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Urban Council Choices Are Unanimous

The annual meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council on last Monday night was a most harmonious affair with the choices for Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Council for the coming year being made without contests.

At the outset the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Austin Hallahan (Indp.) presided and asked for nominations for the Chair. Cllr. Billy Kyne (Lab.) then proposed the name of his Labour colleague, Cllr. Paddy Power and this was seconded by Cllr. Mary Dixon (Indp.).

When no other nomination was made, Cllr. Power was then declared elected as the unanimous choice of the Council as Chairman for the coming year.

Before vacating the chair, Cllr. Hallahan thanked the Council for the honour conferred on him of being allowed to act as Chairman for the past year. He said that it had proved a very

busy year attending functions, the highlights of which were the Civic Receptions to mark outstanding achievements accorded by the Council.

He referred to the many projects undertaken by the Council during the year, especially the major town centre sewerage scheme and the building of the new Pitch and Putt Course which was at present taking shape down at Quann's.

Cllr. Hallahan then referred to the ongoing litter problem in the town and the incidence of vandalism and said that more co-operation from the community at large in overcoming these would be appreciat-

ed.

In conclusion Cllr. Hallahan thanked the Co. Manager, the Town Clerk and the Council staff for all the help and advice afforded him during his year in office and he complimented the Press corps for their impartial reporting of Council affairs. Last but not least, he thanked his wife and family for their support, co-operation and understanding throughout the year in allowing him so much time to attend to the various civic functions and duties involved.

Members then all joined in complimenting Cllr. Hallahan on his very excellent year and for the fair and impartial manner in which he had conducted the Council meetings. The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, on his own behalf and on behalf of the staff joined fulsomely in the tributes to Cllr. Hallahan.

The new Chairman, Cllr. Power then took over and was invested with the chain of office by Cllr. Hallahan to the applause of all present.

Cllr. Power returned thanks for his unanimous election and he assured the members that with their help and co-operation all would get a fair and impartial hearing during the coming year.

VICE-CHAIR

Nominations for the Vice-Chair were then asked for and Cllr. Kyne proposed Cllr. Mary Dixon and this was seconded by Cllr. T. Wright (W.P.). The proposal was not opposed and accordingly Cllr. Dixon was declared elected unanimously and she thanked the Council for the honour bestowed on her.

Plans For Improved Public Lighting In Dungarvan

In the course of a report submitted to the June monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, informed the members that he had met representatives of the ESB in connection with the installation of improved public lighting in the town.

Arising from the discussion that took place he said that it was agreed that the design and quotations for approximately 250 lights in the urban area would be submitted by the ESB for his approval before the end of the month. The Manager added that the operation would be funded on an agreed plan of deferred payment of additional maintenance costs over a period of five years. He was happy that the programme would be put into operation during the August-September period subject to the receipt of a satisfactory quotation from the ESB.

Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White said that the propos-

al concerned a complete review of the public lighting system in the Urban area by the ESB which would

cover all "blackspots" that existed at present.

The Co. Manager's report was unanimously approved.

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Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

NO HOLIDAY FOR YOU!

Last Sunday's readings make it clear that Jesus wanted it known and understood that He was the long awaited Messiah. You'd conclude from what the Apostles said that people were discussing His role, and had Him lined-up with the great prophets. When Jesus asked His Apostles for their own opinion, it was Peter who declared "He was the Christ." Whilst the Lord commended Peter, He gave orders to keep it quiet for the present. Then, He proceeded to outline His mission, and the sufferings that would have to be endured by both Himself and His followers. The

Apostles believed, as was currently held, that the Messiah would be a great leader, and would make the nation great. Hence, the idea of a suffering Messiah had hardly registered. Just as Jesus spoke to the people of His time, He is also asking us to listen, to believe and to follow Him through the highways and by-ways of life.

Have you been listening to what Jesus is saying? He has asked you to come and to share in His way of life, which is, in fact, the basic programme of the Christian life. He does insist that this service should be shouldered daily, and in all and in every circumstance. This for the most of us may involve nothing more than we are doing, but we approach it with a new spirit in that we are determined to serve God in what we are doing. In fact, most of us may be asked to do nothing more than just the ordinary things, but when we make use of them to love God, their value is transformed, and they draw us closer to Him. Remember, even little things when done in God's honour become great in His sight. The failure of the Apostles during the passion shows they had not fully understood the role of the Messiah; and it is also an encouragement to the sinner. Jesus found it hard to carry the Cross. He knows when He invites us to follow Him to Calvary that the way is going to be difficult. However, knowing it is the way to peace, light and joy, like Simon of Cyrene we rise to the challenge.

Zechariah in the first reading urges people to make a new beginning, and he would seem to be linking that effort with the sufferings of the Messiah. The readings are a direct request to all to start building a new and a better life, and encourage us to follow the example of Jesus. And, the reason is, because it is the way to eternal life. What must you do? You obey God's law and you pray. You do not have to seek hardships for these will come in plenty, and, when they do, you meet them with the spirit of Christ.

St. Paul in the second reading tells us how to succeed with building this new way of life to which we are born in Baptism. Once you accept Jesus, you have no choice but to abide by His will and His law in all things. Yes, He does expect you to put Him before everyone and everything. Paul reminds us that "having been crucified with Christ, that He now lives not with his own life, but with the life of Christ who lives in him." He is saying, to live like Christ is to behave and act like Him in all we do and say. It sounds so easy, but the snag is, we are human, and that spells danger unless we watch and pray. It does mean we can neither rest nor have a holiday.

THE MESSAGE

The message is, you can never feel satisfied. None of us are strong enough to do without the Lord, but you must earn God's continual flow of help. Our strength is in the Lord. Let each new day be a new beginning. Indeed, life would be unfair and unjust were it to be taken out of the context of eternal life. Whilst all have to walk in this valley of tears, some do seem to be asked for greater effort, which is best understood as a greater calling to love. The offering of sacrifice goes directly to the heart of God. It is a most powerful prayer.

In the time of Our Lord many did not listen to Him. Today, the picture is unchanged. Great numbers have only one purpose, namely to create their heaven on earth. You know as well as I, you cannot keep your cake and eat it. Yes, it is hard not to be influenced by what is happening. The wise man estimates the cost. He sees no future without God. He knows God's way is going to involve struggle and commitment. He knows too it is a full time job, but spurred on by the hope of the future he will allow nothing to interfere with his relationship with God. So, it is no let-up, and no holiday; but my! what a holiday awaits him in heaven.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I would be grateful if you could publish this letter in the Leader at the first opportunity.

I believe I must have relatives in the Dungarvan, Youghal and Ardmore districts. If so, I'd like to meet them in August on my first visit to Ireland.

They would be descended from my great-grandparents, John and Mary O'Brien (nee McCarthy) or William Megley (Migley?) and his wife, whose name I do not have.

John (a farmer) and Mary had a son, Daniel, born in the parish of Clashmore, Youghal, between 1835-47 (my sources disagree).

In April 1873, also in Clashmore, Daniel and Ellen Megley (born between 1837-42) were married. This was Ellen's second marriage, her first being to Maurice Byrne. I understand there was a daughter born from this marriage.

Daniel and Ellen had a son (John) and a daughter (Mary, my grandmother, born in Ardmore) before emigrating from Waterford to New Zealand about 1878.

Know Your Rights

Q. — I am a full-time shop assistant and my employer only gives me two weeks holidays. I know I am entitled to three weeks but feel there would be a lot of hassle if I said this to my employer. If I report this to the Department of Labour can I remain anonymous?

A. — If you work in the wholesale/retail footwear or drapery trade in the Dublin/Dun Laoghaire area there is a union agreement with the Dept. of Labour under which inspectors can go into premises on a routine basis and see that all aspects of Labour Law are complied with.

Outside of these areas the Holiday Act Section in the Dept. of Labour would write out to the employer on foot of a complaint. You could request them not to identify you as the complainant. However, if you are the only employee, your employer could jump to this conclusion anyhow.

If you were to ask them to send your employer a copy of their booklet, Guide to Labour Law, this might solve the problem when they see that they are in breach of the law.

Q. — The income limit for Hospital Services Card was recently advertised in the papers. It said that if your income was under £16,000 for the tax year '88/89 you would be entitled to Free Hospital Consultant Services as a public patient.

I have a Hospital Services Card and was a public patient recently in hospital and have now received a bill from the consultant. Is this a mistake?

A. — It certainly is. Provided you didn't see the consultant privately in his rooms and you were in a public bed then you are not liable. Simply inform the consultant that you have a Hospital Services Card and that you are not liable.

Q. — My Invalidity Pension was reduced in Nov. '86 because my wife was earning more than £50 p.w. I got the temporary payment of £10 (now reduced to £9) and continued to receive the full-rate for our two children. Will I lose this temporary payment if my wife claims Maternity Allowance?

A. — No, you won't lose this temporary payment. It will last for as long as your claim remains unbroken. In fact it will increase to £18 while your wife is receiving her Maternity Allowance but the rate for your children will be reduced to the half-rate.

When your wife returns to work your payment will revert to what it was before she made her claim. Naturally you will be able to claim the increase for the new arrival.

Protest At Charges For Urban Council Sites

A proposal for the disposal by Dungarvan Urban Council of a 1.25 acre fee simple site at the council's Industrial estate at Kilrush to the Trustees of Bon Sauvuer Convent, Carriglea for the erection of a Training Centre for £39,000 came under fire from a member of the Council at the Council's June monthly meeting last week.

When a report from the Town Clerk, Mr. B. White setting out details of the proposal came before the meeting, Cllr. D. Goode at once objected to the charge of £39,000 as being too much. He went on to say that the site was required to build a training centre for retarded adults and for that reason he felt that the price was "way over the top."

The Town Clerk pointed out that the £39,000 was the price which had been negotiated for the site and the nuns at Carriglea were satisfied with it.

Cllr. Goode reiterated that he still felt it was too high in view of what it was wanted for but the Council went on to approve of the sale.

SITE FOR HANDBALL ALLEY

A proposal to dispose of a site consisting of one-fifth of an acre at Ringnasilloge (Quann's) to the Dungarvan Handball Club for £3,000 for the purpose of building a handball court also came in for strong criticism.

Cllr. Tony Wright said that it was unfair to charge a sports club £3,000 for a site like this. He said that in having to pay so much for a site, the club would have nothing left with which to undertake the building.

Cllr. P. Power agreed and suggested that the Manager might look at the matter again with a view to reducing the price.

When the Town Clerk, Mr. White pointed out that this was a reserved func-

tion for the Council members to decide, the proposal to sell the site to the handball club was agreed in principle with a request to the Manager to renegotiate the price with the club.

When Cllr. B. Kyne suggested that the price be reduced to £1,000, Cllr. Wright thought that this would still be too high. "They should only be charged a nominal price as they have no funds," he said.

It was finally agreed to refer the matter back to the Manager to renegotiate a reduced price with the club.

A condition of this sale is that if building does not commence within a period of 18 months from the signing of the contract, the site will revert to the Urban Council.

Flora Schools Project Pinpoints Lack Of Fitness In Pupils

The results of the Flora Fitness and Health Project and pilot scheme for sturford last Thursday evening indicated that almost 83% of the participants were thought to have benefited significantly. Jean Callanan, Marketing Director, Flora, outlined the background to the scheme and presented the results to the media and representatives of participating schools.

Insufficient exercise, bad dietary habits and smoking are amongst the risk factors associated with coronary heart disease, Ireland's number one killer. Statistics show that in 1985, in Munster alone, over 7,000 people died from coronary heart disease or a related illness.

The results of a study carried out in 1986/87 by Dr. Tony Watson, lecturer in Human Performance, Thomond College, Limerick, indicated that there was a serious lack of fitness and a lack of knowledge about what constituted a healthy lifestyle, amongst pupils in secondary schools.

Funds were needed in order to test a programme devised by Dr. Watson, thought to be capable of improving the fitness and healthy lifestyle knowledge of students. The pilot scheme was organised and funded by Flora. The Flora

Fitness and Health Project received the 'blessing' of the Department of Education. With the enthusiasm and cooperation of the volunteer teachers and schools in Munster, a total of 176 pupils (8 schools and 1 community group), including pupils of Mercy Convent, Dungarvan, took part in the pilot scheme over a ten week period.

BENEFITS OF SCHEME

The results of this scheme showed that of those who participated, almost 83% were thought to have benefited significantly. Amongst other benefits reported were:—

•The course was said to have been enormously beneficial to young people over 15 years of age who would not usually be involved in sport.

•It was said to be valuable in terms of cohesion, it benefitted relationship

between pupils and teachers, in the group.

•Pupils were said to have learned how to take responsibility for their own lifestyles.

•There was considerable satisfaction with the concept of a personalised client centred approach. This included:—

—Personal fitness assessment through tests.

—Preparation of a personal plan for improving fitness and health. The fact that success is individual to each one was thought to be very important. The students were competing, not with others but endeavoring to improve their performance.

Two of the participating teachers, Sr. Ita, Mercy Convent, Dungarvan and Pat O'Connor, St. Enda's Community School, Limerick, gave a first hand report of their experience during the course of the Project.

Appeal For Water Safety Precautions

The National Safety Council takes advantage of the fine spell of weather to appeal to people to be careful when engaged in water sport activities.

Small children are especially vulnerable when parents' attention is distracted. Small children are at high risk using inflatable toys such as air mattresses, motor car tubes and other high-buoyancy playthings. These can drift or be blown out to sea and might not be seen in time. The children may then panic or fall off.

Many accidents can be avoided if some elementary precautions are taken.

WATER SPORTS

Water sports such as boating, boardsailing etc. are increasing in popularity with all sections of our

community. But people taking water sports away however can also be at risk. Some basic precautions can reduce the risk of accidents:

• Join a club and learn the sport properly. Most reputable clubs have safety guidelines and rescue facilities available.

• Wear an appropriate life-jacket or buoyancy aid suitable to the activity. A club or a reputable retailer will advise on what is suitable.

• Check the weather forecast in advance and tell someone where you are going and how long you expect to be away.

• Learn to swim and to give resuscitation.

PENSMAN Takes You... Behind The SPOTLIGHT

THE POLITICIANS MUST ELECT A GOVERNMENT

The 26th Dail assembles in Leinster House, Dublin, to-morrow (Thursday), June 29, when the principal business before the house will be the election of the new Taoiseach.

The indecisive result of the June 15 general election, indecisive that is in that the Fianna Fail party failed to win the overall majority they sought, could in the end prove beneficial for the country.

The message from the electorate is that no one party has been handed total power which in effect puts a gun to the heads of the leaders of the main parties with the order to get on with the management of the affairs of state and the formation of a government. It must, therefore, be a return to government by consensus which was how matters were managed by the 25th Dail but which proved so unacceptable to Mr. Haughey that he called the election.

For the past week discussions have been taking place between Mr. Haughey and the leaders of the opposition parties but up to the time of writing this, no acceptable compromise appears to have emerged. The politicians are jockeying for position and brinkmanship would appear to be the main strategy being used. Through all of this, the political commentators and pundits are having a field day as they rattle off the possible combinations and permutations and present their presumptions and assumptions as to what the outcome will be when the

Dail assembles for its first meeting on Thursday.

As we see it, there should be no earthly reason why the incoming Dail cannot elect an effective government that will survive a full term in office. All that is necessary is for the politicians to put the interests of the country before those of self or party.

We have had a costly election which the majority of people felt was not really necessary and arising from that the only thing that is now certain is that the people do not want to be pushed into another.

Let the politicians realise then, that the day of the single party government in this country is over, for a time at any rate, and come together with some acceptable alignment and elect a government that will run the country for the next four of five years.

AMENDED FOOD HYGIENE REGULATIONS

A hygiene-conscious public, according to Mr. John A. Murphy, Chief Executive of the Irish Quality Association, are now simply unwilling to accept dirt or untidiness in food establishments. This, of course is only as it should be and

is not before its time.

The Food Hygiene Regulations (1950-1971) were amended earlier this year and the new rules came into operation on May 1 last. The principal effects of the amendments are in relation to the introduction of a requirement to obtain a licence from the health board, by a person carrying on a food business from a food stall. They also impose additional hygiene requirements for food stalls.

Under the regulations, a person operating a food business will have to keep written records of the origin and date of receipt of any food and in cases where the C.E.O. of a Health Board has evidence that a food premises, food stall or food vehicle used in connection with a food business, poses a grave and immediate danger to health he is empowered to apply to a District Court for a closure order prohibiting the operation of the food business concerned.

The Irish Quality Association also advises people to steer clear of premises which store raw and cooked meat side by side as this could be "a happy home for salmonella" while the thumbs down sign has also been given to the use of sawdust on shop floors, once so commonly used, as it provides, according to the experts, a perfect breeding ground for bacteria. Most highly recommended to the public are those businesses which display the Irish Quality System Sign as to obtain this, premises are subjected to regular searching inspections by officers of the Irish Quality Association and must always conform to the highest hygiene standards.

Kevin, who was a pupil of Dungarvan CBS, lived life to the full and his warm radiant smile and very friendly nature ensured that he was loved by all who came in contact with him during his short lifetime.

He was a budding sportsman and played hurling and football with his school and with Dungarvan GAA Club. Just hours before his death he posed proudly with his school team mates with the Blake Cup which they won this year.

Like all young people, Kevin had a real love of music and his great idol was the king of rock 'n' roll, Elvis Presley. Kevin was a break-dance specialist and recently performed in concerts at Carriglea and

Dunabney. He liked being on stage and recently too he played the part of Stephen in the Class production of their Glenroe drama. A member of Dungarvan Youth Club, Kevin possessed an extrovert nature and revelled in the company of people of his own age.

How ironic this weekend I will endeavour to write Kevin's tribute. Kevin was a trier, the sportsfield his love, he was an accomplished athlete, his skill and power on the hurling and football fields were well

known. How he loved to wear the blue and white of his school and club with pride.

He greatly appreciated very much the activities of the Youth Club and took part in all their projects. His enthusiasm, excitement and joy made the London '88 trip so special, so worthwhile. His eagerness to please Fr. Michael and myself was very evident. I know that he would be very pleased to see Fr. Michael in our midst again today. Kevin, your thanks for that trip was so genuine and heartwarming.

Kevin, I'll say slan agus beannacht for the moment. Your virtues and traits are still as fresh as Spring, like a period of joy and new life. Your winter has passed, you have changed to come alive in a new and wonderful way.

Lord, Your last journey to Calvary was one of fourteen stations, may we now thank You for Kevin's fourteen years.

Since then he had received a number of complaints especially from people from the Tallow area about the non-availability of the service in Lis-

more. He understood from inquiries he had made that there was a problem about the facilities available for the service in the town and that involved an inter-dentist dispute.

The Chairman, Cllr. B. Kynne who is one of the Council's two representatives on the Health Board said that from the representations made by them in the

matter, he understood that the service was to be resumed on a monthly rather than the weekly basis on which it was originally held. He said that he was not aware of any question about the facilities available or of any disputes.

He added that Cllr. O'Halloran and himself would again raise the matter at the next Health Board meeting.

ARDMORE

ENTERPRISE CO-OP

The Ardmore Enterprise Co-op was formed in March last, following two public meetings on March 9 and 29, in Ardmore. It is a voluntary association whose main aim is to further employment and economic development in the greater Ardmore area. The formation of the Co-op was stimulated by the debate leading up to the preparation of the National Development Plan which was submitted to Brussels. The Plan sought additional funds for Ireland in the lead up to 1992 and the Single European Market. Ardmore Enterprise Co-op has submitted an outline plan to Waterford County Council seeking assistance for the Ardmore area. The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, has asked the Co-op to prepare more specific detailed proposals for submission to him and work is in progress to effect this.

Four specific projects are currently being investigated:

Industrial/Commercial Park — A small industrial/commercial Park is being sought;

Large Hotel — A large hotel, complete with leisure centre, would be a useful addition to the tourist facilities of Ardmore. The Co-op is seeking such a project;

Heritage Centre — The feasibility of building a Heritage Centre is being investigated. It is hoped that Ardmore could perhaps be-

come a Bord Failte designated "Theme Town", based on the early Christian theme;

Marina — Marina facilities, principally for pleasure craft, would be desirable in Ardmore or on the Waterford side of the Blackwater estuary. This is also being investigated.

The Co-op's objective is to develop proposals which will include input from the relevant State Agencies, such as the Waterford County Council. These proposals will be discussed at a public meeting which will be held at the end of September.

The officers of the Co-op are: Chairman — Richard Lincoln; Vice-Chairman — John Moloney; Secretary — Mrs. Currie Hosford; Asst. Secretary — Margaret O'Brien; Treasurer — Liam Gleeson.

We would like to thank the members of the Co-op for their statement and hope to hear more from them in the future. Good luck with your plans.

TIDY TOWNS/ CLEANWATCH

As part of the Cleanwatch section of the Tidy Towns competition, a Food Hygiene course was run in Ardmore on Thursday, June 22 and Tuesday, June 27. The course was of six hours duration, and included six 15 minutes videos, followed by discussions. Move To Upgrade Fire Safety In Hotels And Guesthouses

A new Guide to Fire Safety in hotels, guesthouses, etc., was circulated in summary form to members of Waterford Co. Council at the June monthly meeting of the Council held in Dungarvan.

The guide contains a number of recommendations, the implementation of which should ensure that fire safety standards in Irish hotels, guesthouses, etc will continue to conform to those internationally accepted.

It sets out the statutory duty which persons in control of such premises which provide sleeping accommodation on a commercial basis have, to take all reasonable measures to guard against the outbreak of fire and to ensure as far as is reasonably practicable, the safety of persons on the premises in the event of a fire.

At its conclusion the guide recommends the creation and implementation of a fire safety programme which should be an integral part of the day-to-day running of a hotel/guesthouse. Such a programme would cover a wide range of desirable precautions, ranging from "good housekeeping" practices such as preventing the accumulation of rubbish and waste which can frequently be the origin of fires, to the keeping of a fire safety register.

Mr. Tony McCarthy, Chief Fire Officer who was

present at the meeting explained the important aspects of the guide to the members and said that he proposed to get around the county to inform all those concerned of the new regulations in due course.

FIRE IN TALLOW

Cllr. W. McDonnell then referred to a recent fire which occurred in the Treacy home in Tallow and which completely gutted the building. He said that when the local brigade got to the fire they found that the pump they had was not powerful enough to pump water up to the blazing roof which then caved in. "The members of the brigade did the best they could but their equipment was not able to cope, as it was completely out of date," he said.

The Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley said that an application had been made to the Department for approval to replace the fire engine based in Tallow and he was hoping for a favourable reply.

Cllr. McDonnell complimented the Council officials for providing a mobile home for the Treacy family until their new home was built.

Also honoured were Team Managers, Kealan O'Neill and John Walsh.

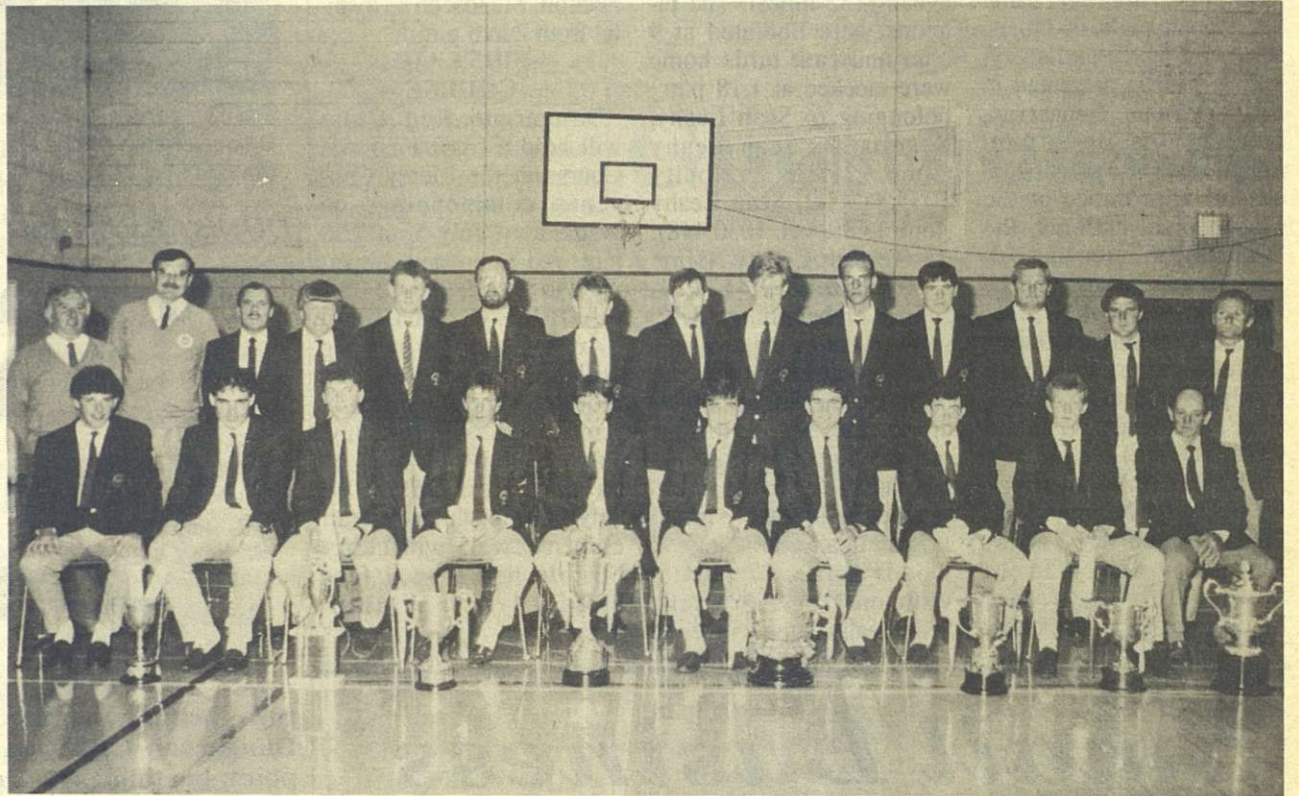

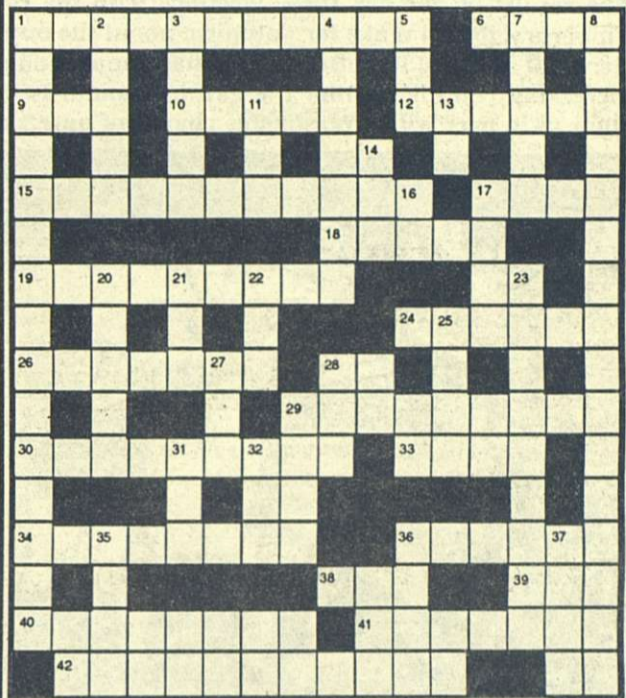

MUNSTER SENIOR HURLING FINAL

Determined Challengers In With A Chance To Upset The Odds

The results of our last three meetings with the reigning Munster champions, Tipperary, do not make for optimism about the outcome of next Sunday's Munster final at Cork, but after all that has happened in the past five weeks, there is increasing confidence that the gap in standards has narrowed sufficiently to allow us in here with a reasonable chance of upsetting the odds.

Five weeks ago we were given a 50/50 chance of beating second division team Clare in the first round at Thurles and having won that game very decisively, we were given only an outside chance against Cork and after that memorable draw, the impossibility of beating Cork in a replay, was being shouted from the rooftops. That is now all a part of our 1989 Munster championship story and we are through to our eighteenth provincial final with a team who are rearing to go and impregnated with a burning desire to compensate their legion of faithful supporters, for their past disappointments.

This will be our third attempt at winning a Munster final in the eighties, but unlike the other two — and apart from the fact that it will be Tipperary and not Cork — here we had to

survive three stiff tests to qualify while in '82 and '83 we got through after only one match. It is now 26 years since we won a Munster championship and this means that all people under the age of thirty or so, have never seen a Waterford man accept a championship trophy at senior level.

So, having been out of the rankings for so very long, a win here would have something of the pride and glamour of a first triumph. In fact it would give new life to the game at all levels in the county and inspire players in the other grades to greater things. But I suppose dreaming must give way to reality, for the moment anyway and we must look at the situation in a cold and calculated way.

GIANTS OF MUNSTER

Our opponents have won the last two provincial titles and are the giants of Mun-

ster hurling, they have played in two All-Ireland semi-finals and a final in the past two years, as well as having success in the Royal Liver National League, almost at the same time. Four of the present team, Nicholas English, Colum Bonner, Declan and Bobby Ryan, are All-Stars and a further six were among the nominations for this honour. Add to these famous hurling names like Pat Fox, Conor O'Donovan, Paul Delaney, goalkeeper Ken Hogan, John Kennedy, Joe Hayes, Aidan Ryan, Donie O'Connell, Noel Sheedy, John Heffernan, etc., and we get an idea of their strength and the task that lies in front of us in Cork. No one will deny then their right to be named the very hot favourites.

As I have written on many occasions, we invariably fare better in the role of outsiders as it has the effect of easing the pressure on less experienced players who can be more easily motivated when playing as the challengers. This has helped before and I have no doubt but that it was an important factor in helping us through our last three games.

The news that the team for Sunday cannot be selected before Tuesday night is disappointing. When it was found that Noel Crowley and Ger Fitzpatrick were both carrying injuries when training took place at Walsh Park on Sunday, the selectors decided to defer final selection until Tues-

day night after training.

It is most unlikely that there will be any change in defence with Portlaw's Jimmy Power retaining the goalkeeping post. Any change here would be a sensation as Power has played very well so far. There is not likely to be a change in defence either with Peter Walsh of Mount Sion, Damien Byrne, Erin's Own and Jimmy Beresford, Colligan in the full line and Timmy Sheehan, Tallow, Ger Fitzpatrick, Mount Sion, (presuming that he will have responded to the treatment for a broken blood vessel) and Pat Ryan, Mount Sion being given a vote of confidence in the half-back line. From here on (and if Crowley is off) it is difficult to figure what options the selectors will go for. If Crowley is on we may see no change at centre-field with the Crowley/Paudie Prendergast combination which started against Cork, being retained. I'm sure Tallow's Pat Murphy, having scored three goals in the replay will not be left out and this will mean dropping one of the six who began against Cork. My perception of this situation is that Ger Connors of Ballygunner, may be the one to lose out. If this is so there would have to be some shuffling done in attack as either Liam O'Connor or Murphy are not wing or corner men and we could conceivably see Anthony Qualter, Ballysaggart moved into a corner berth with Shane Ahearne, Mount Sion operating on the right wing, as he has

done before with O'Connor moving to centre forward and leaving the full-forward berth there for Murphy. Kieran Delahunty, Ballygunner who showed improved form in the replay will surely be retained in the half forward line with Billy Sullivan, also of Ballygunner keeping his corner forward post.

As I have said, it is a pity that we have been left to speculate on our options so close to a Munster final. Hopefully Crowley will be able to play and that the team will see as little change from the side which defeated Cork in the replay, as possible.

We know that we have a mountain to climb and that the task confronting the team is enormous, but my firm belief is that we do have a chance of beating Tipperary if every player gives his all for the full 70 minutes and if their attitude going into the final is right.

Waterford have nothing to lose and everything to gain and on a personal note every player has the rare opportunity of enhancing his reputation in the hurling world. It is a chance that might not come our way for a long time to come. What we are setting out to achieve, has been achieved before by Waterford who entered the game in the role of outsiders, so while it is a very difficult assignment, it is not impossible.

The biggest crowd ever to follow a Waterford team on the Munster trail, will travel to shout their support. The fact that the game is being televised live doesn't seem to have increased the tremendous demand for tickets and the news over the week-end was that our 15,500 allocation may not be enough.

All that remains now is to wish the selectors and team the very best of luck on Sunday and then wait and

THOSE FINES

Waterford County Board were fined a total of £600 at the recent meeting of the Munster Council following what the Chairman, Michael Maher described as misbehaviour on the sideline at the three championship matches in which Waterford were engaged. The incursions by bottle-men and mentors to this extent contravened the championship regulations and it must be stopped. He said it gave him no pleasure to impose these fines on Waterford or any other county. It is not known if the County will decide to appeal, but it is difficult to see on what basis the County could appeal, unless an effort can be made to have the fines reduced.

The penalties paid by Waterford are likely to ensure the observance of the championship regulations by all counties.

The Leinster Council are likely and expected to impose similar penalties for breaches of these regulations at Croke Park on the occasion of the two semi-finals played there.

Central Council will be asked at their meeting on August 12 to approve of a submission to have the regulations for the organisation of championship games, applied also at County level.

REGULATIONS

Entry To Ground: Number of players allowed 24 and only this number may

be published on programme. Number of officials allowed 11 (including county chairman and secretary). In addition, 3 hurley carriers allowed for hurling games.

Total Allowed In Dressing Room: Hurling 38; Football 35. (Penalty for breeches of above: £100 first offence and doubled for next breach).

Dress: Jerseys to be properly numbered in accordance with official list. Players to be numbered in accordance with programme — an exception will be made only in case of valid withdrawal. Such withdrawal to be notified in advance to committee in charge of fixture.

Uniform colour of socks and togs (Socks up and jerseys inside togs for parade). Fines for breach: £50 first and then doubled.

Punctuality: Dealt with under General Rule (177).

Substitutions: Maximum of 3 subs allowed. All substitutions must be from official list of 21 even though 24 names are allowed on programme.

Substitution may be made only during stoppage of play after player has given substitution note to referee. Penalty as per general rule.

No. In Dug-Out: 20 in football and 23 in hurling. Penalty for breach: £50 first offence, then doubled.

Parade: Teams must line out properly and in numerical order after captain.

Tracksuits/training tops not to be worn during parade. Players must stand properly and show respect for National Anthem; mascots are not allowed for parade or team photographs. Penalty for first offence: £50 and doubled.

Kick Around/Puck Around: Not allowed at half time. Penalty first offence £50 and doubled.

Mentors Along Sideline: Referees or other officials appointed by committee in charge will be asked to report unauthorised incursions on to field of play. Two team officials, whose names must be given to the referee before the game, must wear armbands, one for medical person and one for another official who may go along side/end line to make changes and return to dug-out. Such officials may enter field only with prior permission of referee. Penalty for first offence £100 and doubled. Penalty for unofficial incursion on field during game: one month suspension: Rule 183.

Hurley Carriers: One behind each end line at corner flag. One at dug-out. Must wear arm bands. Penalty £50 and doubled.

Swapping Jerseys: Players who have swapped jerseys or who are not wearing jerseys will not be allowed participate in the trophy presentation. Penalty £50 first offence and doubled.

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Councillors Complain About Voters Lists

Several members of Waterford County Council made complaints about the voters lists at the June monthly meeting held in Dungarvan last week.

He pointed out that this happened despite the fact that the preparation of the register of electors was notified to the public and names were requested. He said that he would have the complaints raised checked out.
