Waterford Foods Buys Major US Dairy

Waterford Foods plc has made a major dairy acquisition in the US which will be used as a base for future growth. It is paying \$50 million (£37m.) for the Galloway-West Group in Wisconsin. A further \$5m. will be paid in 1994. The net assets of Galloway-West as at June 30 is £32.6m. which means a goodwill payment of \$22.4m.

According to Mr. Stephen O'Connor, Chief Executive of the Dungarvan based Waterford Foods, a number of factors justify such a high premium. Firstly £5m. of the purchase price will not be paid until 1994, which in effect is an interest free loan for 5 years. In addition the group has stocks worth \$4m. which will be sold quickly and which effectively reduce the purchase price to \$44m.

Galloway-West operates three dairy processing plants in Wisconsin, employs 275 people and processes 61 million gallons of milk. It commands over 50% of the total American sweetened condensed milk production, 25% of the cheese starter media and over 50% of Wisconsin's output of Swiss cheese.

Mr. O'Connor described the acquisition as a major step forward in Waterford

Foods' expansion plans. The firm already sells milk powders into the US market through Bord Baine and is likely to continue this actively after the takeover of Galloway-West. In addition there are possibilities whereby Waterford will also be able to sell other products through Galloway in the US where the dairy products market is growing by 3 to 4% a year.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

DO IT WITH MATT

In the first of last Sunday's readings, Elisha is called by Eligah the Prophet to come and follow him and help to bring people back to God. You'll have noticed that Eligah expected him to pull up stakes, forsake his old way of life and blindly follow. After some hesitation, Elisha slaughtered his oxen, which symbolized his renunciation of what he'd been doing, and then followed Eligah. Whilst this call could be considered a vocation to serve in the priestly ministry, it would equally apply to the general call to all to come and follow Christ. So, everyone is expected to listen and respond even if, as is often the case, it will involve sacrifices. Holiness is not the privilege of the priest and the religious. We are all called to be holy, and to answer that call does mean self-denial. The history of the Church is crowded with records of ordinary people who lived and died in the arms of Christ.

Take Matt Talbot. Drink was once his God. He was spending his life and his wages at the "Altar of Bacchus." Then, he had a set-back, and no one wanted him when he was penniless. Rejected by those who once helped to drink his hard earned money, he began to think and found his soul, and, like Elisha, he never looked back. Now, there is a growing concern that far, far too much money and time is being wasted on drink. A recent survey in Essex showed that young people (17-20) were drinking 15 pints of lager a night. The conclusion was, a continuation at that level would mean a visit to the undertaker inside two years! This helps you to understand a reference to young people turning up at Dublin hospitals with burned-out livers.

Gluttony is one of the seven capital sins, and leads to and causes other sins. If you do not know what drink does, then you need glasses! Everyone else is aware of the untold havoc and misery it causes. Drink ought to be a blessing, but our lack of temperance has made it a curse. May I therefore make a suggestion to those who over-indulge, and especially to those who have become slaves to the habit. God is asking you to mend your ways, and if you refuse to listen, He may leave you to your fate. If I were you, I'd be saying: "God, please listen to me. I'm a sinner. I have hurt the people who love me. I am sorry, and especially I regret the bad example I have given. I do want to follow you, but I find it almost impossible. Dear Lord, I need a lot of help. You once helped Matt Talbot to walk back from the grave. I know he will join in asking You to bless my efforts, because I have pledged these efforts in honour of his canonization."

St. Paul in the second reading continues with much the same theme. He reminds us that service of God is a call to freedom. It means we should be guided by the spirit of Christ, and no longer allow ourselves to be the slave of self-indulgence. Drink, when taken in excess, reaches out like a menacing tentacle, blighting everyone it touches. It has truly merited the name, demon beverage. The tragedies and crimes that follow in its wake are legion. I'm only touching the surface, so, if you have the "disease" do give the matter careful thought. If it needs a miracle, then a miracle you must have. Get in touch with A.A. Be determined. Do not look back. Pray and pray, and ask Matt to help. Neglect could be dangerous. I know if I'd heart trouble, I'd leave no stone unturned to seek a cure, and so would you.

A DIFFICULT ROAD

Jesus took the road to Calvary. He knew it would be difficult, but willingly He allowed Himself to be led to the slaughter. He beckons us to follow after Him. He knows it will not be easy for us to give up our indulgent ways, yet! He expects us to rise above our weaknesses. We'd be most foolish to ignore His invitation to freedom. Even if you are a slave to drink or in bondage to some other evil habit, you must fight and set yourself free. Do not wait for the opportune time. Act now. Go to Confession. Ask the priest to bless your good intentions. Bravely set out on the road to Calvary and you'll find the secret of living.

You may feel you have no problem, when everyone knows you have. You'll never find the joy of living for God if you bury your head in the sand. Be honest with yourself. You'll never be cured, if you believe you have no problem. Be open. Ask the family, and especially the young children to help: they have great influence with God. You may have to receive counsel from the A.A. but the family will rejoice with you in having won back the freedom to which you were born in Baptism.

New Service Charges Campaign Launched

Local authorities around the country have launched a nationwide campaign to encourage people to pay their service charges. The campaign will run until the end of July, using radio and newspaper advertising to make people aware of the cost of providing services such as water, sanitation and refuse collection.

Last September the County and City Managers launched the first such campaign to collect the massive £30 million then owed. Despite pockets of resistance, the campaign met with an overall degree of success — £10 million was raised before the campaign end.

According to Gerry Ward, Kildare County Manager and Spokesman for the campaign: "This figure was encouraging and a start — but nowhere near enough. All the money collected last year went to pay debts and costs already incurred. This time, we want a 100% response."

Mr. Ward continued: "People are now beginning to realise that the charges won't go away as might have happened in the past. This time we want to highlight two things. The first is that services cost money. The second is that they're only being asked to pay a moder-

ate contribution. Water charges, for example, rarely exceed one-third of the actual cost of chlorination, filtration and pumping water into people's homes and businesses."

WAIVER SYSTEM

A 100% response to the charges is the target. The County Managers point out there is a waiver system for families who feel they cannot afford to pay.

"People who cannot afford the charges should approach their local County Manager who will listen to them sympathetically. Depending on the circumstances, the charge can be paid in instalments or waived entirely."

As a rule however, the County Managers will not be a soft touch. The bills have gone out. The money is owed. And the slogan says 'You've got the bill — now pay your share.'

Need For Public Toilets At Lismore And Cappoquin

The need for adequate public toilet facilities to be provided in Lismore and Cappoquin was again stressed at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council held last week in Dungarvan.

Cllr. W. McDonnell made a request on behalf of the local Town Commissioners for the erection of new toilet facilities in Lismore for the benefit of the people in the area. He said that the Commissioners were very disappointed at the lack of progress in the matter as what is there at present is not at all suitable for either the local people or for tourists.

Cllr. J. A. Walsh said that the need for a public toilet in Cappoquin was also very great especially at week-ends when many buses brought big numbers of people to the locality. It was embarrassing when asked by these visitors to have to say there were no public toilet facilities in the town.

Cllr. J. Quirke also spoke in support.

Mr. Dan Hurley, Co. Manager said that the points raised were valid but the position was that the

Council did not have the capital allocation to do the jobs. "However", he added, "we have submitted a priority list in the matter of

public toilets to the Department and hope, in due course, that this will be grant aided and the work can then be carried out".

Justice Criticises Cavalier Attitude To Traffic Offences

When a number of defendants were charged with various offences under the Road Traffic Act at Dungarvan Court last week, District Justice W. F. O'Connell was prompted to criticise people for adopting too cavalier an attitude towards all traffic offences such as speeding and driving vehicles without insurance cover.

When Sergt. Burke, Traffic Corps had a number of drivers summoned for speeding at Gortavickery, Leamybrien, he told the Court that cars were travelling at 78 to 80 m.p.h. there.

District Justice O'Connell described such speeds as crazy pointing out that the statutory speed limit on open roads was 55 m.p.h. He said that this speeding was becoming a rather regular phenomenon affecting all areas as he had come

across it at his courts in Cashel, Clonmel and other places. "They are just driving around with no consideration for others," he said.

Supt. P. J. Hayes said that driving at such speeds was absolutely reckless.

Imposing fines ranging from £50 to £75 on the speeding defendants the District Justice remarked that the only remedy to the problem would appear to be disqualification. "Fines and endorsements mean nothing to those con-

cerned," he said.

In cases where defendants were convicted for driving without insurance, fines ranging from £50 to £100 were imposed.

UNLIGHTED BICYCLE

A defendant summoned for riding a bicycle without front or rear lights was fined £10 in respect of no rear light and £5 for having no front light, the District Justice remarking that it was more important to have a back light on a bicycle at night.

Set Up Bogus Garda Checkpoints

A 17-years old Dungarvan youth who set up roadside checkpoints wearing dark clothes and a postman's hat to impersonate a member of the gardai on a number of occasions appeared at Dungarvan Court last week on charges arising from the incidents.

Martin Power, Childers Estate pleaded guilty to charges of impersonating a member of the garda and he also pleaded guilty to charges of causing malicious damage to a caravan on Christmas night, 1988 and to taking a car without the owner's consent on March 19 last.

Supt. P. J. Hayes, who prosecuted, told the Court that Power with some others damaged the caravan in what could only be described as sheer, naked,

vandalism and left it a wreck on the side of the road.

The Supt. went of to say that Power terrified several motorists when he operated his checkpoints. However one lady motorist chased him and he ran away frightened.

Det/Garda C. Kiely in evidence said that Power had no previous convictions. He now seemed to be going straight and was doing the best he could.

District Justice W. F. O'Connell said that while

it was the defendant's first time in Court he had made quite an impression on his first appearance. He then told Power that he proposed to adjourn all the charges against him until July 12 in order to obtain a report about him from the Court Welfare Officer.

The District Justice added that he expected Power to make a positive effort to pay compensation for the damage caused before then.

Sheep Regime Reform In Discussions

The common market organisation for sheep meat is the youngest of the European Community's market support regimes. It is unique because it was set up on a regional basis, with different levels and types of support.

In eleven Member States the support is provided by an annual ewe premium calculated to bridge the gap between the target price agreed by the Council and the returns from the market, but in Britain, the market gap is calculated every week, and is covered by a variable premium, payable to every farmer who sells lambs. This system, which is similar to the variable premium on beef cattle that was abolished in April, or to the old deficiency payment scheme operated in Britain from 1974 to 1983, induced complete dependence on financial support. Because it is open-ended, it has proved to be very costly and it also distorts trade,

even though the premium is clawed back from any lamb that is exported to another Member State.

The regime has certainly succeeded in increasing sheep output in the Community, and has greatly narrowed the self-sufficiency gap. In this country and in Britain, it has provided an alternative enterprise to dairy farming, but the cost of support per unit of production is higher than any other livestock product, and the division of the Community into seven regions with different rules for support payments would be unacceptable after 1992 in the Single Market.

Last September, the Com-

mission put forward a series of proposals for reform. These included the reduction of the seven regions to four, with Italy and Greece in one, Spain and Portugal in another. In these countries lambs are largely by-products of milk production. All of Northern Europe, including Northern Ireland, but excluding Britain, would make up the third group for the present, and Britain would be a fourth special region until the abolition of the variable premium is completed, at which point they would join the third group.

The initial proposal on the variable premium was to reduce it gradually over four weeks, to reduce the frequency of payment of the premium from weekly at present to monthly in 1990 and quarterly in 1991, and to phase it out at the end of 1992. Along with these changes went proposals to limit eligible ewe flocks to 500 on lowland farms and 1,000 in disadvantaged and mountain areas.

The proposals have been discussed at two recent meetings of the Council, and it is hoped that full agreement will be reached by the autumn at the latest.

The proposal to limit headage payments to 1,000 ewes in disadvantaged areas and on mountains is strongly opposed in Britain where large flocks are traditional, and it is now likely that the limit will be for 500 ewes per labour unit, so that a farm employing four people could have 2,000 eligible ewes. There is provision in the present regime for intervention buying of sheep meat, but the Commission is very anxious to get rid of it, and to substitute aids to private storage as a safety net.

A SECURE FUTURE

Irish farmers have a very great interest in these discussions. When the market regime was introduced in 1980, our ewe flock was little over 1.5 million head. By 1985, it had expanded to almost 2 million, and by next December, it is likely to be very close to 4 million head. Sheep flocks have been introduced on dairy farms where the cow herds have been cut back because of the super-levy, on beef farms where there are problems with high calf prices, and on tillage farms to complement the falling income for cereal growing. A regime that will fit in with the changes brought about by the Single European Market will give sheep farmers a secure future.

Courses For Horses

Olaf Petersen, the international show jumping course designer, made a flying visit to Dublin last Thursday, June 22 to meet his co-designer, Sgt. Major Steve Hickey, at the RDS in order to discuss course plans for the forthcoming Kerrygold Dublin Horse Show (Tuesday, August 8 — Saturday, August 12 inclusive).

Both Olaf Petersen and Sgt. Major Steve Hickey are recognised internationally as two of the top course designers in the world.

Olaf Petersen was the course designer for the Seoul Olympics in 1988 and has been invited to design the course for the World Equestrian Games in Stockholm in 1990. Immediately after working with Steve Hickey at the Kerrygold Dublin Horse show, he will be travelling to Rotterdam for the European Championships.

Steve Hickey has worked on the National Grand Prix circuit in Ireland for many years and has been course designer at the RDS since the World Show Jumping Championships in 1982. He has been involved in course designing at events all over the world, including such diverse locations as Australia and Libya.

The combined expertise of these two specialists will result in memorable courses and thrilling show jumping at this year's Kerrygold Dublin Horse Show.

Belt Up And Don't Be Killed

In 1986 the wearing of seatbelts reached its highest level in Ireland: 86% of drivers and front seat passengers were "belted-up."

Spot checks this year indicate that the wearing of seatbelts may now be under 50% in some areas, especially on short journeys.

But accidents occur on short as well as on long trips. Seatbelts do not prevent accidents but if one happens they lessen the risk of death and serious injury. Recent statistics show that

when an accident occurs a frontseat passenger is 5 times more likely to be killed and a driver 10 times more likely, if not wearing a seatbelt.

So come on drivers and passengers — use your seat belt: it makes sense to "belt up."

Annual Report (1988) Of The Ombudsman

In the course of his annual report for 1988, the Ombudsman, Mr. Michael Mills states that the total number of complaints received during the year was 3,164. This compared with more than 5,000 complaints in each of the years 1985, 1986 and 1987. The Ombudsman attributes the substantial fall off in the number of complaints last year to two factors — (1) the reduction in staff of the Office of the Ombudsman which led to considerable delays in dealing with complaints and (2) the suspension of regional visits throughout 1989 due to the shortage of staff resources.

The number of complaints resolved in favour of the complainant was 451 or some 18% of the total cases finalised. The number of cases in which assistance was provided was 27%. Thus some 44% of all complainants received some form of assistance or redress.

The item most frequently referred to in the Annual reports to date has been the anomaly in the Social Welfare system which resulted in persons with many years of insurance contributions failing to qualify for Old Age (Contributory) Pension when those with less contributions qualified for the Pension. This anomaly arose because of the averaging requirement in Social Welfare law which provided that, in order to qualify for Old Age (Contributory) Pension, a person must have had an average of 20 insurance contributions per year from 1953, or from the time they started insurable employment if later, up to the end of the tax year before reaching 66 years of age.

Under the terms of new legislation introduced in 1988, pro-rata pensions are now payable to persons who went out of insurance between 1953 and 1974 and who re-entered insurance in 1974 as a result of the income limits being abolished. The minimum yearly average of insurance contributions required to qualify for a pension is now 5.

The Ombudsman says that the change in legislation is a welcome develop-

ment and will assist many of the people who were affected by the previous anomaly. He is continuing to receive complaints, however, about anomalies which remain in relation to people who did not re-enter insurable employment in 1974 and who have more contributions on average between 1953 and 1974 than some of those who qualify for reduced pensions under the new arrangement.

COMPLAINTS FROM WATERFORD

According to a table ac-

companying the report, a total of 33 complaints were received from Co. Waterford in 1988 by the Ombudsman. Of those 8 concerned the Social Welfare Dept., 3 each concerned the Revenue commissioners and the Health Board, 18 concerned Telecom Eireann and 1 the Department of the Environment.

Of these, the report states 27 were finalised in the year with 2 being resolved, assistance provided in 7, not upheld 10 while 8 were discontinued or withdrawn.

Know Your Rights

Q. — A house on our road was sold recently for £79,000. We are pensioners and are very worried that we will be liable for the Residential Property Tax in view of all the recent press reports, which implied that you would be liable if your house was valued at more than £74,231.

A. — Not everyone who owns a house worth more than £74,231 will have to pay this tax. What the papers didn't say was that you would be exempt if the total gross income of the household was less than £25,795. So, most pensioners would be exempt unless their children were working and still living at home.

If your income is less than this you are exempt. However, as your house is valued at more than £74,231, you are obliged to make a return on form R.P.2 even though you are exempt.

The above figures are for assessment date 5th April 1988. The income limit for assessment date 5th April 1989 will be £26,654, but the house valuation hasn't been decided yet.

PENSMAN Takes You. . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

LITTER — THE GREATEST THREAT TO TOURISM

Speaking after the dinner which climaxed the opening of the new Clonea Strand Hotel last Thursday, the County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley who performed the official opening said that they should look on Tourism as an industry which not only provided jobs in a particular area but also earned foreign currency for the State. Tourism, he added, was something that did not merely happen but like any end-product it required planning, research, looking for markets, providing a range of activities, putting an emphasis on quality and an attractive price structure.

Mr. Hurley stressed the importance of tourism to the economy at national and local levels by pointing out that in 1987 Ireland earned £859 million from tourism with the South East Region accounting for £91.4 million of which Waterford City and County earned £30 million. Pointing out that Ireland was not a sun destination he said that consequently it was a market of limited appeal. On the "plus" side, however, we had the advantages of beautiful scenery, natural environment, culture, friendly people and where the two largest markets, the U.K. and North America, were concerned, a common language. But, said Mr. Hurley, we must rely to a great extent on aggressive marketing to create an awareness of these.

Listing the additional advantages which County Waterford enjoyed he said we had a good road structure with excellent tourist signposting; ninety miles of coastline; fifty beaches and coves, three of the largest of which qualified this year for the EC Blue Flag for high standard quality bathing waters at Clonea, Ardmore and Dunmore while we also had a large number of lay-bys, picnic areas and viewpoints. "I believe," said Mr. Hurley, "that all those qualities help to attract visitors to stay in our county."

Before he concluded, Mr. Hurley referred to the ongoing problem of litter stating that "the greatest threat to tourism in this country without doubt is litter and the careless acts of disposal of refuse and waste." Despite the many functions performed by the local authorities relating to environmental protection and enhancement, Mr. Hurley said that they had to depend to a very great extent on the help and the co-operation of the general public to ensure a clean environment and a quality of life.

We can only endorse all that the County Manager stated on the occasion and

in particular his remarks about the litter problem. In an effort to make the public more aware of the need for more care and cleanliness not only for the sake of visitors but for our own benefit as well we have repeatedly drawn attention to the careless attitude of the public at large to this very important aspect of our lives. Perhaps this repetition is at last now bearing fruit and that people are, in fact, becoming more conscious of the need to keep our countryside and beaches clean and free from litter. The Blue Flags awarded to Ardmore and Clonea and the establishment last week-end of a new Clonea Beach Awareness Group are examples which should be followed by all.

NEW CHAIRMAN FOR COUNTY COUNCIL

The new Chairman for Waterford County Council is Councillor Michael Queally. A Fine Gael member of the Council for the past fifteen years Cllr. Queally hails from Grenan, Kill in East Waterford and was a member of the Senate up to 1987.

The Fianna Fail nominee, Cllr. Paddy Cahill, whom he defeated by 11 votes to 8, also hails from East Waterford and lives in Adamstown, Kilmeaden. He is one of the longest serving members of the Council having been first elected in 1960.

A feature of the Council's annual meeting held in Dungarvan last Monday was the full muster of 11 Fine Gael members while the Fianna Fail line-up was short of 3 of their total. The Council's two T.D.'s — Cllr. Jackie Fahey (F.F.) and Brian O'Shea (Lab.) were absent on other business concerning the formation of a government by the 26th Dail in Dublin — but also absent were Fianna Fail's Cllr. Seamus Dunphy who was stated to be in

England and Cllr. Sean Whelan.

The election of the outgoing Chairman, Cllr. Billy Kyne, as the Council's Vice-Chairman for the coming year was a well deserved tribute to the Labour man for the excellent manner in which he fulfilled his many duties as Chairman over the past year.

NOT ANOTHER ELECTION — OH NO!

While the County Councillors of Waterford were going about their business in a quiet and dignified manner on Monday evening, the politicians were gathered in Leinster House in Dublin trying to decide who or what form of government if any, was to evolve from the election of the 26th Dail.

While all claimed to be speaking with sincerity and in the interests of the country it came over loud and clear to the onlookers that not one of them was listening to the other.

Since the failure of the Dail to agree to the election of a Taoiseach at its first meeting on last Thursday, the horse trading that has followed, for no matter how it's denied that is all it is, has shown little or no consideration for the good of the country or for its international image. That those elected to the 26th Dail continue to squabble in the manner which they have been doing, can do absolutely no good for the economy of the country.

The Dail is due to meet again on tomorrow (Thursday) in a further attempt to resolve the impasse that has resulted from the entrenched attitudes adopted by the various political parties. Let us hope that a little common sense will have surfaced in the meantime and that instead of dog in the manger attitudes there will be a little give and take.

Let those elected in last month's election get the message that the people of Ireland expect them to form a government and let them get on with it. Another election will not solve anything that cannot now be solved with common sense and some give and take.

The solution is certainly not another election — oh no, not another — so soon!

DEASY MAKES HIS POINT

The dramatic happenings which marked the opening

of the new Dail on Thursday of last week put another political happening rather in the shade. This was Dungarvan's Deputy Austin Deasy's leadership challenge to Fine Gael leader Alan Dukes. In the previous week, Deputy Deasy's announcement that he was to mount such a challenge made the headlines in all the media but this was then overtaken by the subsequent drama in Leinster House.

However, the challenge was made when the Fine Gael Parliamentary Party held their first meeting and it took place following a vote of confidence in Mr. Dukes proposed by Deputy Leader John Burton and seconded by Peter Barry. Explaining the reasons why he was unhappy with the leader, Mr. Deasy said that Mr. Dukes' political judgment was suspect in the application of the Tallaght strategy. There was not sufficient consultation and he held that the party was seen to be too supportive of Fianna Fail.

Mr. Deasy made his points forcibly and without rancour and his speech struck a responsive chord with a number of members. In fact we have learned that Mr. Deasy was surprised at the support which his challenge had generated but we understand that he did not encourage this, pointing out that he merely wanted to make his point and he was satisfied that he had succeeded in doing this.

Incidentally before departing from the political scene of the 26th Dail, it is just as well to record that the only matter which the Deputies decided was the election of the Ceann Comhairle. Here the outgoing holder of the office, the Independent South Tipperary, T.D. Sean Treacy, Clonmel was elected by 87 votes to 78 for the Donegal North East, Fine Gael T.D. Paddy Harte.

Mr. Treacy was supported by Fianna Fail, W.P.'s and independents Tom Foxe and Tony Gregory while Fine Gael, Labour and Progressive Democrats together with Jim Kemmy (Indp.) and Roger Garland (Green) voted for Mr. Harte.

District Justice O'Connell then directed that the accused be further remanded in continuing custody to Dungarvan Court on July 12.

League Final Was A Huge Success



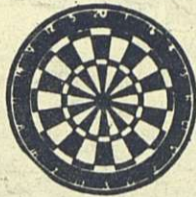

ROWING

Cappoquin/Cork Row Well At Henley

Cappoquin brothers Pat and Michael Murray, with Finbarr Heas and Pat Peillo, Cork Boat Club, rowing in the colours of Cork Boat Club to meet the entry requirements of Henley Royal Regatta, did their country proud at this 150th Regatta which had the greatest concourse of rowers from all corners of the globe.

A record entry, where elimination heats had to be rowed off in most events before the Regatta proper started, was the order of the day. Records also tumbled, timewise, due to the quality of the entries.

Cork Boat Club was the only Irish entry in the Britannia Cup for the coxed fours. Total entry was 55 crews.

After the elimination heats the field was down to 32 crews. Being an overseas entry, Cork did not have to row in these heats. On Wednesday they lined up against Bedford Rowing Club, England, and into a strong head wind led the English boys from the start and at half way had built up a considerable lead to win out easily at the line.

32 crews were now down to 16 and Cork drew an American crew, Dartmouth Rowing Club from the East Coast. These were a much heavier crew than the Irish lads, but this fact did not deter them as they got down to business off the start, leading the Americans by 1/3 length at the 1/4 mile post. Dartmouth did a do or die burn at this stage and drew level at the Barrier (2 minutes). The resolute Munster men would not let them gain any advantage and responded with a magnificent burn themselves which saw

them one length ahead at Fawley (half way).

The Americans literally ran out of gas trying to haul back the Irishmen and found themselves two lengths adrift at the 3/4 stage. Three lengths was the verdict on the line to Cork.

There were eight crews left — the quarter final stage. A win here would bring Cork to the semi-final stage, but the famed Leander Rowing Club stood between Cork and the last four. Leander Rowing Club is made up of the British International squad and legalises its members to compete at Henley. The Leander crew included two world silver medalists and all had been successful internationals. The British crew had an advantage of 20 lbs. weight per man, so a formidable task faced the intrepid Munster men.

Off the start the lighter Cork crew got a canvas ahead. Leander whittled this back to level at 1/4 mile. By the Barrier the strong British machine were a half length ahead but could not shake off this tenacious Irish crew. Their power and strength got Leander one length up at the half-way stage and 1 1/2 lengths at three-quarters way. Well, that's that! But no, those ruddy Irishman

are coming back!

Cork, with their now famed strong finish began to close on Leander approaching the enclosure with an estimated 50,000 people on their feet cheering both crews to the echo. One length to Leander was the verdict but they knew they were in one hell of a race.

Though they lost the race, Cork won the admiration of all for their very brave effort. Had this crew the same facilities and financial backing their semi-professional opponents had, the story could have been different.

Leander went on to defeat Harvard University, U.S.A. in the semi-final and Lea Rowing Club, who won this event over the last two years, in the final by over two lengths. Well done lads!

It's back to Irish waters for the Cappoquin/Cork crew where they will contest the national championship for coxed fours in Blessington on Friday week. Time of the final is 7 p.m. They will be renewing their rivalry with Neptune Rowing Club who won at Nottingham International Regatta recently, but a repeat of their blue riband winning performance should see the Munster men annex the crown. Good luck.

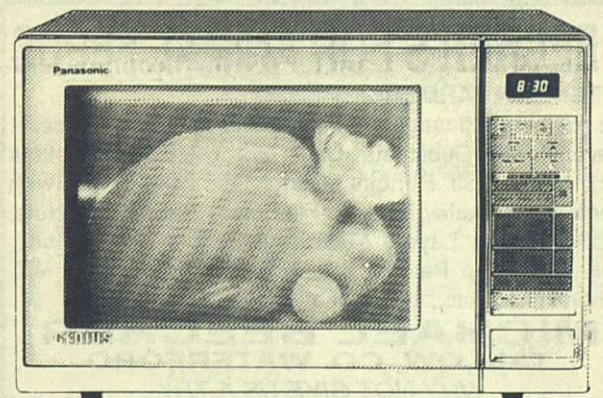

Apart from lugworm and crab which are most commonly used around these parts, there is an impressive range of alternatives to list some of these we make 4 categories. Name-ly shellfish, worms, crustaceans and baitfish.

Under shellfish you can use — razorfish, cockles, clams, scallops, mussels, whelks, limdets, winkles and oyster.

Worms include — rag-worm, lugworm, white rag and even garden worms.

Crustaceans can include — prawns, shrimps, crab and among fishbaits you can use — mackerel, herring, sandeels, rockfish, sprats, squid and pouting.

So there who needs mackerel, perhaps we can

organise a special competition sometime and confine it to one or two of the above baits. A novel idea! I'm sure all or most of the baits mentioned can be obtained locally.

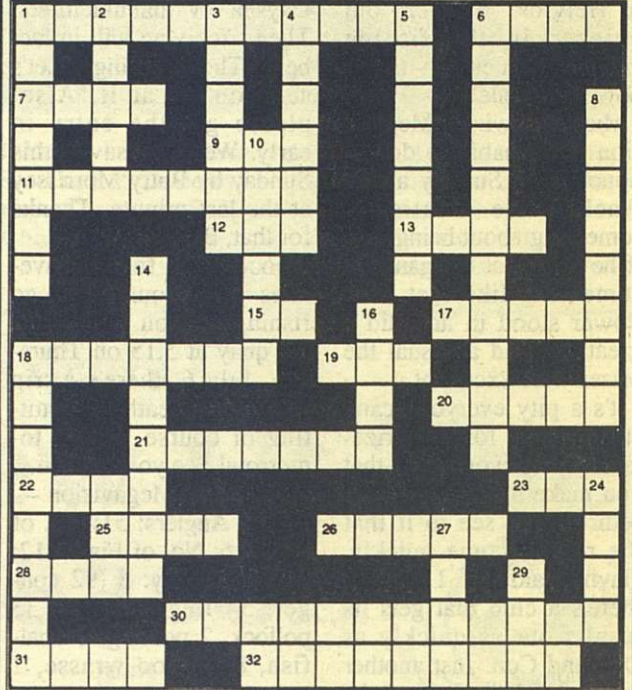

MUNSTER SENIOR HURLING FINAL

Waterford Outclassed In Disappointing Final

**TIPPERARY 0-26
WATERFORD 2-8**

Unfortunately we made the headlines for all the wrong reasons on Monday morning following our disappointing performance at Pairc Ui Caoimh in the provincial final against our far superior opponents, Tipperary on Sunday last.

It wasn't a good game of hurling and neither could it be described as a sporting contest. We had two players sent off by referee Willie Horgan and there were nine bookings during the game which produced more than a normal number of injuries to players on both sides.

The game itself was surrounded by a truly magnificent spectacle with tens of thousands of shirt-sleeved spectators who watched the match in brilliant sunshine and in temperatures well above seventy.

It was not a game that we will want to remember with any degree of pride and judging by the reaction of some of the tens of thousands who watched the game on television, they too were disappointed with what they saw in this free-ridden Munster final. Eighteen of the thirty-seven fouls in the game were committed in the first half, but I thought that the majority of the incidents of poor sportsmanship took place after the resumption during which nineteen frees were awarded. The fact that Waterford players were more culpable cannot be denied but the evidence of the Waterford injuries cannot be overlooked in this rough encounter.

EMERGENCY WARD

Tony Mansfield described the Waterford dressing room as being like an emergency ward in a hospital after the game with Timmy Sheehan having a broken nose, Jimmy Beresford having a broken hand, Ger Fitzpatrick having lacerations of the hand, Peter Walsh lacerations of the head, Liam O'Connor several cuts on his chest. Shane Ahearne has a broken finger. So obviously Tipperary committed their indiscretions more discreetly and the Waterford players, being more amateurish at this business, seem to have got most of the blame. It would be very wrong for me too, to try to get the idea across that we were not more to blame than Tipperary. Some of

the Waterford indiscretions were uncalled for and very much out of character from a team who came through three tough Munster championship encounters with the reputations for good sportsmanship enhanced.

It was obvious that some of the Waterford players didn't agree with the referee's application of the 'shoulder-charge' rule and that he was over severe on them. This allied to the fact that Tipp' started off with a point-a-minute scoring spree immediately on the resumption and extended their four points half-time lead to ten within six minutes of the restart, caused an amount of frustration that eventually led to some of the incidents.

Hopeful of having a more satisfactory result, I did a minute-by-minute note on the match, but now on reflection, I see little point in giving a detailed account of a game that was witnessed by ten or twelve thousand of our supporters and watched on television by everyone else who had an interest. One way or another all readers of our gaelic columns will have seen for themselves what happened at Pairc Ui Caoimh.

TO SUM UP

The many scribes who had perceived the gap in standards to be a big one, were proved right and going into the final, Waterford did have a mountain to climb. Tipperary proved that they are all that they are cracked up to be. In Munster, at least, they are a team apart and they look like keeping their Munster crown for the near future anyway. They fully deserve to win the All-Ireland and hopefully this will happen this year. Waterford went into the game as rank outsiders, but very determined to try their mightiest to win.

It was being presumed that Tipp' would try a demoralising act by getting as many early scores as possible and we thought that the match might move this way when Nicky English pointed from play in the first minute and Michael Cleary

had another a minute later. A foul by Liam O'Connor that needn't have been resulted in English getting his second. In the 7th minute a delightful Paudie Prender point was followed 2 minutes later by a Liam O'Connor score that left us a point down after eleven minutes, so the expected Tipperary early onslaught had not happened and supporters became more hopeful. The next five scores were for Tipp' and by the 21st minute and with an off form Noel Crowley having missed two scoreable frees it stood at 0-7 to 0-2. The gap was opening when Billy Sullivan brought back one Waterford point in the 22nd minute. Conal Bonner and Kieran Delahunty exchanged points and by the 26th minute when Shane Ahearne pointed a penalty shot and Ger Connors replaced Pat Murphy there was only four points between the teams and Delahunty had sent another scoreable free just wide. In the 29th minute Delahunty pointed a free but missed with a '65' in the 34th minute before Liam O'Connor's goal raised Waterford's hopes just on the stroke of half-time to leave us four points in arrears (0-12 to 1-5) at half-time.

EXPOSED

In the second half the gap in standards was exposed and the scoring gap widened to leave it 0-19 to 1-6 when Crowley was sent off in the 9th minute. In the 30th minute with the game gone well out of reach, Kieran Delahunty got our second goal to leave it 0-25 to 2-8 and after Byrne had

been sent off, Tipp' made it 26 for the fully deserving winners.

As I wrote at the start, it was a big disappointment for Waterford as in spite of the ratings given to us by all and sundry, we had hoped to do better. Everyone will now be asking, 'where do we go from here.' Perhaps, before going anywhere, there are a few points that we should remind ourselves of. Worse than this happened us before and we got over it. We should not, in our disappointment, forget the tremendous hours of pleasure and satisfaction given to us by the team this year in this Munster championship and when the dust has settled on this one and the critics have all had their say and when all the sore and broken bones and lacerations are better, Waterford will come again. A small county with limitations in numbers and in skills cannot afford to die and be buried because we are decisively beaten in a provincial final.

For this reason, I was pleased when I was told on Sunday night, that the selectors, had wisely decided to bring the team back together at Walsh Park on tonight, Wednesday for a talk on the game. They are not walking away from their disappointment and this is the right spirit after a defeat.

Weekend Fixtures

Still, a defeat for the senior champions, who have Shane Ahearne, Pat Ryan, Peter Walsh, Ger Fitzpatrick, Kevin Ryan of the county team in their line-up, would be a major shock. This game will be at Walsh Park.

TALLOW v. DUNHILL

A short few years ago, I would have written up this one as a 'cake walk' for Tallow, so great was the difference in standards. Now the difference in numbers between the clubs is the big factor in Dunhill's favour, since the Tallow club has been decimated by emigration due to lack of employment in the area. Dunhill's problem is that many of their stars are ageing and they are not finding it easy to field replacements.

Having lost so many fine players in recent times, one cannot see them doing well this year. They have already lost to Cappoquin by seven points and just managed a draw with Clonea. I doubt if they will get the points here on Sunday at the Fraher Field.

PORTLAW v. DUNGARVAN

Two clubs with a mountain to climb in the senior hurling championships if they are to hold out any hope of being involved at the knockout stages. Both were decisively beaten in the first couple of rounds, so with the loser of this one going nowhere, we can look forward to a great contest.

Both are also qualified for the semi-final of the Sargent Cup, so whatever the result they will be seen in opposition again very soon. I give Portlaw the vote to gain the two points in this

Now Noel Crowley has switched over to Ballygunner from Roanmore but this gain is of no benefit to them here as Crowley was sent off in the game at Cork on Sunday. Results

Experimental Hurling Rules

Following the receipt of observations from counties on the proposed rule changes in hurling, the following will be considered for decision by Central Council at their meeting on August 12th.

- 1 — Kicking the sliotar from the hand, to be prohibited, (Penalty — free puck from where the offence was committed);
- 2 — Hand passed scores to be prohibited, (Penalty — free puck where the offence occurred);
- 3 — That a no entry semi-circle, with a radius of 9.5m. from the centre of the 20 metre line be created.

This area to be an exclusion zone for all players, except the one taking a penalty shot or free kick resulting from a Category D offence within the large or small rectangle, (Penalty, defending player:— The penalty to be retaken if a score does not result. Penalty, attacking player:— Throw-in on 20 metre line where offence occurred.

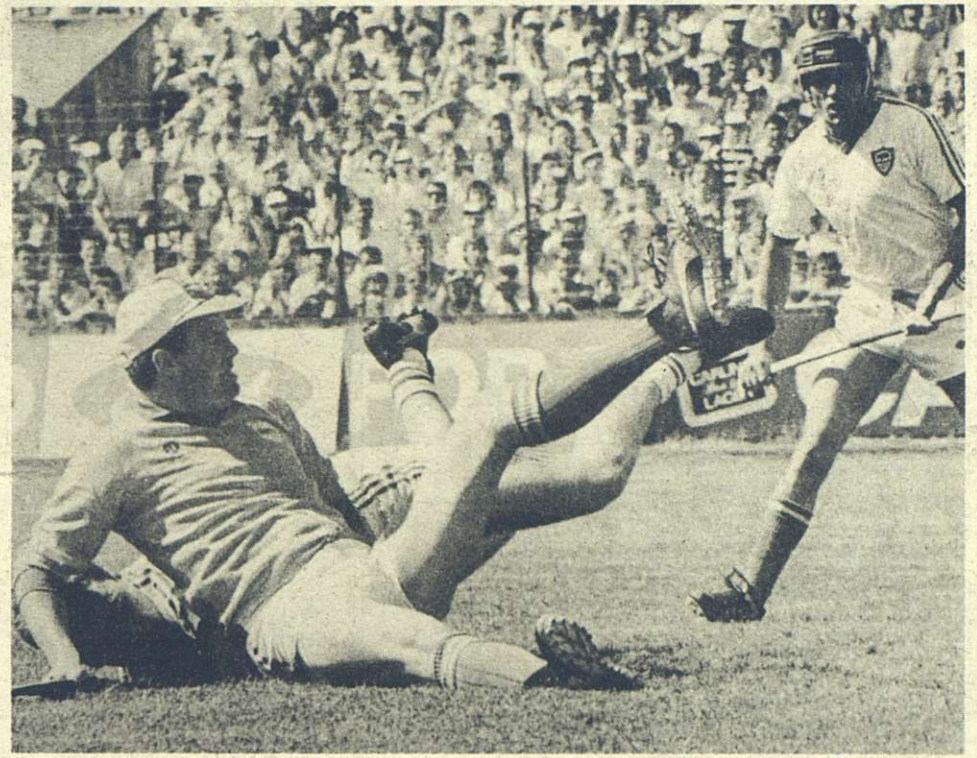

Development and Promotion of Hurling Standards

Coisde Iomana work Group set up by the Chairman of the Adult County Bord, Eamonn O Murchu have identified the following problem areas which need urgent attention in the County at all ages up to 18 years:

- (a) Skills.
- (b) Coaching at representative level.
- (c) Equipment.
- (d) Personnel to administer at club level.
- (e) Coaching at club level.
- (f) Referees.

Schemes have been drawn up which are designed to promote and improve the standards of GAA units in the county at underage level. These schemes will be financed on a 50:50 basis by Munster Council and Waterford County Board. The projects will be initiated under the auspices of Coisde Iomana and Bord na nOg at juvenile and minor level in the County with the objective of achieving success at inter-county underage in future years.

The following projects will take place in 1989 or early 1990.

- 1) — Primary School Skills — A Hurling Skills Awards Scheme is in operation for 52 Primary Schools in the County. This competition takes place every year and is organised by the Primary Schools Association in East and West Waterford.
- 2) — Summer Camps For Under 8, 10, 12, 14 and 16 at Club Level in West Waterford — Following the success of the Colum Bonnar Scheme in East Waterford, it was decided to temporarily appoint a qualified person in Recreational Management. Donnach O'Domnaill specialises in coaching of hurling and has already visited some

primary schools in the West. He will visit every one of the 18 hurling clubs at least once for a full day during the summer holidays, where he will coach groups of 15-20 girls and boys for 1.5 hours per group. Maximum benefits will derive because clubs must provide supervision by an adult during the sessions.

3) — Recruitment and Courses For Referees — Any person who would like to act as a referee at juvenile level will be encouraged to participate in a formal course run by the National Referees Committee. Both beginners and established referees from both divisions in the county are invited to attend this course which will be run in September. An assessment of each course will be carried out at the end of the course and a referees kit will be presented to successful participants.

4) — Leadership Courses — To improve the standards in administration of clubs it is intended to organise courses for Chairman, Secretary, Treasurers and PRO's of underage clubs. This will help and guide them to carry out their duties more efficiently.

It will also encourage young people who don't play the game to join clubs at administration level and will release former players who can then help in coaching the youth. Hurling standards would improve if the organisation of the club was carried out by Club Officers and this

would leave more time for coaching by those people with special skills for coaching, i.e. former players.

5) — Intensive coaching for Divisional Under-age Teams at Under 14, 15, 16, 17 — The East and West panels contested the Munster semi-final at under 16 last year when the East won the Munster final. This year the West team were beaten narrowly by East Cork in the semi-final. The Under 14 County panel won the "B" Section of the Tony Forristal Inter-County tournament last year.

Much attention has been given to these squads in the past and now these teams will be kept together and the continuation of their development through coaching in skills will take place under 15 and 17 years.

Transport to training and matches in addition to providing equipment for these teams is expensive but this expense is seen as a very good investment for the future of hurling in County Waterford, who, hopefully, will be rewarded with minor, under 21 and senior titles in the future years.
