Ardmore Set For Entry To Guinness Records Book

Ardmore, is all set to hit the headlines once again with their attempt to get into the Guinness Book of Records. For the first time in IRELAND, they hope to break the current HUMAN CENTIPEDE record which stands at 552 people, with their ankles firmly tied together moving 30m. (98ft. 5ins.) without falling over. On Sunday, August 27, one thousand people will converge on Ardmore to have an eventful day and, at the same time, raise money for St. Paul's Church of Ireland restoration fund.

Defendant Who Stole Patrol Car And Assaulted Gardai Again Remanded

A thirty-three-years-old man who stole a garda car and eventually barricaded himself in the attic of a house, was suffering from pathological drunkenness, a special sitting of Waterford Circuit Court was told.

Paul Bernard Bailey, 35 Oak Drive, Hillview, Waterford, had pleaded guilty to charges of shop-lifting goods worth £138, the property of Cecil O'Leary in Tramore on July 4, assaulting Garda Eamon Coady on the same date, illegally seizing a car on the same occasion as well as assaulting a number of gardai on the same date in Hillview.

The case was first heard in Dungarvan as reported in the "Leader" and it concluded in Waterford when the defendant was remanded on continuing bail on condition that he entered Belmont Hospital for treatment.

Mr. Cecil O'Leary, manager of Darrers supermarket in Tramore, told the court that he approached the defendant after he had

left the store with goods without paying for them. At first Bailey ignored Mr. O'Leary's request to return to the store, but then started using abusive language. He then got into his car and drove off.

Garda Eamon Coady said that he, along with Ban Garda Kennedy, saw the car and gave chase. The defendant crashed and they approached him on foot. He managed to get out of the car and went to the boot where he took out what witness believed to be a firearm, but he later identified as a car jack, so he backed off.

Bailey then got into the patrol car and reversed towards Garda Coady. Instead of stopping he kept on coming towards witness who, as he turned to run, was pushed over by the vehicle.

GLANCING BLOWS

The door of the garda car opened and the defendant tried to hit witness with a jack while he was on the ground. However, he only succeeded in striking him glancing blows before eventually speeding off some minutes later.

Dr. Denis Lane O'Kelly, consultant psychiatrist, told Judge D. P. Sheridan that the defendant had a frightening history in terms of alcohol, and had been drinking since he was 13 or 14 years of age.

At one stage he would drink five or six large flagons of cider per day, said witness. However, he had been attending Alcoholics Anonymous in England before he was deported.

On the day in question Bailey had drunk a bottle and a half of vodka and

some cider, Dr. Lane O'Kelly said, and added that the type of situation the defendant found himself in was one of pathological drunkenness, which was synonymous with aggressive behaviour.

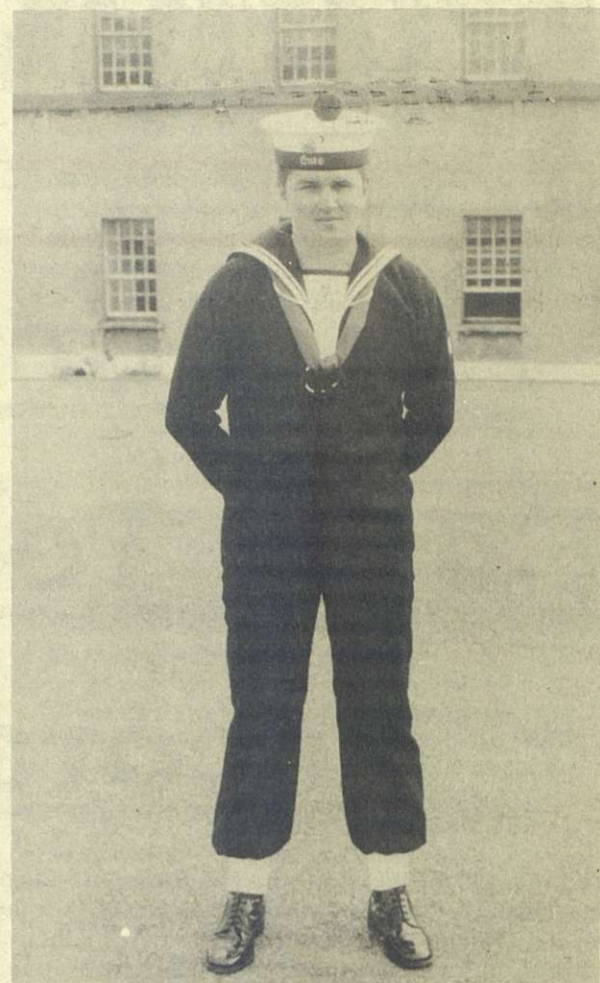
Judge Sheridan noted the fact that the defendant threw a lot of objects from the attic of the house in Hillview at the gardai but once he was taken into custody, everything was okay.

NEEDS TREATMENT

Dr. Lane O'Kelly concluded by saying that the defendant needed treatment, internal and external, which Judge Sheridan said he was quite willing to go along with on condition that the defendant placed himself under the care of the doctor for as long as necessary.

Bailey was then remanded on bail of £100 to the next sitting of Waterford Circuit Court in November.

IFO Call To Amend Salmon Fishing Laws

The Irish Fishermen's Organisation in the course of a Press Release has suggested that the Minister for the Marine, Mr. John Wilson T.D., should amend the regulations relating to commercial salmon fishing as quickly as possible.

The Organisation said that the regulations have been the cause of much discontent, disaffection and friction for over a decade; have soured relations between fishermen and regional Boards; and have cost the taxpayer millions of pounds per annum to keep in place, with no noticeable result to show for it.

The IFO went on to say that the huge amounts of time and money expended in trying to enforce unworkable regulations would be far better spent in other directions with much better results for the salmon, the taxpayer and everybody involved in the fishery. The Organisation cited the frequent complaints made by Regional Boards that they do not have the manpower to monitor river pollution — yet the same Boards have several men performing the ludicrous task of preventing commercial fishermen using monofilament netting to make a living.

NAVAL SERVICE SHOULD WATCH FOREIGN VESSELS

Similarly, the Naval Ser-

vice spent the summer using scarce fishery protection vessels to chase Irish boats in case they might be catching salmon, whilst foreign vessels were physically forcing smaller Irish vessels off the fishing grounds and illegally catching untold quantities of other species, the Organisation said.

"If a fraction of the time and effort that has been devoted to the rod licence issue had been put into amending the salmon regulations the matter could have been resolved long ago. The new Minister should deal with the issue now. We cannot afford to have the bulk of our fishing grounds and our fleet exposed to the mercy of foreign fleets simply because our protection vessels are watching salmon. The present salmon regulations are costing the State, the taxpayer, and the fishing industry in general a fortune. The IFO will be happy to assist the Minister to find a solution" said the Organisation's Secretary General, Mr. Frank Doyle.

International Success For Cappoquin/Cork Crew

The Irish Coxed Fours champions, representing Ireland at the Quadrangular Regatta between Scotland, Wales, England and Ireland at Strathclyde, wound up an amazing season's rowing with a scintillating win over the champions from their respective countries.

Heartiest congratulations to this fine crew in crowning a season of glory with international success. They have now added the Home Countries International championship to their All-Ireland championship and the Blue Riband of Irish Rowing. A very rare achievement indeed.

Deasy Seeks Drift Net Discussion With Minister

Mr. Austin Deasy, T.D., has addressed the following letter under date July 25 to Mr. John Wilson, T.D., Minister for the Marine:

Dear John,
You may remember I was speaking to you last Thursday in the Dail regarding the predicament of drift-net fishermen in my constituency and many other parts of the country. As I pointed out in the Dail Debate on June 9, 1987, I believe that there should be a compromise which would allow legalisation of a limited amount of monofilament net for licensed salmon drift-net fishermen. The confrontations which have taken place in recent years between some of these fishermen and the law enforcement agencies are extremely regrettable and in my opinion are sure to continue unless there is a compromise solution.

I would appreciate it if you would agree to meet a small deputation (3 to 4) of these fishermen together with a representative or two of the IFO if they would so agree, to discuss the matter in detail, at your

convenience.

REPLY AWAITED

A reply from the Minister is now awaited. Earlier, on July 20, before the Dail went into its usual long summer recess, Deputy Deasy asked the Minister at Question Time if he would change the present regulations to allow the use of a limited amount of monofilament net for salmon fish-

ing by licensed drift-net fishermen.

In his reply then, the Minister, Mr. Wilson, said that the issue was very complex and required careful consideration. He said he would be examining the matter with a view to ensuring the best possible balance between the needs of conservation, efficiency, economy and the resources necessary to discharge their obligations in regard to salmon fishery.

Jimmy Foley Of Cappoquin

— One Of Ireland's Greatest Cyclists

During my holidays in Cappoquin last year it was my pleasure and honour to meet a man who, in my younger days, was one of Ireland's greatest cyclists. That man was J. J. Foley of the Cappoquin Athletic and Cycling Club.

Jimmy was born in Lismore in 1920, the son of a grocer who also ran a public house. He had two brothers, Noel and Bill, with whom he went to the local National School and then to Lismore CBS.

Upon leaving school, Jimmy took over his father's other public house in Cappoquin, 'The Railway Bar' (now known as 'Fawly's Bar') and so started his connection with the town that has lasted to this day.

In Jimmy's younger days his idol was the great Irish cyclist of the era, Lismore's Charlie Guest, and it was the youngster's ambition to follow in the great man's footsteps.

When a new cycling club was formed in Cappoquin in 1936, Jimmy joined it from the start. Among the founder members were Mick and Bud Sargent, Sean Bell and my own father, Johnny Regan.

Athletes of the calibre of Sonny McGrath, Norman Walsh and Willie Sargent were among those who also joined up, great sprinters all; Michael Sargent jr. and Danny McGrath, Sonny's brother, who won Munster and All-Ireland All-Round Championships (what would be termed decathlons today).

Of all of those members, only Danny McGrath and Michael

Sargent jr. are still alive. May the others rest in peace.

In those days, most of the cycling was done around the hurling fields of the country, where almost every sports meeting included a couple of races from half a mile up to five miles in length.

MOST OUTSTANDING MUNSTER CYCLIST

Jimmy enjoyed great success travelling to these meetings and was by far the most outstanding Munster cyclist of his time, with a career record of over 44 titles in the province.

Part of the reason for this success was, no doubt, the fact that most of the country's top cyclists were based in Dublin and the northern counties, but nevertheless, Jimmy still had to compete against the likes of Bertie Donnelly and his son, Sean B., Frankie Baird, their Harps AC team mate; Seamus and Charlie O'Reilly, and Vinny Lyons from Dublin's St. Vincent's club; Boherneen's Mick Anderson; George Robinson from Westport; Armagh's Jim McCann; and Jimmy and Paddy McQuaid from Dungannon, whose sons and grandsons are still involved in Irish cycling.

Jimmy won two national titles during his

career, the five miles championship in 1942 and the 7,000 metres title three years later. On no less than twelve occasions he filled the runners-up spot, while his third-place honours ran into the low thirties!

The day of his first title success, in Enniscorthy, he also won the one mile and three mile races after cycling over from Cappoquin — a distance of 84 miles — and then cycling the entire journey back! This kind of 'extra training' was necessary during the war years and for a good while afterwards, because petrol was strictly rationed.

Road racing was also on the Foley agenda, al-

though he now admits that, had the races been of the distances currently being staged, he would have won far more than he eventually did.

Endurance was his great strength, clocking a personal best of 23 minutes and 48 seconds for ten miles, and 58 minutes and 59 seconds over a 25-mile course. The 'Examiner Cup' was just one of the many trophies Jimmy made his own over the years.

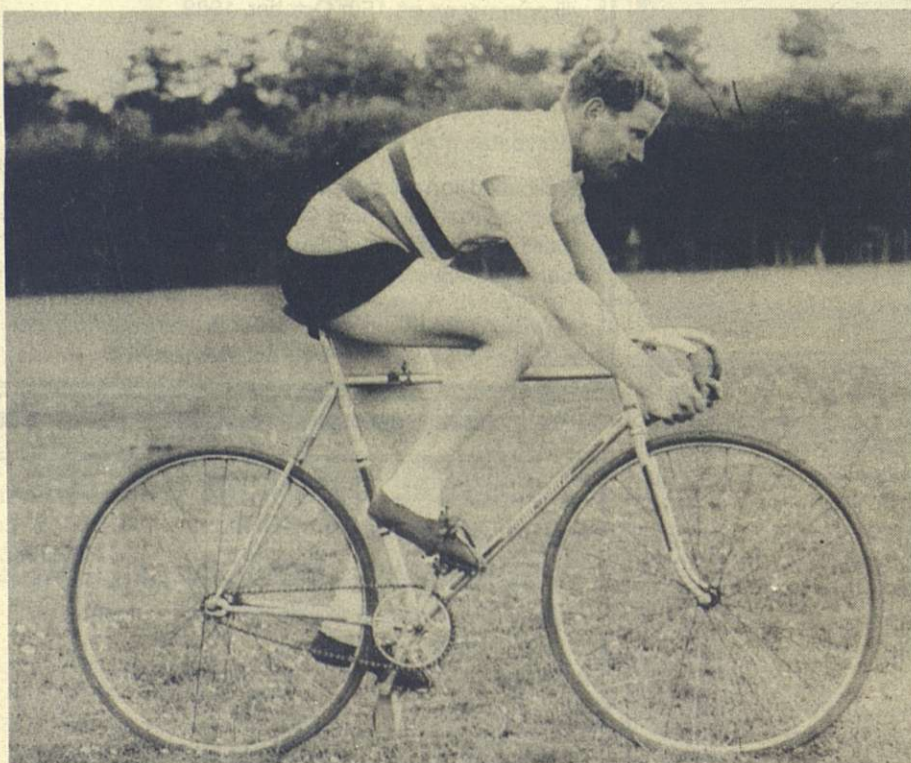
NOW IN RETIREMENT

In the 1940s he married Nellie Donovan, the Jubilee Nurse who came to Cappoquin from Clonakilty, and after running 'The Railway Bar' up until his retirement a few years ago, they built a house exactly halfway between Lismore — the town of his birth — and Cappoquin — the town where he had lived most of his life.

He continued to maintain links with the local cycling club by racing almost every week, and when he eventually put his bike out to pasture he turned his hand to greyhounds.

Success came to him in this area as well, as many good dogs were bred and raced on the track and coursing. Jimmy is currently a member of the Irish Coursing Board.

For me it was an honour and a privilege to have met and have tea with a man who was one of Ireland's greatest cyclists, in the truly amateur days before the spectre of money came over so many of our sports.

ICMSA Call For Change In Sheep Dipping Schedule

The ICMSA proposed on Thursday last that the timing for the official dipping of sheep should be based on good, current sheep husbandry practices, and the practicalities of sheep farming on the upland and mountain areas.

Mr. Eamonn O'Rourke, Chairman of the ICMSA Sheep Committee, said that while ICMSA recognised the reasons for the fixing of a six-weeks period, the Association are proposing that different periods be set for lowland areas and upland/mountain areas. The ICMSA are recommending the following periods: Lowland: 1st September to 14th September (Inclusive); Upland/Mountain: 22nd September to 3rd November (Inclusive).

WOULD FACILITATE FARMERS

ICMSA believe that this would allow lowland sheep farmers to carry out dipping before the commencement of flushing or mating. Furthermore, by providing for a different period for the upland and mountain areas it would also facilitate farmers in these regions.

ICMSA are satisfied that with proper administration and control of the scheme no cross-infection of flocks should occur.

English Company Alleges Trade Mark Infringement Against Waterford Co-op

An interim order was granted by Mr. Justice MacKenzie in the High Court in Dublin on Wednesday last to a British company restraining Waterford concerns from passing off their washing liquid as that of the British company.

Mr. Brian O'Moore, barrister for Procter and Gamble, of Newcastle-on-Tyne, said his client's complaint was in regard to a product from Waterford Foods plc and Waterford Co-op Society Ltd., both of Dungarvan, Co. Waterford.

Procter and Gamble had a product which was referred to as "mild green Fairy Liquid." The defendant's product was called "mildly green Fairy dish washing liquid."

The British company wanted the Waterford concerns to be restrained

from infringing its trade mark. It also wanted them to be restrained from passing off their liquid as Procter and Gamble's and in particular the use of the phrase "mildly green fairy."

They also objected to the use of a child device or mark on the container, and to the red and green colour combination, as was on the Procter and Gamble product.

Mr. Justice MacKenzie granted an injunction until the next vacation sitting of the Court later this month.

They Have Spent 154 Glorious Years In Religion

When Kilmacthomas born Fr. Virgil Power celebrated the Golden Jubilee of his ordination recently, he became the third member of a remarkable Co. Waterford family to reach the milestone of half a century in religious life.

Last year one of his sisters, Sr. Angela Patrice, celebrated the Golden Jubilee of her profession as a Franciscan Sister, and two years earlier another sister, Sr. Eileen Marie, also celebrated her 50 years in the same order, having been professed in 1936.

Thus between them the trio have a combined total of 154 years in religion, which is an extraordinary achievement.

The Powers are natives of Fahafeelagh near Kilmacthomas and are members of a family of eight, four boys and four girls, six of whom are still alive. Their parents were the late Nicholas Power and Hannah Queally.

Twenty-three priests celebrated the golden Jubilee Mass for Fr. Power in Stradbally Church on Sunday, July 30, with the Golden Jubilarian himself the chief celebrant.

Five Cistercian priests represented the community at Mount Melleray, and the homily was preached by Very Rev. Fr. Michael Olden, P.P., Kilsheelan whom Fr. Power taught in Mount Melleray and who himself was taught at the same seminary in 1927 by Fr. Olden's late father.

Now retired and living in Beverley Hills, Florida, Fr. Power also had a Golden Jubilee Mass in Shelter Island, Long Beach, in which five Bishops participated. It was then back home to Ire-

land and County Waterford to celebrate the momentous milestone with his family, and his two Golden Jubilarian sisters.

EARLY EDUCATION

Fr. Power's early education was received at Stradbally Mercy Convent and Currabaha N.S. He then went to Mount Melleray where he sat his Intermediate and Leaving Certificates followed by two years studying philosophy. He entered the Cistercian community at Mount Melleray in 1933 and was ordained in 1939 at the age of 26.

In Sept. of that year he was transferred to the Order's Abbey at New Melifont in Co. Louth but a year later was back at Melleray teaching Latin and Greek at the seminary.

He subsequently was handed responsibility for vocations, and today many of his students are serving the Church in every corner of the globe. He also held posts of Novice Master and Guest Master — the latter involving looking after those who stayed at the guest house. Fr. Power can still recall the many distinguished guests who stayed at Mount Melleray at the time. Among them were the late President de Valera, Cardinal Cushing of Boston, and former Tory Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden.

In 1956 Fr. Power heard the call of the missions and he left his monastic home

at Melleray for the bustling life of Long Island in New York, where he also had an uncle, Monsignor Peter Queally ministering.

He subsequently became chaplain to the sisters of St. Joseph at Brentwood, Long Island, a post he occupied for 12 years. He recalls that at that time there were between 70 and 80 clerical novices each year. Today that number has plummeted to no more than four or five.

FIRST PARISH

In 1968 he got his first parish at Greenport, Long Island, where his uncle, Mons. Queally had been pastor all of sixty years before. Eight years further on in 1976, he was transferred to Centre Moriches, also in Long Island, and he remained there until 1980 when he was transferred to the parish of Our Lady of the Isle on Shelter Island off the coast of Long Island.

He spent seven years there when he decided to retire and went to live in Beverley Hills in Florida. However he continues to help out in the various parishes in Florida and celebrates at least two Masses every weekend.

During his years in the United States Fr. Power became deeply involved in Irish affairs and in Long Island was chaplain to the Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH). He also organised what became known as

the Shamrock ball each St. Patrick's Day and he has walked in the New York St. Patrick's Day Parade for night on 30 years. He was also aide to the parade's Grand Marshal in 1981.

Although he has a deep love of Ireland, and visits the "auld sod" every year, he has no plans to live permanently here. He returns to Florida in mid September.

Sr. Eileen Marie is based

in Wilmington, Delaware, and Sr. Angela Patrice in Philadelphia, but like Fr. Vigil, also retain an intense love of the homeland.

Fr. Power will tell you with obvious pride that the christian name Virgil now extends through three generations of the family.

He said his late uncle, Fr. Pat Queally, was the one responsible for giving him the name, and only a few weeks ago, Fr. Power bap-

tised his grandnephew Virgil Power whose father also bears the same christian name.

The three Golden Jubilarians are extremely modest about their life and times in religion. But behind that modesty too is a pride in all that they have achieved over those combined total of 154 glorious years serving Christ. It is a pride all three are well entitled to hold.

From his farming and business background which spanned countless generations in the Old Boro' Liam who was aged 70 farmed extensively and carried on a successful business over the years. Liam who was so well known and respected, will be greatly missed. His demise marks the end of an era as his brother Fr. John, Vinny and Paddy Joe have all been summoned to their Heavenly abode. In his younger days Liam was an active member of Dungarvan G.A.A. Club and on many auspicious occasions he donned the club jersey with no small success. He was also interested in greyhounds and was owner of the once well-known "O'Connell St. King" and "O'Connell St. Baby". For many years Liam was Acting Steward and President of the local Point-to-Point meeting and indeed the many successes of his "Glenwilliam Rover" in the confined members race was close to his heart.

The great "Kerrygold Island" which he bred was another string to his equestrian bow as this horse which is now renamed "Hardy" competed in the

Aga Khan Nations Cup at Ballsbridge and more recently in the Seoul Olympics for Jack Doyle. At numerous Dungarvan Shows he was an able judge of cattle, horses and sheep. His involvement and his assistance with the foundation of the Dungarvan Blazers, on registration Dungarvan Harriers, is part of the sporting history of the area and for decades he was Joint Master of the Harriers.

All his life he took a keen interest in the welfare of the Marts and was a noted judge for Cork Marts throughout the Munster Region. From some of his close friends we learned that Liam was a fine shot with a gun and was an excellent trout fisherman. The owner of a kind and sincere nature, Liam was a friend to everyone regardless of one's station in life.

We mourn with deep sympathy the passing of Liam Morrissey farmer, businessmen and sportsman extraordinaire, who has left an indelible mark on many aspects of society for which we are truly grateful. We tender our condolences to his wife, family and relatives on their great loss.

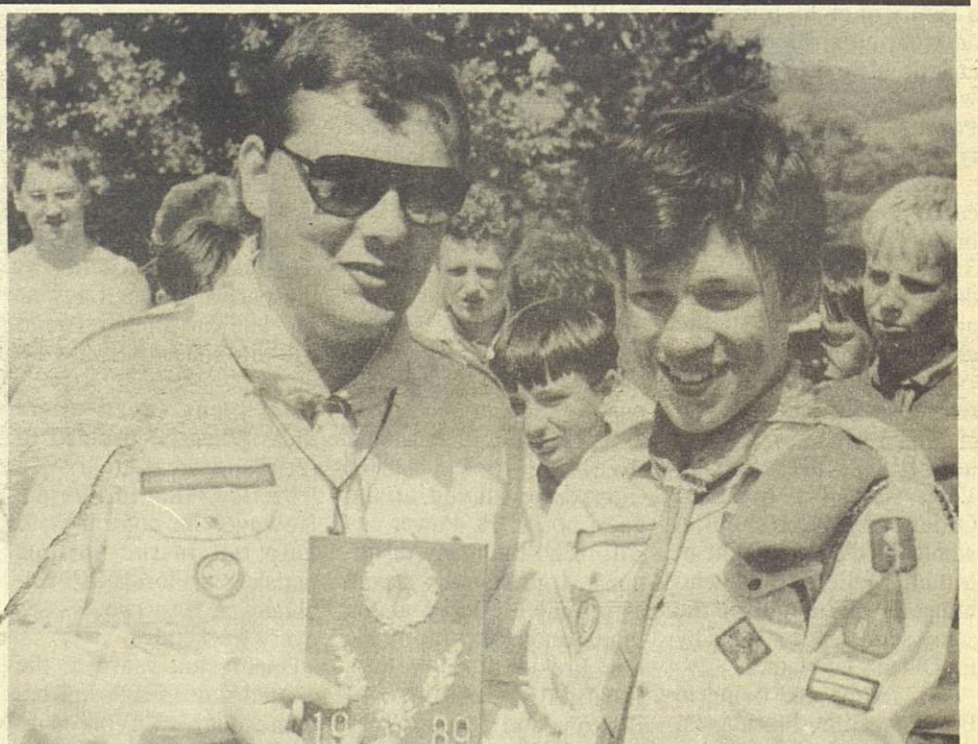

PENSMAN Takes You. . . . Behind The SPOTLIGHT

RTE AND BORD FAILTE IGNORE WEST WATERFORD

Last week's programme in the RTE television series *Holiday Ireland '89* presented by Kathleen Watkins (Mrs. Gay Byrne) and Gavin Duffy, purported to deal with the holiday resorts and beauty spots of County Waterford. It did no such thing. The programme concentrated mainly on Tramore and Dunmore East and made only a very passing comment on the entire West of the county with a rather brief reference to the Nire Valley.

We understand that Bord Failte paid thousands of pounds to RTE to help in producing the series and despite the BF claim that control of the programmes remained in the hands of RTE we feel sure that they must have had some say in the content of each programme as the series moved from County to County.

In recent weeks there have been rumours of strong dissatisfaction with the programmes, laced with allegations that RTE had abandoned its public service role in readiness to do battle with the new TV3 stations. One programme in particular has already come in for special attack — that which featured Ashford Castle in Co. Mayo — which has been criticised for concentrating too much on the luxury aspects of the hotel.

Our criticism of the RTE-Bord Failte series insofar as the programme dealing with Co. Waterford is concerned is that it was too lop-sided and portrayed the holiday possibilities of the County as all being within a distance of ten or fifteen miles of the City of Waterford.

Apart from the Nire Valley there was no reference whatever to any other holiday resort or beauty spot in the West Waterford region. We wonder have the producers of the programme ever heard of Ardmore, Clonea, Stradbally, Lismore or the magnificence of the scenic beauty to gladden both the eye and the heart that abounds along the lovely Comeragh Drive.

We realise that in compiling a television programme, producers must have an eye to the time factor allowed but is it not as important, if not more so, that there should be a proper balance in the content of the programme.

We trust that the County Council and indeed the Dungarvan Urban Council, both of which contribute generously to the funds of the Tourist Organisation, will let those concerned with the production of the programme know that they are not at all pleased with the way it has been turned

out by almost totally ignoring the entire region of West Waterford.

REMEMBERING AN tATHAIR VICTOR

A committee of former members of Aisteoiri an tSean Phobal who took part in plays produced by the late Fr. Victor Power (An t-Athair Victor de Paor) during the period when he was a Curate in the Parish of Ring and Old Parish (An Sean Phobal) from 1957 to 1964, has decided to honour his contribution to the parish, particularly in the dramatic field, by erecting a plaque to his memory on the external wall of Halla Naomh Colman in Old Parish.

The Committee is hoping to have the plaque prepared and in position by early September when a special unveiling ceremony will take place. Members of Fr. Victor's family will attend as well as people from the locality and a number of dramatic artists who were associated with him. We have been informed that the unveiling ceremony will be performed by Tomas Mac Anna of the Abbey Theatre.

An impressive programme to honour the occasion has been drawn up by the Committee. It will commence with a Memorial Mass in Old Parish Church which will be followed by the unveiling ceremony. This will be followed by a Cabaret and Dinner in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan during which extracts of recordings of Victor Power with RTE with passages from his plays and writings together with music will be given.

At present the committee is in the throes of collecting memorabilia connected with An t-Athair Victor — old photographs or programmes associated with his years in the parish — to enable them to compile a souvenir programme for the occasion and would be grateful to hear from anyone who can help in this regard.

As the undertaking will cost a considerable amount of money, the committee would also appreciate any

John and Mark will display their skills before a capacity crowd during the interval in the senior game. Without doubt this is a great honour for Dungarvan CBS and we wish the boys every success on this, their first appearance in Pairc An Chrocaigh on Sunday.

WILL THEY EVER LEARN?

Twenty years ago, on August 14, 1969, British troops were sent into Northern Ireland. The situation as it has since evolved was the subject of forceful editorial comment published in the London "Daily Mirror" on Thursday last, August 10. Signed by the paper's publisher, Robert Maxwell, the editorial appeared as "Page One Comment" under the caption, "Ulster — 20 Years Of Blood and Tears."

This is what it stated: "Twenty years ago, British troops were sent to Northern Ireland to keep the peace. There is still no peace and there can be no peace while they are there."

"On August 14, 1969, Harold Wilson's Labour government dispatched the troops to stop the Protestants terrorising the Catholics. Successive governments have believed, sincerely but mistakenly, that 'there will be a bloodbath' if the troops leave."

"Yet every twelve days, on average, a British soldier or Ulster Defence Regiment volunteer has been killed. So have nearly 2,000 civilians and 263 members of the Royal Ulster Constabulary. That is a bloodbath."

"We repeat what we have said over the years. Britain cannot solve the Irish problem because we caused it

with partition in 1921 and we are still part of it.

"A settlement cannot be reached until Britain has withdrawn totally from Ireland. That would compel all the people — North and South — to work together to build a new and peaceful nation."

"That would strip the IRA of the bulk of its support. Its existence depends on being able to inflame emotions against the old British enemy. In a united Ireland few would follow its failed Marxist atheism."

"That is the only way out of continuing bigotry, hatred, anarchy and murder."

"Much has changed in 20 years. Britain and the Re-

public are bound together as partners in the European Community which guarantees fair treatment, human rights and justice. The new problems of Ireland would be open to a European solution."

"It wouldn't be weakness for Britain to leave. It would be strength. It is the only path to permanent peace. Must thousands more be murdered in Ulster before a British Government has the vision to see it?"

We believe that Mr. Maxwell's editorial in his "Daily Mirror" makes a lot of sense and we hope that it has been read by those in high places.

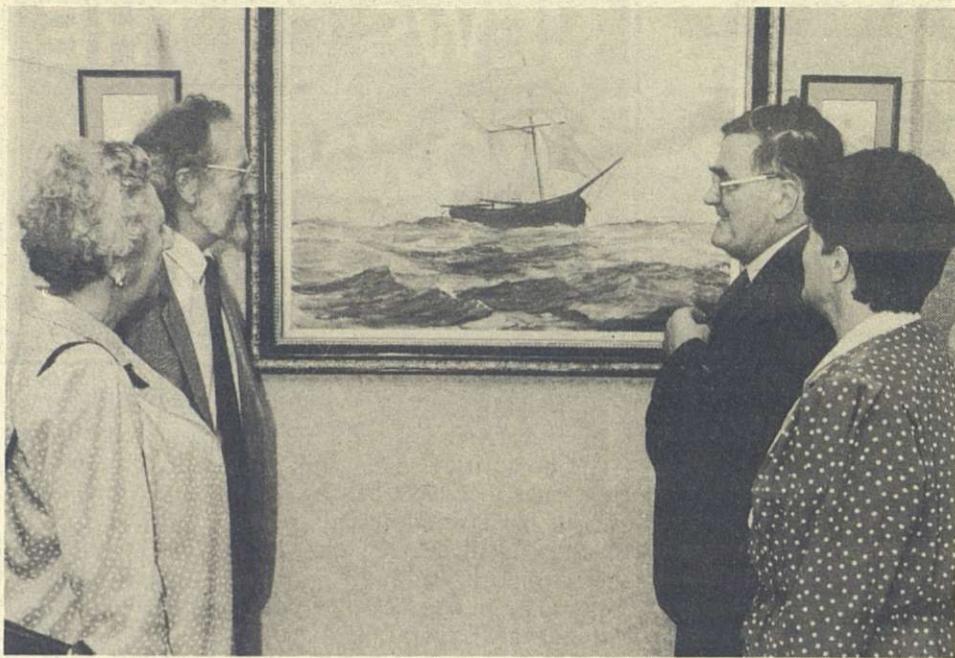

Top Horse Show Puissance Win For Capt. John Ledingham

Capt. John Ledingham, a member of the Ireland and Army Jumping team who hails from Ticknock, Kinsalebeg, Youghal, made history at the RDS Horse Show in Dublin last week when, for the fourth year in succession, jumping for Ireland, this time on Kilcoltrim, he won the prestigious Kerrygold European Community Puissance, the power event at the Show.

In a superb performance, Capt Ledingham on the 16.2 bay gelding were the only combination to go clear in the fourth round with a magnificent jump of 7-1" to beat the top puissance riders in Europe. Following his sky-high jump to victory, Capt Ledingham frankly admitted that he had never been under such pressure in all his life. "Being last in a puissance event is the heck of a challenge because when it comes to your turn, it's all up there for you to do," he said.

On the previous day, Capt Ledingham, also riding Kilcoltrim, won the Kerry-

gold Top Score Competition and the two wins saw him collect more than £7,000 for the Army Equestrian School, in addition to the magnificent Waterford Crystal Trophy which he won for the Puissance event and which was presented to him by a beaming EC Agriculture Commissioner, Ray MacSharry.

Unfortunately the lucky streak of the first two days deserted the fancied Ireland team on Friday and after a disastrous first round in the Aga Khan Trophy, the best the Irish team could do was to finish fourth behind Great Britain.

"Miss Moet" Returns To Kilmacthomas

The Irish bred mare "Miss Moet" was honoured at an unique retirement ceremony in the main arena of the Kerrygold Dublin Horse Show on Thursday last, August 9.

Bred by Mr. Patrick O'Connell in Kilmacthomas, she was first associated with Tommy Brennan who rode her as "Abbeville" when she was owned by the Haughey family. In 1975 she began her association with the great international rider Nelson Pessoa of Brazil, who said of her recently, "she taught me what it really meant to have a splendid Irish

horse." "Miss Moet" has won 72 Puissance competitions all over the world and is believed to have jumped the wall at more than two metres (6.1/2 ft.) on at least 140 occasions. Her lifetime earnings are estimated to have been in the region of £140,000.

To mark the retirement occasion, Moet et Chandon with the help of Bord

Bainne hosted a reception during which "Miss Moet" had a garland of laurels placed around her neck by Mr. Stephen O'Connor, Vice-Chairman, Bord Bainne and Chief Executive, Waterford Co-op Society. Moet also presented magnums of champagne to the horse's previous owners, among them Mrs. Maureen Haughey, wife of the Taoiseach.

On the home front, practically all the action will be packed into Friday and Saturday evenings and with every one of the five senior football championship games which are

down for decision being of great importance to the participants, the results will be awaited with great interest.

These are the last five games in the league section of the championship and it is unusual that all are important, because normally at this stage all clubs know their fate.

KILROSSANTY V. NIRE

Going into their final match these have ten and eight points each respectively and on the result of this game one or other could go through to the semi-final or as will be the case if the Nire win, they will be forced to meet again to break the deadlock that will have arisen. On the basis of their poor display on Sunday in Lismore, the Nire will go into this one as rank outsiders.

Coming out of the Lismore game on Sunday I asked a well-known Nire clubman if they had any chance of beating Kilrossanty after their disappointing performance against Dungarvan. He told me that several of them will be sent to see a blacksmith during the week and by the week-end they will be well ready for the reigning champions.

They will need to have improved a lot, too, from the form they showed when they last met Kilrossanty (1988) and suffered a 13 points hammering from Jim Maher, Pierric Whyte, Pat Quinn, Michael Walsh, Tom Behan, Pat and Tom Pender, Nicky Hayes, Pat Keating and company and as I have written, unless they show considerable improvement they may suffer the same fate here. This was earlier predicted as being one of the best games of the championship, and one never knows, it still could be. Kilrossanty are given a confident vote.

STRADBALLY V. CLASHMORE

This game is vital to both. If Stradbally win — and that is the public perception of the result — then Stradbally are safely through to the quarter-final with eight points from six games. If Clashmore win — and this is by no means

outside the bounds of possibility — then Clashmore and Stradbally could be involved in a play-off for third spot in their group.

This game is being played at the right time for Dungarvan and Butlerstown, one of whom will come right back into the reckoning if Clashmore win.

Stradbally and Clashmore have not met in the past two years, so it is difficult to assess the prospects of either. Stradbally, in my judgment, are merely 'hanging-on' in the top section of their group and if Clashmore could maintain their first 45 minutes form against Kilrossanty for the hour against Stradbally, they could beat them. However presuming that Stradbally have the capacity to improve their game to a greater extent, than have Clashmore, I will give them a hesitant vote.

DUNGARVAN V. BUTLERSTOWN

The importance of this game to both clubs is spelt out in the preview of the Clashmore/Stradbally game. If Clashmore survive on Friday evening, this meeting between Dungarvan and Butlerstown will be a real 'hum-dinger.' When they met at Leamybrien last year Butlerstown won by 2-9 to 1-4, but now Dungarvan, fielding at full strength for this tie, will be a different proposition and can reverse the result of their last meeting.

DUNHILL V. TRAMORE

This is important only be-

cause the losers will have to meet Ferrybank who are propping up the table in the other group, for relegation. I believe that Dunhill will survive this one. They invariably play well when their backs are to the wall.

KILMAC' V. GAULTIER

If Kilmacthomas saw Gaultier beat Rathgormack so decisively on Saturday night, they will know what they are up against in trying to win this tie, which is absolutely vital to their chances of qualifying. At the moment, Gaultier, who are the 1988 intermediate champions have a point more than Kilmacthomas, so a draw will suffice to keep them in the hunt for the moment. It would, of course, mean a play-off with Kilmacthomas to determine which side goes forward to the quarter-finals.

Should Gaultier win, a very interesting situation will arise as they will be on level terms with St. Saviours who are the intermediate champions of the previous year. This would entail a play-off for a place in the semi-final and what a thriller that would be.

Going on their form at the moment, Gaultier, even without Anthony Qualter, who is in the USA, would appear to have the better chance and they are given the vote to win.

Six substitutions will be allowed and a player sent off may be substituted in the next quarter. It is proposed to present the winners with a set of track-suits.

PROPOSED RULE CHANGES

1. **Duration** — Inter-county games to be played in four quarters of eighteen minutes each (fifteen for club games), with a change over of not more than one minute and a ten minute (half-time) interval.

2. **Kick-Out** — (a) All kick-outs to be taken from the hands, from within the small rectangle, on receipt of an appropriate signal (whistle) from the referee.

(b) The players taking the kick-out may kick it more than once before any other player touches it, but not take it into his hands.

(c) All players shall be outside the 20m. line until the ball has been kicked, except the goalkeeper who shall remain inside the small rectangle and/or the player taking the kick, if other than the goalkeeper. If an attacking player offends, he shall be penalised by a free being awarded from the 20m. line opposite to where he stood. If a defending player offends, a throw-in shall be awarded from the 20m. line opposite to where he stood.

(d) The player taking the kick-out, if other than the goalkeeper may not play the ball to the goalkeeper.

3. **Free-Kicks** (Not including penalties) — (a) A player who is fouled shall have the option of taking the kick from his hands or the ground, at the point where the foul occurred, or alternatively leaving it for another player to take from the ground.

(b) Players who are fouled inside the 13m. line but outside the large rectangle too have the option outlined in A.

Penalty: (For advancing beyond point where the free is to be taken) — Throw-in where the offence occurred.

4. **Sideline Kick** — To be taken from the hands where the ball crossed the line. Penalty: (For advancing beyond the point where the kick is to be taken). Throw-in where the ball crossed the line.

5. **Pick-Up** — One-handed scoop pick-up to be permitted, provided the player is not lying, sitting or kneeling on the ground. Penalty: (Category D foul). Free kick where the offence occurred.

6. **Hand-Pass**: There must be a definite striking action. **Two handed**: The striking hand must not be in contact with the ball immediately before delivering the strike. **One handed**: The ball must be tossed and struck with the same hand (open/closed).

A throw is defined as follows: (a) When the ball is held in both hands and played away by releasing it from both hands simultaneously; (b) When the ball is held in one hand and played away directly by that hand.

7. **Teeing Up The Ball**: i.e. kicking a divot or creating any form of elevated platform for the purpose of taking a free kick from the ground to be prohibited. Penalty: Throw-in from where the free is set to be taken.

Bord Bainne Sponsors FAB Training Programme

Bord Bainne has announced that it will sponsor the training schemes administered by the Farm Apprenticeship Board for the years 1989, 1990 and 1991. The sponsorship will amount to £10,000 per annum.

Announcing the sponsorship in Dublin last week, Mr. Tom Cleary, Chairman of An Bord Bainne said that everyone recognises the good work of the Farm Apprenticeship Board in the area of agricultural training. "The Dairy Board was glad to offer financial assistance which is now needed because of the continuing cutbacks in state funding for Agriculture."

"The majority of those graduating for the scheme are working in dairy farms. They therefore contribute enormously to the development of the dairy industry both as apprentices and as farmers/managers/operators. It is appropriate, therefore, for An Bord Bainne to provide financial assistance to allow the Farm Apprenticeship Board continue it's excellent work."

Mr. Tom Doyle, Chairman, Farm Apprenticeship Board said that the high

cost of Agricultural College education was forcing many sons and daughters of farmers to seek careers outside farming. The minimum fee for attending an agricultural college for 1989-90 is £1,350, yet there were no fees payable for some third level courses run by CERT, RTC's/VEC's and FAS.

VERY STRONG DEMAND

As a result, Mr. Doyle said that there was a dearth of trained, skilled young people seeking employment in agriculture which now created a very strong demand for those who complete the Farm Apprenticeship Scheme. As an example, he said that of 98 vacancies in general farm management listed directly by the Board in the past year, less than 30 had been filled.

"This," said Mr. Doyle, "is a challenge facing the industry and one which must be taken up by all the agencies involved in agricultural education and training. There is no doubt that greater funding is urgently needed to redress the present trend."
