A blistering attack against the IDA and a Dungarvan based pharmaceutical plant was mounted by Fianna Fail Councillor Jackie Fahey T.D. at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan last Monday. The attack came during a discussion on a motion proposed by Cllr. Garry O'Halloran, Clashmore, which asked if the County Manager was happy that no health hazard would be caused to the people of West Waterford and to the animals, crops and fish stocks in the area by the proposed pharmaceutical development by Merrell Dow at Killeagh.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

COME, FATHER IS CALLING

In the first of last Sunday's readings Isaiah tries to console the people. They had returned to their homeland after a long captivity, and whilst their return was marked with great rejoicing, it was only to find that their glowing expectations were not matched with the stark reality. They were disappointed. They grumbled over the problems they encountered, and the work to be

Isaiah is trying to win them back to God. He assures them that, with God's peace flowing like a river in their midst, joy, laughter, song and prosperity would be their blessings. Isaiah wanted them to base their lives on a peaceful relationship with God, and thereby help to create a happy and a great nation.

St. Paul in the second reading tells us, from his own experience, how to build a fruitful union with God. And, may I add, it is a message that is hammered out again and again in Holy Scripture. Like Paul, we must shoulder our cross and follow Christ. It means, we must give wholehearted service to God by literally devoting all we think, say or do in His honour. There's no time for hesitation. Do remember, it is God who calls. He loves us. He wants us to follow Him. Paul responded and found himself on the road to peace and happiness. He did not hesitate when that road brought him face to face with suffering. Of course, he found it hard, but, as he said, "he was more than happy to be asked to share in the Passion of Christ."

The Gospel emphasises that

same message, and directs us not only to seek peace through service, but also to join the Apostles in sharing that blessing with others. That peace Jesus speaks about is that same peace with which He blessed the Magdalene. Having pardoned her sins, the Lord told her to go and sin no more, and to rejoice and share her blessing with her neighbours.

I'm going to relate an old story. You may have heard it before, but it will still help you to understand the fruits that flow when one is at peace and in love with God. It was Patrick's first day at school. His brother James, who was eight, kept a watchful eye on him. When the bell rang to signal classes were finished, James was there to take Patrick under his wing. They lived on a small hill farm. It was about one mile from the school. When they came near home the way was now uphill, and little Patrick began to cry: "I'm tired." James gave him a wee hug, and got him to climb on his back. Just as James started to move, a neighbour passed and said: "the load is too much." James replied: Oh! sir, it is not a load, it is my brother." Of course, James found it difficult to carry Patrick, but, because he loved him, it was a labour of love.

Jesus loves us. He is our brother. When we were little, and weighed down with sin. He rushed to take the load off our shoulders. He found it heavy, but despite falling, he bore it all the way to Calvary. Then, he said: "I love you little brothers. I must leave you now. Father has called. You have now no need to fear, if you follow the road bounded by the Commandments. Avoid all

the left turns. The Sacraments will provide your needs, and, should you require help, cry out and the Father will come. Courage, you have not far to go. Father will be waiting." VALLEY OF

TEARS

We live in a valley of tears, but it is up to ourselves to follow the Lord's way. Like James, because we love our brother Jesus, we humbly accept the cross the Carpenter has made for us, and we promise, with God's help, to bear it in His name. We know it will not be easy, but, we also know that doing it as a labour of love will extract the sting. Believe me, the burden would be dead weight if borne under any other name. Martin Luther King was murdered because he preached God's justice. He dealt beautifully with carrying the Cross when he said: "I have seen too much hate to want to hate, and I have seen hate on the faces of too many sheriffs, white councillors and klansmen to want to hate; and every time I see it, I say to myself, hate is too great a burden to bear."

Sin is hate, it is a destroyer. It banishes peace. and, it is deadly in its evil effects. Putting it bluntly, many, far too many, seek a good time, and they are not concerned if it means ditching God. Judging from what is happening all over the world, the way from here to eternity would seem to be littered with failures! I know as well as you that it is hard when things get tough, but that is the time to fight for your life. We are pilgrims and we must not stray. We've only to look at our compass, which always reads: "Be careful... God is everything.

Hospitals C.E.O. Says Statement **Was Distorted**

"sixteen local hospitals, the majority of them at county level, should be closed in the long-term rationalisation of the hospital services, according to the Chief Officer of Comhairle na n-Ospideal, the statutory advisory body to the Government on hospitals." I wish to clarify that I never made such a statement. What I said, in response to a specific question about which hospitals have had question marks over their future, is reported in the body of the

article. I made it clear to the reporter that this information was common knowledge since the publication in 1986 of the Fitzgerald Report. In the headline and in the opening sentence, this factual response is distorted to produce an erroneous statement of a sensationalist nature, attributed both to me personally and to Comhairle na n-Ospideal and giving the impression that the matter was of recent origin. This piece of reporting was subsequently converted in another newspaper (Irish Independent) on the following day to a call for further hospital closures on my part, thus further distorting the original distortion. I issue this statement in order to set the record straight.



Salmon Fishermen Protest On Youghal Bridge

Over 100 angry drift net salmon fishermen from the Clashmore-Ardmore areas blockaded Youghal Bridge for most of an hour as they mounted a fiery protest on Thursday last to highlight the continuing refusal of the government to legalise the use of monafilament nets for salmon fishing.

At about 1 p.m. the angry fishermen from the Blackwater together with their supporters moved on to the busy Youghal Bridge and for most of the succeeding hour mounted a blockade which brought all traffic using the bridge to a stand-

The protesters were accompanied by Rev. Fr. Michael Reid, Ardmore, who stated that all those engaged in driftnet salmon

fishing in West Waterford and East Cork were "small men" with families. "Between them," said Fr. Reid, "they haven't even a decent car and the politicians have failed them totally in their efforts to reach a compromise on the use of monafilament nets."

During the blockade at least one angry motorist tried to get through but he abandoned the attempt when fishermen sat on the

bonnet of his car. Gardai were on duty at the Bridge but did not intervene.

Taking part in the protest were Clashmore fisherman Jimmy Roche and his wife, Mary, whose fishing trawler, the "Cally Marie," was tied up and moored near the bridge. They stated that the eight year old trawler had not been in use since last March because they cannot fish without monafilament nets. Mrs. Roche pointed out that the trawler had cost £100,000 and the monthly repayments to be made to An Bord Iascaigh Mhara amounted to £950 while in addition they had to find

another £1,000 to pay an annual insurance premium. She told us, "we have four children and because the monafilament net is illegal for driftnet salmon fishing we find ourselves up to our necks in debt."

LEGAL TO BUY -ILLEGAL TO USE

Jimmy Roche said that it was ironic that he could freely and legally purchase monafilament nets on which the government re-ceives VAT and yet if he were to use it in order to make a living he would run the risk of being sent to jail because it was illegal to do

When the protest was finally called off, gardai got the traffic moving freely again in a short time. However the fishermen pledged that they would continue their protests and take their case right up to Leinster House, if necessary.

Later in the afternoon, Fishery Officers of the Southern Region Fisheries Board were prevented from removing monafilament nets anchored in Ballycotton harbour. Two fishery patrol boats were spotted in Ballycotton Bay by fishermen returning from the Youghal Bridge protest who then sailed out and blocked the removal of the nets, forcing the officers to

COUNTRY STILL ON THE BRINK?

As we pen these few lines on Tuesday evening, the Fianna Fail and Progressive Democrats Parties are still engaged in a game of brinkmanship while the country is left without a Government.

Throughout the week resistance to giving the PD's any representation on a Cabinet, not to mention two seats, has been building up within Fianna Fail at Constituency levels. However negotiations have proceeded but up to late on Tuesday afternoon there still appeared to be quite a divergence of viewpoints to be bridged, not to mention the crucial question of Cabinet representation.

While we have been assured by the leaders of both parties that the good of the country is the matter of paramount importance motivating both, it certainly looks as if personal and party interests are not lagging far behind. Some of the comments coming up from the constituencies smack of the old civil war bitterness. This is a great

SUNNIEST JUNE FOR TWELVE YEARS OR MORE

The continuing long spell of dry sunny weather was the source of discussion at our 'local' in Dungarvan last Sunday evening when the question was posed as to whether it was ever matched in the past and if so, when.

The query sent us to ferret through our reference books looking for the required information and from one of these we learn that the month of June just past was generally the sunniest June since the 1975 to 1977 period although according to the sunshine totals for the month recorded at Cork Airport, it was the sunniest June since 1962.

During the month, sunshine totals ranged from over 225 hours near the south and east coasts to 168 hours on the Mayo coast. The sunniest days were recorded on June 1, 6, 13, 14, 17 to 21, 27 and 29

and between June 14 and 24, Rosslare had more than 10 hours of sunshine each day.

It may be of interest to readers to learn what the main points about the annual course of the sun in these latitudes are:

— In late June the sun rises north of east and sets some 17 hours later at a point in the northwestern sector of the observer's horizon circle. It's altitude at the maximum is about 60° and is achieved at solar noon.

— In late December the sun describes a smaller arc as it rises in the southeast and sets some 7 to 8 hours later in the southwest having a maximum altitude of less than 15°.

— On March 21 and September 21, called the Spring and Autumn equinoxes because the sun rises due east and sets due west giving a solar day of 12 hours, the maximum altitude is about 37°.

The sunshine averages in the period from 1951 to 1980 according to the records show that:

— May has the highest average sunshine except in some places near the south and southeast where June is sunnier than May.

December is the month of least sunshine.

 Coastal areas are sunnier than neighbouring inland areas.

— Eastern and southern areas get more sun than northern and western regions, the southeast being the sunniest area in the country - hence the tourist slogan: the sunny southeast!

— Mountain areas have got less sunshine than nearby lowlands. The leeside or sheltered side also has the advantage over the exposed slope.

Having read this, perhaps you are now a little wiser about the sun.

ON SENATE TRAIL

Aged 83 years, Dr. Counahan headed a highly successful law practice in Waterford City for a long number of years. As State Solicitor for Waterford for a long period, Dr. Counahan was well and popularly known in Dungarvan where he attended sittings of the District and Circuit Courts.

It was with much regret also that we learned of the recent death of Mr. John Baston, Passage East. John was a member of a highly popular family whose name will never be forgotten in the annals of Waterford hurling through the legendary Capt Vin Baston who played centre back on Waterford's All-Ireland winning team of 1948.

The late John Baston was well-known in Dungarvan and West Waterford as a member of the teaching staff of the County Vocational Education Committee up to his retirement and his passing will be a source of much regret for all who knew this kind and unassuming man. DANGEROUS TRAFFIC ON TALLOWHILL

The persistence of heavy vehicles in using the steeply inclined Tallowhill road was referred to once again at the monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council in Dungarvan last Monday. As on previous occasions, the matter was again spotlighted this time by Tallow Councillor Willie McDonnell.

Cllr. McDonnell recalled that when he drew attention to the dangers caused by heavy lorries using the hill by-pass in preference to the more gradual sweep two years ago it was decided to have warning notices prohibiting vehicles in excess of two tons from using the route erected at the top and bottom. Although the Council had erected these signs he said that big lorries continued to drive down

the hill at high speeds. "Something will have to be done to put a stop to this, otherwise there will be a very bad accident there", he told his Council colleagues.

The County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, then pointed out that before the warning signs had been erected by the Council it was the Garda authorities who had specified the form they should take and it was a matter for the gardai to implement the restrictions laid down by the signs. He added that he would take the matter up with the gardai to see that these restrictions were enforced.

We fully endorse Cllr. McDonnell's call to put a stop to large heavily laden vehicles using this short cut as we are well aware from our own experiences in driving over this road that not only heavy lorries but tankers pass up and down there on a regular daily basis. Without doubt they create a major hazard for smaller, lighter vehicles using the road not to mention the danger they must present to pedestri-

TIDAL FLOWS AFFECT BEACH CLEANING

Earlier this summer members of Dungarvan Urban Council agreed to have a cleaning operation carried out by Council workers on Abbeyside strand. The main target was the deposit of seaweed which stretched along the beach especially in the vicinity familiarly known by locals as "The Minister's Cove."

The cleaning operation was, in fact, carried out and for about 24 hours, the beach was perfectly clean and free from seaweed. Then, overnight, it all reappeared again and the beach was almost as bad as ever.

On inquiry we were informed by the Town Clerk that the problem arises from the alignment of the promenade running from the 'New Road' down towards the Church. It seems that when this was built years ago it was placed further out than the existing bulwarks and this then resulted in a change of the tidal flows as they fill and ebb. This, in turn has meant that seaweed washed in by filling tides is not swept back out to seas as the levels drop and hence the problem as it now ex-

THE BOATMEN OF KERRY

Our choice for the ballad corner this week is one called "The Boatmen Of Kerry," and although it must be comparatively old, we must admit that we never heard it before. It was only while looking through a collection of Kerry ballads recently that we came across it. The reference in it to "Brandon's steep highlands" would indicate that it refers to the fishermen on the north western tip of the Dingle peninsula where Mount Brandon (called after St. Brendan, the Navigator) is a major landmark.

Above the dark waters the seagulls are screaming,
Their wings in the sunlight are glancing and gleaming;
With keen eyes they're watching the herring in motion,
As onward they come from the wild restless ocean.
Now, praise be to God, for the hope that shines o'er us,
When safely returning with our hookers well laden,

RECENT DEATHS

MR. JOHN O'BRIEN

The death of Mr. John O'Brien, Kereen and Bewley, Cappoquin, took place at Waterford Regional Hospital on Sunday, July 2, following a short period of hospitalisation. Aged 70 years, John farmed for many years in the Aglish area where his agricultural knowledge and expertise made him a well known figure who was widely respected among the farming fraternity. All his life he was deeply interested in horses and show jumping in particular and he attended many of the top shows, and the sale of one of his top jumpers to the Army was a sporting landmark in his life.


Successful Strawberry Season



Clonmel And Cashel Hospitals To Be Closed?

Fears have been mounting in South Tipperary that Clonmel and Cashel, battling with each other in a campaign to have a single sector hospital for the region located in their respective towns, could both lose out — to the new Regional Hospital at Ardkeen, Waterford.

For several years past the neighbouring towns of Cashel and Clonmel have waged an uncompromising, and oft times bitter, battle in support of their campaigns to have a single sector hospital in South Tipperary located in their respective towns.

But now, in a new and dramatic development, the very real danger has emerged that both towns will end up losers, and that hospital services for the entire region will be transferred to Waterford's new multi million pound Regional Hospital presently under construction.

The Government's statutory advisory body on hospitals, Comhairle na nOispideal, has mooted the closure of sixteen more hospitals nationwide.

Ironically, the recommendation is in line with the warnings given by the leaders of the Cashel and Clonmel hospital campaigns as they continued to 'slog it out', unrelentingly in their internal fight on the issue.

But now both camps are to intensify their campaigns, and the scene is being set for a long and bitter battle to save the hospitals in both South Tipp towns.

INTERNAL PROBLEM

Already the South Eastern Health Board has come down on the side of Cashel as the location for the sector hospital. Now, instead of a fight on that front, it may well be a fight to keep the doors of St. Joseph's

Hospital in Clonmel and Our Lady's County Hospital in Cashel open.

A leading member of the Cashel hospital campaign committee, Mr. John Hassett, has now called for a coming together of Cashel and Clonmel to find a solution to their own internal problem.

"Otherwise", he has

warned, "we will both lose out and all of South Tipperary will be left without a hospital in the long term".

Mr. Hassett said the urgency of having a sector hospital in either Cashel or Clonmel is greater than ever following the Comhairle na nOispideal recommendation.

FISHERMEN PROTEST

Driftnet fishermen from West Waterford and East Cork made their first step forward to highlight the Government's continuing refusal to legalise monofilament nets by blocking

traffic for three-quarters of an hour on Youghal Bridge last Thursday. Monofilament nets can be purchased legally and V.A.T. is paid to the government on these nets, yet fishermen are prosecuted for using them. If the use of a legal length of monofilament net within the fishing licence laws is not allowed what future is there for these men, many of whom have borrowed for boats and equipment. If some major changes are not made by the Government, fishermen, some presently living below the bread line, will be unable to exist. Is it the Government's plan to terminate traditional driftnet fishing on the Blackwater? Without monofilament nets this is the only option left to these fishermen.



THE MUNSTER **HURLING FINAL**

Throughout last week, little else was spoken about in the county and wherever one moved, the same question was being asked 'what did you think of the match on Sunday?' In most cases the clever guy spoke first, wanting to know what you thought before committing himself. In practically every conversation on the matter, the subject of television came up and it was a sign of the times that almost everyone was able to talk about having seen it in video.

The official side of things in relation to the final was made known in a statement issued by county chairman Eamon Murphy at the monthly meeting of the Board on Tuesday. Talking to the ordinary supporter, it was refreshing to find that very many were able to take an intelligent and balanced view of the match and express themselves in a clear and logical manner. The general view was that a few players went overboard and that the referee was right in punishing the players who were involved in the incidents of misbehavior. Practically everyone was quick to condemn the players who behaved unsportingly and many believed that if these players had kept cool and not become frustrated, our second half display would have been better and Tipperary's winning margin would have been much smaller. Everyone agreed that Tipp. were the better team and fully deserved to win.

What was a source of great annoyance and disgust to almost every supporter of Waterford, was the over-severe media treatment of the game and the unfair and in many cases, irresponsible comments by a number of journalists. I suppose a few of the scribes who did 'go to town on Waterford's players and selectors' saw this as an opportunity of giving their readers a break from their regular Monday morning articles on G.A.A. games, most of which are boring anyway.

What was exceptionally disgusting to all Waterford people was to see one or two of these journalists resort to sheer scandalmongering and in the cheapest form of journalism set about destroying the characters of the Waterford players and mentors. For the past 30 years or so, the "Irish Independent" was my morning paper, but I recently changed over to another because the Independent Editor allowed a certain Nenagh-born journalist the freedom to indulge in extravagant criticism and ridicule of sporting events which had taken place on the previous day. Many people share my judgment of this individual.

Last week I was given cuttings of that newspaper with the most unfair criticism of the Waterford team manager, Tony Mansfield, the other selectors Phil Fanning and Ollie Wilkinson and the team. His article in the Wednesday edition was even more biased and irresponsible than the Monday rubbish which he wrote about the game. I am sure that someone has since told him that his description of the scene in the Tipperary dressing room after the game, was far more embarrassing to Tipperary than it was to Waterford. I know of one person who was present in the room and who laughed when he was told

what the article said about the 'dressing-room soaked in blood'.

Then having completed his character-assassination of Mansfield and the others, he proceeded to instruct the Munster Council as to how they should deal with the referee's report when it comes to hand and God and Heaven help them if their decisions fail to fall in line with this man's demands.

Of course this was not the first occasion on which this man's imagination was allowed to run riot about a sporting event and I'm sure that other groups and other sports will have their tale to tell also.
