The draft revision of the County Development Plan for 1989 was considered by members of Waterford County Council at a special meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday and following a session lasting two-and-a-half hours it was agreed to adjourn further consideration to the Council's next ordinary meeting on Monday, May 8.

Presenting the Plan to the members, the Council's Planning Officer, Mr. J. Shine said that the general aim of the plan was to set out guidelines which it was hoped would inform individual developers as to what the Planning Authority considered to be the best options for development in the county.

The revision did not contain very many changes from the existing plan he said, and the most notable was the fact that the population projections in the last plan had proved too optimistic. Because of a change in the economic climate, emigration and a drop in the marriage and birth rates, the population increase was virtually nil at the moment.

In the section dealing with population trends it review of the Plan undertaken in 1983, the population of the county was estimated at 51,400. The rate of average annual increase in the period 1971-1981 of 1.6% had fallen to 0.6% for the period 1981-1986, brought about by reduced marriage and birth rates and increased emigration.

•The net loss of population through emigration in the 1981-86 period at 3.6 persons per thousand was somewhat better than the average of 4.1 for the south-east region.

Pause For Thought with Fr. Paddy

WASHING THE DIRTY LINEN!

The emphasis in the first of last Sunday's readings is focused on order in the Church, and it goes without saying that an institution founded to cradle, teach and hand down the eternal truths should be so constructed to enable her to fulfil her mission. You have only to recall Christ's commission to Peter to realise He was incorporating this necessary structure into His Mystical Body. In fact, when he singled out Peter to be the strength of the Apostolic body, He pinpointed his main task in the words: "Simon, Simon, behold Satan hath desired to have you that he might sift you as wheat, but I have prayed for thee that thy faith fail not; and thou being once converted, confirm thy brethren.'

Now, when you speak of order, it immediately postulates authority, because order without an authoritative source does not exist. The office of guarding and teaching the good news to all peoples and for all time would sunder unless endowed with the power to maintain and keep the pure waters flowing, and that in simple spelling is authority. Some seem to think they can preach disorder, and still hold they are talking with a Catholic voice, which is poppycock. I referred to this matter last week arising from an article I read in Alpha, a new fortnightly paper. The matter at issue was control and administration in the Church, a matter that was finally settled centuries ago. Peter holds the keys and he is still in the driving

The fly in the ointment was a Papal directive insisting that Professors of Theology must take an oath of fidelity, and in view of recent muddled thinking being propagated by many learned experts, this requirement is timely. Surely, the Church has every right as well as a duty to ensure her flock are fed on the rich green pastures provided by the Lord. If any loyal son feels this ruling to be an unnecessary pressure, he should still bow and humbly accept the directive for the benefit of all.

I'd perhaps have felt that "the least said the better" were it not for a discussion on the radio on Sunday, April 9. I only heard part of it, but it was enough to make me realise that the panel was in cahoots against Papal authority. When a man declares he is a Catholic, and then proceeds to pour forth a diatribe on Papal appointments and Humanae Vitae, you raise more than eyebrows! I understand that Andy O'Mahoney's job is to create discussion and interest, but it makes you wonder when all the guns are firing the one way. It makes me smile when they say they do not want a passive Church, because if they want to be part of the Church they must accept her as God decreed. They must face the fact: the Church is not a democracy. Peter was appointed as Christ's Vicar, and I doubt if they'd question that, but the persistent way they go on nibbling at Papal directives and appointments, you'd imagine it was they who were the appointed guardians of the truth.

THE ROLE OF THE THEOLOGIANS

The role of theologians is to explain and to help, but when they set themselves up as prophets rivalling Peter, the holder of the keys, they are out of step. Their duty is to explain and to impart the teachings of Christ in keeping with approved principles. If they want to promote their own brand, then they should seek another platform. Whilst their work is important, the fact the Holy Father asks for a proof of their fidelity is not without good reason. They may show resentment and display disapproval, but it is not within their compass to change the nature of the Church. I have no doubt but the vast majority of the theologians will welcome any precaution to safeguard their sacred office.

And, what applies to theologians, applies more so to the appointment of Bishops. It is clear from the reaction of the critics that they would like to create trouble, so it is a consolation to know that the Holy Spirit is alive and active. The old saying goes: "Too many cooks . . . " Yes, let everyone have a say, and you end up with a mess. For instance, let everyone follow one's own code of rules for the roads, and you will have chaos.

You know the story of Samuel the prophet going to Bethlehem to anoint the one chosen by God. Seven of the sons of Isai were shown to him, but he said: "The Lord had not chosen any one of them." . . . When David was brought, whom the father had not even considered, Samuel said: "This is he." "Man judges by appearances, but the Lord beholdeth the heart." The Lord in His wisdom put Peter in charge, and he still holds the helm. Hence the Church will allow no group to assume her role in leading her children along the path of holiness. Do not be swayed by the pundits. They, like the storm, leave a trail of destruction. Align yourself with the Holy Father: he is God's choice.

SPEED AN ACCIDENT FACTOR

The County Engineer added that the majority of the accidents at the junction involved right turning movements of cars coming from the Waterford direction turning right on to the Cappoquin road and colliding with traffic coming down from the opposite direction. He felt that the new traffic signs should now solve that. High speed on the By-pass was also a factor in many of the accidents there, he said.

Cllr. Wright was not impressed, stating the what they now had at the junction "was just a cobblers job." He said that the wishes of the local representatives in the matter were just being ignored.

Mr. O'Flynn then pointed out that this was a national primary road founded by the Department and everything done there had to be approved by them.

Cllr. R. A. Walsh said that the Department's reasons for rejecting the roundabout astonished him. "As far as they are concerned it's not a case of ordinary sense but ordinary common nonsense," he

Cllr. Mary Dixon thought that a roundabout should have been put at the junction in the first instance.

WARNING SIGNS **NEEDED** ON LISMORE ROAD

Cllr. O. Wilkinson proposed at the April monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan that appropriate warning signs be erected at the Deerpark road, Lismore in view of the increased traffic by large vehicles on the road and that the Council grant permission for the erection of a public light at O'Keeffe's sawmills on the understanding that the owner will pay for its erection and maintenance.

Cllr. Wilkinson said that there was lot of very heavy traffic, including very big 'artic' lorries, constantly using this road now and he felt these signs were required in the interest of public safety.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn said that there would be no objection to the erection of a light provided the people there paid for it. In regard to the warning signs he felt that there should also be a contribution made towards these and if this was done they could then be put up. He agreed there was an increase of heavy traffic using this road but he wasn't sure that signs would solve the problem there.

In reply to the Chairman, Cllr. B. Kyne, the Co. Engineer said that the signs would cost about £100



ENTIRE COUNTY SHOULD BE DECLARED DISADVANTAGED

Arising from a motion at the April monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan proposed by Cllr. W. McDonnell requesting the Department of Agriculture and Food to include all land in West Waterford in the disadvantaged areas, a long discussion ensued.

Cllr. McDonnell said that he was aware that land in other counties far superior to much of the land in Waterford had been included in the disadvantaged areas scheme. He felt that in a general area it was unfair that one farmer should be in and his neighbour out, as was happening.

He criticised the method

used in designating the areas and said that in his opinion all farmers would have to be in the disadvantaged areas in 1992 if they were to survive. As things were he felt that the farmers in West Waterford were being ill-treated and victimised.

Seconding the motion, Cllr. C. O Riain said that it

was ridiculous the way boundaries were set up as they were at present. On the road between Dungarvan and Clonmel he said that farms on one side were designated as disadvantaged while those on the other side were not. "It is absolutely ridiculous the way this is set up at the moment," he said.

Cllr. G. O'Halloran ex-pressed the opinion that it was a political decision as to whether areas were to be declared disadvantaged or not. They could thank their former Minister for Agriculture, Deputy Deasy, that so many areas in Co. Waterford had been designated disadvantaged, he said.

RULES FROM BRUSSELS

Cllr. Jackie Fahey, T.D., thought that the motion should not seek to confine the declaration to West Waterford only. He added that he wanted to "knock" the idea that it was a political decision to declare any area disadvantaged as the criteria and rules for the scheme were laid down in Brussels.

"I think," said Deputy Fahey, "that all small farmers should be included as disadvantaged and the safest and best thing would, in the circumstances, be to include the entire county as this is the only way that farmers will be able to survive."

It was then agreed to amend the motion to include the entire Co. Waterford as a disadvantaged area and it was passed unanimously.

A letter from the Department of the Environment informed members of Dungarvan Urban Council at their April monthly meeting that a capital allocation of £64,000 had been made by the Minister to cover the Council's expenditure on house building in the coming year.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White said that the amount allocated would provide for the building of only two houses and it was proposed to build these at Caseyville at the rear of the Pipe Band House in Wolfe Tone Road. He added that they expected that the houses being built in Rice's Street would be completed and ready for occupation in June.

Cllr. Kyne said that he had to deplore the common acceptance of cuts in all these allocations and as far as he was concerned two

houses for a town the size of Dungarvan for the coming year was far from acceptable. "This", said Cllr. Kyne., "is Mrs. Thatcher's economics coming home to roost and we should protest against this continued cutting in our housing grants. It is the same where Health and Education is concerned.'

Cllr. M. O'Riordan said that in not being able to build more houses they were only building up problems for themselves in the future.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

the past four years but was let go in February. I went immediately to London and have worked there for 8 weeks. For family reasons I have to come home. Will I be able to claim any benefit in Ireland while I am looking for work.

A. — Under E.C. Regulations the country where you were last employed is responsible for paying your Unemployment Benefit.

If you were receiving Unemployment Benefit in the UK for four weeks you could transfer up to 13 weeks of your UK Benefit over here.

To come under our regulations it is usually necessary to work here for 1 week on your return.

However, if you satisfy the PRSI requirements on your Irish record alone, then they would normally pay your Unemployment Benefit without having to work here for the 1 week. As you meet the requirements on your Irish record (39 weeks PRSI in the tax year '87/88) you should sign on immediately on your return and you should be paid from the fourth day.

"AN IRISH JAUNT"

This is the title of a book due to be published on The children's Flora Tuesday next, May 2, written by two friends setting out their own accounts of a and the last time for entries 14-day walking trip which took them from Dublin to Kerry via counties Wicklow, Wexford, Waterford and Cork in May 1987.

The authors are Roger Jones, an Englishman and Tony Anderson who though also born in England is stated to "always feel more at home in Ireland". The first section of "An Irish Jaunt" gives Roger Jones's account of the journey while the second section tells Tony Anderson's story of the 14-day tour. Surprisingly there is little or no overlap despite the fact that both were written independently.

It is the second section which local people hereabouts should find the more interesting as Tony Anderson had strong family connections with Dungarvan. His father left Dungarvan in 1936 as a young man to seek work in England while his grandfather was employed by C.I.E. at the Causeway level crossing at Abbeyside for many years in the days when we still had a rail service in the county. His aunt Eileen (Mrs. Ned Veale) still resides in Abbeyside and all this is recalled in the book as the authors recount their experiences as they passed through Dungarvan and then via Cappoquin and Lismore on to Cork City before finally completing their Irish adventure in Kenmare and Killarney.

Both accounts are written in an enthusiastic, light and refreshing style and should really delight anyone interested in the Irish countryside and especially the counties through which the walkers passed.

'An Irish Jaunt" is published by the Ex Libris Press, Bradford-On-Avon, and will be distributed in Ireland by Easons as from Tuesday next. With illustrations by Edward Dowden it can well be described as an honest and fascinating account of what two Englishmen experienced in footslooging it across Ire-



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IRISH ROADS **NETWORK** SERIOUSLY DEFICIENT

Speaking at a meeting of the South East Region of the Institution of Engineers of Ireland held in Portlaoise, Dr. Con Power, Director of Economic Policy of the Confederation of Irish Industry said that despite the importance of roads in the context of inland transport in Ireland, the Irish roads network was seriously deficient in terms of operating efficiently, road width, kerb alignment, road pavement strength, the absence of urban by-passes in some cases and access to other transport modes, particularly the principal parts.
