meeting. One club delegate told me before leaving the hotel on Thursday, that he understood that in a roll-call vote, it was obligatory on clubs to vote one way or another. There is no obligation on anyone to vote in any circumstances.

Ballinameela's application to be regraded from intermediate to junior hurling was passed without objection.

Eamon Martin, Brickey Rangers requested that in view of the regrading in the intermediate football, that the championship be played in one section. He said this championship was ruined last year because of withdrawals. The chairman said the matter would be considered by the fixtures committee, when appointed.

In all a total of 129 regradings were approved and there were 58 transfers, including hurling and football.

A letter from St. Patricks club concerning the timing of the minor championships in both codes was discussed and then referred to the fixtures committee. The committee will also decide if teams with a player doing duty with a County team, will be expected to play on the same day.

MENTAL HANDICAP AND SPEECH THERAPYSERVICE

"COMMUNICATION NEEDS", — a discussion document prepared by the Special Interest Group of Speech Therapists in Mental Handicap — is to be launched by Mr. Terry Leydon, T.D., Minister of State at the Department of Health, on Wednesday, February 15th, 1989, in Buswells Hotel, Dublin.

This document examines the Speech Therapy Services to the population with Mental Handicap in Ireland.

Some of the points raised are as follows:

— 20,000 children and adults with a mental handicap in Ireland have difficulties with communication. Most of these have no chance of getting specific help with these difficulties.

— The communication needs of people with a mental handicap are served by the equivalent of 27 Speech Therapists for the whole country.

— Difficulty with communication is not necessarily part of a mental handicap. When it is, the combination of difficulties has a devastating effect on lives.

In Waterford City and County it is estimated that there are 338 adults and 340 children with a mental handicap.

There is no Speech Therapy Service to the adult population with Mental Handicap. The Speech Therapy input to the childhood population is a maximum of four and a half sessions per week, provided by the South Eastern Health Board.

RESEARCH RECOMMENDATION

The most up-to-date research recommends at least 6 full-time Speech Therapists for the estimated numbers with a Mental Handicap in the Waterford area.

To discuss these issues and to tie-in with the National Launch of 'Communication Needs', a special meeting has been arranged on Monday, February 20th, 1989 at 8 p.m. at —

Spring Garden Workshop, Spring Garden Alley, Waterford.

All those with a special interest in Mental Handicap are invited to attend this meeting.

DAILY FLIGHTS FROM WATERFORD

As from March 26, Aer Lingus will have daily flights from Dublin to and from Waterford Airport linking with their world wide schedules through Dublin. A Short's 360 aircraft will be used in the service which is aimed at boosting tourist traffic into the Waterford area as Waterford Airport will be featured in the Aer Lingus worldwide reservation system.

PRINTERS CALL OFF STRIKE ACTION AT "OBSERVER"

The month long strike at the "Dungarvan Observer" came to a dramatic end on Monday of last week when members of the management of the paper approached the striking printers who were on picket duty outside the premises of the paper in Shandon and offered them their jobs back unconditionally.

Strike action followed the dismissal of the four print workers (members of the National Graphical Association) and pickets were maintained at the 'Observer' premises throughout the period of the strike.

Confirming that the workers had been re-instated unconditionally in their jobs, Mr. Seamus Casey, Secretary, Waterford Branch N.G.A. in a statement to the "Leader" last Friday afternoon said that he was pleased and glad to see that the men

were back at work. He expressed the hope that good relations between management and workers would continue in the future and said that any outstanding problems would be dealt with by the accepted procedures of discussion between management and union.

Mr. Casey added that three of the workers had already resumed work and the fourth man who was at present indisposed would return to work when he was fit to do so.
