ROAD GRANTS TOTALLING £3.321m. ALLOCATED TO COUNTY

What was described by the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, as the most important document to come before the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday notified the Council of the Road Grant Allocation being made for 1989 to the Council by the Department of the Environment.

The Department's letter stated that grants totalling £3,321,000 have been allocated for 1989 and it pointed out that in the case of new block grants, County Councils will have wide discretion in spending the grants on regional and county roads. It requested that regard be shown to the need for regional development generally and particularly in the growth areas of tourism, forestry and aquaculture.

"Because of the serious deterioration in the condition of regional and county roads in some areas," the letter went on, "it is desirable for local authorities in these areas to undertake a programme of surface restoration which can be classed as improvement expenditure in 1989".

The letter then set out the

various allocations made under various headings as follows:

Major Improvement Works on National Roads — £1,185,000 (to include £165,000 for the Dungarvan By-Pass; £20,00 for the Sweep and £1,000,000 for Kiely's Cross).

Normal Improvement Works on National Roads — £255,000 (to include £55,000 at Carroll's Cross/Newtown; £150,000 for road strengthening and £50,000 for repairs to Youghal Bridge).

Maintenance Work on National Roads—£459,000 (for surface dressing and ordinary maintenance).

Non-National Roads — Special Works — £60,000 (to cover Bridge survey and repairs);

Discretionary Grant — £1,362,000 (to cover im-

provement and maintenance works and flood damage).

When the matter came up towards the close of the meeting under the heading "Correspondence", Cllr. C. O Riain pointed out that members only received copies of the letter when they arrived at the meeting and as they had not had an opportunity of digesting its contents he suggested that discussion on it be deferred to the next meeting.

A MOST IMPORTANT DOCUMENT

Agreeing, the County Manager said that the letter had only arrived on his desk that morning but he looked upon it as such an important document, the most important to come before them at the meeting, that he decided to have it circulated to the members without delay. He said that he now proposed to have the allocations examined by the County Engineer and would notify the members in due course of his views on them.

Mr. Hurley then pointed out that the allocation for National Road Works showed an overall increase from £1.3 million to £1.8 million adding, "this is a welcome increase but overall while some aspects of the new allocations are encouraging, some are also disappointing".

It was then agreed to defer consideration of the Department's notification pending a review of the position by the Manager and Co. Engineer which will be considered at the Council's next meeting.

E.S.B. PROVIDE "DAYLIGHT" LIGHTING FOR BALLYDUFF UPPER

The County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley told members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan that he had now put a financial package to the ESB in a plan to upgrade the public lighting systems at Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow. He was awaiting a reply from the ESB and if it proved favourable he felt sure that work on the project could be commenced this year.

Mr. Hurley was replying to a question by Cllr. W. McDonnell who referred to complaints made by him at the Council's previous meeting about the standard of public lighting in the West Waterford towns.

At the Council's February meeting, the County Engineer told Cllrs. J. Walsh and McDonnell that a quotation had been received from the ESB indicating that the installation of traffic route lighting on the national secondary section of the roadway through Cappoquin would cost £13,400 and the cost of upgrading the lights in the remainder of the town would be £6,832.

At that meeting Cllr. J. Quirke requested that Ballyduff Village be also included in any upgrading of the public lighting system in West Waterford.

JUST LIKE DAYLIGHT

At last Monday's meeting Cllr. Quirke said that since the previous meeting he had personally taken up the problem in regard to Ballyduff with the ESB.

"As a result, some ESB

men came to the Village and the next thing we knew, it was just like daylight there at night," he said. Cllr. Quirke added that he did not know what the ESB men did but whatever it was it worked. "Maybe," he then said "if

they went to Tallow, Lismore and Cappoquin and did the same thing, they'd get the same result".

The Manager said that as soon as he had received a reply back from the ESB in regard to his proposals he would inform the Council.

THE CRAFT OF SKIN CARE

YOUR EYES

Not only are your eyes the truest of all physical reflections of who you are, they are also an ageless expression of beauty. For there can be something breathtaking about the eyes of an old woman, as there is about the eyes of a child. Like any other part of your body, to be beautiful your eyes have to be healthy, and to be healthy they need care.

Like plants and animals, we need light to stay in optimum health. Not only the light available through the tinted windows of the cars we drive and behind our fashionable sunglasses, but the full spectrum of ultraviolet rays one gets only when naked eyes are exposed to the sun in the open air. The fashion-conscious woman who wears sunglasses day in day out may seriously be undermining her health and vitality in the long run. Most women who wear tinted lenses do so because they believe they make them look better, because their eyes feel particularly sensitive to bright light. Much of the sensitivity comes from the practice of wearing tinted lenses in the first place. For the sake of your health and vitality, it is important to spend at least an hour a day out in the open air with your eyes exposed to the sunlight — not guarded behind lenses whether the lenses be glasses of window panes or car windscreens. Your eyes and the rest of your body need light.

How, physically, you handle your eyes has a lot to do with how long the skin

around them looks young and how clear and bright they are themselves. Eyes, don't need to be favoured to stay beautiful and healthy, but they don't need abuse, either. Yet they are faced with it most of the time in the form of air pollution, smoke, misapplied make-up and mismanaged make-up removal. The skin surrounding your eyes is thinner and finer than anywhere else on your face. It is also only sparsely supplied with oil glands and therefore highly prone to expression lines. This is where a good eye cream, applied around the eye area morning and evening, can help. How you apply your eye cream matters. It is important never to use too much of it or you can end up with swollen, irritated eyes. Apply it gently with your middle finger tapping lightly all around the eye. Never rub or pull skin. How you apply mascara and how you remove it matters too. Most women open their eyes wide and look directly into the mirror, wrinkling up their forehead in the process. The best way is to hold your mirror at chin level and look down into it, then you don't etch wrinkles into your forehead. This may not seem very important, but when you think that you apply mascara, say twice a day, probably every day of our life, the habitual creasing of the forehead becomes a significant force in creating wrinkles there.

Think twice before you opt for waterproof mascara. It is difficult to remove, so you need a special strong remover to

do it and you can end up rubbing and irritating the eye area every time you take off your make-up. Unless you go walking in the rain or swimming with your make-up on, it is better to choose a conventional variety. To take it off, use a non oily eye make-up remover if your eyes are sensitive (most are), and saturate a pad of cotton

wool with it. Then put the pad over the closed eye and hold it there for a few seconds to dissolve the make-up, so you can easily stroke it away.

Smoking is one of the worst things you can do if you don't want the area around your eyes to wrinkle, since it both robs your system of Vitamin C and also tends to make you squint.

DATES FOR LOCAL RADIO HEARING

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q. — I work full-time from Tuesday to Saturday each week. As I don't work on Mondays what is my position regarding the Bank Holidays which fall on a Monday?

A. — Even though you normally don't work on Mondays you are entitled to either:

- (i) paid day off or;
 - (ii) an extra day's pay or;
 - (iii) an extra day's annual leave;
- as your employer may decide.

Q. — I got the Fuel Vouchers last Winter but was refused them this year because my son who is in full-time education was over 18. Has there been some recent change in this.

A. — Yes! there has and it has nothing to do with the recent Budget.

An administrative decision has been taken to pay the Fuel Allowance in all cases where there are children aged over 18 and under 21 years in full-time education provided the other conditions of the Fuel Scheme are satisfied. In these cases the allowance is to be back-dated to last October. Arrangements are being made to identify anybody now entitled and there is no need for them to do anything at this stage.

If they haven't received them by the end of February they should contact whichever section makes their payment.

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT WITH FR. PADDY

GOD IS SPEAKING TO YOU.

In the first of last Sunday's readings for the prophet is telling the people not to live on the memories of the past. Instead, He urges them to remember that God is near, and that they should set their hearts on serving Him. In the second reading Paul repeats the same message by telling his listeners not to live in the past, but to concentrate on getting to know Jesus, and learning to follow His way of life. The Gospel, in a sense, complements that same counsel when Jesus tells the woman: "Go away, and do not sin again." In other words, He is telling her to forget the past, and direct her energies to changing her way of life embracing the service of the Lord. Yes, Jesus was speaking to all of us!

The Gospel story illustrates how gently and compassionately Jesus dealt with the woman accused of adultery. Her fellow men, all of whom would seem to have been steeped in sin themselves, were ready to condemn her, and show her no mercy. Those of us who are old enough will remember the Nuremberg trials, which followed after the last great war. The victors judged the conquered, and exacted severe and full retribution. All the emphasis was on justice, and stern and harsh punishments were imposed. Admittedly, the atrocities, for which many of those accused were responsible in some measure, were appalling and inhuman. Certainly, the victors' response was human and understandable in the heat of the moment, and the last pound of flesh was demanded. God does not work or act like that. He looks and seeks for conversion, and not through punishment, but by His gentle and gracious pardon. He looks to the future, and trust that the sinner will listen to His voice, and mend his ways. There is no excuse for any of us to be burdened and shackled with sin. One has only to ask, and the Lord will release one from bondage. "Go away, and do not sin again." Pardon has been granted, friendship restored and from thereon it is up to oneself to maintain and to improve that happy relationship.

Normally, when our neighbour offends us, we are slow to forgive; and, even then, it is often only grudgingly granted. Even when we pardon, we find it not only hard to forget, but we experience difficulty in eradicating the harmful effects on the relationship. Truly, no one pardons like our God, and we should be on knees thanking Him for His great mercy.

The Pharisees in the parable were trying to get Jesus to pass judgment on the unfortunate woman, and thereby entangle him with the Romans who were the administrators of the law or alternatively cause Him to lose face with people by making light of a great sin. He, however, forced them into judging themselves. "He who is without sin, let him cast the first stone." He then started to write on the ground, and the traditional view is that each of the accusers saw Him trace a record of his sins. Jesus spoke to the woman. She listened. He spoke to the Pharisees, but they were too proud, and walked away. Yes, He is also speaking to all of us. He is saying "cut yourself adrift from sin, and live as befits a child of God." Use your Lenten penances in reparation and in repayment of your debt to God.

DRIVERS HEAVILY FINED AND BANNED

A young Dungarvan man pleaded guilty at Dungarvan Court to a charge of driving with excess alcohol at Kilrush, Dungarvan on July 17 last year.

He was Tim McCarthy, 58 Silversprings, Dungarvan, who was stated by his solicitor, Mr. J. Lavan, to be a young man who was only recently married. Mr. Lavan added that the defendant had co-operated fully with the gardai on the occasion and had given no trouble.

Garda Inspector E. Keating, who prosecuted, said that the blood/alcohol concentration was 170 mgms.

District Justice Reilly convicted the defendant and imposed a fine of £225 together with a driving ban for 12 months and a licence endorsement.

Another Dungarvan man,

27 years-old Anthony McCarthy, Kilrush, was charged with a similar offence at Cappagh on December 10 last.

Inspector Keating said that the blood/alcohol concentration in this case was 111 mgms.

Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr. who defended said that his client was returning home at the time. It was early and he was barely over the limit.

District Justice Reilly fined the defendant £125 and imposed the mandatory driving ban of 12 months together with a licence endorsement.

HERE AND THERE WITH ST. PATRICK

THE SHAMROCK GREEN

A little spray of shamrock green.
From Erin's lovely Isle.
It brings a message warm and true.
To cheer the heart-awhile.
I know too well from where it came.
A happy-smiling vale.
Where a little brooklet wanders on.
Telling a happy tale
A little spray of shamrock green.
When comes St. Patrick's Day.
Will link the hearts of exiled ones.
Wherever they may stray.
Little Emblem of our land.
And of our faith-so true.
I bless you for the joy you bring
And the memories you renew.

There are many Irish localities endeared to the heart of Irish people because of their intimate memories of St. Patrick.

SLEMISH (SLIABH-MIS)

It was on this hillside that the future Apostle of Ireland spent six lonely years of his boyhood as a slave, tending the flocks of Milcho, King of North Dalradia, in Ulster — to whom he was sold by plundering Irish pirates.

It was also on this mountain that he heard the Divine call to the great apostolate for which he was chosen. On the northern side his disciples saw the spectacle of the great fire in Milcho's house — described in the Tripartite Life of the Saint. After Patrick's return to Ulster he called on Milcho — who, lest he be baptised by his former slave, set fire to his house, burning himself and members of his family.

SAUL, CO. DOWN

It was here that Patrick

commenced his apostolate, after being driven from the Wicklow coast (where he first landed) by the pagan chief, Nathi. The original Gaelic name of the place was Sabhall, meaning a barn and was derived from the rude structure, given him by Dichu — a neighbouring prince in which Patrick made his first converts, including Dichu and his family.

A monastery was later established on the spot by St. Malachy. It flourished until the religious upheaval of the reign of Henry VIII. In 1932, an imposing statue of the Apostle was erected, now the scene of an annual Pilgrimage.

ARMAGH

The Book of Armagh, which includes St. Patrick's Confession and the Hymn known as the breastplate is one of our most treasured Irish Manuscripts. It contains too the only

manuscript copy of the complete New Testament that has come down to us from ancient times. It is now in Trinity College, Dublin. The language is chiefly Latin, with a good deal of Old Irish interspersed. A Book almost as beautiful as the Book of Kells.

DOWNPATRICK

It is recorded in the Book of Armagh that our National Apostle died at Sathall (Saul) near Downpatrick in the year 463. The warriors of Armagh and Patrick's disciples in Down contended for the privilege of offering his holy body a sepulchre. During the obsequies, the waters of the nearby river Quoile on the banks of which the Armagh warriors had encamped were swollen by a rising tide, and the people of Down were unhindered in their plans of burying the Saint at Downpatrick.

In 1185, the saintly Bishop of Down saw in a vision the site of the resting place of Patrick and Pope Urban 111, the reigning Pope, issued a Papal Bull for the translation of the relics to a shrine in Downpatrick.

Today, the last resting place of St. Patrick is seen by pilgrims marked by a huge uncut, boulder, with the rudely-traced inscription PADRAIC and located in a small neglected graveyard adjoining the ancient Cathedral — now in Protestant usage. Why the relics were removed from the Cathedral to the graveyard is not known.

The local people, in spite of doubts expressed in the matter by modern historians, stoutly believe that the hallowed dust of our National Apostle rests beneath the stone bearing his name.

£250 FINE AND 100 HOURS COMMUNITY WORK FOR 2 STOLEN GAS CYLINDERS

Two defendants were charged at Dungarvan Court last week arising from the larceny of two gas cylinders from the Service Station at Youghal Road, Dungarvan, one with stealing the cylinders and the other with receiving them knowing them to have been stolen.

Jimmy Duggan, 73 Childers Estate was charged with stealing the cylinders on February 20 and Peter Delaney, 40 Childers Estate was charged with receiving them.

Garda Inspector E. Keating prosecuted and Mr. J. P. Gordon, Solr., appeared for both defendants.

Garda T. Murphy gave evidence of arresting and charging Duggan and of taking a statement from him after caution. In this Duggan stated that he got the 2 cylinders from John Connors and then went to Delaney to sell them for £8. He said that he told Delaney they had been stolen.

Duggan giving evidence on his own behalf said that the 2 cylinders came out over the wall and he just took them away.

Convicting Duggan, District Justice M. Reilly ordered that he undertake 100 hours community service, if deemed suitable to do so by the Court Welfare Officer.

Det./Gda. C. Kiely then gave evidence of arresting and charging Delaney and of taking a statement from him after caution in the course of which Delaney said that Duggan had called to his house at 10.30 that night and asked him to buy the 2 cylinders of gas for £10.

In reply to a question by Mr. Gordon witness agreed that Delaney had said that Duggan told him he had got the cylinders at home.

Mrs. Ann Warren, owner of the service station at Youghal Road told the Court that at 10.15 p.m. on February 20 she went to

the station and found that there had been a break-in.

Delaney in evidence said that he had never been in trouble with the law before. On Monday night, February 20, Duggan came to his house and told him that he had gas cylinders for sale. Duggan said that they were from his own house and he was selling them as they wanted the money. He had come to him for the same thing before. He added that he agreed to pay £8 for the cylinders.

Cross-examined by Inspector Keating witness said that he was not aware that the gas had been stolen.

District Justice Reilly convicting the defendant imposed a fine of £250 and commented that the fact that Delaney had no previous convictions was the only thing that was saving him from being sent to prison.

On the application of Mr. Gordon he fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal.

CONNA'S TRIBUTE TO JERRY MELLERICK

To mark his recent retirement as North Cork Social Welfare Officer, a position he held for 40 years, Jerry Mellerick, P.O., Conna, was recipient of an inscribed silver tray and Waterford Glass, which was presented to him at the monthly function of the Conna Senior Citizens' Association.

A well guarded secret until the night in question, the presentation and accompanying accolade took the format of "This is your Life" with local man Willie Kearney donning the mantle of Michael Aspel with the red book in hand.

It was a most enjoyable occasion, almost stunning in the presence of a large gathering of senior citizens and Jerry's family and friends, and Willie, in a concise and spectacular fashion, gave a vivid account of the man born in 1924, to the present 1989.

Describing his aptitude for the organ, piano and piano accordion, which must surely be his predominant passion, he mastered the art when only about 10 years of age and has given great service to the church

in a space of 50 years or so. He played too with the Brideside Serenaders Band, Tallow in the forties.

His generosity in playing at weddings, concerts and other various functions was unparalleled and one of the highlights of his career was his pivotal role with the successful Conna "Tops of the Town" of a few years back.

As a Regional Hospital patient in the recent tv programme "Check Up," due to a serious injury to his right hand fingers, Jerry, fortunately, came through without blemish and is able to "tickle the ivories" as good as ever and it is our wish, with God's help, that he will continue to use his great talent for many years to come to radiate happiness in the district. SENTENCED TO 16 MONTHS DETENTION

An unemployed labourer who was stated to be in need of medical help was sentenced to a total of 16 months detention in St. Patrick's Institution, Dublin by District Justice M. Reilly at Dungarvan Court last week.

John Connors, 64 Childers Estate, Dungarvan pleaded guilty to a charge of stealing two gas cylinders valued £28.30 the property of Mrs. Ann Warren, at Youghal Road, Dungarvan on February 20.

Gda Inspector E. Keating who prosecuted pointed out that there were 17 adjourned charges also standing against the defendant. He said the defendant broke into the store at Youghal Road on February

20 and when questioned about the matter he was quite hostile to the gardai.

Mr. Niall King, Solicitor told the Court that the defendant was the product of a family problem. He was on tablets and was in need of a lot of help. He asked that he might be placed under some medical supervision.

Convicting the defendant, District Justice Reilly sentenced him to 10 months detention in St. Patrick's and to further concurrent

periods of 6 months on each of the 17 adjourned charges, the 10 months and 6 months sentences to run consecutively.

When Mr. King requested that the sentence might be served in Cork to enable members of the defendant's family to visit him there as they would be unable to afford travel to Dublin, Inspector Keating said that this would be a matter for the Governor of St. Patrick's to decide.

Details and dates of correspondence in the matter were then listed in chronological order covering an initial request by Deputy

Deasy made on , February 16, 1988, with the matter being raised 23 times in the intervening 12 months by Deputies Deasy, Swift, Fahey and de Rossa.

The Minister's reply added in conclusion "On-the-spot inspections were carried out by Officials of the Office of Public Works on May 31st, 1988, on which date they met representatives of the Boxing Club and others interested in acquiring space in the building and a technical inspection was subsequently carried out on September 29th, 1988".

FIDDLING THE FIGURES

Last week we referred to the manner in which the figures for the "drop" in unemployment during the month of February, as presented by the Central Statistics Office, were manipulated to indicate, or in an effort to indicate, that the "drop" was due to the provision of more jobs and not, as is really the fact of the matter, that is was due to the rising tide of emigration.

We return to condemn a rather similar practice this week and again it has to do with employment and the provision of jobs. On Saturday last, one of our national daily papers carried a banner headline on page 6 stating, "1,000 new jobs nationwide won by IDA." The report then went on to claim that, "more than 600 new jobs centred in Newbridge, Co. Kildare and costing almost £150 million will come on stream later this year", while further on it stated: "Industry and Commerce Minister Ray Burke said that almost 460 new jobs would be created in 11 companies as a result of further IDA-won investment in both new and existing manufacturing and international service industries".

It is our experience, as far as similar claims made

here in our own county about the job potential of new industries in the past, that they seldom, if ever, realise the promises made about them. It is an old trick of the politicians (all blends) "to be optimistic" by making statements such as "it will provide 30 or 40 (or whatever number) jobs at the start but when in full production the job potential will grow to 200 or 300". The crunch phrase, of course, is, "when in full production", but when that takes place no one ever seems to know. It sounds great for an opening announcement to real off big numbers like that and the strategy is that the public memory is a short one and they will soon forget!

But just as we stated about the unemployment and emigration figures last week, fiddling the figures in this way in this day and age not only damages credibility in the government and in government agencies such as the IDA but it also damages the credibility of the country.

IT WAS A LOT IN THOSE DAYS

An old copy of the "Cork Examiner" dated Tuesday, May 4, 1937 has been passed to us by well-known Lismore auctioneer, Tim Hegarty, and its interest for us centred on a full page "spread" reporting the official opening in Dungarvan of the tannery of the Dickens Leather Company on the previous day by the then Minister for Industry and Commerce, Mr. Sean Lemass T.D.

The "write-up" detailed that the Company was incorporated on October 23, 1935 and of its nominal capital of £40,000, a sum of £24,000 had issued. It went on to state that local and other Irish interest in the project was reflected in the sum asked for being over subscribed and that "seeing that it obtained a virtual monopoly of the Free State market for its manufactures, the prospects were bright in-

deed".

The report then stated that although the official opening had been postponed until Monday, May 3, 1937, "the factory has actually been in production since May, 1936". It goes on to state that "all told, there are 120 operatives obtaining welcome employment and the weekly payroll of about £300 naturally means a good deal to the town as a whole".

A photograph accompanying the report shows Minister Lemass being shown a processed hide by Reginald Dickens from whom the company took its name and identified in it can be Canon O'Brien P.P. V.F., Fr. Tim Walsh, C.C., Michael O'Meara, Michael Morrissey, T.D., Dr. M. O'Farrell, Co. M.O.H. and An Fear Mor, now alas all gone from among us.

How times have changed since 1937 can well and truly be gleaned from the fact that £300 was then able to provide what was reckoned to be a good weekly payroll for 120 workers.

IT'S HOW IT'S SAID THAT MATTERS

At the last sitting of the District Court in Dungarvan there was an outstanding example to prove that it matters a great deal how a person (or thing) is described. It happened when the District Justice was dealing with the civil processes — cases in which the Court adjudicates on unpaid debts.

In one of these, a man was stated to owe a certain amount of money and when the District Justice asked what he worked at, his solicitor stated that "he worked for farmers". From this, the inference could be, and was probably so understood to be, that the man was a farm labourer and should be afforded the leniency of the Court.

However the solicitor for the creditor was at once on his feet stating "yes, he works for farmers but as an agricultural adviser". It put a totally different complexion on the case.

We suppose it might be described — the description we mean, — as the truth but not the whole truth! It shows though that it's how it's said that really matters!

THE "POOR" POLITICIANS

One thing that the politicians in this country are very good at is looking after themselves. If there was any need of proof of this it was made abundantly evident as a result of a Dail Question asked last week by the leader of the Workers Party, Deputy Proinsias de Rossa.

The reply listed all the members of the Oireachtas (Dail and Seanad) including Ministers, who were in receipt of pensions for services rendered to dear old Mother Ireland. Former Finance Minister and newly appointed EC Commissioner, Ray MacSharry, who took up his new £100,000 plus job in Brussels in December is getting £17,200 in Oireachtas pensions as well.

Two former Taoisigh, Liam Cosgrave and Jack Lynch, each receive over £32,000 per annum as former members of the Oireachtas and holders of office. Former Attorney General, Declan Costello, who is now a High Court judge, gets more than £20,000 from his two pensions, one for being Attorney General and the other as a former member of the Oireachtas.

Locally, Deputy Jackie Fahey gets a pension of £4,625 in addition to his salary as a T.D., Deputy Austin Deasy receives a pension of £7,486 and Mr. William Kenneally has a pension of £9,859.

These are but a few in the very long list of 'pensioners' which shows, beyond doubt, that Ireland, for the likes of these politicians, can be a very good country to live in!

BOILER GRANT FOR LISMORE C.B.S.

The Minister for Education, Mary O'Rourke, has notified Senator Brian O'Shea that further to his recommendations on behalf of Brother J. L. Dormer, Christian Brothers, Lismore, and following consideration of the matter, her Department had sanctioned an increase in the level of grant authorised towards the cost of installing a new boiler at the school.

Inspector E. Keating who prosecuted said that the Garda had given a chance to the two to go to their homes but they refused and were rather arrogant to him.

Mr. J. Lavan, Solr., for one of the defendants said that the pair had attended a "stag party" for a friend who was to get married and an argument took place between them.

Mr. N. King, Solr., then made the suggestion that the charges might be met by the payment by the defendants of a donation for a charity nominated by the Court.

District Justice O'Reilly then replied "very well, if they have £30 each to put up, we'll see what we can do."

Within five minutes £30 was handed in on behalf of each of the defendants and the Justice said that he would apply the POA but the the Inspector then said that in the circumstances he would withdraw the charge in each case.

It was agreed that the £60 be handed to the local St. Vincent De Paul.

PUT BACK FOR FURTHER REPORT

When 21-years-old Michael Nolan, an unemployed labourer of Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, appeared before District Justice M. Reilly at Dungarvan Court on an adjourned charge of causing malicious damage to the amount of £200 to an ambulance, the property of the South Eastern Health Board while it was parked in the grounds of Dungarvan District Hospital on the night of December 20/21 last, a report on the defendant was handed to the Justice by the Court Welfare Officer.

At the previous hearing the case was adjourned to enable the defendant to pay

compensation and Mr. M. J. Hanrahan Solr., who appeared, told the Court that the defendant had so far paid £25 and would pay the balance if he got a chance to do so.

Garda Inspector Eamonn Keating who prosecuted stated that the defendant was living at home and had a number of previous convictions recorded against him.

District Justice Reilly said that he would again adjourn the case until May 10 to give the defendant a further opportunity to pay the compensation and to enable the Court Welfare Officer to submit a further report in the matter.

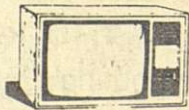

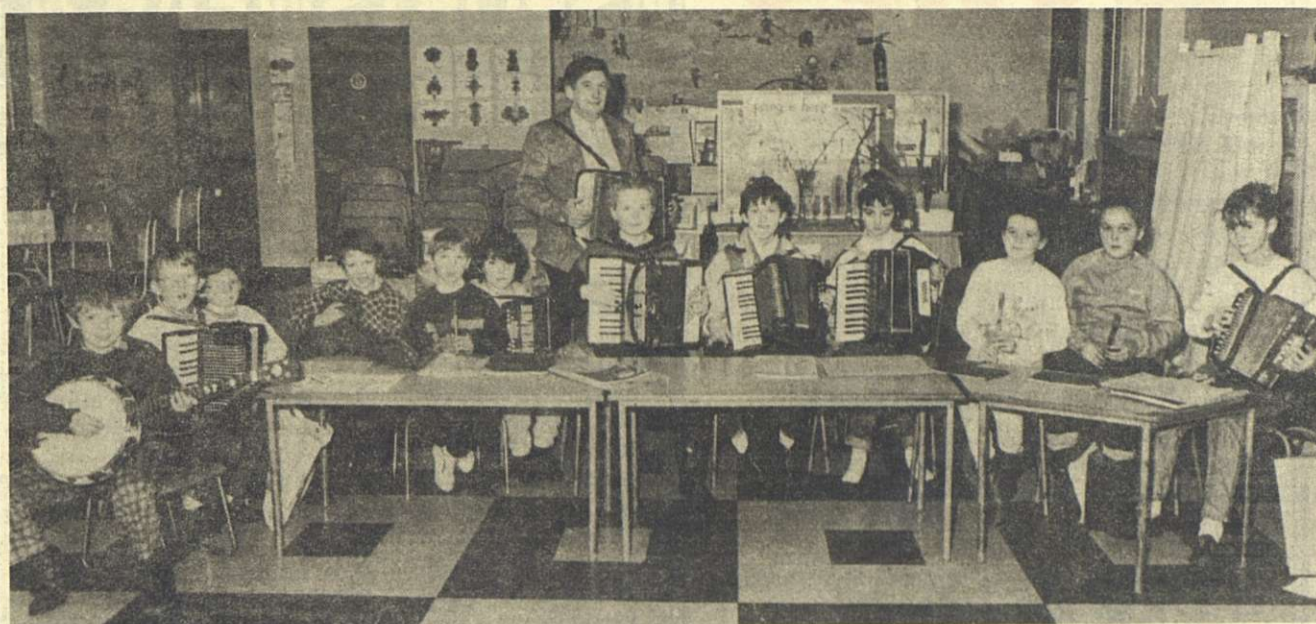

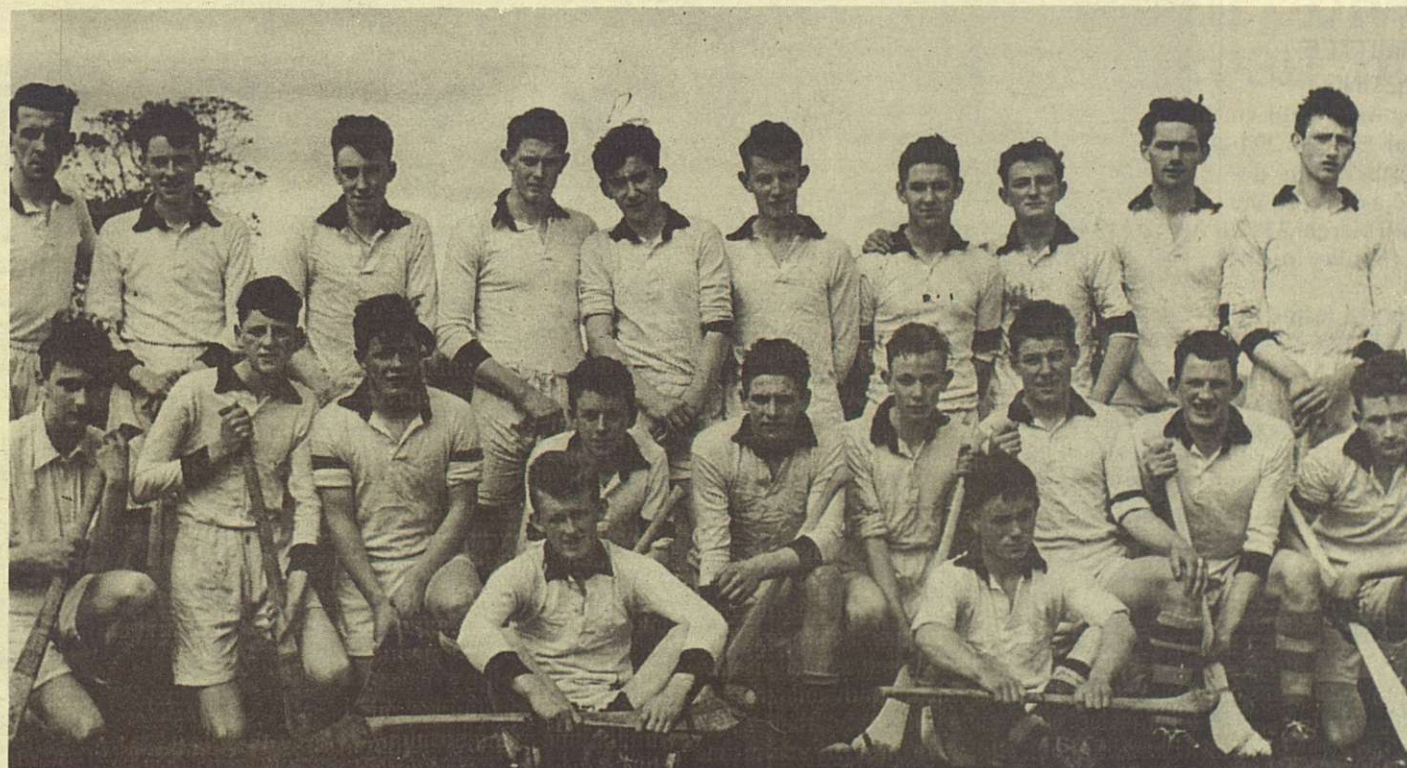
The weather conditions were bad, with wind and rain, spoiling all attempts at good flowing football. Glen View won this game with a goal on the stroke of half-time.

The relegation system for both hurling and football championships will remain the same, even though an alternative formula was proposed by Clashmore.

REPORTS

Reports for the various committees brought delegates up to date with the situation in senior football, senior hurling and the under-age teams. The hurling report stated that the selectors were disappointed with two defeats in a row, but nevertheless the spirit and commitment of

the players was to keep on trying.

The football report told of their four wins in a row and the unfortunate circumstances which kept them out of the battle for promotion and possible involvement in the knock-out stages.

John Jackson delivered a verbal report on progress with the minor hurlers and Ned Flynn spoke for the minor footballers. Both these groups are gearing themselves for the championships. Michael Brophy gave an account of the under 21 football preparations for their championship game next Saturday against Clare.

The chairman complimented the committees on the splendid work being done and assured all of full co-operation of the County Board.

INTERMEDIATE HURLING

Despite a very strong case made by Western Board secretary, Anthony Walsh, the intermediate hurling championship will be run in accordance with the wishes of the majority at county convention — that is on a countywide basis. The case made by the Western Board secretary was that county convention were strongly influenced by the submission that the East would have only four clubs playing in intermediate, whereas, they were five. On a vote, Anthony's objection was well lost. St. Saviours are the fifth club referred to. The County Board agreed to allow them to promote themselves to the intermediate grade without their having won the junior championship in hurling.

REGISTRATION

County Development Officer, John Fraher complained about the fact that only half a dozen or so clubs were registered with him at this stage. He foresaw the same problems about a few clubs not registering until they had been reminded of their obligations in this regard, on several occasions. The chairman told John that things will be different now and that clubs not registered before the next meeting, will be dealt with. A list of names of clubs not registered will be read at the April meeting on the 10th.

OTHER ITEMS

Referee John Moore, who is to receive a special award from the President, John Dowling at a function in Dublin on this Thursday night, was complimented

by the chairman. His remarks in praise of John were applauded.

Half a million was the figure mentioned in a letter from the Killure/Ballytruckle club, as the proposed cost of development of their recently acquired grounds in the city area. The idea has County Board support, but the consent and blessing of Central Council will be needed as well.

Tournament applications from Erin's Own and Roanmore were given the O.K., provided the necessary conditions were observed.

John Walsh, Dungarvan whose request for a cancellation of his transfer application from Dungarvan to the Brickeys and Eire Og, was refused by the Western Board, successfully appealed and he was allowed to remain with Dungarvan

this year.

A number of regrading and transfer applications, which had not been dealt with or which were unsuccessful at Divisional Board meetings, were all passed.

Nioclas MacCraith, was told that an official announcement concerning the number of scholarships being awarded this year, will be made very shortly. The point was made that when the interviews are held late in the season, that unsuccessful candidates are too late to apply for vacancies.

A letter from the Hurling Supporters club, gave details of what is involved in membership and how support for the team is organised. Membership is open to everyone who wishes to see the county team doing well.

WATERFORD'S "NIL" ALLOCATION FOR SANITARY SERVICES SCHEMES

Members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday voiced grave disappointment at a letter from the Department of the Environment notifying the Council that in regard to the Department's Sanitary Services Capital Allocation for 1989, "a nil allocation has, in accordance with the criteria set out, been determined for your authority".

Cllr. P. Cahill, referring to the proposed sewerage scheme for Cheekpoint estimated to cost £372,240 and concerning which it was stated in the County Engineer's "Progress Report" on these schemes for the month of February submitted to the meeting that all relevant documents were with the Department since 1985, said that it was now gone 17 years since this scheme was first proposed and despite repeated representations by him, there had been absolutely no progress on it in all that time.

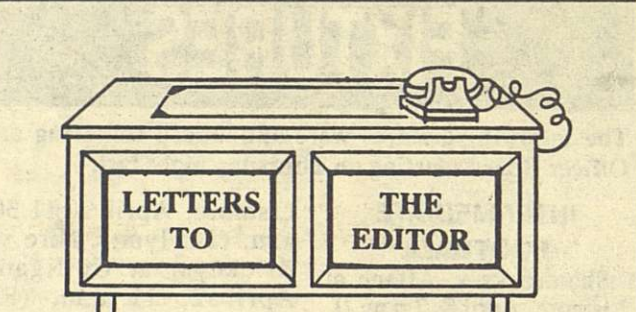
Other major sewerage schemes listed in the County Engineer's report included Ballinroad, Ballyduff Lower, Portlaw, Tallow (estimated cost £1,200,000) and Bawnfune (estimated cost £130,989).

Cllr. J. A. Walsh said that the Department letter meant that all these schemes were now frozen and there was no hope of having any progress made on them this year.

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said he thought that the Council should formally notify the Minister of their grave disappointment at a "nil" allocation for their sanitary services schemes for the year.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham then said that they should take steps to find out if all or any other counties got a "nil" allocation as they had now got here in Waterford.

Cllr. Brian Swift T.D. said that he would take the matter up directly with the Minister and would then report back on the matter to the Council.
