

BAHDY TURNS ONHAUGHDY

And Quits F.F.

A row which has been smouldering for a number of years under the surface between long serving Fianna Fail Deputy for Waterford, Mr. Jackie Fahey and the Taoiseach and Leader of the Fianna Fail Party, Mr. Charles J. Haughey, burst into open confrontation at the week-end when the Dungarvan based T.D. who lived formerly at Lyreanearla, Clonmel, withdrew his support from Mr. Haughey and quit the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party.

That the row stems primarily from a personality clash was admitted by Mr. Fahey in an interview on Radio Eireann news bulletins on Monday when he declared that as soon as Mr. Haughey was removed from the Party leadership he would immediately reapply for membership of the FF Parliamentary Party.

The sequence of events started on Friday night last when a largely attended meeting of the Waterford Comhairle Dail Ceanntair held in Lawlors Hotel, Dungarvan passed a vote of "no confidence" in Mr. Haughey's leadership and called for his immediate resignation as leader of the

The proposal was made by Paddy Murphy and was decided on a show of hands. All the delegates who supported the motion mounted scathing attacks on Mr. Haughey condemning the deal which had been approved by him with the Progressive Democrats.

At the same meeting a further resolution was passed calling on the Taoiseach, Mr. Haughey not to include the former Waterford Progressive Democrat T.D., Martin Cullen, among his nominations to the Senate.

LETTER OF RESIGNATION

Deputy Fahey's letter of resignation from the Parliamentary Party was sent to the Taoiseach on Saturday. In it he referred to previous correspondence between them and to their many meetings in the comparatively recent past. He also referred to the many u-turns taken by the Party on various issues and in particular, the coalition agreement with the Progressive Democrats.

The letter then went on to tell Mr. Haughey that it was obvious that his animosity to the writer had not changed over many weeks and months and that the coalition with the PD's and the agreement arrived at with them had proved to be the last straw that finally brought about his decision to resign.

In later interviews Deputy Fahey referred to what he described as Mr. Haughey's "shabby treatment" of him going back for several years. He said that Mr. Haughey had unfairly held him responsible for much of the internal party wrangling that had so seriously split the Fianna Fail organisation in Waterford in past years. "Not once since then", said Mr. Fahey, "has Mr. Haughey shown that his animosity towards me has been dropped and my decision to leave the Parliamentary



Party and take my seat in the Dail as an Independent is exclusively down to him"

Mr. Fahey also denied that his resignation had come because he had not been appointed to a Junior Ministry. He said that he wouldn't have accepted one at the stage they were allocated if one had been offered him as the turnabout

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

LISTEN AND LEARN

In the first reading the story depicts the Lord visiting Abraham. Abraham is unaware of the identity of his visitor, but he nevertheless extends a warm welcome with all the trappings of oriental hospitality. It was only after they'd eaten, the Lord asked "where is Sarah your wife", and going on He said "I shall visit you again next year . . . and your wife will have a son." Abraham's eyes were immediately opened, and he realised it was the Lord. Undoubtedly, hospitality is important, but the emphasis would seem to be on hearing the word, and believing. In that sense the reading would dovetail into the Gospel story.

St. Paul in the second reading continues to remind us (he was in prison when he wrote this letter) that he rejoiced to make a prayer of his sufferings. He reminds us that the Church has to live and to endure set-backs and sufferings in order to fulfil God's plan of redemption. Paul is telling us that by offering his tribulations to God he is thereby sharing in the work of promoting God's message. This reading has been selected to assure us that our works, our daily tasks and our trials can all be used to serve God, and promote His word.

The Gospel knits into the hospitality theme, but the main thrust is focused on the importance of listening to God's word. It relates a visit the Lord made to some friends at Betany, which poses questions for ourselves. Has the Lord called to see you? If He has, did you make Him welcome. Or, when He knocked, did you tell Him, you were just going out? A wee point struck me, when I read, "Mary sat, talked and listened to the Lord, whilst Martha set about preparing a meal." Surely, that's how we'd behave in our own homes. You certainly would not say to your visitors, wait here, and all the family rush off to get a meal. I know that this is only a minor point in the story, but it is worth considering in view of the general lack of respect and of good manners that is so prevalent today. Look at the lack of concern for private and public property. People who throw shop-trolleys into the sea may think it is fun: God does not. In the Isle of Man one would be flogged for such behaviour. However, they do not have to flog people any more, because, it would seem, the punishment fits the crime! People who ignore God's law are piling up judgment against themselves from whence there is no escape.

I am perhaps an optimist to even suggest good manners, when one


considers the way God is treated. We read about Jesus visiting friends. His desire is to visit all His children, if they would but welcome Him. He longs to abide in your home. He'll be delighted if you ask Him to visit you, and He'll remain as your guest as long as you wish. Luke provides us with the information on how best to welcome and foster a lasting relation-

There is a comparison of service portrayed in the Gospel. Martha is busy preparing the meal, and she is annoyed that her sister does not help. She even says to Jesus: "it is unfair". Jesus does not condemn her form of service, but He gently tells her that Mary's contribution of listening to the word is nearer to His heart. St. Luke does stress the importance of listening to and living by the word; and he implies that other services are secondary. After all, the mission of the Church is to spread the good news,. And, whilst we are all aware of the value of expressing our love through good works, we also know that such fruits flow from following the word.

SPEAKING THROUGH THE GOSPEL

Jesus is speaking to you in the Gospel. He says: "He'd like to come and visit you." He wants you to sit, open your heart and listen to Him. Often, because we are so involved with other affairs, we do not hear Him knocking. The door is sometimes opened, and then banged in His face. Jesus will never impose Himself on anyone. He will only go where there's a welcome. He may present Himself in the guise of one who is sick or hungry or in need. He made it clear, what you do for them, you do for Him. You are bound to share your blessings: It is His law. So, when you are asked to help the S.V.P. etc., express thanks to God you are able to help, and His blessings will fall upon you.

The fact that Government makes certain provision from taxes does relieve us of part of our duty. I said part, because "the poor will always be with us." The S.V.P. will tell you that they would not be operating if the need did not exist. Give and it will be given back in full measure. You will never outdo God's generosity. Hospitality flows from respect for God, for when God is honoured, all these other things fall into place, and respect and good will are the order of the day. Never, never be ashamed to be a true son

August 1989 marks the 20th anniversary of the deployment of British troops on the streets of Northern Ireland. The August 19th March Committee has been set up to organise a national march in Dublin on 29th August to mark this event.

For the twelve months prior to the troops going in, the whole foundation of the Northern state had been shaken as a result of the activities of the Civil Rights Movement. For over 50 years, the Unionist government in the 6-County state had practised blatant discrimination against the minority Catholic population in terms of jobs, housing and access to health, education and other services. The Civil Rights Movement demanded an end to discrimination and enjoyed massive popular support. The very basis on which the state was founded however — "a Protestant state for a Protestant people" - meant that it relied on discrimination for its very existence. The reponse to the for basic Civil Rights was near-pogroms against the Catholic population. Over the 48-hour period from 12th to 14th August 1969, for example, over 1,300 Catholic families were forced to flee their homes as a result of mob attacks which were backed up by the notorious B-Specials. The British army was

sent in on August 14th '69 - as a temporary measure to "restore normality". However the only "normality" which could be restored was the normality of sectarian discrimination.

later it is clear that rather than solving the "Irish problem" the British army is in fact the root cause of that problem. Numerous "political initiatives" have been tried and failed. The only solution which has not been considered is the withdrawal of the troops.

In Britain, more and more people are adding their voices to the call for the army to be brought home, as is evident by the growing support for the "Time To Go" campaign. Surely

20 years and 3,000 deaths we here in Ireland have an even greater onus on us to address the situation in the North-Eastern part of our island. The march called for August 19th gives us all an opportunity to address the question of how the army should be removed and the type of Ireland we wish to see in the future.

No Need For Ramps At **Dungarvan Car** Park

Following complaints by residents in Friary Street about speeding cars exiting from the public car park on to the street made to a previous meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council, the Town Engineer, Mr. George Taylor stated in the course of a report submitted to the July monthly meeting of the Council held last week that he had investigated the situation at the entrance to the car park and saw no need for speed ramps as had been suggested.

Mr. Taylor stated that as the exit was on to a narrow street any great speed could not be achieved. As an alternative he suggested the painting of a stop sign on the road and reducing the width of the entrance to allow only a single line to enter and exit.

The report added that the elimination of parking too close to the footpath could be achieved by a raised kerb or forming flower beds at each end of the en-

The report was unanimously adopted by the members.

Know Your Rights

Q. — I have been unemployed for the past two years and am receiving Unemployment Assistance. There is a possibility that I can get Sunday Work in the catering trade. Will this affect my assistance?

A. — Sunday is not regarded as a day of employment under the Social Welfare Acts. An exception to this would be certain employments where the normal working week included Sunday working e.g. nursing, publican.

If this Sunday work is insurable employment then your Unemployment Assistance will not be affected. If is not insurable, i.e. your employer doesn't deduct PRSI or tax and you do it on a contract or self-employed basis, then any money you earn will be counted as means and it could affect your rate of Assistance.

The important thing to remember is that you must inform the exchange before you do this work and as you can see it is to your advantage that it be insurable employment.

Q. — I have been employed by the same firm for 12 years. Following major surgery I have been out sick for two months. Last week I was given redundancy notice and told that my job was going to be contracted out. I think this is just an excuse to sack me and suspect that they might wait a few months and then replace me. What are my rights?

A. — If you are being let go and not replaced then this is a redundancy situation and you can be made redundant while you are out sick. You will be entitled to your statutory redundancy payments. Any holiday pay due to you and payment in lieu of notice (if you get less than the six weeks notice due for your length of

If they take on somebody else to replace you then it is not a redundancy situation and you could take a case for unfair dismissal to a Rights Commissioner or to the Employment Appeals Tribunal, Davitt House, 50/60, i Mespil Road, Dublin 4. You can also do this if your suspicions prove correct and you are replaced after a few months.

New Abbot Elected For Mount Melleray

Rev. Eamon Fitzgerald, an Irish monk presently working in Nigeria, has been chosen as the next Abbot to head the Cistercian Community at Mount Melleray, Cappoquin.

Fr. Fitzgerald, who has been working for the past two years as chaplain to a Cistercian community of nuns in the West African state, takes up the post left vacant by the departure of the Right Rev. Justin Mc-Carthy.

Fr. McCarthy's resignation, clouded in rumour that he was leaving to marry, was confirmed yesterday to be for health reasons. The Prior in Mount Melleray explained that Fr. McCarthy, originally from south County Tipperary, had been totally exhausted, both "physically and mentally" after nine years as Abbot.

The Prior said that Fr. McCarthy had made the decision to resign only after much deliberation; that he was a quiet man with a timid nature who found the strains of office "too great." He said Fr. Mc-Carthy had taken a year's leave of absence, was staying with a sister and intended to return to Mount Melleray.

The Community of monks, said the Prior, were grateful for the work done by Fr. McCarthy and wished him well. Fr. Mc-Carthy, said the Prior, was the fifth Abbot to resign. The others had done so for similar reasons, or due to old age, he explained.

Fr. McCarthy's successor, Fr. Eamon Fitzgerald is a 43-year-old Dubliner. He entered the community in Mount Melleray in 1966; was professed a monk in 1988, and was ordained a priest in 1974. He holds a degree in spirituality from Rome and served as novice master from the year 1981

to 1966. He was Prior from 1986 to July 1987 when he responded to a request from his superiors and departed for Nigeria to take up the post as Chaplain.

Fr. Fitzgerald's term of office is for six years but he may go forward for the position of Abbot again after that.

The election of the new Abbot took place on Wednesday of last week but the announcement was held over until Thursday when Fr. Fitzgerald could be contacted in Nigeria. The occasion was presided over by the Abbot of Mount Melleray in Brittany, France, who flew in through Cork Airport especially for the election.

Reorganisation Of Urban **Council Staff**

In the course of a report on the reorganisation of staff within Dungarvan Urban Council submitted to the July monthly meeting of the Council, the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley pointed out that since 1987, the total of 10 employees has been reduced to the current number of 7, which included the Town Clerk, 2 Assistant Staff Officers and one each Clerk Typist, Receptionist, Revenue Collector and Rent Collector.

"This," the report stated, 'shows clearly that the Council has lost 3 permanent posts within the last two years, one clerk typist and one clerical officer by voluntary redundancies and one clerk typist on marriage gratuity grounds." It added that this reduction has had the effect of persons in lower grades acting in position of responsibility above their grading and undertaking an extra work load to ensure that the office worked to a satisfactory level of efficiency.

Praising the staff for their efforts, the Manager's report then stated: "I am pleased with the level of production and I must pay tribute to the staff for the work shouldered by them and particularly in recent months from the transition of computerisation which is now nearly complete."

On the proposal of Cllr. B. Kyne seconded by Cllr. M. O'Riordan the report as submitted by the Co. Manager was unanimously approved and adopted.

Dairy Men Accuse E.C. Of Playing **Musical Chairs**

Mr. Michael Drea, Chairman of the IFA National Dairy Committee accused the EC Commission of "playing a game of musical chairs with their proposal to increase the National Quota Reserve by 1% (10 million gallons) while at the same time making 1% of the 5.5% temporary quota cut permanent.

Mr. Drea said: "IFA had proposed that the full 5.5% cut should be restored to producers under 30,000 gallons. This proposal would mean a quota increase of 1.5% and would make 15 million gallons available to smaller producers without any of the red tape associated with the Commission plan."

"IFA's policy would give a 1,650 gallon quota increase to a producer on 30,000 gallons which would enable these producers to carry an extra two cows and two calves resulting in a worthwhile increase in incomes." producer

He added that IFA also insisted that development Plan farmers should be permitted to reach their targets and that outstanding disease cases should be resolved.

Mr. Drea dismissed suggestions that the IFA proposal would result in a build up of stocks saying that butter and skim milk powder stocks were now reduced to levels barely serving food aid purposes.

In conclusion, he said community producers must be allowed to benefit from the improved world market situation which the quota restrictions had brought

Proposed Changes In Operation Of Milk Quotas

Milk quotas are not likely to be exceeded on most Irish farms this year because of the long hot, dry spell of weather, but next year will surely be different, and there seems to be no doubt that controls on production will be with us for many years to come. The quotas have worked very well so far, but it is a new system, only five years in operation, and there are inevitable alterations and adjustments to be made, some of which are under discussion now.

The market situation is changing continually, largely because of the effects of reduced milk output, and most dairy farmers are benefiting from the consequent price increases, but there are certain groups of producers who are having problems. In these circumstances, the Council of Ministers last April invited the Commission to carry out a study into the working of the system, and, if necessary, to come up with proposals before the end of July. The proposals now being discussed include making more quotas available for small producers and young farmers, and new entrants to farming, while tightening upon the regulations for producers who exceed their quotas.

The first proposal is to increase national quotas by 1% for the purpose of helping hardship cases. Farmers with very small quotas still cannot make a living from milking cows, though they work as hard and as long as those with big quotas. For young energetic farmers taking over the family farm, this is particularly frustrating, and these two classes of farmers are liable to be forced to sell their quotas, as they cannot expand output. Farmers with no quotas at present are barred from milk production unless they can afford to buy some

Over the past two years national milk quotas were reduced by 2% and 1%, and over the same period 5.5% of the quotas were suspended under a scheme which provided the producers concerned with compensation (amounting to 39p a gallon in Ireland) being paid to the and only 25,000 tonnes of essential.

butter bought last year, compared with 388,000 tonnes in 1987 and 647,000 tonnes in 1986. Prices of skim milk powder are very high and other dairy products are also dearer.

WEAKENING OF SUPER LEVY

On the other hand, the quotas are being exceeded in every Member state except Greece and Spain, and in the last marketing year the excess was nearly 1.8 million tonnes and if the upward trend continues there could be an increase of between 0.5% and 1% of total output. The Commission believes that this is due to the weakening of the super levy because producers getting compensation under the suspension scheme get paid, even if they have exceeded their quotas, and this makes the excess production economically possible.

Now it is proposed that the compensation under the suspension scheme will not be paid for any gallon of milk produced over the quota as a means of keeping production within the prescribed limits. Those limits have been fixed because of necessity, and in the long term, it is not intended that they should be extended. To provide for the increases of national quotas already mentioned, one-fifth of the suspension of quota will be made permanent, and only 4.5% will be eligible for restoration.

The Commission hopes there will be no extra cost from these proposals, and no extra production either, even when the Mulder case farmers are accepted, because the tightening up of regulations and the producers concerned. 

PENSMAN Takes You... Behind The SPOTLIGHT

MORE FOR THOSE AT THE TOP

The announcement that the Government was preparing to give major salary increases to the top people in the public service was rolled out in a more than apologetic manner in one of our daily papers last week-end. The increases, stated to be almost certainly phased in over more than a year, will probably total some 20 per cent or from about £2,500 to as high as £12,000 a year. The formal announcement of the increases is expected to be made during this week.

Some 700 people will be covered by the rises and they include the Taoiseach, Cabinet Ministers and Ministers of State, Dail Deputies and Senators, the Judiciary, Chief Executives in the public sector companies, in Health Boards and State Agencies, the Garda Commissioner and City and County Managers.

At present the Taoiseach and the Chief Justice have slightly more than £62,000 a year, Dail Deputies have £23,177, Senators draw £12,631 while the highest civil servant who is Secretary of the Department of Finance receives just over £51,000.

The announcement pointed out, "in mitigation," that while the gross cost to the Exchequer would be more than £3 million annually, this would be considerably reduced as the recipients of the increase would be paying income tax at the rate of 56 per cent in the £ on the additional money. In other words, the tax people would be taking back more than half of what would be given out.

In a further effort to bolster a case for the increases, the daily paper which favours payment of them in an editorial comment says that it should be remembered that public servants in the category concerned do not receive automatic increases on a regular basis. It should also be remembered, it states, that public servants at this level are paid much higher salaries in Britain, Europe and elsewhere.

Maybe so, but it should not be forgotten either that compared to Britain, France, West Germany and these other European nations, Ireland is but a small country with a very poor economy. Britain with a population of 40 million plus can hardly be compared to our small 3 millions so it is not fair that we should be expected to match the salaries they pay. Neither should Dail Deputies be seeking to put themselves on a par with British M.P.'s as they simply do not do as muchwork as the Dail sits less often than the British Parliament and takes far longer holidays. We won't even comment on the number of days on which the Senate does business.

It all goes back to the need to cut our cloth to measure and to spend only what the country can afford. In the week prior to the reference to the increases, the Minister for Finance, Mr. Reynolds spoke about the continuing need to keep inflation down by keeping prices down. He spoke about the ongoing need to keep the huge national debt in check and warned that no tax reliefs could as yet be expected as a result. Is this then an opportune

time for a government which is preaching a continuation of restrictive spending on the part of the public to further strengthen the economy to vote themselves such very high increases, it looks as if there is one rule for those at the top and another for those who must make the sacrifices to support them. In these days when we have seen so much of the celebrations to mark the bicentenary of the French Revolution on our television screens, we might be forgiven for remembering, in context of the foregoing, that the French Queen Marie Antoinette remarked when told that the peasants had no bread to eat, "let them eat cake!"

GUILDFORD FOUR APPEAL POSTPONED

The hearing of new appeals ordered by British Home Secretary, Douglas Hurd for the four people convicted of the Guildford and Woolwich pub bombings cannot start in October, as planned, the Court of Appeals in London was told last Thursday. It appears that the final papers for the appeals could not be lodged until the end of October. Consequently the appeals by Patrick Armstrong, Carole Richardson, Paul Hill and Gerard Conlon have been put back until mid-January. They were sentenced to life impr sonment in 1975 and their original appeals were rejected in 1977.

As in the case of the Birmingham Six, Paddy Joe Hill, Gerry Hunter, John Walker, Hugh Callaghan, Richard McIlkenny and Billy Power similarly sentenced for the Birmingham pub bombings in August 1975, there is official intransigence where the Guildford Four are concerned on the British side. And because there is little sign of action on the Irish side, innocent people stay in prison and their families remain deprived of husbands, fathers, grandfathers and loved ones.

Unfortunately, the operation of the law does not always lead to justice. Juries can err or be misled. Judges can be irredeemably prejudiced. Police can manipulate evidence and extract confessions. Technical witnesses can be found to buttress the manipulation. All this has happened in the case of the Birmingham Six and Guildford Four.

The grim truth about the attitude of the English judiciary in these cases is encapsulated in what Lord Denning stated during the course of an interview. It is better, he stated, that innocent people should remain in prison than that the English judicial system come under question.

Perhaps, in a way, it could be an advantage that the Guildford Four Appeals have been put off for another six months as it must be in everybody's interest that additional time be afforded to their lawyers to make the best possible case on their behalf as there is a great mound of documents relating to the appeals to be sifted through. But in addition to the appeals of the four who have now been in captivity for 15 years, English justice will also be on trial for if the prisoners are found innocent it will be an indictment of those and of the system responsible for their conviction while if the appeals are again rejected it will just prove what Lord Denning stated to be true.

DEATH OF WELL KNOWN AUGUSTINIAN

It was with much regret that we learned of the death of Rev. Fr. Tom Butler OSA which took place at the Augustinian Priory, Grantstown, Wellington Bridge, Co. Wexford on Thursday last, July 20.

Fr. Butler was a member of the Augustinian Community in Dungarvan for many years where from the mid-1950's he served as Bursar, Rector of St. Augustine's College and Prior. He will be fondly remembered for his quiet, retiring manner and shy disposition by all who knew him.

ANOTHER CLEAN-UP EFFORT

The members of the Abbeyside Tidy Towns Committee are to be congratulated for joining the crusade to clean up our environment. Already we have commended the Clonea Beach Awareness Committee, the Ardmore Tidy Towns Group which has done so much to make that beautiful seaside resort more colourful and a few more groups here and there around the county who have organised voluntary collections of litter.

The Abbeyside group commenced operations last Tuesday night week and will, we understand, continue to meet each Tuesday night in an effort to keep the streets of the village free from litter.

The work of all these groups must be highly commended and the volunteers involved in them must be congratulated but their efforts can only be futile if the co-operation of the public at large is not forthcoming. This was very evident last week in the case of the effort mounted in Abbeyside. We understand that a fine job was done by the members of the group between 8 p.m. and 10 p.m. on the Tuesday night and several bags of litter were collected but then the litter louts very evidently came on the scene in the subsequent hours around midnight as on the Wednesday morning the Clonea Road was again absolutely covered with paper wrappers, greasy chip-bags and such things. It was, to say the least, an absolute scandal.

As we say, the civicminded groups that go out in their own time to clean up their neighbourhoods are to be wholeheartedly congratulated but in the absence of co-operation from the rest of the community, their efforts are futile. So we appeal to everyone, young and old, big and small, as their contribution to the clean-up crusade, to think twice in future and stop disposing of litter (wrappers, cigarette packets, chipbags, etc., etc.) on our public thoroughfares and of course also on our beaches.

on the coalition issue had already occurred. Speaking on RTE news on Monday night Mr. Fahey said that he would never leave the party but he added that he could sit in the Dail as an independent for the future and will assess each issue on the merits before voting.

AN ISOLATED INCIDENT!

While no official reaction to Deputy Fahey's resignation or to the motion of the CDC had been voiced up to Monday night, the Fianna Fail TD for North Kerry, Deputy Tom McEllistrim commented that the action of the Waterford CDC should not be taken seriously. He pointed out that the Fianna Fail Party had no option but to do what they did and as a result he felt that the country now had a stable government that would run for 4 or 4.5

Sources close to the top in Fianna Fail also described Mr. Fahey's action as "an isolated incident" although the Chairman of the Waterford CDC had claimed that about 3 other Fianna Fail TD's were ready to join Mr. Fahey and the group could then hold the balance of power in the Dail.

Deputy Fahey's cessation from the FF Parliamentary Party reduces the Party representation in the 26th Dail to 76 and the FF-PD Alliance to a total of 82. Theoretically it creates a new uncertainty for the government.

ENVIRONMENT MINISTER ON

FAHEY RESIGNATION Commenting on the resignation of Mr. Jackie Fahey T.D. from the FF

Parliamentary Party in Dun Laoghaire on Tuesday, Mr. Padraig Flynn, Minister for the Environment thought that the resignation was an isolated case which he said would not damage the Government.

The Minister said that he had been surprised by Mr. Fahey's decision and was not sure that it was one which had been fully backed by the organisation.

Mr. Flynn said that the Coalition government was now in place and required the support of the entire party and that, he said, in-cluded Mr. Fahey."We have to go along with the arrangement we have entered into now" he said.

The Minister added that the decisions which had to be made to form the Government had been difficult but no option had remained to Fianna Fail beyond what they had done in the circumstances.

£8,500 Award In Whiplash Claim

In a claim for personal injuries brought by Mary Hyslop, suing through her parents Daniel and Nora Hyslop, 30 Murphy Place, Abbeyside against John P. Cranley, Veterinary Surgeon, 6 Parnell Street, Waterford at Dungarvan Circuit Court on Tuesday, a settlement of £8,500 by consent was announced.

Mr. E. P. King, Solr. (J. F. Williams & Co.) told the Court that the claim resulted from injuries sustained by 16 years old Mary Hyslop in an accident which occurred on December 29, 1988. At the time, the girl was in a car sitting behind her grandfather who was the driver. She was being taken home after receiving treatment for another ailment at Ardkeen Hospital and just after passing Kilmeaden on the main Waterford-Dungarvan road the car was in collision with a

car driven by the defendant. As a result of the impact the plaintiff suffered a whiplash and received a cut on the forehead. Mr. King added that while he considered the amount of the settlement "not princely", the girl's parents were anxious to settle the matter without subjecting her to the trauma of a court hear-

Judge Sheridan said that he was always worried about such cases.

Dr. Tom Higgins in evidence said that the girl had a laceration on the forehead but suffered no injury to her head. She sustained a moderate whiplash injury to her neck and this initially caused her severe pain but this had gradually abated and she appeared now to have only periodic mild

Judge Sheridan agreeing that the settlement was not princely said that he would not go against the wishes of the parents in the matter. He accordingly approved of the settlement and made it a rule of Court.



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


Two extra acts followed (1) Mary Dee singing and the Munster Champions from the 1989 Fleadh; (2) Catherine Mahoney

For the record, the Tour was eventually won by the US rider Greg Lemond who pipped the fancied Laurent Fignon, France, by a mere 8 seconds. Sean Kelly finished a very fine 9th overall with his team mate, another Irishman, Martin Earley in 44th

place, his highest placing in five rides. Martin Earley also had the distinction of a stage win into Pau which for him was, very obviously, the highlight of this year's Tour.

Congratulations then, to both Sean and Martin for keeping the Irish flag flying with such honour with their magnificent feats in the 1989 Tour de France.



The final chapter in the story of Waterford's Munster senior hurling campaign of 1989 was written over the weekend when both the Munster Council and subsequently the management committee, sat in judgement on matters related to Waterford's involvement.

their meeting in Limerick, the Munster Council having heard the match report of referee Willie Horgan, imposed six month suspensions on both Noel Crowley, Ballygunner, and Damien Byrne, Erin's Own, who had been ordered off in the Munster Final for deliberate striking. Both the players, having been given the opportunity of being heard in their own defence, were present. Both have since expressed disappointment at the term of suspension imposed.

The county chairman, Eamon Murphy, secretary Seamus Grant and teammanager Tony Mansfield had also been summoned to the meeting and they made submissions on behalf of the county team. Tony Mansfield was, I understand, summoned to the meeting to explain his 'after-match' interview which he gave and in which he mentioned Waterford's injuries and the players frustration with the interpretation of the shoulder charge rule. Tony defended those views at the meeting, and no action was taken against him.

Tom Cunningham, one of the county's two delegates, claimed that Waterford had been subjected to a lot of adverse criticism and he complained that the whole team had been tarnished because of the deeds of a few. He also expressed annoyance that the entire defence had been brought into the totality of things in the referee's report.
