A member of Waterford Co. Council has stated that fishermen from Helvick told him that the recent dredging carried out in Helvick Harbour "was £25,000 down the drain". This was the Council's contribution to the £50,000 job to which the Dept. of the Marine contributed the balance.

The statement was made by Cllr. Tom Cunningham, Stradbally, at the monthly meeting of the Co. Council held in Dungarvan last Monday when a number of members stated that they had also received complaints from many of the fishermen that the £50,000 dredging scheme had failed to improve the situation in Helvick Harbour.

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne said that he was aware that certain statements had been made concerning the work but as no one had approached him he did not know what the position was. He asked the Co. Manager whether he had any observations to make about it.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager then stated that there has been controversy about the work done at Helvick since the dredging scheme was carried out there last December. He said that the Council had agreed with the proposals for the work made by the Department of the Marine who had prepared the specifications for the job.

However, following the

completion of the work, he said that disappointment surfaced and complaints were made. As a result he met a deputation representing the fishermen about six weeks ago to discuss the situation.

WILD STATEMENTS

Mr. Hurley went on to say that a lot of wild statements were made by members of the deputation and in the end he invited the fishermen to get their own consultant who would carry out his own examination of the harbour and when this was done to come back to him with whatever proposals they wished to put up. "They agreed to this proposal at the time", said the Co. Manager, "but although I believe the offer I made was a reasonable one, I have heard nothing from them since".

The Chairman, Cllr. Kyne said that he thought the Co. Manager's approach to the matter was very reasonable. "And," he added, "I understand that his offer still stands so until the fishermen respond to it, there's nothing further to be done".

Need For "Go Slow" Signs At Ballysaggart

At the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. O. Wilkinson proposed that a "go slow" sign be erected at both sides of Ballysaggart Village. He said that he had been asked by the residents there to make this proposal in the interests of safety as traffic was passing through the village at high speeds.

The Co. Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that for economic reasons the best he could do was to have the signs painted on the roadway. "We have done this in Cappoquin and it seems to be working alright but if it doesn't have the desired effect in Ballysaggart then we can think again", he said.

The Co. Engineer's suggestion was then approved.

CO. COUNCIL CONGRATULATIONS

Members of Waterford Co. Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday joined in extending congratulations to Mr. Seamus O'Brien, Murphy Place, Abbeyside on his recent election as a member of the G.A.A. Management Committee.

Proposing the vote of congratulations, Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that this appointment was a great tribute to Mr. O'Brien who was a man who had devoted his life to the G.A.A.

Cllr. B. Kyne, Chairman said that Mr. O'Brien had certainly given outstanding service to the G.A.A. and was most deserving of this honour.

On the proposal of Cllr. Kyne, the Council also extended congratulations to the Dungarvan United Youths team and their managers on qualifying for the All-Ireland final of the F.A.I. Youths Cup due to be played next Sunday

week.

"This", said Cllr. Kyne, "is a tremendous achievement by the Dungarvan Club and I hope we will have the pleasure of congratulating them on winning the final when we next meet".

On the proposal of Cllr. Paddy Cahill, the Council also joined in congratulating Mr. Bill Henebry, on his appointment as Director of Manufacturing for Wang Laboratories in Europe. Mr. Henebry is son of Mr. Michael Henebry, Portlaw, a former member of the Council.

Extra Public Lights Needed At Knockanore

A call was made at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan by Cllrs. W. McDonnell and J. Fahey, T.D., for the provision of a second light at Knockanore Church.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that as he understood the problem there, the matter could be solved by transferring the existing light into the Church grounds.

It was agreed that this be done.

Cllr. McDonnell also proposed that the ESB be requested to erect a public light outside Knockanore Post Office in the interest of public safety.

Mr. O'Flynn pointed out that there was no allocation for the provision of additional lights made by the Council this year but he said that he would add this to the list to have it done at a later date.

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COURT TOLD OF LUNATIC DRIVING ON LISMORE-TALLOW ROAD

Pursued by a garda patrol car with its siren blaring and its beacon light flashing, two young motorists drove at "a suicidal speed" on the main Lismore-Tallow road, District Justice W. F. O'Connell was told at Lismore Court last Wednesday.

Liam Cunningham, Ballynoe, Lismore, pleaded guilty to dangerous driving at Ballymartin South, Glencairn, on February 23 and with exceeding the general speed limit.

Martin Sheehan, Chapel Street, Lismore, pleaded guilty to exceeding the general speed limit, having no parking brake or identification mark light. Sergeant Tom O'Grady and Garda Pat Norris told of pursuing the defendants' cars which drove through Lismore at very high speed. The patrol car had to reach a speed of 100

miles an hour to catch up with the cars which they believed were racing each other.

Sgt. O'Grady said the driving of the two cars was "suicidal,"

while Garda Norris said Cunningham overtook a car and seemed to lose control and his vehicle went all over the road.

LUNATIC DRIVING

Supt. P. J. Hayes said it is this kind of lunatic driving that causes fatalities on the roads.

For dangerous driving Cunningham was fined

£50, the conviction was endorsed, and he was banned from driving for six months. He was also fined £50 on the speeding charge, the conviction was again endorsed, and he was disqualified from driving for a concurrent three month period.

Sheehan was fined £50, endorsed, and banned from driving for three months for speeding. He was also fined £5 on each of the parking brake and identification light offences.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of appeals.

YOUTH EXCHANGE BUREAU LAUNCHES SUMMER EXCHANGE PROGRAMME

The Youth Exchange Bureau is delighted to announce details of its 1989 Summer Exchange Programme.

Under the Summer Programme the Youth Exchange Bureau, on the basis of very detailed profiles and with the help of its overseas partner organisations, matches young Irish people with a partner in France, Germany, Italy or Spain. There, they spend three to four weeks living as a member of their partner's family and speaking their language. In turn they agree to host their partner for an equivalent period here in Ireland.

This year's programme will cater for up to 1,000 young Irish people. Of these, about 525 will travel to France, 375 to Germany, 75 to Spain and 25 to Italy.

UNDERSUBSCRIBED

With the approach of 1992 and the abolition of Europe's political boundaries, figures in Ireland show that foreign language studies are still vastly undersubscribed. While 66% of second level students study French, this figure falls dramatically to 5% for German and only 1% for Spanish and Italian. The Summer Programme, then, gives participants an ideal opportunity to develop their language skills in their natural settings. It is

also a way in which they can gain a greater understanding of another European culture at first-hand while increasing their self-reliance and self-confidence.

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Know Your Rights

Q. — My husband is going to work in England next month. I will be remaining here with our three school going children. Will this affect our Medical Card? What will happen to our Children's Allowance?

A. — As the dependents of an insured worker you will be entitled to a Medical Card here under EC Regulations. The Health Board will need confirmation from the DHSS in the UK that he is an insured worker.

The position regarding your Child Benefit (Children's Allowance) will be as follows:

If you are not working your Child Benefit will be paid from the UK.

If you are insurably employed you will come under our regulations and will continue to receive your Child Benefit here. You will also be entitled to receive a top-up amount from the UK to bring your total amount up to the UK rate.

If your husband is self-employed in the UK then there will be no charge and you will continue to receive your Child Benefit here.

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Q. — I am in my seventies living alone and my house is in bad repair. Are there any grants to improve things for me.

A. — House Improvement Grants as such were abolished some time ago. However, you may be able to get the repairs carried out under the Special Task Force Scheme for the elderly.

This scheme is operated by the various Health Boards who organise the carrying out of the repairs. The work is sometimes done by trainees from FAS. You may have to contribute something towards the cost of the materials. Each case would be decided on its merits and it would also depend on the amount of funding available and the number of applicants.

You should apply to the Community Care Programme of your Health Board. If you don't know where to go contact your Public Health Nurse.

PAUSE FOR THOUGHT WITH FR. PADDY

MANY HAVE LOST THEIR WAY!

The Apostles, following the Resurrection, were fearless in preaching the risen Christ, and they sealed their testimony with their blood. You will have noticed that the readings last Sunday point out that like the Apostles, we, too, were called to share in proclaiming the Good News, and, for most of us, that will be discharged by preaching through the example of our lives. Recall how the Lord asked Mary of Magdala to "Go and tell the disciples. . ." Jesus employed much the same form of expression when He directed His Apostles to be His witnesses: "Go out to the whole world, and proclaim my teachings." Mother Church is calling and encouraging each one of us to profess our faith in the risen Christ, and then proceed to act as His representative in the world.

The Resurrection, as you would expect, figured prominently in the life of the early Church. The Church was then, and still continues to be, the living witness of the glorified Christ. And, from now until Pentecost, the readings from the Acts relate how the infant Church progressed under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, whilst the reading from St. John's Gospel will present an account of the Lord in the light of His glorification. The selection is appropriate, and will remind us of our function to spread the glad tidings.

The Apostles handed over the mantle of guiding and ruling the Church to their successors, the bishops, to ensure that Christ's saving work would continue to the end of time. And, just as God's command to the Apostle to teach all nations embraced the whole Mystical Body of Christ, the duty to continue that work by the Bishops, also applies to the members. Last week I did draw attention to the office of the people, so this further reference will emphasise this important role, namely, to allow the Holy Spirit to speak and to act through their lives. Hence, to fulfil our mission, love of God must be the order of our daily life. Yes, it is demanding, but then, consider the reward.

I mentioned previously that shyness was wont to spoil and interfere with our efforts. We seem to shun being the target for wagging tongues! St. Peter must have experienced this problem for he besought his hearers to "Banish malice from their tongues. . ." Certainly, Mary Magdala did not allow her past to hinder her. If anything, it only spurred and made her more determined to express her love and devotion. What she did, you too can do. Do not be intimidated. God is calling. Listen to Him. He wants your help. And, as for the critics and the begrudgers, pray that they too may join in this blessed work.

A GREATER SHARING

Vatican II called for a greater sharing in the life of the Church, and especially for a greater participation in the Sacrifice of the Mass. The response and effect to date clearly manifest the influence of the Holy Spirit. No creature, not even an angel, is worthy to participate in the Eucharist, but God in His Mercy, and because of our weakness, has not only made the Mass available to us, but even invites and urges us to use it as our great act of worship, and as our source of strength. "Unless you eat my flesh and drink my blood, you will not have life in you." The message is clear. Eat, and you will inherit eternal life. Indeed, those who have shared, and those who still share in the various services of the Sacrifice of the Mass, have done, and are doing work close to the Sacred Heart. Truly, because we are a chosen people, it behoves us to be worthy of our calling.

We all have a very definite apostolate. Modern life has undergone great changes. Town and cities are larger, greater numbers work in factories, more families live in high rise flats, money predominates, etc. And, because many have lost their way and communication had become more difficult, it remains to you to show them the way out of their darkness. You might well consider yourself a poor representative, but, if you reflect Christ in your life, they will see the light and find their way back. Above all, do not fail your own children. Show them the way by your example, and thereby ensure they are well prepared for the journey.

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BISHOPS' PASTORAL ON VOCATIONS

The bishops of Ireland have written a Pastoral Letter on Vocations to the Priesthood and religious life which is due to be read in all churches and published widely in the media on Sunday next. Entitled "Come Follow Me," the pastoral is addressed to a wide variety of groups — parents, young people, priests, brothers and sisters — pointing out the need for consecrated and dedicated service of men and women in the Church.

The pastoral looks at the history of vocations in Ireland, the changing scene, the value systems in society, attitudes of parents to having their children choose a religious vocation and attitudes and motives of young people themselves. The pastoral is a sixteen-page document but there is a one-page 'flier' or summary addressed to parents, and one to young people themselves.

This publication corresponds in time with the publication of a directory on vocations being brought out by the Waterford and Lismore Diocesan Vocations Commission. This body was founded three years ago on the initiative of Bishop Russell. It is representative of the diocesan clergy and the major reli-

gious Superiors who are the representative body of the religious and missionary orders in the diocese. Together with these there is representation of the St. Joseph's Young Priests Society, a lay organisation dedicated to the fostering and support of vocations, and some interested lay individuals.

The Commission co-ordinates vocations promotion in the diocese and the purpose of the directory is to make available information and contacts on priesthood, brotherhood, sisterhood and lay missions for anyone interested in undertaking them.

Dungarvan members of the Vocations Committee are Sister Breda, Presentation Convent, and Fr. Tom Rogers, C.C., St. Mary's.

EXPENSIVE YEAR AHEAD FOR R.N.L.I.

The annual flag day for Irish Life Boats will be held in Dungarvan this week-end. All proceeds from this fund-raising effort will go directly towards the cost of operating the voluntary run lifeboat service in Ireland — IR£2.5 million needed this year.

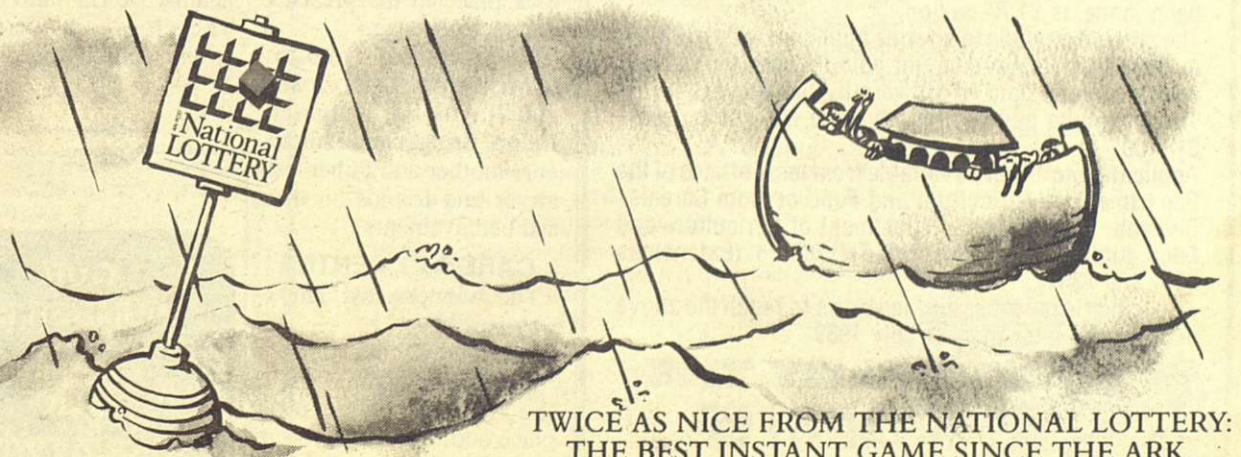
Last year, lifeboats of the Irish fleet of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution launched on service on 321 occasions and saved 122 lives.

The RNLI's policy of replacement and modernisation is ongoing. This year Wicklow Lifeboat Station will welcome a new £700,000 Tyne Class lifeboat, and Ireland will receive a new Arun class lifeboat for the relief fleet. Also during 1989, a new lifeboat station will be opened at Belmullet, ini-

tially for a twelve month period of evaluation trials — the first general purpose lifeboat station to be opened in Ireland since 1927. It promises to be a busy and expensive year ahead — we need your support. EC CALF PREMIUM SCHEME

This Scheme terminated on 2 April 1989 and calves born after that date will be no longer eligible for EC Calf Premium.

Application forms have been posted to all registered herdowners so that they can apply for Calf Premium on calves born between 1 January 1988 and 2 April 1989 which have not qualified already for that premium. Any potential applicant who has not received a form should contact the local office of the Department of Agriculture and Food.

The closing date for receiving completed application forms under this Scheme will be 24 April 1989. Calves listed on application forms received after 24 April 1989 will not qualify for premium. Applicants should ensure that they lodge their applications with the nearest local office of this Department by that date if they wish to be paid premium on their calves.

Calves which do not have calf premium scheme eartags on their ears will not qualify for premium. Applicants should obtain an adequate supply of eartags, therefore, and eartag every calf listed on their applications before lodging the completed forms with this Department. Failure to eartag calves before completing an application form or failure to list the eartag of each calf on an application will result in loss of premium. Applicants should have their Calf Registers properly completed and ready for the Department's Inspecting Officer to examine when he/she calls. Certificates of Birth for bought in calves only should be available for inspection also. Calf Registers and Certificates of Birth should not be submitted with application forms. Eartags can be obtained from the A.I. Stations. Calf Registers and Certificates of Birth can be obtained from the local offices of this Department. It is in the interest of applicants that they obtain any eartags, Calf Registers or Certificates of Birth early enough to allow them submit a valid completed application form by 24 April 1989.

The rate of premium which applies to calves born between 1 January 1988 and 26 August 1988 is £7.60. The rate which applies to calves born between 27 August 1988 and 2 April 1989 is £7.71. Payments will not commence until October 1989 when all calves listed on applications will have reached 6 months of age as required by the EC regulations governing this Scheme. Applicants are asked to note once more the two most important requirements set out in this advertisement, viz -

1. Calves born after 2 April 1989 or listed on applications received after 24 April 1989 will not qualify for premium.
2. Calves which do not have calf premium scheme eartags on their ears or whose eartag numbers are not listed on applications will not qualify for premium.

**CEREALS CO-RESPONSIBILITY LEVY
EC SCHEME OF AID FOR SMALL PRODUCERS
OF CEREALS**

Applications are now being accepted for aid under the above scheme in respect of the 1988/89 marketing year: To qualify for aid a farmer must have:

- (a) paid co-responsibility levies amounting to not less than £20 between 1 July 1988 and 30 June 1989 and must furnish documentary evidence indicating the amount of levy deducted.
- (b) had not more than 100 hectares under cereals in 1988.

Only one application will be accepted in respect of each agricultural holding even where the holding is in joint ownership. Additional land which is leased or rented will be regarded as part of the main holding. Ireland's allocation of aid for the 1988/89 marketing year, adjusted to take account of the partial refund of the additional co-responsibility levy which has already been made, is £1.78 million.

The amount payable to any one applicant will be related to the adjusted levy amount paid i.e. less the partial refund already paid to growers by first buyers. The maximum payment in any case will not exceed £171.00.

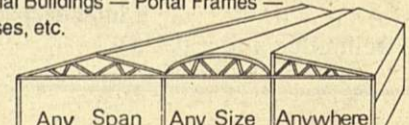

The Chairman Cllr. Billy Kyne moved the motion which he said had been passed by the Urban Council and it was seconded by Cllr. M. O'Riordan who agreed that recent works carried out at the junction seemed to have very much improved the situation there.

At this point the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley referred to the fact that it was only two months ago since the Co. Council had approved the remedial works suggested to be done there by the Consultant at a cost of £25,000 and most of this work had now been completed. He did not think that it was right that the Council should now come along within such a short time with the suggestion that a roundabout and overhead pedestrian crossing be placed at the junction.

Mr. Hurley went on to suggest that they should first give the remedial works done at the junction a chance to show that they had improved the position and eliminated the dangers that existed there up to this. He thought that the best thing to do was for the Council to note the motion now before them and "to hold it on ice" to see how the new arrangements worked out.

The Manager also said that they would have to initiate discussions with the Garda authorities on the question of speed at which traffic, and especially trucks, travel along the bypass road at the present time.

The Council then unanimously agreed to adopt the Manager's suggestion that the roundabout motion be noted and 'put on ice' until a later date.

THE DUNGARVAN NATIONAL DRAMATIC CORPS OF 1920

We are indebted to Mrs. Annette Geoghegan for passing us a photostat copy of an old programme recalling, and we quote "a magnificent scenic production in four acts of that popular Irish drama entitled "Shamrock and Rose,

or The Outlawed Patriot" by the Dungarvan National Dramatic Corps at the Town Hall, Dungarvan on Monday and Tuesday evenings, April 19th and 20th, 1920!

That was all of 70 years ago and among the members of the cast was Miss Mai Queally who played the part of Nano Desmond, the outlawed patriot's sister. She is, of course, now Mrs Mai Queally-Foley who resides at the world renowned "Shell Cottage" in Abbey-side and on whom the passage of years still rests very lightly.

Other names mentioned in the programme which may be remembered by members of the older generation in the town include Michael Ducey, Thomas Murphy (who wrote the words and music of several of the songs in the production), Patrick O'Gorman, Luke Dalton, James Barron, Thomas Kiely, Christopher Quigley, Mary Walsh and Helena Stack.

The programme also listed Mai Murphy as the pianist and accompanist and Richard Kiely as the stage manager and stated that "the Dungarvan Orchestral String Band will attend and play selection of Irish airs during the intervals".

The admission prices (for the time) were not cheap at 3s. 3d. for front seats, 2s. 2d. for the seconds and 1s. for back. All prices were stated to include tax.

A GREAT TOURIST PLUG IN THE U.S.

We were privileged last week-end to listen to a tape recording of a broadcast made on the Travel Show put out on the New York WMCA radio station on March 3 last. It was an interview with Nanette Henneberry who is the Tourist Supervisor with Aer Lingus at their New York office which, we understand, is located on Fifth Avenue.

Nanette, of course, is a Dungarvanite — a member of the Henneberry family of Parkgate, where, when she is on holidays, she still resides in the family home. In her WMCA interview she made no bones about how

much she loves her own hometown Dungarvan.

Apart from plugging the wonderful tourist amenities of Ireland in general, Nanette gave Dungarvan and Co. Waterford a terrific 100% plug which should certainly entice at least some of her American listeners to pay a visit to us.

We heard her say that she never kissed the Blarney Stone but we doubt that she ever had any need to do so. She was most articulate and convincing in all she said. Well done, Nanette — sorry that we missed you last week!

WHEN TALLOW TOWN HAD OVER 1,000 RESIDENTS

Browsing through Francis Guy's Postal Directory of Munster published in 1886, our interest was attracted to the entry made in it about Tallow.

The entry recorded that Tallow was a "post town and parish on the confines of counties Waterford and Cork. Population of parish 1,847; of town 1,232, inhabiting 257 houses." It then goes on to state the "the town is pleasantly situated about half a mile to the south of the river Bride, a tributary of the Blackwater, and consists chiefly of two principal streets, Protestant and Catholic Churches, convent, etc. The protestant church is a venerable structure dedicated to St. Catherine; the catholic church of St. Carthage is a handsome cruciform edifice with a tower of hewn stone".

The entry then states: "This place, together with the surrounding territory was in 1586 granted by Elizabeth to Sir. Walter Raleigh, from whom the estate afterwards passed to the earl of Cork. It was erected into a borough by James I and endowed with many privileges; and previous to the Union returned two members to the Irish parliament, but long before the corporation had ceased to exercise any, "municipal functions". In the original grant it is designated as a decayed town, but was restored by the earl of Cork. The Bride is navigable from the Blackwater to within a quarter mile of the bridge. The soil is fertile and there is neither waste nor bog. The scenery around is remarkably fine and embellished with numerous gentlemen's seats. To the west of the bridge that crosses the Bride are the remains of Lisfinny

Castle, a seat of the earls of Desmond, now converted into a modern residence; and bordering Co. Cork are some vestiges of the castle of Kilmacow, which also belonged to the Desmonds".

And that was how Tallow was described in the Postal Directory of Munster more than 100 years ago.

The entry also records the names of the Justices of the Peace, Landed Gentry and Clergy including the Superior of the Carmelite Convent who was listed as Mrs. Mary Condon.

The Devonshire Arms Hotel was in existence then also with the proprietress listed as Maryanne Joyce and the town had nine bakers, three coal merchants, two corn merchants, seven drapers, five China, Glass and Earthenware dealers, two emigration agents, twenty grocers, five hardware merchants and ironmongers, one harnessmaker and saddler (a Cornelius Morrissey, Convent Street), four leather merchants, two pawnbrokers, eight victuallers, seventeen tradesmen including a cooper, two blacksmiths, ten bootmakers, two carpenters and two tailors; while there were seventeen vintners listed as doing business in the town.

A REPEAT BY POPULAR REQUEST

On Monday, March 13 the use of the music of Taize was introduced to the people of Abbeyside by the Parish Church Choir under the training and direction of teacher Finbarr Keohan who is also the choirmaster and organist at the Church.

So successful did this evening of meditation prove that many people have since sought a repeat performance and in deference to these requests, the priests of the parish have agreed to permit such a repeat performance on next Sunday evening commencing at 8.15 p.m.

For the information of these who may wish to know, Taize is a small village in Eastern France near the city of Lyons. Since 1940 it has been the home of an ecumenical community of brothers, which was founded by a Brother Rogers, and whose prayers, three times each day, is at the centre of their lives. It now attracts huge numbers of visitors every year and it was in order to find a common form of prayer for so many people speaking different languages that the distinctive chants of Taize evolved.

FR. DAMIEN OF MALOKAI

On April 15, 1889, Fr. Damien, known as the leper priest, died on Molokai, one of the Hawaiian Islands. The "London Times" and the "New York Times" were fulsome in their praise for this priest who gave his life for the lepers who were 'condemned' to live on that island. Since that time Damien's name has always been associated with leprosy and the cause of the lepers.

This year the centenary of his death is being celebrated from Molokai to Manila, from Brussels to Buenos Aires. Naturally Hawaii and Belgium are the focus of these celebrations. During the weekend of April 15th, Belgium honours one of her great heroes. Church and state will unite in an endeavour to highlight the role Damien has played in transforming people's attitude towards leprosy. His life and death were the sacrifices needed in order to move the plight of lepers onto the world stage. April 15th has been proclaimed a

national holiday in Belgium and will see thousands of people gather in Heysel stadium doing honour to a Belgian who, single-handedly, responded, in a most Christian-like fashion, to the needs of lepers.

Members of Damien's Congregation, the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, in Ireland and England are honouring Damien in their own way. On April 8th in Westminster Cathedral, Cardinal Hume presided at a Mass honouring Damien, with the Belgian and American Ambassadors in attendance. In Ireland members of the Congregation will reflect on how they can respond more effectively to the needs of the marginalised in 1989.

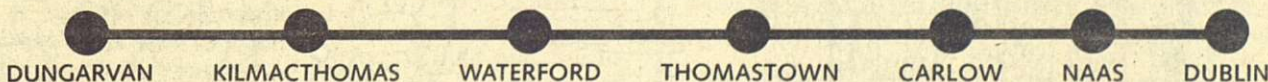

Speaking at the launch of 'Twice as Nice,' National Lottery Director, John Fitzpatrick, said that over the first two years of operation National Lottery sales had topped £240 million. The continuing high level of sales, reflects tremendous ongoing public support for the National Lottery. 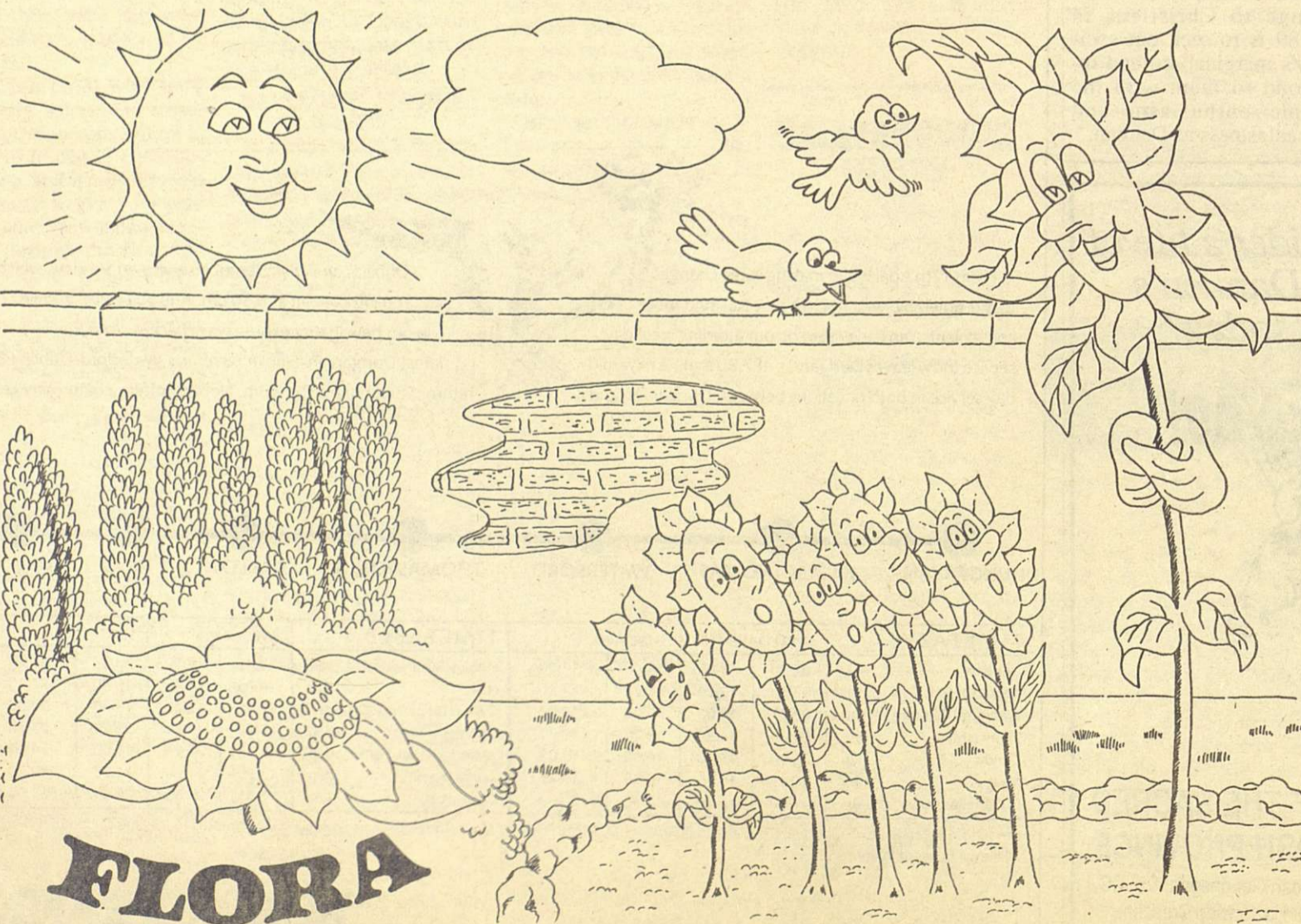

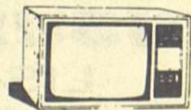

Next Thursday, April 20th is the date of the launching of what must be a unique tape of music and song.

It will be open house in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan — a free night of entertainment for fans and friends of Waterford's uniquely talented Nora Hogan. Throughout Co. Waterford and wherever folk music and singing is appreciated Nora Hogan is well known. It will come as a surprise to many that Nora's talents are particularly appreciated north of the border. The launching of this tape is as eagerly awaited in Derry, Tyrone and Antrim as it is in her native Waterford. Having performed several times on Radio and TV, Nora's talents both as a button accordion player and singer are well recognised. She is a totally unpretentious performer, as dedicated as any professional, never playing for pay but for the entertainment of her audience as well as for her own enjoyment and satisfaction in the true folk tradition.

RENOWNED NIRE VALLEY

Coming as she does from the Nire Valley, an area renowned for its richness of tradition both in music and song, her performance creates an atmosphere redolent of her own background and her family's for generations. On her mother's and father's side, music and singing were a primary part of their lives. Nora has of course given many years developing and polishing the talents so well nurtured in her earlier years. Last year she featured in the C.C.E. summer session of Seisium both as accordionist and singer. She is also an ac-

complished guitarist.

This unique tape of music and song is co-produced with Fran Curry of the Bards, and was recorded at Beau Street Studios, Waterford. It will be officially launched by the renowned folk singer, Liam Clancy, no doubt in the presence of many talented friends and fans of Nora Hogan, Waterford's foremost folk artiste.

NEW MUSEUM EXHIBITION

The latest exhibition in Dungarvan Museum was officially opened last Thursday night by Mr. Austin Hallahan, Chairman, Dungarvan U.D.C. It is titled 'Dungarvan — A Bird's Eye View.' The exhibition shows the development of the town through old drawings, maps, aerial photographs and models, most of which have not been on show previously.

Visitors will be fascinated at the wealth of detail to be seen, especially in the old maps. On display is one of the most important old maps of Dungarvan dated 1760. There is a display on Gallow's Hill with archaeological finds and on the re-development of Dungarvan in the early 19th century by the Duke of Devonshire.

There is a collection of rare old aerial photographs of the town which have not been on public show before and we would like to thank Dungarvan UDC and Waterford County Council for loaning for display.

A special event at the opening was the presenta-

tion of the Museum Society's shopfronts Awards for 1988. The certificates were presented by Mr. Hallahan to the following winners:

Best New Shopfront — Mr. Patrick Killigrew, Shandon;

Best Maintained Old Front — Mr. Ned Kiely & Sons, Mary Street;

Best Hand Crafted Lettering — Mr. Patrick Power, Main Street.

A special award was presented to Mr. George Horsom for his work on the restoration of 'Barry's Stores' in Church Street.

The exhibition will continue until further notice and is open Monday to Friday, from 2.15 p.m. to 5.30 p.m.

IMPORTANT POTTERY FINDS AT CHURCH STREET/JACKNELL STREET

In the Spring of 1988 a site at the corner of Church Street and Jacknell Street was being re-developed for a new housing scheme. The Museum Society was aware that there was a possibility that part of the old town wall would be found on the

site as it was known that the southern section ran along there.

While no trace of the wall was found, a large collection of pottery shreds and other material was uncovered and collected by members of the Museum Society and Mrs. Heather King of the Urban Archaeology Survey. The material was sent to their headquarters in Dublin, the pottery was identified by Miss Rosanne Meenan and the bones by Mr. Vincent Butler.

The pottery turned out to be of more importance than thought of at first and includes: 17th century North Devon Ware, a piece of 13th c. Ham Green ware, a piece of 16th century Saintonge ware from France, fragments of late medieval roof tiles, 18th and 19th century pottery and the bones included those of cattle and horse.

A selection of the more important pieces is on display in the current exhibition running at the Museum — 'Dungarvan — A Bird's Eye View.'

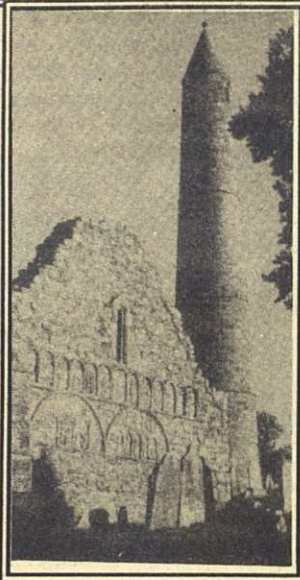

PRELIM. RESULTS OF SURVEY

DUNGARVAN EMIGRANTS HEAD MAINLY FOR LONDON

Preliminary results of the survey on emigration from Dungarvan carried out by geography students from Maynooth College show that nearly one-quarter of all households in the town have been affected by emigration in the 1980's.

Of a total of 169 houses surveyed, 37 had been affected, involving 43 emigrants in all, although some of these have since returned to Ireland. Families living in Local Authority housing schemes were much more likely to have experienced emigration — almost a half compared to just one-tenth of private houses.

Emigrants were found to

be predominately male, single and young (three-quarters less than 25 years of age). The vast majority had emigrated to England, mainly London. Despite all the publicity about Irish emigrants in the United States, only one-tenth of the Dungarvan sample had gone there.

ACCOMMODATION

The survey found that all the emigrants had found employment, although only one half actually had a job arranged before leaving home. Most, however, had accommodation pre-arranged, which provided a ready base from which to seek employment.

This tournament took place in Ducey's on Friday, April 7/Saturday, April 8. A total of 17 pairs took part.

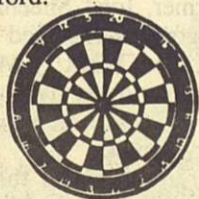

DAIL QUESTION ON ROD LICENCE FEES

Deputy Austin Deasy asked the Minister for the Marine the projected income from the rod licence fees in (a) 1988 and (b) 1989.

The Minister for the Marine (Mr. B. Daly) in his reply stated: Salmon angling licence revenue in 1987 amounted to £170,874. In addition, £21,576 was received under the voluntary registration system.

Total revenue from rod angling licences in 1988 amounted to almost £400,000. Revenue from the sale of the new licences (trout, coarse fish and com-

posite) amounted to £148,660 which represents almost seven times the amount received in 1987 from the previous voluntary registration system.

No explicit projections have been made for 1989. However it is unlikely that the yield will be less than that achieved in 1988. In view of the continuing obstructions etc., the basis for a precise projection does not exist.

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I.D.A. Plan Major Conference On Co-Operatives

The Industrial Development Authority are staging a one-day regional conference on the theme "Co-operatives - An Alternative Means of Job Creation", in the Bessborough Arms Hotel, Carrick-On-Suir, on Tuesday, 25 April.

The conference will have an international flavour with a speaker from the Mondragon Co-operative in Spain, one of the most successful in the world, which currently employs in excess of 25,000 people. The speaker, Senora Ino Gaiparsora, Director of Personnel, in the Fagor Group will review the long history of the co-operative from its small beginnings in the late 1930's, to its present day dominant position in Spanish industry, and share the lessons learned with the conference.

Fagor will be well-known to cycling enthusiasts in Carrick-On-Suir, the home of Sean Kelly, as the sponsors of Stephen Roche, Ireland's other cycling supremo.

Two of Ireland's largest producer co-operatives will be involved in the Conference, Avonmore Foods plc, Chairman, Mr. John Duggan, and Waterford Foods plc, Vice-Chairman, Mr. John Dowley, both of whom will chair sessions of the Conference, and share their broad experience of co-operatives with the audience.

Dr. Sean McCarthy, T.D., Minister for Science and Technology, will officially open the conference, and Cllr. Noel Torpey, Chairman of Carrick-On-Suir Urban District Council will welcome the guests and address the luncheon.

The conference will focus on the growth of Ireland's premier co-operative bank, the Irish League of Credit Unions founded only 300 years ago, now employing in excess of 2,000 people on a fulltime basis, and providing a unique banking service throughout Ireland.

The success of Westport Shoe Co-operative will also be featured and General Manager, Tom Kelledy, the man most responsible for that success, will share their experience with the conference.

Mr. Donal Dineen, Head of the Business Faculty in N.I.H.E., Limerick, will represent the E.C. DG V, and outline lessons from the E.C. on local employment development and the funding available for co-

operative groups.

Ms. Mary Lenihan, formerly of U.C.C. and now in private practice as a solicitor with Noonan and Lenihan Solicitors, Cork, will present a case for change in the legal framework of co-operatives, which is long overdue.

Gerry Kelly, Manager of the FAS Co-operatives Development Unit, will outline the support structures available to co-operatives from his organisation, while Brendan O'Sullivan, Small Business Manager, with special responsibility for co-operatives with the Industrial Development Authority, will spell out its role with co-operatives.

OF PARTICULAR INTEREST

The Conference will be of particular interest to development associations, community groups, chambers of commerce, and individuals with an active interest in developing their own communities.

"This selection of case studies on starting and running co-operatives, combined with practical advice from representatives of the E.C. and the Semi-State sector on the assistance and funding available, is essential for anybody currently running or contemplating setting up a co-operative or community group", commented Mr. Pat Loftus, I.D.A. Regional Manager, Small Business and Conference Chairman.

"The selection of Carrick-On-Suir as a venue for this important conference on co-operatives afford us the opportunity to acknowledge the work being done by Carrick-On-Suir Tanners' Co-operative and Carrick-On-Suir Development Associations, to develop the spirit of self-help in the community".
