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# Rapid Deterioration For Roads, Streets, Footpaths In Dungarvan

Presenting his 1989 Urban Roadworks Scheme at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night, the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, stated that as a result of the adverse trend in funding for roadworks he had to advise the Council he could not provide an adequate level of service and the inevitable consequences will be a rapid deterioration in the condition of Dungarvan's roads, streets, footpaths and sign posting.

Mr. O'Flynn then informed the Council that the total allocated fell far short of the £135,000 minimum programme recommended by him last November. "Consequently", he stated, "I have had to defer many urgent and necessary works such as the resurfacing of Scanlon's Yard Car Park, strengthening Shandon Road, Fr. Twomey's Road and Park Lane.'

A GOOD REASON

Cllr. B. Kyne said that they should pursue the suggestion made by the Co. Engineer to seek more money for the urban roads from the Department and he proposed that the 4 Dail Deputies be asked to accompany a deputation of the Co. Manager, Town Clerk and Chairman, Cllr. Austin Hallahan to meet the Minister to make a case for an increased allocation, especially in the road strengthening grant.

The Co. Engineer said that the fact that they had a major sewerage scheme going on at the present in the town gave them a good reason to seek more funds over and above that allocated to other urbans.

The proposal was seconded by Cllr. P. Power and passed and the proposals submitted by the Co. Engineer were then also approved.

# PAUSE FOR THOUGHT WITH FR. PADDY

### LAST SUNDAY'S READINGS — VOCATIONS

In the first reading, St. Paul tells his listeners that God's message was for the peoples of all nations. It is the will of God. The second from the Apocalypse projects the same theme, and encouragingly describes a vision of the heavenly elect that is made up of people from every nation and clime. Thereby, it gives an assurance to those who faithfully listen to God's word that they will inherit eternal life, because the Blessed in heaven are those who followed and observed God's law. Remember, you will find God's full message in the limpid, living and salutary waters that flow, has flown, and will flow from the Chair of Peter.

We might here ask with the young man in the Gospel: what must we do to gain eternal life? The answer is unchanged. You must love God, and you must love your neighbour. St. Paul did say "to know God's will, someone must tell you." So, because there are so many prophets in Israel, it is necessary to receive and to hear the word from, and I stress, an unsullied source. The Pope is that source, and he has the last and the final word. The Church is not a democracy.


Last week I reminded you as a member of Christ's Body that you had a duty to preach by example. God expects you to be a light to those in darkness. Hence, the better you live, the more your light will shine. However, we know from the Gospels and the experience of life that the Lord's command: "Go forth and teach. ." involves commitment, effort and sacrifice. The Apostles left everything to follow Christ. The rich young man rejected the call. Ever since, streams of young men and women have rallied unselfishly to the invitation, and, like the Apostles, they expended their lives in feeding, caring and leading people into God's sheep-fold. Sadly, thousands and thousands of others heard and hear the call, but chose to follow the rich young man.

Yes, sacrifices are involved. There is no life without a cross. It means leaving home, family and often even country, and living a life of self-denial not to mention dangers. Urged by their love of God, they are prepared to face and to endure hardships and suffering to proclaim His message. We know how parents will endure anything to promote the welfare of their children, and, the children fully aware of the importance of future prospects, will co-operate to please and to achieve. The reason, be it tinged by pride or by greed, is love. When one is filled with love of God that one would face even death to promote His cause. Fr. Damien, the leper priest, feared the dreaded disease, but it did not deter him from pursuing God's cause among the lepers.

### THE HARVEST IS READY

The harvest is ready. The reapers are few, so there are plenty of vacancies in this field. If you were asked to help, how would you react? Nowadays, life is challenging, and people's minds are so immersed and so engrossed with expectations and prospects that they often fail to hear the Holy Spirit. Actually, unless we are interested in spiritual matters, it is difficult to hear His voice amidst all the clamour. When I talk of vocations, I include the call to all the working services in the Church. And, I am not offering an easy option to anyone. But then, what life is easy? Yet! it is well known that those who labour for Christ are never short of happiness.

You often read of great success in the missions, but you will not read of the part played by the prayers in the Convents, Monasteries etc. It is true to say that the past 50 years have witnessed successes that have out-matched all man's previous accomplishments. The spin-off has resulted in great wealth, and the opening up of new avenues and expectations. Naturally, people are so awed and influenced by the prospects that, even if they receive a call, it goes unheeded amidst the many attractions. It reminds one of the weding feast. Sorry, I cannot come. I have bought a farm or I have married a wife. Yes, I am unable to resist the rosy opportunities. Jesus must feel sad when He sees them walk away. If He called you to serve in bringing His word to the hungry, would you seriously consider the matter? There's no immediate pay-off, but when the Lord calls the labourers to pay them their wages, no one can match His generosity.

### RING GAELTACHT

A Chara,

I refer to a statement re the Ring, Co. Waterford Gaeltacht by MEP Tom Raftery recently. Mr. Raftery bemoans that Ring is not in the disadvantaged category, adding that it's the only Gaeltacht Region not included.

I know that some politicians can suffer a Pauline conversion during bouts of electionitis but remember that St. Paul checked before he preached! Further, I would ask why Mr. Raftery did not take up this matter when his colleagues were in power?

For the record, I have by way of motion at Udaras na Gaeltachta Board level asked to have Ring-Old Parish included in the severely disadvantaged category and this is accepted Udaras policy. (Ireland is already regarded as disadvantaged as a unit at E.C. level). Further, there are two Gaeltacht areas (not in Munster) not included in the severely disadvantaged category.

During my campaign to have the Waterford region categorised as severely disadvantaged I have lobbied and will continue to lobby at all levels. It's worth noting that some townlands in the Waterford Gaeltacht are already classified as severely disadvantaged — at least I can console myself that some progress has been made.

Regarding MEP's I ask them to express interest in the status of the Waterford Gealtacht and that they will support some development plans which Udaras na Gaeltachta is forwarding for Ring-Old Parish under the structural fund. Le dea mheas,

# **Christmas Eve** Attack On **Dungarvan** Garda Station

A garda witness told Dungarvan Court last week how he was in the Garda Station in Dungarvan on Christmas Eve when he heard a loud bang and all of a sudden he was covered with broken glass. He was giving evidence in a case in which Patrick Cummins, 8 Childers Estate, was charged with causing malicious damage to a glass window in the Garda Station to the amount of £124 on December 24 and also with being drunk and disorderly on the occasion.

Jack Keating stated in evidence that at about 2 a.m. on the date in question he was passing along the C.B.S. and he saw a person on the Garda Station side of the road. Witness was about 20 yards behind the person and there was no one else around. He saw the person pick up something and throw it at the window which broke. The person then went towards Childers Estate but turned back and he saw gardai come out of the Station and they caught him.

Garda T. Murphy said that they had just entered the Station when the window was broken. They went out and caught Cummins who was drunk and he admitted he was respon-

Garda P. Galvin said he was in the Station when he heard a loud bang and all of a sudden he was covered with broken glass. "The stone (produced) barely missed my head," he said. They went out and found Cummins who was very drunk and he heard Cummins say to Garda Kelleher will this cover it.'

Garda C. Kelleher said he was just into the Station when the window was broken. He went out with Garda Galvin and found Cummins who was very abusive and muttering. They arrested him and took him into the Station. Witness said that he found £48 on Cummins who then asked him "will this cover

### DIDN'T DO IT

Defendant in evidence said that he was on his way home from a party that night and suddenly as he was passing the Garda Station three gardai ran out and said he had broken the window. Witness denied that he broke any window or that he said anything about paying. "I'm an alcoholic and I'm two months off the drink now.I didn't do anything that night. I was drunk but I did not do it," he said.

District Justice O'Connell said he had no hesitation in convicting Cummins.

Supt. Hayes who prosecuted then stated that this was not the defendant's first attempt at attacking the Garda Station and the last time he came he had a

Mr. Niall King., Solr., who defended said that Cummins was now a reformed alcoholic and it was in his favour that he had returned from England to face the charges.

The District Justice then imposed a sentence of 4 months imprisonment on the defendant.

### **DANGEROUS DRIVING** OF BICYCLE

Later Cummins was charged with the dangerous driving of a pedal cycle on December 29.

Sergt. M. Blake in evidence said that at 11.45 a.m. that day he saw Cummins cycling past the Garda Station with both hands in his pockets as he approached an acute bend. When he charged him with the offence later that day, the defendant replied, "you did not see me." Witness said that two other gardai also saw the defendant who was a hazard to traffic.

Convicting the defendant, District Justice O'Connell imposed a fine of £10.

# £41,000 For Local **Improvements Scheme For** County

A grant of £41,000 in respect of Local Improvements Scheme works has been allocated by the Department of the Environment to Waterford Co. Council for the year 1989.

In a report on the matter submitted to members of the Council at the April monthly meeting in Dungarvan, the County Secretary, Mr. B. J. McNally, stated that the grant could be spent on repairs to eligible non public farm roads in the designated disadvantaged areas in the county.

During the course of a brief discussion, the County Secretary said that the last allocation under the heading was made to the Council in 1981 for an amount of £14,000.

Most if not all of those who died were fans of the Liverpool Soccer Club and their ages ranged from 10 years to 65 years, a big number of them only teenagers who had gone to watch their club play for a place in the English F.A. Cup Final. Little did they know as they set off that morning, that they would be crushed and suffocated to death in the early afternoon tragedy that has left everyone stunned since it happened.

### **PUBLICANS** SHOULD TAKE WARNING

Publicans would be well advised to take warning that when they put empty beer barrels on the footpath outside their premises they do so solely at their own peril. The warning was given by Judge Anthony Murphy at Midleton Circuit Court last week when he found in favour of an applicant who sought damages against a publican for personal injuries sustained when he stumbled and fell over some empty beer barrels outside the defendant's

Judge Murphy giving his decision said that publicans do not have the automatic right to place empty beer barrels on the public footpath outside their premises and if they do so then it is solely at their own peril.

"By doing so", Judge Murphy is reported as stating, "publicans are creating an obstruction and a nuisance and if people are injured because of them they are entitled to succeed in a claim for damages."

# SUMMER TIME

As from last Monday, April 17, in accordance with the provisions of the Standard Time Act, 1968, "summer time" for the purpose of the Intoxicating Liquor Acts came into operation so that the extended hours of trading commenced and will end on Saturday, October 7.

This means that the closing time for pubs will be extended by half and hour to 11.30 p.m. with thirty minutes "drinking up" time on week-days from now until October 7. The hours of trading for Sundays remain unchanged.

A new Veritas book reveals that a survey among Catholics showed that when they go to Mass at week-ends they want to hear sermons about their own particular problems addressed in light of the Gospel and lasting no longer than six to nine min-

The book, "We Bring Good News", by Holy Ghost priest Father Brian Gogan states that a survey among Sunday Mass congregations showed that adults did not want sermons on political issues, sex, church finances, hell or Satan. Rather did they want to hear about the life of Christ, family life, personal life and the Blessed Virgin while the preferences of students were even more life-centred.

"Talk about life and tell us how Scripture helps us deal with it seems the main emphasis in the view of the laity", says Fr. Gogan.

Eileen, my Eileen — wait for me, wait, Eileen.



# **Fines Substituted For Prison** Sentences After Plea

A Dungarvan man who was sentenced to a number of concurrent terms in prison when convicted on charges of assault, resisting arrest and with being drunk and disorderly at Dungaryan Court last week made a last minute plea through his solicitor and succeeded in having fines substituted for the prison sentences he was to serve.

37, Cathal Brugha Place and he was charged that on April 6 he did assault Noel Stakelum at Grattan Square and on the same occasion that he was drunk and disorderly and that he resisted arrest. He was also charged that on March 18 he had unlawful possession of a car without the owners consent at Leamybrien.

Mr. Niall King, Solr., defended and Supt. P. J. Hayes prosecuted.

Giving evidence in the assault charge, Noel Stakelum stated that at 1.30 a.m. on April 6, he was walking at the Square when the defendant who was a complete stranger to him came along and asked him for a cigarette. He refused and the defendant then followed him and was joined by another man. Both started shouting at him and then Duggan caught him and gave him a knee into the groin. Some time later he met Garda Murphy and told him what had happened.

Garda T. Murphy stated in evidence that at 1.55 a.m. on the date in question he met Mr. Stakelum who reported the assault. He had seen him being chased by two youths who were roaring and shouting at him. Witness said that when he spoke to the two, Duggan said to his companion, "don't give your name to the f-ing pigs." Duggan was very abusive but the other youth was very cooperative. He arrested Dugwho resisted gan vehemently as he was about to be put into the patrol car. Witness went on to say that as a result he decided to walk Duggan to the Garda Station and on the way he resisted several

Garda Murphy added that when he got to the Station, Duggan had picked up a chair to assault them and he had to be put in a cell and kicked the cell door until 5 a.m. When he was released, he said that Duggan had threatened "that he would fix me."

Garda C. Kelleher in evidence said that he arrived at Grattan Square on the occasion at 2.05 a.m. and had heard Duggan abusing and threatening Garda Murphy. When taken to the station Duggan continued to be aggressive.

Giving evidence in his own defence, Duggan said that it was his mate who had struck Stakelum. It was not a knee in the groin but a box he had given him. "I assaulted no one, I was very drunk at the time and I apologise to the Garda for my behaviour," he said.

District Justice O'Connell stated he had no doubts but that Duggan did assault Mr.

He was Martin Duggan, Stakelum and had abused and threatened the Gardai and richly deserved a substantial prison sentence. On the charges of assault and resisting arrest he imposed two terms of 4 months to run concurrently and on the drunk and disorderly charge he imposed a further month also to run concurrent with the other two remarking that under no circumstances could he tolerate this kind of behaviour.

### LACK OF EVIDENCE

In regard to the charge concerning the car, Kieran O'Connell stated in evidence that he parked his car in the new car park in Dungarvan on March 18. It was locked but one back door was open. He last saw the car at 10 p.m. When he returned at 2 a.m. it was gone and he reported it missing. He next saw it at Kirwan's Garage, Leamybrien, the following day.

Noel Kirwan, Garage owner, Leamybrien stated in evidence that at 5.50 a.m. that morning he heard the alarm at the Garage go off. He got up and as he looked out he heard a man running by the window in the direction of Dungarvan. He then drove his car in the same direction and saw two as it was dark and wet he was unable to identify

them. He returned to the garage and saw a car parked in the forecourt which was not there earlier in the night.

Garda T. Murphy gave evidence of going to Leamybrien where he saw the car. He interviewed the defendant who denied all knowledge of the car and said that he and his companion had walked from Waterford that night. However although it had been raining heavily their clothes were reasonably dry.

Holding that while the circumstances were suspicious there was not enough evidence to sustain a conviction, District Justice O'Connell dismissed the charge.

### **FINES SUBSTITUTED**

Later, Mr. King made a further appeal to the District Justice to suspend the prison sentence on the other charges pointing out that it was five years since Duggan's last conviction. District Justice O'Connell then agreed and bound Duggan to be of good behaviour for 12 months and instead of the prison sentences he substituted fines of £25 on each of the charges of assault and resisting arrest and £10 on the drunk and disorderly charge.
