Tallow Celebrates 21st Birthday In Style

The old reconstructed and refurbished corn mill standing on three floors and located at West Street, Tallow was abuzz with excitement last Monday night as Directors of the Tallow Credit Union gathered there with their members, friends and guests to celebrate the 21st birthday of the founding of the Union in Tallow. It was a night of congratulations, presentations and celebrations and a beautiful balmy evening did much to enhance the enjoyment of the occasion for all those present.

Mr. Sean Twomey, Chairman of the Credit Union Supervisory Committee, who proved an ideal and most efficient Master of Ceremonies for the entire evening put the formal session of the function in motion when he welcomed everyone and introduced, Mrs. Helen McCarthy, President, who spoke about the wonderful support which the Credit Union had received since the movement was established in Tallow in 1968.

From very humble beginnings in Tallow Boys N.S. she traced the expansion of the business through the years up to 1988 when, she said, "our finest hour must have been when the Banner proclaiming £1 million in savings hung so bravely across West Street in July."

Mrs. McCarthy went on to say that they were now looking forward to the £2 million mark in savings and declare: "Our hopes for the future lie with the active members of our Promotion and Education Committee and we are confident of their ability to carry the flag of Tallow Credit Union into the 21st century."

CELEBRATORY MEAL

A celebratory meal organised and prepared by the members of the Promotion Committee followed and subsequently the new building was formally named Nora Herlihy House, in honour of the

founder of the Irish Credit Union Movement, by Sheila Ryan, Manager, who also presented, on behalf of the Credit Union, a signed copy of a portrait of Nora Herlihy executed by Thomas Ryan, President RHA to hang in the building.

The key to Nora Herlihy House was then formally handed over by Mrs. Helen McCarthy to Angela Mulcahy, Vice-Chairman of the Committee of Tallow Enterprise Group.

Accepting the key, Ms. Mulcahy said that the Enterprise Group was formed 3 years ago and had worked away quietly for the betterment of the area. She thanked the Credit Union for solving their accommodation problem by leasing the building to them and added: "We have incurred a large debt in the renovating of this building but we have had some good news about this as the IDA have offered to sponsor the work-space to the tune of £13,500." She also thanked the other State and local agencies who had been so helpful since the Enterprise Group was established.

A number of presentations were then made and included: to Sheila Ryan who was the first secretary, a member of the board and now present Manager of the Union; to Tom Murray, a founder director for 21 years of unbroken service

who was "twinned" with Credit Union member David Murphy, Kilmore Cottage who celebrated his 21st birthday also last Monday; and to all founder members of the Credit Union who were present at the function.

Special tributes were also paid to the late Sean Hancock who was a founder director and President of the Union.

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

WHERE IT ALL BEGAN!

Last Sunday's first reading tells us the world was created by God. And, it is worth noting that man's recent discoveries about the world contribute to proving it was the work of a divine mind. In the second, we hear how Jesus won for us the graces that would unite us with God. The gospel goes on to say that the Holy Spirit will direct and help us to gain access to these saving graces. In fact, the three readings combine to express God's great love and concern for man. It will not have escaped your notice that this work was and will be accomplished through the combined workings of the three Divine Persons, because they have one single nature. This means the Three share in all works exterior to the Trinity: they are distinct only in virtue of their relations to each other.

The Church through her liturgy aims to keep her teachings constantly before our minds, so you'd expect the Trinity, the hall-mark of our religion, to be spotlighted. A Christian must believe in the one true God. It is a basic truth. Some religions differ in that they worship many Gods. And, even among Churches adhering to one God we are at variance in that we not only profess faith in one God, but we hold that there are three Persons in that one God. We believe in God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, and yet! we hold there is only one God. This doctrine is a fundamental tenet of our religion.

The gateway to the Catholic Church was erected by Jesus, and He stressed it was the one and only entrance. "Going therefore, teach all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost." So, to be a Christian one has to be born again in the waters of Baptism, which is the same as saying: no one can be a Christian unless he believes in the Holy Trinity.

Jesus clearly revealed that there are three Persons in God. We have no choice but to accept His word. However, He did not explain how it was that God was one if we consider His nature, and that He was three if in this one nature we reflect on His person. Still, God expects and asks us to believe in the Trinity despite it being beyond our understanding. Remember, the fact we know that numerically God is one nature, and in that nature there are three Persons who are equal and distinct, and each is the true eternal God, does make the face of God that much clearer. When we speak of them as one God, we mean not only that each Person is God, but that each is one and the same God. Indeed, it is incomprehensible, but, as I said, it sheds light on a feature of God that would otherwise have been hidden from us. Too, and it is important, it distinguishes Christ's Church from all others.

GOD IS INFINITE

God is infinite, so man could never grasp the full measure of His being. No one but God fully knows God. This knowledge of Himself we call God the Son. The Father and the Son love each other infinitely, and this love, the one has for the other, we name the Holy Spirit. And, in this perfect understanding of God and in this perfect love, God is forever perfectly happy. You see, the Trinity opens up to us, even if in a limited degree, the inner life of the Godhead. It does not need us. We do need Him. His greatness calls for our reverence, and possessing the knowledge that there are three Persons in God, we feel we can approach and communicate with them.

The Christian religion, as I said, is the only Church to wear the Trinity label. St. John in his first epistle records: "There are three who give testimony in Heaven, the Father, the Word and the Holy Spirit, and these three are one." And from Apostolic times this has been the constant teaching of the Church. I mentioned that the Trinity segregates us from other Churches, such as, the Moslem religion, the Unitarians, etc. Mohammedans have great reverence for Jesus, but they would not worship Him as God.

This doctrine is difficult. It is beyond our understanding. It is a mystery, and seems almost like a contradiction, but such is not the case. We hold God is one in His nature, but we hold He is three if in this nature we consider His Person. Yes, it is hard to follow. Try reading it a second time.

SUMMER BREAKS!

Those with an eye for a summer break with a difference would do well to consider the programme being offered by Voluntary Services International. VSI — which is the Irish branch of an international workcamp organisation has launched its Workcamp Book, which contains a description of some 500 projects taking place throughout Europe (East and West), Canada, USA and North Africa.

The choice of workcamps available is again very broad. Activities include:—

- Working in co-operation with Native Americans in Arizona on an agricultural project at a Navaho reservation.
- Working in an international group on an ecological project in Moscow's Jeuzskiy Forest Park.
- Gardening in the former concentration camp in Dachau (while doing an anti-fascist study element on the history of National Socialism in Germany).

- Joining Soviets and Americans to clear an historic settlement/graveyard in Galway.
- Assisting a therapeutic community for young drug addicts in the rural countryside of N. Sweden.
- Helping to renovate a small independent hostel — used for young less well off people in the Outer Hebrides (Rhenigidale).

- Organising holidays for autistic children in Greece (Aegina Island).
- Working on an anti-apartheid solidarity project in Finland.

The basis of the workcamps is that you spend two to three weeks helping out on a project that will benefit a local community. They are also about breaking down barriers between people of different cultures and religions as volunteers for each project come from a number of different countries.

Volunteers have to cover their own travel expenses but food and accommodation are provided.

No special skills are needed for any of the camps. Volunteers should be over 18 years of age although in some cases VSI accept enthusiastic 17 year olds on their Irish camps.

Schizophrenia is a term used to describe a group of severe mental disorders. The main symptoms are withdrawal, loss of drive or ambition, disordered thinking and inability to initiate or sustain family and social

In Ireland there are nearly 10,000 schizophrenics in hospitals, and approximately 20,000 or more in the community being treated by GP's and at clinics. About 1% of the total population, it is estimated, will suffer from schizophrenia at some time in their lives.

The Association's immediate objective is to bring together parents and relatives of persons suffering from schizophrenia, to discuss their mutual problems and to gain information and consolation from the experience of others.

"HEALTH SHELTER" AT CAPPOQUIN

The following letter has been received by Senator Brian O'Shea from Michael A. Gyves, Administrator Community Care, South Eastern Health Board—

I wish to refer to your representations regarding the opening of the Health Centre at Cappoquin as a shelter to patients waiting to be taken for clinic appointments on Health Board transport.

Each morning a minibus passes through Cappoquin between 8.15 and 8.30 a.m. Patients attending clinics at Waterford Regional Hospital or Cork Regional Hospital are asked to be at the Health Centre between those times. Sometimes the patients are not there at the appointed time and this results in the minibus hav-

ing to come back through Cappoquin later on in the morning. Other occasions are when accidents might occur and this might delay the minibus at Cappoquin. However, these instances are few and far between and in general there are not delays being experienced by the patients on a large scale.

I will monitor the situation over the next month and if there are delays occurring daily, the Health Board will decide on whether to open the health centre early in the morning for the use of the travelling patients.

CD VOLUNTEERS WILL INVADE DUNGARVAN

Dungarvan will be invaded by Civil Defence volunteers from all parts of the country this coming week-end 26/27/28 May, the reason being the holding of the National Civil Defence Welfare and Rescue Championships. There will be over five hundred Civil Defence members visiting the town for the big occasion. These championships, once the highlight of the Civil Defence training year, have not been held for the last three years. Like all state activities they were curtailed due to the shortage of funds. However, prudent management and cost savings have enabled the organisation to revive them again albeit on a reduced scale and on a very tight budget.

It is a great honour for Dungarvan to be chosen to host such a big event as this. The huge numbers will have the town bursting at the seams. It is a tribute to Colm Bannon the County Civil Defence Officer and the local members that they have been entrusted with the task by Commandant Jim McNamara the Regional Officer. Gerry Boland and his wife Kay from Cheekpoint together with Niall Elliot and the members of the local centres will take charge of the Welfare Event. The Rescue championships will be under the control of Billy Allen and John Kennedy assisted by Percy Veale and Patsy Walsh. Mossie Fitzgerald will have charge of the Detention Centre at the Friary College.

Registering and organising all the visitors is a vital job and this has been entrusted to Joe Moynihan and his wife Frances. Joe's father Denis is one of the town's most active volunteers. There is a very strong team here including Siobhan Power, Peggy Whelan, Patricia Roche and Sandra Cahill.

MINISTER WILL ATTEND

Commandant McNamara stated that Colm Bannon and he were delighted with the co-operation which they have received from the local hoteliers. Lawlor's Hotel, Whitechurch House and Clonea Strand Hotel will be full for the week-end. The Local Authority

have also been most supportive. The County Manager Mr. Dan Hurley, and the Secretary Brian McNally have both been Civil Defence members for many years. Now the County Controller, Mr. Hurley addressed a recent meeting of organisers and he told them that he had every confidence that they would do the County proud.

Colm Bannon said that

the highlight of the week-end would be the Presentation Dinner and Dance at Lawlor's Hotel on Saturday night. The Minister for Defence, Mr. Michael Noonan, will attend the championships with Mr. Charles O'Reilly, Director of Civil Defence. The Minister will host the Presentation Dinner and will present the prizes to the winners.

COUNTY V.E.C.

COURSE WAS 100% SUCCESSFUL

Mr. Donal Kelleher, CEO told members of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan that a special Pre-Employment course organised by the Committee in Dungarvan closed down because it had proved to be 100% successful.

He said that 23 people had enrolled in the course and all involved had now secured employment. "It has," Mr. Kelleher went on to say, "been an outstanding success, so much so that we have no one left for the course and it has had to be closed down."

Cllr. D. Goode said that it was indeed an outstanding feat that at a time when unemployment was rife that all 23 members on this course had been placed in jobs. He felt that there would be a big demand for the course if and when it was held next year.

Cllr. P. Coffey, Chairman

said that in a country with almost a quarter of a million of its people unemployed, the result of this course was rather unique. "It is a situation which we should not be slow to highlight," he said.

Cllr. C. Casey agreed and proposed that the Committee should compliment the Course director, Mr. John Martin, a member of the teaching staff at their Dungarvan school. The proposal was carried unanimously.

NO MUSIC GRANT
Much criticism was voiced by the members of the Committee at the failure of the Dept. of Education to make financial provision for the teaching of music as a subject at the Committee's Kilmacthomas school.

Urban Council Briefs

When members of Dungarvan Urban Council came to consider naming the new houses built by the Council at Rice's Street at their May monthly meeting last week, Cllr. B. Kyne asked "what's wrong with calling it Rice's Street as that's where the houses are?"

Cllr. D. Goode thought they might call the new scheme "Plas An Risigh" to honour Brother Rice, the founder of the Christian Brothers.

Cllr. Kyne said that it was to do this that Rice's Street was so named in the first instance. He thought it would be easier especially for post purposes to continue to call it Rice's Street.

The Town Clerk, Mr. B. White, said that all that needed to be done in such a case would be to continue the number of the houses in the street which began with Mr. Kinneen's at No.1.

Cllr. Goode then withdrew his suggestion and Cllr. Kyne's proposal was approved by the Council.

Davitt Car Park? — The Chairman, Cllr. A. Hallahan stated that on the recent visit to Dungarvan of the Mayor of Camden, London, he was accompanied among others, by Mr. Billy Allen, President of the London Waterford Association. Mr. Allen, he said, had suggested that the Council might agree to extend the name of Davitt who had done so much for Irish emigrants, from Davitt's Quay to the Council's new car park at the quay which would then be known as Davitt Car Park.

The Council members agreed to have the matter looked into.

Windows At Childers Estate — Referring to the acceptance of the tender from Munster Joinery for the replacement of windows in 20 houses at Childers Estate, Cllr. Wright asked what the cost was and when the work would start.

The Town Engineer, Mr. G. Taylor, said that the cost worked out at £950 per house and covered the installation of 7 windows in each of the 20 houses.

The Town Clerk, Mr. White said that the work would be started by the contractors without undue delay.

Sympathy — Votes of sympathy were passed with the wife and family of the late Phil Grimes and with the father and family relatives of the late Pat Cullinane, Solicitor.

Paying tribute to the late Phil Grimes, Cllr. D. Goode described him as the greatest Waterford hurler of his time.

The Chairman, Cllr. Hallahan and Mr. White, Town Clerk referring to the death of Mr. Cullinane said that he was a member of the Law firm of Lanigan and Curran who were the Council's legal advisers and represented the Council in Court cases on numerous occasions. Mr. White said that it would be hard find anyone as efficient, courteous and understanding as Pat Cullinane was and his death at such an early age was a great loss to them all.



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RENOVATION OF CATHAL BRUGHA PLACE HOUSES

Mr. Austin Deasy T.D. at Question Time in the Dail asked the Minister for the Environment if he has received plans from Dungarvan Urban District Council, for the renovation of the Cathal Brugha Place houses; and if so, when he intends to take a decision in the matter.

In his reply, Mr. P. Flynn T.D. Minister for the Environment said: "The management, maintenance and improvement of their dwelling is the responsibility of the local authority. A preliminary proposal seeking funding under my Department's remedial works scheme, which pro-

vides assistance in certain cases, was received in February in respect of these houses. Cost and technical details of the proposed work are awaited and pending their submission and examination, I am not in a position to make a decision in the matter."

SIGNIFICANT RECORDS ESTABLISHED BY WATERFORD FOODS

The recipe for a successful food processing industry, in a reshaped Europe, must include high quality at every stage, real investment in product research and development, strong branding, early identification and exploitation of new market opportunities and the necessary flexibility to move as the market or the competition moves.

This was stated by Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director, Waterford Foods Plc., at the Company's first annual general meeting in Dungarvan.

He told the attendance that Waterford Foods had established a number of significant records in the year under review. Turnover, at £238 million, placed the Company among the biggest and strongest in the Irish Food Industry, while cash flow generated by the business amounted to £13.3 million and provided access to very substantial capital reserves.

However, greatest satisfaction could be drawn from the fact that Waterford Foods had now attained business strength in a form that went much deeper than the requirements of any particular year. That strength resided partly in the flexibility associated with a broad product range and the necessary technology to efficiently produce whatever product mix was most attractive for the current market, said Mr. O'Connor.

"We have developed and produced an outstanding brand image for Yoplait yogurts, fresh cheeses and other consumer lines. This is supported by a top class cheddar from Kilmeaden, to the extent that our products are known and respected by both the consumer and the very powerful retail trade.

"At the same time, we have a very efficient manufacturing site at Dungarvan for production of butter,

milk powder, and other commodities. As a result, we can change emphasis between cheese, milk powders and casein, depending on how external factors influence the market.

"That is the kind of flexibility — of strength in depth — that permits us to look at 1989 and beyond with a great deal of well placed confidence," he said.

THE OUTSTANDING EVENT

John Barry, Chairman, said that the outstanding event of 1988, for Waterford Foods had been the establishment of a public

limited Company, which gave the company access to essential capital for its future development and expansion. The value placed on the shares by investors, who had not previously been able to invest in the food industry, showed the respect with which Waterford Foods was seen, even outside its traditional areas. He said that a well planned programme for growth by acquisition was in position and being actively worked on. It would take effect as the most suitable, relevant and profitable opportunities for investment became available.

WAS "OUT OF HIS MIND WITH DRINK"

A young man who was stated to have been "out of his mind with drink" at the time pleaded guilty to a charge of causing malicious damage to a car at Dungarvan Court last Wednesday week.

He was Patrick Maguire, 4 Leamybrien, Kilrossanty, and he was charged with the malicious damage to a car the property of Mrs. Breda O'Halloran, to the amount of £106 at the Burgery, Dungarvan on March 4. He pleaded guilty to the charge.

Supt. P. J. Hayes who prosecuted told the Court that at around 3.15 a.m. on Saturday morning, March 4, the defendant was at the Burgery at the house of Mr.

Casey and started banging on the back door. Mr. Casey sent for the gardai and when Det./Gda. O. Phelan arrived he found the defendant in a very drunken state, so much so that he didn't know where he was or even who he was.

"He was unable to give any explanation for what he had done and was out of his mind with drink," said the Supt. who added that Maguire had since taken full responsibility for what had happened, was very contrite over the whole affair and had paid full compensation to the injured party.

Det./Gda. Phelan said that Mrs. O'Halloran was daughter of the owner of the house and was a home for the week-end. Her car had the windscreen wipers smashed and the door had been kicked and damaged.

Supt. Hayes said that the defendant had no previous conviction.

The defendant in reply to a question by District Justice O'Connell said that he could not remember anything about the incidents.

The District Justice said that there was no explanation for what happened but as there was nothing previously against the defendant and as what he had done had already cost him over £100, he would apply the POA.

DISMAYED AT AGRICULTURE MINISTER'S BRUSSELS PERFORMANCE

A joint statement issued by Co. Waterford I.F.A. Chairman, Mr. Gerry Murphy and Grain Committee Chairman, Mr. John O'Mahony stated, that at a meeting of the Waterford Grain Committee, members expressed dismay at Minister O'Kennedy's lack of understanding of their problems.

It was agreed that what saved growers from losing money last year was the American drought. It is of course unrealistic to expect to be baled out in this fashion every year.

The meeting was unanimous in looking for the £9 return Co-responsibility Levy to be suspended for

this harvest, now that the E.C. Budget is in surplus.

"We demand the Minister to take an aggressive stand on this matter to safeguard the livelihood of Ireland's 33,000 grain growers and the 24,000 people employed in the grain industry," the statement added.

ICMSA TAX PROPOSALS FOR EURO-CANDIDATES

The ICMSA is launching another campaign in the run up to the European Elections on June 15, to highlight its demand for an alternative tax system for farmers.

This campaign is to take the form of mass public meetings in each of the Euro-Election constituencies.

The Munster constituency meeting will be held at Maudie Macs (Buttevant-Mallow) on Monday next, May 29 at 8.30 p.m.

Mr. Sean Kelly, President of the Irish Creamery Milk Suppliers' Association said that all Euro-Election Candidates for the Munster area are invited to the meeting.

Mr. Tom O'Dwyer, Deputy President of ICMSA will present the farm tax policy for his Association and each of the candidates will be asked to respond by outlining precisely their positions.

Mr. Kelly went on: "The present tax-on-accounts system is one of the main reasons for keeping the family farms in a depressed state.

"It's no use for politicians to say glibly that the Profile Form looks after small enterprise farms.

"I know and farmers know from their own experience that the full rigours of the accounts system of tax is the death-knell of the average sized family farms.

"The accounts system prevents initiative and increased output. It favours borrowing more than saving for reinvestment. It is a system geared for large commercial type business, and was never designed for farming.

"ICMSA is proposing a number of alternative tax systems — the Land Tax, the Product Levy Tax, or the Production Unit Tax — either of which would be acceptable alternatives, which would yield the comparable amounts of

tax. "The present tax is both cumbersome and costly to operate. We are saying to Government, give farmers a system which can be understood and farmers will respond with increased production, and the appropriate amount of tax."

QUESTIONNAIRE

Mr. Kelly said that while members of the European Parliament will not be dealing directly with farmers tax in the normal course of their business, nevertheless farmers have a right to

know where they stand on the farmers tax issue. Farmers will naturally be more responsive to Euro candidates who support a fair tax system for farmers.

"It is our intention," said Mr. Kelly, "to request each Euro-candidate to complete a questionnaire on farm tax which will establish precisely the candidates attitude. These responses will be published with meaningful comments by ICMSA in the week-end before the elections."

WHY NOT GIVE US A TRY

YOUNG IRISH IMMIGRANTS — AFRAID, IMPOVERISHED, WITHOUT A HOME

A depressing picture of the fear, poverty and homelessness which afflict some young Irish immigrants to Britain is revealed in a report launched yesterday, Tuesday, May 23.

Many arrive in Britain with a willingness to work hard and start a successful new way of life, says Fr. Jim Kiely, Director of the Irish Support & Advice Centre in Hammersmith, West London who is a member of the Augustinian Order and a native of Ballinamult.

But all too often, he says, they end up struggling to support themselves and their family in Ireland. And, warns Fr. Kiely, there is a real danger that "some are sinking into the abyss of crime, prostitution and homelessness."

The Centre's Annual Report makes several recommendations:

— funds from the Irish State Lottery should be used to increase Ireland's contribution to the welfare of its emigrants;

— an Emergency Safe Start Fund should be set up to cater for the needs of the most vulnerable of the newly-arrived immigrants;

— the Irish abroad should be given a vote in the Irish

elections or, alternatively, the Irish should appoint a special Minister with responsibility for the country's emigrants.

The report looks at the work of the Irish Support & Advice Centre over the last year. Referrals were up 15%, teenagers under 18, 60%. "Our resources are limited, and yet, there is a vital need to help these people, particularly the teenagers who arrive in London — some as young as fourteen. From my experience, where they stay and who they meet initially, is of immense importance. In fact, it is crucial in determining their whole future. The sad reality is that for some, we have a potentially tragic situation on our hands," says Fr. Jim Kiely, the Centre's Director.

And he adds: "The plight of the homeless becomes more poignant when placed against the background of the political machine. Considering that there are almost one million Irish in Britain with: No Voice, No

Say, No Vote, No Power, in the arena of politics in Ireland, one can identify in some small and limited way, with what it is to be without a real say in the corridors of power."

MARRIED MEN, TOO

The Report also points out the powerlessness felt by the increasing number of married men having to emigrate. "It is one thing when children have to leave home — at a certain point that is natural — but it is bitter and unnatural when parents have to. This separation has nothing good in it." One young married man said: "I never thought it would happen to me. Though I'm thirty years of age now, I feel like an eighteen year old again. Afraid and unsure. Life is so different here. I'm not sure that London is the place to bring my wife and kids." And he adds: "I spend most of my wages just keeping myself in accommodation and food. What is left over, I send home to help pay the bills. My wife has no job."

The Report stresses the importance of adaptability, the ability to share cultural heritage and be enriched by that of others. "It is an advantage to live outside the geographical boundaries of a culture. Only then can we be selective about it. It is an illusion for the Irish who have emigrated here, to transfer Irish culture unmodified into this country.

The most one can expect to achieve is an Anglo-Irish culture." "It is becoming fashionable to be European-Irish," adds Fr. Kiely.

NEED FOR PASTORAL PLAN

Fr. Kiely says: "Looking through the media reports of the last year, one cannot help but be struck by the great lack of articles dealing with religious heritage and the deeper, more long-term needs of the individual Irish person." And he continues: "The Pobail De" on Sunday mornings for many young Irish people is the pub. Irish people have a tremendous innate need to come together, to talk, to sing, to share. I feel that we urgently need to form an effective Pastoral Plan that will put shape to the Church — especially the Church of the young Irish immigrant in London."

Other recommendations included in the report were:

— That intending emigrants be aware of the importance of making some decisions regarding lifestyle, religious values, ongoing education, and the constructive use of leisure time.

— That the Government authorities in Northern Ireland make available funds to be distributed to Centres dealing with immigrants from there.

— That a Pastoral Plan be drawn up to include an effective response to the faith needs of the young Irish in London.

KING JOHN'S CASTLE DUNGARVAN "IS ON A LIST"

Mr. Austin Deasy at Question Time in the Dail asked the Minister for Finance the plans which the Office of Public Works have for King John's Castle, Dungarvan, and when restoration works will commence.

Minister of State at the Department of Finance (Mr. N. Treacy) — It is the intention to carry out a major scheme of conservation works at Dungarvan Castle. This will include the provision of interpretation facilities. The Office of Public Works have in hands a programme of major conservation works at a large number of national monuments throughout the country and at this stage it is not possible to say when works will commence at Dungarvan Castle.

Mr. Deasy — I missed a word in the Minister's reply. What did the Minister say prior to the word "facilities".

Mr. N. Treacy — Interpretative.

Mr. Deasy — When will the project commence?

Mr. N. Treacy — We have a very ambitious programme and we have al-

ready decided on what will be done this year in the context of the funds available.

Mr. Carey — I hope it is not the same as in Clare, Minister; you are bursting all records there.

An Ceann Comhairle — Deputy Carey will appreciate that this question refers to King John's Castle, Dungarvan. If the Deputy wants information on an historic monument in Clare he should put down a question.

Mr. N. Treacy — I cannot say when, but it is on a list. It is our ambition to carry out work there as quickly as possible and as soon as resources become available.

Mr. Deasy — That is not very satisfactory.

Mr. N. Treacy — It is positive.

Mr. Deasy — I will be putting down a question again.

FIANNA FAIL PLAN TO COMBAT UNEMPLOYMENT

Speaking at a meeting in Dungarvan, Euro candidate, Jackie Fahey, T.D. said that in addition to the National Development Plan, the Fianna Fail government would submit to the European Commission next month a further detailed plan to combat long-term unemployment and to help young people to integrate into the workforce. In all, these two plans would mean an investment of more than £9 billion while over £3 billion had been sought from the EC Structural Funds.

Deputy Fahey went on to say: "The plan will dramatically alter the economy and rural development potential of Counties Carlow, Kilkenny, Tipperary (S.R.) Wexford and Waterford and our Fianna Fail Government has marked out for special improvements, Waterford and Rosslare sea-

ports with improved ship access to New Ross port."

Deputy Fahey added that Fianna Fail candidates were the only ones who back the government's National Development Plan and the Fianna fail MEP's would be the ones who would stand by it in the European Parliament.

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**EDUCATIONAL
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AN ROINN COMHSHAOIL GRANTS FOR WASTE RECYCLING PROJECTS

The Minister for the Environment invites applications for grants from persons or bodies who are prepared to establish waste recycling projects involving glass, paper, cans or plastics.

Grants of 50% of the capital cost involved in setting up recycling projects are envisaged but grants of up to 75% will be considered depending on the nature of the project. Grants will be available to meet start-up costs only and any operations assisted will be expected to become viable in a short time. While all suitable proposals will be considered, the grants scheme is particularly suited to voluntary bodies and community groups.

Projects which involve commercial-scale recycling operations with collection and subsequent processing of waste being carried on by one person or body, may qualify for assistance from the Industrial Development Authority. Such projects will not be eligible for second grants under this scheme.

FIRST LONDON EMIGRANT REUNION

Father Jim Griffin has passed us word that all is now in readiness for the first London Emigrant Reunion organised by the combined parishes of Dungarvan, Abbeyside and Kilgobinet to take place over the June Holiday Week-end from June 2-4.

A coach will leave Grattan Square at 6 a.m. on the Friday morning for Cork Airport where take-off is timed for 8.30 a.m. with the ETA (estimated time of arrival) at Heathrow, London, 9.30 a.m. The big function of the week-end will be the Re-Union proper which will take place at Dicey Riley's Night Club at 295, Neasden Lane, London NW10, starting at 7.30 p.m. on Saturday night, June 3.

Fr. Griffin says that the occasion will, without doubt be an unique opportunity to meet all the exiles from the locality in London and other parts of Britain and he recalls the immortal lines of Dan Savage's "Lovely Deise" which portray the sadness and loneliness of emigration:

The boat at Dunlaoghaire was moored to the pier

When the voice of an exile I happened to hear,

As I gazed o'er my shoulder in the pale harbour light

Fare thee well lovely Deise I'm leaving to-night.

Fr. Griffin adds that this reunion will keep the link with local emigrants and show in a concrete way that they are still part of the local community though forced to work abroad.

In this context it is appropriate that the annual report of the Irish Support and Advice Centre in London which is referred to elsewhere in this issue of the "Leader" should be particu-

larly noted. In the course of a letter written in the Report by Fr. Jim Kiely, Director of the Centre he states that there is a growing number of Irish immigrants, young and old in London who are in a state of homelessness and powerlessness and the developing fear of a 'new Broadway generation' was very quickly becoming a reality.

Fr. Kiely declares: "Quite frankly, many immigrants have no means of coping with the critical accommodation problem in London — especially during the first few weeks. Our Austin House Hostel has been providing an extremely vital interim shelter to many of these over the last number of years. We now intend to develop and extend this service which we anticipate will leave us £170,000 in debt. We need your financial help — now. Any contribution is welcome."

Statistics published in the Report show that during the 12 months, January-December 1988, the number of new clients who called at the Advice Centre from County Waterford was 114, putting it fourth highest in the list behind Dublin, Cork and Louth.

The Report must certainly provide food for thought for those of us who are privileged to be able to remain at home as to the problems and worries that face our emigrants who are forced to work abroad to

make a living.

NORA HERLIHY HOUSE, TALLOW

In recognition of the wonderful support received from the local community during the past 21 years, the Directors of Tallow Credit Union have purchased the old Grain Store at West Street, Tallow and at a celebration of the Union's 21st birthday last Monday night formally named the renovated building Nora Herlihy House in honour of the founder of the Irish Credit Union Movement and handed it over to the Tallow Enterprise Group.

The building, occupying three floors, will provide work spaces for start-up businesses and projects of a cultural and social nature in the Tallow and surrounding areas.

The idea grew from the survey carried out a few years ago which revealed that as far as unemployment was concerned, Tallow was one of the worst hit areas in all of West Waterford. The Credit Union Directors then took the decision to purchase the old grain store and it has now been reconstructed and renovated and taken over by the appropriately named Tallow Enterprise Group.

It is to be hoped that the new Enterprise Centre will prove to be an incubator in which small ideas may be born and developed into undertakings which will provide much needed employment for this industrially starved area.

THOSE TRAFFIC LIGHTS AT KILRUSH JUNCTION

Our references to the newly-installed traffic lights at the Kilrush junction on the Dungarvan Bypass last week have given rise to further controversy and criticism. While what was stated was not wrong, it was not altogether correct. The sequence, as it works, is correct but there is one light which fails to show when it should and this is what has created the hazard.

Following a further call from our Ballinamult reader and also a number of locals in Dungarvan we probed the matter further during the past week.

From inquiries we made, we have learned that the

new lighting system at the junction was installed by the Phillips Company and that the Co. Council were given to understand that when the new system was put in place, the new control panel would simultaneously be installed.

It now transpires that this did not take place and that although the new lights were erected they were being operated from the original control panel. As a result the red light at the top right of the light cluster which should flash when the green arrow indicates a forward movement does not in fact operate and this is causing confusion for drivers who approach the junction on the by-pass and wish to turn on to the Clonmel-Cappoquin road.

A spokesman for the County Council Engineering Department with whom we discussed the problem on Tuesday agreed that this problem did exist but said that the new control panel was to be installed this week by the lighting contractors and that the situation would then be rectified.

We sincerely trust that this will be the case!

BICYCLE RACK AT SQUARE

We have been asked to draw attention to the fact that for the convenience of cyclists who may wish to park a bicycle at Grattan Square, a bicycle rack has been provided by the Dungarvan Urban Council for the purpose.

It is located to the rear of the seat at the Square on the Main Street side of the trueway and was placed there on the suggestion of Cllr. Nuala Ryan on a trial basis.

Cllr. Ryan told a recent meeting of the Urban Council that shopkeepers at the Square had complained to her that bicycles were being parked up against their windows and that there was a constant danger of damage and breakage as a result.

We have noted several times that the rack is at present seldom if ever used but perhaps now that we have turned the spotlight on its existence it will be availed of more frequently in the future.

A BOTTLE BANK

We have been asked to float the suggestion that a "bottle bank" might be provided in Dungarvan

for the collection of glass bottles for re-cycling purposes.

All that is required is the parking of a suitable 'bank' (usually a refuse skip) in some suitable central loca-

tion with easy access for people with bottles to discard.

There is one operating in Youghal and the proceeds from the project go to the Rehabilitation Institute.

THE ROAD TO NOWHERE — MAYBE!

According to the 1988 Annual Report of the Irish Support and Advice Centre, London, the minimum cost per week of staying in London comes to a total of £125 made up as follows: Rent £40; Food £40; Travel £10; Toiletries £5; New Clothes £5; Entertainment £15 and savings £10. These are figures which our young, would-be emigrants to London should study before taking the road which might, as the following poem also taken from the Irish Support and Advice Centre's Annual Report, just be the road to nowhere.

Called "Aimless Wandering Emigrant Dead," we make it our choice, instead of the usual balad, for this corner this week:

I walk with the rest of them up and down
Between Mornington Crescent and Camden Town
Pain in the belly, sore in the head
Aimless wandering immigrant dead.

I dug that hole then filled it in
I'm buried there up to me chin
You can leave me in it, I'll tell no lies
And for the traffic lights you can use my eyes.

I sit in capps and drink black tea
And try to think what's wrong with me
The night is weeping and full of cries
But I can't join in I've got no eyes.

I've left them buried in London clay
They'll stay there now 'til Judgment Day
Flashing green and flashing red
As the City roars above my head.

In the pub you hear the saddest crap
Straight from their souls into your lap
A fella shouts — 'I left years ago and
There's no one there alive I know.'

There's a woman walking down the street
With Autumn hair and Winter teeth
I'd like to kiss and tell her lies
But she'd see my face hasn't any eyes.

London tore them from the sockets
Destroyed my mind, emptied out my pockets
The drink has all but ruined my liver
And the 'Subby's' sold me down the river.

So I walk with the rest of them up and down
Between Mornington Terrace and Camden Town

REV. FR. LAURENCE SHERIDAN, S.D.B.

It was with deep sadness and very sincere regret that the people of the locality learned of the death of Rev. Fr. Larry Sheridan, S.D.B., Liverpool and Shandon, Dungarvan, which occurred in Liverpool in the early hours of Friday, May 19, after a brief period of ill-health.

Aged 74 years, Fr. Larry answered the great call to the priesthood in 1933 when he entered the Salesian College at Pallaskenry to commence his studies. He gained practical experience 18 months later when he travelled to Buenos Aires. It was in the Argentine some years later that Fr. Larry was ordained. Between Santiago and Buenos Aires the deceased spent 9 years preaching and instructing his Latin American brethren in the word of God.

In 1963 he returned to the Irish province and took up ministerial duties in Clare and later Shinrone in Offaly. The 70's saw him in Brixton, Oxford and two years later he was posted to Liverpool to continue his great work on the English mission.

After a life dedicated to the salvation of mankind, we pray that Fr. Larry is rejoicing in the full knowledge of the truth in heaven.

To his brother Michael (Shandon), sisters Eileen, Rita, Edna (all England) and Josephine (Dungarvan) we offer our deepest sympathy.

Fr. Larry's remains will be flown into Shannon on this Thursday evening and will be later transferred to the Salesian Chapel, Pallaskenry. Following the 11 a.m. Mass on Friday the interment will take place in the Community cemetery.

LIMERICK HURLER'S EXPLOITS RECALLED

(By Johnny Buckley, Ballynoe)

The recent death of John Mackey of Ahane and Limerick fame revived many thrilling and glorious memories of hectic hurling in the 30's and 40's. A son of John "Tyler" Mackey, who captained the Limerick hurlers that went down to Kilkenny in the 1910 All-Ireland, John and his brother Mick (the legendary year older brother) were introduced in their teens when the famous Ahane Club, although only founded in 1929, grew to become one of the most outstanding individual senior hurling teams in Ireland, capturing no less than fifteen county titles.

John, as well as brother Mick, won 3 All-Ireland medals and he had six National League titles to his credit and also Thomond Shield honours.

He laid claim too to 5 senior county football medals. Coming on the Limerick team in 1932 as a sub and being on the team in '33 that lost to Lowrey Meagher's Kilkenny team in the All-Ireland final, success smiled on him the following year in 1934, known as the Golden Jubilee Year, when, having drawn with Dublin in the decider, Limerick overcame the Liffesiders (captained then by Sean Feeney of Ballyduff) on the score 5-2 to 2-6.

1935 saw Limerick bow to Lowrey Meagher's Kilkenny and in 1936 the Shannonsiders reversed the decision against Kilkenny to give John Mackey his second All-Ireland medal.

In 1939 at Fermoy, Cork, who were in the hurling wilderness since their spectacular 1931 All-Ireland win with Endie Coughlan at the helm, dethroned Waterford, the previous year's Munster champions and All-Ireland finalists, and went on to meet Limerick at Thurles, and this game (reputedly one of the greatest) is worth recalling.

Rumours of war were only occasionally whis-

pered and vendors around the field in Thurles had everything in great supply, including sandwiches, minerals, fruit, etc.

Cork had hopes, but when the brothers Mackey appeared entering the field with their father "Tyler" and sisters, it looked as if the Leesiders confidence was a little shaken, but a minor win for Cork in the curtain-raiser rejuvenated the spirits and then the legendary Jamesy Kelleher of Duncorney fame took his seat to be applauded and as "Carberry" wrote the following Thursday in the "Weekly Examiner" the hand was nearly shook off him by the old hurlers of Kilkenny, Tipp, Waterford and "Tyler" himself from Limerick.

TENSION

The tension couldn't be greater until relief came with the appearance of the red jerseyed team led by Jack Lynch: Willie "Long Puck" Murphy, Ballincollig, Batt "Barber" Thornhill from Buttevant, Alan Lofty, promoted minor from Sars, Willie Campbell, Middleton, John Quirke, centre back, Blackrock, and Jim Young, Glen Rovers, Jack Lynch (capt.) Glen Rovers, Jack Barrett, Kinsale, Connie Buckley, Glen Rovers, Bobbie Dineen, Middleton (afterwards a priest), William Tabb, Carrigwohill (who replaced Paddy Donovan), J. "Bobby" Ryng, Carrigwohill, Teddy Sullivan, Middleton, powerfully built full forward and similarly a promoted minor and finally, Micka Brennan from Sars, a colourful character.

The first thing to be observed that day was the hefty frame of Mick Mackey's ecstatic leap into the air every time he scored a point and with John Quirke in close proximity they were few and far between, but the Mackey's roved and especially John while playing the right wing often visited the left to snatch an elusive point, but tenacious Jim Young took good care of him on the day.

Half time came after those mighty exchanges and Limerick enjoyed a slight advantage. But we are told that Jim Regan, stalwart from '28 and '31 period, encouraged Cork by saying "Cork were never 'bate' against the wind, lads." Indeed the wind couldn't be much on that sunny July day but the magic words must have worked. What with Ted Sullivan shaking

them and Jack Lynch and Willie Campbell scoring a long way out from two side line cuts and Jim Buttimer, St. Finbarr's, keeping the net in almost impregnable state, the crown went to rest on the Banks of the Lee, on the score 4-3 to 3-4.

'40 saw the same sides in contention in Thurles and after a draw the second day sent the cup and honours to the Shannon-side and Limerick went on to defeat Terry Leahy's Kilkenny team and John Mackey won his third and well deserved All-Ireland medal.

This is the end of the Mackey era for the present and undoubtedly the great blond-headed John brought a new dimension to Limerick hurling and the green sod of his native Limerick will surely rest lightly on his noble breast. Go mba fada bua a chuimhne in ar meas.

A well known Irish Agency who carry out statistical analysis of all important championship games give 107 as the average number of stoppages in a 70 minute championship game. As will be seen from my figures of the junior match, there were 106 stoppages (53 in each half). For a 60 minute match it seemed a lot. The 'lost time' aspect of the game analysis is the time which elapses between the awarding of a free and the taking of the 'puck.' Also the time between the ball crossing the line and sideline (scores included) and the taking of the subsequent puck, is averaged at 19 seconds. These figures illustrate how little continuity of play there is in a game.

Great Senior Hurling Win

Having had to wait for six years to win a first round of the Munster championships, I suppose it was understandable that our supporters at Thurles were very excited on Sunday. It was looked upon as a mighty win, a great day for a championship starved county and supporters who had waited for a long time to give vent to their feelings, were not going to let the opportunity slip.

We had fifteen points to spare at half time and fifteen points to spare at the finish. Sitting beside me in the stand, a longtime supporter remarked that the last time that a Waterford senior hurling team had a halftime lead like that was in 1959 when we hammered Tipperary in Cork before going on to win the All-Ireland. So, I suppose, what is seldom is wonderful and as I have written the euphoria and the jubilation was delightful to behold and thankfully it has, for the time being anyway, brought back a happy atmosphere to GAA life in the county.

What was most pleasing about the win was that the team played very well, and probably better than they have done for quite some time. As the game progressed it was obvious that they were playing with great confidence as after Paudie Prendergast's long distance sideline cut was tipped to the net by Pat Murphy and was followed by goals from Gerry Connors and Noel Crowley, Waterford, were seen to be in top gear and playing like champions.

The size of the Waterford support in the 5,400 attendance was heard to great effect as the half-time

whistle sounded and Waterford were applauded all the way to the dressing room. When they returned to the field (three or four minutes later than the regulations allow) they were again greeted very warmly. The applause after the game showed how much the supporters appreciated the great effort.

While this was a splendid team effort, it would be foolish indeed to imagine that we have a team of world-beaters, when we don't have. As a team it is yet far too soon to believe that we have arrived as serious contenders on the Munster scene.

We still have a few problems and a few places to be consolidated before we can look very confidently to the future. If we had met Cork last Sunday it is possible that we might have beaten them, but meeting them in the semi-final in two weeks time is a completely different matter.

We have from time to time 'slipped one across' them, but in recent times whenever Cork have geared themselves for a championship contest with us, the results have proved terrible as far as we are concerned. I suppose the 'winding-up' process for their crack at Waterford has

already begun and in the build-up, the "Cork Examiner" will make Waterford the favourites, etc., etc., so there is great need to keep our feet on solid ground and not get unduly carried

There are people who believe that it is a waste of time and money training and preparing such teams and at the same time inconveniencing clubs who are trying to get organised for their own championships.

If it is to continue, I believe now that it should be confined to junior players for all counties as in that it might serve some purpose.

Losing the game here was another disappointment, but there was also a bit of tragedy involved when Paraigh Fanning was injured by a foul blow and carried off on a stretcher, it was found that he had sus-

tained a broken leg before being removed to Cork Regional Hospital, where he was operated on, on Monday.

Young Fanning is one of the county's most promising young players and would have been an automatic choice for our under 21 county team to play Clare at Kilmallock on June 15.

PLAYING IN THE U.S.A.?

Under a new rule which was approved by Congress this year, the week-end trips by players to play in the U.S.A., are now over and players who jet across for a week-end, will be illegal. In order to obtain official sanction to play over there, a player travelling out must carry authorisation documents and must remain in the area of the North American Board for a minimum of 28 days. Should he play and return to Ireland before 28 days

have elapsed, he will be reported and then suspended by the G.A.A.



Should a player return here and play with his home club, before the limit of 28 days has expired, his club will then be illegal also.

Very Curtailed Fixtures Programme For Week-End

Because of Waterford's win on Sunday last and our meeting with Cork on June 4, the majority of the fixtures arranged for next week-end, have been cancelled and only three of the eleven scheduled County Board hurling matches will go ahead. This will include three intermediate and one senior hurling game and the remainder will take their place on the fixtures programme at a later time.

The county fixtures committee met at Fraher Field, last night, Tuesday, to review the championship situation — which is also likely to be affected by the game between Kerry and Waterford in junior football at Dungarvan on June 18.

Had we been that little bit confident of beating Clare on Sunday last, we might have prepared a contingency plan and played all but one of the senior football games listed for the following Sunday, June 4. Obviously no one expected us to beat Clare.

CAPPOQUIN v. CLONEA

It being the only senior match listed for the day, it must be given pride of place on this list, but whether or not this will be justified on the field, is something that remains to be seen. As far as senior teams go in the county, neither of these could be judged to be in the top bracket. In fact, relegation to intermediate grade is a concern for both at the moment and the efforts to avoid such ignominy will inspire both Clonea and Cappoquin in this one.

In the standard ratings, they could be judged about equal, so both will see this as one of the few matches possible for them to win this year and will go all out for the points. It doesn't help their club ego that neither has a player on the county panel at the moment, but with this being the only senior match to be played before we meet Cork on Sunday week, I have no doubt but that the three county selectors will focus their full attention on the performances of the players here.

Clonea and Cappoquin didn't meet in the championship last year, but their clash in the '87 championships at Dungarvan saw Clonea score 5-10 as against 2-7 for Cappoquin. On current form, either can win, but taking a line through Tallow, whom they both played in the present championship, Cappoquin might just about win.

STRADBALLY v. MOLLERANS

This will be their first ever meeting in intermediate hurling, so making a prediction about the outcome is difficult. Last season, Stradbally went to the divisional final against

Fourmilewater here in the West and this would appear to be a bit better than what the Mollerans did down in their divisional championships in the East. A win for Stradbally won't surprise.

FOURMILEWATER v. ST. SAVIOURS

A couple of real defensive blunders cost Fourmilewater the points against Mollerans in the first round and if they allow the same to happen here, they could find themselves in serious trouble later in the competition, when it may be more difficult to pick up the points. Saviours won the sympathy of the County Board when they appealed to be let up into intermediate grade in hurling this year, but in their first round match against Tramore, the decision of the delegates was fully justified when Saviours won with a bit to spare. I have a feeling that the Ballymac' based lads are better prepared now and will win this one.

KILGOBINET v. TRAMORE

Transfers out of the club have affected Kilgobinet, but the fine spirit displayed in their first round against Stradbally, showed how determined their players are to overcome the handicap. Both could find themselves battling to avoid relegation at the end of this championship, but to be quite frank about it the losers of the battle might be the winners in the long term.

OTHER GAMES

St. Mary's will find Ballinameela a tough one to overcome in their clash in the opening match at Cappoquin on Sunday. Having beaten An Rinn, who are regraded as the favourites to win the championship, Ballinameela will 'have their tails up' for the remainder of the series and this regraded side, having found their form again, will be the team they will all have to beat. I expect to see them win this one.

Following their lapse against Ballinameela on Saturday night, An Rinn should show a return to form again against Clashmore at nearby Old Parish venue on Saturday night. Clashmore are improved from their earlier form, but I wouldn't rate them to be as good as their Gaeltacht

neighbours.

Now that Ballysaggart have shown a return to winning form, they will be hot favourites to beat bottom of the table Geraldines in their hurling tie at Cappoquin on Sunday. This won't be as good as its curtain-raiser.

In the junior B games, Ardmore should account

for Kilrossanty at Abbeyside, Tourin will have too much power for Eire Og at Cappoquin and Glen Rovers will be expected to beat Modeligo.

In the two second string matches, Lismore will be strongly fancied to beat Cappoquin and Abbeyside, may just about beat Stradbally.

Waterford pulled off a surprise victory over Clare in the first round of the Munster senior hurling championship played at Semple Stadium, Thurles on Sunday last. It wasn't just the victory that caused surprise. It was the emphatic way that Waterford put paid to the Clare challenge.

Further U.S. Scholarships Links For Friary

Following the well-established links with Mercyhurst College and St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan, comes the hopeful news of another American University seeking to forge links with the Friary. The new interest comes from Dr. Ronald Champagne, President of St. Xavier's College, Chicago. Last summer Dr. Champagne was in Ireland to explore means of assisting young Irish people, by offering them educational opportunities in the USA.

Mercyhurst College (Erie) has already taken the initiative in this area, and several Friary past-pupils are already pursuing courses there. We are happy to announce that Mercyhurst is again recruiting Irish students this summer, and four Friary pupils and two Mercy School pupils are presently working on their applications with a view to interviews. Hopes are high that three scholarships, at least, will be awarded by Mercyhurst. This is obviously very encouraging news for the Friary.

Whilst, as yet, there have been no firm offers from St. Xavier's, yet their goodwill towards Ireland is prospect-enhancing. Their desire to help young Irish students indebtedness to their founders, a group of Irish Mercy Sisters who set up an academy in Chicago in 1846. Their commitment to the Irish connection was strengthened by the visit of Fr. Pat Moran, Principal of St. Augustine's to St. Xavier's College last autumn.

VISIT BY COLLEGE DEAN
 Fr. Moran was in the U.S.

to visit the seven ex-Friary pupils at Mercyhurst, but he also took the opportunity to explore scholarship possibilities in other U.S. centres. He was impressed by the opportunities and facilities offered at St. Xavier's and maintained links with the faculty. When the Dean of Admissions & Financial Aid, Mary Cartan Hendry visited Trim in May, Fr. Moran invited her to visit Co. Waterford, and especially Old Parish, the ancestral home of Chicago's newly-elected Lord Mayor, Richard Daley. She also visited Waterford Glass, Ring Crystal and Holy Cross Abbey.

On Thursday, 4th May, she addressed the Leaving Certificate pupils of the Friary. Obviously she enjoyed her visit. In a letter to Fr. Moran she wrote: "I was very impressed with the young men I met at St. Augustine's. They inspire me to work diligently so that in the future some of them may join us at St. Xavier's." Let's hope that her visit to Cashel, Ring and Old parish may prove another opportunity for Friary pupils in the years ahead.
