

Sentencing Frank O'Ke-effe (19), Kilcoran Park, Youghal, District Justice W. F. O'Connell spoke of "the annoyance, insult, and distress" the defendant had caused to many ladies, some of them el-

"The public must be protected from this kind of reprehensible behaviour, and I intend to make an example of this young man," he added.

O'Keeffe pleaded guilty to two charges of sending telephone messages for the purpose of causing annoyance and nuisance on September 17 and November 20 last.

"We were surprised that O'Keeffe was involved,' said Garda Gaine. "This is very much out of character for him."

Sentencing O'Keeffe to four months imprisonment, concurrent, on each of the two charges preferred against him, District Justice O'Connell rejected strong pleas by Mr. P. Lavan, Solr., on behalf of the defendant for a more lenient penalty.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

AN UNGRATEFUL PEOPLE!

Life is wonderful. It is a priceless gift. And, it is the hope of all of us to enjoy and make the best possible use of our possession. Indeed, it is easy at times to be untimely robbed of our life, though instinctively we care, protect and defend it from all and every danger. If anyone asked you, what is life? You'd proceed to talk about what life does rather than it is. This understandable. The essence of life is hidden in deep mystery. So, all we know is the experience of life, and that could be classified under animate existence. They do not seem to sing "Ah! sweet mystery of life . . . anymore, but all it would tell you about, is the joy of living. Take electricity. We know how this energy is generated, transmitted and used, but, to describe what it really is, is outside our scope. We say a stone is lifeless, whereas, all vegetation, the animal world and humans participate and enjoy a measure of life, which they have acquired in different degrees and in various ways. The life or soul of vegetable matter and beasts is produced by natural processes, and can only exist and operate within matter. It follows, when the matter or the body dies, the soul also dies. Man's soul, however, which is the life of his body, is directly created by God at the moment it is infused into the dwelling place prepared by the parents. Further, we believe that the human soul, though is exists and operates in and through the human body, is also able to live and operate outside and apart from the body. Man's soul is a spiritual substance and is immortal. "Let the dust return to the earth from whence it was, and let the spirit return to God who gave it." The soul "being the offspring of God" is created a spirit in order to be like God. The miracles relatedin last Sunday's readings should make us sit up. Elias did what no human could, but his effort to restore life was blessed by God. Jesus, who is Lord of life and death, raised the widow's son to life. He was moved not only by compassion, but also to provide proof that He was Christ, the Messiah, the fulfilment of prophesy. He wanted people to realise that God had visited His people. The raising of Lazarus did lead many to believe, but strange, it only made His enemies more determined to kill Him. You have some of the same blind hatred about religion in Ulster!

Jesus is still speaking through the Gospels to you. We accept His word, but, somehow, we fall down in practice. When did you last thank God for His blessings? Have you ever shown gratitude for His loving care? Do you invoke His protection on your varied projects? Do you give thanks at your meals? Yes, we take things for granted. Death is waiting for each and every one of us. In fact, we die daily in that each day brings us nearer to the day when our soul will go for judgment, whilst our bones rest in the dust to await the General Resurrection when they'll be united with the same soul, and rise gloriously to share, with God's help, in the eternal glory.

Everybody over a wide area was shocked at the unexpected death of Mr. Tom Shanley, Kilminion South, Dungarvan wiich occurred on Wednesday morning, May 31st.

Tom who was 55, was a native of Clonakilty and a member of a well known family who for many years have been involved in the licensed trade. His brother Moss today still runs a thriving establishment back in West Cork.

In his early working days Tom gained valuable experience in the electrical departments of Avoca Mines and Irish Refining. For a number of years he was posted on contract work with Esso Whitegate and Esso Libya ans in September '69 he took a position with Quigley Magnesite when they began operations in Ballinacourty.

In Jan. '84 he fulfilled a burning ambition when he set on stream his own electrical business. A man of exemplary character and first rate ability he was thoroughly devoted to his work and his dedication, diligence and managerial abilities were soon seen to good affect. In 1983 he purchased "The Anchor Bar," The Quay, which deservedly enjoys a wide clientele and stands as further testimony to Tom Shanley's business acumen.

A most likeable person, Tom was a private individual who won the esteem and respect of all whose privilage it was to know him. At all times his concern was for his wife and family and the many charitable works he performed for the less fortunate were done without publicity, pomp or ceremony. Even though business commitments were pressing, Tom took an interest in the local golf club and had the distinction of being President in the past. He was also honoured with life membership of the local rugby club and in his younger days he was no mean footballer as in 1955 he won an All-Ireland Junior football title with his native Cork.

Tom was also a great lover of music and jazz in particular and he was no mean performer on the piano and could rattle the ivory keys with relish.

Short though his lifespan was, he touched many lives and all were enriched by their association with him. He was a thorough gentleman whose unexpected death has been the cause of much sorrow to his many friends but more especially to his sorrowing wife, sons and other family relatives to

BULBULIA **CRITICISES FF's** "BEDSIDE CONVERSION"

In the course of a Press Release, Fine Gael candidate, Senator Katharine Bulbulia said that the burning issues in the election are the ill-conceived health cuts, enforced emigration and few job opportunities and, of course, high taxation. Apart from burning people's hearts and pockets these issues are burning Fianna Fail votes and there is mounting mood for change.

Senator Bulbulia went on to state that Fianna Fail's post mortem and attempted bedside conversion on their disastrous Health cuts has fallen on an aggrieved electorate, knifed by careless, thoughtless lunging at cost savings. The stuffed dummies are in shop windows: the electorate are not mindlessly waiting to vote for another bout of mal-administration from Fianna Fail. It is a very, very sick joke indeed, but people do remember the FF slogan last time around about health cuts hurting the poor, sick and elderly.

And, added Senator Bulbulia: "My ten years in public service with your mandate in two local authorities, two public boards and the Senate have given me much experience and knowledge and with your further support I aim to regain Fine Gael's second seat in this vital constituency - once held since the foundation of the State."

MORE JOBS MUST BE CREATED SAYS LABOUR CANDIDATE

Senator Brian O'Shea, the Labour Party candidate in the general election, stated that apart from the health Services, the major issue he had met during his canvassing since the campaign began was unemployment and the creation of jobs.

"It is terrible," said Brian O'Shea, "to see the despair on the faces of so many people who answer the door. On one hand there are many in their forties and fifties who have become unemployed through no fault of their own and who firmly believe there is nothing in store for them but a future without work.

"It is one thing for the

government to be juggling with statistics and claiming that unemployment is down and employment is up, while ignoring the fact that nearly one thousand people per week emigrated last year. It is another thing to meet the unemployed on the doorstep and listen to their side of the story. The long term unemployed, with their families living in poverty, have now despaired of ever getting work. They have first hand experience of workers in their late thirties, forties and fifties being refused employment because they are considered too old. What a waste of human resources and experience."

Senator O'Shea went on to say that at the other end of the scale he had met the school-leavers who cannot get a job because they have no work experience, and who have made up their minds that there is nothing for them but to emigrate. "And," he added, "as a result, 48,000 people emigrated last year, and over 30,000 the previous year. God knows how many will have to leave this year. If emigration continues at its present rate, within a few years we will have lost an entire generation. The entire country will be like many of the villages and small towns are now populated with elderly and with small children."

In conclusion Senator O'Shea stated: "The only way to deal with this problem is to create jobs. It is the Labour Party's view that jobs can be created, but only if there is a radical change of policy."

ICMSA TAXATION QUESTIONNAIRE TO EURO **CANDIDATES**

"In the elections for the European Parliament farmers have a choice of candidates who are strongly in favour of a system of tax which will give better opportunities for the survival of the family farms," said Mr. Sean Kelly, President of ICMSA, when commenting on the responses of some of the candidates to the ICMSA Questionnaire on farmer taxation.

All the candidates were invited to central meetings within their respective constituencies.

The most notable absentees from the Munster meeting were two outgoing MEP's Gene Fitzgerald (FF) and Tom Raftery (FG).

Mr. Kelly said that the Munster constituency offers a wide selection of Euro candidates who favour an

alternative to accounts for farmers.

Michael Ferris said the Labour Party policy was that all farmers with more than 20 adjusted acres would be given the opportunity to select between Land Tax and the Accounts System.

Paddy Lane, the only Fianna Fail candidate to attend the Munster meeting, offered himself as a negotiator with IFA and the Government to bring about a flat rate of land tax which would be scaled in accordance with the profitability of different farm enterpris-

T. J. Maher strongly favoured a taxation policy that will offer a choice to farm families and to family-operated business enterprises, which would allow them develop without an undue burden of taxation.

Also clearly in favour of an alternative tax system for family farms were Fr. P. Ryan (Indep.) and Joe Sherlock (WP).

Pat Cox (PD) was in favour of the tax-on-accounts system.

NO FG RESPONSE

No Fine Gael candidate in any constituency completed the ICMSA Questionnaire and Paddy Lane was the only Fianna Fail candidate to do so.

Mr. Kelly said: "It now has been established that a good selection of Euro candidates have sufficient concern for farm families by committing themselves to an alternative tax system."

Voting for candidates who want to keep farmers locked into a most hostile tax-on-accounts system is voting for a speedy end to the family farms," concluded Mr. Kelly.

REVISION OF POLLING STATIONS IN COUNTY

About two years ago a directive from the Department of the Environment was received by the County Council to the effect that polling stations of less than 350 voters were to be closed and removed from the Council's polling scheme. In addition the directive laid down that private houses could no longer be used as polling stations for the holding of an elec-

The matter was debated by members of the Council on several occasions and arising from these discussions a draft, setting out a new list, was sent to the Department but this was returned to the Council as unacceptable as it still included polling stations with less than 350 voters.

A series of area meetings of the Council followed and a further revised draft Department and finally approved.

the matter, several members of the Council held that voters in the affected areas would be very disappointed by the changes which had to be made because of the Department directive but it was pointed out that this specifically laid it down that nothing less than 350 voters was a pre-requisite for a polling station and no private houses would be permitted.

As required by the Act the changes in the polling scheme were then advertised and the constituency T.D.'s were notified of the changes in due course but no objections were raised. However Deputy Jackie Fahey did raise an objection later on to a change in the Eastern end of the county and he was advised then by the Council to contact the Minister for the Environment as he was the only person with power to alter the position.

> 16 POLLING STATIONS CLOSED

As a result of the Department's directive a total of 16 polling stations around the county were closed. In the Dungarvan electoral area as well as Villierstown these included a private house in Old Parish with the remainder being divided between Grange and Ring. Part of Abbeyside Rural area has been transferred to the polling station at Dungarvan Hospital and there was a closure and a division between Dungarvan Rural in the Carriglea and Ballinameela area.

The polling station in Aglish now has a total of 653 voters listed, of which 243 are from the former polling station at Villierstown which has now been closed.

ICMSA FARMER TAXATION AND POLITICAL **PARTIES**

Mr. Sean Kelly, President of ICMSA, last Friday revealed that An Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey, refused to meet a delegation from ICMSA for discussions on agricultural policies including taxation.

"I believe Mr. Haughey is wrong to ignore farmers in this manner," said Mr. Kelly. However, Mr. Kelly said that in a letter Mr. Haughey outlined the benefits of the tax-on-accounts system for farmers.

While there is usually a great deal of interest in Dail Elections, the same cannot be said in the case of the last two E.P. elections. In some ways it is a pity that the important issues affecting the immediate years ahead of the European Community have been fudged and fogged out by the bickering that has gone on about our internal problems but perhaps the heat and friction which appears to have been generated on a number of general election issues will induce the people to go to the polls and then to cast their votes for

There can be little point in the holding of elections if those entitled to vote ignore them. TIPS FOR TIDY **TOWNS** COMMITTEES

Speaking at the tree planting ceremony in Dungarvan last Thursday evening (see report elsewhere in this issue) Mr. Pat Nolan, South East Tourism stated that over 700 towns and villages were expected to compete this year for the top award in the Bord Failte - First National Building Society Tidy Towns Competition which is now in its 31st

Pointing out that this top award brought national prominence to the winner, Mr. Nolan outlined seven points that the adjudicators, who will shortly be making the rounds, would be watching out for in this year's competition.

There are: Roadside kerbs and the bases of buildings and walls cleared of soil and weeds; Sports grounds and their surrounding walls and gates properly maintained; Derelict buildings to be tidied, boarded and painted; Lichen and moss removed from attractive stonework; Litter-bins emptied regularly; Graffiti removed as soon as it appears; Trim appearance of village or town's nameplate and surrounding approach roads.

Mr. Nolan also advised Tidy Towns Committees to plan their participation in the competition and to communicate their objectives to the community. He said that it was the experience of Bord Failte that good communications generated the kind of community spirit which won awards in the competition.

Bord Failte also believes that the Tidy Towns Competition will grow in significance as people become more conscious of the importance of their environment, not alone as an essential contribution towards a successful tourism industry but also as a key element in our quality of

We think that these points raised by Mr. Nolan at a function to mark the the participation by Co. Waterford in this year's Tidy Towns Competition could be very usefully noted by the various Tidy Towns Committees throughout the county.

MILK QUOTA SYSTEM SCHEME PROVIDING FOR THE TEMPORARY LEASING OF QUOTAS IN 1989/90

Under this scheme producers can offer for leasing to other producers within the same co-op or dairy, a portion of their quotas which they consider they will not use in 1989/90.

This year's scheme is broadly in line with the temporary leasing scheme that operated in 1988/89. As a general rule producers may lease up to 70% of their quotas. However producers whose herds were depopulated under the TB or Brucellosis eradication schemes in 1988 or prior to 31 July in 1989 may lease up to 99% of their quotas.

Available quotas must be offered in the first instance to producers in the priority categories and only when their needs have been met can quotas be offered for leasing to other producers. The priority categories have been brought into line with those operating for the re-structuring scheme and for the distribution of flexi milk. Briefly the categories are: those with no quotas or quotas less than 30,000 gallons as the first priority; and those in the 30,000 to 50,000 gallon quota bracket as the second priority and within that bracket preference will be granted to producers whose deliveries in 1983 were abnormally low due to animal disease problems in the 1978-1983 period.

The payment for leased quotas this year is increased to

a maximum of 30 pence per gallon.

Full details of the scheme may be obtained from any co-operative or dairy or direct from the Superlevy Section, Department of Agriculture and Food, Kildare Street, Dublin 2. The closing date for applications is 20 July 1989 so as to enable the leases to be drawn up and completed by 31 July 1989, as required under the Community regulations.



Tagging of Calves

Calves under six weeks of age, being moved or sold, must, by law, be tagged and identified. As the Calf Premium Scheme has been discontinued, ERAD has arranged to make calf tags and certificates available to owners of unrestricted herds on production of their cattle identity cards. These tags and certificates can be obtained free of charge from A.I. stations, For further details contact your local ERAD Office.





retaining three of last year's selection, we must travel this time to Bishopstown on Friday next, with play starting at 12 noon.



The elite coxed fours event at 'Metro' has always been the most cherished prize of any of the Irish Regattas and has commanded the just title as the Blue Riband of Irish

When their coxed fours crew broke up in March the Murray Brothers, Pat and Michael, turned their attention to the coxless pairs event to fly the flag for Cappoquin for the regatta season. Through a happy sequence of events they teamed up with Finbarr Heas and Pat Peillo of Cork Boat Club and entered for the coxed fours event in Trinity Regatta in early May. This combination took Trinity by storm and beat every Irish crew they met at Elite 1 level, tearing the form book to shreds. Having had only two practice sessions together prior to Trinity their performance was sensational beating Belfast Rowing Club and Neptune Rowing Club, Dublin both crews manned by international oarsmen. In the final at Trinity they found themselves carrying the Irish flag against the cream of English internationals, Tideway Scullers Club from London. This race the Munstermen lost by half a length, but won the admiration of the rowing world for a great fighting performance.





He said "Waterford gave their all in the drawn match. They reached a peak of perfection that was enviable. I cannot see them reaching the same peak again, particularly if, and I am certain they will, the Cork selectors, reposition their side for the replay."

McGrath went on: "there is no better brains on a sideline bench on a hurling field, than there is in Cork. They will have learned a mountain of information regarding their own strengths and weaknesses as well as Waterford's strengths and weaknesses." "Cork," he said, "played poorly on the day and you won't see a Cork team play so poorly again."

That's what McGrath said on the day after the drawn game in Thurles. Joe Mc-Grath is now with Cork, he having trained their under-21 team to win the All-Ireland last year and obviously he is hoping for a win for them He is certainly putting it up to Cork in making them such clear favourites.

It is disappointing news that the Waterford team to play in Thurles will not be selected until tonight (Wednesday). The delay unfortunately is considered necessary because the Selectors are unsure about the availability of a couple of players who have injuries. Jimmy Beresford suffered a hamstring injury in training on Friday evening and the news concerning the Colligan player was not very encouraging when I made enquiries from a clubmate

on Sunday.

Pat Murphy has a recurring back problem and is by no means certain to be fit to play. Pat Ryan has a muscle problem, but is likely to be fit enough to play, if selected. Overall, the team should not show more than one or two changes - possibly two - from the team which lined out in the drawn game. If Beresford is ruled out, he will almost certainly be replaced by Pat Ryan, and Liam O'Connor could be seen in the role of full-forward if Murphy is declared unfit.

The Mount Sion man, Ger Fitzpatrick, is playing so well in Liam O'Connor's centre-back berth that he cannot be moved and he is likely to see himself flanked by Ryan and Timmy Sheehan.

Noel Crowley and Paudie Prendergast will start again as midfield partners and our chances of winning will depend to a great extent on how well they perform. Both players excelled in the drawn match, but having seen the "match of the day' video on a couple of occasions, they faded in the final minutes.

"This dispensary", said Cllr. Kyne, is vital to this entire area and I hope that the estimated cost of the remedial work required will not now be put forward as a reason to close it".

Cllr. Kyne went on to say that he understood the Health Board had started discussions with what were described as interested parties about the Kereen dis-pensary. "But", added Mr. Kyne, "Let me state on behalf of the people of the area that this dispensary should not be relocated in Cappoquin — it must stay to serve the area for which it was originally and always intended".

Dr. A. De Souza, Community Care Programme Manager, stated that he was at present investigating how best to upgrade the dispensary building as it had no toilets and needed repairs to doors and roof while the exterior walls required damp proofing and replastering.

Pressed by Cllr. Kyne, Dr. De Souza then gave an assurance that there was no question of removing the dispensary from Kereen but, because of its condition, he said the Board was

at present considering how best it could be improved.

WILL PRESS FOR RETENTION

Interviewed by the "Leader" in Dungarvan last Monday, Cllr. Kyne stated that in addition to raising the matter of the rumoured closure of the dispensary at last Thursday's Health Board meeting, he had also discussed the situation with Mr. M. A. Gyves, the Administrator for Community Care in Waterford. He added: "I have got an assurance that the dispensary is not for closure but I will continue to press for its retention and to have the re pairs and improvements as identified by the Board themselves carried out".


