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Council's Plan To Curb Vandals In Dungarvan Housing Estate

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council were given first hand accounts of the vandalism and harassment which has been taking place for some time past at Childers Estate, the largest housing estate owned by the Council in the town, when three residents of the estate were received as a deputation at the Council's February monthly meeting.

What was related by the residents simply amounts to a reign of terror carried on under cover of dark by a minority group of vandals who, by their actions, are making life absolutely unbearable for the majority of residents at the estate.

The members of the deputation were Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Power, 62, Drumhill Drive and Mrs. Marion Crowe, 113, Childers Estate.

Mrs. Crowe told of how the public lighting at the estate was being so often vandalised that the ESB had told her that it was becoming too expensive to carry out repairs and make replacements. Public lighting was needed in the estate as it was in the darkness that the residents were open to vandalism and harassment, she said. For this purpose the lights were being deliberately broken and then the gang responsible could do what

they liked.

She said that an open square in the estate was the gathering place for up to 20 in the gang and in the dark 'you could get anything thrown at your door or in over the wall'. She added that the guards were unable to do anything as the place was too open and the gang were able to make their get away at the back. "And," added Mrs. Crowe, "if you say anything, all you'll get is the height of abuse and if you go to the guards to make a complaint you are immediately in trouble. We're supposed to close our eyes to all that's going on but something needs to be done to give us some bit of peace".

WINDOW BLOWN IN

Mrs. Power told the Council members how her back window was blown in and the baby had been cut by the flying glass. "Something will have to be done to close up the back as that

is the way they get away when the guards come," she said. Mrs. Power went on to say that they had been threatened that they would be burned out and they were being continually harassed. "The houses there are fine but the vandalism is just terrible and the situation there is unbelievable, and something will have to be done," she added.

In reply to questions as to who was responsible, Mrs. Power said that they had come in from all over and from places like Cappoquin and Lismore and they were now living with people in the estate. Matters in the estate at present were very vicious and she was afraid that there was going to be big trouble. "People are afraid to come and talk about it but we're not afraid," she said adding that despite all that was happening Childers was a lovely estate and the houses there were very good.

Mr. P. Power disclosed how he had been called an informer for going to the guards and said that he could not grow a flower or shrub in his garden as they had been pulled up. He said

that they were unable to step outside the house because of the damage that would take place and they could put up with this no longer. "If they come in again", he said, "I'll shoot them and something will happen but I don't care if I get jail out of it".

In reply to further questions, members of the deputation stated that they would be prepared to go into Court and give evidence if the culprits were caught.

After the deputation had withdrawn from the meeting, the Town Engineer, Mr. George Taylor said that there would be a lot of objections to closing in the back of the estate as this provided the only rear access to a lot of the houses.

Cllr. T. Wright thought the lights at the estate should be repaired irrespective of the cost.

Cllr. B. Kyne said that the minority group who were responsible for the trouble and the damage hadn't been brought to court for want of evidence and had been getting away with it as a result. "Maybe

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THE CRAFT OF SKIN CARE

(By Carmel Horan, Proprietress of Carmel's Beauty Salon, Main Street, Dungarvan)

Theoretically, having beautiful skin is simple. That's the theory. In practice, however things can go wrong. An early wrinkle, brown spots to mar a perfect complexion, acne, dryness, roughness — that's when you need help from special cosmetics and treatments and also professional advice.

WHEN SKIN DRIES OUT

Dried-out, dried up skin usually comes from under-active sebaceous glands, which due to a hormone imbalance don't produce enough of this important oily fluid to lubricate the skin and protect it from excessive water loss. It can also be the result of being exposed to excessively drying weather conditions, central heating or air conditioning. Another, rarer cause is being on a diet too low in essential fatty acids, such as a fat free slimming regime. Finally, sometimes dried-out skin is due to an incorrect water balance in the outer layer of cells as a result of their being exposed to water (e.g. in swimming) for so long that they have swollen and burst. Excessive dryness of the skin also occurs on people who unknown to themselves are suffering from subclinical deficiencies of Vitamin A or B or any one of several of the B-Complex group.

The incidence of dry skin is increasing, probably as a result of air pollution, artificial atmospheric conditions, the use of certain drugs, or the overuse of detergents and soap on the face. A combination of these factors will result in skin that can look a dullish grey-white colour and boast an even increasing number of fine lines.

PREVENTION AND CURE

Use a water oil moisturiser on your face night and day to protect against excessive water loss by trapping the water in the outer layer of the skin and preventing it from being given up into the atmosphere. Ensure you get enough essential fatty acids in your diet by using olive, sunflower, or safflower oil in your salad dressings. Consider taking supplements of Vitamins A and D in the form of fish liver oil, or drinking fresh carrot juice a couple of times a day. Fish liver oil put directly on the skin can help too. Other helpful things include weekly steaming of the skin followed by an oil massage. Don't wash your skin with soap. Don't use any skin product containing alcohol. Use a mask for dry skin. Always choose an oil based make-up foundation.

ULTRASENSITIVE AND ALLERGIC SKIN

Although allergies and allergic reactions to particular substances are not inherited, a tendency to them can be. Approximately 15% of all women are said to be highly prone to allergic reactions. But on the whole, allergic complaints are on the increase. The word allergy means "altered response" in Greek. If you are allergic to something, this means that your body has come into contact with it and instead of reacting normally to it, or not at all, it has reacted hostilely. This seldom happens the first time you meet the substance, but if for some reason your body takes a dislike to it, it will create an antibody. This will cause a series of reactions finally resulting in raised, red, itchy blotches in the skin. This is known as an acute reaction for it occurs within seconds or minutes after coming in contact with the substance. You can inhale it in the form of a hair spray or you can take it in through the skin as a face cream or make-up product.

The only effective way to deal with skin sensitivities is to locate the substance or produce causing trouble and then remove it from your life. A clue to its identity lies in the area where the red blotches or scaling first appears. If it is on your hands for instance, check out the detergents you have been using, your hand creams, nail polish, the soap you wash your hands with. If it is around the eyes, it may be an eye cream an eye make-up remover, a mascara or an eye shadow.

Test this out by smearing a little of the substance on the gauze of a band-aid and then tape it to a newly washed area of your back or under arm. Use a fresh band-aid for each substance. Then leave the patches on for the 24 hours and remove. Any area that shows up red or blotched indicates that the substance on that patch is one to which you have a sensitivity. After that avoid it.

WHEN ACNE STRIKES

It is more common among teenagers than among any other age group, although acne, an infection of the oil glands, can occur at any time in life. It shows up as blackheads, whiteheads, pimples and pustules that occur on the face and neck, back and chest, almost always when levels of testosterone or progesterone — two hormones necessary for growth — are high. Testosterone, known as the male hormone (although women have it in small quantities too) spurs the oil

glands to increase their production of sebum. When too much sebum is produced, an oily plug can fill the duct, which then becomes infected while the skin around it becomes inflamed. Many people with acne are victims of one or another food allergy — the most common allergens being wheat, milk or preservatives and colourings. And when the elimination of waste via the alimentary canal is inadequate, often wastes are eliminated through the skin. Finally, stress and emotional upset are often implicated.

PREVENTION AND CURE

Look to your diet first. Eliminate sweets, sugared soft drinks and fatty foods such as nuts and fried foods. A diet in which at least 50% of your foods are eaten raw often does wonders for even long term acne, provided it is used in

conjunction with the proper external care. Externally, it is essential to keep the skin clean, removing dirt and excess oil regularly, but this should be done with gentle, PH-balanced cleansers, that do not contain sulphur or bactericides or other drying chemicals, which in the long run can only make matters worse. Skin should be washed in warm water at least twice a day. Of course your hands should be immaculate so as not to encourage further infections. Salon treatments should be considered and advice on products sought. Antibiotics may also be necessary in the treatment of acne and because of the stress aspect of acne, both regular exercise and deep relaxation can be helpful too.

Next week I will discuss broken veins and reddish skins, brown spotting of the skin and facial hair.

EUROPEAN YEAR OF INFORMATION ON CANCER

1989 has been designated the European Year of Information on Cancer and members of the Waterford Faculty of the Irish College of General Practitioners have undertaken to write some short educational articles on the common types of cancer and how they may be treated or prevented for publication as an information service.

The following is the first of these articles:

LUNG CANCER

Cancer of the lung is the commonest preventable cancer seen in Ireland. It is a very serious condition, the average survival after diagnosis is about six months, and only one in ten of those in whom lung cancer is discovered will still be alive in five years. Four times as many men as women develop lung cancer, but as more and more women are smoking nowadays, this may change.

The connection between cigarette smoking and lung cancer is now established beyond doubt and over 90% of lung cancers are caused by smoking. A few cases occur in workers exposed to heavy metals such as asbestos and nickel in industries.

Symptoms suggestive of lung cancer include cough, hoarseness, breathlessness, spitting of blood, and chest infections which do not clear up with appropriate treatment. If the disease spreads, there may be weight loss, fatigue, swollen glands, bone pain, muscle weakness and personality changes if the brain is involved. These complaints do not necessarily mean lung cancer, but if they occur in heavy

smokers or older people and do not clear up, then medical advice should be sought.

DIAGNOSIS

Lung cancer is diagnosed by examination of the chest, chest x-rays, analysis of the sputum, and a technique known as bronchoscopy where the inside of the lung is viewed through a special flexible tube. If the cancer is discovered early, surgery may be successful but only a quarter of those who survive surgery will be alive in five years. Radiation can help distressful symptoms in advanced cases but does not prolong life.

Some unusual types of lung cancer can be treated with certain special drugs but results are not very good.

Ninety per cent of all lung cancers can be prevented by giving up smoking. This is a public health problem, and legislation to prohibit smoking in public places is to be welcomed, as there is evidence that passive smoking (inhaling of smoke by non-smokers) puts many non-smokers at risk. It is also important that children are educated at an early age about the dangers of smoking. Lung cancer is preventable if the will is there.

YOU MUST HAVE THE KEY!

From the first reading for the third Sunday in Lent, we learn from Moses' encounter with Israel's God that He is a God of action, and a God who responds to every cry for help: it is significant that He expects faithfulness in return. The second explains further that when God extended help and deliverance to Israel, it was equivalent to an invitation to come and serve Him. This teaching is for our example and for our benefit.

Just as the people of Israel had a choice as displayed on numerous occasions by their willful insubordinations, we too are endowed with free will. We may elect to be like the unproductive fig tree, which is content to extract strength and life from the earth, but gives nothing back in return or we may choose to obey and bear fruit in abundance. The Gospel reminds us of some of the national disasters that occurred in the life of the Jewish people from which we would be wise to conclude that life is full of uncertainties; and that we should take heed, and make our peace with God.

Since Lent started, a good deal of emphasis has been placed on preparation, but now the Church is urging all of us and especially the careless to look into our souls. The good Lord invites us all to repent, and create a trusting relationship with Him. Unfortunately, like the people of Israel, large numbers ignore the need of repentance. "Delay not to be converted to the Lord" saith the Holy Spirit. I do not have to mention the weakness of human nature: one does not have to look beyond oneself! Hence, the wise and the prudent betake themselves to the fountain of Divine Mercy, and pray: "Lord, be merciful to me a sinner." Whereas, the foolhardy ignore the call from God, and that is both sad and dangerous.

It matters not how high we have erected barriers and ramparts between ourselves and God for there is not a sin in the world, even the most wicked, which our Father in Heaven is only too ready, eager and happy to pardon. "I desire not the death of a sinner, but rather that he turns from his way and lives." Truly, God's mercy is boundless for there is no limit to His forgiveness. The snag is that we will betake ourselves to the cleansing waters of Confession. Still, we might well sing with the Psalmist "Praise the Lord, for He is good: for His mercy endureth forever."

In preparing for Confession I would suggest that you take a look at the Cross, and consider quietly what Jesus suffered to make reparation for sin. Go through the passion in your mind. It will draw you closer to Jesus and gratitude and love will flow from your heart. Many of our greatest Saints found their strength in the Cross. Then, you will kneel down and ask for pardon, and you will rise with a strong determination to live as befits a Saint.

God asks us to live by His law. The fact that He, the Son of God, endured so much suffering, should make us realise the seriousness of sin. Adam's sin closed Heaven. Jesus re-opened it. And, in His great mercy, He has made available to all the tools to forge the Key to open the gateway into Heaven. Hence, it is vitally important that we have our Key when we step into eternity

Tallow Horse Breeder Wins Circuit Court Appeal

A hill climb rally organised by the Tipperary Light Car and Motor Cycle Club, Clonmel and held at the Sweep, Tallow on June 7, 1986 was mentioned at the Hilary Circuit Court Sittings in Dungarvan before Judge D. P. Sheridan last week when the Club appealed against a District Court ruling awarding damages to Mr. Noel Henley, landowner and horse breeder, Tallow, on foot of the death of a foal alleged to be due to the negligence of the club.

Outlining the case, Mr. S. Lanigan-O'Keeffe, B.L. (instructed by D. J. O'Meara & Sons, Solrs.) for Mr. Henley, said that his client was a landowner at Tallow bridge and kept thoroughbred brood mares. For some years the Tipperary Light Car Club held rallies at the Sweep in Tallow and for the purpose they would get the County Council to close the road and they would notify the local landowners concerned that a rally was to take place. During this period there had been no trouble.

However, said counsel, on this occasion the rally was restarted after a 2-years lapse and no notification that it was to be held was given either to Mr. or Mrs. Henley. The first Mr. Henley knew about the rally was on the Saturday morning when he heard the noise of a loud-speaker and then saw a car warming up and then zoom up the narrow road at 60 to 70 m.p.h. He said that Mr. Henley at once went to try to bring in his mares which were out on the land adjoining the Sweep but he was unable to catch them at first. Eventually he did manage to get them in but at that stage they were in a state of considerable distress as a result of the noise. On the following Sunday night a foal was born to one of the mares. The birth had been normal but the foal failed to survive.

Mr. Lanigan-O'Keeffe said that the value of the foal had been agreed at £2,050.

BORN ALIVE

John Griffin, Veterinary Surgeon, in evidence told the Court that he carried out a post mortem examination on the dead foal and found that it had been full term and born alive. He had

found nothing abnormal but when he was informed that the mare had been in distress the day before the birth, he formed the conclusion that pre-birth stress had been responsible for the foal's death as it would not then have had sufficient cortisone and this would have caused its inability to breathe.

Mrs. H. Henley, wife of the plaintiff stated in the course of her evidence that she had got no notification of the rally and on the morning it was to take place she had to take two mares to the stud. At around 1 o'clock she went to collect the mares in a horse-box and she then found her husband trying to bring in the mares which he said "were going cracked all over the place" because of the noise. She added that the rally was then going to start and one car had gone down the road at great speed.

In reply to Mr. P. McCarthy, B.L., for the Car Club, Mrs. Henley denied that she had received any notification of the rally handed in by Tony Morrissey at her petrol station and shop. She admitted they had usually got notification when the rally was held in former years but not on this occasion.

Noel Henley stated that he never had any objection to these rallies and from his father's time they always got prior notice that a rally was to take place but they got no such notification this time. As a result he had no idea that a rally was being held until he heard the public address system at about 12 o'clock that day. It was extremely loud and as it continued he became concerned about the mares. Had he known there was to be a rally he would have

taken the mares in. When he tried to collect them they were excited and as he tried to corner them they became more excited. When he eventually got them in they were sweating and in a very distressed state.

Tony Morrissey, Glasshouse, Curraglass, in evidence said that he was Clerk of the Course for the rally and part of his duties was to notify the local landowners in the vicinity of the course beforehand about the rally. He said that the rally was advertised in the "Cork Examiner" and in the local shops and he said that he had dropped in a notice about it to Henley's petrol station. Mrs. Henley was not there at the time but a child aged about 12 or 14 years was in the shop.

HEATED ARGUMENT

Michael Moloney, Springmount, Dungarvan said that he was a Steward of the Club at the Rally on June 7, 1986, and when he got a message from Tony Morrissey, he went over and found a heated argument going on between him and Mr. Henley. He quietened matters down and offered to get help for Mr. Henley

to get his animals in.

In reply to a question by Judge Sheridan, witness agreed that it was very important that everyone concerned with a rally should be notified. "It has always been our policy to keep the public fully informed in this way," he said.

Judge Sheridan giving his decision said that the proper course was that notification of the rally should be given and he found that this was where the defendant's case fell down. If Mrs. Henley had been given notice and if Mr. Henley did not move the mares he would then only have himself to blame. But to give the notice to a 14 year old was not sufficient. "In my view," the Judge then stated, "the Club was not entitled to carry on any activity without giving such notice and having come to that conclusion it means that the plaintiff (Mr. Henley) is entitled to a decree for the agreed damages of £2,050 together with costs and I accordingly affirm the order already made in the case by the District Justice."

FATAL KILLEAGH BUS CRASH RECALLED

An inquest into the death of 29-years-old bus driver, Noel Kent of 43, Sandown Crescent, Togher, Cork which occurred when the Expressway Bus which he was driving crashed at Killeagh Gardens near the Old Thatch pub in Killeagh, Co. Cork shortly before 8.30 a.m. on December 19 last, was held in Midleton last Wednesday.

Medical evidence was given by Dr. Richard Daly, pathologist, who told the Coroner, Dr. C. O'Connell that as a result of a post mortem examination which he performed on the deceased at Youghal Hospital he formed the opinion that death was due to cardiac respiratory failure due to asphyxia resulting from a traffic accident.

Asked by Mr. Michael Corkery, Solr., who appeared for the next-of-kin, if, as a result of his examination, he would say what the driver's condition was immediately prior to the impact, Dr. Daly replied that as far as he was concerned he was a fit man and there was no anatomical impediment to normal behaviour.

THROWN TO THE FLOOR

Margaret O'Keeffe, Killyshil, Dungarvan, one of the three passengers on the bus that morning, told the

inquest that the bus appeared to be going slower than normal. She could not recall whether the bus stopped at Youghal and she never heard the driver pass any remarks before the accident. All she could remember was being thrown on to the floor when the impact occurred.

Garda Arthur Hennessy, Garda PSV Inspector, Union Quay, Cork, gave evidence of various inspections and tests carried out on the crashed bus and said that as a result of these he was satisfied that the damage to the steering, braking system and other components was caused by the impact.

Sergt. T. Behan also gave evidence.

A verdict in accordance with the medical evidence was then returned by the jury and sympathy was extended to the next-of-kin by the Coroner, by Supt. Maurice Murray who represented the Garda authorities and by the jury.

EXTRA PUBLIC LIGHTS SOUGHT BY COUNCILLORS

Cllr. W. McDonnell proposed at the February monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held in Dungarvan that the ESB be requested to erect a light at the entrance to St. Carthage's Church, Lismore from the South Mall side for the benefit of people attending Saturday night Mass in Lismore.

Cllr. McDonnell said that the problem might be solved by switching a light from an existing position as at present the entrance by the church at that side was in darkness.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that there was no money available for the erection of extra lights but he thought that the problem could be solved when the existing lights in Lismore were upgraded. He promised to keep the position in mind.

LIGHT AT AFFANE CHURCH

Stating that it was a case of absolute necessity, Cllr. James A. Walsh proposed that the Council erect an ESB light at Affane Church car park. Cllr. Walsh said that while this car park was one of the best ever provided by the Council it had the drawback of having no lights and people had to walk from it to the church in the dark at evening Masses and funerals.

The County Engineer admitted that it would be

most desirable to have a light there and there was even a pole on which a light could be placed but the position was the Council had no money to meet the cost involved.

Mr. O'Flynn added that if the church authorities were prepared to put up the cost then the light could be erected.

Cllr. Walsh said that he would make an inquiry to find if this would be possible and Mr. O'Flynn said that he would ascertain the cost involved from the ESB.

PLANNING PERMISSION FOR BONMAHON HOUSES

Waterford Co. Council has granted planning permission to Mr. G. Walsh per Mellon, Halpin and Associates, Architects, Dublin for the erection of 8 houses at Bonmahon.

BALLINAMULT PUB'S "PROUD RECORD" BROKEN

"Not since the licensing laws were introduced has there been a conviction in respect of this pub," Mr. Eamonn P. King, Solr., told District Justice P. Smithwick at Cappoquin Court when James Hanrahan, Ballinamult, pleaded guilty to a breach of the licensing laws.

The court was told by Garda Donal Foley that when he entered the premises at 12.25 a.m. on December 3 through one door customers "flew out" another door and he only obtained a few names.

Mr. King said that within living memory there had not been a conviction against this pub. There was a retirement party that started late

and finished late, but he doubted if the publican would ever again be in breach of the licensing laws.

District Justice Smithwick accepted that the pub, and publican, had "a proud record" and he imposed a fine of £25 on Hanrahan and £25 on each of the "found ons."

Supt. M. Keane prosecuted.

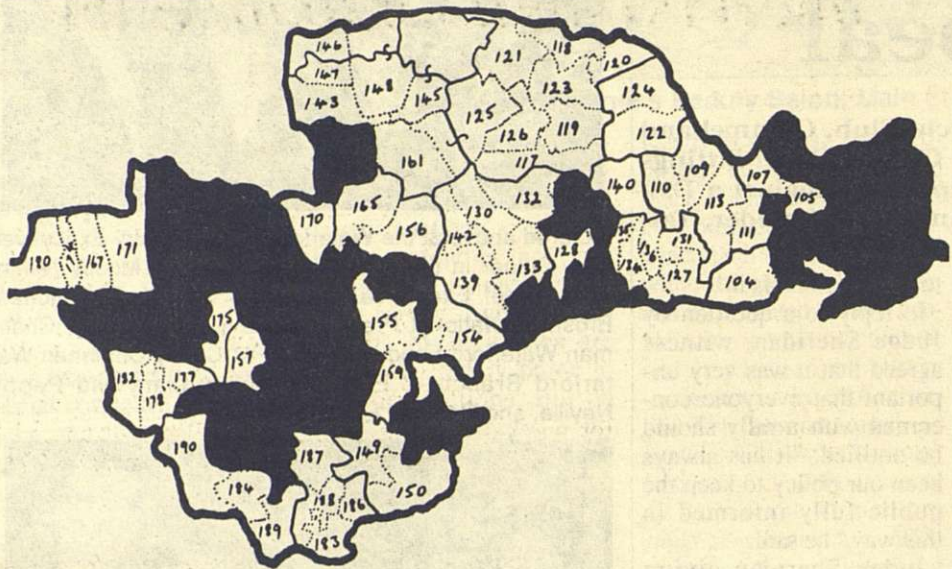
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I.F.A. TO INVESTIGATE CO. WATERFORD "BLACKSPOTS"

Protecting the National Herd

Following intense pressure from I.F.A., a number of special research teams are to be set up by E.R.A.D. to investigate major T.B. and Brucellosis blackspot areas throughout the country. The move was welcomed by the Association's Co. Waterford Animal Health Committee Chairman, Mr. John Cashman who said I.F.A.'s persistent calls for greater emphasis on the causes of T.B. outbreak had finally been answered.

"In addition to Offaly other areas are persistent blackspots which have had problems with T.B. for years and farmers in these areas will welcome this latest action. The teams involved will be drawn from Teagasc and E.R.A.D., and will report directly to Dr. Downey and the E.R.A.D. board," said Mr. Cashman.

"With new outbreaks of T.B. now numbering over 3,000 a year, this type of research project is urgently needed to provide scientific answers to this major scourge which is devastating so many farm families," he added.

Mr. Cashman went on to say that I.F.A. are currently seeking a substantial increase in compensation levels for T.B. reactors which at the present levels leave farmers with unsustainable losses.

Site For Oil Depot In Dungarvan

Dungarvan Urban Council at their February monthly meeting unanimously approved of the sale of Site No. 10 (area .536 acres) at the Council's Industrial Estate at Kilrush to East Star Petroleum Co. for the purpose of an Oil Depot for the sum of £13,500.

The site was portion of the lands recently purchased by the Council from Mr. Jack Curran, Gallowshill.

Taxation Has Put Fear Of God Into Farmers

The fear of God has been put into farmers about taxation on Accounts when over two-thirds of farmers do not have a taxable income, said Mr. Patrick Phelan, Chairman, Waterford I.F.A. Farm Business Committee.

Mr. Phelan said, "This would include most farmers whose rateable valuations are £20 or less. Most of these farmers can now be taken completely out of the tax net by completing the new Farm Profile-Basic form which will soon be available.

I.F.A. has successfully negotiated a simpler Farm Profile form for all farmers who have never been contacted by the Revenue.

"I.F.A. are also negotiating a more comprehensive Farm Profile form which will give every farmer the option of making his return without having to pay accountants. This is positive action by I.F.A. to minimise accounting costs to farmers" added Mr. Phelan.

Cattle Price Increase Sought By I.F.A.

The Irish Farmers' Association has called for a minimum price increase of 3p/lb carcass weight for beef cattle with effect from Monday, 27th February.

The call was made by the Association's Co. Waterford Livestock Committee whose chairman, Mr. Tom Leahy said in a statement recently, that such an increase was justified because of the elimination of MCA taxes, the higher VAT refund and the resumption of intervention support for R grade steers.

The IFA and the meat factory representatives have already held a meeting with the Minister for Agriculture & Food, Mr. Michael O'Kennedy, to discuss how the serious financial crisis of winter beef producers can be resolved.

The IFA is proposing that the intervention prices for steers be increased in Ireland and also that the community export refunds for beef and live cattle be increased to restore profitability for farmers producing beef for the export market.

Judge Sheridan then commented that if people

were not readers of the 'Cork Examiner', then notices in it were of no use to them. "I know", said the Judge, "that at the same time Cork people are very loyal to their own paper but this was an event being held in Co. Waterford".

DUNGARVAN SCHOOL THAT NEVER WAS HAS COST £67,000

The financially hard-pressed County Waterford Vocational Education Committee has spent more than £67,000 in planning for a new school that may never be built it was disclosed at last week's monthly meeting of the Committee in Dungarvan.

Mr. Donal Kelleher, CEO, told the members that while the actual sanction for the proposed new vocational school in Dungarvan has not been officially withdrawn, the approval to go ahead with it is being withheld.

To date, the VEC has spent £44,596 on the purchase of a four-acre site, fees, and advertisements. Professional fees cost a further £22,667 and with £37 for "other expenses" the total cost has come to £67,263.

"What have we for that considerable sum," asked Cllr. M. O'Riordan. Providing the answer to his own question he added, "absolutely nothing."

He accused the Department of Education of letting the VEC and the people of Dungarvan down. "It is the Department that has knocked the new school," he said.

STILL A CHANCE

Cllr. D. Goode, however, said that the Department's original sanction has not been withdrawn. "There is still a chance the school will go ahead."

The Chairman, Cllr. P. Coffey, said sanction is one thing but getting the money is quite another. It was "most disappointing" that the committee had spent more than £67,000 on something that might never become a reality.

Replying to members, the CEO said the estimated cost of the proposed new school is £750,000.

PENSMAN Takes You... Behind The SPOTLIGHT

MINISTER TO RATIONALISE DISTRICT COURT CENTRES

The Minister for Justice, Mr. Gerry Collins T.D., in the course of his address to delegates at the annual Fianna Fail Ard Fheis in Dublin last week-end stated that he would soon be announcing plans for a rationalised District Courts network throughout the country. Minister Collins said that at the present time when travel within the country was so easy and fast they could no longer justify 250 District Court locations.

This announcement by the Minister again brings into focus the question of District Court centres in West Waterford. At present we have monthly sittings of the Court at Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow in addition to bi-monthly sittings in Dungarvan and Youghal.

Last year the County Manager recommended as an economy measure, — the Courthouses have to be provided and maintained by the Co. Council — that the West Waterford Court sittings all be held in the Courthouse, Lismore, thus dispensing with the expense of maintaining the accommodation at present required for Cappoquin and Tallow. This recommendation was subsequently endorsed by the Waterford Law Society, representing the solicitors practising in the county.

However on the couple of occasions that the matter was raised at meetings of the County Council, the recommendation was vehemently opposed by the local Councillors in the Cappoquin and Tallow areas on the grounds that the removal of the District Court sittings from these areas would downgrade the towns and result in a major economic loss for them.

Now, the latest statement by the Minister for Justice would seem to indicate that the matter will be taken out of the County Council's hands and that the decision as to how many District Court centres will function for the future in the West Waterford area will be made by the Department of Justice.

CHURCH GATE COLLECTIONS

The problem of the increase in the number of church-gate collections and the embarrassment they create for Mass-goers has been referred to in this column on a number of occasions in the past. Now we note that in the neighbouring diocese of Cloyne, a crackdown on these collec-

tions has been initiated and this could well be repeated in other parts of the country.

The level of collections increased to such an extent in the Co. Cork diocese that many people complained that they were being prevented from attending Sunday Mass.

Now Bishop John Magee and the 16 strong Council of Priests of the Cloyne diocese have moved urgently to crackdown on the spate of church-gate collections.

A strongly worded statement issued recently by the priests of the diocese and approved by Bishop Magee declared: "The coming together of people for the celebration of Mass is a sacred occasion. Advantage is being taken of this by groups for the convenience of fund-raising. Church-gate collections are not related to the purpose for which people assemble at Mass". The statement added that worshippers constantly complained that church-gate collections caused them "great embarrassment" while others spoke of being prevented from attending Mass because of the number of collections.

The statement read at all Masses last Sunday week went on: "We request that collections be made well away from all entrances to the church grounds and in any case not less than 25 metres in keeping with the condition of the garda permit. It is requested that proper notification be given to the parish priest in regard to church-gate collections, at least as a matter of courtesy".

As similar problems experienced by Mass-goers throughout the diocese of Cloyne are occurring in this diocese perhaps similar action as that initiated in Cloyne might be introduced here.

DUNGARVAN AMENITIES TO BE PRESERVED

Items to be considered for preservation include: — Barry's Stores; St. Mary's Church of Ireland Church and Gates; St. Mary's Catholic Church, railings and gates; Waterford Co-op Offices (old Provincial Bank); Courthouse, Priory House and Friary House and Church; Old CBS School, Shandon; Shandon House and Church site; Nos. 2 to 6, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 and 27 Church Street; South Terrace; Seaview Terrace, Strandside North; Mountain View; Old Rectory, Land's End; Thatched house, Strandside South; Merry's Restaurant; the shop fronts at Morrissey's, O'Connell Street, Alicia's and Power's Bakery, O'Connell Street, Mickey Landers, Delaney's and Curran's Hardware, Grattan Square, M. Moloney, John Casey and Corcoran's, Main Street and Bridget Dee's, Mary Street; Band Stand and Arch Entrance to Dungarvan Park; Cast Iron Balcony at Lawlor's Hotel; Archway to Power's Brewery; Limestone Paving Flags in Friary Street, Pillar Post Box in Church Street and the Cast Iron External Stairs at the old CBS School.

This section of the Town Plan which relates to the development of the Urban District over the period 1989-2001, allowing for the statutory five yearly reviews, seeks to preserve and enhance the unique natural setting of the town and this is to be welcomed.

Thank you, Mayolin van Limburg Stirum".

The note, of course, referred to the publication in this column a few weeks back of the words of "The Old House" which had been requested by Mai for her Dutch friend. The story is now complete.

APPEALS AGAINST ASSAULT CONVICTIONS FAIL

Arising from a free-for-all involving three brothers and three professional bouncers which occurred at Bridge Street, Dungarvan on the night of July 10-11 last, appeals against convictions for assault were brought by two of the brothers at last week's sitting of Dungarvan Circuit Court. At the District Court in Dungarvan last November all three of the bouncers were convicted of assaulting the brothers while two of the latter were convicted and fined for assaulting the bouncers.

At the Circuit Court last week, Thomas and Martin Fitzgerald, Ballinroad, Dungarvan appealed against their convictions for assaulting Jesse Hen-

nessy, Cork Road, Waterford and Richard Ryan, Ballybeg Square, Waterford who with Louis Connolly, Ballybeg, Waterford, were employed as bouncers at Lawlor's Hotel on the night in question.

Having heard the evidence of Frank Ahearne, night porter at the hotel, Jesse Hennessy and Richard Ryan and Garda C. Kelleher for the State and of the appellants Tom and Martin Fitzgerald as well as of their brother John, Judge D. P. Sheridan said that he was quite convinced that on the occasion the Fitzgerald trio were aggressive and refused to leave the hotel. When an effort was made to get them out they turned nasty and he felt district Justice O'Connell had been perfectly right in doing what he did. But having said that he felt that the Fitzgerald's had got more than they bargained for.

Judge Sheridan then said that he would adjourn the cases for a year and remand the two Fitzgeralds on continuing bail, a condition of which was that neither would enter Lawlor's Hotel or Zeta's Night Club during that year. If they behaved during that time he would then consider what he would do.

NATIONAL HURLING LEAGUE

DEATH OR GLORY GAME FOR WATERFORD

Following our shattering defeat by Wexford in round 5, very few will be prepared to gamble on our chances of beating Offaly in round 6 of the National Hurling League, when the sides meet at Fraher Field on next Sunday.

The visitors, like ourselves, have but two points so far, but it is a very long time since they played as badly as we did at Wexford Park two weeks ago.

Ordinarily, Offaly are a better side than Waterford and proof of this is seen in the Leinster championship where they have performed very well in recent years. Only last year they lost to Galway in the semi-final, having previously won the Leinster title. A team that good are not to be sneezed at, even though they may have only a couple of league points.

In their match against Kilkenny, on the same day on which we lost to Wexford, Offaly surrendered a seven points half-time lead to lose by a couple of points, in a thrilling game at Tullaghmore. With players like Aidan Fogarty, Ger Coughlan, Matt Corrigan, Joachim Kelly, Jimmy Troy (all of whom played on their All-Ireland winning team of '81) John Rigney, Pat Delaney, Mick Duignan, they will field a physically stronger team and a side, equally, if not more skilled than Waterford.

On the Wednesday night following the Wexford hammering the players were back in training at Fraher Field and the mood, on the night was one of fierce determination to shake off the memory of that awful hour at Wexford Park. One interesting aspect of this is, that in 1982 and '83 when we were hammered in the two Munster finals and in the past two National Leagues when we lost very heavily in the semi-finals, we had, on each occasion, to wait for several months before playing competitive stuff again. On the previous occasions it was widely felt throughout the county, that if we had an important match soon after these, we would have played much better.

So perhaps it is to our advantage now that this game comes so close to the Wexford debacle. We all know that Waterford, even though the talent available is limited, are far better than they appeared at Wexford Park and given this chance to redeem themselves, we could see them surprise everyone, although most people believe that it will take a near

miracle for our team to show sufficient improvement to beat last year's league finalists.

The team to do duty will not be selected until, tonight, Wednesday after training at Fraher field.

There are some doubts about the fitness of a few players and hence the delay in naming the side, which is unlikely to show much

change in personnel from what has become to be regarded as the regular.

There may be a few positional changes. I'm sure that Damien Byrne will revert to full-back and the returned Noelie Crowley who didn't perform very satisfactorily at centre-field against Wexford, is likely to be moved from that position. Pat Ryan and Billy Sullivan will have fitness tests and may both be back to be named on the first fifteen.

For us, more than for Offaly, this is a crunch game as if we lose, we are almost certain of being relegated, whereas, Offaly if they lose can regain the points against Antrim. We will play Limerick in our final game and our chances of getting the points in that one, don't look rosy at the moment.

So here on Sunday, it will be a death or glory situation for Waterford. It will almost certainly be the game which will decide if we stay up or go back to division 2 for another year. We play in the role of outsiders and this is an advantage in that we invariably play somewhat better when we are rated in this way.

Offaly are favourites and sadly they must be given the vote to win.

things will change after to-night," he said.

Cllr. P. Power said that this outrageous conduct had been going on for the past two years only that it was worse now than then.

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that whoever was responsible should be evicted from the estate as they were just making life unbearable for a majority of the residents there.

The Chairman, Cllr. Austin Hallahan said that breaking the law in this fashion could not be tolerated. "We should go to the Gardai and say we have people who will now identify these blackguards and to go ahead and take action against them," he said.

THREE POINT PLAN
 Mr. Dan Hurley County Manager said that as the es-

tate was Council property they could not wash their hands of their responsibility to the good tenants there.

"I think", he said, "that we have 3 major points to deal with here. One, to have immediate discussions with the ESB to see if vandal free lights can be provided at the estate, whatever the cost; Two, dealing with the back entrance to the estate as a problem area and three, have formal discussions with the gardai on the whole question of the vandalism there". The Manager added, "it must go out from this meeting that we have a responsibility to our tenants and we must do something to protect them and our own property".

The Manager's proposals were then unanimously approved by the Council.

RIVER SEARCH FOR BALLYDUFF CHILD SCALED DOWN

After almost two weeks of the most intensive searching by a big number of garda and navy divers and hundreds of members of the general public, the search for four-years-old Aileen Daly, Modeligo, Ballyduff Upper in and along the banks of the river Blackwater was scaled down last week-end. The child has been missing since Wednesday evening, February 15, when her 37-years old teacher father called to the local Garda Station and alleged that he had thrown her into the river from the parapet of Lismore Bridge.

Since then, Garda and Navy sub aqua teams with the assistance of divers from Fermoy and Dungarvan have combed the river under desperately bad conditions for up to eight miles downstream from Lismore without result.

Supt. P.J. Hayes, Dungarvan who has been in charge of the search operation throughout, has been loud in his praise of all who took part in it. "No words of mine could adequately pay tribute to the people who have given their ser-

vices so willingly since the search commenced", he said.

And now although the organised search has been scaled down and the sub aqua divers have returned to their bases, a garda spokesman has asked that landowners along the banks of the Blackwater, still keep a watch on the river in the hope that the little girl's body would be found. "It would be some consolation for her family after all that has happened," he said.
