History was made on Thursday night last, July 27, when it was announced at the Annual Dungarvan Show Dinner Dance that Ballyduff had won "The Club of the Year Award". Great celebrations followed as the club had been trying hard for some years to win this prestigious award.

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Circuit Court Hears Dramatic Account Of Garda Chase And Arrest

The dramatic details of how a man was chased in a Garda patrol car but was eventually arrested after violent resistance in the attic of a house in Waterford City were unfolded at Dungarvan Circuit Court before Judge D. P. Sheridan last Thursday.

Paul Gerard Bailey (33) stated to be a native of New Ross who lived in England for a number of years appeared in custody on a number of charges under the Criminal Law Amendment Act and the Offences Against the Person Act including the unlawful seizure of a Garda patrol car and assaulting three members of the Gardaí on July 4, 1989.

Garda Inspector Eamonn Keating in evidence told the Court that on the day in question at about 2.45 p.m. Bailey went into Darrer's Store at Main St., Tramore and filled a trolley of goods including groceries, bottles of wine and champagne to the value of £150. He left the store without checking the goods and the Manager, Mr. O'Leary followed him to the carpark where he advised the defendant to return but was abused.

The defendant put the goods in the boot of the car, reversed out colliding

with the trolley and drove away.

Mr. O'Leary then reported the matter to the Gardaí in Tramore and a patrol car manned by Garda Eamonn Cody and Bangarda Tina Kennedy started a search. They came on the defendant's car on a narrow by-road about 4 miles from Waterford City and put on the siren but the defendant just increased speed. A chase ensued until they came to a right-hand bend on the road when the defendant's car crashed and wound up in the ditch.

The two gardai approached the driver who looked agitated and was struggling to get out. When he got out, he took an object from the boot of his car which he pointed at the Gardaí and which they took to be a firearm. He then moved to the Garda patrol car and got in and at that stage Gda. Cody recognised that the object was not a firearm but a car

jack. The defendant reversed the patrol car and pushed Gda. Cody to the ground and then made a swipe at him with the jack

while he was on the ground. The Garda was injured but not seriously.

Pause For Thought With Fr. Paddy

MY SON, HERE IS YOUR KEY

The readings for last Sunday focus attention on the necessity, and the power of prayer. In the first, Abraham appeals to God for mercy on the grounds of His own honour and justice; and he even bargains with God to restrain Him from bringing down destruction on the peoples of Sodom and Gomorrah. Certainly, God displays great patience and mercy in agreeing to spare the cities if ten just men could be found within their walls, but, as we know, they failed to locate even that few, and God rained down destruction upon them.

St. Paul in the second speaks of being buried in Baptism as if it were a tomb, and then, amazingly rising with Christ to share in His new life. This ties in with the other readings in that a new way of existence has been opened up; and to stay alive in this new way, one must fulfil the requirements as laid down in the Commandments, and employ all the available means, namely prayer and the Sacraments, to survive and maintain growth in the Body of Christ.

The Gospel emphasises the importance of prayer. Remember, the First Commandment tells us that we have a grave duty to pray. God does not want man to forget that he came from the hand of God, and that he depends on Him for everything. Prayer is an acknowledgment of these facts. The wonderful thing about this is, God is so available. His door is always open. You could call on Him any time, any day and any place. He would never turn His back on anyone. Rather, he extends a welcome to all. And, no one leaves Him with empty hands.

The "Our Father" opens with an acknowledgment that God is our Father, and then proceeds to honour and praise Him for His greatness. It then directs that we ask for daily bread, which implies that we approach God every day and beseech Him to care and to help us in trials and temptations. Too, Jesus Himself made it clear that we should "pray always and unceasingly." The early Fathers, basing their opinions on the Commandments, and what Jesus said, held that man was bound to pray daily. To fulfil this obligation man is not bound to follow any formal plan or method. You all know how to talk to your own mam or dad, well this is your cue. There's a lot in the simple approach. But, always, always have a set time for your regular prayers. Any old time never works.

St. Matthew gives this advice: "When you pray go into your room and shut the door." He is saying, when you talk to God, close your mind to other interests. Try to get your mind on God, and the things that relate to Him. Yes, you'll say thanks, you'll make promises, and you'll ask for help. The last thing you would do is to tell Him what a great fellow you are for that was the prayer of the Pharisee. True humility in prayer is thanking God for what we are, and asking Him to continue to watch over and protect us.

REFLECTING GOD'S ABIDING LOVE

Indeed, God does not expect us to be concerned about our souls, and he has assured us that "whatever we ask in His name, He will do it." That's why we say "Thy kingdom come" that His divine will (salvation for all) might be fulfilled. We run to him in times of trouble. He is our Father. He will protect us. We know how deeply parents love their children, yet! it is only a reflection of God's abiding love. When we let God into our lives, we develop a close relationship, talk freely with Him and open our hearts to Him. He'll be a father to us, and we will be sons to Him. The happiest people and the most contented are those who have developed a companionship with Jesus. You could even see it in their faces.

Abraham besought temporal help for Sodom and Gomorrah, and God would have granted his request if one small condition could be fulfilled. Whilst spiritual help takes priority, it is not wrong to ask for material benefits. Jesus in His life-time went about doing good. He provided wine at Cana. He helped and cured the sick and the blind. He fed the hungry, and restored the dead to life. The records and experience prove that God is moved by prayer, but he would have us remember that our main concern should be aimed at what is necessary for our salvation. Jesus Himself has promised that you have only to "ask, and it will be given to you." He has, however, reminded us that we must be persistent. He gave you an example in the Gospel. Prayer is the key to the secrets of the heart of Jesus. It will open the pearly gates.

Gardai Asked To Stop Heavy Vehicles Using Tallow Hill

At the July monthly meeting of Waterford Co. Council, Cllr. Willie McDonnell again raised the matter of trucks and heavy vehicles speeding down the steep incline of Tallow Hill and asked that a request be forwarded to the Garda authorities to put a stop to the practice in the interest of public safety.

Cllr. McDonnell has now been informed by the County Engineer, Mr. John O'Flynn, that he has sent the following letter to Chief Supt. M. Walsh, Waterford about the matter under date July 17.

"In October 1987 following various complaints and representations a formal request was issued to this Council for the erection of

signs No. 217 at either end of Tallow Hill prohibiting vehicles over 2 tons for using this stretch of roadway. I subsequently wrote to your office on 24th November, 1987 reporting

that the signs concerned were being largely ignored and requesting periodic enforcement by the Gardai.

"The matter has again been raised at our Council Meeting on 10th July,

when complaints were made by members of the Council that trucks were ignoring the signs and were speeding down this hill causing a danger to other road users. In the circumstances I would be most grateful if you could arrange for enforcement to be instituted in this area."

Mother Abbess Re-Elected For 2nd Term At Glencairn Abbey

Mother Dominic Lee, has been re-elected by her fellow sisters for a second term as the Abbess of the Cistercian Community of St. Mary's Abbey, near Lismore. The term will last for six years.

A native of Fermoy, Mother Dominic is the daughter of the late John and Norah Lee, who conducted a drapery under the name of O'Brien's under the Clock in the town's Pearse Square. Mother Dominic will celebrate forty years in the Community, which is better known as Glencairn, this coming November.

A cosmopolitan community being drawn from England, Wales, Scotland, America and Ireland, the nun's main function is "to bear witness to the transcendence of God in a world that finds God irrelevant," said Mother Dominic recently.

Therefore, the life of the nuns is centered around spiritual reading and prayer, and the worship of God. Of little importance is manual work. The nuns work a 200-acre farm purchased on their behalf sixty

years ago by the Brothers in the Cistercian Monastery of Mount Melleray. The nuns also produce communion bread and they are famous for their painting of Ikons.

ABBNEY RENOVATION

Renovation of their abbey in preparation for the 21st century and at the cost of £250,000 is due to go ahead in October with a completion date by the Easter vigil of the following years.

With a community of forty nuns including four novices and six junior professed the Abbess has no worries whatsoever about future numbers at Glencairn. She said that, given the interest young people have expressed in the Community's way of life, if the Sisters did not have confidence about the future there would appear to be a lack of faith on their part.

Waterford T.D. Appointed To Labour Front Bench

Mr. Dick Spring, leader of the Labour Party named his Front Bench for the 26th Dail recently and newly elected Labour member for Waterford, Deputy Brian O'Shea has been assigned the responsibility as Spokesman on Education. Deputy Michael Ferris, the newly elected T.D. for South Tipperary has been appointed Spokesman on Social Welfare.

A "Brighter" Winter Ahead For West Waterford

The members of Waterford Co. Council representing the Lismore area have, in the past, raised the poor public lighting arrangements in the towns of Cappoquin, Lismore and Tallow on a number of occasions. Cllrs. Walsh, Quirke, Wilkinson and McDonnell have each supported motions calling for an improvement in the public lighting in these towns.

When the matter was last raised at the January meeting a motion in the name of Cllr. McDonnell asked that the ESB be requested to carry out a detailed examination of the lighting systems operating in each of the towns. In support of his motion, Cllr. McDonnell described the West Waterford towns as now the darkest in Ireland and claimed that "the existing lights remind me of nothing more than old-fashioned flash-lamps".

CO. MANAGER'S REPORT

The County Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, then undertook to take the matter up with the ESB and he at once entered into negotiations with the ESB on the matter of improving the lighting systems and the cost implications of carrying out such improvements.

Last week Mr. Hurley had the following report circulated to all members of the Council with reference to the situation:

"I have approved acceptance of quotation from the E.S.B. for the installation of new public lighting networks, including traffic route lighting in the towns of Dungarvan, Cappoquin and Lismore and of a new public lighting network in Tallow.

"The E.S.B. expect to commence work in Cappo-

quin early in August, in Dungarvan in September and in Lismore and Tallow in November. They estimate that all work will be completed by the end of November.

"The proposed work which will be carried out in accordance with the E.S.B.'s recommendations for public lighting should result in a significant improvement in the existing

situation in the towns involved."

A "BRIGHTER" WINTER

The installation of the new lighting system should make for brighter nights in the coming winter in each of the towns mentioned and will undoubtedly be generally welcomed by the people in the areas concerned.

Settlement In Fatal Accident Claim

In a claim brought by James Connors, 38 Sea Park, Abbeyside against Garry Donnelly, Kyne Park, Abbeyside arising from the death of plaintiff's teenage son, a settlement was announced at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week.

Mr. J. Walsh B.L. (instructed by J. F. Williams & Co.) for the plaintiff stated that the claim arose from a fatal accident which occurred at the Burgery, Dungarvan on October 10, 1988 when the plaintiff's son, Seamus was a passenger in a van driven by the defendant. The van collided with a wall and Seamus was killed almost instantly by the impact.

Mr. J. Curran (Lanigan & Curran) was for the defendant.

Announcing an agreed settlement of £9,250 on foot of the claim, Mr. Walsh

told the Court that all but two of the plaintiff's children had waived any claims in the matter as had also the grandparents. He said that that only left the parents James and Pamela Connors and the two children referred to as beneficiaries. In addition to the agreed settlement, there was also an amount of £791 allowed as special damages to cover the funeral expenses involved.

Approving of the settlement, Judge D. P. Sheridan apportioned a sum of £250 for each of the two children, Maureen and Bridget

and directed that the sum for special damages be paid to the plaintiff. He further directed that the residue be divided equally between the parents of the deceased.

Judge Sheridan commented that in cases such as this, the death of a young person was always a matter of great sadness to him as indeed it must be to the parents for whom he felt great sympathy.

Reduced Prison Sentence For "Easily Led" Dungarvan Man

John Connors (20) of 64, Childers Estate, Dungarvan, appealed at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week against the severity of a 16 months imprisonment sentence imposed on him at the District Court when he was convicted on a number of charges of damaging parked cars and the larceny of 2 gas cylinders in Dungarvan last February.

Garda T. Murphy stated in evidence that on the night of February 2/3 last the defendant with others attacked and damaged about 12 or 13 cars parked at housing estates at Springfield, Silversprings, Comeragh Crescent and Kiltrush. When he was subsequently arrested at his home and asked about the damage to the cars, he freely admitted his involvement. "It was just pure vandalism," said Garda Murphy. The defendant also admitted stealing the gas cylinders, he said.

In reply to Mr. J. O'Kelly B.L. (instr. by J. F. Williams & Co.) witness agreed that the defendant was a person who was easily led. He has been under psychiatric treatment and had gone to England to seek work but had returned to face the issue.

Mr. O'Kelly said that the defendant had now got out of the environment which had led to his trouble and had already served a brief part of his sentence and as a result had suffered a short sharp shock and found out that he did not at all like it. He referred to a medical report submitted by Dr. J. Stacey which said that the

defendant came from a very poor family background and was suffering from a slight mental handicap.

Connors in evidence told the Court that he would not like to go back to detention. "If I'm given a chance I'll never get into trouble again and I will work to make money to pay compensation for the damage to the cars," he said.

Judge D. P. Sheridan said that in the sentence passed by the District Court there was a question of deterrence and he was not going to interfere with that. Ordinary people whose cars had been systematically smashed had to be protected by the Court and he was not going to allow such things to happen. In doing what he did, the judge said that the defendant had faced a sentence of 2 years but this had been cut to 16 months by 2 consecutive sentences. In the circumstances he said that all he could do in the case was to make the sentences concurrent which would reduce them to a total of 10 months and he gave the defendant credit for the 3 weeks which he had already served.

Know Your Rights

Q. — My daughter is about to adopt a baby. She works full-time and will need some time to adjust. Will she be entitled to any leave from her job?

A. — At the moment there is no such thing as Adoptive Leave. Some employers may give special leave to an adoptive parent but there is no legal obligation on them to give either paid or unpaid leave. It is certainly worthwhile asking her employer for time off but she may have to take this at her own expense.

Q. — A friend was seriously injured in an accident at work and will probably need long term hospital care. At present he doesn't qualify for either a Medical Card or Hospital Services Card. How will he stand regarding his hospital bills?

A. — As this was a work accident he will be covered for medical care under the Occupational Injury Benefit Scheme if he was insured at class A, B, D, F, J, M or N. Under this scheme he will be able to get a refund of the costs incurred as a public patient which are not covered by the Health Board. In his case this would be the consultants fees and the £10 daily in-patient charge.

Other expenses covered under this scheme are: Doctors visits, prescriptions and certain prescribed treatment, certain medical or surgical appliances and repair and replacement of these, certain qualified nursing care and certain public transport costs.

It is necessary to notify the OIB Section in the Department of Social Welfare within 6 weeks of the start of the medical treatment. The refund is paid by cheque and if the treatment is ongoing the payments can be made in instalments.

Dail Question About Ballinroad Sewerage Scheme

Mr. Austin Deasy, T.D., asked the Minister for the Environment if he will allocate funds for the provision of a sewerage scheme at Ballinroad, Dungarvan.

In a written reply in the Dail last Wednesday week, the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Padraig Flynn stated: Contract documents for this scheme were approved in February 1987, clearing the way for Waterford County Council to seek tenders for the pro-

ject. The County Council did not advertise for tenders but recently submitted a proposal to carry out the work themselves by direct labour. This proposal is presently under examination in my Department and, if found in order, will be considered for approval in the light of existing commitments on the sanitary services programme and the level of finance available.

Circuit Judge Recalls Death Of Young Dungarvan Solicitor

Judge D. P. Sheridan referred to the recent tragic death of a young Dungarvan Solicitor at the opening of the Trinity Sittings of Dungarvan Circuit Court last week. He said that while he could have paid tribute to the late Pat Cullinane at other centres he thought it more appropriate that he should wait until he came to his own home town of Dungarvan before doing so.

Paying tribute to the deceased, Judge Sheridan said that he regarded the members of the legal profession who practised in his courts as a kind of family relatives and as a family mourns the death of a young member he was sure the people of Dungarvan mourned the passing of a young and brilliant man in the person of Pat Cullinane who was taken by God in the flower of life.

He recalled that Pat Cullinane had trained for his legal career in the office of a great friend and practised in that of another friend and at an early stage showed his great aptitude for the law and for getting on with people. Then he was struck down by the terrible illness that had caused his death.

"It is difficult," said Judge Sheridan, "to put into words what one feels in these circumstances and what we feel about a person who was taken away so young. While he was on this earth he was a model that many could study and now I am sure he is enjoying God's pleasure in another place better than this."

Judge Sheridan then extended his deepest condolences to Pat's father and

to the other members of the Cullinane family.

Mr. Stephen Lanigan - O'Keefe B.L. on behalf of the members of the Bar joined in the tribute and said that he and his colleagues were now acutely aware of the great loss occasioned by Pat Cullinane's death. "All we can do now," he said, "is to remember the great courage he showed in face of the devastating illness that finally struck him down."

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT
Mr. Niall King, Solr. (J. F. Williams & Co.), President of the Waterford Law Society, referred to the late Pat Cullinane's commitment and involvement in community affairs in the locality and the brave manner in which he had coped with the heavy burden of ill-health which had hung over him. His death had been a great loss and they would all miss him forever, he added.

Mr. John Cooke, Co. Registrar said that in Pat's death they had lost a very good friend who held a very high place in his esteem and in that of the entire Circuit Court Office.

Supt. P. J. Hayes on his own behalf and on behalf of the Garda Siochana joined in the tribute and said that in the time he had got to know Pat Cullinane they had become great friends. "Everyone is now the poorer for his passing. Go ndeana Dia trocaire air," said the Supt.

Mr. Joe Curran, Solr., (Lanigan & Curran) speaking on behalf of his firm and on behalf of the Cullinane family suitably returned thanks for all the tributes that had been paid.

Taoiseach Meets Waterford CDC Deputation

A deputation from the Waterford Fianna Fail Comhairle Dail Ceanntair travelled to Dublin last Thursday to see the Taoiseach Mr. Charles Haughey and to discuss with him the unrest of the organisation in the constituency about coalition and their emphatic objection to former PD Deputy Martin Cullen being given a Senate seat.

Speaking after the meeting, the group's spokesman, former TD Dr. Donie Ormonde, said Mr. Haughey had convinced the delegation on a lot of issues. The discussions had been reasonable and forthcoming, with no punches pulled, and they were quite happy with the outcome.

"He was quite receptive and while he gave no commitment one way or another, he assured us that he would take on board some of our worries and we left quite happy at the end of the meeting. He realised the fears of various people in relation to coalition".

Asked if the Comhairle Dail Ceanntair would now rescind its recent motion of no confidence in Mr. Haughey, Dr. Ormonde said it would meet within the coming week and a report would be issued arising from the meeting.

He admitted one of the delegation's main concerns was the possibility that Mr. Haughey would nominate

former PD TD for Waterford, Martin Cullen, to the Senate.

ASTOUNDED

Dr. Ormonde said he was astounded that the PDs, whose avowed ambition was to abolish the Senate, would be prepared to accept two or three seats there.

He pointed out that there was a significant danger. "We have two seats in Waterford at the moment on 34 p.c. of the vote and if someone like Martin Cullen got a Senate seat it would obviously put this situation in jeopardy".

Mr. Haughey promised to look into the party organisation in general in Waterford and to visit the Constituency later in the year. One of the problems had been a lack of communication and the Taoiseach had gone a long way towards resolving that.

With Dr. Ormonde on the deputation were Maurice Tobin, Brendan Kenneally TD, Paddy Kenneally, Pat Leahy and Dick Tobin.

Lismore Man's Appeal Against Dangerous Driving And Drunk Driving Convictions

Matthew Pius Walsh, Glenmore, Lismore, an engineering and building contractor appealed at Dungarvan Circuit Court last week against his conviction at Lismore District Court last May on charges of dangerous and drunken driving at Glenmore on February 25.

On the dangerous driving charge he had been convicted, fined £100 with £30 expenses and endorsed and on the drunken driving charge he had also been convicted, fined £200 with an endorsement and £112 expenses and disqualified from driving for 12 months. The charge arose from a traffic accident which occurred when a jeep driven by the appellant was in collision with a car driven by William Feeney, Coolisheal, Ballyduff on the day in question.

Pat Hayes, An Post Supervisor in Waterford told Judge Sheridan that on the evening in question he came on the scene of the accident at about 6 p.m. A person with a strong smell of alcohol wanted to move the woman in the wrecked car but witness said it would be best not to do so and to wait until a doctor arrived. He said that the man was incoherent when he spoke and was unsteady on his feet. He did not know him at the time but learned later he was the defendant.

David Feeney, Conna stated in evidence that prior to the accident, the defendant driving his jeep passed him at Coolydoody junction which was about 3.5 to 4 miles from where the accident happened. As the jeep came towards him he saw Pius Walsh was driving. The lights were blazing and the jeep was not very steady on the road. It was weaving over and back and going at about 55 m.p.h. Witness said he had to pull in to let the jeep pass and it then swung wide on to the main road at the same speed. "I formed the opinion at that stage," said witness, "that Pius Walsh was not fit to drive."

William Feeney, Coolisheal said that on the evening in question he was returning with his wife and two children from Dungarvan where they had been shopping. At about 5.45 p.m. as he was about to pass his brother's house at Glenmore, he noticed a jeep coming against them at a fast speed. At the bend of the road the jeep crossed the road and cut into the grass on his side but then tried to get back on to its

own side again.

"I moved out from my left side towards the white line to try to avoid him," then said the witness, "but he hit me bang onto the front on my car one foot from the white line on my side. There was a very bad impact and he blew me across the road." Witness added that Pius Walsh was the driver of the jeep.

Witness went on to say that his wife was injured. After the collision he said Pius Walsh came over to him and "he had a lot of drink in him." He said that Walsh said to him "let there be no aggro over this, I have insurance." Dr. O'Donovan then came along and took his wife away in his own car.

Mrs. Helen Feeney, wife of the previous witness said that she was a front seat passenger in her husband's car. At Glenmore she saw a Landrover coming against them on their side of the road. She didn't remember the bang but she remembered seeing shattered glass and blood coming from her forehead. She was unconscious for a time but then remembered Dr. O'Donovan taking her away in his car.

Donal Feeney, Coolydoody in evidence said that he went to the scene of the accident where he saw Pius Walsh stagger as he walked towards his jeep. He saw oil on the road in front of his brother's car.

Garda P. J. O'Driscoll and Garda L. O'Hara both of Ballyduff gave evidence of going to the scene of the accident. Describing the damage to Mr. Feeney's car, the former said that it was mainly to the left, all of which had been pushed back while the latter said that the car was "a total write-off." At the time they arrived, Pius Walsh had left and they carried out a search for over 2.5 hours looking for him in the area without success. He was not at home but the jeep was there severely damaged on the driver's side and with oil leaking from the sump.

Dr. T. A. O'Donovan, Ballyduff gave evidence of being called to the scene of the accident. While he was attending to Mrs. Feeney,

Pius Walsh came over and asked how she was. "I didn't notice any particular smell of intoxicating liquor from him," said the doctor who added that Walsh then said "I'm getting out of here, I'm leaving."

ONE GLASS OF GUINNESS

The defendant in evidence stated that he was in Castlelyons that day on business. He had a sandwich and one glass of Guinness for his lunch there. He travelled home through Conna, Coolydoody and Ballyduff that evening and drove all the way with no trouble. Approaching the bend on the road at Glenmore, he was doing about 45 m.p.h. and suddenly a car came on top of him. It was on his side of the road, on its wrong side and the collision occurred. After the accident he called his wife on the 2-way radio in his jeep to tell her. He then spoke to Mr. Feeney and told him that he had insurance cover and there would be no problem about any damage. He felt badly shaken after the accident but had been quite capable of driving.

In cross-examination, the defendant said that all he had to drink that day was one glass of Guinness. When the Gardai were looking for him he had gone with his brother to see Dr. O'Keeffe in Tallow. He admitted that on their way to Tallow they passed the scene of the accident again and the garda patrol car was then there.

Mrs. Mary Walsh, wife of the defendant said that after the accident she met her husband who was shaken. He did not appear to be in any way drunk and was all right to drive.

Judge Sheridan giving his verdict said while he did not believe anything which the defendant had said but in the absence of any forensic evidence such as a breathalyser test and the fact that the defendant had put himself away from the Gardai and as the Court had to be very positive in such matters he was not satisfied beyond reasonable doubt that the charge of drunken driving had been established and as he would have to give the defendant the benefit of the doubt he

would allow the appeal in this case.

However in regard to the other charge, Judge Sheridan said that it had concerned one of the most horrible cases of dangerous driving he had ever come across for a long time. Repeating that it was the worst piece of dangerous driving to come before him for a long time, the Judge said that according to the defendant's own evidence that he only had one glass of Guinness that day, he was cold sober when he drove in this fashion.

Judge Sheridan continued, "I believe every word Mr. Feeney told me and he gave his evidence in a clear and moderate way and did not pile it on against the defendant. I do believe that Mr. Walsh was completely on his wrong side of the road when he struck Mr. Feeney and he was clearly guilty of dangerous driving of a high order and I so find." He accordingly dismissed the appeal in this case.

Mr. T. Slattery, B.L. (instructed by J. P. Gordon & Co.) for the defendant made a strong plea not to impose a disqualification stating that it would greatly handicap the defendant in the running of his business.

Judge Sheridan however again stressed that this was the worst piece of dangerous driving which he ever had to deal with, and added, "I am absolutely convinced that a period of reflection is required for the defendant in the matter. I'm sorry but I must put Mr. Walsh off the road for 9 months and I will allow him a month in which to make any arrangements to meet the situation."

NO CONFIDENCE MOTION SET TO CREATE NEW F.F. SPLIT

The "no confidence" motion in Mr. Charles Haughey as leader of the party passed a few weeks ago by the Waterford Comhairle Dail Ceanntair of the Fianna Fail Organisation now seems set to create a new split in the organisation within the Constituency. The motion, reported to have been approved unanimously by an almost 100% attendance of CDC delegates, was passed simultaneously with the announcement by Mr. Jackie Fahey, T.D. of his resignation from the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party and the withdrawal of his support from Mr. Haughey as Taoiseach.

At the CDC meeting it was decided to send a deputation to Dublin to discuss the problems that gave rise to the "no confidence" motion with Mr. Haughey and this decision was duly carried out on Thursday of last week. A report of the deputation's meeting with the Taoiseach is published elsewhere in this issue, the sum total of which seems to be that while Mr. Haughey gave the members of the deputation a receptive hearing he gave them no commitments on the issues raised by them.

Since then, we understand that a statement has been issued by the Whip of the Fianna Fail Group of County Councillors, Cllr. Tom Cunningham of Stradbally to the effect that a majority of members of the group have pledged their 100% support for Mr. Haughey. The group of course also includes Deputy Fahey and his son Sean and this latest development would indicate that the old differences that have been the legacy of past disagreements within the Party are to raise their heads yet again.

And now a new twist in the tangled situation has taken place with fresh accusations and allegations being made by Deputy Fahey. In one of these he claimed in a statement issued last Monday that Dr. Donie Ormonde, member of the Fianna Fail National Executive, and spokesman for the CDC deputation when it met Mr. Haughey, had accepted the offer of a Senate nomination from the Taoiseach in return for restoring peace in the Fianna Fail organisation in the constituency. Deputy Fahey then accused Dr. Ormonde of doing a u/turn claiming that he had been one of the most vociferous opponents of the Coalition deal entered into by Mr. Haughey when he spoke at the CDC meeting. He further said that Dr. Ormonde had announced that there would be a further meeting of the CDC and gave the impression that the "no confidence" motion in the Taoiseach as leader of Fianna Fail would be rescinded. Mr. Fahey added

that no such meeting had been called and he understood that there would be no meeting held.

Following this latest attack by Mr. Fahey, Dr. Ormonde was quick to deny that the Taoiseach had offered him a Seanad seat in order to heal the FF rift in the constituency, but Deputy Fahey has come back with a dismissal of this denial by Dr. Ormonde and is insisting that his information was correct. He said that it had been indicated to him that Mr. Haughey would consider nominating Dr. Ormonde in order to offset the difficulties which would be created by the former PD Deputy Martin Cullen also being included in the Taoiseach's list of Seanad nominations.

And so, as we go to press, the matter rests. But of course the matter will not rest and unfortunately for the Fianna Fail Organisation in the Constituency the stage appears to be set for yet a further series of storms within the party in the months ahead.

TWO BISHOPS WILL ATTEND

The blessing and re-opening of the newly reconstructed and redecorated Parish Church at Kilgobinet will be attended by two Bishops when the ceremony takes place on next Sunday morning, August 6.

Standing on the hillside overlooking Dungarvan Harbour, Kilgobinet Church was first built in 1825 when the Parish Priest was Very Rev. John McCann whose family were natives of the parish. It was reconstructed in 1882 but very little beyond ordinary maintenance and repairs had since been done until the present extensive reconstruction was undertaken by the present Parish Priest, Very Rev. Fr. R. Doherty.

The new building is now a beautiful Church incorporating all the modern conveniences and is a credit to the Parish Priest and to the parishioners who have generously contributed to the building fund. Incidentally, this is the third church in the Parish which has undergone a complete facelift under the Pastorship of Fr.

Doherty, the churches of Kilbrien and Colligan already having been completed within the last few years.

Principal celebrant of the Concelebrated Mass to take place at 11 a.m. in the new Kilgobinet Church on next Sunday morning will be the Bishop of the Diocese, Most Rev. Dr. Michael Russell whilst also in attendance will be the Bishop of Gibraltar, Most Rev. Dr. Devlin. The homily for the very special occasion will be preached by Rev. Fr. Michael O'Byrne, C.C., Ballinameela, whose family are natives of and have long associations with the parish.

To mark the occasion the Dungarvan Brass band will also be in attendance and will give a recital of specially selected airs for the benefit of the parishioners and for the big attendance of the general public which is expected to be present.

A DOUBLE INTEREST FOR CO. WATERFORD

Teams representing seven nations, Great Britain, the Federal Republic of Germany, France, Sweden, Belgium, Italy and Ireland and individual riders from the U.S. and Brazil will compete in the international showjumping competitions for a prize fund in excess of £116,500 at the Kerrygold Dublin Horse Show which will open on Tuesday next, August 8 and continue until Saturday, August 12.

Friday, August 11 is Aga Khan Day when the glamour event, the Nations' Cup, with a prize fund of £20,000 to be divided among the victorious teams, and the Aga Khan Challenge Trophy going to the victorious nation.

For Co. Waterford viewers there will be more than ordinary interest in next week's show, especially where the international team events in the jumping enclosure are concerned as we have two Waterford men on the official Irish International team, one who has a vast experience as a member of the team, the other a newcomer, though far from inexperienced in top-flight jumping competitions.

Capt. John Ledingham who hails from Kinsalebeg has been a kingpin on the Ireland Aga Khan team for some years and has proved himself particularly as an expert in Puissance competitions. The Puissance brings out the best in horses and riders with the courage to tackle the big wall.

It is of interest to note in

this regard that the major Puissance competition of the Show will take place on Thursday afternoon and between rounds 1 and 2 of the competition, there will be a special ceremony involving "Miss Moet," Nelson Pessoa's great Puissance mare. Now retired, she will be handed back to her breeder, Mr. Patrick O'Connell, Kilmacthomas.

The newcomer to the Ireland team is 26-years-old Francis Connors, Woodstown, Co. Waterford whose father, Michael is member of the Connors family of Park, Stradbally, noted for years as breeders and exhibitors of champion equines. His selection on the team has fulfilled his life's dream. "It will be my first time to take part in the Aga Khan competition. It's been a big ambition of mine to jump for Ireland and I'm honoured," he said following the announcement of the selection of the team.

MAJOR CO. WATERFORD LIBRARIES DEVELOPMENT

The official launch of the new Library Computer System for the Co. Waterford Libraries Committee took place at the Dungarvan Branch Library at Lower Main Street, Dungarvan on last Tuesday evening and was performed by Cllr. Michael Queally, Chairman, Waterford Co. Council.

The complete computerisation of Library operations in Co. Waterford has, under the aegis of the County Council, and as initiated by the Co. Manager, Mr. Dan Hurley, been in train for some time past and represents a major advance for Irish Public Libraries. For Waterford Co. Council and its subsidiary body, the County Libraries Committee, the project is a first in Ireland as it is the only such Automation Project under way outside the

Dublin area.

The system will not only cover basic library operations, providing a more comprehensive and immediate service, but will, through a sophisticated telecommunications—computer network, allow access to national and international information banks. In this respect it is intended, through the development of

a closer liaison with local business concerns, to provide a comprehensive information system which will form an essential part of the local preparation in the context of the introduction of the Single European Market in 1992.

A full report of the launch ceremony will be given in next week's issue of the "Leader."

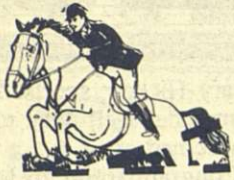

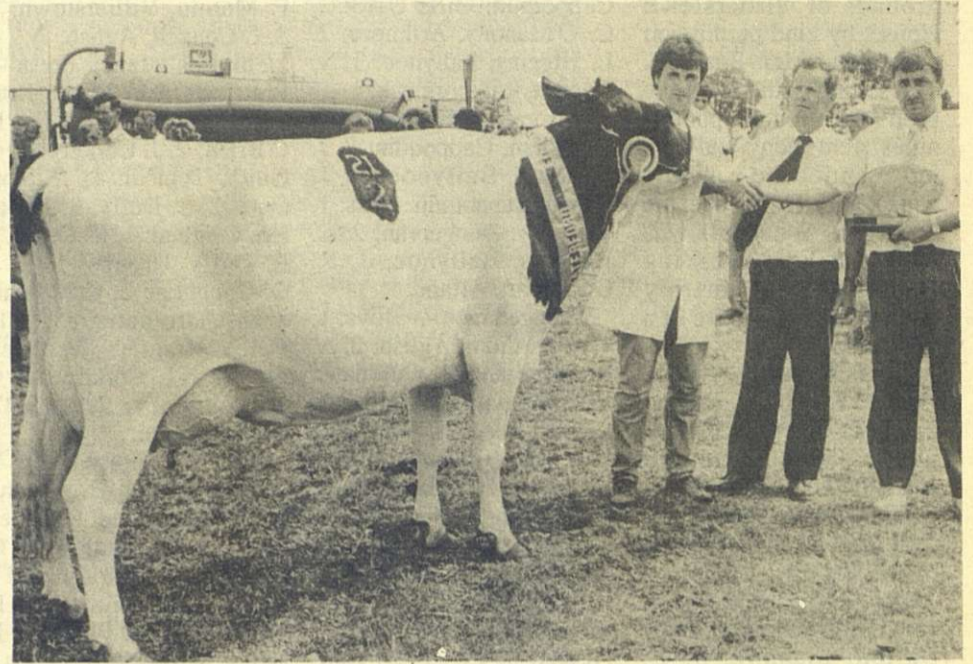

LETTER FROM A LOCAL FISHERMAN

We have been asked to publish the following letter: "With regard to the recent protests at Youghal Bridge (6/6/89) and at Leinster House, Dublin (12/6/89) by inshore fishermen from the Youghal, Ardmore, Knockadoon and Clashmore areas, we wish to point out that these were peaceful protests to highlight the

present predicament of the small inshore fishermen.

"The salmon fishing season for these fishermen opens on the 14th of March, until the end of July, in which there is a peak period of 6 weeks. The fishermen pay £150 licence fee in order to fish during this period.

"The position is, having paid the licence, the fishermen cannot fish due to the ban on monofilament nets on which the government collects V.A.T. If the fishermen use these nets, either samples are taken or they are confiscated by water bailiffs, the fishermen are then brought before the courts, and heavily fined.

"Due to the enforcement of this law by the water bailiffs from the Southern Regional Fisheries Board, inshore fishermen have only fished 5%-10% of the present season.

"At the moment every fisherman from the above listed areas is awaiting prosecution".

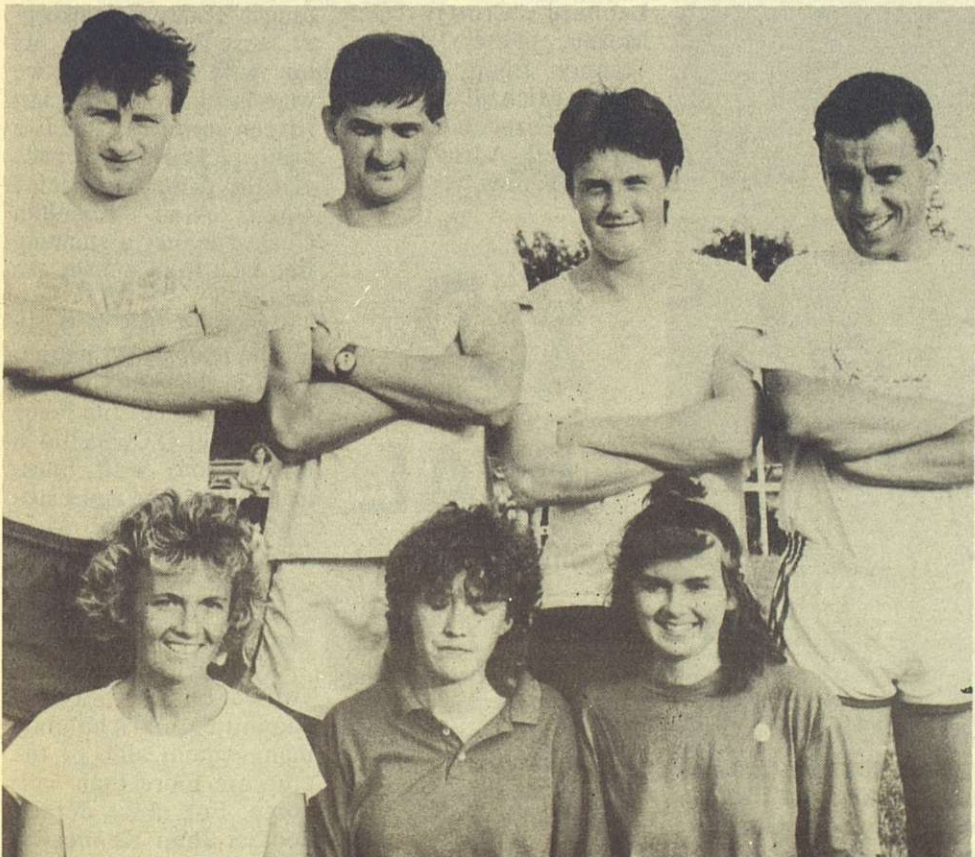

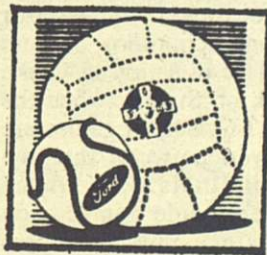
Premier Football Championship

As requested by Central Council, the Waterford County Board have agreed to run a football competition under the experimental rules during August/September. Arrangements for this were made at a meeting of Coisde na Peil last week, when they decided to run the Premier Football championship, commencing on Monday, August 21st and to play under the proposed new rules.

It was decided that four club teams and four group teams will be invited to participate and assuming that these will agree the draw was made and selectors appointed.



The four club teams are Kilrossanty, Stradbally, St. Saviours — all of whom were involved in the closing stages of the football championship last year — and the Nire who played in the county final of the previous year.

The group teams were

chosen from a geographical spread and while players in these teams can be chosen regardless of the present grade or the status of their clubs, selectors will be instructed to pick their best available players. Each team will be allowed to play six substitutes. The matches will be over 80 minutes and played on four quarters of 20 minutes each.

FAR WEST:

Clashmore, Ardmore, Geraldines, Sliabh gCua, Shamrocks, Ballyduff, Lismore, and the other clubs in that catchment area. These will be named at a meeting to be held on Tuesday night next. The selectors will be Declan Ahearne, Timmy O'Keeffe and Denis McGrath.

MID WEST:

Clubs in the Dungarvan/Ballinacourty/Brickey Rangers area, with

the selectors being Greg Fives, Eamon Martin and Kevin Curran.

MID COUNTY:

Kilmacthomas/Rathgormack/Dunhill, etc., etc., with selectors, Noel Kirwan, Tommy Mooney, Pat Doyle.

FAR EAST:

City teams, Butlerstown/Tramore, etc., etc. Selectors Liam Fardy, Ned Flynn, Francis Lonergan.



RULES

The experimental playing rules have now been accepted and all participating teams will be expected to familiarise themselves with these before the games are played. The selectors have been invited to a special meeting to further discuss the competition on Tuesday next, August 8th at Dungarvan.

Apart from the under 21 championships — in which there seems to be very little interest anyway — the Western Board have made tremendous progress and as can be seen from their latest fixtures list, they are at, or close to the finals in most grades. With so many games, this is a credit to everyone concerned. With the under 21 championships, it now seems that these will not get underway until September and this will mean that they can be played on Sundays only. If this happens, it could spell trouble and create many problems later in the year.

The sponsors have invited their own Rules Association, English Soccer, American Football, New Zealand Rugby League and

the G.A.A. to participate. The offer has been accepted here and our national final will take place on August 20th at the football semi-final at Croke Park. Before that the provincial finals will be held and each county will send one representative to this.

In the competition, each player will be given five or six attempts and all kicks of over 40 yards will count. But as kickers will be kicking into a 'grid' which will be situated about 50 yards from the 'kick-out' point, accuracy is of the utmost importance (a dead kick of about 50 yards would earn more points than a 55 yard inaccurate kick). A kick of 80 yards which is directly on line will earn \$100,000. This is a Jackpot prize. Each of the above associations will be represented by only one kicker at Melbourne and they will be kicking for a first prize of \$10,000, with \$3,000 second and \$2,000 third prizes. As well, the sponsoring unit (in our case the County Board) will receive huge prizemoney (if we

win, of course). It will be run in conjunction with the Australians Blue Ribband Rules Final and it is listed throughout Australia as a 'side-show'. Waterford are invited to send a rep. to the provincial final.

John Moore In Action



County referee John Moore was the official in charge of the Munster under 21 hurling final between Tipperary and Limerick at Thurles on Wednesday evening of last week. The game was something of a disappointment because of Tipperary's complete superiority. The vast majority of the 9,000 crowd were Tipp. supporters.

Lismore Players In Croke Park

No fewer than four young schoolboy players will be in action in Croke Park on Sunday when the I.N.T.O. School games are played between the two semi-finals. In these seven-a-side games each province will be represented by a panel of ten players and in supplying four to the Munster panel, Lismore School must be way out in front of all others. This gives a fair idea of the extent to which the game is being nursed and promoted up there.

The four young players bear names that have all been heard of before on the

hurling fields of the county, like David Bennett, who is son of Joe, who has been one of the leading lights in Tourin hurling, Dan Shanahan, son of Brian, who has many times starred with Ballysaggart, Brendan Landers, son of Donie who played a major role in Lismore's progress over the years, Thomas Landers who is also chosen is a cousin of Mossy Walsh, whose hurling reputation is known far and wide. It is a nice honour for the county to have these young players paraded before a 60,000 crowd at headquarters.

Week-End Results

As will be seen from the report, the game between Lismore and Ballyduff at Cappoquin on Sunday evening, was something of a flop. A big crowd who paid £1,766 in gate money had travelled in expectation of seeing a thriller. It was never on, as Ballyduff, for some unknown reason, never once lifted the hopes of their big gathering of supporters.

A solitary point in the first half and three more in the second was the best they could manage. On the other hand, Lismore did everything that was needed to take them safely into the knock-out stages.

Coming out of the Fraher Field on Friday evening, Dungarvan must have asked themselves what they have to do to win a game. Here against Stradbally they virtually ran riot and built up an eight point lead that should have been much greater in the first half and then, like in the hurling tie with Mount Sion some weeks ago, saw victory snatched from them in the final minute.

Over the hour Dungarvan looked seven or eight points a better side and should have been way out of reach of being caught by an unfortunate short kick-out in the final minute. The losers made Stradbally look very second class (admittedly this wasn't difficult) for well on 40 minutes and the defeat, coming as it did, is something that the "Blues" won't like to think about.

Most of the other senior football ties produced the

expected results with Kilmacthomas scoring a very impressive win against Tramore, Rathgormack beating Dunhill and the Nire continuing on their winning way by inflicting a hammering on pointless

Ferrybank. Kilrossanty were in trouble for a while against Clashmore, but were the undisputed winners at the finish.

The best match of the week-end was at Tramore where St. Saviours and Gaultier fought out a thriller that kept the crowd on their toes until the last kick of the game. This saw Saviours two points up and deserving but lucky winners.

Seana Phobal made no

mistake in their junior 'B' football tie with Ballysaggart and deservedly took this title which will also make them county champions as there is no competition in this grade in the East. Therefore they can claim to be the first champions of 1989.

In an amazing junior football tie, Kilrossanty defeated Ballinacourty, who at one stage in the game enjoyed a seven points lead.

Fortunately both matches can be seen on T.V.

For many reasons, the second game — that between Tipperary and Galway, is being treated as the All-Ireland final and most supporters perceive it as the one which will produce the 1989 winners. Unfortunately this one has, to a great extent, been overshadowed by the Tony Keady case (the other two, Staunton and Helebert don't count for much for obvious reasons). Keady, who is Galway's brilliant centre-half back, made himself illegal by playing under an assumed name for Laois against Tipperary in the New York championship and was suspended for 12 months. The Galway hurling manager and some of the team, threatened to

pull out of the semi-final if he was not re-instated by Central Council. They met last night, Tuesday, to hear the case and with no other option open to them, but to uphold the suspension, it will be interesting to see the reaction of Galway.

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Circuit Court Hears Dramatic Account Of Garda Chase And Arrest

Inspector Keating said that the Bangarda had gone down the road to a house for assistance and a local farmer who had seen what had happened came along with a shovel and a slasher but the defendant had driven off in the patrol car at that stage. The search for the missing vehicle continued and after about an hour it was located at a Corporation housing estate at Ballybeg with the radio pulled out.

A SHOTGUN

As a result of information received, Inspector Keating said that with a party of Gardai he then went to 35, Oak Drive, Hillview Estate and the lady who answered, admitted that she was the owner of the English registered car which was involved. She was the girl friend of the accused and when asked, she said she thought her boyfriend had gone to Wexford. A routine search of the house followed and during this the accused was found to be in the attic. "He said he had a double barrel shotgun and would shoot us if we tried to come up to get him", said the Inspector.

The Court then heard that there was a stand-off situation for about an hour during which the Inspector spoke to the accused advising him to give himself up but he threw everything he could find in the attic at the Gardai and even attempted to overturn the water tank. "He continued to abuse us and the bad language he used was the worst I ever heard", added Inspector Keating.

Witness went on to say that eventually they got a ladder and some crash helmets and after a struggle they managed to get into the attic. A further violent struggle ensued during which the accused had to be knocked down and handcuffed. He was then taken to the Garda Station and there all the aggression seemed to leave him.

Judge Sheridan remarked that a great deal of bravery had been shown by the Gardai and indeed by the farmer who had been at the scene of the crash.

Inspector Keating — It was very difficult to get into the attic to make the arrest.

The Inspector added that the accused who had lived in the Bristol area in England came back to Ireland about 5 weeks previously with his girl friend who was a divorcee with a 7 years old daughter. He had a number of previous criminal convictions.

**NEVER HAPPENED
BEFORE**

The accused giving evidence in his own defence declared at the outset, "I can't believe I did these things. It never happened to me before in my life. It must have been the drink". He then said that he had been under great pressure during the previous 6 weeks. He was in breach of a deportation order in England and while he was being detained, his girl friend had been beaten up, robbed and raped by her ex-husband. They then decided to come back to Ire-

land when he was released.

They left everything they had behind them and had nothing when they arrived here. He borrowed some money and got a rented house in Waterford. On the day in question he was very depressed and took a bottle of vodka from the house and went to Tramore and drank it there on the beach. He had not a drink for 2 years as he had a drink problem. He bought another half bottle of vodka and drank that also.

The accused then told Judge Sheridan that if given a chance there would be no

recurrence of such violence or of such unsocial behaviour.

Judge Sheridan then said that he was not satisfied that he had a full picture of the situation and asked that the Probation Officer at Cork Prison, the Manager of the Supermarket in Tramore and Garda Cody be brought before him to give evidence. "I will adjourn the further hearing to a sitting of the Court in Waterford on Thursday next and I hope to reach a decision in the case then", he said.
