ROAD FUNDING FOR COUNTY GROSSLY INADEQUATE

—SAYS CO. ENGINEER

Presenting his Road Works Proposals for 1989 to the members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday, the County Engineer Mr. John O'Flynn stated that while the provision for roadworks in the county in 1989 was increased by 9.4% over 1988, the available funding was still grossly inadequate to reverse or even halt the progressive decline in the state of Waterford's roads.

The proposals provide for a gross expenditure of £4.341 million as compared with £3.967 million last year. In addition Dungarvan UDC have already approved a road works programme costing £65,000 for the year, a decrease of 13% on last year's level, arising from a reduction in urban road grants.

In the course of a very comprehensive report prepared by Mr. O'Flynn and approved by County Manager, Dan Hurley, it was stated that due to significant changes in road policy and funding as well as in the context of a much reduced Council workforce, the high level of service which has traditionally obtained on Waterford's roads can no longer be provided.

"The Roadworks Scheme proposed," said Mr. O'Flynn, "distributes the resources available to me in the best possible manner. The funds provided for the upkeep of the county's roads are insufficient for the purpose, and do not at all reflect the importance of the road system to the economic and social well being of County Waterford."

In regard to manning levels on the roads, the report pointed out that this had dropped from 197 in 1983 to 141 at the present time as far as permanent workers were concerned but the position was ameliorated to a limited extent this year with the availability of 57 part-time Social Employment Scheme workers.

Mr. O'Flynn's report went on to say that due to the grossly inadequate funding, the position was particularly acute in respect of County Roads, where the accumulated underfunding, combined with the loss of a quarter of the Council's workforce was resulting in the decay of this important

capital asset at a rate exceeding 4% per annum.

RESCUE PROGRAMME

The report then stressed the critical need for the introduction of a Rescue Programme of remedial works within the county which was estimated to cost £19 million and pointed out that "Local Authorities can no longer fund any meaningful programme of road upkeep and improvement, so much increased State or EC intervention must be sought for this urgent national problem."

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager thanked the County Engineer for preparing such a very excellent report which he had no hesitation in recommending to the Council for approval. "We'd like to see more money available for our roadworks," he said, "but it isn't and consequently we must live within our allocation."

Referring to the drop in the workforce, Mr. Hurley said that if more money was made available, "we will get into the recruiting business and create more jobs."

MEMBERS VIEWS

Cllr. G. O'Halloran referring to the provision of £972,000 for ordinary maintenance of County Roads which was the same as last year but was a drop

of 44% of its 1986 level said that such a cutback had resulted in a reduced workforce and reduced maintenance standards particularly on the less used County Roads. "It's the present Government who are responsible for this and it's no wonder our roads are falling into rack and ruin," he said.

Cllr. C. O Riain said that the Council must keep agitating for more and more funds for County roads as they were never designed to take the heavy traffic which was now passing over them.

Cllr. O. Wilkinson said that the worst hit roads in the pre-Christmas floods were in the Lismore area and he asked if there were any plans to make these roads any bit better.

The Co. Engineer replied that the lion's share of the money provided would go to the Lismore area.

Cllr. P. Coffey — And that won't leave much for the roads in East Waterford.

Cllr. C. Casey thought the Co. Engineer had done a very good job with the less than adequate funds which had been made available to him.

On the proposal of Cllr. P. Cahill seconded by Cllr. O. Coffey the County Engineer's proposals were then unanimously approved.

CIVIC RECEPTION FOR SOCCER STARS

The members of the Dungarvan United team which won the All-Ireland F.A.I. Youths Cup recently are to be honoured with a civic reception in Dungarvan in the near future.

This was decided by members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday.

The formal resolution to accord the members of the winning team a civic reception was moved by Portlaw Cllr. Pat Coffey who congratulated the team on their wonderful victory.

The Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne seconding the proposal said that winning an All-Ireland in any sport was a great achievement for any team and it was only right that this achievement as far as members of the Dungarvan United team were concerned should be recognised in this way.

Cllr. Kyne added that he had already discussed the matter with the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, who agreed that the great victory should be so honoured.

It was agreed that the details involved should be worked out between the Council and Club officials.

DIVIDED WE FALL

Sacred Scripture tells us clearly that Jesus established one Church, and that He founded her on the Apostles. His prayer for unity among the members as related in last Sunday's Gospel only emphasises that that was His will. To add weight and further confirmation, the structure, the purpose and the means used all contribute to preserving that unity.

Jesus constructed His church to bring salvation to all mankind, and that was to be her work as long as there were souls to save. Hence, Christ's Church must still be alive and active in teaching the truths, which He commanded. Indeed, there have been fragmentations, but these did not divert her from her mission. She has survived the defections and the upsets, and faced and endured persecution, and she will allow nothing to deflect her from God's will. Being built upon Peter, the rock, she is fitted to ride any and every storm.

Her work is to preach the good news, and thereby, teach people to know how to follow the Master. The outcome is inevitable. All who receive and accept the word of God will end up professing the one and the same Faith. When Jesus prayed and spoke about love being the bond binding them all into the one Body of Christ, He would have had in mind the time following after His Ascension, when the Holy Spirit would come down and operate as the soul and life of the Church, and dispense the Graces that He had won on Calvary. "Father, may they be one in us, as you are in me, and I am in you." He was asking that all those forged and linked together through Baptism would, through His love, be one with God and one with one another.

Every aspect of the Church in action reflects aims and results in uniformity. All the members speak with one voice, the voice of Christ. The members live by His standards. They are nourished on the one Bread, the Eucharist. They address and worship God through the one and the same Sacrifice of the Mass, where they are washed and refreshed.

The result, all the children grow up as one family in which love abounds. Actually, the principal effect of the Eucharist is to fill the soul with love. It makes us more like God. Ordinary food, we change into ourselves, but the Bread of Life changes us. "I live now not I, but Christ liveth in me." In truth we say, it is our communion.

REMOVING THE BARRIERS TO UNITY

We know Christ instituted only one Church, then, how come the world abounds with Christian Churches all professing belief in God, but preaching varied and diverse messages. I do not have to tell you of the influence of disunity! You know what it does to a family, a team, a town, a nation. Turn back the pages of history, and you'll be appalled at what has been done in the name of God. The bitterness, the hatred, the strife, the ravages, etc. have left the Body of Christ torn and wounded.

Our time has witnessed a welcome change in relationships, and we thank God for the understanding and the tolerance that have grown among the major Churches. The task of reaching full unity is almost insurmountable, but with God, our prayers and goodwill we could remove the barriers.

Despite the differences in teachings, agreement could be reached through the Scriptures. In England, the Anglican scholars agreed that our teaching on the Eucharist is based on Scripture. Hitherto, they had been at variance even with the Protestant arm in Germany. I have great respect for the Methodists. Truly, they are good at their prayers. However, I noted with sadness that they wanted to keep the Mass at arm's length. And, as you know, the Mass is the heart and core of our religion. Still, if we faithfully follow the Gospels, promote goodwill, pray and strive to fulfil God's will, we could find a path even through the highest mountain.

It is helpful to bear in mind that people of other persuasions have also a deep and loving faith, and whatever one may think of the past, we have inherited the unhappy situation, so do not apportion blame. Rather, bury the past and thank God for helping us to open up and clear the way to the safety of His sheep.

FINE GAEL CONSTITUENCY MEETING

On Monday night, May 1, there was a Fine Gael Constituency meeting in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan. There was a large attendance and Chairman Billy Walsh welcomed Prof. Raftery, M.E.P., Edward O'Reilly, National Sec. of Fine Gael, Sylvester Cotter, National Executive, Senator Katharine Bulbulia, and Deputy Austin Deasy.

Prof. Tom Raftery, M.E.P. thanked all present and all members of FG in the Constituency for their continuing support. He informed the meeting that it was essential the general public realised that the European Parliament was not a talking shop. The European Parliament is, and will be, more and more affecting their daily lives. VAT rates, pollution and legislation regarding the work place will be coming up for discussion shortly he said. Good people are essential to represent Ireland in Europe. The Fine Gael Party are affiliated to the Christian Democrats, the largest group in parliament with

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TOP CHEESE AWARD FOR WATERFORD FOODS

The Bord Baine Mullaly Cheese Cup was won by Waterford Foods plc's Cheese Division, Kilmeaden, at the RDS Spring Show in Dublin last week.

Recognition of excellence has come at a valuable time for the plant, located just west of Waterford city. It coincides with intensive promotion of Kilmeaden cheddar as a branded product — a marketing approach which was launched only last year.

The cup, which has been presented continuously since 1967, is the Supreme Championship Award for cheese making in Ireland and attracted over 20 entries including all major cheese manufacturers in Ireland.

Stephen O'Connor, managing director of Waterford Foods, said that branding and promotion had paid off handsomely for the "fillet of cheddar", from Kilmeaden.

Know Your Rights

Q. — I am married with five school-going children. My gross income is £9,500 p.a. Am I entitled to the £200 Child Tax Allowance?

A. — The tax allowance for child dependents has not been restored. What had happened is that the exemption limits for persons on low incomes has been increased by £200 for each dependent child.

The exemption limit for a married couple aged under 65 is £6,000. So, a couple with 5 children with a gross income of £7,000 would be exempt from tax. As your gross income is £9,500 p.a. you are not entitled to a tax exemption or to the £200 exemption allowed for each dependent child. Instead you are entitled to the normal tax free allowance which does not include an increase for your children.

Q. — I am sixteen, still at school and my parents and myself have Medical Cards. The Health Board have informed me that I will have to pay towards the cost of dental treatment. Is this correct?

A. — In the good old days before the cut backs, dental treatment was provided free of charge for Medical Card holders. However, because of the reduced allocation in their funding some Health Boards have introduced charges for certain types of dental treatment, others have restricted the treatment and will only provide emergency treatment such as extractions.

There was a very big entry of cattle at Dungarvan Mart on Monday last, and a much bigger entry of heifers also.

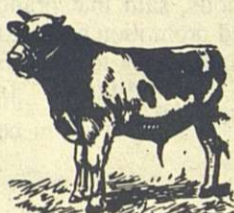
There was 420 calves on offer and trade and demand throughout the Sale was very good.

SHOTGUN INCIDENT IN CLASHMORE

A fullscale garda investigation took place following an incident in the village of Clashmore, late on Tuesday night of last week, during which a Youghal-based Southern Fisheries Board officer fired two shots in the air in an attempt to frighten off two men whom he believed were about to attack him.

The men, both from Youghal, were arrested and brought to Dungarvan garda station. One of them was later taken to the Cork Regional Hospital with a fractured cheekbone believed to have been sustained in the fracas earlier in Clashmore.

The second man was later released without being charged while the injured man was later discharged from hospital.

The Fisheries Board officer is Inspector Michael Faul, and he provided full details of the affair to gardai in Youghal.

However the gardai believe it may be linked to the serving of fishery prosecutions on a Youghal fisherman on Tuesday.

ISSUED THREATS

A senior garda officer stated that Inspector Faul had gone to Clashmore for a drink on Tuesday night. Later two men entered the premises and subsequently

issued threats to the Inspector in the toilet.

"When Inspector Faul left he was followed by the men and in the belief that they were going to attack him he grabbed a licensed shotgun from his car and fired two shots in the air to frighten them", the garda spokesman said.

In the fracas that followed

the shotgun fell to the ground but was retrieved and was handed over later to the gardai.

It is understood that when Inspector Faul fired the shots in the air the two men dared him to shoot them.

Inspector Faul has been subjected to abuse and threats before, related directly to his position.

Large Attendance at I.D.A. Conference On Co-Operatives in Carrick-On-Suir

"The attendance by over 100 people at the IDA Conference on Co-operatives — An Alternative Means of Job Creation, which was officially opened by Dr. Sean McCarthy, Minister for Science and Technology, held recently in Carrick-on-Suir, gave evidence of the healthy spirit of self-help throughout the community," stated Mr. Pat Loftus, IDA Small Business Manager and Conference Chairman.

The conference, which included contributions from the world famous Mondragon Co-op in Northern Spain, which employs in excess of 25,000 people in a variety of industries, the very successful Westport Shoe Co-op, and the Irish League of Credit Unions, all of whom outlined their own particular routes to success and gave advice on communities contemplating setting up co-operatives in their own areas.

The attendance which included a large number of individuals from outside the region, was from Chambers of Commerce and Community Groups, lending institutions and enterprise centres throughout Ireland.

At the conference, Ms. Mary Lenihan, a Cork solicitor, and an authority on Irish Co-operatives, made a strong case for a change in the legislation relating to co-operatives which in her view is long overdue and a distinct impediment to starting up of co-operatives and pointed to the Mondragon experience, where it is part of the educational system.

Mr. Patrick Watchorn, Director of the Irish League of Credit Unions, which today employs 1,500 people fulltime, and has savings in excess of £350 million, spoke of the growth of the Credit Union from small beginnings and which now operates on an all Ireland basis. He described the Credit Union as a financial co-operative, representing over one million members, working together to improve themselves socially and economically.

Mr. Donal Dineen, Head of Business Studies, N.I.H.E. and a representative of DGV Commission of the European Communities, outlined lessons from the European Commission's LEDA Programme, which is a particular approach to the development of initiatives at local level. "The underlying process of development can most effectively start at the local level using whatever resources can be mobilised, combining public and private investments, while targeting the international

market place for any production initiatives undertaken."

Mr. Gerard Kelly, FAS, outlined the role of the FAS Co-operative unit and outlined its key functions such as education, promotions, research and co-operative development in training.

VARIOUS INCENTIVES

Mr. Brendan O'Sullivan, IDA, outlined the various incentives available from the IDA towards the setting up of co-operatives which included feasibility, employment and management development grants and also encouraged delegates to seek knowledgeable advice directly through the IDA Patron and Mentor Programmes.

Ms. Ino Gaiparsoro's paper (Director of Fagor, part of the Mondragon Co-operative) included the very real advice that "a co-operative has to be dynamic to survive." It must be a process of consistent experimentation and adjustment to a changing environment.

Mr. Tom Kellely, G.M. Westport Shoe Co-op also stressed the need for a dynamic approach to business and pointed to the very high level of motivation and commitment in co-operatives, which resulted in good quality, low absenteeism, and frees up management time for more strategic operations.

DELIGHTED

Mr. Loftus described himself as being delighted with the high level of interest demonstrated by the very good attendance and the lively participation in the plenary sessions during the conference. "The purpose of the conference was to encourage the self-help so evident in many Irish communities today, and advising on the assistance available from the State and EC agencies. This was certainly achieved at the conference and it is now necessary to build upon this and encourage more communities to work towards creating worthwhile employment opportunities in their own areas," concluded Mr. Loftus.

Menten's Comeragh Mansion Sold

Dutch war criminal Pieter Menten's Irish mansion has been sold to a London businessman for a figure believed to be in the region of £250,000.

The sale of Comeragh House, near Leamybrien, was conducted privately by Menten's ex-wife Meta and it included 30 acres of farm land.

Indonesian born Meta personally supervised the clear-

ance of the house and the export of a large consignment of pictures and antique furniture to Holland.

On Menten's 1985 release from prison in Holland, where he served only part of a 10-year sentence for the murder of Polish Jews in World War 11, he was refused entry into Ireland. The house was cared for by Mrs. Mary Brazil, his Irish housekeeper, and Jimmy

Power, the groundsman.

ARSON ATTACK

Comeragh House was seriously damaged in an arson attack in 1979 by armed and masked men believed to have been hired by Zionists. Petrol was poured over the stairs and hallway and set alight. In a subsequent malicious injury claim, Menten was awarded £41,000 against Waterford, Co. Council.

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COUNTY COUNCIL VOTES SYMPATHY

Outstanding tributes were paid by members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday to the late Phil Grimes whose death on his 60th birthday after a protracted illness occurred in Waterford in the early hours of that morning.

Proposing that the sympathy of the Council be extended to the bereaved wife and family, Cllr. Pat Coffey referred to the great service which Phil Grimes had given as one of the outstanding hurlers in the country in his day both to the County and to his club, Mount Sion.

Cllr. C. O Riain said that Phil Grimes was a comparatively young man and his

death was a great loss. He had graced the playing fields of Ireland and far beyond and regretfully they had no one like him now.

On the proposal of Cllr. Paddy Cahill the Council also extended sympathy on the death of Frank Cluskey former leader of the Labour Party and sent good wishes

to Mr. Brian Lenihan for a speedy recovery from his present illness.

On the proposal of Cllr. G. O'Halloran sympathy was also extended to the father, brother, sisters and relatives of the young Dungarvan Solicitor, Pat Cullinane, whose regretted death took place recently.

CALL TO REMOVE STUDENT FARMER DISCRIMINATION

At the launch recently by Agriculture Minister, Michael O'Kennedy, of the IFA's annual programme of Scholarships and Awards for young farmers, the Association's President, Tom Clinton called on the Minister and the Government to make greater use of the EC Social Fund to remove discrimination between young student farmers and students in other Third Level courses.

Mr. Clinton said: "When a student goes to an RTC the full cost of the course is covered, in addition to which he or she gets an allowance for accommodation and other expenses. Compare this to the lot of brother or sister who goes to Agricultural College. He or she can get a Teagasc Scholarship of a maximum of £600 which is less than half of the cost of college fees and accommodation which work out at roughly £1,350. This is surely an unjustifiable discrimination which must be put right."

The IFA leader called on the Minister for Agriculture, Mr. O'Kennedy, to bring his influence to bear on the issue. "I would ask you to ensure that at Cabinet level the maximum use is made of the monies available under the EC Social Fund to end this discrimination," he said.

The 1989 Agricultural Scholarships and Student Awards Programme officially launched by Minister O'Kennedy include 50 Student Scholarships valued at £700 each sponsored by FBD Trust Ltd.

One of the major features of this year's programme is a top Student Award of £5,000, start-up aid for a young farmer to develop his or her enterprise having successfully completed a three year Course in Agricultural Education.

DAIRY FARMERS WILL RELY ON QUALITY OF CALVES

"With the milk quota regulations preventing increased milk supplies dairy farmers will rely to an increasing extent on the quality of their calves, in order to get increased income." This was stated by Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, Deputy President of ICMSA in a statement issued from Limerick.

Mr. O'Dwyer said that his advice to the general body of dairy farmers was to move away from the Holstein type of Friesian cow, and revert to the more standard dual purpose Friesian.

Mr. O'Dwyer continued: "Dairy farmers should plan to provide the best possible quality of calf to the beef industry.

"Ireland will always be small in terms of beef output by European standards, and it is important therefore that the quality of our products is recognised as being first class.

"The Holstein type of cow does not provide the best quality of calves for beef under average Irish conditions.

"Too many of the Holstein cross animals do not match up to requirements and both the dairy and beef farmers are the losers.

"In the foreseeable future the good dual purpose Friesian will adequately produce sufficient milk for our quotas while at the

same time provide an excellent calf for the beef industry.

"Dairy farmers who in recent years kept more of their own calves on to the yearling or two year old stage have seen for themselves the unsuitability for beef of those calves with high Holstein breeding."

Mr. O'Dwyer concluded: "The quality of our calves will become even more important in the years ahead and now is the time to plan for better breeding."

GRANT FOR IMPROVEMENT WORKS AT CLONEA BEACH

Waterford County Council has been notified by the Department of the Environment that an Environmental Grant of £20,000 (representing 60% of the cost) has been allocated for improvement works at Clonea beach to include the provision of car park facilities, improvement of access for pedestrians including disabled and the provision of information signs.

HOLD UP IN DUNGARVAN'S NEW SOCIAL WELFARE OFFICE

Deputy Austin Deasy at Question Time in the Dail asked the Minister for Finance the reason for the delay in relocating the Office of the Department of Social Welfare in Dungarvan, in view of the lack of proper facilities in the existing office; the date on which new premises were acquired; when same will be ready for occupation; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

The Minister, Mr. Reynolds in his reply stated: Plans for the relocation of the Department of Social Welfare in Dungarvan are at an advanced stage.

A building at Church Street, Dungarvan was acquired at the end of March,

1988 to house the Department of Social Welfare and a number of other Departments. One of these, the Department of Forestry, became a Semi-State body, Coillte Teoranta, and its changed status meant that that body had to be given time to consider its new position in respect of accommodation requirements and the funding for any fitting-out work to the area it was to occupy.

I would estimate that the building will be ready for occupation in about 5 or 6

months, allowing for builder's holidays.

TEAGASC SAYS . . .

Cereals: Spring cereals sown within 3 years of grass, or after a grassy stubble will be at risk from pest attack. Leatherjackets, wireworms and slugs are the main problem. Due to the mild winter, this problem is potentially greater this year.

Aphids populations are high this year and so is the risk of Barley Yellow Dwarf virus attack. Spray all Spring cereals at the 3 leaf stage.

Due to rapid growth combined with late sowing, trace element problems may be more severe this year. The only reliable course is soil plant analysis. This combined with higher than usual disease risk

could create serious problems for Spring Cereals.

Sheep: A late Spring, followed by warm weather has led to ideal conditions for the mass hatch of nematodirus worms on pasture. Lambs of 4 weeks of age or more could be at serious risk.

By the time you notice scouring in lambs the damage is often done. The result could be dead lambs and lambs that fail to thrive afterwards.

Dosing with a suitable wormer before symptoms occur is vital.

In the present conditions, dosing may have to be repeated every two weeks.

Calves: Dose calves against hoose worms three weeks after turnout to pasture and repeat every 5 weeks. Some products such as Ivomec may be repeated after 5 weeks. If calves are coughing and have hoose, Nilverm is the best treatment.

PENSMAN Takes You. . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

HOOLIGAN ELEMENT SPOILING DUNGARVAN

It is a sad commentary on our lack of civic spirit, but probably more a sign of the times in which we live, that so much vandalism is taking place not only here around Dungarvan but in most other places as well.

Last week we put the spotlight on the manner in which the property of the Abbeyside A.F.C. at their Stuccolane pitch has been regularly targeted by vandals over a protracted period.

This week we must again condemn the nefarious acts of the hooligan element in the town which this time have been aimed at the community at large. These latest acts of vandalism have been directed towards the floral tubs which have been placed at vantage points around the town and which at this time of the year contribute such a great deal to beautifying Dungarvan.

The horticulture department of the local Urban Council, established under the initiative of County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, has been the source from which a beautiful selection of flowers and shrubs has been produced in the past couple of years and these are then transplanted in lovely ornamental tubs and placed at vantage points around the urban area.

A few weeks back these tubs were placed in positions after the winter recess and for a little while were not interfered with — but not for too long! The hooligan element, which one hopes is only a minority group, then got going and under cover of dark, attacks were mounted on the tubs placed along the Causeway to Abbeyside. They were uprooted, upturned and dumped from the footpaths to such an extent that the Council were left with no alternative but to remove

them entirely.

It is a terrible pity that teenagers returning from their disco outings cannot go home without turning into a gang of streets roughs who attack public property in this fashion.

These may be hard words but we find any others inadequate as what those responsible for these iniquitous acts are doing is spoiling the beauty of the town and forcing the removal of the lovely flowers and shrubs which have won such widespread admiration not only from local residents but from visitors as well.

OUR EURO TRAIL

As yet the general public are displaying little or no interest in next month's elections to the European Parliament. Candidates however are on the trail — some almost for the past twelve months — seeking the votes that will send them to the El Dorado that is in Strasbourg.

On Monday last former Northern Alliance leader John Cushman who won a Fine Gael nomination for Munster in rather controversial circumstances was on tour in Dungarvan. We found him quite an affable person when he called to the "Leader" Office but we were rather surprised at the low-powered support group which accompanied him.

There was not a T.D. nor a Senator in sight. Was there any significance in such an absence? It has set us wondering!

IT SURELY WAS — THE ULTIMATE EVENT

We thought it was going a bit far when Oliver Barry billed the two-concert visit to Dublin of Frank Sinatra, Liza Minnelli and Sammy Davis (Jnr.) last week as "The Ultimate Event", but having been privileged to be present at the second of the two concerts at Lansdowne Road in Dublin last Thursday evening we must agree that it was, indeed, a once-in-a-lifetime occasion, to see three of the world's top-line performers on the same stage at the same time.

Sammy Davis was terrific, Liza Minnelli was fantastic

but it remained for the 74-years-old Sinatra to top the occasion and win for the performance of all three the description of fantabulous!

Certainly, Sinatra showed that growing old is nothing to be afraid of nor indeed to be ashamed of. When he came on stage, he literally took the 18,000 in the audience by the scruff of the neck and for more than an hour he showed that he still can perform with the verve (almost) and the style (certainly) which has kept him in the top-flight of world-class performers for all of forty years!

We saw quite a few fans from Dungarvan and parts of West Waterford who made the journey to the metropolis for the concert also and the verdict from those we spoke to was unanimous that it was a 'super', never-to-be-forgotten occasion and all felt privileged to have experienced it.

A PROPER BUS SHELTER REQUIRED

The references made in last week's column about the present unsatisfactory position in regard to the Bus Eireann arrangements in Dungarvan and the proposal to return the official Bus Stop to O'Connell Street from its present location at Davitt's Quay when the uprooting of the street for the laying of the sewer pipes has been completed, has prompted "Concerned Citizen" to write submitting some comments.

Agreeing wholeheartedly with the return of the buses to O'Connell Street, he stresses the need for a proper shelter pointing out that "it's terrible to have to stand in the rain and wind at 7 a.m. of a winter morn waiting for the Expressway or local". He then suggests that Bus Eireann might examine the possibility of acquiring the derelict house beside the Rusty Nail pub in O'Connell Street and converting it into an adequate shelter for bus travellers. It is something that might be looked into as it is generally accepted that Bus Eireann have been very lax in providing even the barest facilities for travellers from the town and district who have to rely on the public transport system.

"Concerned Citizen" also expresses the hope that the Youths who recently won the F.A.I. Cup would be feted by the local Council

"for this great feat as it may not be done again for a long time and they deserve such an honour for putting 'United' on the soccer map after so many hard away games."

Well, we understand that this it to be looked after following an unanimous decision by the members of the County Council at their meeting in Dungarvan last Monday. All that is now required is to work out the details and to fix a suitable date.

"Concerned Citizen" ends the letter by having a few 'digs' at the local Urban Council by asking "when is the Council going to finish digging holes, I see they ruined the lovely job of painting done by Lawlor's Hotel . . . will the streets be left like a tip-head for the summer or will they be re-tramacadamed . . . the place is a sorry sight now coming into the tourist season!"

We think this latter criticism is too harsh as we believe that the progress being made on this major town centre sewerage scheme could hardly be better in the circumstances.

A beautiful girl of 19 years, she was in the first flush of womanhood, when she was stricken by a fatal illness. She bore her sufferings with Christian fortitude and then serene and beautiful as she had lived she stretched out her arms to God.

On arrival at the Church the remains were received and blessed by Rev. Fr. Kehoe and a number of visiting clergy. School children from Touraneena and Dungarvan provided a guard of honour. Fr. Jim Kiely, cousin of deceased was the chief celebrant at a concelebrated Mass on Tuesday morning and his simple and eloquent homily moved many of the packed congregation to tears.

Sacred music and hymns were rendered by a special augmented choir which added considerably to a beautiful if poignant occasion.

Following the Mass Geraldine was reverently carried through lines of weeping school mates to be laid to rest in a flower decked grave.



James Tobin, Shamrocks, proposed the refixture which was agreed unanimously.

The recent decision to introduce falcons into Croke Park to destroy the flock of pigeons who had taken up permanent residence atop of the stands, was strongly condemned by Eire Og club chairman, Tom Drum-

my. He said that the Pigeon Association was outraged by the decision, which was altogether unnecessary. Tom stated that falcons were birds of prey who inflict their savagery on pigeons.

The chairman said that the matter would be brought to the notice of the County Board, who would instruct their Central Council representatives to take up the matter at Croke Park.

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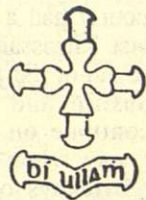
DUNGARVAN SCOUT NOTES
