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E.P. ELECTIONS MARBIPOLL INDICATES CHANGE IN MUNSTER

According to an Irish Times/MRBI opinion poll published to the "Irish Times" last Monday there may be significant upsets in the European elections of June 15 with Fine Gael and Fianna Fail losing three seats to the Progressive Democrats, the Labour Party and independents.

The survey was conducted by the Market Research Bureau of Ireland on behalf of the "Irish Times" among a national quota-controlled sample of 1,600 electors aged 18 years and upwards, weighted to represent each of the four European Parliament constituencies in the country and covering 160 sampling points. Survey interviewing took place on Friday and Saturday, May 5 and 6, and the accuracy level within each constituency is estimated at plus or minus approximately 5 per cent.

In Munster where the outgoing strength of the parties is F.F. 2, F.G. 2, Indp. 1, a number of factors in the poll have contributed to the fact that it is the most enigmatic of the four to read and currently the only certainty is that Fianna Fail will hold two seats and Fine Gael one, and most likely that independents will have one with the final seat being fought for among the Labour, P.D. and Fine Gael candidates.

The survey indicated an overall party strength of 40% for Fianna Fail (up 1% from last time); 16% for Fine Gael (down from 29%); 15% for Labour; 7% for Progressive Democrats and 22% for W.P., S.F. and Independents.

From this it would seem that the seat of Mr. Gene

and he seems likely to retain his seat with the fifth seat going to Mrs. Eileen Desmond (Labour) or-less likely-to Mr. Pat Cox of the Progressive Democrats. The Rev. Patrick Ryan has shown poorly and the withdrawal of the Sinn Fein candidates in his favour is unlikely to have any significant impact.

THE OTHER CONSTITUENCIES

In the Dublin constituency (Outgoing F.F. 2, F.G. 2) the only certainties indicated in the survey are Fianna Fail one and Fine Gael one with the Labour, P.D. and W.P. candidates all hovering around half a quota with Labour holding a slight advantage.

Leinster constituency (Outgoing F.F. 2, F.G. 1): There is nothing in the survey to suggest the result here will be any different to that of 1984.

Connacht/Ulster (Outgoing F.F. 2, F.G. 1): The primary indication is that each will win one seat with the battle for the third vital seat promising to be a long one as is typical of European election counts with the possibility of Fianna Fail losing a seat to either Mr. Neil Blaney (Indp.) or to Mr. Bobby Molloy (P.D.).

DON'T KNOWS

One final observation on the poll which will undoubtedly add to the uncertainty of the outcome is the relatively high level of undecided voters in all four constituencies. With rather more than one in five uncommitted, many of the candidates will see this as an impetus towards stepping up the campaign.

Fianna Fail's National Plan Described As Vague By Joe Sherlock W.P.

Workers Party Munster Euro candidate, Mr. Joe Sherlock, T.D., speaking in Waterford recently said the National Plan on which Fianna Fail are contesting the European elections will mean nothing in terms of real jobs or prosperity for the majority of people in the Munster region.

He described the Plan which was produced without consultation with local interests as a vague document which refuses to specify in exact terms the number of jobs that will be created. The National Plan is made up of 123 pages but only 17 pages mentions jobs in any way.

Pinpointing Waterford as representative of the appalling victim of economic disasters on a national level, Mr. Sherlock said Waterford had been mentioned in terms of aspirational requirements for job creation. He said that as far as Waterford was concerned a serious job plan would set out to examine the high spots of unemployment and look at the industries that have lost jobs and attempt to put down a plan for modern industry on this basis.

Referring to the recent study of the Waterford Economic Development Board for the Waterford Development Area Mr. Sherlock said that many of the figures used are old and out of date. The figures given for jobs lost and gained apply to the latest, 1987. He said that a year was a long time in economic life when the situation is changing rapidly and pointed to the loss of 1,000 jobs in the Waterford Glass industry which dramatically changed the figures of unemployment in 1988.



ICMSA have adopted a policy seeking the immediate restoration of the suspended quotas to all small scale producers. It is not sufficient for the Minister of Agriculture to merely voice passive support for the French proposals to increase quota of small quota holders. Mr. O'Kennedy should adopt a clear policy on this issue and actively campaign at European level for more favourable treatment for family oper-ated dairy farms. The quota system has led to greater hardships on small scale dairy farmers as witnessed by the rapid dead-line of over 10,000 in the number of dairy farmers since 1984. Small scale dairy farmers cannot wait until the end of the present quota system in 1992. Restoration of the suspended quotas would be an interim measure pending the implementation of a new and more favourable quota regime in 1992.

WINTER IN APRIL CAUSED WIDESPREAD DAMAGE

According to the current issue of An Bord Glas News, nineteen-eighty-nine will be remembered as the year when April was more wintery than January. The severe frosts that affected many parts of the country on the nights of April 23 and 24 have given fruit growers much to ponder over.

damage was The widespread, but some areas, some crops and some varieties escaped altogether. Methods of protecting early field crops with new plastic film was tested on a large scale - and was found wanting in some respects.

While the damage to fruit crops in particular could run into hundreds of thousands of pounds, valuable lessons have been learned. We can't stop frost from occurring, but we can take steps to reduce its effect.

CAUSE OF DAMAGE The Meteorological Service report that April 1989 was the third coldest April this decade with average temperatures generally one or two degrees centigrade below normal. Although average temperatures in 1983 and 1986 were lower, these years had fewer nights with below zero temperatures.

The four degrees of air frost recorded in many parts of the country on April 24 was the lowest temperature for the month since 1973. The south Kilkenny/Waterford area, with temperatures of -2C, was less severely affected. APPLES

Apple blossom was damaged in most parts of the country with the Dublin area faring worse than South Kilkenny and Waterford

varieties in their susceptibility to frost is more clearly seen with the apples than with any other fruit. Bramley's Seedling, the supreme cooking variety, is the most sensitive. Its blossoms can be destroyed when still at the tight green cluster stage. According to Niall O'Kennedy, ex-Head of the Apple Research Station, Ballygagin, damage to blossom in the Dungarvan area varies from 75% on Bramley to nil on Katja, Golden Delicious and Laxton's Superb. Damage to Jonagold, Jonathan and Cox's Orange Pippin was noticeable but not nearly as severe as with Bramley.

It is impossible for growers to estimate their final yields at this stage. Trees usually carry many more flowers than are needed to set a full crop. Over 75% of Bramley blossom was

killed at the Horticultural College, Kildalton in 1988, yet the trees carried a full crop. In fact, that crop made more money than any before, simply because a heavy fruit set leads to undersized apples unless expensive fruitlet thinning is done. Nevertheless, Leo Doyle, Teagasc, feels that damage in many orchards is so severe that treatment with gibberellic acid is needed.

This technique, based on natural growth processes, has given good results in trials at Kildalton in recent years. After normal pollination, apple flowers produce gibberellic acid. This is the chemical messenger sent by the flowers to the tree for energy to enable fruitlets to develop.

In a frost year like 1989, provided the entire flower has not been destroyed, sprays of gibberellic acid to blossom that has not been pollinated, or only poorly pollinated, can stimulate the development of fruitlets and give a good yield.

When representatives of IFA and NARGC met at the Farm centre in Dublin recently it was agreed that the situation was far too urgent to be diverted into a Law Reform Commission study, which could take years to conclude. NARGC National Director, John Murphy, welcomed the progress made by IFA in its discussions with the Minister for Justice towards updating and clarifying the area of law in relation to aspects of field sports. He said it was significant that these discussions had strongly favoured

a continuation of the traditional access to the Irish countryside for sporting and leisure activities.

MUST NOT BE TAKEN FOR GRANTED

MILK QUOTA SYSTEM ALLOCATION OF QUOTAS TO 'MULDER' PRODUCERS

This notice concerns producers who participated in the Non-Marketing of Milk Scheme or the Dairy Herds Conversion Scheme.

Under recent decisions of the EC Council of Ministers and Commission participants who:

- complied with all of the conditions of the schemes and - whose non-marketing or conversion period ended after 30 September 1983

are, subject to certain conditions, entitled to milk quotas of 60% of the quantities on which the non-marketing or conversion premium was based. Among the conditions to be met is the establishment to the satisfaction of the Department that the applicant is capable of producing on his/her own holding up to the level of the quota applied for.

Quotas are allocated provisionally for two years and will only be allocated **definitively** if the producer has recommenced milk deliveries or sales before 29 March 1990 and in a twelve month period prior to 29 March 1991 has delivered or sold quantities equal to at least 80% of the quota provisionally allocated. The quotas concerned will

not be transferable except by inheritance. The closing date for receipt of applications in the Department is **29 June 1989.** Application forms and full details may be obtained from any milk co-operative or dairy or direct from the Superlevy Section, Department of Agriculture & Food, Kildare Street, Dublin 2. 





PENSMAN Takes You... Behind The SPOTLIGHT

HUGE BACK-LOG IN PATIENT TREATMENT AT ARDKEEN

The huge waiting lists for the treatment of in-patients and out-patients at the Waterford Regional Hospital in Ardkeen as detailed in a report from the South Eastern Health Board dated May 11, indicate in the clearest terms the absolutely decimated condition of the country's health services.

The report was referred to by Cllr. Billy Kyne at this week's monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council. Cllr. Kyne who is also a member of the Regional Health Board said that despite all the talk going on about European elections and a possible General election the fact was that people were suffering badly from the drastic cut-backs in the health services.

Reading from the report, Cllr. Kyne stated that as of March 31 last, there were 1,504 out-patients waiting for surgical treatment at Ardkeen while there were almost 500 in-patients awaiting for treatment in the ENT unit at the hospital. In the out-patients ENT unit the number awaiting treatment, as at March 31, was 899 while 370 patients were on the waiting list for Out-patient orthopaedic treatment.

These figures, Cllr. Kyne stated, showed the terrible state that the health services were now in. The fact that there were more than 1500 people waiting for treatment alone in the Waterford Regional Hospital for out-patient surgical treatment proves this beyond any doubt, he added.

AN APPEAL FOR PUBLIC SUPPORT We had a phone call dur-

ing the week from the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, thanking us for high-lighting in this column last week the vandalism and damage done to the ornamental flower tubs and shrubs placed at vantage points around Dungarvan which, in recent weeks has forced the Urban Council to remove them entirely. As we pointed out, we feel sure that those responsible represent a very small minority - a young, irresponsible hooligan element that loses its self-control in

the late hours of the night or the early hours of the morning and who mount attacks of this kind under the cover of dark.

However, the County Manager, who is undoubtedly a true optimist, informs us that he is planning to give the floral tubs project another chance but in doing so he has issued an appeal to the general public for support for the project and to ensure as far as possible that there will not be more of the wanton destruction and damage that was carried out a few weeks ago.

Mr. Hurley, anticipating an influx of visitors to Dungarvan for the June Bank Holiday week-end in a fortnight's time, and anxious to make the area as attractive looking as possible plans to have the floral tubs and shrubs replaced by then

other places around the town from where they had to be removed because of the scandalous vandalism that went on.

In addition, the County Manager issues a call to the people of the entire Urban area to join with him in his plan to beautify the locality by introducing window boxes not only to private houses but, where possible, to business premises as well.

We have seen what a great difference these window boxes can make and what a symphony of colour they can be responsible for at the seaside resort of Ardmore where there was a marvellous community effort mounted a couple of seasons ago for their Entente Florale entry. But while it might be rather fanciful to expect a similar effort in Dungarvan, we do think that the people of the town should give serious consideration to this latest suggestion from the County Manager to enhance the beauties of the Urban.

Perhaps the suggestion is one that might be actively supported by the Traders Association, Junior Chamber and the ICA and any other society or organisation which has the welfare of the town at heart.

And finally, before leaving this subject, may we suggest that more attention could be given to some environmental education in our schools which would make our young people conscious of the need to protect our amenities from the type of hooligan vandalism to which much of it has recently been subjected.

TRAFFIC LIGHTS AT **KILRUSH** JUNCTION

The new set of traffic lights at the Kilrush junction on the Dungarvan Bypass have now been completed and are fully operational.

A call to our newsdesk during the week from a Ballinamult reader stated that the lights were still not functioning correctly and that the red stop light was not lighting when the green filter arrow came on to permit traffic turning right from the Waterford side on to the Cappoquin road to proceed.

RECENT DEATHS

MRS. ELLEN POWER

On Monday evening, May 8, the sad news filtered through the Old Boro' of the death of Mrs. Ellen Power, 80 Congress Villas, Dungarvan, who had been in the care of the Matron and staff of St. Joseph's Hospital for seven years.

A member of a well known seafaring family, her father Patrick Fitzgerald died on duty while tending to his marine occupation and was interred in faraway Capetown. Ellen's brothers, Jimmy and Paddy, like many others of that era, took the emigrant trail back in 1912 to the USA, while Ellen herself stayed at home and some years later married Geoff Power who was well known in musical circles and with his brothers provided entertainment for audiences in many places.

Predeceased by Geoff by 33 years, Ellen herself had reached the great age of 94 years. A deeply religious woman and a daily Massgoer up to the recent past, Ellen always had her priorities in perspective. She loved to stroll around Fr. Twomey's and up Miss Kiely's Boreen with her great friend Mrs. Margaret O'Brien (nee Maher) of O'Connell Street, discussing the topics of the day and witnessing mother nature in all her splendour.

Ellen was a very quiet and unassuming person who took a great pride in her home and the well being of her family. The visitations of her sons from London and daughter from Canada were always eagerly awaited.

In a life span that covered the entirety of the century, she could relate many an interesting anecdote from her experiences and from social life generally. Prior to her hospitalisation, she proved herself an excellent neighbour and good friend, hence she enjoyed great popularity and was always spoken of with the highest of praise and acclaim.

To pen Ellen's obituary without mentioning her neighbour Jonie Healy of 82 Congress Villas would be most remiss. Jonie was a true friend and neighbour who over the years must have worn a path to Ellen's hospital bed where she listened and encouraged Ellen through her period of illhealth. Her kindness and consideration have not gone

unnoticed by Ellen's family, and the public. Many times during the obsequies one overheard people singing the praises, and deservedly so, of this remarkable neighbour.

There have been minor complaints regarding behaviour at sea, such as skippers' vision being limited due to anglers sitting on the prow while boats are coming into the inner harbour, so we'll make this out of bounds at these times. There are others that I won't bore you with now but we will post guidelines on the caravan and each boat. We ask for your co-operation in these matters, and they are for your benefit.



Our international angler John Cronin is back. The Irish team of which he is a member were sixth out of fifteen, which is a praiseworthy performance, having regard to the type of fishing, which seems very different to what we do here. It was two hours steaming to the fishing grounds, one bag of nine fish weighed only 1.5 kilos, which sounds like they would not have counted here. The method of fishing was "up-tide," casting into a very fast flow. These are not usual conditions here as we don't allow casting and the waters are quite

PHIL GRIMES

The tens of thousands who saw him play hurling for Waterford, for his beloved Mount Sion or for Munster, will remember Philly as one of the greatest hurlers of our time. Why he will be remembered is now part of the history and the lore of Waterford hurling and whenever and wherever the subject is talked about, the name of Philly Grimes must feature prominently in the conversation.

The great sadness which his early death aroused and the huge crowds who turned up for his funeral were evidence of the man's great popularity. From all over Munster and Leinster came the great hurlers of his era, from practically every club in Waterford came representatives and former admirers of his great hurling skills, to pay their final respects to a player whom everyone loved. Phil made his first appearance in a county jersey in a league game against Cork at Dungarvan in 1947 when he played against Christy Ring. At the time, Ring was nine years his senior and the holder of five All-Ireland medals. The strapping 18-year-old Mount Sion man handled himself very well against the maestro who was later to become a legend.

'48, but was in the USA when we won the All-Ireland. He was still awarded a medal, but was heard to say many years later: "It was great to get an All-Ireland medal, but naturally, it was more satisfying when winning it on the field," as Philly did in '59. He had also played in the '57 final and played in the '63 All-Ireland when he was 34 years old.

During his three years in the USA, he played hurling with Tipperary and was a player on the New York team which was narrowly beaten by Tipperary in the national league final of '49/'50. As well as his All-Ireland medals he holds three Munster championship medals, an Oireachtas medal, a National League medal and three Railway Cup trophies won with Munster. He holds twelve county senior championship medals in hurling and five in football quite an extraordinary achievement by any standards.



COUNCIL HAS RETHINK ON BUS STOP PROBLEM

Members of Dungarvan Urban Council who, at their previous meeting agreed to a Bus Eireann proposal to return the official bus stop in the town to O'Connell Street for a trial period of six months, are now to rethink the situation following a further discussion on the matter at the Council's May monthly meeting held last Monday night.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan raised the matter when she said that since the Council's previous meeting, a number of local residen's in private houses in O'Connell Street (as opposed to business concerns) had complained to her about the decision taken by the Council. She said that when these people, and in particular a couple of elderly residents, read about it in the local paper they were shocked. She said that they told her that when the buses were in O'Connell Street before, life was just like hell as the diesel engines of the buses started up at 7.30 a.m. and went on throughout the day. They did not want to have the noise and fumes back again. She added that one of them had said that if, as suggested in a letter in the local paper last week, that the derelict building near the "Rusty Nail" might be converted to a bus shelter,

"we might as well move out of the street altogether." The Chairman, Cllr. Austin Hallahan, said that he also had been approached about the matter by a number of long standing residents of O'Connell St. who were not in business but living in the Street. These people thought they were in heaven last year when the bus stop was moved but when they read of the decision to put the bus stop back again they were absolutely shocked. "I am very conscious of their concern in the matter and I think we should meet with Bus Eireann to discuss the whole problem again," he said.

AN IDEAL PLACE Cllr. D. Goode thought that the proper place to put the bus stop was at the new car park on the quay. "That's an ideal place as there's plenty of room there and they could do up the 'Linny' as a shelter," he
