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DUNGARVAN'S '89 DEVELOPMENT PLAN FORMALLY APPROVED

A special meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council held to discuss the adoption of the Draft Development Plan for the urban area for the next five years was adjourned at the outset for a brief period as a mark of respect on the death of Mrs. Alice Young, aunt of Cllr. Billy Kyne.

On resuming the meeting, the Chairman, Cllr. Austin Hallahan, welcomed Mr. John Reid, Planning Consultant and said that they were there to hear Mr. Reid's views on the listed observations received as a result of the public display of the Draft Plan for the period of three months from January 23 last.

Mr. Reid having outlined the procedure followed for the display and adoption of the Plan, categorised those who had made observations on it into three classes: (1) Ecclesiastical — items to be preserved; (2) Private Residents — items to be considered for preservation and (3) Individuals concerned with specific aspects of the Plan.

He then pointed out that as none of the observations submitted required a mate-

rial change in the Draft Plan, a further display of one month was not required.

Mr. Reid then spoke on each of the observations and following a discussion by the members it was agreed to change the zoning of the land at Monang, the property of the Repts of William (Billy) Morrissey, from Open Space to Residential. It was further agreed that the area of land at Clogherane (Lisfennel) presently owned by Dungarvan G.A.A. Club and which might be surplus to their requirements be zoned Residential as Dungarvan G.A.A. had indicated that they might dispose of this land for housing development.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn suggested that as this land was bound-

ed on one side by the Dungarvan By Pass road, the Council should, prior to granting permission for housing development on it, consider a suitable housing density that would not generate a pedestrian traffic which would be dangerous to persons using the By Pass.

Mr. Reid circulated a document to the members which indicated the changes to be made to the draft plan.

WATER SUPPLY FOR FIRE-FIGHTING

Cllr. Tony Wright queried the proposal relating to the water supply required for fire-fighting purposes and asked if the Council proposed to implement the condition that hydrants be provided at a rate of 1 per 6 houses and that no house be more than 46 metres from a hydrant.

The Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White stated that this would be a condition in all planning permissions granted for housing development and that the Council would endeavour to meet this requirement in existing built-up areas of the town if the finance was available.

The Co. Engineer, Mr. O'Flynn, stated that a report should be obtained from the Chief Fire Officer on the existing water supply and if it was found to be sub-standard, the finance could be sought from the Department of the Environment.

The members agreed to this suggestion from the Co. Engineer and on the proposal of Cllr. M. O'Riordan seconded by Cllr. R. Walsh the Council then unanimously approved the adoption of the amended draft plan as the Dungarvan Development Plan 1989 to 1994.

The Chairman and members and the Town Clerk on his own behalf and on behalf of the County Manager and staff complimented Mr. Reid on his presentation of the final plan and thanked him for all the help given to the Council in dealing with the queries received in relation to it.

Minister Reneged On Promise To Glenbeg N.S.

On May 31, the Minister for State at the Dept. of Education, Mr. Frank Fahey, informed Ms. Eileen O'Mahoney, Principal Glenbeg N.S., Dungarvan in the course of a letter, that he regretted there were no funds available to help finance sports activities in the school as requested.

In her reply on behalf of the Board of Management of the school, dated June 2, Ms. O'Mahoney pointed out to the Minister that while the Board never at any time requested financial assistance for the provision of sporting equipment, it was the Minister himself, when he performed the official opening of the new extension at the school on October 27 last who publicly promised a grant for £1,000. The letter went on: "The local community is still involved in money making activities to make up the £10,000 we had to pay for land, so that our pupils could be more involved in sporting activities. The community has not reneged. You have. The children were incredulous when I read your letter for them to-day. I'm sure their parents will be equally so when they get a photocopy of same."

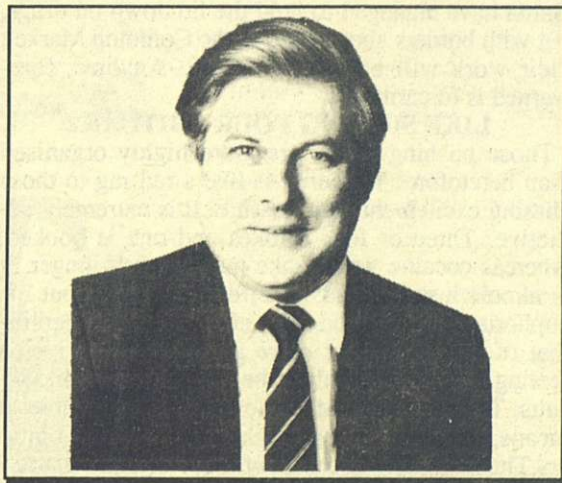

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

GOD IS DYING!

When God is toppled and rejected, the inevitable happens. An accommodating God is soon found to replace Him. The reason for the rebellion is, the oppression of His law. They want freedom from all personal restrictions. So, God is banished, and with Him goes His stabilizing influence on behaviour, and out goes His plan on the purpose of life. Oh! they strive to create a "nirvana" here, but experience and the reality of life show they build on sand. God, however, leaves them to their own stubbornness. Strange, how they desire to do without God at any cost. They'll suffer, be miserable and endure hardships to keep Him out. It is a re-echo of the cry put into the mouth of Satan: "I'd prefer reign in Hell than serve in Heaven." You can bet that old nick stands solidly behind them in their foolishness.

Sadly, great numbers of our young people are having to seek work in alien lands. The trauma of leaving home, and the accompanying problems of seeking work is bad enough, but attendant on these, they have to face dangers to their faith. England has all the trappings of a Christian country, but her standards are more pagan than Christian. Indeed, the moral tone here has taken a dive.

Desmond Fennell in his "Beyond Nationalism" (1985) speaks of the 'Irish Times' and R.T.E. as the most conspicuous for their anti-Catholicism. The purpose, it would seem, is to discredit and reduce the influence of the Church. Certainly by design or not, R.T.E. has not altered her course: she seems to be out to form the mind of the Nation! I was aghast at the biased stand taken by R.T.E. in the recent referendum. Oh! the Bishops should remain silent, whilst they filled the air with their slanted viewpoint. Whoever they fooled, they did not fool all the clergy. My advice, do not accept all you hear on the network as gospel. I'm the first to admit that the 'Irish Times' and R.T.E. are giants in their particular field.

Some parents seem to fail to warn their children on drink, which can ruin the health of both body and soul. It imposes hardships on families. If I say little now, it is, because I wish to warn you about Crack. However, cut your drinking. Knock one off your daily intake. If you cannot, then you have a problem. Young people, if you have not started, do not begin. Give yourselves a chance to build a happy life. I'm told some hospitals are crowded with young folk with burned out livers. Parents, remember you have responsibilities to both yourselves and your children.

I wish to make you aware of the grave dangers of the drug, Crack, a concoction of cocaine. What I say applies to all the hard drugs like heroin, morphine, etc. Many parents unwittingly fail to alert their children on drink. Do not neglect to caution them about Crack. In three years it swept the U.S.A. and left a trail of woe. In 1988 it was unknown in England, but this year it surfaced, and its rapid proliferation has alarmed the police. It will be our problem tomorrow. It involves big money; and the drug barons have already begun their invasion of Europe. Todate, the Garda have managed to hold the lid down on drugs, but with borders about to go in the Common Market, their work will be more difficult. Anyhow, forewarned is forearmed.

LIKE SIGNING YOUR OBITUARY

Those pushing Crack are more highly organised than heretofore. This drug is like a red rag to those chasing excitement and pleasure. It is extremely addictive. Three or four smokes and one is hooked, whereas cocaine would take much, much longer. It is almost instantaneous in effecting a high, but the euphoria is short lived. The aftermath is not unlike that of L.S.D. but far more predictable. It gives a feeling of greatness only to be followed with dire results. The harm caused to the brain is irreparable. It means, smoking Crack is like signing your obituary. The deliberate and unlawful use of this drug is a serious sin. God forbids the deliberate killing or harming of yourself or another. Crack causes grave bodily harm, so its unlawful use would be a grave abuse. Great numbers of teenagers are numbered among the victims of this drug. How come that anyone would be so foolish? When there is nothing barred, they will go to town! Having rid themselves of God's bondage, they lose their sense of prudence and wisdom. Excitement is what they want, and the pushers are readily available to supply the need. And, when trapped, they dare their friends to have a go. They give little thought to the dangers, but rather enjoy the risk of living with death. We need to put God back in society.

LET'S GET RID OF OUR "DIRTY IRISH" IMAGE

With reference to the letter you published recently re the German visitors' experience of litter in the area, I wish to elaborate further.

I was in touch with them and we discussed the situation which they were sad to see had deteriorated since their last visit five years ago. They told me of the way these things are dealt with in Germany, but they avoided this in their letter, as they didn't want to be the "Germans who know everything better!"

They pay an annual fee and each household is provided with a wheeled bin which is emptied once a week. On 3 pre-announced days during the year, bigger objects such as refrigerators, mattresses, furniture, etc. are collected without payment. The same applies to hazardous substances like paints, solvents, etc., twice a year. Unwanted cars are collected from your home, free of charge.

The vexed question of plastic bags and plastic bottles was just as vexed there, until taxes were placed at source, i.e. at manufactur-

ers' end. So there was a speedy change to biodegradable bags.

This question of plastic bags has not been addressed here at all. It is most alarming to view the hundreds and hundreds of them stacked in co-operative stores and hardware shops, etc., up and down the country, and wonder what is to be the fate of each and everyone of them. What are the farmers expected to do with them? This is a question to which no attention has been paid. Is there any hope the German solution would be applied?

In the meantime, we continue to befoul our country and kill the goose that lays the golden eggs. Two of that party of six were visiting Ireland for the first time, and they don't intend returning as they were so revolted by the litter.

We have become so accustomed to it that we don't see it. If they, or any other foreigners told us we were the "Dirty Irish," we would be indignant, but unfortunately we can't deny it. The streets of our towns and villages bear witness of the fact; so do the unofficial refuse dumps at the sides of quiet roads and often in locations of great beauty; so do the high water lines on our beaches, marked as

they are by domestic rubbish dumped over some quiet bank or cliff at sea edge and carried in by the tide.

Have we any self-respect or scrap of patriotism? Or

ought one be embarrassed to be so naive in 1989.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Q. — I am 69 and receiving a Contributory Old Age Pension. When I called to my local Community Information Centre (CIC) recently to check about my tax they were surprised to hear that I wasn't getting a pension from the UK for the five years I spent in the services during the war. They got me to fill in a form and sent it in to D'Olier House in Dublin. Do you think I will get a pension?

A. — There is every chance that you will get an English Pension. On their own the five years stamps wouldn't be enough for a pension but under EC Regulations they can be combined with your Irish contributions and should entitle you to a pro-rata pension. The claim form for the COAP asks for details of employment in any EC country. Had you given this information your claim would have been forwarded

automatically to Newcastle-on-Tyne with details of your Irish insurance record.

It may take some time for your claim to be processed but if you are granted a pension they will take the date you applied for your Irish pension as your date of application and you will even be paid some arrears.

Q. — Now that the standard rate of tax has been reduced to 32%, will the Deposit Interest Retention Tax (DIRT) be also reduced to 32%?

A. — Yes, DIRT and Withholding Taxes for Professional Services have been reduced to 32% from the 6th April '89.

The tax on payments to the construction industry will remain at 35%.

MARTIN CULLEN IS AGAIN PD STANDARD BEARER

At a packed convention at The Tower Hotel, Waterford, Martin Cullen, T.D. was unanimously selected as Progressive Democrat Candidate for Waterford in the forthcoming General Election. The selection was by acclamation following the proposal of Martin Cullen by the convention chairman.

During his speech, Martin Cullen stressed that a politician's role is to secure a good future for the country. He spoke of the Government's attitude before the last election and their posters which stated that Health cuts hurt the poor, the old and the elderly and their most amazing u-turn when they got into power in 1987. The Labour Party held its Selection Convention in Connolly Hall, Waterford and unanimously selected Senator Brian O'Shea as the Party candidate. The Convention was chaired by Cllr. Billy Kyne, Chairman of Waterford County Council.

In welcoming the delegates to the Selection Convention, Billy Kyne stated that The Labour Party in Waterford welcomed the General Election. It gave

the people throughout the length and breadth of Waterford City and County, an opportunity to shout "Stop."

MAHER TALKS ABOUT EP'S GROWING IMPORTANCE

Increasingly it was in Europe that the more important decisions affecting people's daily lives in this country, were being taken, Munster MEP, T. J. Maher said at a meeting addressed by him last week.

Ten years from now, Mr. Maher said, Dail Eireann's powers would, at best, be equal to the limited ones County Councils hold in this country at present. As a result of the increasing involvement of the EEC in our affairs, he said, it was important that the electorate would select people of ability, integrity and experience to represent them in the European Parliament.

Concluding, Mr. Maher said, "it was people who understood Europe and how its different institutions operated that were required to promote Irish interests in the lead up to the Single Market in 1992. We cannot afford to have political robots representing us, who are prepared to allow themselves to be push button

controlled."

PD CANDIDATE ALLEGES SMEAR CAMPAIGN

Deputy Martin Cullen, the Progressive Democrats' TD in Waterford last week-end alleged that he is the victim of a damaging smear campaign.

The campaign, which started early in the week, had been one of whispering innuendoes, spreading of misinformation, quoting comments which he did not make and there had also been allegations about his family life.

On the doorsteps, throughout the city as well as in Tramore, Portlaoise, Kilmacthomas, Dungarvan and Lismore, canvassers were being told that Deputy Cullen was to be "blacked." Up to last Friday night he could not establish the full extent of the malicious rumours and innuendoes which he believed were being spread by "a lunatic fringe of the left."

Refusing to give in to intimidation and drift with the tide, Deputy Cullen warned that he was not going to be silenced by "this bunch of zealots" — "I would rather lose my seat in the Dail, than hold it at the expense of the reasons for going there in the first place," he added.

EARTHWATCH TO QUIZ CANDIDATES ON ENVIRONMENT

The Irish environmental organisation Earthwatch is calling on its nationwide membership to put environmental issues high on the agenda in the forthcoming elections.

In a briefing to Earthwatch supporters entitled 'How Green are they really?' Earthwatch list 16 'crunch' questions which it suggests should be put to prospective candidates to establish their credentials on environmental matters. The questions cover issues ranging from smog, sewage and toxic waste to tropical rainforests, the ozone layer and global warming.

Earthwatch has circulated the list of questions to the political parties and will be publicising their responses on this Thursday, June 8.

LAND AUTHORITY A PRIORITY ELECTION ISSUE

In an all-party pre-election submission, Macra na Feirme have called for the establishment of a Land Authority to be treated as a priority election issue. The authority would be established as a watchdog to monitor sales of land and would be empowered to take necessary action to prohibit any venture which might be detrimental to the future of family farming and Irish agriculture.

Speaking on behalf of the

organisation, the President of Macra, Laurence Fallon summarised the problems saying, "at present, anybody can buy land in the country, whether it is for a hobby, an investment or bona fide farming. However, the repayment ability for land purchased and used for bona fide farming is generally less than for other reasons. Any incoming Government should have as a priority in its agricultural portfolio, the establishment of a Land Authority which gives young trained farmers priority to purchase land for bona fide farming. Furthermore, tax incentives for lessors of land should be increased substantially to encourage land leasing, in particular to young trained farmers."

OTHER ISSUES

Over the coming week, the members of Macra na Feirme, the grassroots of the organisation, will unite in a concerted effort to campaign on these and other key issues which are central to Macra policy.

Other issues including inheritance tax, stamp duty, the distribution of structural funding and the restoration of the Youth Service Grant to Department of Education Esti-

Use AI For Best Beef Calves

One of the attractions of using AI for breeding purposes is the wide choice of bulls and breeds available to the herdowner. This is particularly relevant just now as herdowners, having availed of the AI service to breed for genetically superior dairy replacements, are making decisions on beef breeds to be used.

With many herdowners in this area now facing super-levy quota restrictions, there is more realisation than ever of the need to maximise income from their beef enterprise. Better management and more selective breeding are essential to effect improvement.

The dairy herdowner is very concerned that he will not alone get a good quality calf but that he will have easy calving as well. In this respect each herdowner will have his own priorities.

WHAT BEEF BREED?

It's like asking "What's the best car or tractor on the market." Each breed has its own devotees but to maximise income from the calf drop or finished cattle the continental breeds have a distinct advantage in growth rate, conformation and lean carcass. The best

option is to use a number of these breeds, the choice being dictated by cow size and her calving history in past seasons.

In general Aberdeen Angus and Hereford should be used where ease of calving is of prime importance. Limousin, Simmental and Belgian Blue can be used in more mature cows and finally Charolais on the biggest and most mature cows in the herd.

Within these breeds the farmer can be even more selective, with the range of bulls now available. Select bulls for ease of calving, performance or on your own experience at farm level.

GALTEE BEEF SIRES

The choice of beef available from Galtee Cattle Breeding Society this year is the most comprehensive

ever on two counts:

1. — Sires from nine beef breeds are now standing at Galtee. These are Aberdeen Angus, Hereford, Limousin, Simmental, Charolais, Belgian Blue, Romagnola, Piedmontese and Blonde d'Aquitaine.

2. — Within most of these breeds there is a range of bulls performance tested at the Dept. of Agriculture central beef performance test unit at Tully and/or beef progeny tested in the Munster Cattle Breeding Society's test units. These sires also have accurate information on ease of calving.

It should be noted that these bulls are available at the standard AI fee even though semen is being exported in certain cases.

Herdowners are getting more adventurous as regards using the more 'exotic'

beef breeds. In 1987 a Belgian Blue bull (IOS) was introduced to Galtee. This bull is relatively easy calving with short gestation length. His use enhances the beef potential of the dairy farmers calf crop, without delaying the calving season.

A performance tested Blonde d'Aquitaine bull was introduced in 1988. This bull (BAIO) was used to a limited extent in 1988. Semen is also available this year from Romagnola and Piedmontese breeds.

The Department of Agriculture and Food's livestock division recently published an Approved AI Beef Bull list with useful information and explanations on their beef testing programme. Copies of this leaflet are available from Galtee AI on request and it's well worth reading.

The Bord Baine Mullally Cheese Cup was presented to Waterford Foods plc by Tom Cleary, Chairman Bord Baine, at a reception in Waterford recently. It was awarded for excellence in cheddar cheese-making at the company's Kilmeaden plant. The Cup is the Supreme Championship Award for cheese-making in Ireland and attracts over 20 entries from all major cheese manufacturers.

Presenting the trophy to Stephen O'Connor, Managing Director of Waterford Foods, Mr. Cleary said:

'Cheese is one of the great food products of the world and we must continue to strive to increase our share of that market. Last year we produced a record 79,000 tonnes and cheddar still accounts for almost four-fifths of this. High standards of quality and sensible marketing structures are the key

to maximising returns.'

Accepting the cheese cup Stephen O'Connor said: 'The award today come at the ideal time to support our marketing efforts for the Kilmeaden brand, referred to as the 'Fillet of Cheddar' in our T.V. and radio advertising. As a result of strong selling of a good product, Kilmeaden has become the fastest growing cheddar on the Irish market.'

ICMSA LAUNCH FARM TAXATION CAMPAIGN

The ICMSA campaign to make farmer resistance to the Tax-on-Accounts system of farm taxation a vote-getting issue in the Euro elections was given a massive boost at the opening public meeting in Mallow when two former IFA Presidents came out in support of an alternative taxation scheme.

MEP of ten years, T. J. Maher plumped for a choice in tax paying systems especially if an alternative system provided an incentive to reduction and development of agriculture. Fianna Fail candidate in the Munster constituency, Paddy Lane, came out in favour of a workable Flat Rate Land Tax which would have different multipliers based on the relative profitability of livestock, dairying and cereals. Mr. Lane offered himself as an

intermediary between the farm bodies and as a link with Fianna Fail in coming up with what he called "a workable alternative system."

The two former IFA Presidents were among 7 European Parliament candidates in the Munster constituency who gave their positions on the ICMSA demands for an alternative to Tax-on-Accounts before a farmer audience of almost 400.

Labour's Michael Ferris said his party was commit-

ted to the re-introduction of a land tax and also favoured incentives to agriculture and farm development, while Workers Party candidate, Joe Sherlock favoured the Land Tax introduced by the previous Coalition which applied to farms up to 80 adjusted acres.

The ICMSA is to publish its verdict and advice to farm voters about each of the Euro poll candidates in the week before the June 15 election.

At the Munster meeting, ICMSA Deputy President, Tom O'Dwyer summed up that Fr. Patrick Ryan had clearly favoured the ICMSA position; another independent candidate, George Salter Townsend agreed that a special case be made for farmers, and Progressive Democrat Pat Cox had not faced up to the issue before the meeting. Mr. O'Dwyer added that the Progressive Democrats leadership and senior parliamentary spokesmen did not support the ICMSA stance.

PRICE ON FARMERS VOTES

Taking a slogan "Think Before You Ink," the ICMSA election campaign will put a price on farmers votes, ICMSA President, Sean Kelly said. He warned that otherwise the clout of the farm vote would be diminished in future elections with farmers driven out by the Tax-on-Accounts system.

As chairman of the meeting, Mr. Kelly also drew attention to the conspicuous absence of the Fine Gael candidates, Dr. Tom Raftery and John Cushnahan, advising the attendance "you can make up your own minds on that, but I am disappointed."

June Postal Survey Of Farming Activity

As part of the annual June Survey of farming activity, the Central Statistics Office (CSO) is currently sending out postal questionnaires to a representative sample of approximately 26,000 farmers throughout the country. In addition to providing data for the annual estimates of crop areas and livestock numbers, the results of the survey will also be used to analyse the structure and management of Irish farms as part of an EC-wide farm structure survey.

The CSO guarantees that all information supplied will be treated as strictly confidential and under no circumstances will individ-

ual returns be used for any other purpose.

Gaeltacht Has Special Status

— CCE Chief Says At Fleadh Cheoil Opening

Speaking in Cappoquin last Friday evening when he officially opened the Waterford Fleadh Cheoil, Labhras O Murchu, Director General of Comhaltas Ceoltoiri Eireann said that the Gaeltacht was the surest guarantee we had that Ireland, like so many other countries, could successfully become a fully bi-lingual country. The Gaeltacht areas had proved that the Irish and English languages could exist comfortably side by side and that bilingualism was not an obstacle to progress in the matter of education, commerce or tourism. In fact, the opposite was very much the case as the Gaeltacht had achieved a very special status as an education institution and tourist destination.

An t-Uasal O Murchu went on to say that a proficiency in the Irish and English languages cultivated a facility for languages generally. Those who hint that the Irish language in some way hindered progress with Continental languages were on very shaky ground. It was not unusual in some countries for young people to master three and four languages. One would hope that our native language would not again be made a red herring — in some ways our status in Europe had matured us beyond such insular simplicity.

THE MANTLE OF EQUALITY

"Our nativeness and independence in culture", said the DG, "increases rather than diminishes our stature among the nations of the world. It carries with it the mantle of equality. It enriches our image and attracts discerning visitors to

our country who wish to experience this enriching influence. Our culture, in fact, is one of the great distinguishing marks which we have as a nation and which, properly cultivated, can be a great commercial asset".

"However", Mr. O Murchu then said in conclusion "the main reason why any country would wish to retain a national identity is primarily patriotic. It enshrines a loyalty and commitment to one's own country. There are many examples on Irish history of how respect for our national individuality inspired heroic sacrifices and it is our national pride which today will help us overcome some of the major problems which beset us. Patriotism and selfishness are not comfortable bed-fellows and most of a nation's ill have their root cause in selfishness".

Pollution Awareness Appeal

— From Clinton

IFA President, Mr. Tom Clinton, has praised the efforts and financial commitments made by farmers during 1988 on pollution control. These efforts have resulted in a reduction of 78% in the number of fish kills attributable to farming during the year. Mr. Clinton called on all farmers to continue their efforts towards a pollution free environment. He said that the present dry weather and low water levels in rivers increased the risk of fish kills and that farmers must take all practical measures to prevent the highly polluting silage effluent from entering water courses.

REALISTIC GRANTS
A detailed survey by Teagasc/IFA indicates that hundreds of millions of pounds will have to be spent by farmers on updating pollution control facilities. The reality is that this can only be done over a number of years, and with the help of realistic grants for the whole of the country

that take account of the present day costs of building construction, said Mr. Clinton. He called on the Department of Agriculture to immediately revise costings to reflect market realities, and make these grants available to farmers in non-Disadvantaged Areas as well as Disadvantaged Areas.

Heart Disease in Ireland still claims the equivalent to 30 jumbo jets crashing every year, approximately 16,000 deaths annually.

Countries like Australia and America have had a reduction of 40% in heart related deaths. The main focus of prevention of heart

disease in these countries has been on changing lifestyle at all ages.

Many people in Ireland are now more aware of the risks for heart disease but are often inclined to feel that the problem will not affect them. Simple changes in eating and exer-

cise habits could make most lives healthier not only preventing heart disease and other ills but giving a fuller more enjoyable life.

The Heart Newsletter will seek to encourage all community organisations to have a health component in

their activities and help create an environment conducive to healthy lifestyle — most people are now aware that much heart disease can be prevented but need simple guidelines on how to make individual changes in their own lives.

EURO ELECTION FUDGED BY LOCAL ISSUES

As we have been noting for the past couple of weeks, Thursday June 15 is Election 89 Day and voters will be asked not only to choose their representatives for the European Parliament on that day but also their Dail Deputies while in the Gaeltacht districts, voters will receive a third voting paper to elect members to Udaras na Gaeltachta.

In many ways it is a great pity that June 15 was chosen as the day for a general election as it has pushed the importance of and the issues at stake in the European Parliament election into the background — so much so that very little if anything is coming through to the electorate on that score.

With the Single European Market to become a reality in 1992 and with more and more of the administrative legislation being handed out from Brussels, this year's Euro election should be a matter of extreme importance for us. However the superimposing of the general election on it has meant that local politics have been given preference and the serious issues of our EC involvement have become fudged by the rivalry of the political parties at both constituency and national levels.

This is indeed a great pity as with the European Parliament assuming more and more importance in the day-to-day running of the European Community, the importance of the Dail will automatically diminish in the years ahead.

VOX POPULI

The Vox Populi or voice of the people on the controversial Merrell Dow proposal to locate a chemical

plant at Killeagh indicates that a striking majority of people residing in East Cork and West Waterford, within a 20 mile radius of the proposed plant, are opposed to it.

Two to one are against the development according to a survey carried out by the Market Research Bureau of Ireland and which was commissioned by the Womagh Valley Protection Association. A total of 32,000 adult were quizzed during the survey and the result showed that 56% were against the proposal to build the factory in Killeagh, 29% were for and 15% were undecided or had no opinion on the issue.

The campaigners are now planning to make the matter a hot election issue and the results of the survey have been delivered to the leaders of all the political parties in the Waterford and East Cork constituencies.

VANDALS STRIKE AGAIN

Vandals who had previously struck at the ornamental flower tubs along the northern footpath at the Causeway Abbeyside targeted the same ornamental tubs for a second attack last Friday night.

Following the first attack, the tubs were removed by the Urban Council but in

preparation for the Bank Holiday week-end, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley under whose initiative the horticulture section of the Council was set up, decided to replace the tubs to again beautify the area not only for the locals but for the visitors as well. With a new growth of colourful fresh flowers the tubs were put back and for a few days were once more the centre of much admiration.

Unfortunately they were not left untouched for long as on Saturday morning last it was discovered that they had all been toppled over and thrown on to the roadways and absolutely destroyed during the night.

It is difficult to comprehend the mentality of anyone who would attack such objects prepared and placed in position at public expense with the sole purpose of beautifying the environment. We can only condemn them as hooligans and morons who have absolutely no respect for property — public or private — and who appear to get their particular 'kicks' from perpetrating damage of this kind under the cover of darkness.

In addition to the damage to the flower tubs, we have been informed by the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White that the hanging flower baskets which are also a feature of the floral decorations in the Urban have come under attack from the vandals. One at the Bridge was removed and unceremoniously dumped at the week-end while earlier in the week five which were being prepared for placement around the town were stolen from the Council's horticulture depot at Youghal Road.

The people of the town should have no mercy in their attitudes towards those responsible for all this persistent, reprehensible damage and anyone with any clue as to the identity or whereabouts of the culprits should have no compunction in coming forward so that they can be caught and dealt with by the Courts.

We cannot allow these vandals and hooligans to destroy such admirable schemes to beautify Dungarvan. More shame on us if we do!

As a result we have learned that although the ambulances are based in Dungarvan at St. Vincent's and St. Joseph's Hospitals, a phone call must first be made to Ardkeen in Waterford city for an ambulance and then a call is made back to Dungarvan for the ambulance to be sent out.

Whether this causes an undue delay or whether the calls could be more expeditiously dealt with is the point at issue.

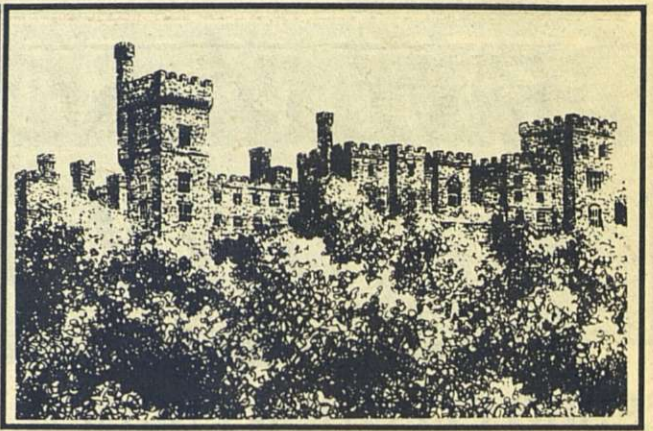

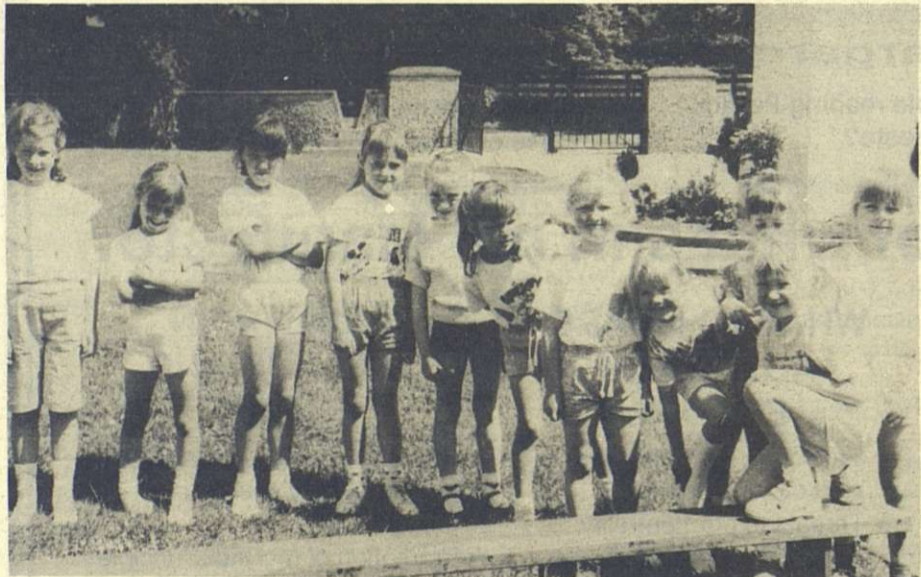

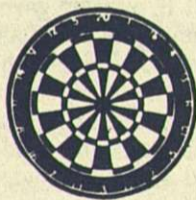

Johnny Buckley writes — When the Great Referee called Philly Grimes to his heavenly home recently on his 60th birthday, Waterford was left without one of its greatest sons and hurlers in particular.

Philly showed great promise with the caman at the age of 14 and at the age of 16 received his baptism of fire in intercounty hurling with the Waterford minor team.

With 15 County senior hurling titles won by his native Mount Sion team, plus 5 senior football honours, Oireachtas, National League medal, Munster (3 medals) and similarly Railway Cup medals and the unique distinction of '48 and '59 All-Ireland medals

— the only Deise player to acquire them — it can be said unreservedly that he was wholly deserving of these adulations.

With his fluency of movement and no doubt ambidexterity he thrilled thousands and became a household name far beyond Waterford. His magnificent displays, especially in '57, '59 and '63 are often recalled but one of his great pieces of wizardry with the caman must be in the National Hurling League final

of 1962-'63 when playing against Tipperary, when in full flight he plucked a ball from the air, almost behind his back, swung around and without looking sent it sailing over the bar in astonishing fashion.

He was an inspirational member of the team always and a great Waterford ambassador and sportsman wherever he went and the unassuming Philly Grimes will long be remembered with admiration and affection.

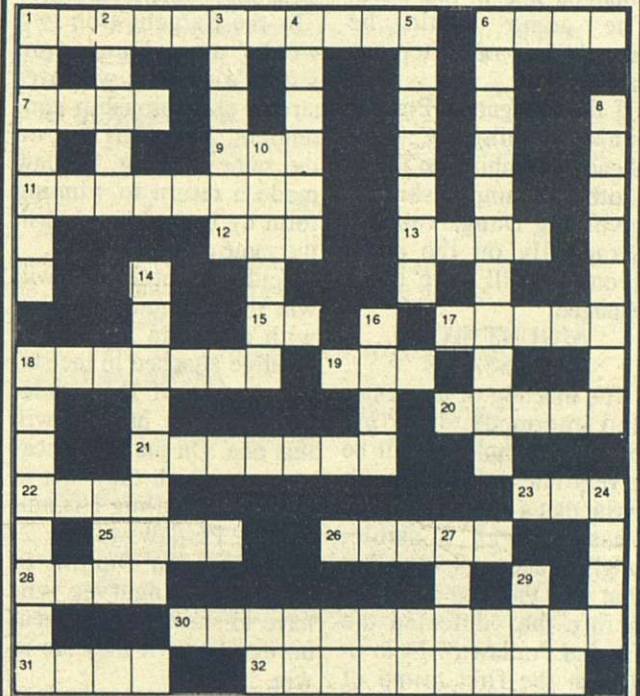

Week-End Fixtures Curtailed

As will be seen from our Fixtures Chart, the number of senior and intermediate games listed for the week-end is greatly curtailed. This is due to the fact that within the following seven days, two more county teams will be in action in the Munster championships and selectors have requested that players on the under 21 hurling panel for the following Friday and junior footballers for the Sunday, will not be required to play club championships.

I understand that one or two fixtures might have been overlooked and those involving Mount Sion and Portlaw could possibly be changed late in the week. The game would be brought forward rather than cancelled.

If the Dungarvan/Portlaw senior hurling tie, goes ahead at Dunhill, the junior football championship tie involving Dungarvan and Stradbally on the same evening, will have to be changed.

MOUNT SION v. PASSAGE

The meeting of the senior and intermediate hurling county champions, will be a very interesting clash. To write that a surprise win for Passage was possible, might sound outlandish, but that was the way it looked before they defeated the fancied Portlaw (3-14 to 0-10) in the first round of this, their first senior championship. In their second championship game they gave Lismore a big fright when running them to four points (1-10 to 1-6). Unlike Mount Sion, Passage have no big names (yet), but they are very well balanced and will pose problems for the senior champions, who will have Shane Ahearne, Pat and Kevin Ryan, Peter Walsh, Brian Greene, Eamon Ryan, Ger Fitzpatrick, Donal Loughnane and Anthony Cooney. I don't expect that the champions will have a whole lot to spare, but they will win.

DUNGARVAN v. PORTLAW

This clash could turn out to be a make or break event as both sides having lost their two first rounds will need the points to have any

slight chance of staying in contention. In fact the losers here may have relegation worries as the other four in their group have at least one win to their credit.

In the Sargent Cup two weeks ago, Dungarvan scored a surprise win over strong championship contenders, Ballyduff but on the same evening, Portlaw made a return to winning form by beating Dunhill in the same competitions.

Neither of these clubs will win the championship, but with a certain amount of prestige attached to the status aspect of the grade, both will try hard to win this one. On the only occasion on which they met in the senior hurling championship, Portlaw won by 2-18 to 2-3, in Dunhill in 1987, so Dungarvan will have to show improvement on that form, if they are to win.

FOURMILEWATER v. KILGOBINET

Fourmilewater are our divisional champions and will be hot favourites to win this tie against a depleted Kilgobinet at Lismore on Sunday. Given a fright by newcomers, St. Saviours whom they beat by a single point last week, the Ballymac' team will need to take this game very seriously if they are to keep adding the points.

Kilgobinet lost to Tramore by five points in the second round, but nevertheless they gave a fairly satisfactory performance. I don't think that Kilgobinet are good enough to win this one.

TRAMORE v. STRADBALLY

Stradbally were short about half of their team

when losing to Mollerans two weeks ago, so it is difficult to imagine how they will fare if at full strength here. Realising their position on the league table, I'm sure they'll make certain of fielding at full strength. If this can be done, they should win. They were runners-up in this division in intermediate hurling last season.

ST. MOLLERANS v. SAVIOURS

This should be a very close affair and Mollerans with full points so far will find the city team quite a handful. Judging by their performance against Fourmilewater in round one, Saviours are capable of winning this very interesting clash.

ABBEYSIDE v. COLLIGAN

When these teams met in the championship last year, Colligan just managed to win a very exciting game. This year, Abbeyside suffered an unexpected defeat by De La Salle and Colligan lost by three points to Erin's Own. There will not be a lot between them again, but Colligan, I suppose will be favourites.

BALLYDUFF v. AFFANE

Up Ballyduff way it is being said that the club should not allow football to interfere with their hurling and ten miles down the road the view is held that hurling, at this stage, should not interfere with their chances of winning the intermediate for Affane who are cruising along very nicely, playing great football and happy enough with their six points at this stage.

This will be a very important result for both and I

think it will favour Affane, who would then be certain of being involved in the final shake-up.

JUNIOR HURLING

Ballinameela versus St. Mary's is the most attractive of the five games listed in this championship. Both are troubled by injury and neither will, according to club officials who have recently been in touch with the Board about postponements, be at full strength. Ballinameela, who recently beat An Rinn, will be the more fancied of the two. They dropped down from intermediate last year and will be the more experienced side.

An Rinn should win their tie with pointless, Geraldines, Lismore will surely prove too strong for Abbeyside, Ardmore will have it all to do to beat Glen Rovers, but Kilrossanty can feel reasonably confident of beating

A full meeting of the Western Board will take place on this, Thursday evening at 8 p.m. at Lawlor's Hotel. The meeting is called to deal with a big number of referees reports which will involve suspensions of at least eight or nine players who were sent off in recent championships.

A further meeting of the committee is arranged for 9 p.m., after this meeting.

Refereeing

The Special Coisde Iomana Work Group which was recently set up by the County Chairman, has as terms of reference "The submission of a scheme for the development and promotion of hurling standards at under-age level, to the Munster Council". Several meetings were held and no time was lost in formulating a scheme and preparing a document for submission to the Council.

The submissions have been approved and permission to proceed with the plans, which will be generously grant-aided, have been received.

One of the items on the seven-point plan is 'Recruitment and Courses for Referees' and it is intended to proceed with this almost immediately.

In this it is intended to encourage members to act as referees at under-age level and to provide formal courses in association with the national Referees Work Group with assessment at the end of the course for both beginners and established referees in both divisions of the county.

It goes without saying that the success of this venture by this group, will depend entirely on the co-operation they receive from clubs and individual members.

At a recent Bord na nOg meeting I heard Divisional Secretary Pat Nugent state that he had eighteen active referees on his list. This is very encouraging news and hopefully things will stay

this way. But at the same time there is an urgent need to begin a recruitment drive in the county and there is an urgent need for referees courses in order that standards will improve.



This county must admit to having been very neglectful in this respect and apart from the occasional gathering of referees for a discussion every once and a while, nothing positive has been done to recruit or promote refereeing.

More than 75% of our referees have not attended a proper referees' course and several of the present men doing this onerous duty, have never had instruction. The opportunity is now being presented and hopefully every club will take an interest when this five-session course begins.

A Draw At Thurles!

I don't know how long it has been since I missed a Waterford senior hurling championship game. Because of a long standing engagement elsewhere, I was forced to miss this one. My 'stand-in', whom I regard as an expert in the business wrote me this report: 'To many of our large contingent of supporters in Thurles on Sunday, this was a game 'thrown away', and they were perfectly right in saying so. Here was a game which we entered as underdogs, yet from the start we took the game to Cork and never let them settle for one minute.

Our commitment was 100% and we fully deserved our half-time lead. On the restart we continued to outthurl Cork and we went into a clear six points lead. Then for some reason or another we let Cork back into the game. Pat Ryan and Liam O'Connor were introduced to steady things and having had our lead reduced to 0-1, we went 0-4

ahead again. Once more we tired and let Cork level things and in the end we were lucky to survive with a draw.

Where do we go from here? — Joe Connolly (Galway) on the Sunday Game said, "we have nothing to fear". We showed that we have the beating of Cork if we can concentrate for the 70 minutes.

True, Cork have been warned, but I am confident that we can beat them next time out. If we cut out the silly fouling and if our backs would clear the ball first time and forget the solo, we must have every chance.

We had a goal disallowed at a vital stage for a foul on Ger Cunningham. I felt this goal should have been allowed as he was well outside the square, having committed himself to a dropping ball, which he lost anyway.

Our supporters outnumbered Cork by about 10 to 1. It was great to see them

enjoying themselves and once again at half-time, they gave the team a standing ovation (Old Stand); Shane Ahearne played a captains part all through, Crowley and Prendergast had fine games at midfield, despite the presence of Teddy McCarthy. Peter Walsh, Damien Byrne and Pat Ryan (when introduced) all played very well.

The last occasion on which Cork and Waterford played a draw in senior hurling was at Limerick in 1965 when the sides finished 2-6 each. Cork won the replay on the following Sunday by 1-11 to 2-5. Cork lost the Munster final by a massive 18 points to Tipperary.

Results

With the exception of the Dungarvan/Ferrybank game, all the senior football ties were closely contested over the week-end. Dungarvan found their best form and scored a big victory over pointless Ferrybank. It was Dungarvan's best performance of the season.

Kilmacthomas really put it up to St. Saviours who were lucky to come out with a share of the points in the end. Kilmac, who were unlucky against Rathgormack should be involved in the closing stages.

Dunhill just managed to beat Ballinacourty again. In their last four meetings there has been less than a goal between these teams. Ballinacourty could now find themselves involved in relegation worries, unless they experience a change in their next three matches.

Butlerstown were in full flight when they lined out against Clashmore and fully deserved their win, but they are not all that much better than Clashmore, who lost this one be-

The Nire and Stradbally was close and very exciting on the Bank Holiday evening and only a point separated them in the end, with the Nire gaining some revenge for their defeat in the '87 county final.

Sliabh gCua got themselves into joint leadership of the intermediate football championship with a two-goal win over Ardmore, who remain strongly in contention.

More Date Changes

Because of the draw at Thurles and the replay being fixed for June 18th, a number of changes have had to be made by the Munster Council and those affecting Waterford are, Under 21 hurling which is changed to June 21st., at Kilmallock and the junior football championship against Kerry, which was due on the 18th and is now changed to Saturday 17th, and will be played in Mitchlestown.

When Lismore's under 14 hurlers travel to Feile for their sixth time they will be guests of Kilcormack/Killoughey G.A.A. club, Laois.

And now the good news is that Lismore Camogie club, by defeating St. Saviours in the final last week-end, have also qualified and they too, will travel to the Laois/Offaly organised hurling festival.

Lismore club played in their first Feile in 1981 when they reached the final of Division 11 in Galway. In 1984 they were promoted and made play in Division 1 in Wexford. They reached the semi-final and were beaten by the eventual winners Na Piarasaigh, Limerick. In 1985 they again played in Wexford in Division 1, but were knocked out in the early rounds. Back in Division 2 in '87, when Feile

was held in Clare, they reached the final and were beaten by St. Paul's, Belfast who won the competition. Then the big breakthrough came last year when Lismore did the county proud in winning out in Division 2 in a great final which was played at Birr.

ROBERT POWER DOMINATES BRAY 3-DAY

Robert Power travelled to Bray at the weekend with the Irish junior squad to compete in the Curtain Dream 3-Day Race organised by Bray Wheelers.

The first stage was a 70 mile race, with 3 king of the mountains primes. Power went clear to win the stage by 2 mins. and 37 secs.

The second stage was a 1 mile time trial along the Bray seafront. This was won by Dutch rider A. Gulchester, 2nd B. Morton, Telecom, 3rd Robert Power just .5 of a second down on the winner and 2 mins. 37 secs. up on his nearest rival on general classification.

Stage 3 was a 2.5 mile circuit to be covered for one hour and one lap, with K.O.M. points on each lap. On the hill Power scored on all but 3 laps so kept his K.O.M. classification but more important he gained more time on his rival when he went clear with 3 laps remaining and opened up a gap of 1 min. winning the stage to make it 2 out of 3. Going into the final day he was 3 min. 37 secs. ahead of his team mate David Hourigan.

The last stage was 67 miles over very hard roads and a 5 mile climb up Sugarloaf, Power rode very strongly and dominated this stage again to win his 3rd stage and overall victory.

Power showed tremendous ability over the weekend against a class field and a Dutch team and this win gives him a big moral boost coming up to the junior world's in Moscow in July.

This was Power's 3rd win in 8 days. Last weekend he won the Midleton Senior Grand-Prix on Saturday taking 4 primes on the way with Larry Power, Cidona 2nd. On Sunday he travelled to Mooncoin and won the senior event beating Anthony O'Gorman the All-Ireland Senior Road Race and 25 T.T. and 50 T.T. champion with Ger Wyley 3rd.
